Dear Sir

A I feel that the inspection process has uncovered major flaws in the proposed project for Sizewell.

- 1. Poorly envisaged planning for the road network, leaving small roads bearing an inappropriate and dangerous type and quantity of traffic
- 2. Poor consideration of the coastal erosion processes which will take place over the life of the installation in the Applicant's modelling, design and impact assessments
- 3. The flood risk to the site will remain significant according to the Applicant's assessments even beyond 2140
- 4. The end date of 2140 for removal of all spent fuel and decommissioning contradicts the dates of closer to or beyond 2190 indicated by statutory authorities and EN-6 legislation
- 5. There is insufficient potable water supply for construction and operation this has been known for decades but seems to have taken EDF by surprise
- 6. The grave risks to biodiversity have not been sufficiently calculated either at the construction site or on the foreshore
- 7. The development of a Sizewell Marsh SSSI does not meet the Environment Act 2021with its compensation plans and does not account for the cumulative developmental damage to the catchment area of the Leiston Beck by EAN1 and EA2 wind farms in addition to the disruption proposed by SZC.
- B I have already expressed my concern at the social consequences of construction locally and at the wastefully expensive process which will burden the people of this country for many years to come.
- C I have also written about the militarily foolish plan to concentrate 30% of the UK's energy in a small and vulnerable part of the east coast. The tactics of Russia in Ukraine where nuclear power stations have been targeted and seized should make us re-assess this plan immediately.
- D The time for this kind of nuclear construction was decades ago; the technology belongs to the 20th century and its flaws have still not been overcome.

E The British government should act for the people and the country, and not be cowed, or be told what to do, by the interests of foreign-controlled energy companies like National Grid, EDF, Iberdrola, and so on.
