



The applicant is still undecided what method to use to route cables from Work No. 11 to Work No. 13; open trenching or HDD. Our preference is HDD as this will not result in the destruction of hedgerow and disturbance of nightingale and turtle dove. This area must be protected.






This field entrance is already established and suitable for vehicles to access Field 7 on the Land Plans. The Holloway is 5 metres to the left of this Picture

Access between fields 7 & 8 along the established track is unobstructed, avoiding the need to destroy part of the Holloway.

If this proposal is adopted, the planned diversion of the footpath will no longer be needed and footpath users will be able to enjoy the full beauty of the Holloway without hindrance other than some form of safe crossing.

We suggest this alternative method of accessing field 7 & 8 as the hedgerow loss, whilst disappointing, is of lower value than the current proposals.



This will avoid the needless destruction of an ancient right of way and Hedgerow of higher habitat and food source value





Pathways are bordered by a mix of plantings, thick hedgerow and native

During the year, these hedges provide shelter for birds and minibeasts as well as an abundant food source.




Note the thickness of the planting along the Holloway. This provides excellent protection and habitats for many species.
