Dear Mr Smith and team,

Following my live presentation I felt it would be good to give you a clearer number of call out for the local emergency services in the Friston, Aldeburgh, Leiston and villages that are likely to be effected by the Applicant's application, but it is a struggle to get FOI information from the emergency services, however I can share the following with you:

On average, it takes more than 25 minutes for paramedics to respond to the most serious emergencies in the Aldeburgh, Leiston, Saxmundham, Halesworth, Stradbroke and Eye areas. The slowest times recorded are for Aldeburgh, the end destination of the A1094, which has an average response of 29.46 minutes. (For reference the NHS target is 8 minutes). I don't know the number of daily visits, however while playing golf at Aldeburgh (A1094) it is not unusual to count 3 ambulances under blue light make the journey into Aldeburgh in the time it takes to play the first 9 holes (1 1/2 hrs).

I believe that you will find the following article in the East Anglian Daily Times of great interest:

I cannot find any local fire service stats re number of weekly callouts but I can tell you that in 2019/20 in Suffolk there were 6 fire-related fatalities, 179 casualties, with an average response time of 10 mins 04 seconds (the time has been gradually increasing over the last 8 years). There are no nationally specified standards for fire services to respond to emergencies, but in order to be a fireperson you should be within 6 minutes of the fire station where you are based and 3 miles to the lifeboat.
