In the name of what is good *for the future of humanity* we protest strongly regarding the FIVE NEW SITES as options for future projects planned in the locality of Kelsale, Leiston, Theberton, Sternfield, Snape and Saxmundham - in addition to the Friston site of over 100 acres for EA1N/2 - thus looms the largest energy infrastructure in the UK. This would create:

Multiple landfalls on our already crumbling sand-based coast

Multiple cable routes cutting through the protected Suffolk Coast & Heaths AONB, the Leiston - Aldeburgh Site of Special Scientific Interest, the River Hundred and the Sandlings Special Protected Area

Intolerable noise pollution, light pollution and air pollution to local communities, wildlife and livestock. And far more.

#### CUMALITIVE IMPACT

Cumulative Impact Assessments are a legal requirement of the Planning Inspectorate's Examination procedure. National Grid has been challenged by Interested Parties and the Examiners to be transparent about the scale and detail of this Hub. National Grid has failed to present The Full Picture. SPR's approach to cumulative impact has been to ignore it or to provide only the minimum possible information. The adverse impacts will outweigh any benefits to our region. A catastrophe for the Suffolk Coast and Heaths and all the people who live within it.

Alternative site options exist which are better aligned with the government's environmental policy, sites more appropriate – brownfield or industrialised sites - or sites in need of redevelopment such as Bradwell or Grain.. All must surely, surely be seriously considered.
