Why did VF ignore the holiday let businesses in Necton? Because they were negligible they say. (Just like our road junction?)

One holiday let business in Necton rents out for £1800 in high season – or used to – with the substations and the NG extensions this will all change as they are just across the fields. (The Barn, Necton)

Another gentlemen close to Ivy Todd who runs high end lets gets his repeat business currently from people enjoying star-gazing in rural Norfolk. This is after all designated as a dark rural landscape - well that will all change first during construction, and then during the maintenance work we're told will happen every summer for up to 2 months, 24/7. No wonder VF chose to ignore these businesses. (Westbrooke Holidays).

Fully shielded 'cut off lamps' will be used on all lighting schemes in areas classified as Rural Dark Landscape.

The policy applies to all street lights that are the responsibility of the County Council and is

also advisory in respect to non County Council lighting.

I spoke to Derek Sim, the Station Manager of the local fire service. He said their worst risk will come from field fires, as they're so common and this site will be surrounded by drying crop fields. There were 261 of them in 2018 – actually the link below amends this to 452.


