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Dear Hefin,

In addition to the Heritage Statement 1 and 2 commissioned by GREAT, please find below 4 heritage assets that have also been identified by members of GREAT as being adversely affected by the proposed development.

The Heritage Statement submitted by Cleve Hill Solar Park (November 2018) only refers to the listed buildings in Graveney itself although Historic England and Kent County Council required the developers to carry out an assessment within 5 kilometres of the proposed development. This assessment fails to identify the many assets that will receive an effect that is significant on their settings. The Heritage Statement submitted by Cleve Hill Solar Park is therefore at best wholly incomplete. This approach devalues and minimizes the negative effect on all listed and non-designated settings that would have clear visibility of the proposed development.

Oyster Bay House in Faversham situated on Standard Quay  
*Grade 2 Listed Building, an imposing building, a tall warehouse of the mid 19th century (circa 1843) with 3 storeys built when the Creek was improved.*

Saint Peter's Church in Oare  
*Grade 1 Listed Building, situated about a mile and a half from Faversham, dating back to the 12th and 13th centuries and which continues to serve the people from Oare and nearby rural communities.*

Church House in Oare  
*Grade 2 Listed Building, dating back to the 18th and 19th Century with gardens running parallel with the church yard*

Pheasant Farmhouse in Oare  
*Grade 2 Listed Building, built 15th and 17th Century, it is situated to the the side of Saint Peter's Church*
