28 ONSHORE ARCHAEOLOGICAL DESK BASED ASSESSMENT

28.1 Introduction

28.1.1 Background

- 1. Royal HaskoningDHV has been commissioned by Norfolk Vanguard Limited. to undertake an Archaeological Desk Based (Baseline) Assessment (ADBA) as part of the Environmental Statement (ES) for the onshore project area of the proposed Norfolk Vanguard Offshore Wind Farm (herein 'the project').
- 2. The ADBA feeds into the ES chapter for onshore archaeology and cultural heritage, to be submitted as part of the DCO application in June 2018, as a key technical appendix.
- 3. This ADBA has been prepared in compliance with the Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) for ADBA (Terrestrial Archaeology) prepared by Royal HaskoningDHV on behalf of Norfolk Vanguard Limited specifically for the project (Royal HaskoningDHV, 2017). The ADBA is a 'point in time' document prepared during the initial stages of the iterative project design process for the PEIR submission in October 2017. The project description, study areas, site visits and baseline information referred to herein have thus been refined and superseded by those set out in Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage.
- 4. Review and approval of the WSI was provided by Historic England (HE) and Norfolk County Council (NCC) Historic Environment Service (HES). HE's approval of the WSI was received via emails dated to the 04/05, 17/05 and 26/05 2017. NCC HES agreed verbally to the WSI as part of a face-to-face discussion following an Expert Topic Group Meeting conducted on the 02/02/2017 relevant to coastal, intertidal and nearshore archaeological considerations (discussed below).
- 5. The WSI was prepared following the Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage Method Statement (Norfolk Vanguard Limited, 2017), originally submitted in draft to NCC HES and HE on the 25th January 2017, as part of the Evidence Plan Process and in advance of the first Expert Topic Group meeting for Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage held on 1st February 2017.
- 6. A Scoping Report (Royal HaskoningDHV, 2016), preceding the Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage Method Statement, was submitted to the Planning Inspectorate on the 3rd October 2016, with a subsequent Scoping Opinion received on the 11th November 2016.
- 7. Subsequent to the first Expert Topic Group Meeting (01/02/2017) a further meeting was arranged and took place on 02/05/2017 specific to coastal, intertidal and





nearshore archaeological considerations at the landfall options, and focusing on Happisburgh South. This included representatives from the Ancient Human Occupation of Britain (AHOB) and Pathways to Ancient Britain (PAB) Projects and discussed the need for a formalised survey-specific WSI to be prepared for the forthcoming archaeological monitoring and geotechnical site investigation works (see section 28.2.9).

8. The next Evidence Plan Process Expert Topic Group Meeting took place with NCC HES and HE in July 2017.

28.1.2 Development Proposal

- 9. The project comprises both offshore and onshore elements. Offshore, two distinct areas of project have been proposed, comprising Norfolk Vanguard East (NV East) and Norfolk Vanguard West (NV West), connected to the shore via offshore export cables. Onshore, various elements of infrastructure will be required in order to connect the wind farm to the national grid at the Necton National Grid substation. The onshore project area will comprise:
 - Landfall;
 - One cable relay station (CRS) (if required under a HVAC option). There are currently two location options being considered. This will be refined to include one CRS location for the ES and DCO application submission in June 2018;
 - Onshore underground cables;
 - Onshore project substation; and
 - Extension to the existing Necton National Grid substation and overhead line modifications.

28.1.3 Purpose of this Document

28.1.3.1 Aims

10. The aim of this ADBA is to outline, as far as is possible from existing information, the nature, extent and significance of the archaeology and cultural heritage (historic environment) baseline resource within the proposed onshore project study area and, where relevant, its immediate surroundings.

28.1.3.2 Objectives

- 11. The specific aim of this baseline ADBA is further defined via the application of the following objectives:
 - To outline the known and potential heritage assets within the site, based on a review of existing information in order to provide an archaeological and historical baseline context within a defined study area;





- To assess the significance of the known and potential heritage assets through a
 weighted consideration of their valued components and to provide a
 consideration of the contribution that setting has on the significance of heritage
 assets, where relevant; and
- To identify the potential impacts of the proposed project upon heritage assets and their setting as part of a high-level assessment.
- 12. More specific reference to and assessment of heritage significance and impact significance is detailed within Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage of the ES. The ADBA focuses predominantly on establishing the archaeology and cultural heritage baseline conditions of the onshore project area.

28.1.4 Scope

13. This ADBA details the baseline environment with respect to onshore archaeology and cultural heritage where relevant to the project. It incorporates relevant archaeological assessment data available to date, including desk-based research, aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment (Annex 28.1.3) and an initial settings assessment (section 28.5). Recommendations that arise from the result of this assessment are included as part of ES Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage and are beyond the scope of this document.

28.2 Methodology

28.2.1 Introduction

14. The following methodology has been designed in a manner consistent with good practice professional guidance outlined by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' (CIfA) Standards and guidance for historic environment desk-based assessment (CIfA, 2014).

28.2.2 The Study Area

- 15. For the purposes of this ADBA, two principal study areas (SA) have been established, defined as follows:
 - Non-designated Heritage Assets study area: defined by a 500m boundary around (either side of) the 200m onshore cable corridor easement, CRS and onshore project substation and the Necton National Grid extension works including overhead line modifications.
 - Designated Heritage Assets study area: defined by a 1km boundary around the 200m onshore cable corridor easement, CRS and onshore project substation and the Necton National Grid extension works including overhead line modifications.





- 16. In line with the WSI for the ADBA (Royal HaskoningDHV, 2017), with regards to the non-designated heritage assets, an initial 1km study area was placed around the CRS search areas and onshore project substation search area in order to provide a record of heritage assets which served to both inform the wider baseline context and to assist heritage setting considerations. The study area as presented in this appendix has been defined based on the project description in June 2017. Due to the ongoing refinement of the onshore project area, this has since been refined down, however the data and coverage is still considered to be valid.
- 17. Potential setting impacts (see section 28.5 and Annex 28.1.1) such as those arising from above ground infrastructure will be looked at over a wider area, and will tie-in with the Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment (LVIA) process and tools kits such as Zones of Theoretical Visibility (ZTVs) and photomontages, once produced and where necessary (see Chapter 29 Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment).

28.2.3 Sources

28.2.3.1 Documentary and internet sources

- 18. The following documentary and internet sources were consulted in order to compile this ADBA:
 - The Norfolk Historic Environment Record (NHER), including records of previous archaeological surveys and investigations (events) (data received 10/05/2016);
 - The National Record of the Historic Environment (NRHE) and the National Heritage List for England online (http://www.historicengland.org.uk/listing/the-list/) maintained by HE (accessed January to May 2017);
 - The Norfolk Record Office;
 - Regional, Local and Period Archaeological Studies and Journals, including the East Anglia Archaeology and Norfolk Archaeology Journal Series (referenced in section 28.7);
 - The Archaeology Data Service (ADS);
 - Existing and available geotechnical data (e.g. boreholes / trial pits) (see section 28.2.9);
 - The Ancient Human Occupation of Britain (AHOB) and Pathways to Ancient Britain (PAB) Projects, with respect to Happisburgh and known sites of international importance, associated with the 'Cromer Forest Bed deposits';
 - The Environment Agency's removal of failed sea defences archaeological evaluation report re: Happisburgh (Birks, 2016);
 - Other documentary sources relevant to the archaeological and historical background of the study area (referenced in section 28.7).





28.2.3.2 Cartographic sources

- 19. A number of historic maps were reviewed in order to undertake high-level historic map regression of the study area as presented this ADBA, including Enclosure and Tithe maps and 1st, 2nd and later edition Ordnance Survey maps. Cartographic data were sought from the following sources:
 - The NHER;
 - The Norfolk Record Office; and
 - NCC's Historic Map Explorer (http://www.historic-maps.norfolk.gov.uk/mapexplorer/).
- 20. Historic maps have been requested as part of Envirocheck searches, which provides data on amongst other things land quality conditions and land contamination, required for other environmental and / or engineering purposes. This data has not been scrutinised at the time of compiling this baseline ADBA. This historic map data will be subject to a detailed examination as part of the ongoing development of the full ES chapter and DCO application to be submitted in June 108.

28.2.3.3 Aerial photographic data

- 21. This baseline ADBA includes the results of the aerial photographic data assessment, undertaken by Air Photo Services Ltd. (APS, 2017). The APS report and accompanying figures are also included in full as Annex 28.1.3.
- 22. Aerial photographs can be very useful for identifying and / or assisting in the interpretation and identification of heritage assets and archaeological remains. The following sources were consulted in order to compile the aerial photographic data assessment:
 - NHER;
 - HE Archive, Swindon;
 - Available online images at Google Earth and Bing;
 - National Mapping Programme (NMP) the Norfolk Coast (including the Rapid Coastal Zone Assessment) / NMP coverage from relevant in-land areas; and
 - The APEM Photographic Survey (Flyover, 2017).
- 23. Further details regarding the methodology adopted for the aerial photographic data assessment are provided in Annex 28.1.3.

28.2.3.4 Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR)

24. This baseline ADBA includes the results of the LiDAR data assessment, also undertaken by Air Photo Services Ltd. (APS, 2017), and is also included in full as Annex 28.1.3. LiDAR is a remote sensing technique and stands for 'Light Detection And Ranging'. The technique uses an active laser sensor, which sends and receives





rapid pulses of laser light from an airborne aircraft (sometimes known as Airborne Laser Scanning or ALS). The pulses of laser light strike the surface of the earth and are reflected back to the aircraft. The time taken for a pulse of light to reach the ground and return is recorded by the sensor, which allows the three dimensional (x, y, z) location of a point to be determined. As such, LiDAR data can produce horizontally and vertically accurate elevation measurements, thereby enabling archaeological sites which survive as upstanding earthworks to be mapped. LiDAR data can also provide a greater insight into the surroundings of already known archaeological remains and can be used in conjunction with other methods such as aerial photographic assessment.

- 25. The assessment of LiDAR data which informs this baseline ADBA was based on freely available data from the Environment Agency, reviewed in conjunction with aerial photographic data.
- 26. Further details regarding the methodology adopted for the LiDAR data assessment are provided in Annex 28.1.3.

28.2.4 Data Handling

27. Of the sources outlined in section 28.2.3, those with spatial data were incorporated into a project geographic information system (GIS) using ArcGIS 10.5 so that they could be spatially analysed. The data were subsequently compiled into two gazetteers, one for designated heritage assets (Annex 28.1.1) and another for non-designated heritage assets, which also covers where monuments and find spots have been recovered / identified during specifically planned previous archaeological events (Annex 28.1.2). Designated heritage assets were assigned a project-specific ID number in a numerical sequence between 1 and 362 and 1699 to 1701, and non-designated heritage assets between 363 and 1698. At this baseline ADBA stage it is known that there are some duplicated records between the two datasets. For the purposes of this report, the gazetteers are compiled and illustrated in British National Grid. Information from the sources summarised in section 28.2.3 of this document, relating to the archaeological and cultural heritage, informed the baseline establishment work, where relevant.

28.2.5 Chronology

28. Archaeological, cultural and historic material is generally studied within a framework of 'periods' or 'ages' that reflect the activities and cultural changes taking place over time. Dates are referred to as BC (before Christ), BP (before present) or AD (*Anno domini*) within the text. BP dates are used for periods of time older than circa 10,000 years ago whereas BC and AD affectively refer to calendar years.





29. Archaeological periods are broadly defined by the following date ranges:

Palaeolithic: 960,000 BP – 8,500 BC

Mesolithic: 8,500 – 4,000 BC
 Neolithic: 4,000 – 2,200 BC
 Bronze Age: 2,200 – 700 BC
 Iron Age: 700 BC – AD 43
 Romano-British: AD 43 – 410

Early medieval (Saxon): AD 410 – 1066
 Medieval: AD 1066 – 1499
 Post-medieval: AD 1500 – 1799

• 19th Century: AD 1800 – 1899

Modern: AD 1900 – present day.

28.2.6 Setting Assessment Methodology

- 30. In this baseline ADBA the methodology for assessing potential development effects through the alteration of a heritage asset's setting addresses Step 1 of HE's guidance on the Setting of Heritage Assets: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 (HE, 2015a); to identify those heritage assets whose settings might be affected by a given development. This will be of particular relevance to the CRS, onshore project substation, extension of the Necton National Grid substation including overhead line modifications, as well as areas of HDD and mobilisation zones. This approach is also in accordance with the NPPF and associated Planning Practice Guidance (PPG): Conserving and enhancing the historic environment (DCLG, 2012 and 2014).
- 31. The heritage settings assessment (section 28.5 and Annex 28.1.1) identifies and briefly describes the designated heritage assets, located within the defined study area around above ground infrastructure in the onshore project area associated with the project (CRs, onshore project substation and extensions to Necton National Grid substation including overhead line modifications). Initially, the study area was established within a 1km buffer around the entire onshore project area (section 28.2.2). This area may yet be extended, where necessary, based on the Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment (LVIA) process and the associated proposed production of tool kits, such as Zones of Theoretical Visibility (ZTV) and photomontages (for select identified viewpoints), once produced. Any study area extensions will be further informed by and reflect the topography of the landscape within and through which the project infrastructure will be constructed and operated.





- 32. The heritage settings assessment initially focusses on the main, most highly designated heritage assets (i.e. Scheduled Monuments, Grade I and II* Listed Buildings, Conservation Areas and Historic Parks and Gardens). More detailed attention was given to those assets in the immediate vicinity of the proposed above ground infrastructure and any clear lines of sight both from the north and south up and down the Norfolk Coast in respect to the cable relay station options. Particular reference is also given to those assets of significant height or those situated on particularly high ground, as this increases the chances of long range views (visual links) from such assets towards the above ground infrastructure in the onshore project area and vice versa.
- 33. Grade II Listed Buildings were also considered as part of the heritage settings baseline assessment. Assets considered included those of particular note or concern or those located within the 'immediate' vicinity of the proposed above ground infrastructure options. These assets are not generally described in the same level of detail as other more highly designated assets.
- 34. The heritage settings assessment was further supplemented by data attained from a two day site visits to various heritage assets whose settings were regarded as potentially being affected by the proposed project. Site visits were also undertaken with a view to considering/establishing the extent to which setting is considered to contribute to the significance of those heritage assets identified and under consideration.
- 35. The methodology described above was devised with the purpose of facilitating a sufficiently early understanding of the designated, and any key select / applicable non-designated, heritage assets. This enables any potential setting impacts of above ground infrastructure in the onshore project area to be adequately assessed in Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage Chapter of the ES.

28.2.7 Setting Assessment and Significance

36. The methodology for establishing the contribution that setting makes to the significance of the key identified heritage assets, and where and to what extent the proposed project infrastructure forms part of the setting of the identified assets, has been discussed in consultation with NCC HES and HE, as part of feedback from the Scoping Report (Royal HaskoningDHV, 2016), Method Statement (Norfolk Vanguard Limited, 2017) and the Evidence Plan Process Expert Topic Group Meetings (01/02/2017). The next meeting is planned for 19/07/2017.





- 37. The setting of a heritage asset is defined in the NPPF (Department of Communities and Local Government, 2012) as "the surroundings in which a heritage asset is experienced. Its extent is not fixed and may change as the asset and its surroundings evolve. Elements of a setting may make a positive or negative contribution to the significance of an asset, may affect the ability to appreciate that significance or may be neutral."
- 38. Significance is defined in the NPPF Annex 2 as "the value of a heritage asset to this and future generations because of its heritage interest. That interest may be archaeological, architectural, artistic or historic. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting."
- 39. The assessment of the significance of heritage assets within this report has been undertaken in accordance with the criteria set out in Conservation Principles, Policies and Guidance for the Sustainable Management of the Historic Environment (English Heritage, 2008). The guidance provides a comprehensive framework for the sustainable management of the historic environment, wherein 'Conservation' is defined as the process of 'managing change to a significant place and its setting in ways that will best sustain its heritage values, while recognising opportunities to reveal or reinforce those values for present and future generations'. Within this document and more specifically the ES (Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage), significance is weighted by consideration of the potential for the asset to demonstrate the following value criteria:
 - **Evidential value**. Deriving from the potential of a place to yield evidence about past human activity (English Heritage, 2008: 28) and primarily associated with physical remains or historic fabric.
 - Historical value. Deriving from the ways in which past people, events and aspects of life can be connected through a place to the present (English Heritage, 2008: 28). This can derive from particular aspects of past ways of life. Illustrative historical value provides a direct (often visual) link between past and present people, while associative historical value provides an association with notable families, persons, events or movements.
 - Aesthetic value. Deriving from sensory and intellectual stimulation and including
 design value, i.e. "aesthetic qualities generated by the conscious design of a
 building, structure or landscape as a whole" (English Heritage, 2008: 30). It may
 include its physical form, and how it lies within its setting. It may be the result of
 design, or an unplanned outcome of a process of events.
 - Communal value. Deriving from the meanings of a place for the people who
 relate to it, or for whom it figures in their collective experience or memory.
 Communal values are closely bound up with historical (particularly associative)





and aesthetic values, but tend to have additional and specific aspects (English Heritage, 2008: 31).

40. The significance of a heritage asset is typically derived from a combination of some or all of these values, and the setting of a heritage asset can contribute to, or detract from, any of these four values.

28.2.8 Field Reconnaissance Survey

28.2.8.1 Target approach

- 41. This baseline ADBA is supported by information attained from targeted 'heritage specific' site walkover and site visits (to date representing two full days of site visits). Additional site visits will be undertaken the results from which will be included within the ES (Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage).
- 42. Site walkovers have so far been targeted on areas flagged from the desk-based baseline review as being particularly sensitive with the focus to date being on heritage setting considerations.
- 43. Site visits were undertaken to specific designated and select non-designated heritage assets identified thus far as having the most obvious heritage setting implications. A heritage specific site visit was undertaken as part of the heritage settings assessment included within this ADBA and associated ES (Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage) on the 11th and 12th April 2017.

28.2.8.2 Recording methodology

44. A written and photographic record was compiled during site visits on an 'asset by asset', and sometimes 'area by area', basis.

28.2.9 Archaeological Monitoring of Geotechnical Site Investigations

- 45. A programme of geoarchaeological monitoring of ground investigation works for the proposed onshore cable route (landfall and key crossing locations) is anticipated to start in the week commencing the 26th June 2017.
- 46. In summary, the investigation will comprise the monitoring of coring activity and assessment of boreholes logs, with a focus on possible landfall sites at the coast and at seven key crossing locations, where the proposed current onshore cable corridor intersects major transport routes or waterways where trenchless (e.g. Horizontal Directional Drilling HDD) methods will be required. The investigation will also examine ground conditions in two locations at the proposed Happisburgh South Landfall Option. A more detailed methodology is provided in a separate WSI (forthcoming) for the geoarchaeological watching brief (Wessex Archaeology, 2017).





47. In addition to data retrieved from coring as part of the geoarchaeological watching brief, the assessment will also take into consideration any existing and available geotechnical data (e.g. previous boreholes / trial pits, from the BGS or similar) to inform an understanding the presence or absence of deposits of archaeological and / or geoarchaeological potential, where relevant. Borehole data assessed as part of the coastal defence removal works at Happisburgh will also be incorporated in this regard (Birks, 2016).

28.2.10 Defining Impact Significance

48. As noted above in section 28.1.3.2, more specific reference to and assessment of both heritage significance and impact significance will be undertaken within Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage of the ES, as opposed to within this baseline ADBA (Technical Appendix), which focuses predominantly on establishing and summarising the archaeology and cultural heritage baseline conditions of the proposed onshore project infrastructure areas.

28.2.11 Assumptions and Limitations

- 49. Data used to compile this report primarily consists of secondary, pre-existing information derived from a variety of sources. The assumption is made that the secondary data, as well as that derived from other secondary sources, is reasonably accurate.
- 50. The records held by the sources used in this assessment are not a record of all surviving heritage assets, rather a record of the discovery of a range of archaeological and historical components of the historic environment for the study area. The information held within these sources is not complete and does not preclude the subsequent discovery of further elements of the historic environment that are, at present, unknown.

28.2.12 Copyright

51. This report may contain material that is non-Royal HaskoningDHV copyright (e.g. Ordnance Survey, British Geological Survey, Crown Copyright), or the intellectual property of third parties, which is for non-public reproduction. Users remain bound by the conditions of the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988 with regard to multiple copying and electronic dissemination of the report within the public realm.





28.3 Legislation, Policy and Guidance

28.3.1 Legislation

28.3.1.1 Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act (1979) (as amended)

- 52. Under the terms of the Act, an archaeological site or historic building of national importance can be designated as a Scheduled Monument and is registered with the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS). Any development that might physically affect a Scheduled Monument is subject to the granting of Scheduled Monument Consent. HE advises the government on individual cases for consent and offers advice on the management of Scheduled Monuments.
- 53. There are seven Scheduled Monuments within the study area (see section 28.4.2).

28.3.1.2 Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act (1990)

- 54. Statutory protection for Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas, and their settings, is provided under the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act. A Listed Building is that which is seen to be of special architectural or historic interest, and a Conservation Area comprises an area of special architectural or historic interest, the character or appearance of which is desirable to preserve or enhance.
- 55. A Listed Building may not be demolished, altered or extended in any manner which would affect its character without Listed Building Consent being granted by either HE (who are responsible for Grade I and II* Listed Buildings, and proposals relating to demolition of Grade II Listed Buildings) or the relevant Local Planning Authority's Conservation Officer, or equivalent (who is / are responsible for Grade II Listed Buildings). There are three grades of listing (in descending order):
 - Grade I: buildings of exceptional interest;
 - Grade II*: particularly important buildings of more than special interest; and
 - Grade II: buildings of special interest, warranting every effort to preserve them.
- 56. There are 342 Listed Buildings and 11 Conservation Areas within the study area (see section 28.4.2).

28.3.1.3 Historic England Register of Parks and Gardens

- 57. The Register of Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest in England is maintained by HE and divides sites into three grade bands similar to those used for Listed Buildings.
- 58. There are three registered Parks and Gardens within the study area (see section 28.4.2).





28.3.2 National Planning Policy Framework

- 59. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) was published by the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) in March 2012, replacing Planning Policy Statement 5. Provision for the historic environment is principally given in Section 12: Conserving and enhancing the historic environment of the NPPF, which directs Local Planning Authorities to set out "a positive strategy for the conservation and enjoyment of the historic environment, including heritage assets most at risk through neglect, decay or other threats. In doing so, they should recognise that heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource and conserve them in a manner appropriate to their significance." (Department for Communities and Local Government, 2012a).
- 60. The aim of NPPF Section 12 is to ensure that Regional Planning Bodies and Local Planning Authorities, developers and owners of heritage assets adopt a consistent and holistic approach to their conservation and to reduce complexity in planning policy relating to proposals that affect them.
- 61. To summarise, government guidance provides a framework which:
 - recognises that heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource;
 - requires applicants to provide proportionate information on the significance of heritage assets affected by the proposals and an impact assessment of the proposed development on that significance;
 - takes into account the desirability of sustaining and enhancing the significance of heritage assets and their setting;
 - places weight on the conservation of designated heritage assets (which include World Heritage Sites, Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings, Protected Wreck Sites, Registered Parks and Gardens, Registered Battlefields or Conservation Areas); and
 - requires developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible.
- 62. Local planning authorities are urged to request applicants to describe the significance of any heritage assets affected by a proposed development, including any contribution to the assets' significance made by their setting. The level of detail required in the assessment should be proportionate to the assets' importance and no more than is sufficient to understand the potential impact of the proposal on their significance.





63. Further information and guidance on how national planning policy is to be interpreted and applied locally is provided in the Planning Practice Guide (PPG) under the section Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment (Department for Communities and Local Government 2012b).

28.3.3 National Policy Statements

- 64. This baseline ADBA was carried out in support of the ES which has been undertaken in a manner consistent with the National Policy Statement (NPS) for energy infrastructure, including the Overarching NPS for Energy (EN-1) (Department of Energy and Climate Change, 2011a) and the NPS for Renewable Energy Infrastructure (EN-3) (Department of Energy and Climate Change, 2011b).
- 65. EN-1 sets out national policy for energy infrastructure, and the importance of archaeological assessment in the development process.
- 66. EN-3, considered in conjunction with the overarching NPS (EN-1), provides the primary basis for decisions by the Planning Inspectorate on renewable energy infrastructure development applications. EN-3 sets out the importance of the historic environment and the ways in which it can be impacted by development and outlines guidance for application assessments, Planning Inspectorate decision-making and mitigation measures.

28.3.4 Historic Environment Good Practice Advice

- 67. In March 2015, HE published new Historic Environment Good Practice Advice (GPA), which provides supporting information on heritage industry good practice, particularly looking at the principles of how national planning policy and guidance can be more effectively put into practice. The GPAs follow the main themes of the planning system and other key issues with respect to good decision-making affecting heritage assets. These include:
 - The Historic Environment in Local Plans: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 1 (HE, 2015b);
 - Managing Significance in Decision-Taking in the Historic Environment: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 2 (HE, 2015c);
 - The Setting of Heritage Assets: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 (HE, 2015a).

28.3.5 Local Policies

68. The study area transects three local authority districts, comprising North Norfolk, Broadland and Breckland.





- 28.3.5.1 North Norfolk: Local Development Framework Core Strategy (North Norfolk District Council 2008, Updated 2012)
- 69. This document sets out the key elements of the planning framework for North Norfolk, covering the period to 2021. Policies therein considered to be relevant to the project with respect to archaeology and cultural heritage are as follows:
- 28.3.5.1.1 Policy EN 8: protecting and Enhancing the Historic Environment.
- 70. Development proposals, including alterations and extensions, should preserve or enhance the character and appearance of designated assets, other important historic buildings, structures, monuments and landscapes, and their settings through high quality, sensitive design. Development that would have an adverse impact on their special historic or architectural interest will not be permitted.
- 28.3.5.2 Greater Norwich Development Partnership Joint Core Strategy (JCS) for Broadland, Norwich and South Norfolk (adopted March 2011, amendments adopted January 2014)
- 71. The Greater Norwich JCS sets out the overarching strategy to growth across the Broadland District Council, Norwich City Council and South Norfolk County Council area to 2026. It therefore forms part of the Broadland local plan. The policies set out within the Greater Norwich JCS and relevant to the project with respect to archaeology and cultural heritage are outlined below.
- 28.3.5.2.1 Policy 1: Addressing climate change and protecting environmental assets
- 72. The built environment, heritage assets, and the wider historic environment will be conserved and enhanced through the protection of buildings and structures which contribute to their surroundings, the protection of their settings, the encouragement of high-quality maintenance and repair and the enhancement of public spaces.
- 73. In addition to the policy above, two planning objectives which form part of the monitoring framework for the Broadland part of the Norwich Policy Area are also considered relevant:
 - Spatial Planning Objective 8: To positively protect and enhance the individual character and culture of the area; and
 - Spatial Planning Objective 9: To protect, manage and enhance the natural, built and historic environment, including key landscapes, natural resources and areas of natural habitat or nature conservation value.

28.3.5.3 The Broadland Development Management Development Plan Document

74. The Development Management Development Plan Document (DPD) aims to further the objectives set out in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and the Joint Core Strategy (Broadland, Norwich and South Norfolk). The following policies





are considered relevant to the project with respect to archaeology and cultural heritage:

28.3.5.3.1 Policy EN2 – Landscape

- 75. In order to protect the character of the area, development proposals should have regard to the Landscape Character Assessment SPD and, in particular, consider any impact upon as well as seek to protect and enhance where appropriate:
 - Gaps between settlements;
 - Visually sensitive skylines, hillsides and valley sides and important views including the setting of the Broads Area;
 - Nocturnal character;
 - Conservation Areas:
 - Scheduled Ancient Monuments;
 - Historic Parks and Gardens; and
 - Green spaces including natural and semi-natural features as well as geological / geomorphological features which make a significant contribution towards defining the character of an area.

28.3.5.4 Breckland: Adopted Core Strategy and Development Control Policies Development Plan Document

76. The Breckland Core Strategy, adopted in 2009, outlines the vision and overall objectives for development in Breckland up to 2026. It also contains the district-wide Development Control policies for Breckland that will inform future planning decisions. Policies considered relevant to the project with respect to archaeology and cultural heritage are outlined below.

28.3.5.4.1 Policy DC17: Historic Environment

77. The built environment, particularly statutorily Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas, should be protected and enhanced.

28.4 Archaeological and Historical Background (Baseline Environment)

28.4.1 Introduction

78. This section provides an account of the designated and non-designated heritage assets within the study area. Starting with the designated heritage assets by designation type and then continuing with non-designated heritage assets in chronological order.





28.4.2 Designated Heritage Assets

79. There are 363 designated heritage assets within the study area (see Annex 28.1.1 and Figure 28.1, Maps 1 - 13), comprising seven Scheduled Monuments (SMs) (1-7), three Registered Parks and Gardens (8-10), 342 Listed Buildings¹ (11-351; 1699-1701) and 11 Conservation Areas (352-362). This section provides a short summary of these designated heritage assets. As the project intends to avoid all designated heritage assets, no direct physical impacts are anticipated to occur. These assets will therefore predominantly form part of the settings assessment (see section 28.5 and Annex 28.1.1), in which they will be considered in greater detail so that any non-physical impacts resulting from the project can be more fully understood.

28.4.2.1 Scheduled Monuments

80. Of the seven Scheduled Monuments in the study area, three can be regarded as being located in the eastern extent of the study area (1-3). Bromholm Priory (1) is located within the Bromholm area and is the site of a Cluniac Priory founded in 1113. The north transept, chapter house, part of the dormitory and two gatehouses comprise the extant remains at the site, with cropmarks indicating a larger (more widespread) original extent.



¹ An updated dataset for designated heritage assets was received following the initial gazetteer compilation, which saw the inclusion of three additional Listed Buildings. As ID numbering had already been assigned, it was not possible to retain a consecutive numbering system with these heritage assets assigned a number at the end of the sequence.

81. The Great Barn (2) is located in Paston, some 1.4km to the north-west of Bacton. The barn was built by William Paston in 1581 and is recorded to be one of the largest in the country. The third Scheduled Monument located within the eastern extent of the study area is the Cross in St. Giles's Churchyard (3), located in Colby. St. Giles's Church was built c. 1300, and extended in the 15th century. Although the church itself is designated as a Grade II* Listed Building, the stone cross located close to the south porch in the churchyard is designated in its own right as a Scheduled Monument.

82. There are four further Scheduled Monuments in the western extent of the study area (4-7). Wendling Abbey (4), located in Wendling in the western extent of the study area, is the site of a Premonstratensian Abbey founded in or before 1267. Extant remains are confined to foundations protruding through the turf, although no buildings are discernible.

83. A double moated site at Huntingfield Hall (5), to the north-east of Bradenham has also been scheduled. The eastern moat contained the 17th century Huntingfield Hall, that was later demolished in 1860. Medieval pottery dating to the 13th or 14th century has been found in the field to the north of the moats. An additional moated site designated as a Scheduled Monument is located 430m south-west of Bradenham Hall (6). The final Scheduled Monument located within the western extent of the study area comprises Mona Hill (7), a large Bronze Age round barrow located just over 1km south-east of Necton.

28.4.2.2 Registered parks and gardens

84. The gardens at Happisburgh Manor (8) are located in the eastern extent of the study area at Happisburgh. The gardens were laid out in 1900 around Happisburgh Manor and are compartmented, comprising a hedged tennis court, a brick floored terrace, summer houses and a kitchen garden. The remaining Registered Parks & Gardens are located in the approximate centre of the study area and comprise the mid-18th century landscape park and 20th century topiary garden at Salle Park (9) to the northeast of Cawston; and the 17th and 18th century formal gardens with later developments dating to the 19th and 20th century at Blickling Hall (10).

85. The Registered Parks and Gardens all have associated Listed Buildings, which are outlined separately below, and in Annex 28.1.1 – representing the Designated Assets Gazetteer and initial heritage settings write up.

28.4.2.3 Listed buildings

- 86. The 342 Listed Buildings in the study area can be sub-divided as follows:
 - Grade I Listed Buildings: comprising 26 designated heritage assets (11-36);
 - Grade II* Listed Buildings: comprising 23 designated heritage assets (37-59); and
 - Grade II Listed Buildings: comprising 292 designated heritage assets (60-351; 1699-1701).
- 87. Although the Listed Buildings show a scattered distribution across the full extent of the study area, there are some areas in which a notable concentration of such heritage assets occur. Such concentrations are commonly observed in association with historical towns and / or settlements adjacent to the proposed onshore works (infrastructure areas). The town of Reepham provides one such example, in which a large number of buildings dating to the post-medieval period are known to have survived (Fillery-Travis, 2007a). Moving eastwards, the towns of Cawston, Aylsham, Blickling and North Walsham also show notable concentrations of Listed Buildings.





- 88. North Walsham is of particular interest in this regard, as a disastrous fire in 1600 is recorded to have destroyed many of the houses in the town (Aldridge, 2006). As such, many of the buildings within the town post-date 1600. Perhaps unsurprisingly, the concentrations of Listed Buildings outlined above commonly reside in areas designated as Conservation Areas (see section 28.4.2.4); defined as areas designated for their special architectural and historic interest.
- 89. The remaining Listed Buildings within the study area are sited in a seemingly more sporadic way, with relatively minor concentrations observed in Happisburgh, Bacton and Bromholm to the east and Little Fransham and Necton to the west. It is, however, noteworthy that some prominent towns adjacent to the proposed onshore cable route largely fall beyond the parameters of the study area; with their town centres not represented amongst the designated heritage assets considered for / within this ADBA. These include the historic cores of Dereham and Swanton Morley. The designation of the Dereham Conservation Area for instance indicates that many more Listed Buildings are likely to exist within this area, that are just beyond the limits of the study area.

28.4.2.4 Conservation Areas

- 90. The following 11 Conservation Areas, running from the landfall to the onshore project substation, to varying degrees intersect the study area:
 - Happisburgh (352);
 - Bacton (353);
 - North Walsham (354);
 - Aylsham (355);
 - Blickling (356);
 - Ingworth (357);
 - Mannington & Wolterton (358);
 - Cawston (359);
 - Reepham (360);
 - Dereham (361); and
 - Necton (362).
- 91. Blickling (**356**) and Mannington & Wolterton (**358**) are unusual in some respects being as they are very large 'rural' Conservation Areas, as opposed to the general trend of Heritage Conservation Areas commonly representing the historic cores of settlements, towns and villages. These Conservation Areas directly adjoin each other and also the Conservation Areas of Aylsham (**355**) and Ingworth (**357**).








Plate 28.5 Conservation Areas Overview (North-West of Aylsham).

92. Some of the Conservation Areas are discussed in a greater level of detail as part of the Settings Assessment (section 28.5 and Annex 28.1.1).

28.4.3 Non-designated Heritage Assets

- 93. There are 1336 non-designated heritage assets within the study area (see Annex 28.1.1, Figure 28.2 Maps: 1 30), some of which do represent duplicates of the designated heritage assets at this baseline ADBA stage. These assets have been assessed alongside various source material outlined in section 28.2.3 and referenced in section 28.7 in order to inform an archaeological and historical baseline account of the study area established.
- 94. Due to the extensive linear footprint of the onshore elements of the proposed Norfolk Vanguard project, which extends across the North Norfolk, Broadland and Breckland districts of Norfolk, the following baseline account provides a broad narrative of archaeological and historical information with a focus on the various principal towns and / or settlements adjacent to the cable route corridor, where relevant, particularly from the medieval period onwards; in which the majority of towns are historically recorded to have originated. The following towns and / or settlements have been identified as focal points throughout this review:





- Happisburgh;
- Walcott;
- North Walsham;
- Aylsham;
- Cawston;
- · Reepham;
- Swanton Morley;
- · Dereham; and
- Necton.
- 95. This approach diverts away from a historical account of this (arbitrarily / development focused and defined) 'region / area' of Norfolk as a whole, which is beyond the scope of this project, to encapsulating key areas of historical and archaeological interest along the proposed onshore cable route, thus providing a context for known heritage assets, as well as the potential for as yet undiscovered assets to be present within the study area. The baseline account retains the chronological framework typical of archaeological and historical baseline accounts. Due to the broadly variable and limited nature of known finds and monuments / sites, which predate the medieval period within the study area, the baseline review for these periods is dictated by the availability of assets / information which may, at times, divert discussion away from the focal points outlined above to other areas of archaeological interest along and in the immediate vicinity of the route.
- 96. The following review includes a discussion of various non-designated heritage assets within the study area, including those within and beyond the proposed development boundary. Where an asset is discussed and lies within the proposed development boundary, this is stated within the text. Not all assets are discussed within the text, but all are tabulated within Annex 28.1.2.

28.4.3.1 Prehistoric

- 97. The prehistory of the study area is directly linked to a series of glacial and interglacial phases and associated marine transgressions and regressions, which have resulted in changes to the environment across the region.
- 98. The earliest evidence of hominin (early human) activity in the immediate environs of the study area is recorded at Happisburgh, comprising a footprint surface found in Early Pleistocene estuarine muds (367). The estuarine sediments at Happisburgh form part of the Hill House Formation, which has been dated between 1 and 0.78 million years ago (My), with the footprints indicative of estimated body dimensions that fall within the range of evidence from 'Homo antecessor' fossils (Ashton et al., 2014: 11). These footprints preserve indirect anatomical evidence of these first hominins in northern Europe.





- 99. Further evidence from Happisburgh includes a lithic assemblage (c. 970,000 BP) dating to the Lower Palaeolithic at Happisburgh Site 3 (Parfitt et al., 2010) and a lithic working and butchery site at Happisburgh Site 1 (372) (c. 700,000-500,000 BP), representative of activity near the shore of a North Sea estuarine landscape. At that time the North Sea acted as a large basin estuary, which drained many major European rivers at the time.
- 100. On the basis of discoveries at Happisburgh and those at Pakefield, Suffolk (*c.* 700,000 BP) (Parfitt *et al.*, 2005), East Anglia is recognised as an internationally important region for Lower Palaeolithic archaeology. These sites fall within a date range of the British Cromerian sequence (> MIS 13), and thus pre-date the Anglian glaciation (478,000-423,000 BP; MIS 12). The Anglian glaciation would have concealed the study area, with ice sheets reaching as far south as the north Cornwall coast and the Thames Valley (Wymer, 1999:17), with sea levels an estimated 130m below present day levels. The Hoxnian interglacial (423,000-380,000 BP; MIS 11) saw the return of more temperate conditions. During this period, Britain formed part of a huge peninsula of north-western Europe, with the now-submerged regions of the North Sea forming extensive low-lying estuaries, major river systems, plain and rolling hills (Wessex Archaeology, 2015). Artefactual evidence of this date includes the Clactonian and Acheulian flint industries.
- 101. There are 12 non-designated heritage assets recorded by the NHER as being of definitive Lower Palaeolithic date, ten of which represent find spots for the discovery of eight handaxes (363-6, 370-1 and 373-4), a flint flake (368) and flint finds (371). The remaining two sites comprise the Happisburgh footprints (367) and the Happisburgh 1 site (372) discussed above. It's notable that 11 of the 12 Lower Palaeolithic records are located in a coastal location, indicating a potential for further finds of this date to exist within the foreshore area in which sediments of the Cromer Forest-bed Formation are known to be intermittently exposed. Four of these records lie within the site boundary (363, 365, 368 and 372) at the proposed landfall location at Happisburgh. The discovery of an isolated hand axe (373) some 400m south-west of the onshore project substation nonetheless signifies the potential for finds of this date to exist further inland as well.
- 102. The Wolstonian (380,000-130,000; MIS 10-6) followed the Hoxnian interglacial, and is thought to have comprised three cold stages (MIS 10, 8 and 6) interspersed with two temperate phases. The archaeological record indicates a hiatus of hominin activity in MIS 10 until the re-colonisation of Britain by 'Homo neanderthalensis'. Lithic technologies dating to this period include the Levallois core technique (Mousterian), developing from *c.* 300,000 BP (Scott and Ashton, 2011), marking the onset of the Middle Palaeolithic in Britain.





- 103. The archaeological record indicates a further period of inhabitation in Britain from the last glacial stage of the Wolstonian (MIS 6, c. 180,000 BP) until the recolonisation of Neanderthals in Britain once again some 60,000 BP (MIS 4) in the Devensian glacial (110,000-13,500 BP; MIS 5d to 2); the last glacial stage to occur before the present climatic amelioration. The absence of hominin activity in the interim Ipswichian interglacial (130,000-110,000; MIS 5e) is enigmatic, given the favourable climate and availability of large mammal fauna. No finds or sites recorded by the NHER within the study area have been assigned a definitively Middle Palaeolithic date. Despite this, hominins are known to have been active in this area of East Anglia during this period. This is evidenced by the *in situ* remains of a mammoth and associated Mousterian stone tools and debitage discovered within fill deposits of a palaeochannel at Lynford Quarry, Mundford (Boismier *et al.*, 2012) some 18km south-west of the onshore project substation.
- The Upper Palaeolithic (40,000-10,000 BP / 8,500 BC) is marked by the first evidence 104. for the presence of modern humans ('Homo sapiens') in Britain. It is during the Upper Palaeolithic period that the Devensian maximum (18,000 BP) occurred, when the glaciation was at its greatest extent, with the southern edge of the ice sheet extending from the Severn to the Wash (Flemming, 2002:7). Sea level was some 120m below its present day levels during this time, with Britain connected to the continent. The study area would have been on the margins of the ice front during this period, exposing it as a peri-glacial landscape. The Upper Palaeolithic is poorly represented across East Anglia. Although this may indicate low population density in East Anglia during this period, it has been suggested that the lack of early Upper Palaeolithic material may be due to the lack of cave sites, which have proved to be so important for the preservation of sites of this date in other areas of Britain (Austin, 1997: 9). The archaeological record indicates a hiatus in human activity in Britain between c. 24,000-15,000 BP (Pettitt and White, 2012 and Jacobi and Higham, 2011), with indications of eight relatively brief phases of human occupation currently represented for this period (Jacobi and Higham, 2011). Two find spots of this date are recorded in the study area, comprising the discovery of early upper Palaeolithic flints (554) some 500m west of Banningham (north-east of Aylsham) and an Upper Palaeolithic flint blade (555) some 800m south-west of Keswick (south of Broomholm). The discovery location of both of these finds is within or intersects the proposed development boundary.
- 105. Following the retreat of the Devensian ice sheet, the Mesolithic period (8,500-4000 BC) in Britain saw a marked improvement in climate following the onset of the warmer Holocene interglacial (MIS 1). The archaeological record indicates that coasts, estuaries and wetlands were regarded as key landscape elements during this period, with evidence indicating the presence of constructed settlements albeit of a





non-permanent nature and hunter-gatherer lifestyle for Mesolithic groups. The archaeological evidence for Mesolithic activity primarily consists of lithic artefacts, although evidence for a wide range of material implements is present in the archaeological record. Evidence for pits, hearths and traces of ephemeral structures are occasionally encountered across the country as a whole, such sites are rare in Norfolk, with evidence indicating the utilisation of natural features during this period (Dennis, 2006a).

- 106. Mesolithic finds recorded by the NHER for the study area comprise isolated lithic artefacts, including a Mesolithic flint find 1.3 km north-east of Cawston (558), a flint tranchet axehead some 500m south-west of Keswick within the proposed development boundary (557), a flint find to the north of North Walsham (556) and a Mesolithic blade (553) 1.5km west of Aylsham. Larger Mesolithic assemblages are known from the county in the wider study area region, several of which were targeted at areas where surface scatters were previously identified. Examples include thousands of Mesolithic flints found at Kelling Heath, some 15km NNE of the proposed development on the North Norfolk coast and a large Mesolithic flintworking scatter at Great Melton to the west of Norwich, some 14.5km south-east of the proposed development area (Dennis, 2006a).
- 107. Archaeological assemblages dating to the Neolithic (c. 4,000 – 2,200 BC) typically indicate a shift in settlement activities from the hunting and gathering lifestyles practised in the Mesolithic to increasingly sedentary agricultural settlement practised by Neolithic communities. An existence which revolved around more static farming is likely to have resulted in the redefinition of the relationships Neolithic communities held with the land, with an increased importance in land ownership and the lines of ancestry associated with particular areas (Aldridge, 2005a). This may be represented by the Neolithic long barrows, which could have served as territorial markers, as well as a means to inter the dead (Aldridge, 2005a). The NHER indicates the possible presence of at least nine barrows of this date in the study area. Three such sites are regarded as possible long barrows assigned to the Neolithic period and are located c. 1km and c. 2.5km south-west of Bromholm respectively (570 and 574), and 3km north-east of Swanton Morley (575). Asset 570 lies within the proposed development boundary. The remaining six features are regarded as ring ditches representing possible round barrows (607 - 9, 611 - 2 and 614), assigned a date range between the Neolithic and Bronze Age. These features are located some 450m south-east of Southgate (607 - 9), 2.3km and 1.6km south-west of Happisburgh respectively (611 and 612), and 1.4km north-east of Swanton Morley (614). The remaining records for Neolithic activity within the study area predominantly comprise findspots relating to lithic artefacts, scattered variously across the study area with no significant areas of concentration apparent.





- At a national scale, the onset of the Bronze Age (c. 2,200 700 BC) is marked by the 108. introduction of bronze metalworking, changes in pottery styles, the increased occurrence of single burial traditions and changes in monumental building (Hodgson & Brennand, 2006: 29), although the transition between the Later Neolithic and Early Bronze Age was a gradual one. Although first dated to the Neolithic period, round barrows are characteristic of the Bronze Age and are amongst the most numerous in Norfolk's prehistoric archaeological record, alongside metal tools, weapons and jewellery finds (Aldridge, 2005a). There are 93 records held by the NHER for ring ditch / round barrow features assigned solely to the Bronze Age (686 - 701, 703 -737, 740), located variously across the study area, with more assigned as multiperiod features. Of these assets, at least 25 are recorded as lying within the proposed development boundary (690, 692, 693, 698, 701, 707 - 10, 712, 714 - 17, 719, 721 - 3, 725 - 6, 730, 734 - 6). The Bronze Age barrow at Mona Hill (7) provides an example of a site of this nature, which has been designated as a Scheduled Monument. Other landscape evidence of Bronze Age activities in this region are rare, with some indications for small farmsteads. Bronze Age artefacts recorded within the study area include the discovery of a stone axe-hammer (738), sword finds (741 -2) and an axe head (743), as well as unidentified metal (739) and stone (744) finds. These finds were discovered variously across the study area, with two discoveries taking place in Happisburgh (741 and 743) within the proposed development boundary, two in the vicinity of Southgate to the east of Reepham (739 and 744) and two in the wider Necton area (738 and 742), the latter of which is recorded within the proposed development boundary.
- 109. The Iron Age (c. 700 BC – AD 43) is a period characterised by the introduction of weapons and tools made out of iron in the archaeological record. Present-day Norfolk, alongside parts of Suffolk and Cambridge, was the land of the Iceni tribe during the Iron Age. The presence of pits, ditches and postholes indicates that settlements of the period likely formed small farmsteads and villages, with a few larger settlements or towns known as oppida sites developing in the late Iron Age. Possible Iron Age oppida sites have been identified in Norfolk at Caistor St. Edmund (c. 22km south of the study area), Thetford (c. 25km south of the study area) and Saham Toney (c. 7.5km south of the onshore project substation) (Dennis, 2006b). The NHER records numerous cropmark features in the study area, indicative of field boundaries, trackways and enclosures thought to derive from the Iron Age, with a higher concentration of such features evident towards the coast. Evidence for settlement in the study area during this time is provided by a possible round house of Iron Age / Roman date (824) and five farmsteads (782, 784, 786, 790, 799), all of which are located within 4km of the coastline. Three such assets are recorded within the proposed development boundary (784, 786 and 790). While evidence for settlements, which employed defensive measures, is relatively common in the





archaeological record for the country as a whole during the Iron Age, forts of this period are relatively rare in this region. The remaining records relating to human activity of this date include findspots of various artefacts with a scattered distribution throughout the study area, many of which comprise a multi-period assemblage.

28.4.3.2 Romano-British

- Although the invasion of Claudius in AD 43 typically marks the onset of the Romano-British period in Britain, the Iceni tribe remained independent of Roman rule until the defeat of Boudicca in AD 61. Archaeological evidence indicates an intensification of settlement in the region during the Romano-British period, with the establishment and growth of a number of large towns such as Venta Icenorum at Caistor St. Edmunds (c. 22km south of the study area), which became the administrative, legal, judicial and financial centre for the civitas², and Brampton, a 30-hectare settlement some 3.5km south-east of Aylsham (Gurney, 2005). Other evidence for settlement in the region indicates the presence of smaller towns, villages and farmsteads. Two Roman settlements are recorded by the NHER within the study area, both of which lie directly north of the onshore project substation (835 and 841), to the east of Little Fransham. Other records indicative of settlement include evidence of buildings (839 and 873), enclosures (834, 844, 845, 849 and 851) and possible farmsteads (846), with a noted concentration towards the eastern coastal extent of the study area, with two records located further inland in the area north of Aylsham (844 and 873). Of the assets outlined above, two are recorded within or intersecting the proposed development boundary (846 and 849).
- 111. Farming activities are known to have continued in the area, with numerous records for field systems, boundaries and trackways dating to this period, the majority of the known locations are concentrated in the eastern extent of the study area. Alongside farming practices, widespread industrial activity also occurred with pottery industries, salt-production, metal-working, coin production and brooch manufacture (Gurney, 2005). Military presence is also indicated in the archaeological record for the wider study area, as evidenced by military supply bases or depots such as the late Roman 'Saxon Shore' fort at Caister-on-Sea. A probable Roman fort (837) is located within the study area, to the immediate south of the onshore cable corridor between Reepham and Aylsham. Other forts in the wider area include one in the vicinity of Swanton Morley, to the north of the study area, which has been dated to the early period of Roman occupation (Fillery-Travis, 2007b).

² The civitas refers to a social body of citizens that are united by law.





28.4.3.3 Saxon

- 112. The archaeological record for the study area dated to the early medieval or Saxon (*c*. AD 410 1066) period is relatively sparse, with a predominance of findspots. Features of this period are rare, and where present, commonly relate to field boundaries. Anglo-Saxon settlement patterns are generally poorly understood, although the Norfolk region is considered to have been relatively rich at this time with a large population (Norfolk Museums, 2017).
- 113. The Anglo-Saxon period is characterised by the migration of Saxon, and later Norse and Danish setters into Britain, which saw the establishment of a network of trade and migration routes to the Continent. This in turn saw the development of a number of important ports or landing places along the East Anglian coast and market towns further inland. The town of Aylsham is thought to have been founded in the Saxon period as indicated by documentary sources, although archaeological evidence for the area dating to this period is relatively limited (Dennis, 2005a), with monuments confined to a possible Saxon watermill and a possible Early Saxon metal working site, situated beyond the parameters of the study area. Further westwards, the market town of Dereham is traditionally thought to have been founded in AD 654, although the earliest documentary evidence for the town dates to AD 798, where it is referred to as Deorham in the Anglo-Saxon Chronical. Despite this, there is very little archaeological evidence dating to this period in the town.
- 114. There are four records for Late Saxon settlement recorded by the NHER within the study area, all of which are located to the north of the onshore project substation, north of Little Fransham (970, 971, 976 and 980). To the south-west of the study area, although archaeological evidence is limited, documentary evidence points to Necton as being an important and wealthy holding during the Anglo-Saxon period (Dennis, 2005c). Other evidence of Anglo-Saxon activity within the study area comprises the presence of a possible Early Saxon grubenhauser (sunken featured building) in Happisburgh (955), although the date of this feature remains unconfirmed. Religious and ceremonial activity dating to this period is represented by possible early Saxon burials (956) between Reepham and Swanton Morley and the ground of two chapels; the site of St. Mary's Chapel, Kerdiston (977) to the north-west of Reepham and All Saint's Church, Edingthorpe, Bacton (988).
- 115. Evidence suggests that significant Saxon sites do get discovered on linear development schemes in Norfolk, as can be attested by the Saxon Cemetery discovered in Fulmodeston on the Dudgeon Offshore Windfarm Onshore Electrical Connection (cable route) in 2014 / 2015 and the Anglo-Saxon Cemetery at Tittleshall found along the route of the Bacton to King's Lynn Gas Pipeline.





28.4.3.4 Medieval

- 116. By the time of the Norman Conquest in 1066, which marks the onset of the medieval period (c. 1066 1499 AD) in Britain, many East Anglian towns and ports had developed into busy trading centres with many towns and villages experiencing a degree of growth. This growth is reflected in the archaeological record, which records the evidence of 16 settlements dating to the medieval period alone within the study area, and a further seven assigned to the medieval to post-medieval period. These records are all concentrated in the area surrounding the onshore project substation, predominantly surrounding Little Fransham. Over one hundred separate medieval settlement sites have been identified by field walking in the open fields of Fransham, with several medieval manors recorded to have been present at this time (Spooner, 2005). Settlement is also considered to have been widespread in the Necton area during this period, to the immediate south-west of the onshore project substation (Dennis, 2005c).
- 117. The 'focus towns' outlined in section 28.4.3 above are each detailed in the Domesday Book. The medieval town of Dereham is thought to have expanded at this time, with evidence indicating that it may have been a centre for pottery production (Dennis, 2005b). The NHER records a brick kiln in the study area located within the vicinity of Dereham (1082). Medieval Aylsham is also recorded to have thrived, with the linen and canvas industries promoting the town as a notable market centre (Dennis, 2005a). North Walsham witnessed considerable commercial expansion during the medieval period, particularly with the arrival of Flemish weavers in the 14th century. By 1379, 68 families were engaged in making Walsham cloth, in comparison to only 30 occupied in agriculture (Aldridge, 2006).
- 118. The NHER records numerous non-designated heritage assets assigned to the medieval period for the study area. More than half of those records represent findspots. The remaining assets represent a variety of features, including evidence of numerous settlements, tofts, buildings, manors, moats, chapels, enclosures and field boundaries. A high concentration of medieval settlement sites are present in the area surrounding the onshore project substation (993 - 7, 999 - 1000, 1002, 1005, 1006, 1008 and 1039), particularly in the vicinity of Little Fransham to the north of the onshore project substation. Two of these sites mentioned are recorded within the onshore project area (996 and 997). An additional seven settlement sites of medieval to post-medieval date are also recorded within this area (1085 - 9, 1094 and 1096), two of which are located within the onshore project area (1086 and 1087). Other medieval sites in this area include four records for toft villages (1009 -12), indicative of the continuation of farming activities during this period, one of these noted here is recorded within the onshore project area (1012). Evidence for medieval settlement across the remaining areas of the study area is more limited





- and comprise medieval buildings in the area between Dereham and Swanton Morley (1014, 1042 and 1043) and four deserted settlements, one at Cawston (990), one at Salle (north-west of Cawston) (1214), one some 2km west of Reepham (1223) and another to the south of Colby between Aylsham and North Walsham (1025).
- 119. Religious and ceremonial activity of medieval date within the study area is largely concentrated in the wider Ridlington area, some 2km south-west of Walcott, including a medieval cross (1032) sited within the onshore project area, the possible site of a Chapel (1035) and the possible site of the Chapel of Our Lady, Witton (1020). Other such assets in the remainder of the study area dated to the medieval period include a medieval cross to the north-west of Reepham (1041) located within the onshore project area. Reepham was regarded as a centre for Christian worship in the medieval period (Fillery-Travis, 2007a). Further religious assets of medieval date include the former medieval graveyard of St. Clement's Church (1024) in Keswick. There is additional evidence for religious activity within the study area assigned to the medieval to post-medieval period, including ten churches, located in Necton (1184), Keswick (1232), Happisburgh (1233), Little Fransham (1234), Cawston (1235), Colby (1236), Crostwright (1237), Bacton (1242) and Witton (1243 - 4). The Scheduled Monuments of Bromholm Priory (1) and Wendling Abbey (4) founded in 1113 and 1267 respectively provide two such examples of heritage assets representative of religious activity in the early phases of this period within the study area.

28.4.3.5 Post-medieval and 19th century

- 120. The East Anglia region thrived in the post-medieval period. A period characterised by the Industrial Revolution, post-medieval East Anglia witnessed a number of great achievements in transport and communications, industry and agriculture, many aspects of which are represented in the archaeological record of the study area.
- 121. With established overseas trade connections ranging from the Baltic Sea to the Iberian peninsula and beyond (Williams, 1988: 70) alongside numerous artificial and natural slow moving waterways reaching in-land, the navigable waterways of the wider study area facilitated the movement of goods which in turn, had an encouraging effect on the industry of the region. The benefits of water transport were well recognised during this period, with Acts of Parliament taking place from the 17th century onwards to raise capital for river navigation improvements (Aldridge, 2005b). The in-land waterways in East Anglia continued to be the predominant means of transporting goods throughout the region until the advent of the railway and improved roads provided a more efficient transport system (Aldridge, 2005b). The ability for the railways to distribute goods is well represented by the eight records for railway routes held by the NHER for the study area (1486,





- **1487**, **1490**, **1491**, **1494**, **1498**, **1499** and **1501**), which illustrate the far-reaching abilities of railway lines of this period.
- 122. Imports to the wider study area region during the post-medieval period commonly comprised coal, timber, animal feeds and fertiliser together with consumer goods, with exports consisting of grain, bricks and the products of mills (Aldridge, 2005b). The production of export commodities and materials is reflected in the NHER for the study area. Numerous mills are recorded by the NHER within the study area, 11 of which are thought to have originated from the post-medieval period. These mills comprise nine windmills (1260 - 1, 1344, 1377, 1381, 1385, 1396, 1457 and 1458), one spinning mill (1352) and one paper mill (1454). Of these assets, one (1377) is located within the proposed development boundary, to the north of North Walsham. The NHER also records eight brick kilns (1258, 1267, 1278, 1322, 1334, 1345, 1368, 1376 and 1483) (only one of which - 1267 - is known to be located within the proposed development boundary) and four brickworks (1280, 1277, 1383 and 1417). Other heritage assets reflective of industry during this period comprise a lime kiln (1346), a quarry site (1274), a pottery kiln (1255) recorded within the proposed development boundary, glass works (1323) and a forge (1397). The assets summarised above are distributed along the full extent of the study area, with slight concentrations noted in association with the wider vicinity of the key historical towns of Fransham, Dereham, Reepham, Cawston, Aylsham, North Walsham and Happisburgh.
- 123. It followed that production centres for key areas of export experienced a degree of prosperity during this period. The improved navigation of in-land waterways enabled, in some instances, for trading wherries to reach mills directly and other industries were also able to benefit with the ability to exploit the improved means of distribution (Aldridge, 2005b). Post-medieval Aylsham provides one such example, as the growth of the woollen industry and the weaving of worsted cloth enabled the town to prosper, facilitated in part by the cutting of the Bure Navigation Canal (Dennis, 2005a) and the later East Norfolk railway, including the Bure Valley Railway (1498).
- 124. Agriculture also took on a more prominent role during this period, with East Anglia at the forefront of the 'Agricultural Revolution' in the 18th century with the improved communications developed to serve the farming economy and to facilitate the diverse trade of Norfolk (Gilman, 1997:67). The NHER records numerous assets reflective of farming activities during this period. Records for farm houses, farmsteads, barns and stables are distributed across the full extent of the study area, with a slightly more dense concentration of assets of this nature from Aylsham eastwards to the coast. Records for field boundaries, enclosures and trackways are





- also numerous, with a concentration of such features in the wider proposed landfall zone of the study area, to the east of North Walsham.
- 125. Heritage assets of this period within the study area also include direct evidence for settlement in the form of numerous dwellings, including manor houses, great houses, vicarages, cottages, labourers' cottages and farm houses with a fairly even distribution observed across the study area. Other evidence of settlement activity includes what is now the Bell Public House (1332) in Cawston and a number of school houses. The latter are located in Necton (1492), Little Fransham (1485), Gressenhall (1484), Edinthorpe (1497), Bacton (1489) and to the north of Witton Bridge (1481). Religious activity is attested by the record of four chapels (1422, 1473, **1477** and **1480**) and a meeting house and burial ground (**1408** and **1415**), predominantly concentrated in the area east of north Walsham with the exception of 1473 which is located at the western extent of the study area in Necton. The Old Quaker Burial Ground (1408) in use since 1697 is located within the onshore cable corridor to the west of the B1145 heading north from North Walsham. The Burial Ground is situated at somewhat of a pinch point, in the immediate vicinity of the Grade II* Listed Friends Meeting House (43 / 1415) and the Grade II Listed Thatched Cottage (117 / 1416).

126. Notable heritage assets indicative of settlement measures of this period also include records for two workhouses, one in North Walsham (1343) and the other at Cawston (1353). The importation of the factory system in Britain in the 19th century left many individuals unemployed during this period and parishes were encouraged to have a workhouse to accommodate those members of the population considered unable to support themselves.

28.4.3.6 Modern

- 127. The archaeological record dating to the modern period within the study area is unsurprisingly dominated by heritage assets dating to the two World Wars. The east coast of Britain was subject to a high level of hostility during World War I (WWI) and World War II (WWII), and the East Anglian region provided a focus for military activity. With the southern North Sea providing an obvious arena for naval action and the threat of invasion looming, a series of defences were constructed across the county.
- 128. One of the more familiar examples of defensive buildings of this period are pillboxes; concrete guard posts with small windows through which military personnel could fire weapons to oncoming adversaries in the event of an invasion. Pillboxes became an increasingly important component of Britain's coastal defences between 1916 and 1918. There are at least six pillboxes dating to WWI in the study area, four to the





- area north-east of North Walsham (1513, 1514, 1518 and 1519) and two in the wider Bromholm area (1515 and 1520), both of which are located within the proposed development boundary.
- 129. In WWII, pillboxes were built in their thousands, with some 18,000 constructed in 1940 alone (Aldridge, 2005c). There are 27 pillboxes of WWII date recorded within the study area, the majority of which are located within the eastern extent of the study area, to the east of North Walsham. However, it was not uncommon for pillboxes to be placed further in-land, particularly in the vicinity of important junctions, airfields or radar stations (Aldridge, 2005c). A pillbox recorded by the Chain Home Low Radar Station in Happisburgh (1528) provides one such example. Moving westwards along the study area, in North Walsham, the River Ant and the North Walsham and Dilham Canal were also incorporated into a series of anti-invasion defence stop lines (Aldridge, 2006).

- 130. Further examples in-land include three pillboxes recorded within the Aylsham area to the west of the River Bure (1571 2 and 1583) and a further example to the north of Dereham (1569). Other defensive measures employed during WWII are well represented in the NHER for the study area and include spigot mortar / gun emplacements, tank traps (e.g. anti-tank ditches and blocks), barbed wire, search light batteries and observation posts. Although predominantly sited in the coastal region, a number of examples indicate defensive measures further inshore, including two spigot mortar emplacement located at Cawston (1573) and at the River Wensum to the east of Swanton Morley (1534), a gun emplacement to the north of Dereham (1570) and an antenna array to the south-west of Swanton Morley (1559).
- 131. The advent of air power brought another dimension to warfare in the 20th century. The need for the military to invest in aerial warfare became increasingly clear throughout WWI, with the construction of aviation-related infrastructure gaining momentum. At the start of WWI, there were only seven completed aerodromes in the whole of Britain. By its conclusion, there were 301 aviation sites serving the Royal Flying Corps (RFC) and the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS), which later amalgamated to form the Royal Air Force (RAF) (Aldridge, 2005d). With its relatively flat topography, Norfolk provided an ideal landing ground for aircraft and became a





focus for airfields during WWI with some 30 fields established (Aldridge, 2005d). A direct example within the eastern extent of the study area is provided by the record for RNAS landing ground in (**1512**), some 600m south of Bromholm located within what was Cable Relay Station Search Zone 4 (now understood to have been discounted as an option).

- 132. Norfolk witnessed a dramatic decrease in the number of airfields following the end of WWI until political uncertainties in Europe in the late 1930s led to an expansion of the RAF. Following the outbreak of WWII, aerial defence and hostilities formed a main component of Britain's warfare strategies, with an unprecedented growth of airfield construction across the country. By the end of WWII, Norfolk had some 37 major military airfields (Aldridge, 2005d). Examples in the wider study area region include an RAF Station at Swanton Morley, which served as a bomber command base between October 1940 and December 1941 (RAF, 2017) and Oulton Airfield in the Cawston Parish which opened in 1940 and was used by the RAF and United States Air Force. Heritage assets relating to WWII aerial activity are present in the NHER for the study area and comprise an anti-aircraft landing trench (1556) to the north of Bacton and three aircraft crash sites (1511, 1568 and 1585) recorded in the wider area of Bacton, Swanton Morley and Necton respectively.
- 133. A number of towns along the route of the study area were subject to aerial attack during the two World Wars. Happisburgh was attacked during WWII, as evidenced by a number of bomb craters recorded by the NHER (1544). A further bomb crater is recorded by the NHER to the south of Bacton (1552). The Guild Hall at Dereham is recorded to have been hit by a zeppelin in WWI (Dennish, 2005b).
- 134. Modern heritage assets recorded by the NHER for the study area that do not relate to the two World Wars are relatively few in number and comprise a manor house (1526) to the south-east of Ridlington and a public house (1510) and telephone box (1527) located in the area between Broomholm and Keswick. Later military activity relating to the Cold War is absent from the NHER records for the study area, although evidence of heritage assets of this date are present in the wider region, such as the Cold War nuclear bunker reportedly discovered in the car park of the Guild Hall at Dereham (Dennis, 2005b).

28.4.4 Previous Investigations

135. Numerous previous investigations undertaken with a view to achieving objectives of an archaeological or heritage nature have taken place within and around the study area. Due to the extensive linear footprint of the proposed onshore works, it is not possible to provide an exhaustive account of all projects undertaken to date. This section therefore provides a summary of the nature and type of assessments





- undertaken which have informed the known archaeological record and therefore enhanced our understanding of the historic environment in this region.
- 136. A number of large-scale linear schemes have been developed and therefore assessed in this wider area of Norfolk. Examples that have occurred in the region of the study area and were subject to archaeological assessment include the Bacton to King's Lynn and Bacton to Great Yarmouth gas pipeline projects. Further large scale linear projects include onshore works undertaken in relation to the Dudgeon Offshore Wind Farm, the cable route of which extends from Weybourne on the North Norfolk coast to the onshore project substation at Necton where it will connect to the National Grid, and the onshore works in relation to the Sheringham Shoal offshore wind farm, the cable route for which extends from Weybourne to an onshore substation at Salle, near Cawston. A further pre-consent development currently subject to archaeological assessment is the Hornsea Project Three Offshore Wind Farm, the onshore cable route of which is proposed to run between Weybourne and the Norwich main onshore substation to the south of Norwich. The pre-application stages for this project are currently underway and a PEIR was submitted in October 2017.
- 137. The coastal and broad zones in Norfolk have also been subject to the National Mapping Programme (NMP); a HE initiative which aimed to identify, map and interpret all archaeological sites visible on aerial photographs, using a range of source material. The NMP for the coastal zone was supplemented by a Rapid Coastal Zone Assessment Survey (RCZAS), a type of survey designed to assess the archaeological potential of the coastlines of England including archival research and a ground-based survey of the inter-tidal and coastal zones. The results of these assessments were thereby included within the NHER data and were incorporated into the aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment (Annex 28.1.3).
- 138. In addition to the large scale projects described above, a number of smaller scale projects have also been undertaken within and around the study area. A review of grey literature available on the Archaeological Data Service website indicates a range of archaeological assessments in the area, including archaeological evaluations (Bacton, North Walsham, Dereham and Little Fransham), archaeological watching briefs (Bacton, Keswick, Happisburgh, Aylsham, Reepham and Swanton Morley), monitoring and recording exercises including historic building records (Bacton, Happisburgh and North Walsham), extensive field walking (e.g. at Little Fransham) and the archaeological assessment of geophysical survey data (North Walsham, Aylsham and Necton), as well as aerial photographic data. Other notable archaeological assessments in the area include a high number of desk-based assessments.





139. Due to its significance with regards to Lower Palaeolithic archaeology and Pleistocene sedimentary units, the area of Happisburgh has been subject to numerous phases of archaeological investigation, particularly in relation with the AHOB and PAB Projects (Ashton *et al.*, 2010, 2014). Development-led archaeological investigations in the Happisburgh area include, but are not limited to, coastal defence removal works (Birk, 2016), a new life-boat ramp at Cart gap (Ashton, 2009) and a sewer diversion at beach road (Hickling, 2012).

28.4.5 Cartographic Sources

- 140. Online historic mapping provided on the Norfolk County Council Historic Maps of Norfolk website (http://www.historic-maps.norfolk.gov.uk/mapexplorer/) were consulted for the purposes of conducting a review of cartographic source material across the study area. Due to both the extent of the proposed onshore works and the undertaking of an aerial photographic and LiDAR assessment, which considers historical land use within the study area, it was deemed neither practicable nor necessary to undertake a detailed map regression exercise for the whole study area. This section therefore provides a high-level review of broad-scale land-use patterns identified following a review of cartographic sources for the study area.
- 141. A comparison of the Tithe maps dated *c*. 1840 against a 2014 Ordnance Survey map indicate a continued agricultural land-use across the majority of the study area, with many larger field boundaries and trackways / roads retaining their mapped 19th century position to the present day. However, it is noted that a number of the smaller field divisions shown in the Tithe maps are not evident in the present day. The presence of numerous enclosed fields is typical of the period as it dates back to a time in which the introduction of more scientific farming methods from the 18th century saw the demise of open field farming with the redistribution of farming land into smaller fields as part of a process known as enclosure. The earlier enclosure maps, dating between the late 18th and mid-19th century, were also consulted as part of this review, although the digitised data for such maps is far more fragmentary making coverage of the study area much more limited. Nonetheless, where present, these early maps again indicate that the lineage of many field boundaries present in the study area derive from at latest, the post-medieval period.
- 142. The 1st Edition OS Maps, dating between 1879 and 1886, share a number of field boundaries as those shown in the earlier Tithe maps, although broadly speaking, a general trend towards larger field enclosures is apparent across the route. A notable difference in the 1st Edition OS Maps in comparison to the Tithe maps is the introduction of the Great Eastern and Eastern and Midlands Railway lines. The former Dereham and Lynn branch railway is also present on these maps, which opened in stages between 1846 and 1848 and was closed in 1968. In the study area,





this branch line is represented by a section of line between Dereham and Wendling, which has since been claimed by the A47 road.

- 143. Cartographic sources which post-date the 1st Edition OS Maps are not available through the Norfolk Heritage Explorer website. The next available source material comprises 1946 aerial photographs which are considered as part of the aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment, the results of which are summarised below.
- 144. As noted above in section 28.2.3, historic maps have been requested as part of Envirocheck searches, required for other environmental and / or engineering purposes. This data has not been scrutinised at the time of compiling this baseline ADBA. This historic map data will be examined in more detail as part of the ongoing development of the full ES and DCO application to be submitted in June 2018.

28.4.6 Aerial Photographic and LiDAR Data Review

- 145. This section provides a high-level summary of the results of the aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment undertaken by Air Photo Services Ltd, further details on which can be found in the full Heritage Assessment of Aerial Imagery report, provided as an annex to this baseline ADBA (Annex 28.1.3).
- 146. The aerial photographic and LiDAR assessment revealed a series of extensive and complex cropmarks across the study area and proposed development boundary, presenting evidence of a complex multi-period buried archaeological landscape dating from the earlier prehistoric through to the modern day. Sites include, but are not limited to, funerary sites, settlements, trackways, roads and defensive structures.
- 147. Areas in which cropmarks are most concentrated include the north-eastern sector of the route, near the coastline. As such, this section of the cable route is regarded as having a high potential for the further discovery of buried archaeological remains. However, the concentration of cropmarks in this area is likely due to the ease with which crops respond to soil deficits in this area. Although the potential for buried remains to exist in the remainder of the route is less well known, the lower density of cropmarks in this area is likely due to the less drained soils, which may mask the appearance of buried features.
- 148. Although the assessment indicates the presence of human activity from the early prehistoric periods to the modern day, no traces of medieval agriculture were recorded from any source, with no visible traces of medieval ridge and farrow features across the route. Earthworks of medieval date were, however, present in the form of moated sites in the southern sector of the route.





- 149. Other notable landscape uses in the area reviewed in the aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment comprise defensive measures associated with the First and Second World Wars of the 20th century. A series of WWII defensive structures, which are visible as complex extant features on photographs taken in the 1940s and 1950s, were placed along the coast and in the coastal hinterland.
- 150. The Aerial Photographic and LiDAR assessment identified a total of 270 sites of potential archaeological interest from aerial imagery. A range of the more complex of these sites could inform the subsequent pre-application priority onshore geophysical survey requirements, as previously discussed at a high-level with NCC HES and HE. Recommendations regarding such survey works will be included as part of Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage and are not considered here.

28.4.7 Historic Landscape Characterisation

151. The NHER contains Historic Landscape Characterisation (HLC) data for the study area (Figure 28.3, Maps 1-5). Due to the vast extent of the linear footprint of the proposed onshore works, the character of the study area has been divided into four principal areas. This approach enables the character of the study area to be analysed in a manner that can be more meaningfully understood than that afforded by a broad scale characterisation of the area as a whole. These areas are discussed in turn below. It should be noted that due to the nature of the data, in some cases the HLC character polygons extend beyond the parameters of the study area. As such, more localised character types summarised below may lie beyond the area assessed in this review. Where possible, this is noted in the following discussion.

28.4.7.1 HLC Area 1

152. HLC Area 1 comprises an extent of the study area between the onshore project substation at Necton to the area south-west of Swanton Morley. The HLC of Area 1 is summarised in Table 28.1.

153. HLC Area 1 is predominantly characterised by 20th century agriculture with further areas characterised by the presence of post-medieval enclosures of 18th and 19th century date. Other notable defining features in the area comprise woodland, predominantly characterised by 18th - 20th century woodland plantations (154Ha). In addition to those outlined above, character types of specific heritage interest in relation to past land use in the area include pre-18th century irregular enclosures (120Ha), with a particular concentration in the wider vicinity of Scarning and Dereham and military land-use in the form of a WWII bomb store *c.* 900m north of Wendling, although the latter lies beyond the parameters of the study area.

28.4.7.2 HLC Area 2

154. HLC Area 2 comprises the extent of the study area between the south-west of Swanton Morley and the west of Cawston. The HLC of Area 2 is summarised in Table 28.2.

155. HLC Area 2 can be predominantly characterised by 20th century agricultural use, with a marked additional character type defined by the presence of post-medieval enclosures of 18th and 19th century date. Other notable character types in the area include managed wetland in the form of meadow enclosures and informal parkland (344Ha). Other aspects of land use of possible heritage interest include pre-18th century enclosures (141Ha) concentrated to the south of Swanton Morley and the north-west of Reepham and two orchards to the north-west of Reepham.

28.4.7.3 HLC Area 3

HLC Area 3 comprises an extent of the study area between Cawston and the west of North Walsham. The HLC of Area 3 is summarised in Table 28.3 below.

156. The predominant character type present in HLC Area 3 is 20th century agriculture, with post-medieval enclosures of an 18th and 19th century date also well represented. Other notable character types include woodland, predominantly comprising 18th - 20th century woodland plantation (341Ha) and informal parkland (230Ha). Character types of potential heritage interest alongside those outlined above include military use in the form of Oulton Airfield (beyond the parameters of the study area for non-designated assets), pre-18th century enclosures (18Ha) in the wider vicinity of Silvergate and Blickling and historic religious buildings in the form of churches.

28.4.7.4 HLC Area 4

157. HLC Area 4 comprises an extent of the study area between the area west of North Walsham to the proposed landfall options at the coastline. The HLC of Area 4 is summarised in Table 28.4.

158. The character of HLC Area 4 is predominantly represented by 20th century agriculture, with post-medieval enclosures of 18th and 19th century date. Other well represented character types in the area include woodland, particularly with regards to 18th - 20th century woodland plantation (140Ha). In addition to those outlined above, character types of potential heritage interest include historic built up areas as represented by numerous religious institutions, a historic earthwork comprising a medieval moated site (beyond the parameters of the non-designated study area parameters) and the 17th - 20th century grazing marshes in the areas surrounding the inland waters to the west of Ridlington and to the east of Lessingham.

28.5 Settings Assessment

- 159. An initial heritage settings (baseline) assessment has been undertaken with respect to potential impacts of the proposed (predominantly above ground) infrastructure on the setting of principally higher designated heritage assets in the immediate vicinity of the onshore project area. This has focused specifically on the CRS, onshore project substation and the National Grid substation extension including overhead line modifications.
- 160. The heritage settings (baseline) assessment has identified the designated heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Registered Parks and Gardens, Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) located within a 1km study area on all sides around the above ground infrastructure in the onshore project area.
- 161. The initial study area was established and is relevant to predominantly designated heritage assets within a 1km buffer of the proposed onshore infrastructure options. Formal Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment (LVIA) processes, and associated tool kits, such as Zones of Theoretical Visibility (ZTVs) and photomontages have not yet been produced. However, key LVIA and Heritage viewpoints have been identified for comment by relevant stakeholders (including NCC HES and HE). These viewpoints have taken account of and specifically reflect the topography of the landscape within and through which the project infrastructure will be constructed and operated within this area of Norfolk. For example coastal and near coast views in which the Cable Relay Station options will potentially feature are anticipated to be more far reaching than those of inland areas of rural Norfolk in the vicinity of the onshore project substation and the National Grid substation extension including overhead line modifications.
- 162. This heritage settings (baseline) assessment is intended to address Step 1 of HE's guidance on the Setting of Heritage Assets: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 (HE, 2015), as well as the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and associated Planning Practice Guidance (PPG): Conserving and





- enhancing the historic environment (DCLG, 2012 and 2014), in terms of identifying those heritage assets whose setting may be affected by the proposed development.
- 163. In consultation with NCC HES and HE, the contribution that setting makes to the significance of the key identified heritage assets, and where and to what extent the proposed development infrastructure forms part of the setting of the identified assets, has been initially assessed and is considered to be an ongoing and iterative process.
- 164. Any potential impacts to the setting of identified heritage assets from both construction and operation will be further addressed in the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and the findings reported in the subsequent final ES.
- 165. Initial site visits were undertaken on April 11th and 12th 2017 following early identification and mapping of those heritage assets whose setting is potentially considered to be most affected by the proposed development.
- 166. In summary, the main objectives of the heritage settings (baseline) assessment to date has been to:
 - Identify all designated heritage assets within the study area. Generally more
 detailed descriptions have been provided for the more highly designated assets,
 as well as those of notable height and/or those located on higher ground, as well
 as those in closer proximity to the proposed above ground infrastructure
 options;
 - Establish which designated and select/applicable non-designated heritage assets within the study area may have potential setting implications, and require further assessment (deliberation and attention). This is in accordance with Step 1 of HE's guidance on the Setting of Heritage Assets: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 (HE, 2015) and the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and associated Planning Practice Guidance (PPG): Conserving and enhancing the historic environment (DCGL, 2012 and 2014); and
 - Establish a sufficiently early understanding of the designated and select/applicable non-designated heritage assets, through documentary research and site visits, to enable any potential setting impacts of the proposed above ground infrastructure to be adequately considered in Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage and in the subsequent final ES.
- 167. Annex 28.1.1 details all Designated Heritage Assets within 1km of the onshore project area. The table in the annex is ordered as follows: Scheduled Monuments; Registered Parks and Gardens; Listed Buildings; and Conservation Areas with the Royal HaskoningDHV ID Nos. running from 1 to 362 and 1699 to 1701.





- 168. In Annex 28.1.1, the RHDHV ID Nos. are highlighted Green for landfall/CRS related assets; Red for onshore cable corridor related (including associated infrastructure such as trenchless crossings (e.g. HDD) and mobilisation zone) assets; and Blue for onshore project substation related assets including Necton National Grid substation extension and overhead line modifications.
- 169. Amongst other detail Annex 28.1.1 also includes: the name of each asset; the location of each asset; whether the asset was visited or seen directly during the heritage settings site visit; pre-site visit notes; and site visit / post-site visit notes (including broad conclusions and recommendations, where relevant).
- 170. In addition to the detail included in Annex 28.1.1, the 34 heritage assets in Table 28.5 have been identified at this baseline ADBA stage as requiring further heritage setting consideration and assessment within ES Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage.

Blickling Conservation Area (356)	Overlaps with (completely contains) a trenchless crossing (e.g. HDD) zone and an approx. 4km stretch of the onshore cable corridor. Vicinity of mobilisation zone at SW corner.	

- 171. The heritage assets targeted as part of the initial site visits undertaken to date were located in the wider landfall and CRS area and were prioritised due to the open nature of the landscape and the envisaged increase in potential settings impact that may occur.
- 172. Additional site visits are anticipated in order to inform the ES. Seven heritage assets (focussed at the onshore project substation) will be visited as part of the subsequent settings fieldwork. These assets require a site visit due to their proximity to the onshore project substation, and are as follows:
 - Two moated sites at Huntingfield Hall (5).
 - Moated site 430m south west of Bradenham Hall (6).
 - Mona Hill (7).





- Church of St. Andrew, Bradenham (34). <u>LVIA Heritage Viewpoint Location</u>.
- Church of St. Mary, Fransham (35).
- The Old Hall, Fransham (58). LVIA Heritage Viewpoint Location.
- Bradenham Hall (347).
- 173. A number of identified assets at the landfall and CRS will also be revisited to inform the EIA prior to submission of the final ES and DCO application in June 2018.

28.6 Discussion

28.6.1 Summary of Heritage Potential

- 174. The archaeological evidence in the study area reflects a human presence from the earliest evidence of hominin activity in the UK to the present day. Finds and sites dating to the prehistoric period suggest that the study area presented an environment suitable for exploitation during the Palaeolithic and Mesolithic period. The archaeological record suggests a prevalence of activities associated with subsistence, reflective of a nomadic existence of a hunter-gatherer lifestyle. Should further remains from this early period exist within the study area, they will most likely comprise artefactual lithic finds. There is also a potential for palaeoenvironmental data concealed within *in situ* sediments in the coastal areas surrounding Happisburgh and at historic river crossing locations along the Rivers Bure and Wensum which may include Holocene riverine sediments and sub-Till deposits of possible archaeological interest. *In situ* laminated silts, considered to be laterally equivalent to the estuarine muds in which the Happisburgh footprints (367) were recorded, have been identified in the Happisburgh area (Birks, 2016: 16).
- 175. Activity of an increasingly sedentary nature is represented by the archaeological record from the Neolithic period onwards. Should further currently unrecorded heritage assets be discovered to exist within the study area dating from the Neolithic to the Romano-British period, such sites would likely be representative of land-use in association with settlement, subsistence (including farming activities) and spiritual / religious activities. The archaeological record also indicates the presence of military-related activity in the study area from the Romano-British period. As such, the potential for currently unrecorded heritage assets of a military nature dating to this period should not be discounted within the study area.
- 176. Settlement, agricultural and religious activities continued to dominate the archaeological record within the study area from the Saxon period onwards. These elements of past land-use may thus be represented amongst potential heritage assets that are as yet undiscovered in the study area. In addition to those outlined above, potential heritage assets from the medieval period onwards may also be of a commercial or industrial nature. The growth of a number of trading centres





surrounding the study area saw a marked increase in heritage assets associated with industry and production in the archaeological record, an element which intensified in the post-medieval period with the Industrial Revolution. Commercial and industrial expansion drew people to the towns, which in turn, saw an increase in more concentrated settlement patterns in and surrounding various towns along the route of the study area. Despite this, agricultural activities continued to be the predominant activity and is likely to be reflected in the potential archaeological record (e.g. in the form of field boundaries).

177. Currently unknown archaeological remains dating to the 20th century in the study area are likely to be predominantly representative of defence measures (e.g. tank traps, anti-aircraft infrastructure, pill boxes that are no longer extant) or may provide direct evidence of hostilities (e.g. bomb craters).

28.6.2 Potential for Buried Archaeological Remains

- 178. There is the potential for buried archaeological remains to exist within the study area dating back to the earliest evidence of hominin activity in north-west Europe, particularly in the area of the proposed Happisburgh landfall location. Areas in which in-situ laminated silts, considered to be laterally equivalent to the estuarine muds in which the footprints were recorded, have been recorded in the Happisburgh area (Birkes, 2016: 16), suggesting the potential for further such deposits and associated finds to exist. Such sediments are paramount to an understanding of the Pleistocene deposits at Happisburgh and are regarded as archaeologically significant.
- 179. The onshore cable route was scrutinised in detail as part of the aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment, and found to contain a high potential for the further discovery of buried archaeological sites/features. The assessment confirmed and revealed a series of extensive and complex cropmark sites, indicative of a complex multi-period buried archaeological landscape dating from earlier prehistoric through to modern periods (Air Photo Services, 2017, Annex 28.1.3). These numerous cropmark features were more abundant in the northern sector of the route, thought to be due to the ease with which crops respond to soil moisture deficits in this area. By comparison, cropmark features are less plentiful in the remaining southern section of the route, although it is noted that well drained soils may mask the appearance of buried features here. As such, the potential for buried remains to be present across the onshore infrastructure areas is considered to be high.
- 180. A targeted selection of the more complex and substantial looking cropmark features could be included in a subsequent programme of (pre-application) priority geophysical survey to be discussed and agreed in consultation with Norfolk Vanguard Limited, NCC HES and HE (see section 28.4.6). Recommendations





regarding such survey works are included as part of ES Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage and are not considered here.

181. The aerial photographic and LiDAR assessment revealed the proposed development area to be an area that has been subject to heavy agricultural use for several decades, leaving the entire route heavily plough eroded. Despite this, there is potential for buried archaeological features or assets to exist in the sub-soils. Any such features would expect to be revealed upon the stripping of topsoil, unless they are extremely eroded.

28.6.3 Previous Impacts

28.6.3.1 Buried archaeology

- 182. As outlined above, there is a high potential for buried archaeological remains to exist within the study area. However, despite this potential for as yet undiscovered remains, this potential depends partly on the impacts that previous land use may have had in this area.
- 183. For the most part, the proposed onshore development area extends across a rural landscape which has been subject to heavy agricultural use. The aerial photographic and LiDAR assessment results indicate a marked plough erosion effect across the whole area (Air Photo Services, 2017).
- 184. As such it follows that for the majority of the study area, the predominant form of previous impacts to buried archaeological remains from former and ongoing land use are likely to have arisen/arise as a result of farming activities such as ploughing.
- 185. Other areas of previous impact are likely to include construction activities associated with modern highways, housing and other infrastructure/services. Prominent routes which transect the study area include, but are not limited to, the A47 which runs roughly east-west at the point of intersect, passing across the study area between Dereham and Necton, the A1067 which passes between Swanton Morley and Reepham in a NW-SE orientation, the B1149 which crosses the study area north-south to the east of Cawston, the A140 which crosses the study area north-south to the east of Aylsham and the A149 which runs NW-SE through North Walsham.
- 186. Impacts upon the heritage (historic environment) resource arising from other previous developments are also outlined in section 28.4.4 above, as part of a high-level description of previous archaeological events within the study area, which have resulted in the uncovering and discovery of a range of archaeological sites, monuments and find spots, as recorded within the NHER.





28.6.3.2 Above ground heritage

- 187. The study area is situated within a largely rural landscape which passes adjacent to a number of urban centres. The historic character of the above ground heritage in the rural setting is predominated by assets relating to previous settlement and farming activities with longevity indicated from at least the medieval/post-medieval period onwards. The historic character of the above ground heritage in the urban centres is predominated by buildings associated with post-medieval expansion, although modern development and 20th and 21st century expansion is likely to have altered the hinterland of many such towns into areas of modern settlement.
- 188. Previous impacts to above ground heritage assets are likely to be predominated by impact to the setting of heritage assets, as a result of various developments within the study area. On a broad scale, examples include the modern highway development outlined above, although the development of modern infrastructure on a smaller scale (e.g. housing) and sometimes on a larger scale (industrial development/quarrying) may also have had an impact on the setting of various heritage assets within the study area.

28.6.4 Potential Development Impacts

- 189. The project has the potential to impact upon the archaeological and cultural heritage (historic environment) resource in a number of ways, through both direct permanent physical changes and indirect non-physical changes to the setting of heritage assets. Some impacts and changes will be temporary and others permanent, some confined to the construction stages and others more permanent during operation and the lifespan of the project, and subsequent decommissioning.
- 190. The potential impacts considered below are a preliminary indication to inform and guide the more formal impact assessment undertaken as part of the ES.

28.6.4.1 Potential impacts during construction

- 28.6.4.1.1 Direct impact on (permanent change to) buried archaeological remains
- 191. The extent of any impact will depend on the presence, nature and depth of any such remains, in association with the depth of the proposed construction-related groundworks. Any adverse effects would likely be permanent and irreversible in nature.
- 28.6.4.1.2 Direct impact on (permanent change to) above ground archaeological remains e.g. historic earthworks (including the historic landscape character)
- 192. The extent of any impact will depend on the presence and nature of any such remains. Any adverse effects may be permanent and irreversible in nature.





- 28.6.4.1.3 Indirect impact on the setting of heritage assets (designated and nondesignated, including historic landscape character)
- 193. Would likely occur through the presence of machinery, construction traffic and general construction activities taking place within the onshore proposed development areas. The sight, noise and smell as well as any dust and vibration created during the construction phase could have an indirect (non-physical) impact upon heritage assets and their settings.
- 28.6.4.1.4 Impact on potential geoarchaeological / palaeoenvironmental remains, potentially indicative of former land surfaces
- 194. It is possible that elements of the scheme may effect below ground deposits over a wider area than that of the footprint of the infrastructure. For example through hydrological changes that may cause desiccation and drying out of wetland deposits and associated preserved waterlogged archaeological remains.

28.6.4.2 Potential impacts during operation

- 28.6.4.2.1 Indirect impact on the setting of heritage assets (designated and non-designated)
- 195. The presence of above ground infrastructure could have an ongoing impact on the setting of heritage assets following completion of construction through into operation and maintenance phase; as a result of for example the presence of the CRS, onshore project substation and extension to the National Grid substation including overhead line modifications within the landscape and their day to day uses.

28.6.4.3 Potential impacts during decommissioning

- 28.6.4.3.1 Direct impact on (permanent change to) buried archaeological remains
- 196. The extent of any impact will depend on the presence, nature and depth of any such remains, in association with the depth of the proposed decommissioning-related groundworks. Any adverse effects would likely be permanent and irreversible in nature. It was noted by HE in the Scoping Opinion (The Planning Inspectorate, 2016) that the demolition of buildings and infrastructure can have an impact greater than that of construction e.g. if grubbing out of foundations or remediation of contaminants is required.
- 28.6.4.3.2 Indirect impact on the setting of heritage assets (designated and non-designated)
- 197. Would likely occur through the presence of machinery, decommissioning traffic and general decommissioning activities taking place within the onshore decommissioning areas. The sight, noise and smell as well as any dust and vibration created during the





decommissioning phase could have an indirect (non-physical) impact upon heritage assets and their settings.

28.6.4.4 Potential Cumulative Impacts

- 198. The following potential cumulative impacts have been identified:
 - Cumulative Impact on the setting of designated and non-designated heritage assets;
 - Cumulative Impact from groundworks on above ground, or buried archaeological remains; and
 - Cumulative Impact from groundworks on potential geoarchaeological / palaeoenvironmental remains, potentially indicative of former land surfaces.
- 199. All of the potential development impacts identified and described above will be considered further within Chapter 28 Onshore Archaeology and Cultural Heritage ES Chapter and DCO submission in June 2018.

SUMMARY

- S1 This assessment of aerial imagery was commissioned by Royal HaskoningDHV UK Ltd (referred to for this assessment as RHDHV) on behalf of Norfolk Vanguard Ltd in support of an Archaeological Desk Based Assessment over a proposed c. 60km route of an onshore cable corridor, and the locations of associated onshore cable relay station and substations, for the Norfolk Vanguard Offshore Wind Farm in Norfolk. UK.
- S2 The object of this assessment was to provide information on the location and nature of any archaeological features which are visible on aerial imagery within and immediately adjacent to the cable corridor route, onshore cable relay station and substation options and a 100m buffer for these areas.
- S3 Airborne Laser Scan (ALS, or Lidar) data, which was collected by the UK Environment Agency and made available for download, has been processed and interpreted over c. 75% of the area, in conjunction with interpretation of historical and modern aerial photographs and high quality ortho rectified aerial imagery provided by APEM Ltd, which was collected in April 2017. Interpretation and mapping from aerial photographs, which was completed in 2007-2008 by the Norfolk Rapid Coastal Zone Assessment and Norfolk Aggregates National Mapping Programme (NMP) projects has been examined and incorporated to the assessment, and is fully acknowledged within the attribute tables into the supplied GIS SHP files.
- The assessment area has been under heavy agricultural use for several decades, and the majority of the sites recorded for this assessment showed as cropmarks on aerial photographs taken at suitable times of the year between the 1940s and 2017. These cropmarked sites are extensive and complex, particularly in the north eastern sector of the route adjacent to the coast. They present evidence for a complex multi period buried archaeological landscape which dates from the earlier prehistoric through to modern periods.
- Two hundred and seventy individual site or areas were recorded for this assessment from aerial imagery. The majority of the sites recorded were heavily plough eroded and visible only as crop marks. However, AP site 16, a group of curvilinear enclosures, survives as earthworks, as does a likely moated manor site and associated drains at AP site 42. AP 16 and 42 lie well away from the central area of the cable corridor route. These sites are already noted and mapped by the Ordnance Survey. Dense and complex cropmarks show the presence of many buried multi period sites at the coastal end of the proposed route, and inland from the coast, in areas where the lighter soils and geology are very conducive to the formation of cropmarks in drier seasons. Defensive structures which were placed in World War Two along the coast and in the coastal hinterland were visible as complex extant features on photographs taken in the 1940s and 1950s and were recorded comprehensively by the NMP.
- The plough erosion has been very marked in this whole area (covered by the cable corridor route), and no traces of Medieval agriculture were recorded from any source. Close examination of the visualised Lidar data similarly recorded very few sites which retain any topographic features outside of the unploughed areas adjacent to watercourses which show extant remains of modern drainage only. The APEM data, whilst of very high resolution, was taken just too early in the year to record crop marked features, with the exception of the wide buried ditches of a moated site in the



south west of the route area. Over 2900 historic and modern aerial photographs thus provided the majority of the data for this assessment. These were examined in detail at the Historic England (HE) Archive in Swindon and the Norfolk Historic Environment Record (NHER) in Gressenhall Norfolk during April and May 2017. All timelines of mosaiced aerial imagery which were available were examined concurrently at www.earth.google.com, with attention to the 2006 timeline which showed many of the sites as cropmarks. The Cambridge University Collection of Aerial Photographs (CUCAP) was not open for consultation during this assessment, and there is no indication when CUCAP may again be open. The online index was searched for this project and all relevant records of photographs were downloaded as a CSV file and checked in the GIS against other records. Some CUCAP photos are cited in the NHER, and these were copied into the HE and NHER collections and thus seen. No other sites were noted solely from CUCAP photographs which have not been consulted, but it was not possible to see the entire collection in the CUCAP archive. This remains an issue for archaeologists undertaking AP assessment as of June 2017.

- S7 It is highly likely that further buried features may be present which are not visible on aerial photographs and not discernible as ground height variations via Lidar data due to erosion. This factor underlines the need to supplement and build upon the current data through non-intrusive and intrusive survey methodologies as outlined within the WSI for Archaeological Desk Based Assessment (Royal HaskoningDHV, 2017).
 - S8 The assessment of aerial imagery is summarised in the gazetteer of sites within this report and presented as a series of SHP files for GIS. These data comprise 272 individual polygons which contain the attribute descriptions for each set of mapped features which were recorded within them. Original interpretation and mapping was at 1:2500 level, and every effort has been made to ensure an accurate and comprehensive record of the visible, predominately buried, archaeological resource (heritage assets) within the assessment area.



1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 This assessment of aerial imagery was commissioned by Royal HaskoningDHV UK Ltd (RHDHV) on behalf of Norfolk Vanguard Ltd in support of an Archaeological Desk Based Assessment over a proposed c. 60km route of an onshore cable corridor, and the locations of associated onshore cable relay station and substation options, for the Norfolk Vanguard Offshore Wind Farm in Norfolk, UK.
- 1.2 The project was undertaken in accordance with section 2.4 of a Written Scheme of Investigation for Archaeological Desk Based Assessment (Royal HaskoningDHV 2017).
- 1.3 The object of this assessment was to provide information on the location and nature of any archaeological features which are visible on aerial imagery within and immediately adjacent to the cable corridor route, onshore cable relay station and substation options and a 100m buffer from these areas.
- 1.4 It is important to note that aerial photographs and Lidar data usually only show part of the horizontal and vertical extent of buried and upstanding features. Their capacity to reveal features as differences in the ground height, crop marks, vegetation marks, soil marks or as the shadows cast by banks, ditches and walls, depends upon a number of environmental and agricultural factors prevalent at the time of the airborne survey and the resolution and penetration of Lidar surveys, particularly in wooded or heavily vegetated areas.
- 1.5 Features have been mapped to a 1:2500 scale digital Ordnance Survey (OS) map base.
- 1.6 The site numbering shown in the gazetteer of sites is exclusive to this report only and concords with the numbers allocated as Preferred References (PrefRefs) and Monument Unique Identifiers (MonUIDs) by the NHER and numbers allocated to each site by RHDHV in their own gazetteer of all sites within the assessment area.



2 THE ASSESSMENT AREA

Location

2.1 The assessment area is shown on Figure 1, and runs from proposed substation area at Necton, to the northeast via Dereham, Reepham and North Walsham to a wide area of possible cable relay station sites between Bacton Green and Happisburgh on the Norfolk coast.

Topography, geology and soils

- 2.2 The study area traverses gently undulating or flat predominantly arable countryside. The route traverses two solid geologies. The bed rock in the southern sector of the route is white chalk, (British Geological Survey 2017). The northern sector of the route, from approximately Cawston and Aylsham onwards overlays Neogene and Quaternary rocks (undifferentiated) which is a Sedimentary bedrock formed approximately 23 million years ago and consists of Gravel, Sand, Silt and Clay (British Geological Survey 2017).
- 2.3 The predominant superficial geology consists of Till (Diamicton) with large areas of Glacial Sand and Gravel indisposed along the route concentrating in the centre and the north. The route also passes through smaller deposits of Alluvium (Clay Silt and Sand) and deposits of Crag Group sand and gravel in both the south and the north of the route (British Geological Survey 2017).
- 2.4 The soils along the south of the route are slightly acidic, loamy, and clayey with impeded drainage in some places. There are smaller areas of slowly permeable seasonally wet slightly acid but base-rich loamy and clayey soils, and loamy and sandy soils, with naturally high groundwater and a peaty surface. In the centre and north of the route, the soils are freely draining, slightly acidic and loamy, with smaller deposits of freely draining slightly acid sandy soils, and loamy sandy soils with naturally high groundwater and a peaty surface.
- 2.5 The free draining substrates in the northern part of the route are very conducive to the formation of cropmarks in times of even slight soil moisture deficit, and were also attractive to past settlers. The less well drained soils in the southern part of the route are a little more problematic and less conducive to crop mark formation, and therefore the identification of archaeological sites as crop marks may not be as effective as in the north sector of the proposed route.

Previously recorded heritage assets

- 2.6 The proposed cable corridor route passes through a wide area of diverse archaeological contexts, which date from the earliest prehistory to World War Two defensive remains.
- 2.7 The study area, within the 100m buffer, cable route and cable relay station options contains, from an aerial perspective, buried and eroded heritage assets ranging from Bronze Age funerary monuments, likely Iron Age or Roman settlement and military enclosures and routeways, the foundations of a former Saxon church and Medieval trackways, drains,



- boundaries, moated sites and a post mill in addition to extensive areas of former defensive features which were extant in World War Two, and are now largely removed.
- 2.8 The area to the immediate south west of the coast between Bacton Green and Happisburgh contains a particularly diverse, extensive and complex range of buried sites which show as cropmarks. The remainder of the route indicates concentrations of known cropmarked sites, again of a varied nature, and carries potential for further discovery in all areas.
- 2.9 The absence of evidence for Medieval agriculture in the form of extensive ridge and furrow was notable in this area, which has been heavily ploughed over many recent decades.



3 ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND NATURAL FEATURES FROM AERIAL IMAGERY

- 3.1 In suitably cultivated soils, sub-surface features including archaeological ditches, banks, pits, walls or foundations may be recorded from the air *via* conventional aerial photographs or multi spectral imagery in different ways in different seasons. In spring and summer these buried sites may show through their effect on crops growing above them.
- 3.2 Such indications tend to be at their most visible in ripening cereal crops, in June or July in this part of Britain, although their appearance cannot accurately be predicted and their absence cannot be taken to imply evidence of the absence of archaeological features.
- 3.3 In this area of predominately free draining soils, there are many occasions when even slight soil moisture deficit is sufficient to allow the formation of crop marks over buried features.
- 3.4 In winter months, when the soil is bare or crop cover is thin (when viewed from above), features can show *via* differences in the colour or moisture levels in soils.
- 3.5 Upstanding remains, which may survive in unploughed grassland or areas of tree cover, are also best recorded in winter months when vegetation is sparse and the low angle of the sun helps pick out slight differences of height and slope.
- 3.6 These effects are not confined only to archaeological features, as almost any disturbance of soil and bedrock can produce its own range of shadow, crop and soil differences. For example, crops growing in this area are, under suitable environmental conditions, patterned by periglacial and bedrock fissures and show the differences in the depth of subsoils, especially over limestone bedrock. These features affect crop growth and, when visible on aerial photographs, are mixed with and can sometimes be confused with archaeological features.
- 3.7 Airborne Laser Scan (ALS) data, otherwise known as Light Detection and Ranging (Lidar), have also been collected from airborne survey platforms in more recent years at varying resolutions, and are available for download, processing and interpretation *via* the UK Environment Agency website over c. 75% of this study area.
- 3.8 These data allow the visualisation and accurate recording of differences in the ground level when viewed as a Digital Surface Model (DSM) or Digital Terrain Model (DTM) (which includes tree cover and buildings). Lidar data is of assistance in recording micro and macro topographic features which may indicate relict or extant archaeological and historic landscapes and features.
- 3.9 Lidar data digitally indicates differences in height of the ground surface by creation of a Digital Surface Model (DSM) *via* light pulses from a geo-located and stable airborne survey platform, and is interpreted *via* a series of digital visualisations to accurately depict these height differences (Bennett *et al* 2012, Doneus 2013, Hesse 2010, Štular *et al* 2012).
- 3.10 These data are best interpreted and used in conjunction with modern and historic aerial photographs and maps to provide initial ground truth information.



3.11 In this case, parts of the route were covered by these data, which were used where possible to supplement the interpretation of aerial and satellite derived photos and images. However, the level of erosion over the majority of sites, which were visible only as cropmarks, was such that the Lidar data showed few sites other than those which are still extant as earthworks in areas which are under pasture or outside of arable cultivation.

Limitations of the data

- 3.12 Aerial photographic evidence is limited by seasonal, agricultural, meteorological and environmental factors which affect the extent to which either buried or upstanding archaeological features can be detected from the air. The visibility of archaeological features may differ from year to year, dependent on the type of crop or land use, prevailing weather and levels of moisture in the soil over the crop growing season.
- 3.13 Individual photographs often thus record only a small percentage of the actual extent of buried or upstanding features, and a wide range of photos taken over a long timescale may be needed to reveal the extent of buried features from the air. This has been particularly apparent when examining aerial photographs for this assessment, as features within the site have shown as extensive and clear marks in crops and soils on some occasions, and not at all on others.
- 3.14 The accuracy of the surface model derived from processing Lidar data is limited by the resolution of the original survey the number and proximity of recording points in the 'point cloud' generated over the site or survey area. The only area where 25cm resolution data was available was in the coastal region near Bacton, and even this finer model did not show significant extant archaeological features.
- 3.15 Small topographic details may be derived and profiled and measured from accurately and appropriately visualised Lidar data very successfully, but their interpretation as heritage assets is best undertaken in conjunction with the ground truth data presented by aerial photographs, site visits or modern and historic map data.



4 AIR PHOTO INTERPRETATION AND MAPPING

Photographs examined

- 4.1 The most immediately informative aerial photographs of archaeological features tend to be those resulting from observer-directed flights.
- 4.2 This activity is usually undertaken by an experienced archaeological observer who will fly at seasons and times of day when optimum results are expected.
- 4.3 Oblique aerial photographs taken using a hand-held camera are the usual products of such investigation. Although oblique photographs are able to provide a very detailed view, they are biased in providing a record that is mainly of features noticed by the observer, understood, and thought to be of archaeological relevance. To be able to map accurately from these photographs it is necessary that they have been taken from a sufficient height to include surrounding control point information to match fixed points on both the photograph and the ground. The majority of the comprehensive and numerous collection of oblique aerial photos were taken by Derek Edwards for the NHER and by Historic England, since the 1970s.
- 4.4 Vertical aerial photographs have been taken over the whole of Britain and provide information on a series of dates, mainly between 1946–7 and the present time. Many of these vertical surveys were not flown at times of year that are favourable for the recording of archaeological features which show as either cropmarks in the summer months.
- 4.5 Vertical photographs are taken by a camera fixed inside an aircraft and with its exposures timed to take a series of overlapping views that can be examined stereoscopically. They are often of relatively small scale and their interpretation requires higher perceptive powers and a more cautious approach than that necessary for examination of obliques.
- 4.6 Use of these small-scale images can also lead to errors of location and size when they are rectified or re-scaled to match a larger map scale.
- 4.7 Photographs used for the assessment included those derived from routine vertical surveys, satellite imagery and oblique aerial photos, and over 2900 individual images were examined in conjunction with web-based digital mosaics and data provided by APEM over the whole survey area.
- 4.8 Aerial photographic cover searches were obtained from the Historic England (formerly English Heritage) Archive, and the NHER. The Cambridge University Collection of Aerial Photographs is, however, currently closed for consultation.
- 4.9 The ortho-rectified mosaics of vertical aerial photographs at Google Earth (www.earth.google.com) were consulted online for this assessment in April and May 2017.
- 4.10 Lidar data which were derived from surveys undertaken at 2m, 1m and 25cm resolution on all available dates were downloaded in April 2017 as Digital Terrain Model (DSM) and Digital Surface Model (DSM) data derived from Ascii files, from:

- 4.11 The data were processed through QGIS using the Relief Visualisation Toolkit (RVT) from Ascii data into analytical single direction hillshade (sun azimuth 315, elevation 35 degrees), multi-directional hillshade grey scale and RGB (16 directions, sun azimuth 35 degrees), Simple Local relief Model (SLRM).
- 4.12 Lidar data is only available over c.75% of the study area.
- 4.13 Aerial photographs and Lidar data which were consulted are listed in the **Digital Appendix** to this report.

Methodology

- 4.14 The study area was assessed and all visible archaeological features were mapped in detail to an accuracy compatible with the mapping scale and the scale of the images from which the data were derived, as well as the 1:2500 scale Ordnance Survey (OS) Mastermap digital map base provided by the client.
- 4.15 All available photographs were closely examined by eye and under 1.5x and 3x magnification and verticals were interpreted with the aid of a mirror stereoscope, where appropriate, or in detail on screen when consulted as digital files.
- 4.16 Selected aerial photographs were digitally rectified to an OS map base using AirPhoto 3.58 and Quantum GIS software in order to remove perspective distortion and ensure correct rectification of aerial photographs to the OS map (Scollar 2002 and 2014). Images from Google Earth were also captured, interpreted and rectified to OS map bases (Scollar and Palmer 2008).
- 4.17 AirPhoto calculates mismatch values of control points taken from air photos and the map base. In all transformations prepared for this assessment, the mean mismatches ± 1.5m and minimal pixel error was noted on the same transcriptions using the Quantum GIS georeferencer tool.
- 4.18 The rectified files, the georeferenced Lidar visualisations and the orthorectified APEM data were set as background layers in QGIS, where features were interpreted and drawn over to create polygon and line data as SHP files.
- 4.19 Former field boundaries were shown if they constituted part of the archaeological landscape.
- 4.20 Features were identified as 'possibly archaeological' if the interpreter was uncertain of their origin or their appearance was very faint.
- 4.21 The mapping concentrated upon the proposed cable corridor route and 100m buffer zone. The impact of the scheme upon sites within this corridor may be assessed via their categorisation within the project GIS, and visually where the proposed route, cable relay and substation areas traverse areas of buried features. However, in order to appreciate the landscape or intrasite relationships of some features, it was necessary and desirable to map or indicate the position of sites or features which lay just outside the buffer in certain instances.



4.22 Layers from this dataset have been used to prepare the illustration for this report and are provided digitally for import to a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) in ESRI SHP file format where they may be more easily manipulated, and integrated with data from the wider project assessment, as required.



5 RESULTS




FIGURE 1: Location of the Cable Route Assessment of aerial imagery Norfolk Vanguard Offshore Wind Farm (Terrestrial Archaeology) Air Photo Services 217 04 01 May 2017

5.1 Figures 1 – 15 are collated in their entirety at the end of this report and are also available in the Digital Annexe as high quality jpg files, at the following Dropbox link:

- 5.2 The assessment area has been photographed and surveyed from airborne platforms and from satellite on a number of occasions since the 1940s when earthworks, extant structures and crop or soil marked features were visible over parts of the study area and its immediate environs.




FIGURE 2 Sites 1 - 283 identified from aerial imagery Norfolk Vanguard Offshore Wind Farm (Terrestrial Archaeology) Air Photo Services 217 04 01 May 2017

- 5.3 Figure 1 shows the study area, Figure 2 shows an overview of the sites recorded for this assessment, and Figures 3 17 present the results of this assessment as illustrations to this report for reference purposes only.
- 5.4 Two hundred and seventy individual areas of heritage interest were identified from aerial imagery. These are detailed in the SHP file attribute databases and in a detailed Excel file and is delivered electronically in XLS format. The Digital Appendix contains the following seven items:
- 1 This report as a pdf file
- 2 Figures 1 17 as a pdf file (the map book)
- 3 The full gazetteer of sites including metadata as an xls file
- 4 SHP files which contain all the mapping and attributes for the features and monument polygons which were recorded during this assessment
- The full Historic England coversearches which list the aerial photographs which were consulted in this archive
- 6 The Lidar process logs and metadata
- 7 GIS metadata
- 5.5 The majority of these features are directly impacted by the proposed scheme and lie within the proposed cable corridor route, cable relay station and substation options and immediate buffer zones.
- 5.6 MS Word is perhaps not the ideal platform to represent and detail sites recorded via large GIS databases, therefore the sites are summarised below as extracts from the full database files.
- 5.7 Measurements and detailed corroboration/cross comparison should be made within the project GIS using the SHP files supplied as part of this project.

6 CONCLUSION

- 6.1 The proposed cable corridor route, cable relay station and substation option areas contain a high potential for the further discovery of buried archaeological features.
- 6.2 The complex cropmarked record in the northern sector may be a result of the ease with which crops respond to soil moisture deficits in this area. The northern area contains sites which date from early prehistory to the modern periods, of all types ranging from funerary sites to settlement, trackways, roads and defensive features.
- 6.3 The potential of the southern sector is less well known, as the less well drained soils may mask the appearance of buried features in certain areas. Some Medieval/Post Medieval moated sites are, however, recorded in this area.
- 6.4 The entire route has been heavily plough eroded, but features will survive in varying states of preservation in the sub soils as extant buried archaeological remains (heritage assets). There were no visible traces of Medieval ridge and furrow along the route.
- 6.5 The majority of the archaeological resource (heritage assets) were recorded from oblique and vertical aerial photos, and a particularly responsive 2006 timeline at www.earth.google.com.
- 6.6 Features recorded as structures which were extant in World War Two have mostly been removed, but form part of the historic landscape of the coastal area, which played a pivotal role in the defence of Britain during the 1940s.
- 6.7 The majority of the proposed route and buffer zone applied as part of the assessment, particularly in areas where complex crop marks are recorded, will contain the remains of heritage assets (sub-surface archaeological remains), which will likely be visible upon stripping of the topsoil and any thicker sub-soil deposits, unless the remains are extremely eroded. The horizontal and vertical extent of these features cannot be predicted from the aerial imagery evidence alone.
- 6.8 As such the next steps in the onshore archaeological process may be the targeting of a number of areas for priority archaeological geophysical survey, in order to build upon the dataset and current knowledge base established from the assessment of aerial imagery.


