1 Executive Summary

1.1 The Project Context

- 1.1.1 DS Smith Paper Ltd is applying for a Development Consent Order to allow for the construction and operation of a replacement Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Plant at the Kemsley Paper Mill to the north of Sittingbourne in Kent.
- 1.1.2 The proposed plant, called 'K4', would have a nominal power output of 68-73 megawatts and would supply electricity and steam to the Kemsley paper mill, with any excess being exported to the grid. K4 would be built within the south-eastern corner of the main mill site, which is located to the east of Kemsley and to the north of Sittingbourne. It will comprise a complex of buildings together with ancillary structures and plant. There will be two stacks, one 70m in height and one 35 metres in height.

1.2 Summary of the Approach to Consultation

- 1.2.1 Under Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008 an applicant is required to publicise an application for a Development Consent Order and to consult the local community, specifically prescribed bodies and local authorities.
- 1.2.2 S47 consultation took place in late 2017, followed by S42 consultation and S48 publicity concurrently during January and February 2018. A second round of S42 consultation, to include four S.44 parties, took place in March 2018. Prior to the formal consultation exercise some informal non-statutory consultation had taken place with Swale Borough Council and selected statutory bodies in order to inform the preparation of the SoCC and the technical assessments within the Environmental Statement.
- 1.2.3 Table 1.1 provides a summary timeline of the key stages and outcomes within the overall consultation process:

1.2.4 A number of comments were received from statutory consultees, statutory undertakers and local authorities at the S42 stage, generally in respect of the approach being taken to the assessment of environmental topics within the Environmental Statement. A number of changes were made to the Environmental Statement following the S42 consultation, particularly in respect of the nearby scheduled monument, the highways assessment, the impact of noise on ecology and archaeology. An archaeology requirement was added to the DCO as a result of the S42 consultation. None of the comments made required any change to be made to the proposed development scheme itself.



- 1.2.5 The levels of local community involvement were low, despite the efforts made by the applicant to widely publicise the public exhibitions held and the other methods by which comments could be made. The comments made by the local community have been addressed comprehensively within the various topic chapters of the Environmental Statement.
- 1.2.6 S48 publicity ran concurrently with S42 consultation. However all of the responses received by the 2nd March 2018 S42/S48 deadline were from consultees or parties who had been contacted as part of the S42 consultation. No responses have therefore been received directly as a result of the S48 publicity.
- 1.2.7 DS Smith has satisfied the relevant legislation relating to pre-application consultation, and has endeavoured to engage with statutory consultees, local authorities, interested parties and the local community regarding their proposals. The low level of community involvement in particular is likely to reflect the fact that the proposed K4 plant represents a relatively minor installation within the established Kemsley Paper mill and is in itself environmentally benign.
- 1.2.8 DS Smith thank all those parties who have engaged in their pre-application consultation.

5 Introduction

- 5.1.1 This report has been produced in support of an application for a Development Consent Order by DS Smith Paper Ltd to allow for the construction and operation of a Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Plant at the Kemsley Paper Mill to the north of Sittingbourne in Kent.
- 5.1.2 It comprises the Consultation Report required to be submitted by Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008 for all applications for a Development Consent Order.

5.2 Signposting

- 5.2.1 An Executive Summary is provided at Chapter 1 and provides a quick reference guide detailing, in chronological order, the actions taken to consult prior to the submission of the application.
- 5.2.2 Chapter 7 contains a summary table addressing legislative compliance and Chapter 8 discusses compliance with relevant guidance.
- 5.2.3 The main body of the report deals with the following distinct areas of consultation and publicity in turn;

6 Project Context

- 6.1.1 A full description of the proposal site and proposed development, including the CHP process, is provided within Chapter 2 of the Environmental Statement [Document 3.1], which assesses the likely significant environmental effects of the proposed development. The Non-Technical Summary [Document 3.2] provides a more concise overview of the project and its likely significant environmental effects.
- 6.1.2 A Design and Access Statement [Document 5.3] forms part of the DCO application and discusses the site context and proposed development in more detail. A Planning Statement [Document 5.2] has also been submitted and assesses the proposed development against the relevant planning policy context.

6.2 DS Smith Paper Ltd

6.2.1 DS Smith Paper Ltd (DS Smith) is a leading European manufacturer of recycled corrugated case materials and speciality papers. The company operate nine paper mills across Europe, with Kemsley their only mill within the UK.

6.3 The Kemsley Paper Mill

6.3.1 The Kemsley mill was built in 1924 to produce newsprint and by 1970 had diversified to produce corrugated case materials. The entire site is owned by DS Smith, who have invested heavily in modernising the facility, which now employs around 400 people and has an annual production capacity of up to 800,000 tonnes.

6.4 Existing Energy Supply

- 6.4.1 The paper production process is energy intensive and requires a substantial amount of electricity and steam. The energy and steam requirements of the Kemsley mill are provided by a range of sources, operated by either DS Smith or partner companies. The current power sources are:
 - **K1** a gas turbine CHP plant located within the mill site which provides electricity and steam to the mill;
 - K2 a steam generator located within the mill site which uses waste plastic and sludge as a source to provide steam to the mill;
 - **K3** an energy from waste plant operated by Wheelabrator to the east of the main mill complex which from 2019 will provide steam to the mill.
- 6.4.2 K3 is currently being constructed, with the original design having a capacity of less than 50MW. A separate DCO application is being prepared, the 'Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) Power Upgrade', to increase the capacity of the K3 plant to 75MW. That is an entirely separate proposal from the K4 scheme which forms the subject of the DCO application which this Consultation Report accompanies.

6.5 K4 – The Proposed Combined Heat and Power Plant

- 6.5.1 The electricity and steam provided by the existing onsite K1 gas turbine is key to the operation of the mill. However K1 was built in 1995 and does now require significant investment to extend its operational life. In addition K1 was designed to serve the Sittingbourne Paper mill (which no longer exists) as well as the Kemsley mill, so has an inefficient surplus potential capacity.
- 6.5.2 DS Smith is therefore seeking permission to decommission the existing K1 plant and to build K4, a new gas fired CHP plant with a nominal power output of 68-73 megawatts, to supply electricity and steam to the Kemsley paper mill, with any excess being exported to the National grid.

6.6 Project Location, Layout and Design

6.6.1 K4 would be built within the south-eastern corner of the main mill site, which is located to the east of Kemsley and to the north of Sittingbourne. It would comprise a complex of buildings together with ancillary structures and plant. There will be two stacks, one up to 70m high and one up to 35m high.




Figure 6.3: Indicative Works Plan






Figure 6.4 – Indicative Proposed Model

8 Consultation Guidance

- 8.1.1 The applicant has had regard to the DCLG 'Planning Act 2008: Guidance on the preapplication process' ['The Guidance'] when formulating their consultation strategy.
- 8.1.2 Paragraph 15 of the Guidance notes that effective pre-application consultation will lead to applications which are better understood by the public. As demonstrated by some of the responses to the questionnaire completed by the public at the public exhibitions (see Section 14.5- 14.8) there were occasions where the exhibition material was able to clarify areas of confusion. In particular in the case of K4 there was the potential for local confusion with K3, given the similar names and types of development and proximity of the two sites, and the applicant has ensured that clarity is provided regarding the two projects within the consultation material.
- 8.1.3 Paragraph 17 requires developers to be clear about the status of documents. This has been reflected during the consultation process; the leaflet [Appendix L] distributed to the local community makes clear at the outset that it is for the purpose of consulting the public.
- 8.1.4 Paragraph 30 recognises the role played by local authorities as bodies with expert knowledge of their local community, and Paragraphs 34 makes clear the benefit that expertise can bring to the Statement of Community Consultation. The applicant met with Swale Borough Council at an early stage to engage with the Council regarding the intended strategy towards consultation with the local community. Contact was also made with the Community Liaison Officer at KCC to see whether any further groups could be identified who should be contacted [Appendix F]. In particular the direct Zone of Influence defined for the purposes of S47 consultation was discussed with Swale Borough Council at an early stage to ensure it represented an appropriate coverage of the area around the proposal site.
- 8.1.5 In accordance with Paragraph 54 of the Guidance an inclusive approach was taken to engaging with the local community. A range of publicity measures were used; internet, leaflet drops, newspaper articles and adverts to ensure as wide a range as possible of the local community were aware of the proposals. A range of methods of response were also provided; physical questionnaire, online questionnaire, email, letter or phone. The material circulated to the local community was appropriately non-technical in nature, to ensure it remained accessible to all. The SoCC was made widely available, in accordance with Paragraph 57.
- 8.1.6 Paragraph 58 recommends that S48 publicity should coincide with S47 community consultation where possible. In this case, due in particular to the short period between the consultation with local authorities on the SoCC and the public exhibitions, it was not possible to align those processes. S48 publicity was therefore undertaken after the S47 period concluded; in effect allowing any interested parties two opportunities to comment on the proposal.



- 8.1.7 The community consultation on K4 was undertaken at an early stage when the design proposals were still conceptual but when there was sufficient information to provide the community with a good understanding of the scale and likely impacts of the proposed CHP plant. That early consultation then allowed the opportunity for the application to incorporate any comments into the design evolution, although as demonstrated within this Report the outcome of the comments made through the consultation under S42 and S47 were primarily matters for the Environmental Statement and the DCO, rather than requiring changes to the proposed scheme itself.
- 8.1.8 The functional nature and relatively small scale of the proposed development, together with its context within the wider Kemsley Paper mill and low level of environment impacts, mean that in respect of Paragraphs 70 to 73 the level of consultation undertaken is considered to have been appropriate and there was no need in this case for a multi staged process. That approach is borne out by the low levels of response from both statutory consultees and the local community. No changes arose as a result of consultation which have meant that further consultation is necessary.



9 Non-Statutory Informal Consultation

9.1 Environmental Impact Assessment

- 9.1.1 As part of the preparation of the technical chapters of the Environmental Impact Assessment, RPS have consulted informally with the following between August 2017 and January 2018. Where relevant the correspondence has been provided as Appendices within the Environmental Statement [Document 3.1], as referenced below:
 - Mid Kent Environmental Health department regarding approach to Air Quality assessment within the ES [Document 3.1 Appendix 5.1];
 - Swale Borough Council Environmental Health Department regarding approach to noise assessment;
 - Environment Agency regarding data to feed into flood risk assessment work and correspondence regarding approach to flood risk with the Upper Medway Internal Drainage Board;
 - KCC Ecology regarding scope of ecology work and requirement for bird surveys in particular [Document 3.1. Appendix 10.1];
 - Kent County Council and Swale Borough Council regarding viewpoint positions for landscape and visual impact assessment work [Document 3.1 – Appendix 11.1].

9.2 Local Authority

- 9.2.1 An initial briefing meeting was held between the project team and the Case Officer at Swale Borough Council on the 14th September 2018 to set out the project concept and to present a draft of the Community Consultation Statement and Statement of Community Consultation. The approach being taken by the applicant to consultation with the local community was discussed, with no issues raised by the Council in that respect.
- 9.2.2 A further review meeting was then held on the 19th February 2018 with Officers from Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council. That meeting was timed to take place during the S42 consultation period for the local authorities. No significant issues were raised by either Council in respect of the S42 consultation documents.



10 S.42 - The Duty to Consult

- 10.1.1 Section 42 of the Act establishes a duty to consult:
 - (a) Such persons as may be prescribed;
 - (b) Each local authority that is within Section 43;
 - (c) The Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and
 - (d) Each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in Section 44.
- 10.1.2 In this case the land in question is not within Greater London and Part (c) of Section 42 does not apply.


10.2 Section 42 – Part a) Such Persons as may be prescribed

- 10.2.1 Prescribed persons are identified in Regulation 3 of, and Schedule 1 to, the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009.
- 10.2.2 In identifying prescribed persons regard has been had to those bodies consulted by PINS as part of the Scoping Opinion, together with the Annex to PINS Advice Note 3: EIA Consultation and Notification. Where relevant consultees have been included in the S42 list if there is any doubt as to whether they do form a prescribed body.
- 10.2.3 Appendix 1 provides a list of those prescribed persons consulted under S42.

10.3 Section 42 – Part b) Relevant Local Authorities

10.3.1 Figure 10.1 and Table 10.1 identify relevant Local Authorities under S43 of the Act (as amended by S133 of the Localism Act 2011). The Categories for the purposes of Table 10.1 are those set out within The Act, in terms of 'A', 'B', 'C' or 'D' authorities.








Figure 11.1 – Local Authorities under S43

10.4.1 Category (1) covers a person who is an owner, lessee, tenant (whatever the tenancy period) or occupier of the land. Following diligent inquiry the following parties were identified as falling into Category (1) in respect of the land encompassed within the DCO boundary:

- 10.4.2 Grovehurst Energy Limited and SRP New Thames Limited are subsidiary companies of DS Smith Paper Ltd so have interests in the paper mill site, including land which falls within the DCO boundary.
- 10.4.3 Fletcher Challenge are freeholders of land around the roundabout to the north of the paper mill. Given the proximity of the DCO boundary to the roundabout they have been consulted for completeness. South Eastern Power Networks have a leasehold which passes within the DCO boundary.
- 10.4.4 Category (2) of S44 applies to anyone who is interested in the land or has power to sell and convey or to release the land. No parties have been identified as falling within Category (2).
- 10.4.5 Category (4) of S44 applies to any person who would or might be entitled to make a 'relevant claim', as defined in S44(6) as a result of the implementing of the order, the order being implemented or as a result of the use of the land once the order has been implemented. No parties have been identified under Category (4).

10.5 Form of S.42 Consultation

- 10.5.1 The consultation documents for the purposes of Section 42 comprised the following:
 - a covering letter explaining the proposed project and the role of Section 42 consultation within the DCO process;
 - A CD containing a draft Environmental Statement and Non-Technical Summary, by way of Preliminary Environmental Information;
 - A draft plan pack, to form plans and maps to detail the nature and location of the proposed development;
 - A copy of the S48 notice, in accordance with Regulation 13 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.

10.6 Consultation Process

- 10.6.1 The initial batch of S42 consultation packs were sent by Royal Mail Recorded delivery to prescribed bodies and relevant local authorities on the 24th January 2018. The letter provided a deadline for responses of 5pm on the 2nd March 2018, by email or by post. That deadline provides a 35 day deadline from Friday 26th January 2018, starting with the day after the day on which S42 consultees received their packs. The deadline set ensured that the minimum 28 day consultation period was provided, even if there were to be some delay in a consultation body receiving the S42 pack.
- 10.6.2 Royal Mail tracking records demonstrate that all S42 packs were received by prescribed bodies and relevant local authorities by the 29th January 2018 at the latest.



- 10.6.3 A follow up letter (Appendix 2) was sent on the 20th February 2018 to all those prescribed bodies and relevant local authorities who had not responded, to highlight the deadline for responses of the 2nd March 2018.
- 10.6.4 S42 packs were sent to the four S44 parties on the 5th March 2018 by Royal Mail Recorded Delivery. Due to inclement weather in the UK at that point Royal Mail were experiencing delays with postal deliveries, so the covering letters, S48 notices and a link to the project website (allowing for the download of the S42 pack) was also sent by email on the 5th March 2018 to the four consultation bodies. The deadline provided for the S44 parties was the 3rd April 2018; a period of 29 days starting on the 6th March 2018, and timed to avoid the bank holiday on the 2nd April 2018.

10.7 Response to S42 Consultation

- 10.7.1 The following tables document the responses received from Prescribed Bodies, Statutory Undertakers and Local Authorities to the S42 consultation. No responses were received from the S44 parties contacted.
- 10.7.2 Appendix 3.5 of the Environmental Statement [Document 3.1] provides a detailed response to the matters raised by S42 consultees and documents how the Environmental Statement, where necessary/appropriate, was amended to reflect the comments received. The key points are summarised below in respect of the comments made by individual consultees and ES Appendix 3.5 is also provided as Appendix 2 to this Report.

10.8 Prescribed Bodies

- 10.8.1 The Coastguard representation (19) was received after the S42 deadline but nonetheless has been treated as a S42 response.
- 10.8.2 No response was received from the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) during the S42 period. However due to the height of the proposed stack the CAA were contacted following the S42 period and responded by email. That response has been treated as a response under S42 for the purposes of this report.

10.11 S.42 Consultation – Summary

- 10.11.1 A number of prescribed bodies and local authorities took the opportunity to comment on the S42 pack. None of the comments raised required a change to the design of the scheme itself, but a number of changes have been made to the approach to the assessment of issues within the ES in order to address the points made.
- 10.11.2 It is submitted that the applicant has addressed the requirements of Section 42, with active steps taken to address any comments made by parties consulted under Section 42.



11 S.46 – Duty to Notify PINS of proposed development

- 11.1.1 S46(1) of The Act requires an applicant to supply PINS with such information as would be required should PINS be consulted under S42. S46(2) requires the application to comply with (1) on or before commencing consultation under S42.
- 11.1.2 The S.42 consultation pack, comprising the draft Environmental Statement, Non Technical Summary and plan set, were sent to PINS on the 25th January 2018, at the same time as the S42 consultation packs were distributed. The submission to PINS included, for information, the covering letter sent to S42 consultees and the list of prescribed bodies, statutory undertakers and local authorities consulted under S42.
- 11.1.3 PINS confirmed receipt of the S42 pack on the 26th January 2018. S.42 letters were sent to consultees on the 24th and 25th January 2018 and set a deadline for responses of the 2nd March 2018; a period in excess of the minimum 28 days stated by S45. Notification under S46 was therefore sent to PINS at the same time as the S42 packs were distributed, and the acknowledgement of receipt was more than 28 days before the conclusion of the S42 consultation period. S46 of The Act has therefore been satisfied.



12 S.47 - Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC)

12.1 Preparation of SoCC

- 12.1.1 Section 47 of The Act states that the applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land. Before preparing the statement the applicant must consult each local authority that is within Section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.
- 12.1.2 The Local Authorities for the purposes of Section 43(1) are Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council.
- 12.1.3 In preparing the SoCC, regard was had to a variety of sources which include the DCLG-Planning Act 2008 Guidance on the Pre-Application Process (March 2015) and the Planning Inspectorate Advice Note 14: Compiling the consultation report.

12.2 Community Consultation Strategy (CCS)

- 12.2.1 A Community Consultation Strategy was produced in order to inform the SoCC and to provide context to the SoCC for the purposes of SBC and KCC.
- 12.2.2 The CCS first provided the context to the proposals and summarised the likely environmental effects, based on early EIA work which had been carried out at that stage. The Swale Borough Council Statement of Community Involvement document, 'Shaping Spaces and Places' sets out the principles and strategy for consulting the local community within the borough on planning applications and therefore formed a basis for determining the approach to be taken to public consultation on K4.
- 12.2.3 The CCS set a number of core aims and objectives for the K4 public consultation:
 - (i) To make stakeholders aware of the proposed development at an early stage in the process and to inform them about the context, function and expected impacts of the proposed CHP plant;
 - (ii) To provide clarification regarding K4, to ensure the distinction with K3 is understood locally;
 - (iii) To inform stakeholders about the process which will be followed in order to seek a Development Consent Order from the Planning Inspectorate and to highlight how they can continue to be involved in this process;
 - (iv) To provide an early opportunity for stakeholders to provide their comments on the proposed development and to have any queries answered;



- (v) To allow the project team the opportunity at an early stage in the process to reflect the comments made within the scheme being proposed and to feedback to interested parties.
- 12.2.4 Based on the proposed development and its likely environmental effects a direct zone of influence was defined, to form the focus of public consultation together with the wider community. As set out at Paragraphs 6.2.4 and 6.2.5 of the CCS the zone of influence was defined using natural boundaries in the surrounding area and reflecting the initial work done at that stage regarding the environmental assessment of topics such as landscape and visual impact and air quality.
- 12.2.5 Census data was used to assess the make-up of the local community, to ensure an appropriately wide range of consultation methods were used. A series of consultation actions were defined on that basis to target the Zone of Influence, such as leaflet mailings, together with actions intended to target the wider community. A range of local consultees, comprising the defined local authorities, politicians, Parish Councils and other organisations were identified as bodies who should be consulted directly on the proposals.
- 12.2.6 The outcomes of the consultation were expected to be a contact list of interested parties, comments on the proposed scheme and queries addressed to the project team.
- 12.2.7 The CCS was presented to and discussed with SBC alongside the draft SoCC at the initial briefing meeting on the 14th September 2017.

12.3 Preparation and Methodology of the SoCC

- 12.3.1 The first version of the SoCC was prepared on the basis of the CCS discussed above. It provides a brief overview context to the proposal and consultation process, together with a list of key terms. The SoCC provides an overview of DS Smith, the Kemsley Paper mill, the existing energy arrangements and the proposed K4 plant, using a context plan, indicative DCO boundary plan and an early illustrative 3D model of the K4 plant for illustration.
- 12.3.2 A summary of the DCO process is set out within the SoCC, which makes clear that an Environmental Impact Assessment will be carried out and reported within the application within an Environmental Statement. That section sets out that a Preliminary Environmental Information document will be produced to inform the consultation.
- 12.3.3 The SoCC explains the methods by which it will be circulated, sets out contact details for the project team and explains how anyone interested can find out more and get involved. The SoCC clearly states the deadline for responses and sets out how interested parties can request documents in alternative formats and keep updated, before then explaining the future programme of events.

12.4 SoCC Consultation

12.4.1 The first version of the SoCC was discussed in the initial briefing meeting with Swale Borough Council on 14th September 2017.



- 12.4.2 The draft SoCC and the accompanying Consultation Strategy document were formally submitted to SBC and KCC on the 5th October 2017. A deadline for responses of the 2nd November 2017 was provided, which allowed for a 28 day period from the 6th October 2017.
- 12.4.3 The SBC consultation response was received on the 30th October 2017. It is provided as Appendix 6 and raises no issues with the proposed SoCC.
- 12.4.4 The KCC consultation response was received on the 2nd November 2017. It is provided in Appendix 6 and, whilst it noted that KCC were generally satisfied with the proposed consultation, it raised a number of specific points, as set out below. An update had been sent to KCC on the 26th October 2017 explaining that the applicant intended to publicise the SoCC and the exhibitions immediately after the 3rd November 2018 deadline, to understand whether KCC were likely to raise any fundamental issues with the approach being taken to public consultation. KCC did not indicate that was the case and the comments made were reflected in the SoCC prior to it being published and in the questionnaires prior to those being made available at the exhibitions.
 - Public consultation names and addresses: the SoCC was amended so that the
 wording requests personal details but does not read that it is mandatory to
 supply those. In addition the SoCC already made clear that any personal details
 supplied will not be made public and further clarification was provided that
 summaries of comments provided would potentially be published.
 - Public exhibitions KCC suggested additional public exhibition dates. DHA responded to KCC by email on 7th November 2017 to suggest that a review would be undertaken as to whether further exhibitions would be useful depending on the level of attendance at the two events originally scheduled. That response also noted that the exhibition boards, questionnaire and PEI were provided on the project website and could be requested from DHA, so the ability of interested people to respond was not hindered.
 - **Targeted mailings** in accordance with the KCC comment a map was introduced into the SoCC to make clear the extent of the Zone of Influence. The targeted mailings of the explanatory leaflet included all non-residential premises within the zone of influence, including educational facilities. In accordance with KCC's suggestion the KCC Community Liaison Officer was contacted on the 7th November 2017 and responded on the 13th November 2017 to confirm that he had not identified any additional organisations who should be contacted.
 - Website Section 4.4 of the SoCC was updated to list the information which would be provided on the website. KCC suggested that a FAQs page be added to the website; the SoCC made reference to Frequently Asked Questions being provided on the website, however as demonstrated by Chapter 14 of this report levels of response to the public consultation were very low and no additional information requirements were requested by any respondents. The project leaflet is considered to have provided a sufficient high level summary of the proposals and their context and negates the need to provide that information in a 'FAQ's'



- form. However the potential to use FAQs will continue to be reviewed as the project progresses.
- Public consultation in accordance with the KCC suggestion the feedback form
 was amended to allow respondents to tick if they wished to be added to the
 project contact list. That ability was used within the majority of the feedback
 forms returned.
- 12.4.5 As demonstrated by the above the short period between the conclusion of the SoCC consultation period and the commencement of S47 consultation did not prejudice the applicant's ability to reflect KCC comments where necessary.

12.5 Publication of SoCC

12.5.1 Notices publicising the SoCC were placed in the Sittingbourne News Extra and the Sheerness Times Guardian on the 8th and 15th November 2017. The notices set out the ways which the SoCC could be viewed; at the deposit locations (the DS Smith mill office, the Swale Borough Council Offices and the Sittingbourne library), on the project website or by requesting a copy from the project team via email. The notices stated that the deadline for any representations on the proposed development was 5pm on the 17th December 2017.

12.6 Discussion of SoCC Compliance

12.6.1 As set out in Section 12.4.4, KCC had suggested that further consultation events might be required. DHA sent a further email to KCC on the 21st November 2017 following the first two consultation events, setting out the efforts made to publicise those and the low levels of attendance. This was followed by a further email on the 9th January 2018. KCC responded on the 11th January 2018 to confirm that they did not consider a further consultation event to be necessary, albeit noting that any significant change to the proposal might warrant a further event.

Compliance with SoCC

12.6.2 The compliance of the consultation undertaken with the various aspects of the SoCC are summarised in Table 12.1 below.

13 S.47 - Consultation Events

13.1 Exhibition Arrangements

- 13.1.1 Two exhibitions were held:
 - Thursday 9th November 2017 12:30pm to 5:30pm
 - Saturday 11th November 2017 9:30am to 2pm.
- 13.1.2 The times selected were intended to provide sufficient opportunity for a wide range of the local community to attend, either on a working day or on the weekend.
- 13.1.3 The exhibition events took place at the Kemsley Village Hall, which lies just under a kilometre to the west of the Kemsley Paper mill. The hall is a focal feature of the surrounding community and is easily accessible for both immediate residents and any other interested parties from the wider local area.

13.2 Exhibition Material

13.2.1 A set of ten information boards were produced [Appendix H] and provided information on DS Smith, the Kemsley Paper Mill, the proposed CHP, anticipated environmental effects, the DCO process and how interested parties could get involved.






Figure 13.1 – Exhibition (Saturday11th November 2017)

- 13.2.2 Copies of the SoCC, PEI and the project leaflet were also available. The PEI for the purposes of S47 consultation comprised a document which took a similar form to an EIA Non-Technical Summary, which is provided as Appendix I to this report. The PEI report provided a self-contained, non-technical summary of the context to the project, the proposed scheme and the environmental impacts being assessed, to provide any parties interested with an accessible non technical source of information at the S47 stage. That approach is consistent with the advice provided at Paragraph 93 of the Planning Act 2008: Guidance on the pre-application process' guidance, in terms of it being of an appropriately accessible source of environmental information but then also being supplemented by the more detailed draft Environmental Statement presented as PEI at the S48 stage.
- 13.2.3 The consultation events were staffed by members of the project team from DS Smith, E.ON, DHA and RPS.
- 13.2.4 A questionnaire was provided to allow for responses to be made at the consultation event.

13.3 Publicity

Newspaper notices

13.3.1 A notice was first placed in the Sittingbourne News Extra and Sheerness Times Guardian on the 1st November 2017 to publicise the proposed exhibitions. The subsequent notices placed in the same papers relating to the publicity of the SoCC, on the 8th November 2017 also publicised the two public exhibitions. Further notices were placed in both papers on the 15th November 2017 to publicise the SoCC.

Project Website

13.3.2 The project website was updated to provide information regarding the dates, times and venue of the exhibitions.

Leaflet Drop

13.3.3 Some 2720 leaflets were hand delivered to residential properties within the defined Zone of Influence on the 3rd and 4th November. The leaflets provided a broad overview of the project and publicised the exhibitions.

Leaflet Mailing

13.3.4 The same leaflets were sent by post on the 3rd November 2017 to businesses and other non-residential properties within the Zone of Influence, to Parish Councils, local politicians and to local interest groups and forums.



Flyers

13.3.5 Posters advertising the exhibitions were placed at the Kemsley village hall, the Sittingbourne library, local shops in Kemsley, the Kemsley doctors surgery and the Iwade village shops.

Newspaper Articles

13.3.6 An article which provided an overview of the project and which highlighted the exhibitions was published in the Sittingbourne News Extra on the 1st November 2017.

13.4 Deadline

13.4.1 The deadline for consultation responses to be received was 5pm on the 17th December 2018. That provided a period of over a month and a half from the publication of the first exhibition notice in the local paper and from the circulation of the project leaflets, and over a month from the date of the two exhibitions.

13.5 Key Statistics

- 13.5.1 Levels of attendance at both exhibitions was low; ten members of the public and three local Councillors attended the Thursday event, with four members of the public and one Councillor attending the Saturday event.
- 13.5.2 Six questionnaires were returned, one of those by post subsequent to the event. One further submission was made through the project website.



14 S.47 - Consultation Responses

14.1 Questionnaire

- 14.1.1 The project questionnaire primarily used free text questions to allow for those responding to have the ability to provide open answers on what were considered to be the key issues relating to the project. The questions covered:
 - The need, location, design and scale of the proposed K4 plant;
 - What are considered to be the important environmental effects;
 - Any elements of the proposal which cause concern;
 - Any areas where further information would be helpful;
 - Any general comments.
- 14.1.2 The questionnaire provides the opportunity for those responding to be added to the project contact list to receive future updates.

14.2 Rates of Response

14.2.1 As noted previously six questionnaires were returned at or after the consultation events. One submission was made via the project website.

14.3 Location of Respondents

14.3.1 Five of the respondents stated that they were a resident of Kemsley. One respondent was a resident of nearby Milton Regis and one respondent did not provide a response but was a Sittingbourne resident.

14.4 Responses - Need, Location, Design and Scale

What are your thoughts on the need, location, design and scale of the proposed K4 CHP plant?

- 14.4.1 Six responses were provided to the question. One respondent was neutral, whilst the other five responses were positive; the comments made included a statement that the information provided was helpful, the need for the development was understood, K4 was a sensible approach and forward thinking.
- 14.4.2 On that basis there do not appear to be any issues with the need, location, design and scale of the K4 proposal.



14.5 Responses - Environmental Effects

The information boards outline the anticipated environmental effects of the proposed K4 CHP plant. Which of these effects are most important to you and why?

- 14.5.1 The following issues were raised, in terms of being environmental effects which were most important to those responding:
 - (1) Emissions/ Air Quality
 - (2) Traffic levels (including congestion on A249)
 - (3) Emissions from traffic
 - (4) Noise
 - (5) Height of stack/Visual Impact
 - (6) Surface water Run-off
 - (7) Ground contamination
 - (8) Wildlife
- 14.5.2 All the issues raised were also included in the Scoping Opinion provided by PINS and are therefore being comprehensively addressed within the ES and summarised in the NTS.

14.6 Responses- Issues of Concern

Do any aspects of the proposed K4 CHP plant cause you particular concern and why?

- 14.6.1 Three respondents did not identify any areas of concern; in two of those cases no answer was provided and in the remaining case the respondent confirmed 'none' as a response.
- 14.6.2 Table 14.1 sets out the concerns raised by the remaining four respondents and provides a response to those. Some of the responses covered multiple themes or issues.

14.7 Responses - More information

Are there any topics or areas where you feel more information is needed to help you understand the proposed K4 CP plant or its anticipated environmental effects?

14.7.1 No respondents raised any specific issues; one simply asked for continued updates on the project.

14.8 Responses - General comments

Please provide any general comments you have regarding the proposed K4 CHP plant below.

14.8.1 Additional comments were as follows:

The paper production process is energy intensive and a continually running process and the key for DS Smith is securing a sufficiently robust and flexible solution capable of meeting that need. CHP provides that capacity and flexibility, which cannot be achieved by solar panels. The ability to meaningfully landscape the area in question is limited by the fact it was once used as a landfill site and there are ongoing gas monitoring stations placed throughout.

14.9 **S47 Summary**

- 14.9.1 Appropriate steps have been taken to define a consultation strategy which ensures that the local community would be properly informed regarding the proposals and would have the opportunity to comment. In particular some 2720 households and a further 70 business/establishments within the defined Zone of Influence received the overview leaflet which provides a broad summary of the proposal and its likely significant effects.
- 14.9.2 The rate of response to the S47 consultation was unfortunately low, however that in itself can be considered representative of the attitude of the local community to what is in physical terms a minor addition to an established large industrial site. The responses that were received to the S47 consultation did not raise any issues in terms of the need, location, design and scale of the proposed development. In terms of environmental effects the overriding themes were those of air quality/emissions, odour, and traffic and in a number of cases respondents noted that the exhibition information had served to allay their concerns regarding the environmental impacts of the proposal. In addition a number of respondents made positive comments regarding the overall strategy and benefits of replacing K1 with K4.



15 S.48 Statutory Publicity

- 15.1.1 Section 48 of The Act states that the applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner and requires those publication notices to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.
- 15.1.2 Regulation 4 of the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009 then sets out provisions for the publication of the public notice and what this must contain.

15.2 The S48 Notice

- 15.2.1 The S48 notice addresses all of the specific points within Regulation 4(3) of the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009.
- 15.2.2 The following notices were published:
 - Sittingbourne News Extra 24th January 2018 and 31st January 2018
 - Sheerness Times Guardian 24th January 2018 and 31st January 2018
 - The London Gazette online 30th January 2018, in paper 31st January 2018
 - The Telegraph 30th January 2018
- 15.2.3 The above reflects Regulation 4(2) of the Prescribed Forms and Procedure Regulations 2009 which require the S48 Notice to be published for two consecutive weeks in a locally circulating paper, once in the London Gazette and once in a national newspaper.
- 15.2.4 The S48 notice provides a deadline for responses of the 2nd March 2018, which is consistent with the deadline provided for S42 consultees. That deadline provides a period of 31 days from the date of the last notice being published.
- 15.2.5 The documents, maps and plans (as required under Regulation 4(3)(e)) comprise the draft Environmental Statement, Non-Technical Summary and plan set as issued under the S42 consultation. Those documents were placed on deposit at the Kemsley paper mill office, the Swale Borough Council offices and at the Sittingbourne library.

15.3 Response to S48 Publicity

15.3.1 As noted the S48 publicity was undertaken at the same time as S42 consultation. All of the responses received during that period either made specific reference to S42 in their response or were from a consultee included on the S42 mailing list. No other responses were received from any other parties who would have been notified of the project by the S48 publicity.



16 Summary and Conclusions

- 16.1.1 In accordance with Section 25 of the Guidance on the pre-application process (March 2015), the consultation undertaken in respect of the proposed K4 project is considered to have been thorough, effective and proportionate.
- 16.1.2 Levels of response and engagement from both statutory consultees and the local community has been low. The responses received to consultation and publicity have not generated any changes to the proposed scheme itself. However elements of the DCO application have altered as a result of the consultation undertaken by the applicant, in particular:
 - The assessment of ecology and noise within the Environmental Statement;
 - The assessment of wider impacts on the setting of the scheduled monument;
 - Improved scoping of the highways assessment within the ES;
 - The reflecting of the increasing status of the Saxon Shore Way footpath within the ES;
 - The inclusion of an archaeology requirement within the draft DCO.

HSE's land use planning advice

Will the proposed development fall within any of HSE's consultation distances?

The redline boundary of the development does not fall within the consultation zones of any major accident hazard site with Hazardous Substances Consent (HSC).

There are currently no major accident hazard pipelines within the development. If in the intervening period we are notified of a change to this situation, the developer would need to seek advice from us.

Would Hazardous Substances Consent be needed?

The presence of hazardous substances on, over or under land at or above set threshold quantities (Controlled Quantities) may require Hazardous Substances Consent (HSC) under the Planning (Hazardous Substances) Act 1990 as amended. The substances, alone or when aggregated with others, for which HSC is required, and the associated Controlled Quantities, are set out in The Planning (Hazardous Substances) Regulations 2015.

Annex A: Natural England's detailed advice in relation to the proposed Kemsley Paper Mill CHP (K4) Plant

Designated nature conservation sites – further information required

As detailed within the Environmental Statement, the application site is within close proximity, and has the potential to impact the following designated sites:

- The Swale Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI)
- The Swale Special Protection Area (SPA)
- The Swale Wetland of International Importance under the Ramsar Convention (Ramsar Site)
- The Swale Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ)
- Medway Estuary and Marshes SSSI
- Medway Estuary and Marshes SPA
- Medway Estuary and Marshes Ramsar Site
- South Thames Estuary and Marshes SSSI
- Thames Estuary and Marshes SPA
- Thames Estuary and Marshes Ramsar Site
- Queendown Warren SSSI
- Queendown Warren Special Area of Conservation (SAC)

Natural England considers that impacts to these sites are likely to result through a number of pathways including lighting, noise, water quality, changes to water temperature within The Swale, air quality and disturbance to species associated with the above sites. These are discussed in more detail below.

Noise

The Environmental Statement and accompanying Information to Inform the Habitats Regulations Assessment (Appendix 10.1) discounts impacts on the basis that noise levels within the designated sites will not exceed 80dB L_{Amax}. Natural England's advice is that it is generally accepted that noise levels below 55dB are unlikely to result in disturbance to coastal bird species. Above 55dB, disturbance can occur and the significance of the impact is both species and site specific. Consequently, we recommend that further assessment of the potential impacts from noise impacts during construction and operation to species associated with The Swale SSSI, SPA and Ramsar Site and The Swale MCZ is provided along with details of any avoidance and mitigation measures that may be required. It would also be helpful if a noise contour plan detailing existing noise levels is provided to supplement those provided for construction and operation levels within the Environmental Statement.

Air Quality

Natural England notes that the Ecology section of the Environmental Statement (Chapter 10) and the Information to Inform the Habitats Regulations Assessment (Appendix 10.1) in general defer consideration of the air quality impacts and mitigation measures to Chapter 5 of the Environmental Statement. Chapter 5, the Air Quality section of the Environmental Statement appears to relate primarily to human health rather than ecological impacts. As such, we would recommend that further detailed consideration of the potential for air quality impacts, which should include information on the specific avoidance and mitigation measures to be implemented in relation to designated sites is provided.

We also note that section 5.29 of Appendix 10.1 states that '..redevelopment is not anticipated to increased traffic on the A249, nor on local service roads'. Natural England recommends that further clarity is provided within the assessment to confirm that there will be no increase in traffic which could result in air quality impacts to the designated sites.

Natural England notes that the Air Quality 'in-combination ' assessment within Appendix 10.1 has yet to be competed and as such we are unable to provide detailed advice on this at present.

Water quality

The Environmental Statement highlights that the scheme could result in a number of impacts to the designated sites in close proximity to the application site (The Swale SSSI, SPA and Ramsar Site and The Swale MCZ). These include impacts from contaminated run-off, construction materials and altered water flow for example. Whilst the Environmental Statement provides general principles of the measures that are to be developed to ensure impacts to the designated sites do not occur, we recommend that greater clarity is provided at this stage on the prevention and control measures that are to be implemented. The final detail of which can of course be agreed post consent but there needs to be sufficient certainty at this stage that impacts can be avoided or fully mitigated to allow Natural England to provide detailed advice on the proposal.

Water temperature

Mention is made of warm water discharges to The Swale within the Environmental Statement but no assessment of the potential impacts that could result to the designated sites from this appears to have been provided. It would be helpful if clarity were provided on whether this will result in any additional impacts to those from the existing consented CHP which this proposal will replace; if so the potential ecological impacts should be fully detailed along with the avoidance and mitigation measures.

Lighting

Sections10.6.4 and 10.6.5 of the Environmental Statement detail that light impacts during construction and operation are unlikely to result in significant impacts to the designated sites. It would however be helpful if light contour plans detailing the current and likely lux levels within the designated sites during construction and operation of the scheme are provided.

Protected species

We have not assessed the potential impacts to protected species as part of this advice letter. However as part of the Development Consent Order process, we would be happy to provide advice on mitigation measures as part of the Letter of No Impediment on a cost recovery basis through our Discretionary Advice Service.

Thank you for consulting Historic England regarding the proposed construction and operation of a Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Plant at the Kemsley Mill, Sittingbourne, Kent. We provide the following advice.

Advice

An Environmental Statement (ES) has now been submitted for the proposed development. This includes a Cultural Heritage chapter which assesses the development's impact upon both non-designated and designated heritage assets and their setting.

The ES states that the development will have no direct physical impact upon any designated heritage assets. It also states that the development will cause no change to the setting of the Grade I Church of St Giles, or the scheduled monuments of 'Murston Old Church' or 'World War II Heavy Anti-aircraft Gunsite.' This is by virtue of the distance between these assets and the development site, and the screening effect of intervening development. We agree with these statements.

We think that the assessment of the development's impact upon the setting of the closest scheduled monument (Castle Rough) is inadequate in some respects. The assessment discusses only the *visual* impact of the development upon the setting of the monument, i.e. it fails to assess the impact that changes in ambient lighting, noise and traffic might also have. We would expect an assessment of these aspects of setting to have been undertaken, especially considering the proximity of the monument to the proposed development. This would also have been in line with Historic England's guidance on setting ('The Setting of Heritage Assets'), and advice we gave

in August 2017 regarding the scope of the ES.

Although we think the assessment is in some aspects inadequate, we do - following our own site visit - agree that the *visual* impact of the development on the setting of Castle Rough will be negligible. This is because views to, from and around the monument have already been considerably compromised by the existing industrial complex. As the new development will sit comfortably within the massing of the existing complex, the additional visual impact it will cause should therefore indeed be negligible.

It may be that the impact of additional noise, lighting and traffic associated with the development will also be negligible for the same reasons. However, we note that this has not been formally assessed and thus we cannot determine this aspect of the development's impact. We understand that a noise assessment has been carried out and was used to assess impacts upon residential areas and ecology; therefore we believe that sufficient raw data should be available to allow the impact of additional noise upon the setting of Castle Rough to be assessed also.

The Cultural Heritage chapter of the ES also assesses the development's impact upon the setting of other designated assets (e.g. grade II buildings and Conservation Areas), and upon non-designated buried archaeology. We are principally interested in designated assets and would therefore defer to the advice of the Heritage Conservation Team at Kent County Council (KCC) with regards to the impact on non-designated heritage.

Relevant Policy

When applying for planning permission (or a Development Consent Order) for a development, applicants should describe the significance of any heritage assets affected, including any contribution made by their setting. The level of detail should be proportionate to the assets' importance and sufficient to understand the potential impact of the proposal on their significance (para. 128 NPPF).

The planning system should play an active role in guiding development to sustainable solutions; with economic, social and environmental gains sought jointly and simultaneously (para.8 NPPF). When determining an application for a DCO, the deciding body should therefore seek to improve proposals so that they avoid or minimise harm to the significance of designated heritage assets, whether through changes to the asset or to its setting.

We agree that the development's impact upon the setting of the Castle Rough scheduled monument will be negligible as regards *visual* impact. Although this may also be true of the development's impact upon other aspects of the monument's setting (e.g. noise, lighting levels), we note that this has not yet been clearly assessed or demonstrated within the ES.

We recommend that any application for a Development Consent Order is accompanied by a refined assessment of the development's impact upon the setting of the Castle Rough scheduled monument, i.e. one which also addresses the impact of increased noise, lighting and traffic. This is in accordance with paragraph 128 of the NPPF.

If the application cannot demonstrate that the impact of these aspects upon the setting of the Castle Rough scheduled monument will also be negligible, the applicant should seek to improve the proposal so that harm is avoided, minimised or mitigated. This is in accordance with paragraph 8 of the NPPF.

You should consult the Heritage Conservation Team at Kent County Council as regards the development's impact upon non-designated archaeology and how harm may best be avoided, minimised or mitigated. You should also consult the Conservation Officer at Swale Borough Council regarding the development's impact upon the setting of Grade II listed buildings, Conservation Areas and non-designated heritage assets.

Thank you for your letter dated 24 January 2018, notifying the Marine Management Organisation (the "MMO") of the proposed application by DS Smith PLC for an Order granting Development Consent for the Kemsley Paper Mill (K4) Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Plant.

The MMO's role in Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects

The MMO was established by the Marine and Coastal Access Act 2009 (the "2009 Act") to make a contribution to sustainable development in the marine area and to promote clean, healthy, safe, productive and biologically diverse oceans and seas.

The responsibilities of the MMO include the licensing of construction works, deposits and removals in English inshore and offshore waters and for Welsh and Northern Ireland offshore waters by way of a marine licence¹. Inshore waters include any area which is submerged at mean high water spring ("MHWS") tide. They also include the waters of every estuary, river or channel where the tide flows at MHWS tide. Waters in areas which are closed permanently or intermittently by a lock or other artificial means against the regular action of the tide are included, where seawater flows into or out from the area.

In the case of Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects ("NSIPs"), the Planning Act 2008 (as amended) enables Development Consent Orders ("DCO") for projects which affect the marine environment to include provisions which deem marine licences².

As a prescribed consultee under the 2008 Act, the MMO advises developers during preapplication on those aspects of a project that may have an impact on the marine area or those who use it. In addition to considering the impacts of any construction, deposit or removal within the marine area, this also includes assessing any risks to human health, other legitimate uses of the sea and any potential impacts on the marine environment from terrestrial works.

Where a marine licence is deemed within a DCO, the MMO is the delivery body responsible for post-consent monitoring, variation, enforcement and revocation of provisions relating to the marine environment. As such, the MMO has a keen interest in ensuring that provisions drafted in a deemed marine licence ("dML") enable the MMO to fulfil these obligations.

Further information on licensable activities can be found on the MMO's website³. Further information on the interaction between the Planning Inspectorate and the MMO can be found in our joint advice note⁴.

Kemsley Paper Mill (K4) CHP Plant

The MMO has reviewed the Environmental Statement submitted on the 24 January 2018. The following chapters have not been considered as part of this review:

- Chapter 03: Methodology
- Chapter 04: Transport
- Chapter 05: Air Quality
- Chapter 06: Climate Change
- Chapter 07: Noise
- Chapter 08 Ground Conditions
- Chapter 10: Ecology
- Chapter 11: Landscape
- Chapter 12: Heritage
- Chapter 13: Summary Tables

Based on the information provided, no element of the proposals are within the UK Marine Area (as defined by Section 42 of The 2009 Act). The proposals are therefore wholly outside of the MMO's remit.

From the information provided, notably within the Non-Technical Summary and Section 02 'Site description and Proposed Development', the MMO has determined that the application boundary for the K4 plant is located entirely above MHWS and the report contains no reference to any additional activities on existing infrastructure, such as an outfall pipe, which may extend below MHWS.

In relation to Chapter 09 of the Draft Environmental Statement, Section 9.4.5 references a drainage network which is connected to a surface water outfall into the River Swale. The MMO is aware of a Marine Licence which is in place for the construction, maintenance and operation of the outfall (Ref. 'MLA/2017/00316'). For clarity, the undertaker for this proposed DCO should contact the MMO to discuss licensing requirements should any additional works be required which are outside of the parameters of this licence.

Please note that this response constitutes the MMO's initial comments, and that the MMO reserves the right to make further comments on this project throughout the determination process, and to modify its present advice or opinion in view of any additional information that may come to its attention.

Conclusion

Based on the information provided, the MMO has no comments to make in respect of the proposed K4 CHP Plant as works are located entirely above MHWS and therefore are outside the remit of the MMO. However, should it become apparent that any element of the proposals will extend below MHWS, the MMO reserves the right to provide further comment during the application process.

Introduction

Reference the letter from DHA Planning to Royal Mail dated 22 January 2018, Royal Mail's response to DS Smith Paper Ltd's section 42 consultation is set out below.

Royal Mail - relevant information

Royal Mail is responsible for providing efficient mail sorting and delivery nationally. As the Universal Service Provider under the Postal Services Act 2011, Royal Mail has a statutory duty to deliver mail to every residential and business address in the country as well as collecting mail from all Post Offices and post boxes six days a week.

Royal Mail's postal sorting and delivery operations rely heavily on road communications. Royal Mail's ability to provide efficient mail collection, sorting and delivery to the public is sensitive to changes in the capacity of the highway network.

Royal Mail is a major road user nationally. Disruption to the highway network and traffic delays can have direct consequences on Royal Mail's operations, its ability to meet the Universal Service Obligation and comply with the regulatory regime for postal services thereby presenting a significant risk to Royal Mail's business.

Royal Mail has operational facilities in Sittingbourne, Rainham, Medway and Sheerness. Royal Mail's Delivery Office in Sittingbourne (Central Avenue, Sittingbourne ME10 4AA) is only 3 miles from the proposal site. In exercising its statutory duties, Royal Mail uses all of the main roads in the vicinity of the proposed K4 CHP Plant at Kemsley Paper Mill on a daily basis.

The adjacent Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) Power Upgrade planning permission and DCO proposal together with other nearby planned major developments creates potential for cumulative traffic impact during the construction and operation phases.

Therefore Royal Mail is concerned that its future ability to provide an efficient mail sorting and delivery service to the public in accordance with its statutory obligations may be adversely affected by the construction of this new Power Station.

Royal Mail's comments / requests

Royal Mail's consultant BNP Paribas Real Estate has reviewed the section 42 consultation documents including ES Chapter 04 – Transport. It is noted that a CTMP will be prepared and agreed with the Local Highways Authority Officers prior to commencement of construction works. However, the documents do not appear to formally acknowledge the need to ensure that major road users such as Royal Mail are not disrupted though full advance consultation by the applicant at the appropriate time in the development process.



In order to address this, Royal Mail requests that:

- 1. The forthcoming DCO application offers a requirement that Royal Mail is pre-consulted by DS Smith Paper Ltd on any proposed road closures/ diversions/ alternative access arrangements, hours of working and the content of the final CTMP.
- 2. The forthcoming DCO application offers a requirement that the final CTMP includes provision for a mechanism to inform major road users about works affecting the local network (with particular regard to Royal Mail's distribution facilities in the vicinity of the DCO application site).

The above requests, made by Royal Mail at section 42 consultation stage, have been agreed and actioned by the developer of another NSIP proposal, to the satisfaction of Royal Mail and resulting in no further action by Royal Mail as a statutory consultee.





Thank you for your email dated 22 January 2018 providing Kent County Council (KCC) with the opportunity to comment on the draft Environmental Statement (ES) for the proposed Kemsley Paper Mill (K4) CHP Plant.

KCC has reviewed the draft ES and for ease of reference, comments are structured under the chapter headings used in the draft document.

4. Traffic and Transport

Baseline conditions

The junction analyses were completed on neutral dates in June 2016 and March 2017 and are considered valid.

KCC, as the Local Highway Authority, does not agree to the current extent of the road network and junctions that the ES identifies as requiring assessment. The full list should be agreed with the County Council prior to submission of the final TA.

It is noted that reference is made in the ES to an assessment on the M2 being included in the final submitted Transport Assessment (TA).

Development proposals

The principle of the construction access being directed to the northern access (Barge Way) and staff access via Ridham Avenue is considered appropriate. KCC agrees that only an assessment of the construction traffic (and not operational traffic generation) is appropriate. However, the final TA will be required to demonstrate a justification for the predicted number of HGV movements. It will also need to provide a clear indication as to the length of time that the peak number of staff would be expected on site. In addition, the number of remaining staff expected for the construction period should be made clear for the true impacts and parking needs to be assessed.

Future Year Traffic Flows

It is agreed that 2019 is the appropriate future year for assessment, taking into account the peak traffic impact. Whilst the list of committed sites is largely agreed, consideration should also be given to the application at Wienerberger Smeed Dean Works, Church Road, Sittingbourne, ME10 3TN for the erection of a tile factory including service yard, storage yard and car parking area (17/505073/FULL), as this may have been determined by the time of final submission of the Development Consent Order (DCO). KCC agrees that the sites at north west and south west Sittingbourne are sufficiently delayed to not impact the future scenario, but consideration should be given to include the permitted Iwade developments that may not be currently generating any traffic.

Trip Generation

It is noted that the assessment assumes workers will arrive between 06:00 and 07:00 and leave at 19:00 and 20:00 on a weekday, with the traffic count identifying peaks as between 08:00 and 09:00 and 17:00 and 18:00. Although the HGV movements in table 6.2 appear slightly incorrect, the principle of up to eight movements in a peak hour is unlikely to have a significant impact. As previously stated, additional counts and junction assessments are requested by KCC, with the potential need to include additional committed sites as appropriate.

Construction Traffic Management Plan (CTMP)

It is noted that a full CTMP is to be agreed with the Highway Authority prior to the commencement of the development. The details proposed in paragraph 4.8.2 are considered appropriate, however, KCC would also wish to ensure that control measures are put in place to ensure the arrivals and departures of construction staff are indeed outside of the identified peak traffic. With regards to the contractor car sharing or mini bus collection, due to the high numbers of staff involved, it would be appropriate for a small-scale Travel Plan to be produced. This should include details of minibus provision and operation, along with the signposting of staff to sustainable transport options.

9. Water Environment

The assessment of water resources in the draft ES is thorough. Consultation has been undertaken with the Medway Internal Drainage Boards and all matters appear to have been addressed to their satisfaction. Therefore, KCC has further no comments to make with respect to surface water management in the draft ES.

10. Ecology

The information provided in the draft ES and Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA) provides a substantial overview of the potential ecological impacts including increases in noise, light spill, air quality and disturbance from people and plant movements upon the Swale Special Protection Area (SPA), Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), Ramsar Site and the Milton Creek Local Wildlife Site (LWS). KCC considers that the proposed mitigation measures are achievable and agrees that the development will not have a likely significant impact upon the aforementioned protected sites, subject to the outlined mitigation measures. KCC, therefore, agrees with the conclusion that the proposed development for the Kemsley CHP Plant can be screened out from having a likely significant effect on the designated sites.

11. Landscape and Visual Effects

KCC notes that the applicant has acknowledged the existence of the Public Rights of Way network and the Saxon Shore Way, and has considered the potential impacts on these routes. In addition to these paths, the applicant should be aware that KCC is currently working in partnership with Natural England to develop the England Coast Path in this region. This is a new National Trail walking route that will eventually circumnavigate the English coastline. The applicant has not highlighted the coast path in the draft ES and should be aware that the trail is scheduled for completion in 2020 and is likely to increase the number of people walking this section of the coast.

12. Archaeology and Cultural Heritage

The draft ES has considered the impacts of the proposed development on the setting of designated heritage assets (Listed Buildings, Scheduled Monuments, Parks and Gardens and Conservation Areas) and the historic landscape, as well as the direct physical impact on heritage assets.

Historic England and Swale Borough Council's Conservation Officer will lead on considering the impacts on designated heritage assets. KCC is aware of the Historic England advice provided to DHA Planning, dated 7 February 2018. KCC agrees with Historic England's position that there is no physical impact upon designated heritage assets and that visual impacts on the setting of Scheduled Monuments would be negligible given the massing of the present Kemsley Mill complex. KCC supports Historic England's request that a clearer assessment of the noise, lighting and traffic impacts on the Castle Rough moated site should be included to support the DCO application.

KCC has reviewed Appendix 12.1 with regards to the impacts of the development on buried archaeology, but this appears to be limited to a presentation of reports from adjacent sites, Kent Historic Environment Record data and historic maps. It is unclear if there has been a Desk-Based Assessment written to support Chapter 12 that includes consideration of direct geotechnical evidence within the site, which underpins the view that the area has been substantially affected by previous development, as stated in paragraph 12.6.3. However, KCC agrees that there is no suggestion that archaeology of such significance, that would warrant preservation in situ, is likely to be found within the site.

KCC requests that further assessment is likely to be required to understand the degree of previous disturbance on the site and how that may have affected the potential for significant archaeology to be impacted by the proposal. KCC considers that such assessment and appropriate mitigation can be addressed following determination of the DCO and secured by an appropriate requirement for a programme of archaeological works.



The Council is required to inform the Planning Inspectorate of the information they consider should be provided in the Environmental Statement; or confirm that they do not have any comments.

The site is located within Sittingbourne, Kent and falls within the administrative boundaries of Swale Borough Council.

Consultations

The Council's Highway Development Engineers:

The Scoping Report identifies the potential issues with construction traffic during the decommissioning / construction phases. The site is some distance from Bromley and the effect on any highway within the Borough is likely to be negligible. I would have no comments on the Scoping Report.

Environmental Health Pollution -

Due to the distance and the prevailing wind carrying any airborne discharge in the opposite direction, I have no objections

Planning Considerations

The application falls to be determined in accordance with the National Planning Policy Framework.

Conclusions

The main issues relating to the application are the potential impact to the surrounding area and local residents, including highways impacts within the London Borough of Bromley.

The proposed development constitutes a project falling within the definition of a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under the Planning Act 2008 by virtue of building, commission and operating an onshore generating station with an energy generating capacity of greater than 50MW and therefore requires a Development Consent Order (DCO) granting permission. It is anticipated that subject to obtaining the Order granting Development Consent the new gas-fired Combined Heat and Power (CHP) plant will become fully operational in 2020.

Whilst no highways impacts are considered, it is acknowledged that the resultant air quality may have some undue impacts upon LBB residents. It is noted within the submission that the operation of the gas fired turbine will result in emissions to air of combustion related gases including nitrogen dioxide. Whilst at this stage it is anticipated that due to subsequent advances in technology since the previous facility was installed in 1995 that emission levels will fall, the subsequent design and operation of the plant is not yet determined and cannot be confirmed. Officers request that the Inspectorate request further details of this within the Environmental Statement, however it is acknowledged that given the distances to the Bromley Boundaries, and the likelihood of the drop in emissions, no adverse impacts are anticipated.


The application site is located a significant distance from the Borough boundary (over 38 miles) and is unlikely to impact directly upon residents within Bromley or generate significant levels of traffic movement to and from the London Borough of Bromley to give rise to any significant transport/highways effects in the Borough.

Having had regard to the above it is not considered that the raising of objections in this case would be warranted.

Response to the S42 Consultation & S48 Publication

Introduction

The approach taken by the applicant to pre-application consultation and publicity is explained in full in the Consultation Report [Document 5.1] which forms part of the DCO application.

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 requires the applicant to consult various prescribed bodies, directly affected and adjoining local authorities, the Greater London Authority where relevant and any parties identified under S44, such as owner, lessees, tenants or occupiers and others.

Section 48 of the same Act requires the applicant to publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.

Section 42 consultation packs were sent to the required parties on 24th January 2018. A further Section 42 consultation in respect of additional Section 44 parties was undertaken on the 5th March 2018.

A draft ES was produced pursuant to the EIA Scoping process and formed the basis on which the S42 Consultation was undertaken. A copy of the consultation letter with a link to the relevant documents on DS Smith's website is provided in **Technical Appendix 3.4** (a CD containing all consultation documents was also sent to all consultees) as well as any consultation responses received. In accordance with the EIA Regulations a copy of the Section 48 notice was included within the S42 consultation packs.

Statutory notices under Section 48 were placed in locally circulating newspapers on the 24th and 31st January 2018, the London Gazette on the 31st January 2018 and the Daily Telegraph on the 30th January 2018.

Responses were received from 22 of the organisations consulted under Section 42. No responses were received as a result of the Section 48 notices. Full consultation responses are provided as **Appendix 3.4**.

The following table presents the key issues raised by consultees and provides responses to each of the relevant comments i.e. where a suggested amendment to the proposed scope of the ES is made. Comments that do not suggest an amendment to the scope of the draft ES pursuant to the S42 consultation have been excluded for ease of reference.

Where applicable, cross-references are made to where the issues have been addressed in the Environmental Statement. Please note, where comments received from consultees are quite lengthy, only the main points have been extracted and noted in the comments column below.





Statutory and non-statutory consultee scoping response/ comments

Environment Agency

Groundwater and Contaminated Land

The DCO application documents will need to set out how the ground conditions will be investigated, assessed, and if necessary remediated as part of the development. Details of any piling for foundations will also need to be agreed through the DCO process to ensure protection of the underlying aquifer.

A full desk based phase I survey has been undertaken and is provided as appendix 8.1 to the ES in addition to the main ES chapter (Chapter 8). This sets out how the ground will be investigated, assessed and if necessary remediated as part of the development including necessary precautions related to piling.

Historic England

"We think that the assessment of the development's impact upon the setting of the closest scheduled monument (Castle Rough) is inadequate in some respects. The assessment discusses only the visual impact of the development upon the setting of the monument, i.e. it fails to assess the impact that changes in ambient lighting, noise and traffic might also have. We would expect an assessment of these aspects of setting to have been undertaken, especially considering the proximity of the The Heritage Chapter (12) of the ES has been amended in accordance with the above. monument to the proposed development. This would also have been in line with Historic England's guidance on setting ('The Setting of Heritage Assets'), and advice we gave in August 2017 regarding the scope of the ES.

Although we think the assessment is in some aspects inadequate, we do - following our own site visit - agree that the visual impact of the development on the setting of Castle Rough will be negligible. This is because views to, from and around the monument have already been considerably compromised by the existing industrial complex. As the new development will sit comfortably within the massing of the existing complex, the additional visual impact it will cause should therefore indeed be The assessment of the impact of the development on Castle Rough has been reviewed to ensure it completely aligns with the identified Historic England guidance. This includes additional consideration of the effects of noise, traffic and lighting on the setting of the monument.





negligible.

It may be that the impact of additional noise, lighting and traffic associated with the development will also be negligible for the same reasons. However, we note that this has not been formally assessed and thus we cannot determine this aspect of the development's impact. We understand that a noise assessment has been carried out and was used to assess impacts upon residential areas and ecology; therefore we believe that sufficient raw data should be available to allow the impact of additional noise upon the setting of Castle Rough to be assessed also.

We agree that the development's impact upon the setting of the Castle Rough scheduled monument will be negligible as regards visual impact. Although this may also be true of the development's impact upon other aspects of the monument's setting (e.g. noise, lighting levels), we note that this has not yet been clearly assessed or demonstrated within the ES.

We recommend that any application for a Development Consent Order is accompanied by a refined assessment of the development's impact upon the setting of the Castle Rough scheduled monument, i.e. one which also addresses the impact of increased noise, lighting and traffic. This is in accordance with paragraph 128 of the NPPF.

If the application cannot demonstrate that the impact of these aspects upon the setting of the Castle Rough scheduled monument will also be negligible, the applicant should seek to improve the proposal so that harm is avoided, minimised or mitigated. This is in accordance with paragraph 8 of the NPPF."





Natural England

"Based on the information provided, there are a number of areas where Natural England recommends further clarity is provided in relation to potential impacts to designated nature conservation sites and the associated mitigation measures that may be required.

number of pathways including lighting, noise, water quality, changes to water temperature within The Swale, air quality and disturbance to species associated with the above sites. These are discussed in more detail below.

The effects of the development resulting from lighting, noise, water quality and changes to water temperature were presented in draft ES pursuant to S42 consultation albeit it is acknowledged that the No Significant Effect HRA Report (Appendix 10.2) did not perhaps reference them sufficiently for the ease of the reader.

Natural England considers that impacts to these sites are likely to result through a The HRA has been reviewed on this basis to ensure it cross references appropriately to other locations in the ES where detailed information is presented which support the conclusions set out in the HRA.

Noise

The Environmental Statement and accompanying Information to Inform the Habitats Regulations Assessment (Appendix 10.1) discounts impacts on the basis that noise levels within the designated sites will not exceed 80dB LAmax. Natural England's advice is that it is generally accepted that noise levels below 55dB are unlikely to result in disturbance to coastal bird species. Above 55dB, disturbance can occur and the significance of the impact is both species and site specific. Consequently, we recommend that further assessment of the potential impacts from noise impacts during construction and operation to species associated with The Swale SSSI, SPA and Ramsar Site and The Swale MCZ is provided along with details of any avoidance and mitigation measures that may be required. It would also be helpful if a noise contour plan detailing existing noise levels is provided to supplement those provided for construction and operation levels within the Environmental Statement.

It is noted that while 80dB LAmax is adopted as the threshold at which significant effects will occur, it is evident from the noise contour plan that accompanies the Ecology Chapter that no noise at or above 80dB LAmax is predicted. Indeed, a noise level greater than 65dB LAmax is not predicted anywhere within the SPA and the area over which a level up to 65dB LAmax could occur is limited to 20.8ha which represents approximately 0.32 % of the entire SPA.

RPS and DHA Environment have sought to hold a meeting with Natural England subsequent to their S42 response to discuss their concerns and agree a way forward but at the time of writing have not had a response.

Air Quality

Natural England notes that the Ecology section of the Environmental Statement (Chapter 10) and the Information to Inform the Habitats Regulations Assessment (Appendix 10.1) in general defer consideration of the air quality impacts and mitigation measures to Chapter 5 of the Environmental Statement. Chapter 5, the Air Quality section of the Environmental Statement appears to relate primarily to human health rather than ecological impacts. As such, we would recommend that further

Appendix 5.4 of the Environmental Statement contains the results of the air quality assessment looking at nutrient nitrogen and acid deposition on the Swale SPA. These indicate that no likely significant effect on the Swale SPA is likely. Clarification in the HRA and Chapter 10 has been provided to cross reference accordingly and further explanation provided as deemed necessary.





detailed consideration of the potential for air quality impacts, which should include information on the specific avoidance and mitigation measures to be implemented in relation to designated sites is provided.

We also note that section 5.29 of Appendix 10.1 states that 'redevelopment is not anticipated to increased traffic on the A249, nor on local service roads'. Natural England recommends that further clarity is provided within the assessment to confirm that there will be no increase in traffic which could result in air quality impacts to the designated sites. Natural England notes that the Air Quality 'in-combination ' assessment within Appendix 10.1 has yet to be competed and as such we are unable to provide detailed advice on this at present.

Water quality

The Environmental Statement highlights that the scheme could result in a number of impacts to the designated sites in close proximity to the application site (The Swale SSSI, SPA and Ramsar Site and The Swale MCZ). These include impacts from contaminated run-off, construction materials and altered water flow for example. Whilst the Environmental Statement provides general principles of the measures that are to be developed to ensure impacts to the designated sites do not occur, we recommend that greater clarity is provided at this stage on the prevention and control measures that are to be implemented. The final detail of which can of course be agreed post consent but there needs to be sufficient certainty at this stage that impacts can be avoided or fully mitigated to allow Natural England to provide detailed advice on the proposal.

Water temperature

Mention is made of warm water discharges to The Swale within the Environmental Statement but no assessment of the potential impacts that could result to the designated sites from this appears to have been provided. It would be helpful if clarity were provided on whether this will result in any additional impacts to those from the existing consented CHP which this proposal will replace; if so the potential ecological impacts should be fully detailed along with the avoidance and mitigation measures.

The Proposed Development will result in a de Minimis impact on traffic movements once operational and therefore the only potential impact result from the construction traffic movements as set out in Chapter 4 Traffic and Transport. As set out in Chapter 5 Air Quality the volume on traffic and the roads in question are such that any potential impact can be ruled out as not significant without necessitating detailed assessment in accordance with Institute of Air Quality Management guidance. Appropriate cross-referencing has been provided to aid the reader and the 'in-combination' assessment completed.

It is considered that sufficient detail is provided in Chapter 9 (Water Environment) of the ES at the application stage and to the satisfaction of the EA and KCC. The reader is directed to this chapter of the ES and specific detailed cross referencing has been added to aid the reader.

As set out in Chapter 2 and 9 of the ES:

"In order to safeguard the quality of all water discharged from K4 all process drains along with any waste water are collected via a dedicated drains network and flow into a dedicated sump for neutralisation by the addition of acid (if required). From here any excess water will be conveyed to the Mills existing waste water treatment facility (WWTF) and discharged under DS Smith's existing discharge permit (permit no. EPR BJ7468IC-V009) into the Swale as currently occurs for K1. The volume of water





discharged from K4, by virtue of being a smaller more efficient plant than K1, will be less and will not therefore exceed the existing WWTF permit limit. The permit for the WWTF contains discharge limits for both water pH and temperature which will remain in place for K4 and subject to periodic monitoring. Both water quality and temperature from K4 is therefore safeguarded before being discharged into the Swale."

It is therefore considered that any potential effect can be screened out on this basis.

Lighting

Sections 10.6.4 and 10.6.5 of the Environmental Statement detail that light impacts during construction and operation are unlikely to result in significant impacts to the designated sites. It would however be helpful if light contour plans detailing the current and likely lux levels within the designated sites during construction and operation of the scheme are provided."

The Proposed Development is not at the detailed design stage whereby lighting plans are feasible. However notwithstanding this Lighting will be minimal and implemented using BS EN 12464-2:2007 *Lighting of work places*. *Outdoor work places*. *Part 1 &2*. Contemporary lighting schemes minimise light spill and reduce lateral and vertical light spill from the source. Given the Site lies over 280m from the nearest part of the SPA and the existing lit context in which the development will sit not significant effect is likely.

Kent County Council





"Traffic and Transport

KCC, as the Local Highway Authority, does not agree to the current extent of the road network and junctions that the ES identifies as requiring assessment. The full list should be agreed with the County Council prior to submission of the final TA.

Following receipt of KCC's S42 comments the RPS Transport consultant has been in direct correspondence with KCC with agree the spatial context of the road network and junctions to be assessment.

It is noted that reference is made in the ES to an assessment on the M2 being included in the final submitted Transport Assessment (TA).

Chapter 4 of the ES now includes an assessment of the development on the M2.

Development proposals

The principle of the construction access being directed to the northern access (Barge Way) and staff access via Ridham Avenue is considered appropriate. KCC agrees that only an assessment of the construction traffic (and not operational traffic generation) is appropriate. However, the final TA will be required to demonstrate a justification for the predicted number of HGV movements. It will also need to provide a clear indication as to the length of time that the peak number of staff would be expected on site. In addition, the number of remaining staff expected for the construction period should be made clear for the true impacts and parking needs to be assessed.

Chapter 4 of the ES has been amended to provide justification of the length of time that peak numbers of staff would be expected and other periods during the construction.

Future Year Traffic Flows

It is agreed that 2019 is the appropriate future year for assessment, taking into account the peak traffic impact. Whilst the list of committed sites is largely agreed, consideration should also be given to the application at Wienerberger Smeed Dean Works, Church Road, Sittingbourne, ME10 3TN for the erection of a tile factory including service yard, storage yard and car parking area (17/505073/FULL), as this may have been determined by the time of final submission of the Development Consent Order (DCO). KCC agrees that the sites at north west and south west Sittingbourne are sufficiently delayed to not impact the future scenario, but consideration should be given to include the permitted Iwade developments that may not be currently generating any traffic.

The scope of the cumulative impact assessment of the development with other local permitted or planned developments has been increased to include 17/505073/FULL and others.





Trip Generation

It is noted that the assessment assumes workers will arrive between 06:00 and 07:00 and leave at 19:00 and 20:00 on a weekday, with the traffic count identifying peaks as between 08:00 and 09:00 and 17:00 and 18:00. Although the HGV movements in table 6.2 appear slightly incorrect, the principle of up to eight movements in a peak hour is unlikely to have a significant impact. As previously stated, additional counts and junction assessments are requested by KCC, with the potential need to include additional committed sites as appropriate.

The RPS Transport consultant has been in direct correspondence with KCC to agree the spatial context of the road network and junctions to be assessment (see Chapter 4).

Construction Traffic Management Plan (CTMP)

It is noted that a full CTMP is to be agreed with the Highway Authority prior to the commencement of the development. The details proposed in paragraph 4.8.2 are considered appropriate, however, KCC would also wish to ensure that control measures are put in place to ensure the arrivals and departures of construction staff are indeed outside of the identified peak traffic. With regards to the contractor car sharing or mini bus collection, due to the high numbers of staff involved, it would be appropriate for a small-scale Travel Plan to be produced. This should include details of minibus provision and operation, along with the signposting of staff to sustainable transport options.

The proposed scope of the CTMP has been amended to reflect the request of KCC and a commitment to a small scale travel plan identified.

Landscape and Visual Effects

KCC notes that the applicant has acknowledged the existence of the Public Rights of Way network and the Saxon Shore Way, and has considered the potential impacts on these routes. In addition to these paths, the applicant should be aware that KCC is currently working in partnership with Natural England to develop the England Coast Path in this region. This is a new National Trail walking route that will eventually circumnavigate the English coastline. The applicant has not highlighted the coast path in the draft ES and should be aware that the trail is scheduled for completion in 2020 and is likely to increase the number of people walking this section of the coast."

Chapter 11 of the ES has been amended to reflect the future change in status of the Saxon Shore Way and the increase it its use.





Health and Safety Executive

HSE's land use planning advice

"Will the proposed development fall within any of HSE's consultation distances?

The redline boundary of the development does not fall within the consultation zones of any major accident hazard site with Hazardous Substances Consent (HSC).

There are currently no major accident hazard pipelines within the development. If in the intervening period we are notified of a change to this situation, the developer would need to seek advice from us.

The presence of hazardous substances on, over or under land at or above set. The Proposed Development does not fall within the remit of the Regulations threshold quantities (Controlled Quantities) may require Hazardous Substances Consent (HSC) under the Planning (Hazardous Substances) Act 1990 as amended. Royal Mail

"Royal Mail has operational facilities in Sittingbourne, Rainham, Medway and Sheerness. Royal Mail's Delivery Office in Sittingbourne (Central Avenue. Sittingbourne MEID 4AA) is only 3 miles from the proposal site.

In exercising its statutory duties, Royal Mail uses all of the main roads in the vicinity of the proposed K4 CHP Plant at Kemsley Paper MILL on a daily basis. The adjacent Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) Power Upgrade planning permission and DCO proposal together with other nearby planned major developments creates potential tor cumulative traffic impact during the construction and operation phases.

It is not considered that the level of traffic generated during construction is likely to materially impact on Royal Mail's daily operations and therefore such a requirement is not deemed necessary.





Therefore Royal Mail is concerned that its future ability to provide an efficient mail sorting and delivery service to the public in accordance with its statutory obligations may be adversely affected by the construction of this new Power Station.

Royal Mail's consultant BN Paribas Real Estate has reviewed the section 42 consultation documents including ES Chapter 04- Transport. It is noted that a CTMP will be prepared and agreed with the Local Highways Authority Officers prior to commencement of construction works. However, the documents do not appear to formally acknowledge the need to ensure that major road users such as Royal Mail are not disrupted though full advance consultation by the applicant at the appropriate time in the development process.

In order to address this. Royal Mail requests that

- The forthcoming DCO application offers a requirement that Royal Mail is pre-consulted by DS Smith Paper Ltd on any proposed road closures/ diversions/ alternative access arrangements, hours of working and the content of the final CTMP
- 2. The forthcoming DCO application offers a requirement that the final CTMP includes provision for a mechanism to inform major road users about works affecting the Local network (with particular regard to Royal Mails distribution facilities in the vicinity of the DCO application site)."



1 Introduction

1.1 Purpose of this Document

- 1.1.1 DS Smith Paper Ltd (DS Smith) intend to apply for a Development Consent Order for the construction and operation of K4 a gas fired Combined Heat and Power plant at their Paper Mill in Kemsley, to the north of Sittingbourne.
- 1.1.2 The proposed CHP will comprise an onshore generating station with a capacity greater than 50MW. The proposal is therefore a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project, under Section 14 (1) (a) of the Planning Act 2008 (as amended by the Localism Act 2011), for which a Development Consent Order from the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy will be required.
- 1.1.3 The NSIP process requires consultation with various groups, including prescribed persons, local authorities and the local community to be undertaken at an early stage, so that when submitted schemes have already taken into account any significant issues likely to be raised during the examination of the DCO application.
- 1.1.4 The Planning Act 2008 requires an applicant to prepare a Statement setting out how they propose to consult people in the vicinity of the land about the proposed application. This Consultation Strategy explains the approach and methodology taken within the 'Statement of Community Consultation' (SoCC).
- 1.1.5 This Consultation Strategy and the draft SoCC have been submitted to Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council for review prior to the SoCC being published and the community consultation being carried out. An early version of the SoCC was presented to Swale Borough Council on an informal basis and was discussed, together with the broad approach being taken to consultation, in a meeting on 14th September 2017.

1.2 **Current Project Status**

- 1.2.1 This document has been prepared at an early stage of the process towards seeking a Development Consent Order for the proposed CHP.
- 1.2.2 The applicant submitted an Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Request to the Planning Inspectorate on 17th August 2017. The Planning Inspectorate provided their Scoping Opinion on 27th September 2017.
- 1.2.3 DS Smith's intention is to undertake the consultation required by the Act during the remainder of 2017, with a view to lodging the DCO application with the Planning Inspectorate during the first quarter of 2018. Should that application be accepted by the Inspectorate it would then be subject to an examination process lasting up to 9 months.
- 1.2.4 Once the application is submitted the Local Authority will have the opportunity to produce a Local Impact Report, to be considered by the Inspectorate in determining the application, which will set out what they perceive to be the positive and negative local impacts of the proposed development.



2 Legislative Requirements

2.1 The need for a DCO

2.1.1 The proposed K4 plant is an onshore generating station in England with a capacity of more than 50 megawatts, and therefore is a 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project' under Section 15 of the Planning Act 2008 (as amended) ('The Act'). DS Smith are therefore required to apply to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy for a Development Consent Order to seek consent for the proposed development.

2.2 Local Community Consultation

- 2.2.1 Section 47 of The Act places a duty on the applicant to consult the local community.
- 2.2.2 Section 47(1) states that the applicant must prepare a statement (the SoCC) setting out how the applicant proposes to consult people living in the vicinity of the land about the proposed application. Part 47(2) states that the applicant must consult each authority within part 43(1) of the Act about what is to be in the statement.
- 2.2.3 For the purposes of Section 43(1), a local authority (as defined within the Act) is one where the development falls within the local authority area. In this case the Section 43(1) authorities are therefore Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council.
- 2.2.4 Part 47(3) of the Act provides the local authorities with a 28 day period in which to comment on the SoCC, starting on the day after the day on which the authority receives the consultation documents. Part 47(5) requires the applicant to have regard to comments received by that deadline.
- 2.2.5 Part 47(6), as amended by the Localism Act 2011, requires the applicant to make the SoCC available for inspection by the public in a way reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land. The applicant must publish a notice stating where and when the SoCC can be inspected.
- 2.2.6 Part 47(7) requires the applicant to then carry out the consultation in accordance with the SoCC.

2.3 Other Consultation to be undertaken

- 2.3.1 Section 42 of the Act requires an applicant to consult:
 - (a) Such persons as may be prescribed;
 - (b) Each local authority within Section 43;
 - (c) The Greater London Authority if the land is within Greater London;
 - (d) Each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in Section 44.



2.3.2 The application will contain a Consultation Report which will document how the various elements of Section 42, together with the requirements under S47, have been addressed.

2.4 Other Documents

2.4.1 A number of documents have been produced which provide information and guidance of the pre-application consultation process. Particular sections of these documents of relevance to the strategy proposed within this Statement are referred to below.

DCLG- Planning Act 2008 – Guidance on Pre-Application Consultation

2.4.2 This document provides guidance on all aspects of the process and this Consultation Strategy and the draft SoCC has regard to this guidance. In particular the document notes, in Paragraph 11 that projects and the communities and environment in which they are located will vary considerably and that this should be reflected within the particular methods and approach to consultation which is chosen. Paragraph 13 recognises that consultation, whilst being thorough and effective, will need to be proportionate.

Planning Inspectorate Advice Note 8.1

2.4.3 Advice Note 8.1: 'How the process works' states that 'the length of time taken to prepare and consult on the project will vary depending upon its scale and complexity.'



3 Proposed Development

3.1 Proposed CHP

- 3.1.1 The draft SoCC provides an overview of the proposed development together with illustrative plans and images to show the proposed location and scale of the K4 plant.
- 3.1.2 In summary, the Kemsley Paper mill is currently supplied with electricity and steam from a range of sources. Those include K1; an existing CHP plant which supplies both electricity and steam to the mill and which is now nearing the end of its operational life.
- 3.1.3 It is proposed to construct K4, a new CHP plant to replace K1. K4 would be located within the main Kemsley Paper mill complex and would contain a gas turbine, producing in the region of 54-57MW of electrical power, a Heat Recovery Steam Generator producing in the region of 105-110 MWth steam and a steam turbine producing in the region of 16MW of electrical power.




Figure 3.1 – Location of K4 project (red line indicates expected DCO boundary)






Figure 3.2 – Illustrative plan showing K4 design/layout

- 3.1.4 Figure 3.1 shows the location of the K4 project and Figure 3.2 provides an illustration of the scale/design of the proposed plant.

3.2 Anticipated Environmental Impacts

- 3.2.1 The following are considered to be the key potential environmental impacts arising from the proposed development and will be used to define a zone of influence around the proposal site:
 - (1) Traffic and Transportation: the construction process is expected to last some 20 months and would generate staff, abnormal loads and HGV movements. There would be similar movements during the eventual decommissioning phase. An average of 40 two way HGV movements would be generated per day during the construction phase. During the operational phase there would be no additional staff or delivery movements, only ad-hoc maintenance vehicle movements. The ES will therefore provide a full assessment of the traffic and transportation impacts and their likely effect on the surrounding road network.
 - (2) Air Quality/Climate change: the key potential impact on air quality at the construction stage arises from dust being created from construction activities, together with any emissions associated with the commissioning of the K4 plant. At the operational stage it is anticipated that the level of emissions will reduce compared to the existing situation, given the K4 plant will be smaller and more efficient than the existing K1 plant, and as such it is not expected that air quality will impact on the extent of the zone of influence.
 - (3) **Noise:** the ES will assess noise and vibration generated by construction plant at the site, against the current baseline. Operational noise and vibration will also then be considered, albeit operational vibration will be controlled at source and is not expected to have any impacts on the surrounding population. Given the context of the existing mill operations and the distance to nearby businesses/residences it



is not expected that noise will be a factor which will impact on the zone of influence.

- (4) Landscape and Visual Impacts: the proposed K4 plant will be viewed against the context of the established and substantial Kemsley Paper mill. Whilst it is therefore expected that landscape and visual impacts will be minimised, there are likely to be some visual impacts on users and residents within the surrounding area. The zone of influence has therefore been drawn to reflect the potential for visual impacts to occur.
- (5) **Ecology and Nature Conservation:** the site has limited direct ecological value due to its location within the wider paper mill complex. However the assessment within the ES will also consider the impact of the proposals on surrounding designated sites. The issue of nature conservation is not one which is expected to alter the zone of influence which has been defined.
- (6) **Water resources:** the ES will consider the impacts of the proposed development on surface water, coastal water and groundwater quality. Given the context of the site and the ability to employ appropriate preventative measures this is not an issue expected to impact on the zone of influence.
- (7) **Archaeology and Cultural Heritage:** the ES will assess the potential for archaeological remains to exist within the site, together with any impacts on the setting of nearby heritage assets. There are not anticipated to be any impacts which will arise beyond the zone of influence identified in respect of issues such as traffic and transport/landscape and visual impact.
- (8) Accidents and disasters the proposal site is not in a location considered to be vulnerable to hazards, other than river/esturine flooding. The operation of the proposal K4 plant and the wider paper mill are therefore controlled by a range of legislative instruments which are intended to minimise the risk of accidents and their impact should they occur. This is not an issue which is expected to extend the zone of influence beyond that defined based on other issues, such as traffic and transportation.
- (9) **Land use/Land condition:** the ES will assess ground conditions and any contamination present within the construction site, in order to address any potential impacts on human health, such as construction workers, ground contamination and controlled waters and ground gas. Land use/land condition is not a factor which is expected to alter the zone of influence.
- 3.2.2 As demonstrated by the above summary the main anticipated environmental impact which will have the potential to impact those living in the vicinity of the site is construction traffic. The remaining environmental impacts, in terms of their potential impact on the surrounding population, are minimised or mitigated by the context of the application site within the wider Kemsley mill complex and the fact that K4 will replace the older and less efficient K1.



3.2.3 The zone of influence which has been defined takes into account the above and is discussed in further detail in Section 6 of this Statement.

3.3 The K3 Context

- 3.3.1 Consent exists for an energy from waste plant just to the east of the Kemsley Paper Mill, called 'K3'. That plant is being constructed by Wheelabrator and will supply steam to the Kemsley Paper mill.
- 3.3.2 K3 will be the subject of a DCO application to increase its operational capacity to 79MW. That application, the 'Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) Power Upgrade' has been registered with the Planning Inspectorate but it is understood that an application will not be submitted until 2018. The Wheelabrator team conducted their public consultation work under S47 around mid 2017.
- 3.3.3 There is potential, given the naming structure and the proximity of the projects for local confusion to occur. The consultation strategy proposed will address this issue by making clear within any documentation the differences between the two projects. The potential for consultee confusion to occur is limited by the fact that the public consultation exercises on the K3 and K4 projects do not overlap.



4 Swale Borough Council – Shaping Spaces and Places

4.1.1 The Swale Borough Council's Statement of Community Consultation document 'Shaping Spaces and Places' was produced in 2008 to set out the principles and strategy for the Council to consult the community on planning applications and planning policies. A number of those principles have relevance for the consultation of the community as part of the DCO application and have therefore been taken into account when formulating this Consultation Strategy. The relevant elements of the document are summarised below.

4.2 The Swale Community

- 4.2.1 The Council's Statement of Community Involvement identifies several groups considered to form the Swale Community, which therefore need to be consulted on development proposals:
 - (1) **Local Communities** the document notes that the interests of local communities can be represented by parish councils or voluntary groups, but that harder to reach groups can also exist whose involvement can be limited by age, ability or pressure of time. It also notes that too many consultations can wear local communities down.
 - (2) **Specific Consultation bodies** includes Natural England, Parish Councils etc. For the purposes of the DCO these bodies will be consulted under S.42.
 - (3) **Service providers** includes Health Trusts, schools/colleges, emergency services. A number of these service providers will be covered by the S.42 consultation, whilst the community consultation strategy then has regard to any specific local providers, particularly those within the zone of influence.
 - (4) **Other agencies** the examples given comprise the RSPB and local societies. Some agencies will be addressed by the S.42 consultation, but efforts will then also be made to identify further specific local agencies who should also be consulted.
 - (5) **Developers and landowners** efforts will be made to identify any local landowners/developers, particularly those within the zone of influence.
 - (6) **Businesses** local businesses, particularly those within the zone of influence, will be identified and consulted.

4.3 Improving participation and representation

4.3.1 The Statement of Community Involvement focuses on how to improve participation and representation.

Removing barriers

4.3.2 The Statement identifies apathy and disinterest, time of meetings and activities, mistrust and cynicism, access to or lack of information as barriers to involvement.



- 4.3.3 The strategy proposed reflects and addresses those issues. A range of methods of consultation have been proposed including the use of a project website, to provide a source of information and a method of providing feedback which is easily accessible for most people. Similarly two exhibitions, during a weekday afternoon and at the weekend, have been proposed to provide the opportunity for a wide range of people to attend. The deposit of key documents at local venues and the opportunity to respond by post also widens the methods by which people can understand and comment on the proposed scheme.
- 4.3.4 The consultation strategy focuses on providing information on the proposed scheme which is understandable for those with no technical or working knowledge of the paper mill or the DCO process, as well as explaining the DCO process itself so that the local community understands the role they play.

The right information to the right people

4.3.5 The Council's Statement of Community Involvement reflects the need for people to understand the wider planning system and to ensure that opportunities are being provided for relevant people to understand what is going on and how they can get involved. As reflected above the varying methods of publicity and methods aim to ensure that relevant elements of the community are being provided with the appropriate level of information and are being given a range of opportunities to respond.

Getting more active

- 4.3.6 The Statement notes that Swale Borough Council will be more active in going into communities. The Consultation Strategy set out within this document takes a similar approach with the exhibitions intended to engage the public in a location convenient to them.
- 4.3.7 The Council's Statement notes that a large part of the Borough comprises rural areas where parish and town Councils will help create appropriate levels of involvement. The zone of influence identified around K4 encompasses some rural areas and a similar approach will therefore be taken, including identifying networks such as the National Farmers Union who can assist with engagement in rural areas.

Giving everyone a voice

- 4.3.8 In accordance with the approach taken in the Consultation Involvement document the proposed consultation strategy aims to remove any barriers created to involvement by race and disability. Specifically:
 - Documents will be made available if necessary in different formats, such as large print and other languages;
 - Accessibility will be considered when booking/setting out exhibition venues;
 - **Young people** specific local groups will be identified to help engage with young people. Schools falling within the zone of influence will be targeted specifically.



- Working community local businesses will be identified and consulted, in order
 to target people who work but do not live within the vicinity. Likewise local press
 releases and articles will be used to target a wider range of the community who
 use the local area:
- Minority ethnic and cultural groups local action groups will be identified and
 contacted in order to act as a gateway to potentially hard to reach groups. The
 range of press releases, local flyers and targeted mailings- together with the offer
 of documents in alternative formats, will also help target this group.
- **People with low literacy** groups such as the local community empowerment network will be used as a gateway to these groups. The local exhibitions will provide an opportunity to discuss the proposals and any concerns first hand with the project team.
- **Disabled people** as noted above documents will be provided in alternative formats where requested and regard will be had to accessibility when booking and arranging exhibition venues. Local societies and groups will be used as gateway organisations to target this hard to reach group.
- 4.3.9 Section 1.27 of the Statement of Community Involvement notes that the local community have indicated a willingness to use the internet and email for communications. The proposed consultation strategy takes a similar approach, in using the internet and email but in also then using traditional methods of hard copy documents and postal responses to ensure all preferences are catered for.

4.4 Involvement

- 4.4.1 Section 3 of the Statement of Community Involvement discusses the ways that the Council will involve people in the Local Development Framework and reviews the benefits of a number of different methods of consultation, which have therefore been assessed below in terms of their relevance to the DCO process:
 - **Local media** the consultation strategy includes press releases at appropriate times;
 - Website/email/online consultation this is included in the consultation strategy;
 - Publicity in local community centres flyers will be posted in local public places such as shops and the GP's surgery;
 - **Documents available for inspection** the SoCC and key documents will be made available at convenient local locations such as the mill and Council offices;
 - Area/Town forums and Parish Council meetings organisations such as Parish Councils will be contacted directly and meetings etc discussed;



- Informal consultation/one to one this has not been included from the outset within the consultation strategy but can be added should a need for one to one sessions be identified;
- **Qualitative research** those attending the exhibitions will have the opportunity to fill in a questionnaire which may provide some qualitative data, if appropriate;
- **Public exhibitions** these will be carried out as part of the consultation strategy;
- Participation workshops not included as part of the current consultation strategy but can be included if requested;
- Working groups/select committees not included as part of the consultation strategy but can be included if requested;

4.5 Communicating effectively

4.5.1 The outcome of the consultation exercise will be reported in the Consultation Statement which will form part of the DCO application.

4.6 Summary

- 4.6.1 The Swale Borough Council Statement of Community Involvement identifies the methods by which the Borough Council intend to consult the local community on planning applications and the local plan, and sets out a number of factors considered in arriving at that strategy. As such it provides a useful guide to formulating the consultation strategy to be undertaken in respect of the K4 DCO application.
- 4.6.2 As demonstrated above the proposed consultation strategy aligns closely with the methods and approach to public engagement used by the Borough Council.



5 Public Consultation Strategy

5.1 Aims and Objectives

- 5.1.1 The following aims and objectives have been formulated to guide the pre-application public consultation strategy to be undertaken:
 - To make stakeholders aware of the proposed development at an early stage in the process and to inform them about the context, function and expected impacts of the proposed CHP plant;
 - (ii) To provide clarification regarding K4, to ensure the distinction with K3 is understood locally;
 - (iii) To inform stakeholders about the process which will be followed in order to seek a Development Consent Order from the Planning Inspectorate and to highlight how they can be continue involved in this process;
 - (iv) To provide an early opportunity for stakeholders to provide their comments on the proposed development and to have any queries answered;
 - (v) To allow the project team the opportunity at an early stage in the process to reflect the comments made within the scheme being proposed and to feedback to interested parties.



6 Who should be consulted?

6.1.1 Section 47(1) of the Planning Act 2008 requires an application to consult people living 'in the vicinity of the land' about the proposed development.

6.2 What is the zone of influence?

- 6.2.1 No set definition is provided by the Act of what constitutes the 'vicinity' of the land which is the subject of a DCO application, which reflects the broad scale and range of projects which qualify as NSIP's.
- 6.2.2 Chapter 3 of this report summarises the anticipated environmental impacts of the proposed CHP. Due to the position of the CHP within the wider DS Smith Kemsley paper mill and the fact that it would be replacing an existing and less efficient CHP plant, the environmental impacts in terms of issues such as air quality are expected to be negligible.
- 6.2.3 There are anticipated to be some impacts on the local area arising from vehicle movements at the construction and decommissioning stage, albeit no continued impact arising from vehicle movements at the operational stage. Despite the context of the proposal site there are also expected to be some landscape and visual impacts on surrounding areas. Those two factors have therefore been used to help define a zone of influence.

Direct zone of influence

- 6.2.4 Appendix A to this Statement contains a plan which identifies a broad area around the Kemsley paper mill, which where possible has been defined using natural boundaries such as roads and which encompasses the residential properties, business and areas of land closest to the mill. That area represents a direct zone of influence, particularly where occupants or users of the area may be able to view the proposed development or be impacted by vehicle movements during the construction stage. The Consultation Strategy therefore focuses on ensuring that the community within that direct zone of influence have been contacted directly regarding the proposals.
- 6.2.5 The western extent of the zone of influence uses the B2005 as a natural boundary line, given that is one of the main routes into Sittingbourne from the Kemsley junction of the A249, with some allowance made for properties to the west of the B2005 which are also close to the A249. The A249 continues to form the western boundary, before the zone of influence follows a farm track running through Elmley and southern Sheppey, which provides access to the properties closest to the mill on the eastern side of the Swale. The Swale Way has then been used as a boundary to encompass some of the businesses closest to the mill within the Sittingbourne industrial estate, before then encompassing the residential areas of Kemsley which lie closest to the mill and connecting with the B2005.

Wider community

6.2.6 DS Smith plc is a well known local employer and the Kemsley Paper mill is a longstanding and substantial industrial site within the local area. The proximity of the project to the wider Kemsley and Sittingbourne areas means there is potential for occupants within a



wider zone to be interested in or to have concerns regarding the impact of the proposals. The Consultation Strategy therefore also ensures that wider methods of publicity are being used to ensure that interested residents within Kemsley and Sittingbourne will be made aware of the proposals and have the opportunity to comment.

6.3 What is the make-up of the local community?

- 6.3.1 At the time of the 2011 census there were 5,156 people aged 16 to 64 recorded as living within the Kemsley ward, which covers the paper mill and the residential areas to the west. Some 4,120 (80%) of those people were economically active in either full or part time employment. Around 84% of the population had qualifications of some description.
- 6.3.2 Within the wider Kemsley Mill postcode area around 77% of people identified themselves as being White in terms of ethnic group. Other larger ethnic groups in the area comprised Black African (15%) and Indian (2.7%).
- 6.3.3 The Kemsley mill itself lies within the Swale 007D Lower Super Output Area in Census terms, with the immediate surrounding community also falling within the Swale 007B and 007E areas.
- 6.3.4 According to DCLG mapping Swale 007D is within the 40% least deprived neighbourhoods in the country, based on indices of multiple deprivation. The level of deprivation is similar in Swale 007B and slightly higher in Swale 007E.




Figure 6.1 – Indices of Multiple Deprivation (source DCLG)

- 6.3.5 Based on Census information the community in the area closest to the mill is primarily White, employed and qualified to some standard, with a relatively low level of deprivation. As demonstrated by Figure 6.1 levels of deprivation do then vary within the wider area.
- 6.3.6 As such it appears that a typical range of communication methods will be sufficient to ensure that the most immediate community around the mill are being informed regarding the project and that similarly typical methods of response will provide sufficient



- opportunity for that community to respond. However the increased levels of deprivation in the surrounding area could be an indicator of, for example, lower levels of qualifications, so an appropriately wide range of communication methods and options for engaging with the DCO process will need to be provided.
- 6.3.7 The Swale 'Shaping Spaces and Places' document, reviewed in Section 4 of this Strategy, identifies the presence within Swale of Hard to Reach Groups, and Section 4 identifies how the various groups identified have been addressed by the consultation strategy taken. The list of intended consultees in Appendix B includes a number of gateway organisations which will be used to access some specific hard to reach groups.

6.4 Summary

- 6.4.1 The consultation strategy will therefore focus on those people living or working permanently within the zone of influence.
- 6.4.2 In addition, it will need to ensure that three further elements of the local community are addressed:
 - (1) Those people who temporarily move into or through the zone of influence;
 - (2) Local politicians, Ward Members and Parish Councils;
 - (3) The wider community throughout Kemsley, Sittingbourne and Iwade.
- 6.4.3 Within these groups, the consultation strategy must also ensure that a sufficiently wide and appropriate range of methods are used, to ensure that hard to reach groups become aware of the proposed scheme and have the opportunity to comment.



7 How should they be consulted?

7.1 Stage 1: Informing people of the proposals

7.1.1 The strategy taken reflects the wide access now available to the Internet, as a means of providing information to local stakeholders and as a medium to allow them to comment on the application or to raise queries with the project team. However the consultation strategy also addresses those who may not have easy access to the Internet, by ensuring that post or telephone can also be used to access the same level of information and to have the same opportunity to make comments or raise queries.

Direct Mailing to residents

7.1.2 Those business and residential properties which lie within the identified zone of influence will be contacted directly by mail to inform them about the proposed development and the consultation and application process which will be undertaken.

Direct contact with other stakeholders

7.1.3 In addition to local residents, it is proposed that a number of local bodies, organisations and politicians be contacted, including gateway organisations who can provide access to hard to reach groups within the community. A proposed list of these bodies is included in Appendix B of this Strategy.

Project Website

- 7.1.4 A project website has been created (http://www.dssmith.com/paper/about/paper-mills/kemsley-uk/k4-project-public-consultation) and at present provides basic information regarding the project, together with a link to the Planning Inspectorate project webpage.
- 7.1.5 The website will be updated regularly to publicise events such as the public exhibitions and to update regarding the progress of the application. It provides a project email address which allows interested parties to contact the project team and will in due course allow for key documents relating to the project to be reviewed and downloaded.

Media Releases

7.1.6 Media releases will be used to ensure that local news publications can provide information on the project and the ongoing consultation process. The publication of the SoCC notice in local papers will also be used to publicise the exhibitions.

Posters/leaflets

7.1.7 Posters and leaflets will be used locally to publicise the exhibitions and to provide details of the project website.



7.2 Stage 2: Public Consultation events

- 7.2.1 Two public exhibitions are to be held, on Thursday 9th November, between 12:30 and 5:30pm and on Saturday 11th November between 9:30am and 3pm, in the Kemsley village hall.
- 7.2.2 The holding of exhibitions on a weekday afternoon and on a Saturday is intending to provide as many people as possible to attend to view the exhibition material and to discuss any issues or raise queries with the project team. The Kemsley village hall is located centrally within Kemsley is a logical local venue for those exhibitions.
- 7.2.3 The exhibition will be publicised via the SoCC notice, direct letters to local residents, a press release and posters in key locations. The website will be updated to refer to the exhibitions and any party who has contacted the project team requesting to be kept informed regarding the project will be contacted direct.
- 7.2.4 The exhibition will be used to present information regarding the proposals and will be staffed by project team members able to discuss the proposals with attendees and to answer questions. Those attending will be able to register their interest in the project, as well as make comments via a questionnaire.

7.3 Stage 3 – Consultee led involvement

7.3.1 The project team will review responses received from local consultees and will consider and action any requests for additional forms of engagement where appropriate, for instance attending Parish Council meetings or holding more focused drop in sessions for particular groups. That will ensure the consultation strategy remains flexible and able to engage with any groups or parties which have not been identified.

7.4 What Information will be provided?

- 7.4.1 The public consultation events will be supported by exhibition boards which will summarise the context to the Kemsley Paper mill and the proposed K4 scheme and which will explain the DCO process and the anticipated environmental impacts of the proposed development. The direct mailings will be accompanied by a summary leaflet providing similar information to the exhibition boards.
- 7.4.2 A separate Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will be produced for the purposes of the S47 consultation, which will provide a summary of the intended environmental impacts of the proposed development in accessible language, free from technical jargon wherever possible. More detailed environmental information can then be provided if requested by individual residents or groups.

7.5 Timing of Consultation

7.5.1 There will be a specific time limited consultation period to meet the formal requirements of Section 47 of the Planning Act. That period will commence shortly before the public exhibitions, at the start of November 2017, at the point at which the SoCC is published. At



- the same time targeted mailings will be undertaken and other stakeholders contacted directly.
- 7.5.2 Responses to the consultation will be required by 5pm on the 17th December 2017, thereby providing a sufficient period of one and a half months for interested parties to respond.
- 7.5.3 Other consultation elements, such as the website, have been made live prior to the formal consultation period commencing and will continue to operate subsequent to the formal time limited consultation period to continue to update the local community on the progress of the application. There will still be the opportunity to contact the project team generally with queries outside of the specified period for representations on the proposed scheme.



8 What will the outcomes be?

8.1 A range of data will emerge from the consultation process:

- (a) A contact list of interested parties (post, email or both);
- (b) A set of comments made on the proposed scheme, either through the questionnaires provided at the exhibition or via the website;
- (c) A set of queries raised by interested stakeholders, either at the exhibition or through the website.

8.2 Processing consultation data

- 8.2.1 A Consultation Report will be produced to accompany the DCO application which will analyse and summarise the comments received within the specified timescale. This report will be published via the project website and will then be made publicly available alongside the wider application documents.
- 8.2.2 Any individual queries raised will be responded to directly as appropriate.

8.3 Further Steps

8.3.1 The consultation strategy described until this point is considered to be appropriate to meet the requirements of the relevant legislation, whilst being directly related to the scale and nature of the proposed scheme and the context of the local area. However depending on the response to the consultation it may be necessary to engage further with the local community in general, or specific areas or parts of it. At this point the need for any further consultation work will therefore be assessed and further steps put in place if necessary.




9 Summary

- 9.1.1 DS Smith Ltd will be submitting an application to seek a Development Consent Order from the Secretary of State for the K4 CHP plant at the Kemsley Paper Mill, Sittingbourne.
- 9.1.2 Prior to submitting the application DS Smith are required to consult with people in the vicinity of the land regarding the proposals. They must then first set out within a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) how they intend to carry out that consultation, and to consult with Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council regarding the content of the SoCC prior to that being made public.
- 9.1.3 This Consultation Strategy has been submitted to Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council alongside the draft SoCC to explain the rationale taken to public consultation by DS Smith.
- 9.1.4 Swale BC and Kent CC have a statutory 28 day period in which to comment on the draft SoCC, beginning on the day after they receive the SoCC and this Consultation Strategy. The DS Smith project team look forward to receiving the responses within that period and would be pleased to discuss the SoCC and this Consultation Strategy document during that time if that would be helpful.

Thank you for your email dated 5th October 2017 providing Kent County Council (KCC) with the opportunity to comment on the draft Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) and Consultation Strategy relating to the Kemsley Paper Mill (K4) CHP Plant.

KCC Officers have reviewed the documents and are generally satisfied with the proposed consultation. The comments below are set out in relation to the headings included in the draft SoCC.

The County Council welcomes feedback on how the results of the draft SoCC consultation will be reviewed and which suggestions will be taken forward.

4. Public Consultation [4.4 How to find out more and get involved]

Consultation respondents should not be required to provide their names and addresses when responding with comments as this may discourage submission. The applicant could instead encourage respondents to provide these personal details, but it should not be mandatory.

The data protection policy should be very clear, with the purpose of the collection evident, if the applicant is collecting personal information.

Public Exhibitions

KCC is concerned that there is limited opportunity for stakeholders to engage through the exhibition events as they are scheduled within a narrow timeframe and would prevent attendance for anyone on holiday, for instance. It is suggested that additional public exhibition dates should be considered.

Target Mailings

In order to evidence sufficient coverage, a map should be provided within the SoCC to show which homes and businesses would fall within the core consultation boundary. The consultation list should include the local educational facilities.

KCC would also recommend that the applicant consults with KCC's Community Liaison Officer for the district Bill Ronan, [Bill.Ronan@kent.gov.uk] to ensure that all of the local community groups have been identified, particularly from the voluntary and community sector.

Website

The SoCC should set out clearly that the website will include the same level of information that is to be displayed at the exhibitions. This is to ensure that all interested parties, whether or not they are able to attend the exhibition, are well informed on the proposals.

KCC also suggests that a 'Frequently Asked Questions' page should be available on the website which can be updated throughout the consultation period.

4. Public Consultation [4.5 Keeping Updated]

For respondents who would like to receive updates on the proposals, KCC suggests that the feedback form should include a question asking people if they would like to be added to the register without them having to contact DHA separately.

Bill, thanks very much for the email; we welcome the continued support and if anything does arise in terms of queries or opportunities for further discussion from your strategic meetings or discussions with community leaders then please let me know. In terms of the SoCC, to confirm we have made that available at the Kemsley Mill, the Swale offices, the Sittingbourne library, at the exhibitions (all in hard copy) and then for download via the project website.

Francesca – further to your email and for general information please find attached the PEIR which has supported the community consultation. We are separately preparing a draft Environmental Statement which will comprise PEIR for the purposes of the formal consultation of statutory bodies and consultees under Section 42 and expect to issue that around the middle of December.

By way of an update we distributed some 2,800 leaflets to residential properties and 70 letters to businesses within the zone of influence. As noted in the SoCC we published notices in the local paper in the week prior to and during the week of the exhibitions and had coverage by way of an article in the paper itself, as well as publicising the exhibitions online via the project website. However levels of turnout were extremely low; we had three local Members and ten members of the public at the Thursday exhibition and one Councillor and four Members of the public at the Saturday exhibition. Thus far we have had five questionnaires returned.

It therefore appears that public interest in the project, at least to date, is very limited and on that basis I see little merit in holding a further public exhibition at this stage. You will be aware of Part 47(6), as amended by the Localism Act 2011, requires the applicant to make the SoCC available for inspection by the public in a way <u>reasonably convenient</u> for people living in the vicinity of the land; and I simply ask if you might consider this in any decision you make.

I am grateful for the information and I will raise the consultation at strategic meetings across Swale through my work, I will also discuss with community leaders in Kemsley to ensure residents are informed.

I would welcome being kept informed, and I will do whatever I can to support the ongoing consultation process.

The guidance does state that Local Authorities should be given at least 28 days to respond to there is scope for this. 1 Introduction

1.1 The Kemsley Paper Mill

1.1.1 DS Smith Paper Ltd (DS Smith) is a leading European manufacturer of recycled corrugated case materials and speciality papers. The company operate nine paper mills across Europe, with Kemsley their only mill within the UK. The Kemsley mill was built in 1924 to produce newsprint and by 1970 had diversified to produce corrugated case material. The entire site is owned by DS Smith, who have invested heavily in modernising the facility, which now employs around 400 people and has an annual production capacity of up to 800,000 tonnes.

1.2 Existing Energy Supply

- 1.2.1 The paper production process is energy intensive and requires a substantial amount of electricity and steam. The energy and steam requirements of the Kemsley mill are provided by a range of sources, operated by either DS Smith or partner companies. The current power sources are:
 - **K1** a gas turbine CHP plant located within the mill site which provides electricity and steam to the mill;
 - **K2** a steam generator located within the mill site which uses waste plastic and sludge as a source to provide steam to the mill;
 - **K3** an energy from waste plant operated by Wheelabrator to the east of the main mill complex which from 2019 will provide steam to the mill.
- 1.2.2 K3 is currently being constructed, with the original design having a capacity of less than 50MW. A separate DCO application is being prepared, the 'Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) Power Upgrade', to increase the capacity of the K3 plant to 75MW. That is an entirely separate proposal from the K4 scheme which forms the subject of this DCO.



2 K4 - The proposed Combined Heat and Power Plant

2.1 Context

- 2.1.1 The electricity and steam provided by the existing onsite K1 gas turbine is key to the operation of the mill. However K1 was built in 1995 and does now require significant investment to extend its operational life. In addition K1 was designed to serve the Sittingbourne Paper mill (which no longer exists) as well as the Kemsley mill, so has an inefficient surplus potential capacity.
- 2.1.2 DS Smith is therefore seeking consent to replace K1 with a new CHP plant, called K4. The new plant would be located on land within the existing paper mill complex, adjacent to the existing K1 plant. It is intended to be a smaller, more efficient replacement of K1 which is designed to serve the specific needs of the Kemsley Paper mill and to complement the energy and steam provided by K2 and K3.
- 2.1.3 K4 would be powered by natural gas. The design of the CHP is still being finalised, but it would comprise the following:
 - A gas turbine producing in the region of 52 to 57MW of electrical power;
 - A Heat Recovery Steam Generator, producing in the region of 105 to 110 MWth steam;
 - A steam turbine, producing in the region of 16MW of electrical power.
- 2.1.4 Gas would be used to fire the gas turbine to produce electricity. The heat created by that process would be used to create high pressure steam, which would also be fed through a second turbine to produce further electricity. The resulting low pressure steam would be sent to the mill for use within the production process.
- 2.1.5 The DCO will also cover the decommissioning of K1, though some elements of K1 will be retained for use in connection with K4, including the water treatment facilities and the grid connection.

2.2 Project Location

2.2.1 K4 would be built within the south-eastern corner of the main mill complex, which is located to the east of Kemsley.

2.3 K4 Layout and Design

2.3.1 The design of the CHP plant is still being finalised. However it is expected that it would comprise two main buildings and would utilise existing infrastructure and connections already present within the mill site. The building will have one stack, with the height of that stack still to be determined.



2.3.2 The red line boundary shown on Figures 1 and 2 includes the current footprint of K1, the proposed location for K4, together with land needed for construction, lay down and access. All the land involved is owned by DS Smith.




Figure 3 – Illustrative CHP design (proposed buildings in blue- indicative design only)



3 The Application Process

3.1 Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects

- 3.1.1 The Planning Act 2008, as amended by the Localism Act 2011, is intended to make the process of seeking planning permission for 'nationally significant infrastructure projects' faster and fairer.
- 3.1.2 The Planning Act 2008 states that the construction or extension of a generating station of more than 50MW is considered within Section 14(1) (a) of the Act to be a 'nationally significant infrastructure project'. As such an application for a **Development Consent Order** must be made to the Planning Inspectorate. The Inspectorate will examine the proposal and environmental information submitted by the applicant and make a recommendation to the Secretary of State, who will then be responsible for determining the application.
- 3.1.3 The Government prepared National Policy Statements which provide an Overarching National Policy Statement for Energy (EN-1) and a National Policy Statement for Fossil Fuel Electricity Generating Infrastructure (EN-2). Within these documents the Government encourages the use of good quality CHP projects and discuss the potential impacts of this type of development and how these can be properly addressed and mitigated.

3.2 Environmental Impact Assessment

- 3.2.1 The DCO application will be accompanied by an Environmental Statement (ES) which will provide a detailed assessment of any significant environmental impacts and benefits which are expected to arise from the proposed development and which will identify any mitigation measures to be proposed to control or reduce environmental impacts.
- 3.2.2 An EIA Scoping Opinion has been obtained from the Planning Inspectorate. The Scoping Opinion identifies those environmental issues expected to be relevant to the proposed development, which will be assessed in the Environmental Statement. The Planning Inspectorate have sought the views of statutory consultees before setting out what the scope of the Environmental Statement should be.
- 3.2.3 The public consultation will be accompanied by a Preliminary Environmental Information Report, which will summarise the likely environmental impacts of the proposed development.

3.3 Early Construction Works

3.3.1 If the K4 DCO is granted then due to changing environmental regulations DS Smith Ltd would need to construct the K4 plant as soon as possible. DS Smith are considering seeking planning permission from Swale Borough Council for various early construction works which are likely to include site preparation, groundworks and other elements, so that work on those elements could commence ahead of any DCO being obtained.



3.3.2 A planning application of that nature would be completely separate to the DCO process and would not preclude or influence the outcome of the DCO application. The planning application would be publicised and assessed in the normal manner by Swale Borough Council on its own merits, against the policies of the Local Plan and any other material considerations.



4 Public Consultation

4.1 Context

4.1.1 The Planning Act 2008 (Section 47), and associated Government guidance, requires an appropriate amount of public consultation to be completed prior to the submission of an application for development consent. Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council have been given the opportunity to review and comment on this SoCC prior to it being made public.

4.2 Scope and circulation of the SoCC

- 4.2.1 Notices relating to the availability of this SoCC have been published in the Sittingbourne Messenger newspaper.
- 4.2.2 Copies of the SoCC have been made available at the following locations, with typical opening hours shown:




Zone of Influence




KEMSLEY PAPER MILL (K4) CHP PLANT

The Kemsley Paper Mill needs a considerable amount of electricity and steam to operate, which is currently provided by various on-site sources operated both by DS Smith and by other companies.

K1 is an existing Combined Heat and Power Plant located within the main mill complex which provides both electricity and steam to the mill. It was built in 1995 and now requires significant investment to replace outdated parts and to ensure it complies with tightening European environmental regulations which will be imposed nationally by the Environment Agency from 2020.

K1 was originally designed to serve both the Kemsley Mill and the Sittingbourne Paper Mill- the Sittingbourne mill has now closed so K1 has a design capacity which exceeds the needs of the Kemsley Mill and is therefore inefficient.






K4 is a Combined Heat and Power plant which would replace K1. K4 would have a smaller capacity than K1 of between 52 to 57 Megawatts and would use efficient modern CHP technology.

The Combined Heat and Power process is very efficient. K4 would operate using natural gas supplied by an existing pipeline which would be used to fire a gas turbine, producing electricity to be fed into the mill, with any excess exported to the national grid. The heat created by that process is used to create high pressure steam which is then fed through a second turbine, creating further electricity. The resulting low pressure steam is then sent to the mill, to be used within the production process.

The K4CHP would be built on land within the main mill complex. It would comprise a complex of buildings and structures, with a single chimney located on the largest of those buildings.

It is expected that the construction of K4 would take around 20 months. K4 would then operate continuously to supply the mill, apart from regular maintenance periods.






Environmental Effects

CEMSLEY PAPER MILL (K4) CHP PLANT
DEVELOPMENT CONSENT ORDER

Our application will be accompanied by a full Environmental Statement (ES) which will identify any significant environmental effects anticipated to arise from the proposed K4 development, both on its own and when combined with other planned or approved projects in the surrounding area.

We have produced a **Preliminary Environmental Information Report** (PEIR) which provides more detail on the project and the likely environmental effects ofthe development. Copies of the PEIR are available at this exhibition or can be downloaded from the project website.



Air Quality

We expect K4 to generate reduced levels of emissions compared to the current operation, as it will be a smaller and more efficient replacement of the existing K1 CHP plant.

An assessment will be undertaken to identify the actual impacts of emissions from K4 on human health and sensitive nature conservation sites in the local area, including the Swale Special Protection Area, Medway Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area, Thames Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area and Queendown Warren Special Area of Conservation.

Traffic and Transport

We estimate that the construction of K4 will generate an average of 25 to 30 HGV deliveries per day throughout the 20 month construction period. These vehicles would access the site via the A249, Swale Way and Barge Way. Because K4 would operate using natural gas, there will be no regular deliveries when it is operational, except for occasional maintenance vehicles.

There are currently approximately 20,000 vehicle movements per day along Swale Way, 2,000 of which are HGV's. The construction vehicles therefore represent only a small proportion of current traffic flows on the surrounding highway network and the relative change in traffic flows would be difficult to perceive.

Climate Change

Greenhouse gas emissions from K4 will be studied in the ES, balanced against the reduction in emissions when K1 is closed. Changing climate risks such as flooding will also be assessed. Since the new development would be replacing a similar but older gasfired CHP plant, which has its own greenhouse gas emissions, the net change is likely to be quite small and may be a reduction overall.



Environmental Effects

CEMSLEY PAPER MILL (K4) CHP PLANT

Noise

Noise and vibration during construction will be controlled by adherence to an appropriate Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP). Noise emissions during operation of the facility will be controlled to acceptable levels, by selection of appropriate plant and by design.

Noiselevelsarenotanticipated to be any greater than those arising from the infrastructure being replaced, and will be minimised as far as is reasonably practicable. Vibration during operation of the facility will be controlled at source, and off-site vibration would be negligible.

Flood Risk and Drainage

The K4 site lies within Flood Zone 1, where there is a low probability of flooding of less than 1 in 1000 years, although parts of the wider mill site lie within Flood Zone 3 where there is a higher probability of tidal flooding.

The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas. It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies and appropriate drainage measures during construction, operation and the later decommissioning phase, impacts on flooding and surface water, and interrelated sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be minimal.

Heritage

There are no designated heritage assets within the site itself. Castle Rough, a Scheduled Monument, is located some 230 metres southwest of the site and the closest listed building is Great Grovehurst Farmhouse which is 1.3km away to the west. The nature of the 20th century land-use within the proposal site and the associated ground disturbance means it is unlikely that any archaeological deposits which might have existed still survive.

The ES will contain the results of a desk based assessment, field visit and walkover survey to assess the presence of any unrecorded heritage assets and the suitability of further survey techniques.



Environmental Effects

KEMSLEY PAPER MILL (K4) CHP PLANT

Ecology

The K4 footprint within the Paper Mill is an area of existing concrete meaning there is no potential for on-site ecology effects from the new CHP plant. The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both important sites, designated for the number of birds that they support. Therefore, the assessment of ecological effects will primarily focus on these areas from the point of view of dust and noise generation.

The assessment will also consider the impacts on other designated sites in the area from changes to air quality as a result of the operation of the CHP. However, given that the K4 project replaces the much older K1, it is not anticipated that it will give rise to any adverse impacts on designated sites from emissions created by the proposed plant.

Landscape, Townscape and Visual Resources

There are no direct effects expected on the wider rural landscapes around the Swale and the Isle of Sheppey, either during construction or operation. The site is currently not visible in views from the majority of Sittingbourne, but more open longer distance views exist from the south east due to the Swale estuary channel and the low lying nature of the Isle of Sheppey.

However the proposed buildings and structures would be set against a backdrop of existing large industrial buildings, with the chimney the only element visible from many locations. Further assessment work will be undertaken to establish the scale of the impact of the development on the Saxon Shore Way long distance path, which runs close to the Kemsley Mill.

Ground Conditions

The K4 footprint has historically formed part of the wider Paper Mill development since 1930s and was primarily used for agricultural purposes prior to development of the Paper Mill. Due to the historical development of the Paper Mill there is potential for contamination to be present within the soil and groundwater underlying the K4 site, although any contamination is anticipated to be limited in extent.

We will be undertaking an assessment of ground conditions which will focus on identifying what contamination might exist and ensuring that impacts on human health, local groundwater and surface water resources and on the local sensitive ecological receptors are controlled.



Application Process

CEMSLEY PAPER MILL (K4) CHP PLANT

The K4 project is a 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project' (NSIP) because it is an onshore power generating station with a capacity of over 50 megawatts. We must therefore apply to the Secretary of State for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to give us permission to build K4. The Planning Inspectorate process applications for DCO's on behalf of the Secretary of State. Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council will be statutory consultees during the DCO process.

Before being able to submit the K4 DCO application we are required to consult with the local community, statutory consultees and Borough and County Councils regarding the project.

The DCO Application Process

Examination	Up to 6 months	Interested parties can send in their comments in writing and can request to speak at a public hearing. The Inspectorate will issue written questions to clarify any queries regarding the proposal and there will be public hearings into specific matters.
Recommendation	Up to 3 months	The Planning Inspectorate consider the application and make their recommendation to the Secretary of State.
Decision	Up to 3 months	The Secretary of State considers the Inspectorate's recommendation and issues their decision on the application. There is the opportunity for legal challenge once the decision is issued.

On some other NSIP projects applicants have chosen to submit a separate planning application to the local planning authority to seek permission to undertake early site preparation works, ahead of receiving a Development Consent Order.

In order to meet Environment Agency regulations for industrial emissions, which will tighten from 2020, we would intend to build K4 as soon as possible should we obtain a Development Consent Order.

We are therefore reviewing the possibility of making a similar application for early site preparation works on the K4 site. Those works could include site clearance, breaking up of the existing concrete slab, creating laydown and working areas and other preparation activities.

We would need to make a planning application to Swale Borough Council for those works. Swale Borough Council would publicise and consult on that application in accordance with their standard procedures and we would provide updates on that application via the project website.

Introduction

DS Smith Paper Limited ("the Applicant") proposes to seek permission to decommission an existing gas fired Combined Heat and Power ("CHP") Plant and build a new gas-fired CHP plant ("K4") with a nominal power output of 52-57 Mega Watts (the "Proposed Development") to be operated by DS Smith and other companies to supply steam and power to their existing Kemsley Paper Mill, in Sittingbourne, Kent.

The Planning Act 2008 states that the construction or extension of a generating station of more than 50MW is considered within Section 14(1) (a) of the Act to be a 'nationally significant infrastructure project' and as such requires an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to be made to the Planning Inspectorate and approved by the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy. Such an application is therefore being prepared by DS Smith Paper Ltd. As part of this an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is being carried out in accordance with the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 to identify the potential significant environmental effects of the scheme. The results of this assessment will be reported in an Environmental Statement (ES) submitted with the application to the SoS.

This document provides a summary of the Proposed Development and the <u>preliminary results</u> of the EIA undertaken to date. Members of the public can comment on this 'Preliminary Environmental Information' ("PEI") through a dedicated page on DS Smith's website, via email, letter or using the feedback forms at the forthcoming public exhibitions. Details on how to do so are provided at the end of this document. Members of the public who register themselves as interested parties with the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) by the relevant deadline after the acceptance of the formal application will also be able to make comments on the final ES (details provided at the end of this document).

What is the purpose of EIA?

The purpose of Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is to identify the likely **significant** effects of a Proposed Development, positive or negative, to some aspect of the environment whether natural or man made. Both the sensitivity of the environmental receptors being affected and the magnitude of the impact inform the significance of the effect.

The findings of the EIA are then presented in a document known as an Environmental Statement (ES).

The significant environmental effects of the Proposed Development during decommissioning of K1, and construction, operation and future decommissioning of K4 requires assessment in the ES by appropriate technical experts.

Where feasible, mitigation measures have been proposed to avoid/reduce an adverse effect identified. A reassessment of an effect with this mitigation in place is then undertaken to determine its significance post mitigation.

Any significant environmental effects remaining after mitigation are reported and represent the likely residual effects of the Proposed Development on the environment (if any).

Where identified, significant effects are required to be taken into account in the application decision making process by the SoS. If consent is granted mitigation measures are secured by requirements within the DCO to ensure they are implemented.

What issues have been assessed?

A formal scoping opinion request was made to PINS in July 2017 to agree the scope of the issues to be included in the EIA in consultation with the relevant consultees i.e. Kent County Council (KCC) Highways, the Environment Agency, Natural England etc. A copy of the formal scoping opinion is publicly available on PINS website: https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/ at the Kemsley Paper Mill (K4) CHP Plant project page.

Consequently it was agreed that the following topic areas need to be assessed within the EIA, a summary of the preliminary results of which is provided within this document:

- Traffic and transport
- · Air Quality (including human health)
- Greenhouse Gases and Climate Change
- Noise and Vibration
- Ground contamination
- Water Environment
- Ecology
- Landscape and Visual Effects
- Cultural Heritage
- Cumulative effects

Where a particular environmental feature, or component of it, has not been included within an EIA, this is not to suggest that there will be no associated effects; rather that these are not considered to be among the potentially significant effects.

The Proposal Site

The proposed site lies in the south east corner of the existing Kemsley Paper Mill site approximately 600m west of the Swale Estuary and north of Milton Creek in the Borough of Swale, Kent. The site is roughly triangular in shape and consists almost entirely of existing concrete hardstanding.

The site is accessed from the A249 via Swale Way. An internal access road provides access to the proposal site.

The site lies immediately east of the Kemsley residential suburb of Sittingbourne with the town centre some 2.5km south of the site.

D S Smith bought the whole site in 2008, investing over £100m to upgrade facilities to make lightweight corrugated case material (CCM). This is the first recycled lightweight paper manufactured in the UK. Kemsley Mill has an annual production capacity of around 800,000 tonnes made from 100% recycled waste paper and is the second biggest recovered fibre-based paper operation in Europe.





Figure 1: Site location plan showing indicative red line boundary of the DCO application.

The site lies in proximity to a number of sensitive areas and sites which could be potentially affected by the Proposed Development which will be assessed within the EIA. The main sensitive sites/areas are listed below and their location illustrated in Figure 2:

- The Swale Special Protection Area, Special Site of Scientific Interest and Ramsar site designated for its grazing marshes and estuarine habitats and the assemblage of breeding and overwintering birds it supports
- 'Castle Rough' a Medieval moated site (Scheduled Monument)
- · Local residents in the Kemsley area of Sittingbourne
- · The A249 and local highways network
- The River Swale
- The Saxon Shore Way Public Right of Way

It should be noted that this is not an exhaustive list but identifies the main sensitive sites/areas only.


Existing Energy Sources at Kemsley

The paper production process is energy intensive and requires a substantial amount of electricity and steam. The energy and steam requirements of the Kemsley Mill are provided by a range of sources, operated by either DS Smith or partner companies.

The current power sources are:

- K1 a gas turbine CHP plant located within the mill site which provides electricity and steam to the mill;
- K2 a steam generator located within the mill site which uses waste plastic and sludge as a source to provide steam to the mill;
- K3 an energy from waste plant operated by Wheelabrator to the east of the main mill complex which from 2019 will provide steam to the mill.

K3 is currently being constructed, with the original design having a capacity of less than 50MW. A separate DCO application is being prepared, the 'Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) – Power Upgrade', to increase the capacity of the K3 plant to 75MW. That is an entirely separate proposal from the K4 scheme which forms the subject of this DCO application.

The Proposed Scheme




Figure 4: Illustrative 3D visual showing how the Site is likely to look post-construction.

The electricity and steam provided by the existing onsite K1 gas turbine is key to the operation of the mill. However K1 was built in 1995 and does now require significant investment to extend its operational life. In addition K1 was designed to serve the Sittingbourne Paper mill (which no longer exists) as well as the Kemsley mill, so has an inefficient surplus potential capacity.

DS Smith is therefore seeking consent to replace K1 with a new CHP plant, called K4. The new plant would be located on land within the existing paper mill complex, adjacent to the existing K1 plant as illustrated in Figure 4 above. It is intended to be a smaller, more efficient replacement of K1 which is designed to serve the specific needs of the Kemsley Paper mill and to complement the energy and steam provided by K2 and K3.

K4 would be powered by natural gas. The design of the CHP is still being finalised, but it will comprise the following:

- A gas turbine producing in the region of 52 to 57MW of electrical power;
- A Heat Recovery Steam Generator, producing in the region of 105 to 110 MWt of steam;
- A steam turbine, producing in the region of 16MW of electrical power.

Gas would be used to fire the gas turbine to produce electricity. The heat created by that process would be used to create high pressure steam, which would also be fed through a second turbine to produce further electricity. The resulting low pressure steam would be sent to the mill for use within the production process.

The DCO application will also cover the decommissioning of K1, though some elements of K1 will be retained for use in connection with K4, including existing water treatment facilities and the grid connection.

Impacts to be Assessed

The EIA will assess a range of potentially significant environmental effects utilising the professional experience of a range of competent experts and the Scoping Opinion of the SoS and relevant consultees. The findings of the EIA will be presented in the final ES. The summary below provides a commentary on the assessments undertaken to date including the likely significant environmental effects envisaged (where possible at this stage), any mitigation measures proposed to reduce or offset these effects and the likely residual effects of the development on the environment. Members of the public are advised that this information is preliminary at this stage pending the full results of the assessments which will be provided in the final ES submitted with the application to the SoS. Please see the end of this document for information on how you can comment on this Preliminary Environmental Information and the final ES once submitted to the SoS.

What has been assessed?

A scoping checklist of environmental features and their components has been utilised to identify those aspects of the environment or components of them that have the potential to be subjected to likely significant environmental effects and therefore should be included in the EIA.

A formal Scoping Opinion request, which included the results of the checklist assessment, was made to the SoS in July 2017 to agree the scope of the EIA in consultation with the relevant consultees i.e. KCC, the Environment Agency, Natural England etc.

The EIA will be produced in accordance with the SoS's formal Scoping Opinion. A copy of this document is publicly available on PINS website: https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/

Method of assessment

The specialist assessments will follow generally similar methodologies. Desk and/or field studies will be undertaken to establish the existing situation at the Site and surrounding area. The effects of the Proposed Development are then established using a method that compares the sensitivity /importance of an aspect of the environment with the likely size of the predicted change to establish the degree of effect (negligible, slight, moderate, substantial, very substantial). Typically if an effect is determined

to be of moderate significance or above then it is deemed to be a significant effect for the purpose of the EIA Regulations.

The degree of an effect determines the resources that should be put in place to avoid or reduce an adverse effect

Where appropriate mitigation measures have been proposed to avoid/reduce a significant adverse effect. The significance of an effect with this mitigation in place is then re-assessed to determine its significance post mitigation.

Any significant environmental effects remaining after mitigation are reported and represent the likely residual effects of the proposed development on the environment.

All methodologies are undertaken in accordance with current guidance and best practice.

A summary of the preliminary assessments of the specialist environmental topics is provided below:

Traffic and Transport

The construction of K4 is estimated to generate an average of 25 to 30 HGV deliveries per day throughout the 20 month construction period. These vehicles would access the site via the A249, Swale Way and Barge Way. Highway capacity assessments are being undertaken to determine the effect of these construction vehicle movements along the adjacent highway network.

There are currently approximately 20,000 vehicle movements per day along Swale Way, 2,000 of which are HGVs. Thus, the construction vehicles represent only a small proportion of current traffic flows on the adjacent highway network and the relative change in traffic flows as a result of the construction vehicles would be difficult to perceive. The sensitivity of receptors along the adjacent network deemed highway are to be low / negligible and initial assessments indicate that the effect of the construction vehicles would be negligible.

Because K4 would operate using natural gas, there will be no regular deliveries when it is operational, except for occasional maintenance vehicles. Thus, there would be no regular transport demand associated with K4 once operational.

Air Quality

The impacts of emissions from K4 on human health and sensitive nature conservation sites in the local area will be assessed using an atmospheric dispersion model. The model will be run for five years of hourly meteorological data to allow the impacts to be assessed for a wide range of conditions. The cumulative impacts of K4 with K2 and K3 will be assessed by their inclusion within the model.

Contributions of nitrogen oxides and carbon monoxide will be predicted. The predicted contributions will be added to existing baseline concentrations and the total pollutant concentration will then be compared with the relevant EU limit values and

UK Air Quality Strategy objectives set for the protection of human-health.

Concentrations of nitrogen oxides, nutrient nitrogen deposition rates and acid deposition rates at the Swale Special Protection Area, Medway Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area, Thames Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area and Queendown Warren Special Area of Conservation will also be predicted and compared with the relevant critical levels and loads.

Whilst still subject to the final assessment it is likely that emissions from K4 will be at worst equal to if not less than existing K1. The air quality benefits of replacing K1 with K4 will be quantified within the assessment report.

Greenhouse Gases and Climate Change

The main impact on climate change from the Proposed Development would be its direct greenhouse gas emissions when operational from combustion of natural gas fuel.

Indirectly, constructing and operating the facility would also cause greenhouse gas emissions through the supply chain for its fuel and for construction materials and activities. These emissions will be quantified in the Environmental Statement and set into the context of the UK's energy and climate change policies. Since the new development would be replacing a similar but older gas-fired combined heat and power plant, which has its own greenhouse gas emissions, the net change is likely to be quite small and may be a reduction overall.

Over the course of the new development's lifetime, changes in climate could also pose risks to it or could increase the vulnerability of other parts of the environment it affects, such as local ecosystems. The main risk is from flooding, and the assessment of this in the ES is to be included in the Water Environment Chapter and will include a suitable precautionary allowance for increased rainfall in the future, following the

Government's guidance on flood risk.

Noise and Vibration

Work on the Noise and Vibration assessment is underway. Survey data to establish baseline noise levels has been gathered from previous projects at the Site.

Noise and vibration during construction will be controlled by adherence to an appropriate Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) which will stipulate appropriate construction methods to minimise construction noise. There will be no construction working outside of normal working hours without the express written permission of the local planning authority (Swale Borough Council).

Noise emissions during operation of the facility will be controlled to acceptable levels in accordance with industry guidelines and World Health Organisation guidance, by selection of appropriate plant and by design. Noise levels are not anticipated to be any greater than that from the infrastructure being replaced, and will be minimised as far as is reasonably practicable.

Vibration during operation of the facility will be controlled at source, and off-site vibration is likely to be negligible.

Ground Conditions

The effect of the proposed K4 development will be assessed following UK best practice, principally based around the Environment Agency and DEFRA document 'Model Procedures for the Management of Land Contamination'. It is anticipated that, although the K4 site has formed part of the wider Paper Mill site since the 1930s, any contamination associated with its industrial history will be limited in extent. The Ground Conditions Chapter of the EIA will primarily focus on the potential for contamination to be present within the K4 development area and to determine potential effects of contamination, if present, to impact on human health, local groundwater

and surface water resources and on the local sensitive ecological receptors.

The shallow geological stratum underlying the site is generally of a low sensitivity with regard to groundwater contamination, however the study will include an assessment of the potential effects during the construction and operation of the CHP might have on groundwater quality.

The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas and the study will therefore include an assessment of potential effects the construction and operation of the CHP might have on these receptors.

It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies during and post construction, impacts on human health groundwater, surface water and sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be minimal.

Ecology

The effect of the proposed K4 development on ecology will be assessed following good-practice quidelines (Chartered Institute of Ecology and Environmental Management 2016). The K4 footprint within the Paper Mill is an area of existing concrete hard standing meaning there is no potential for onsite ecology effects from the new CHP plant; a Phase 1 Habitat Survey of the redline boundary in October 2017 has confirmed this. Therefore, the majority of the ecology chapter of the EIA will describe effects on off-site nature conservation interest.

The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both important sites for nature conservation due to the number of birds that they support as well as the plant and invertebrate assemblages present. Therefore, since these sites are 100+ metres from the development boundary, the assessment of ecological effects during construction arising from K4 will primarily focus on the potential for the disturbance

of birds using the intertidal habitats as a result of noise generated during construction activities such as piling. The noise levels from various activities will be modelled and compared to a threshold of disturbance derived from an up-to-date literature review.

The assessment of operational effects will focus primarily on the effects of emissions to air from the operation of the CHP on designated sites within 10 km. The assessment will consider the effects of changes in ambient concentrations of nitrogen dioxide and ammonia along with deposition of nitrogen and acid into the habitats for which the sites are designated. The assessment would also be cumulative with both K2 and K3. However, given that the K4 project replaces the much older K1, there may be an overall improvement in air quality and a subsequent enhancement with respect to local biodiversity.

Landscape and Visual Effects

A preliminary Zone of Theoretical Visibility (ZTV) of the Proposed Development has been generated to establish the study area based on preliminary scheme information.

Information on landscape, townscape and visual resources within the relevant study area has been collected through a detailed desktop review of existing studies and datasets and field based surveys and analysis.

application site currently comprises concrete hardstanding and forms part of the operational land within the DS Smith site. Large scale industrial buildings and chimneys at the DS Smith Paper Mill form the northern and western site boundaries, separating the location from the residential districts of Sittingbourne. This urban area is defined as the Sittingbourne Industrial Commercial townscape character area. The Industrial/commercial character area has a poor quality and condition due to the extensive industrial buildings and infrastructure and the presence of disused and derelict land resulting in a low value. There are no designated landscapes which lie within the site area.

The site is currently not visible in views from the majority of the settlement of Sittingbourne due to industrial development on the edge of the town and the restored landfill mound. To the south-east of the site the channel of the Swale and lowlying landscape of the Isle of Sheppy allow more open, longer distance views. Key views of potentially high sensitivity and susceptibility to change in view as a result of the proposals include walkers using the Saxon Shore Way long distance footpath (ZU1/2) beside the Swale and Milton Creek. The greatest number of visual receptors with views towards the site would be the occupants of vehicles travelling on Swale Way.

Twelve candidate viewpoint locations have been defined and photography undertaken to inform the visual impact assessment. Viewpoints will be agreed through consultation with Kent County Council/Swale Borough Council.

The new buildings and infrastructure which form the proposed K4 CHP, although large in scale, would form an extension of the existing character of neighbouring development at DS Smith. The townscape character of the site would be of low sensitivity to change through redevelopment. Significant adverse effects townscape character durina construction or operation during the day or at night, would be unlikely.

The surrounding landscape character areas of the Swale and Isle of Sheppey are generally in good condition and have an intrinsically high value. There would be no direct effects on these rural and wild landscape and their sensitivity to change through the indirect influence of the new CHP would be medium or low. Significant adverse effects on these landscape character areas during construction or operation during the day or at night would also be unlikely due to the similar nature of the proposals to the established industrial context.

There are unlikely to be any significant adverse effects during construction and operation on views gained by visual receptors at individual locations within the study area as a result of the proposals. The proposed buildings and structures would generally be visible in the backdrop of existing large scale industrial buildings at the paper mill. The tops of the flue stacks would be the only visible element, beside other stacks in views from the north and west. There will be no locations where new industrial buildings or structures at the proposal site would be seen in a view that does not already contain views of large areas of existing industry.

There is the potential for significant sequential effects on walkers using the Saxon Shore Way long distance path which follows the coastline and estuary landform within a valued and designated landscape, passing relatively close to the proposed CHP. Receptors would have the opportunity to gain a series of views of the development for a distance of several kilometres as part of a walk, leading to the potential for an accumulation of effects which may be significant. Further assessment work will be undertaken to establish the potential for these significant effects.

Cultural Heritage

A desk assessment undertaken in connection with the proposal has revealed that there are no statutorily designated heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings) within the application site.

The closest designated asset is Castle Rough, a Scheduled Monument (HER number TQ96NW10, list entry number 1013368). The SM is located some 230 metres southwest of the proposal site. It is low lying and not visible from any distance away. The closest listed building to the proposed development is Great Grovehurst Farmhouse, located some 1.3 kilometres west of the laydown area part of the proposal site and listed at Grade II (list entry number 1057685). The closest listed building to the built part of the proposed development is Little Murston Farmhouse, located some 1.4 kilometres southeast of the proposal site and listed at Grade II (list entry number 1061035). There are a number of other designated assets within the study area. There is no evidence that the Proposed Development would have a significant effect on any of them.

Recent archaeological work in the area, including on the Sittingbourne Northern Relief Road has indicated that the higher ground of the Kemsley Ridge has the potential to contain remains from the prehistoric through to the medieval periods, with further activity taking place in the lower lying marshlands now represented by areas of alluvium. There is also the potential for remains from later periods. No archaeological remains were observed on the surface within the proposal site.

The nature of the 20th century landuse within the proposal site and the associated ground disturbance suggest that the potential for the survival of previously unidentified sub-surface archaeological remains of national importance, or of sufficient importance to warrant preservation in situ, is unlikely. It is likely that any archaeological deposits within the proposed construction footprint, have been damaged, possibly removed, and that the potential for the survival of archaeological remains is low.

Water Environment

The effect of the proposed K4 development will be assessed following UK best practice, Institute of Environmental Management and Assessment (IEMA) Guidelines for Environmental Impact Assessment (2004) and the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges (DMRB), Volume 11, Part 10, (November 2009). Whilst the DMRB is not specific to the assessment of hydrology and flood risk, it provides an accepted approach to the assessment of development impacts. In addition, the assessment has been undertaken in line with National, Regional and Local planning policy requirements.

Determination of the baseline conditions at the application site has been established through a review of literature and data from publicly available sources including; the EA, British Geological Survey (BGS) and Kent County Council (KCC).

The Water Environment Chapter of the EIA will primarily focus on flood risk and the potential impacts on water quality and quantity as a consequence of the Proposed Development during the construction, operation and decommissioning phases.

The tidally dominated Swale is approximately 300 m to the south at closest orientation to the Proposed Development and has been classified by the EA as the main risk of flooding.

The EA flood map for planners and Swale Borough Council SFRA (2010) indicate that the entire Proposed Development lies within Flood Zone 1 (FZ1), with low probability of flooding (assessed as Land having a less than 1 in 1,000 annual probability of river or sea flooding). The construction access road is located within Flood Zone 3 (FZ3), and has a 'high' probability of tidal flooding. The southern extent of the access road development is located within Flood Zone 1 (FZ1) with less than 1 in 1,000 annual probability

of flooding from river or sea in any year

The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas, therefore the study will include an assessment of potential effects construction and operation of the CHP might have on these receptors.

It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies and appropriate drainage measures during construction, operation and later decommissioning phase, impacts on flooding and surface water, and interrelated sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be slight and not significant.

Cumulative Effects





House plans meeting over **objections**

A site meeting was held for a proposed two-bedroom house after neighbours objected to the plans.

More than 20 objections were lodged against plans for the garden of a home in Brier Road, Sittingbourne. The site meeting took place on Monday

Borden Parish Council objected after residents raised concerns at one of its meetings.

It said in a statement: "Due to the slant of the land, the second floor will have a clear sight into adjacent properties and will look right into the bedroom windows.

"Because of the turning circle on to the road in Grove Park Avenue, it will impact on the area and cause issues with parking."

Vernice Hayward, of Grove Park Avenue, said: "This will be a disgrace if it goes through.

"It is a private road. I live on the end so it will look straight into my property, and the drive will come in front of mine.

However, a design and access statement said the new build would be 20 metres from the property in Brier Road and would be "excavated" into the garden.

It added: "The only rear-facing window is that of the bathroom which has obscured glazing.

Residents of Grove Park Avenue and Brier Road suggested the building would affect a footpath linking the two streets that was well used by schoolchildren.

Another concern was the proposal would move a streetlight making a path unsafe in winter.

He added the open day on Sunday was the best turnout for this time of year they have had in three or four years.

There were also seven steam locomotives on display.

Plans on show for updated plant to power paper mill

A planning application is being prepared for a power station at Kemsley Paper Mill.

Owner and operator DS Smith Paper is holding two public exhibitions ahead of a bid to build a combined heat and power (CHP) plant, known as K4.

The mill, which produces up to 800,000 tonnes of paper and cardboard each year and employs about 400 people, is currently powered by K1, an existing CHP plant producing electricity and steam, and K2, which is made up of steam producing boilers.

K1 was constructed in 1995 and used to provide energy to both the Kemsley mill and the now demolished Sittingbourne Paper Mill.

Described by its owners as "outdated and inefficient", its designed capacity is surplus to the requirements of the Kemsley site and a number of elements are nearing the end of their operational life.

It is hoped by using natural gas to provide electricity and steam, the K4 plant would adhere to Environment Agency industrial emission regulations due to begin in 2020.

The output of the proposed plant means it would require approval by the secretary of state via the Planning Inspectorate.

Graham Appleby, K4 project manager for DS Smith, said: "K4 will be a more efficient power supply for the mill to replace our K1 plant, as well as provide sustainability benefits in line

with our company objectives.

"The new plant ensures we can meet the tightening Environment Agency standards regard-ing industrial emissions.

We look forward to discussing our proposals at our forthcoming exhibitions and encourage people to send us their views.

The public exhibitions will run at Kemsley Village Hall, Ridham Avenue, Kemsley, on Thursday, November 9, from 12.30pm to 5.30pm, and Saturday, November 11, from 9am to 2pm.

Another power station is being built by Wheelabrator next to the mill off Barge Way.

It will create electricity by burning waste and will also provide steam to the mill.

£30m bid to pay for road improvement

■ From front page for new housing. At Swale's full council meeting last month, Cllr Tony Winckless (Lab) asked Cllr Mike Cosgrove (Con), cabinet member for regeneration, for an update on how proposed improvements to the junction were progressing.

His question came bearing in mind additional traffic that will be generated from 1,160 extra homes due to be built north west of Sittingbourne, between the railway line and the A249.

Cllr Cosgrove said: "There are ongoing discussions with land-owners with regard to the potential developer contributions towards improvements to the Grovehurst junction to meet the traffic needs generated by those particular developments.

He added that, in parallel to this, a bid had been made to the Housing and Infrastructure Fund for a major redesign of the Grovehurst junction at an esti-

mated cost of £30m.

He said the improvement works were needed so the junction would be able to "cater for potential traffic growth demands beyond the current Local Plan period and for any future proposals to complete the Northern Relief Road and Southern Relief Road"

Kent County Council is waiting to discover if its bid has been successful.

Controversial building plot under review

Revised plans have been submitted for a controversial building project in Newington.

The former Newington Working Men's Club in the High Street has been demolished to make way for new homes.

It had become an eyesore and was knocked down in June last year, without planning permission, but an application for nine three-bedroom homes and one three-bedroom maisonette was approved a month later.

The new plans have been put in after minor changes were made to features, including roof height.

The original application was granted with 23 conditions.




K4 is a 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project' and we must therefore seek a Development Consent Order from the Secretary of State in order to build the new plant.

The design and layout of the K4 plant is still being finalised but we expect it will comprise a collection of buildings surrounding a larger structure which contains the gas turbine, with a single chimney.


K4 would replace the outdated and inefficient K1 CHP plant already operational at the Kemsley Mill and our proposal would therefore reduce emissions from the mill.

K4 will be powered by natural gas delivered by an existing pipeline and will therefore only require occasional maintenance vehicles when operational.

The Development Consent Order application will be accompanied by a full Environmental Impact Assessment, which will assess the environmental effects of the proposed K4 development.

Power plant firm pledges \$50,000 for good causes

Community groups are set to benefit from £50,000 given by the developer of Swale's newest power station.

Construction of Wheelabrator's K3 energy plant has started at Kemsley Mill, off Swale Way, Sittingbourne. The operator has

announced a community benefit fund to be awarded to charities and community organisations to help boost projects in the region.

The company's UK managing director Paul Green said: "Wheelabrator Technologies is committed to playing an active role in local communities supporting and investing in civic and charitable organisations, local schools and environmental causes, while contributing to increased economic growth and enhanced quality of life in the communities in which we operate.

'We believe our social responsibility begins with the communities in which our facilities operate and our customers and employees live.

Once the energy-from-waste K3 combined heat and power (CHP) plant is up and running in 2019, it will be able to process up to 550,000 tonnes per year of postrecycled rubbish provided by waste management companies.

The refuse would otherwise have been sent to a landfill or pretreated and exported to Europe. When fully operational, the

plant will generate nearly 50 megawatts of electricity enough to power 146,180 homes - which will be exported to the National Grid.

The construction phase will

create hundreds of jobs and there will be more than 40 full-time operational roles when it opens.

The site is also expected to provide a multi-million pound economic boost to local businesses and contractors

Steam produced by K3 will be supplied directly to the neighbouring Kemsley Paper Mill, helping to reduce owner DS Smith's carbon emissions from the production of recyclable packaging for the retail industry.

DS Smith is looking to build its own CHP plant, known as K4, at the mill. It is consulting with statutory bodies and look to lodge a planning application around the end of March.

Wheelabrator's community benefit fund will be divided over the next two years.

MP's fears on housing allayed

MP Gordon Henderson met the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, Sajid Javid, last week to oppose the government's plan to increase housing targets for

Swale's local plan proposes 776 homes a year, but new govern-ment guidance would increase that figure to 1,054 per year.

Mr Henderson said: "I explained to Mr Javid that Sittingbourne and Sheppey had taken more than its fair share of housing over the past couple of decades and, consequently, some communities had been changed out of all recognition.

"I warned him that I would oppose the government's policy unless it was changed to reflect previous housing growth.

He added: "Mr Javid did make clear the new targets only apply to local authorities that have not yet submitted a local plan. He said since Swale has an approved local plan in place, it will not have to take account of the new guidance until it submits its next local plan, which could be some vears away.'

Mr Henderson said he also briefed Mr Javid on the proposal for a garden village in Sittingbourne, south of the A2, and told him that if Swale council granted planning permission for the development, he would ask him to call in the plan because

A split between Austria and Germany would give Trotsky a trump card in the negotiations. But the South-Western front facing Austria is in Ukrainian hands. If Ukrainia makes a separate peace with the Central Powers, this will primarily affect Austria. The Austro-Russian front ceases to exist, and then Austria, having secured peace for herself, no longer has any direct interest in opposing the excessive German pretensions in Northern Russia, which now protract and complicate the negotiations. This explains the present acute indignation of the Bolsheviks against the Ukrainians, and their determination to overthrow the Kieff Rada.

They are acting both by military force and political stratagem. In Kharkoff they have set up a rival Bolshevik Ukrainian Government, and are trying to agitate among the Ukrainian soldiers. A recent attempt to provoke a rising in Kieff was frustrated by the disarmament of the local Red Guard by the Ukrainian Government. From the north and east Bolshevik forces from time to time make more or less successful raids into Ukrainian territory, and Bolshevik troops from the Roumanian and South-Western front indulge in frequent skirmishes with the Rada's troops within Ukrainia.

Matters are further complicated by the struggle between the Roumanian and Russian troops. The Roumanians are now waging a regular battle with the Ninth Siberian Division near Galatz. Kharkoff, however, is the real centre of the Bolshevik military operations. Here a staff under Antonoff sits in a railway carriage, and, directing its forces against the Ukraine on one side and the Don on the other, tries to cut communication between the two autonomous territories. The forces at Antonoff's disposal consist of sailors, soldiers, Red Guards, and German and Austrian prisoners. A certain success was achieved against the Ukraine in the capture of Poltava Ekaterinoslav, and Alexandrovsk, but the Ukraine has recovered Ekaterinoslav and Alexandrovsk.
