Fewer children play on street says study

NEW research commissioned by UK walking charity, Living Streets has revealed that 60 per cent of children aged four to 11-years-old never play out on their local street. This has gone up from 50 per cent a decade ago.

The YouGov poll asked parents with children in this age group whether their local street was a safe and welcoming place that their child could enjoy, over a third (36 per cent) disagreed.

People were asked what the most noticeable changes to their local streets have been since they were a child, the vast majority said higher traffic volume (74 per cent).

It comes after Department for Transport figures revealed an increase in child pedestrian fatalities last year, from 38 per cent to 58 per cent.

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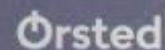

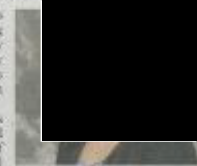
Exam shake-up: How does the reformed GCSE grading work?

THIS year most GCSEs have been graded 1 to 9, as the new system continues to bed in. The reformed GCSEs have been phased in over several years. 2019 has seen over 99 per cent of GCSE entries in England were for reformed GCSEs. It means this summer it is the first time the vast majority of subjects have been graded under the new system. Changes to the formatting of the grading structure to a numerical order began in 2015 with English language, English literature and maths. When these students got their results in 2017, they were the first to get their grades in numerical form. From the start of 2018 all subjects for the new GCSE exams came under the new system meaning by August 2020, all students in England

will receive their grade in numerical form. The reformed GCSE system moves the classification of results to a 1-9 scale replacing the A-G grades. Broadly speaking, grades 7 to 9 are on a par with the former A and A* grades. The 4 to 6 scores correspond with C and B grades in the old system. The 4 grade is a pass, equivalent to a C. The former G to D grades have been replaced by scores ranked 1 to 3 which puts them in the bottom bracket. The shake-up of the exam system, deemed to be the biggest for a generation, is said to be more challenging than the previous approach. Grade 8s are achievable by only the top achievers and are above what would, in the past, have been an A* grade. As such, it is designed to recognise the very highest performing students, so there are fewer grade 9s than there were A*s. Grade 8 straddles the top of the old A and the bottom of the old A*, so there is no direct comparison with the A* grade. According to Ofqual, the Office of Qualifications and Examinations Regulation, which regulates qualifications, examinations and assessments in England, overall GCSE outcomes at grade 4-C in England have remained stable in recent years. This trend has continued this year and shows a slight rise, 67.1 per cent in 2019 compared with 66.6 per cent in 2018.

67 per cent of pupils achieve GCSE pass rate in East Riding

MANY East Riding schools and pupils are celebrating their GCSE results with early indications suggesting secondary schools and academies have maintained the strong position achieved in recent years. Over the past three years numeric grades have replaced letters for the vast majority of subjects and from next year all subjects will be graded from 1 to 9. A grade 4 is equivalent to the old grade C and classed as a 'standard pass'. A grade 5 is classed as a 'strong pass'.

of hard work from students and teachers alike.

"These results have been achieved despite the very low level of funding for East Riding schools from the Department for Education" (compared to other regions of the county). This is down to the hard work of young people and their families supported by dedicated school staff. It is a tribute to the way schools and young people have responded to the challenges of the reformed GCSE examinations."

In the East Riding, provisional outcomes indicate that in 2019 the proportion of students achieving a standard pass of grade 4 or better in English and maths is 67 per cent. The proportion gaining grade 5 (strong pass) is 45 per cent.

Provisional results suggest East Riding schools achieved an attainment 8 score of 48, similar to last year's figure. Progress 8 score is the measure used to determine ranking in secondary school league tables, but this year's figures will not be available from the Department for Education until October 2019. East Riding of Yorkshire Council Cllr Julie Abraham, portfolio holder for children, young people and education, said: "We are delighted to celebrate the achievements of young people throughout the East Riding as they receive their GCSE results. The dedicated professionals working in our schools provide a high quality education for all our young people and today's outcomes are the culmination of many years

Liamie O'Brien, the council's principal improvement adviser, said: "These results are a testament to the hard work of our young people, as well as the dedication and commitment of teachers and support staff in all our schools. We are proud of the accomplishments of young people throughout the East Riding - achieved with the support of their carers and families. We greatly appreciate the hard work of head teachers, teaching and support staff that have contributed to these impressive results."

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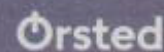

RSPCA warns about puppy farms as complaints soar about the trade. Charlie Bullough looks at the RSPCA's concerns over unscrupulous breeders and sellers and how to thwart them...

How to help beat rogue puppy traders

Complaints about unscrupulous puppy farms which put profit ahead of the health and welfare of dogs are at record levels.

Last year was the worst yet for grievances about the puppy trade in England to the RSPCA's 24-hour emergency hotline.

The charity received 4,357 complaints last year in England - a 390 per cent increase on 2008 when it took

just 890 reports related to the underground industry.

There has been a year-on-year increase in these reports over the past decade as more and more unscrupulous breeders and dealers seek to cash in on a growing puppy market. Dogs of certain breeds can sell for hundreds or even thousands of pounds.

The news comes at a time when there's a spike in people searching for puppies and buying dogs at the begin-

ning of the school holidays.

RSPCA dog welfare expert Lisa Hens said: "It is distressing that we are still seeing so many reports about puppy farms but part of this increase is probably due to people being more savvy about what to look out for when getting a pet."

The charity has been calling for government action to tackle the "dodgy" trade in puppies. More than 100,000 people signed its petition about the issue.

Lisa added: "After the RSPCA campaigned for years, the Government last year finally introduced tougher licensing regulations around the selling of animals - including breeding and selling dogs - which we hope will help crackdown on this multi-million pound industry."

"The Government has also committed to a ban on the third-party sales of puppies and kittens which, alongside tougher licensing conditions

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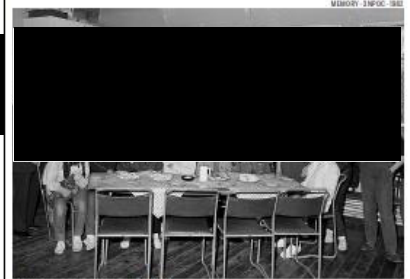

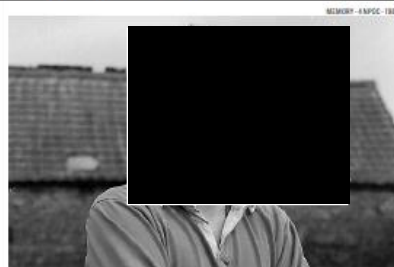

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EU has 'single united position' as Johnson talks with leaders

Brussels insists its unity will not be undermined by UK premier's strategy

THE EUROPEAN Union retained its "single united position" over Brexit yesterday as Boris Johnson prepared for talks with the leaders of its most influential nations.

The Prime Minister met German Chancellor Angela Merkel in Berlin yesterday and is due to meet French President Emmanuel Macron in Paris today in his first overseas trip since entering Number 10.

On Saturday, Mr Johnson will be at the G7 summit, where he will meet other world leaders including US President Donald Trump.

But Brussels insisted Mr Johnson would not be able to undermine the EU's unity by holding bilateral meetings with the German and French leaders.

European Commission spokeswoman Natasha Bertaud said: "The EU has had from the outset - and continues to have now - one single, united position on Brexit matters."

Ireland's Foreign Minister, Simon Coveney, said a no-deal Brexit is much more likely now than it has ever been as a result of Mr Johnson's approach.

The PM has called for the backstop - the contingency measure designed to ensure a soft border with Ireland remains in all circumstances - to be scrapped.

Mr Coveney said yesterday: "There is a consensus in the approach that the British Government is taking and that consensus is that they are making a deal far more likely."

"There is a reason why Boris Johnson is visiting Berlin today and Paris tomorrow - to try to talk to EU leaders about finding a way forward."

"I think he will get a very cautious message from EU leaders that the negotiations over the last two to three years are not going to

be abandoned now." Speaking on RTE Radio One, Mr Coveney said the Irish would not be "surrendered at the end of this because a British prime minister has ruled out a no-deal line."

He added: "That's not a reasonable approach."

Former minister Ed Vaizey suggested Mr Johnson was "just going through the motions" with his European trip this week and was "half-hearted on getting no-deal".

Cabinet minister Robert Jenrick said he hoped European leaders "will come to the table because it's in our mutual interest" to make changes to reach a deal before the UK leaves on October 31, with or without an agreement.

The Commission Secretary said: "I think the EU would be delighted to under-estimate our determination to do so or the degree of preparations that we are undertaking at the moment."

Mr Johnson has reiterated his opposition to the Northern Irish backstop, saying he will not support any withdrawal agreement that includes it.

As talks get underway in Berlin yesterday, Mrs Merkel told Mr Johnson the European Union would be prepared for a no-deal Brexit.

The German Chancellor said she wanted a Brexit outcome which allowed the UK and EU to continue to have "very close relations" - but acknowledged that the bloc had to be ready for the possibility of Britain exiting not without a deal.

"We are also prepared for a no deal, as should this happen, this will or can happen, we are prepared for it. Obviously we also think of the many citizens, British citizens living currently in other countries of the European Union who also have to deal with the situation should Britain, from one day to the next, no longer be a member of the European Union."

Mr Johnson, whose stance on the backstop has been met with a wall of resistance in Brussels, insisted he wanted a Brexit deal.

But he added: "Clearly we cannot accept the current Withdrawal Agreement, arrangements that either divide the UK or lock us into the regulatory and trading arrangements of the EU, the legal order of the EU, without the UK being any say on those matters."

Minister insists port delays can be avoided in no-deal

TRADE

THERE SHOULD be no significant delay to the flow of goods through ports after Brexit if "we all do the right thing", Michael Gove has said.

The Cabinet minister in charge of no-deal planning visited Holyhead Port in North Wales to meet with organisations working on the trade route to Northern Ireland, Ireland and the rest of the world.

Mr Gove said predictions of a three-month "mishmash" of ports in the event of a no-deal Brexit, as revealed in the leaked Operation Yellowhammer documents, were "the absolute worst case".

He said: "I'm confident that, if we all do the right thing, on October 31 we will be able to ensure that goods can flow in and out of ports like Holyhead without any significant delay. There are a number of scenarios, there is a worst case and we are trying very hard to reduce the risk of that worst case materialising."

"I think the steps that we've taken over the course of the last three weeks and more steps that we'll be taking in the next few weeks and months will ensure that we reduce the risk even further. One of them is making sure that traders have all the information and the systems that they need in order to be able to export."

Mr Gove was given a tour of the country's second busiest port, which was being used by both freight vehicles and holiday-makers on their way to Dublin, and met with representatives who run organisations from there.

He also visited transportation company Graymold Shipping and met leaders of North Wales coastguard.

Corbyn in cross-party appeal for 'no-deal' summit

LABOUR LEADER Jeremy Corbyn has urged senior politicians to a meeting to discuss averting a no-deal Brexit.

In a letter, Mr Corbyn said: "The country is heading into a constitutional and political storm, such a vital that we must urgently, before Parliament returns."

"The chaos and dislocation of Boris Johnson's no-deal Brexit is real and threatening, as the Government's lead negotiator

Yellowhammer dossier makes crystal clear. That's why we must do everything we can to stop it."

The meeting is scheduled to take place on August 27 at 10am.

The letter is addressed to SNP Westminster leader Ian Blackford, Liberal Democrat leader Jo Swinson, Commons Pled Cyners leader Liz Saville Roberts, Green Party MP Caroline Lucas and Change UK leader Anna Soubry.

Rome-based Tory MP

Gate Babé, Dominic Grieve and Caroline Spurgeon are also copied in, as is former Conservative minister Nick Boles, who resigned the whip in opposition to the Government's approach to Brexit.

It was announced yesterday that Tory grades and vocal no-deal opponents Sir Oliver Letwin, a former minister and shadow chancellor who was also copied in on the letter, is to stand down as an MP at the next election.

EU silliness has irritated many, says Sir David

SIR DAVID Attenborough has said that many people in the UK are "fed up" with the European Union.

In an interview with Italian newspaper *La Repubblica*, the naturalist and broadcaster said the EU may not have paid enough attention to what people care about and has allowed itself to do things that irritate people.

While some people in South America and Africa "are faced with hideous problems, meanwhile we are occupied with silly squabbles about Brexit", he added.

"I think that the irritation of the ways in which the European community has interfered with people's lives on silly levels or silly issues has been a bit of people who don't actually understand what the advantages and the disadvantages are," he told the paper.

EU migration to UK 'is higher than previous estimates'

EU NET migration to the UK is higher than previously thought, the Office for National Statistics has admitted, prompting experts to claim that the numbers have been "systematically" under-estimated.

The ONS said it under-estimated levels of EU migration to the UK, affecting figures on the number of migrants from EU countries - like Poland - since

2016. Migration from countries outside the EU has been over-estimated, the ONS added.

It said: "In the year ending March 2019 - the latest period at which we have adjusted data available - EU net migration is around 16 per cent higher than our published estimate. In the year ending March 2018, net migration is around 20 per cent lower than our published estimate."

As a result, the ONS has downgraded the status of its quarterly immigration figures it compiled to "preliminary".

Immigration experts at the University of Oxford said the latest ONS analysis showed official data has been "systematically under-estimating net migration from EU countries".

The ONS said: "Our research has clearly shown that no single source of data can fully reflect the complexity of migration."

"However, when we look at all available sources together

it provides a much clearer picture. Whilst we go through this transformation process, we have sought to re-classify our migration statistics as 'preliminary' to reflect the uncertainty in our data."

Official statistics can be labelled as "preliminary" when they are going through development and do not yet meet the quality standards required of "national statistics". "National statistics" are expected to meet a set

of requirements including a high degree of accuracy and reliability.

The ONS said it hopes to seek re-designation to national statistics status next year.

Johnson's girlfriend barred from US

She had applied for permission to go to the US in the next few days as part of her job with environmental group Greenpeace but the request was blocked by the American authorities, the Daily Mail reported.

The problem could be linked to a trip to Somaliland last year.

Council invests £6m in low-emission vehicles

TRANSPORT: Almost £6m is to be invested in new low-emission vehicles by Barnsley Council to try to get the town ahead of a Government target to meet carbon neutral status.

The council is to buy a fleet of 149 new vehicles, with a quarter of them expected to be fully electric. The change means another £100,000 will also have to be invested in installing 30 charging points at council premises.

Fun time for a football club... and a fight to save others from same fate

As Bury are expelled from football league, MP calls for new laws to give safeguards against 'rogue owners'

AS THE dust settled on the first expulsion of a football league club since 1991, and as fans left their scars by the hundreds in a matter of respect, politicians were galvanised into action to ensure that Bury's fate would be one that no other club would suffer.

New laws that would safeguard clubs from "rogue owners" were revealed urgently, along with a review of the role of the English Football League had played in Bury's demise, the MP Durian Collins said.

Calling for a full review of the off-pitch drama at Gigg Lane in the former Lancashire cotton town, Mr Collins, chairman of the Commons Digital, Culture, Media and Sport Committee, claimed that as expelling the club from competition, the league had let down Bury's fans.

His membership was withdrawn, after 125 years, at 10pm on Tuesday, following the collapse of a takeover and after the club had failed to demonstrate it could pay its debts.

Warning that another "crisis club", neighbouring Bolton Wanderers, might have followed Bury into oblivion, Mr Collins tweeted that his committee would discuss next week "how we can review the role of the football authorities in this crisis and what new powers are needed to set apart rogue owners and directors of clubs".

The committee failed to give a green light to the appointment of an independent regulator for football.

Bury's owner, Steve Dale, had been given until 10pm on Tuesday to come up with a plan for paying the club's debts or to sell it to someone who could.

It had been hoped that a London-based investor, C&N Sporting Risk, would complete a takeover, but it pulled out of the deal 30 minutes before the deadline, citing concerns over its confusing club structure.

Mr Dale then claimed he had received three bids for the club, and later urged the league to reinvest its decision.

Fresh hope for saving Wanderers

ROCKY WANDERERS have been held by their administrator that plans to shut down the club have been put on hold, it is understood. Bolton are on the verge of liquidation after the English Football League gave administrator Paul Appleton 14 days to either sell the Sky Bet League One club or prove they can be funded for the rest of the season.

Appleton revealed on Monday there was no money left to fund the club after a takeover bid by the Football Supporters Federation had stalled.

That continued on Tuesday as Appleton revealed Bolton would meet the 14-day deadline to announce a deal had been approved, but progress came too late to stop the EFL enforcing a 14-day notice to withdraw the club's membership.

However, following overnight talks, the main issues that had halted the completion of Football Supporters Federation takeover have now been resolved and a deal could be completed soon.

"We believe an independent administrator should be brought in," he said.

"We also want a secret ballot of all EFL clubs to ask if they would follow clubs Bolton and Bury FC to be taken out of the league. I don't think they would want that."

With no right of appeal, Bury can only write to the league's

board to ask for a change of heart. With little prospect of that, the local MP, Ian Lewis, joined the growing chorus for a rethink, claiming on Twitter that the organisation had "proof" of funds from a credible global organisation which has agreed to purchase with Steve Dale.

Meanwhile, the league encountered a hiccup. Debbie Jensen, said she was "dismayed" at what "was undoubtedly one of the darkest days in the league's recent history".

She has promised an investigation into what happened. She denied, however, that the league had any other option, saying it could not force Mr Dale, or any other owner, to sell.

"It was his decision not to sell. The EFL doesn't run football clubs," she said.

Asked whether the league should have allowed more time to the Bury of late holders who emerged after the C&N deal, Ms Jensen said: "It was not in any situation do you say enough?"

"We've already postponed Bury's first five games and each of those impacts other teams. Do we postpone six, seven, eight, nine - all what point do you stop?"

"We have duty of care to the 23 other clubs in League One and equally to all of the clubs in the Championship and League Two."

Ms Jensen repeated her commitment to the government review she has started, and which she hopes will focus on how clubs manage their costs.

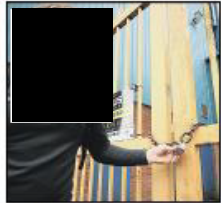
She also said she would listen to the growing calls for an independent regulator.

The Sports Minister, Nigel Adams, said Bury's expulsion was "a very dark day for English football" and "a tragedy for the fans".

The England Women's manager, Phil Neville, described the impact of the club's demise on his own family. His mother, Jill, was club secretary, and his late father, Neville, was a director with a stand around the pitch.

There are people in that football club that are ingrained in the football, in the fanbase. They wake up this morning with no football club," he said.

TIMELINE

- **1902:** Club founded on April 24 through a merger between two churches, the Bury Wanderers and Bury Corinthians. The club moved a mile to Digby Lane on the East of Bury's estate. Gigg Lane remains their home ground and is one of the oldest football grounds in the world.
- **1951-52:** Bury enter the FA Cup for the first time.
- **1952:** Bury secure foundation members of the Lancashire League. They were back-to-back champions of that competition in 1950-51.
- **1952:** The club wins the FA Cup again, beating Exeter in the final. Before the match, chairman J. Hughes was reported to have kissed the players by saying "We shall do better. In fact, you are the Shakers!" The nickname remains to this day. The 1952 Lancashire Cup was the first of its kind to be strictly to 2017-18.
- **1954:** The Shakers are admitted to the Football League. They win the Second Division title in 1954-55 by nine points, gaining promotion to the top tier.
- **1990:** Bury win the FA Cup.

- **1992:** The club claims the FA Cup again, beating Derby 2-0.
- **1993:** Bury come fourth in the Second Division - their highest ever top tier finish.
- **1993:** The club is relegated from the top level and has not returned since.
- **1993:** Bury ship out of the Second Division for the first time.
- **1997:** For the first time Bury are relegated to the fourth tier.
- **1998:** Two successive promotions under manager Stuart Pearce lift Bury to the second tier for the first time in 20 years.
- **2001-02:** Financial problems lead to the collapse of EFL Digital take Bury into administration. Supporters raise enough money for the club to survive.
- **2003:** Bury become the first club to score 1,000 goals in each of the top four leagues.
- **2012:** The Shakers have a transfer embargo placed on them due to financial trouble caused by their administration.
- **2018-19:** Bury finish second in League Two and are promoted to the third tier. Businessman Steve Dale buys the club in December 2018 and begins to rebuild the club to avoid a winding-up order. But financial trouble returns in mid-2019.

Down and then out...the clubs who have faced a similar struggle

CRISIS
THE DRAMA at Bury's Gigg Lane has been played out in the backrooms of many other football clubs over the years.

In June 1997 - two years after a fan-led challenge to a man named John Voe - Doncaster Rovers

went wound up in the High Court with debts of £5.9m. It was eventually bought out of administration and now plays in League One at the new Excite Keepmoat Stadium.

In 2000, debts forced Halifax Town AFC into administration. The club has moved relega-

tion on the last day of the season but was wound up after being removed from the Conference League. However, a new club, FC Halifax Town, was accepted into the Northern Premier League in the following season.

There was to be no happy ending for Bradford Park Avenue, it

had played in the first division of English football during the First World War but by the early 1930s had fallen into the Northern Premier League. It went into liquidation in 1936 with debts of £20,000, and was re-formed as a Sunday league team.

A new club with the same

name was formed in 1937, and currently plays in the National League North.

Perhaps the most famous club to collapse was Accrington Stanley, in 1976, following financial difficulties caused by the purchase of a new stand. It spent four seasons in non-league football be-

fore being disbanded, though a new club was formed in 1976. Macclesfield was the last club to go out of business while still in the Football League, but a number of former league clubs have kicked since. They include Darlington, Buxton and Sharncliffe. Macclesfield and Chester City.

Drink-drive crash toll hits eight-year high

BIRMINGHAM: Hundreds of people were evacuated after a gas leak near the main entrance to Cadbury's Bourneville site.

West Midlands Fire Service said it responded to a 1093 call to an incident off Bourneville Lane at about 23:50pm yesterday.

It is thought the leak was caused after a digger damaged a gas pipe, the brigade added.

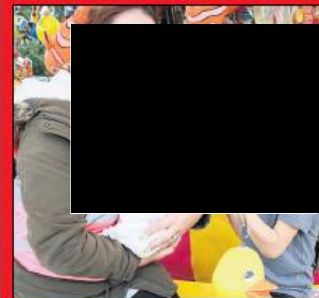

FUNDRAISING FIGHT CONTINUES TO SAVE ICONIC WHELDALE

A bid to save an iconic coal barge has raised more than £7,000, but there is still a long way to go for volunteers behind the rescue mission.

The Yorkshire Waterways Heritage Society said it has been working "extremely hard" on its plans to save the Wheldale Tug which is up for sale after the Yorkshire Waterways Museum went into liquidation earlier this year.

The amount they need to buy the barge and its three compartment boats at Goole Docks is £35,000, and volunteers said the purchase would just be the start of a long renovation project.

A spokesperson for the society said: "Buying Wheldale would be the starting point as given that we have been successful we will need to get her out of the canal so that she can be surveyed and repaired."

"She weighs 55 tonnes so

no crane in Goole docks is capable of lifting her. Space would also be needed to store her for some time to allow our very able volunteer engineers to work on her.

"Alternatively a local dry dock would be needed but we are struggling to find a suitable location. Discussions are ongoing with our supporters and we fully expect to find a way forward".

Thousands of hours had been put into restoring the coal barge before it was used to ferry museum visitors around the docks.

But it now needs more vital renovation works to give it another lease of life, and the vision set out by volunteers is to see it set sail across the water once again.

To boost their fundraising efforts, the volunteers have relaunched a paperback edition of a book about the tug entitled

'Railway on the Water'.

A spokesperson said: "Author Mike Clarke has generously given permission for the Yorkshire Waterways Heritage Society to relaunch 'Railway on the Water' to raise funds for the activities of the society."

"The demise of the Yorkshire Waterways Museum in May 2019 has meant that those crucial heritage vessels have

been put up for sale and could be sold to buyers outside of Yorkshire.

"The heritage society wants to ensure that does not happen".

There are also plans for a hardback edition of the book and the society are appealing for business sponsors.

A spokesperson added: "The Yorkshire Waterways Heritage Society would love to hear from

local Yorkshire folk who remember the days of the 'Tom Puddings' when coal was a major export through the port of Goole.

"You might have been a former employee of British Waterways or ABP or perhaps the relative of someone involved in the coal trade or simply living near the canals."

"We would like to record

what you remember so that future generations can learn about times gone by".

Humber Bridge skate in aid of hedgehogs

A 12-year-old boy and his dad are planning to inline skate the iconic Humber Bridge four times to raise money for a local hedgehog charity.

Elliot Jeffery and dad Dave, who are both from Market Weighton, will be taking on the challenge on Saturday, November 1 to raise vital funds for The Market Weighton Hedgehogs.

The local hedgehog charity is run by close friend to Elliot and Dave, Linda Cook, who is dedicated to making the town of Market Weighton safer for hedgehogs. With the funds raised from the Humber Bridge challenge, the animal charity are hoping to create accessible hibernation houses across the town and produce education packs around hedgehog safety for schools in the local area.

Speaking about the challenge, Dave said: "We are skating four times across the Humber Bridge, which would make it around five miles. Elliot has been skating for over a year and really wants to help support Linda's project, so I'm more than happy to help him attempt this."

He has volunteered with the charity before helping with

fundraising in the local supermarket and recent turndola's.

"Elliot came up with the idea to do it, and he's never done anything like this before. Inline skating isn't for everyone, so as something a little different, and adding the extra crossings just adds to the challenge."

"I skated across it a long time ago but this time as four crossings. We estimate it taking a couple of hours, but that will depend on things like the wind up there."

The Market Weighton Hedgehog group was set up around six months ago to give the opportunity for hedgehogs to thrive within the town. The idea was to help provide a safe space for them to live, educate local residents, and build the group as a known portal for information and resources.

The group has gone from strength to strength in recent times providing new feeding stations, and acting as an invaluable supporter to the neighbouring hedgehog rescue centres.

With this additional funding, further expansion into school visits are being planned, with additional external gatherings for adults to

understand how they can all help the creatures.

Speaking about the creation of Market Weighton Hedgehogs, owner, Linda Cook, said: "I've always thought about doing it and I've done bits and bobs before for hedgehogs in my garden."

"You hear lots of stories about them being in decline and you don't see them around as much as you do when I was little."

Mrs Cook says she works closely with hedgehog hospitals and does foster some, but most of her work is based on making sure Market Weighton is hedgehog friendly.

She added: "I want to make sure there is enough food and water and everyone in Market Weighton is aware of them and what they should do if they find one that is poorly, or what to do in their garden and how to avoid the nests when they are gardening."
