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## 1. The purpose of community consultation

At Ørsted, we want to hear your views. This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) explains how we intend to consult with you on our proposals for the Hornsea Project Four Offshore Wind Farm ('Hornsea Project Four'), as required under the Planning Act 2008 (the 'Planning Act').

This document outlines the pre-application consultation for Hornsea Project Four. Ørsted recognises consultation to be a vital step in the development of our proposals. The pre-application consultation provides the opportunity for the local community to engage with and comment on the project as the project plans evolve.

We want to listen to your views and work with you to develop our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. This will allow us to develop our plans responsibly and in manner that supports local community interests.

## 2. Background

We are a renewable energy company taking tangible action to create a world that runs entirely on green energy. We have invested significantly in the UK, where we develop, construct and operate offshore wind farms and innovative waste-to-energy technology.

The UK is our largest market and we currently have 11 operational offshore wind farms here. We have three operational offshore wind farms of the east coast which are Westmost Rough, Lincs and Race Bank Offshore Wind Farms.

Our Hornsea Project One and Two Offshore Wind Farms are currently under construction and are situated in the southern North Sea. We have recently submitted an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to develop Hornsea Project Three Offshore Wind Farm.

This SoCC has been produced solely for Hornsea Project Four, which is in the early pre-application stage for a DCO situated to the western edge of the former Hornsea Zone (west of Hornsea Project One, Hornsea Project Two and Hornsea Project Three). We will provide full details about what this means from a community consultation perspective in the following sections.

## 3. The planning process

With a proposed capacity of over 100 megawatts (MW), Hornsea Project Four is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). Our project must therefore apply for a DCO through the NSIP planning process. Consent for the onshore army offsites and onshore cable routes, and onshore and offshore substation, will be included in the DCO.

The DCO application will be dealt with by the Planning Inspectorate (PINS), the agency responsible for managing the examination process for NSIPs. It will then, if accepted, be examined by an independent Examining Authority Panel, who will then make a recommendation to the Secretary of State (SoS) for Business Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS). The SoS will then review and comment on the before making a decision on whether to grant a DCO.

As part of the examination process, we must satisfy PINS that our pre-application consultation has been undertaken. This includes identifying statutory consultees for the proposed consultation, under Section 42 of the Planning Act, as explained in Section 5 of the SoCC. It also includes setting out how we propose to consult with the community in the vicinity of the project under Section 47 of the Planning Act, with this SoCC being published in accordance with this requirement.

## 4. Hornsea Project Four Offshore Wind Farm

The project will be located approximately 90 km offshore and will be to the west of Hornsea Project One, Two and Three. The project has an Agreement for Lease (AfL) for an area of up to 800 km<sup>2</sup>. If built, Hornsea Project Four will comprise up to 180 wind turbines and provide clean, renewable energy to power UK homes.

Electricity generated by the offshore wind farm will be brought ashore via underground subsea cables which will be buried offshore at a point known as 'landfall', before connecting into an onshore substation and the national grid. We are currently in discussions with National Grid over a proposed grid connection at Cayton Bay.

We are currently assessing potential high-level cable route options and various landfall areas. This will be published in the Scoping Report and is something we will be seeking your opinion on as part of the consultation and planning process.



## 5. Who will we consult?

We will consult with individuals and communities living within the vicinity of the land and/or sea areas that will be affected by the project. We will also consult with those who are interested in or may feel impacted by our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. We encourage interested parties to submit their feedback via our communication lines, which include our dedicated project email address ([@hornseaprojectfour.co.uk](mailto:hornseaprojectfour.co.uk)) and Telephone Information line (0800 8109 3030). Interested parties can also register their interest at our project website ([www.hornsea-project-four.co.uk/hornsea-project-four/](http://www.hornsea-project-four.co.uk/hornsea-project-four/)) to receive regular updates on the project and our proposals.

Our consultation will also involve relevant parish and town councils, area committees, community groups, organisations representing local businesses, communities and tourist boards. We will work with your Local Planning Authority (LPA) East Riding of Yorkshire Council, among others, to identify key community groups. In addition, we will also be discussing our proposed project with a range of statutory and non-statutory consultees including:

- Local authorities – this includes the host authority and neighbouring local authorities
- Owners, tenants and occupiers of the land affected by the DCO application
- Commercial stakeholders (including asset owners and the fisheries industry)
- Environmental bodies


## 6. What will we consult on?

- Social (e.g. Public Rights of Way; noise and vibration during construction)


More information will be available regarding technical aspects of the project as our proposals develop, which will then be discussed at our local information events.

## 8. Environmental information

In accordance with Regulation 12 of the Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017, a Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will be produced to inform the preparation of the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for Hornsea Project Four in accordance with Regulation 5 of The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017. The methodology and scope of the EIA will be agreed with the relevant regulatory and environmental bodies, the SoS, and your LPA.

The following reports (listed below) will be consulted on as part of the BA process and as the DCO application is prepared:

**Scoping Report –** The Scoping Report will be informed by desk-based research on the existing offshore and onshore environments in the location of the proposed project and supported by surveys and data analysis. This report will present the key project parameters, otherwise known as the Project Envelope, which includes all associated onshore and offshore infrastructure and possible elements that make up the project. These elements will be further developed and refined during the project development process. Typical elements of an offshore wind farm are provided in the figure to the left. The report will also describe the methodologies that will be applied to further characterise the existing environments and how any potential impacts will be assessed.<sup>2</sup>

**Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) –** Following the publication of the Scoping Report, a PEIR will be produced, which will provide an initial statement of the environmental information available for the Hornsea Project Four study area. The PEIR will build on the information provided in the Scoping Report and will be refined through the consultation process, it will incorporate the findings of the surveys and initial assessments and will enable consultees to develop an informed view of the potential environmental effects. We will be seeking feedback from local communities and other stakeholders on the PEIR (see the consultation timeline in Section 10 for more details).

**Environmental Statement (ES) –** The ES will advance the content of the PBR and continue to incorporate the responses from the consultation and results of the surveys undertaken. It will also describe any changes made to the project and any mitigation measures that need to be implemented. The ES will form part of the DCO application for submission.

Dates of when these reports will be published can be found in Section 10 of this SoCC, which displays the consultation timeline. Copies of these reports will be made available as we conduct the public consultation.

2. A statutory process in the form of a Scoping Opinion conducted by RIB will result in feedback on the findings from local communities and other stakeholders.

Our project must therefore apply for a DCO through the HSIP planning process. Consents for the offshore areas, turbines and onshore cables, sites, and onshore and onshore substation, will be included in the DCO.

The DCO application will liaise with the Planning Inspectorate (PI), the agency responsible for managing the examination process for NSIPs. If, and then, it is accepted, by examining an independent Examining Authority Panel, who will then make a recommendation to the Secretary of State's Grid for Business Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS). BEIS will then review and comment on the before making a decision on whether to grant a DCO.

As part of the examination process, we must satisfy PIHS that our pre-application consultation has been undertaken. 

The methodology and scope of the EIA will be agreed with the relevant regulatory and environmental bodies, the SoG, and your LPA.

The following reports listed will be consulted on as part of the EIA process and as the DCO application is prepared:

**Scoping Report** – The Scoping Report will be informed by desk-based research on the existing offshore and onshore environments in the location of the proposed project and supported by surveys and data analysis. This report will present the key project parameters, otherwise known as the Project Envelope, which includes all associated onshore and offshore infrastructure and possible elements that make up the project. These elements will be subject to further refinement throughout the project development process.

Typical elements of an offshore wind farm are presented in the figure above. The report will also describe the methodologies that will be applied to further characterise the existing environments and how any potential impacts will be assessed.

1. A separate Habitats Regulation Assessment in relation to nature conservation areas (NAs) for species conservation status will also be prepared.  
2. A statutory licence in the form of a Building Consent issued by PHE will result in feedback on this plan's local consequences and other interested parties.

## 9. Public consultation

The consultation process for the proposed Hornsea Project Four will be an iterative process, the design of the project develops in response to the consultation. The following consultation stages shape the consultation timeline, as presented in Section 10 of the SoCC.

### Stakeholder briefings in Autumn/Winter 2016

Following publication of the SoCC, we will introduce community members to our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. This will include initial meetings with members of the community and stakeholders.

### Local Information events – Autumn/Winter 2016

Local information events will take place in October 2016. These will provide interested members of the local community with the opportunity to view the early stage proposals and submit community feedback. This will help shape the proposals for Hornsea Project Four, where only developed plans will be presented at local information events immediately preceding the Summer/Autumn 2016.

### Local Information events – Summer/Autumn 2016

Local information events and further consultation will take place independently in Summer/Autumn 2016 and will run for at least 20 days. This voluntary consultation, in accordance with Section 17 of the Planning Act, will allow us to update you on the project plans and show you how they have emerged responsive to feedback gathered from the consultation. At this stage, you will also be able to provide feedback on our PEIR, as described in Section 8. More specific details of the further consultation will be published through the appropriate channels listed in Section 14.

## DRIVER FLED CRASH LEAVING SON IN CAR

A man who left his son in the wreckage of a car crash after allegedly drink driving was just one of many incidents the Goole policing team shared this weekend.

Residents got the rare chance to see exactly what local policing involved when the team shared details of their call outs and patrols on Twitter.

Modern slavery, drink driving, domestic abuse, sexual assault and anti-social behaviour were all in a day's work for a Goole police officer.

The crushed car incident took place on Saturday evening on High Street in Airmyn, when a grey Ford Focus came off the road, hit a large post, and came to a stop in the front garden of a house, knocking over a tree and landing in a large hedge.

Humberside Police, who were live-Tweeting their call outs this weekend, said on Twitter: "Driver made off from the scene before police arrived. Patrols carrying out an area search for him now. Passenger being treated by ambulance at scene, having told officers that his father who was driving whilst under the influence, left him there,

Injured?"

Now, Humberside Police have said they will be investigating the collision and will be speaking to the driver.

A spokesperson from the force said: "A 21-year-old man who was the passenger

sustained minor injuries in the collision. The driver fled the scene. We are investigating the circumstances of the collision and have identified the driver who will be interviewed as part of our investigations."

The project will be located approximately 90 km offshore and will be to the west of Hornsea Project One, Two and Three. The project has an Agreement for Lease (AfL) for an area of up to 850 km<sup>2</sup>. If built, Hornsea Project Four will comprise up to 150 wind turbines and provide clean, renewable energy to power UK homes.

Electricity generated by the offshore wind farm will be brought ashore via underground subsea cables which will be buried ashore at a point known as 'landfall' before connecting into an onshore substation and the national grid. We are currently in discussions with National Grid over a proposed grid connection at Croyde Beach.

We are currently reviewing potential high-level cable route options and various landfall sites. This will be presented in the Scoping Report and is something we will be seeking your opinion on as part of the consultation and planning process.

## 5. Who will we consult?

We will consult with individuals and communities living within the vicinity of the land affected by the DCO application. This consultation is also open to anyone who may be interested in or may be impacted by our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. 

The methodology and scope of the EIA will be agreed with the relevant regulatory and environmental bodies, the SoS and your LPA.

The following reports listed will be consulted on as part of the EIA process and as the DCO application is prepared:

**Scoping Report** – This Scoping Report will be informed by desk-based research on the existing offshore and onshore environments in the location of the proposed project and supported by surveys and data analysis. This report will present the key project parameters, otherwise known as the Project Envelope, which includes all associated onshore and offshore infrastructure and possible elements that make up the project. These elements will be subject to further refinement throughout the project development process.

Typical elements of an offshore wind farm are presented in the figure above. The report will also describe the methodologies that will be applied to further characterise the existing environments and how any potential impacts will be assessed.

1. A separate Habitats Regulation Assessment to refine the nature conservation areas (NAs) Surveyor's conservation strategy will only be produced.
2. A statutory process in the form of a Strategic Options Consultation by PPG will result in feedback on this from local communities and other stakeholders.

The core consultation and assessment components of the Core and detailed phases will be refined as the project design develops. All of the projects key review processes and public events will commence when the project is granted a DCO, these are listed below:

**Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR)** – Following the publication of the Scoping Report, a PEIR will be produced, where all immediate environmental statement of the environmental information available for the Hornsea Project Four study area. **Environmental Statement (ES)** – The ES will enhance the content of the PEIR and continue to incorporate the responses from the consultation and results of the surveys undertaken. It will also describe any changes made to the project and any mitigation measures that need to be implemented. The ES will form part of the DCO application for submission.

Details of when these reports will be published can be found in Section 10 of the SoCC, which details the consultation timeline. Copies of these reports will be made available to the public consultees.

## 9. Public consultation

The consultation process for the proposed Hornsea Project Four will be an iterative one as the design of the project develops in response to the consultation. The following consultation process shapes the consultation timeline as presented in Section 10 of the SoCC:



## Credibility fears over Ofsted's inspections cuts

Watchdog could be seen as 'irrelevant'

OFSTED'S CREDIBILITY is at risk as its inspections are review. MPs have warned, with the body too focused on costs over assumptions about effectiveness of schools.

Significant cuts to Ofsted's budget have seen a 52 per cent drop in the amount spent by the body on inspections since 1999, a report by the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) has said.

The result has been too high a focus on costs, the report concludes, alongside "clear shortcomings" in Ofsted's performance with too few inspections and an inability to meet targets.

Meg Hillier MP, a spokeswoman of the PAC, said: "Cuts to Ofsted's budget have undermined families' ability to make informed decisions about schools."

"If the level of inspection continues to be eroded there is a risk that Ofsted will come to be perceived by parents, Parliament and taxpayers as not relevant or worse, simply a fig leaf for

Government failures on school standards. Should this happen, its credibility will evaporate."

The report, critiquing the current system, questioned whether a single day for routine inspections on schools rated good was enough to gain a measure of its effectiveness. And a policy which means outstanding schools are exempt from routine re-inspections

and an inability to meet targets.

Ofsted Chief Inspector, Amanda Spielman, said: "As with all of the public sector, we have had to do more with less.

"However, I remain confident that our inspections provide parents, schools and the Government with the assurance they need about school standards and that we do this in a way that compares very favourably in terms of quality and value for money with school inspection regimes internationally."

"However, as I said at the hearing, we have reached the limit in terms of being able to provide that level of assurance within our current funding envelope."

"That is why, with our ongoing framework review, we are looking at how to ensure that schools and parents get everything they need from our reports, and why many of the committee's recommendations are already long in train."

## 'Biomarkers' to measure ageing process

A NEW way of measuring the impact of the ageing process on bones, joints and muscles could be used to help people stay physically active for longer.

Scientists at the University of Sheffield were involved in a project to help distinguish between the normal physical effects of ageing on the body and the first

signs of disease. They teamed up with colleagues at Newcastle and Liverpool universities to draw up a new set of measures to assess bone and muscle health.

The approach recommends the use of specific physical indicators called biomarkers to assess bone condition, cartilage damage and muscle mass. It is hoped the

**1. The purpose of community consultation**

At Ørsted, we want to hear your views. The Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) explores how we intend to consult with you on our proposals for the Hornsea Project Four Offshore Wind Farm ("Hornsea Project Four"), as required under the Planning Act 2008 (the "Planning Act").

This pre-application consultation provides the opportunity for the local community to engage with our comment on the project as the project plans evolve.

We want to listen to your views and work with you to develop our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. This will allow us to develop our plans responsibly and in manner that supports local community interests.

**2. Background**

We are a renewable energy company taking tangible action to create a world that runs entirely on green energy. We have invested significantly in the UK, where we develop, construct and operate offshore wind farms and innovative waste-to-energy technology.

The UK is our largest market and we currently have 11 operational offshore wind farms here. We have three operational offshore wind farms off the east coast which are Westmost Rough, Lincs and Rose Bank Offshore Wind Farms.

Our Hornsea Project One and Two Offshore Wind Farms are currently under construction and are situated in the southern North Sea. We have also recently submitted an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to develop Hornsea Project Three Offshore Wind Farm.

This SoCC has been produced solely for Hornsea Project Four, which is in the early pre-application stage for a DCO situated to the western edge of the former Hornsea Zone (west of Hornsea Project One, Hornsea Project Two and Hornsea Project Three). We will provide full details about what this means from a community consultation perspective in the following sections.

**3. The planning process**

With a proposed capacity of over 100 megawatts (MW), Hornsea Project Four is classified as a National Strategic Infrastructure Project (NSIP). Our project must therefore apply for a DCO through the NPPF planning process. Consents for the offshore array, offshore and onshore cable routes, and offshore and onshore substation, will be included in the DCO.

The DCO application will be dealt with by the Planning Inspectorate (PI) as the agency responsible for managing the examination process for NSIPs. It will then, if accepted, be examined by an independent Examining Authority Panel, who will then make a recommendation to the Secretary of State for Business Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS). The SSI will then review and comment on the decision-making in relation to whether to grant a DCO.

As part of the examination process, we must satisfy PI that our pre-application consultation has been undertaken. This includes identifying statutory consultees for the proposed consultation under Section 42 of the Planning Act, as explained in Section 5 of this SoCC. It also includes setting out how we propose to consult with the community in the vicinity of the project under Section 47 of the Planning Act, with the SoCC being published in accordance with the requirement.

**4. Hornsea Project Four Offshore Wind Farm**

The project will be located approximately 90 km offshore and will be to the west of Hornsea Project One, Two and Three. The project has an Agreement for Lease (AFL) for an area of up to 650 km<sup>2</sup>. If built, Hornsea Project Four will comprise up to 160 wind turbines and provide clean, renewable energy to power UK homes.

Electricity generated by the offshore wind farm will be brought ashore via underground subsea cables which will be buried ashore at a point known as 'tanchoff', before connecting into an onshore substation and the national grid. We are currently in discussions with National Grid over a proposed grid connection at Croyke Beck.

We are currently assessing potential 'No-foul' cable route options and various landfall areas. This will be presented in the Scoping Report and is something we will be seeking your opinion on as part of the consultation and planning process.

**5. Who will we consult?**

We will consult with individuals and communities living within the vicinity of the land affected by the DCO application. This consultation is also open to anyone who may be interested in any way feel impacted by our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. ## 6. What will we consult on?

We will be seeking feedback on aspects of our plans for Hornsea Project Four. We will encourage local communities to give their views about how our proposals may affect them or their area. 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**Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) –** Following the publication of the Scoping Report, a PEIR will be produced, which will provide an initial statement of the environmental information available for the Hornsea Project Four study area. The PEIR will build upon findings from the Scoping Report and feedback received through the consultation process. It will incorporate the findings of the surveys and initial assessments and will enable stakeholders to review an informed view of the potential environmental effects. We will be seeking feedback from local communities and other stakeholders on the PEIR via the consultation timeline in Section 10 for more details.

**Environmental Statement (ES) –** The ES will address the content of the PEIR and continue to incorporate the responses from the consultation and results of the surveys undertaken. It will include any changes made to the project and any mitigation measures that need to be implemented. The ES will form part of the DCO application formalisation.

Dates of when these reports will be published can be found in Section 10 of this SuCC, which displays the consultation timeline. Copies of these reports will be made available as we conduct the public consultation.

## 8. Environmental information

In accordance with Regulation 12 of the Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017, we confirm that the project fall(s) within the scope of the Environmental Impact Assessment Directive and, as such, we will be undertaking an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for Hornsea Project Four, in accordance with Regulation 3 of The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017. The methodology and scope of the EIA will be agreed with the relevant regulatory and environmental bodies, the SoS, and your LPA.

The following reports listed will be consulted on as part of the EIA process and as the DCO application is prepared:

**Scoping Report –** The Scoping Report will be informed by desk-based research on the existing offshore and onshore environments in the location of the proposed project and supported by surveys and data analysis. This report will present the key project parameters, otherwise known as the Project Envelope, which includes all associated onshore and offshore infrastructure and possible elements that make up the project. These elements will be subject to further refinement throughout the project development process.

Typical elements of an offshore wind farm are presented in the figure above. This report will also describe the methodologies that will be applied to further characterise the existing environments and how any potential impacts will be assessed.

1. A separate Habitats Regulations Assessment (in relation to marine environmental effects) will be prepared once the location has been identified.

2. A voluntary process in the form of a Scoping Opinions conducted by PINS will result in feedback on the four local communities or other affected bodies.

## 9. Public consultation

The consultation process for the proposed Hornsea Project Four will be undertaken once the design of the project develops sufficiently for the consultation. The following consultation process defines the consultation timeline, as presented in Section 10 of the SuCC.

**Stakeholder briefings – Autumn/Winter 2018**  
Following publication of the SuCC, we will introduce community members to our proposals for Hornsea Project Four. This will include initial meetings with members of the community and stakeholders.

**Local information events – Autumn/Winter 2018**  
Local Information events will take place in October 2018. These will provide interested members of the local community with the opportunity to view the early stage proposals and submit community feedback. This will help shape the proposals for Hornsea Project Four. Where more detailed plans will be presented at local information events, individually planned for Summer/Autumn 2019.

**Local information events – Summer/Autumn 2019**  
Local Information events and further consultation will take place individually in Summer/Autumn 2019 and will run for at least 25 days. The statutory consultation in accordance with Section 47 of the Planning Act, will allow us to update you on the project plans and show you how you may have changed response to feedback submitted from the consultation. At this stage we will also be able to provide feedback on the PEIR, as described in Section 8. More specific details of the formal consultation will be published through the communication channels outlined in Section 14.
