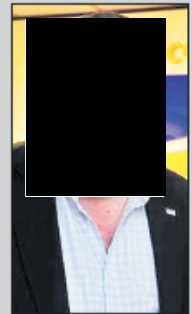

Business chief outlines fear over rail contract

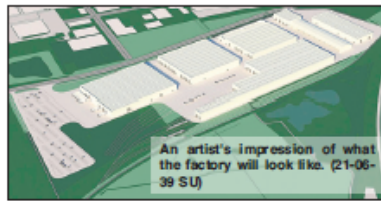
A senior business figure has claimed a challenge to the Siemens's rail contract for Goole could delay the project for several years.

At the Goole meeting of the Hull and Humber Chamber of Commerce, group chief executive Dr Ian Kelly, suggested the move by Bombardier and Hitachi, and Alstom Transport UK, could delay the factory from opening "for a number of years".

Dr Kelly had just spoken about the legal challenge, which has halted any work on the £1.5bn scheme, which was due to be built in Goole, before he made the comments about the potential delay.

He said he believed the Secretary for State Transport attending at the launch meeting in Goole had raised some questions within the companies who were not awarded the contract and "might be seen as prejudicial".

Helen Houlst, local growth programme manager, questioned

whether the perceived timescale was correct – as she was under the impression the legal challenge was going to be dealt with "this side of Christmas".

Dr Kelly said that was not the impression he had been given, but "legal challenges could be dismissed early" if the correct people were able to push the case through quickly.

Siemens Mobility, who were awarded the contract in June by Transport for London (TfL) to build 94 new London Underground trains, said they did not wish to comment on a

possible timescale for the legal challenge.

However, a TfL spokesperson, said: "High Court proceedings in respect of two unsuccessful bids started in July in relation to the decision to award the Deep Tube Upgrade Programme contract to Siemens Mobility Limited.

"We are contesting the claims. We see no good basis for these claims to be issued and are disappointed that these companies have chosen to take this step. We are unable to make any further comment at this point."

It was announced in March that Siemens were to build a new factory at Goole 36. The factory has the potential to employ up to 700 people in skilled engineering and manufacturing roles, plus an additional 250 people during the construction phase.

On June 15, TfL said the 94 trains would be designed and built by Siemens Mobility in Goole. The new trains are expected to start running on the Piccadilly Line from 2023.

However in July a legal challenge was launched by losing bidders Bombardier and Hitachi, before Alstom Transport UK also launched a legal challenge, against the decision to award the contract to Siemens in August.

Support needed to get lifts for rail station

A bid for funding for the provision of lifts at Selby rail station is being prepared – and residents are being encouraged to support the campaign.

TransPennine Express (TPE) is working on the bid with a number of partner organisations.

Two of the three platforms at the station can only be accessed by going over the train line, by either the bridge or taking the level crossing.

Graham Meiklejohn, regional development manager for TransPennine Express, said: "Ensuring that stations have step-free access is a key priority of the railway industry and is a key customer requirement."

"We will be making strong bids to the Department for Transport as we seek to secure the funding for access

improvements at Selby, Thirsk and Seamer."

The bid is due to be submitted by the end of November with a decision expected by April 2019.

Residents can support the campaign for lifts at the station by completing an online survey, which is available until the end of October.

Terry French, secretary of Selby and district rail users group, said: "The group have been campaigning for lifts

at the station for some time and recognise the need for lifts to be installed.

We hope that people will support the campaign by completing the survey and saying how it would benefit Selby.

Holiday caravan site plan for former mine

Holiday caravans and lodges are planned for land at the former North Selby Mine site near Easingwold.

Harworth Estates Investments Limited are proposing a potential redevelopment of the area which will comprise a range of touring caravan, static caravans, and self-contained lodges, about 300 units.

A previous plan from a different developer, which was not pursued, included the development of an anaerobic digester.

The company held public meetings at Easingwold and Wheldrake at the end of September to gather residents' comments and feedback about the proposal.

Richard Rowson, chairman of Easingwold Parish Council, said people had different reactions to the proposal.

He said: "People's sentiments have been mixed. Some said it was the least bad option and preferred that to the previous application for an anaerobic digester, while others wanted the site to be restored to agriculture. As a parish council, we haven't got a view yet."

Eddie Pete, regional director of the Harworth Group, said: "Harworth looked at the site and discovered that

a leisure redevelopment would be a very beneficial use for the site and we are looking to submit an application before the end of the year.

"We had 50 people at the Easingwold consultation and I was very pleased that so many people came and had positive feedback about the project."

Mr Pete also said some of the people attending the consultation raised concerns about traffic increase on the A19 or going north.

He added: "There's need for tourist accommodation in the area and we think we can bring a good quality service here and bring back to a beneficial use since the mine site closed."

Harworth said they are looking to submit their plans before the end of the year.

A York Council spokesperson said: "Any application submitted will be duly considered in terms of impacts on highway safety as well as ecology, contamination, flood risk, visual impact and effect on neighbours' amenity, etc. Further, public consultation would be undertaken prior to any decision being taken by the council."

Restored naval gun to be shipped back home

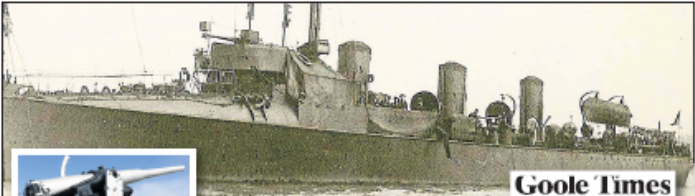
Councillors have asked that a controversial ship's gun that was placed on a Goole roundabout is sent back to Bridlington.

It came to light at the meeting that the gun was a First World War relic which was restored by a Goole council worker, who rescued it from the depot in a state of disrepair, and that was why it was on show in Goole in the first place.

Goole Town Council met on Thursday to discuss what to do with the gun, which was taken from the wreckage of the HMS Fairy, which was sunk off the coast of Bridlington during action with a German submarine in 1918.

Several councillors had objected when the gun was placed by East Riding of Yorkshire Council on the Normandy Way roundabout, stating reasons such as road safety and it was removed shortly after the story appeared on the front page of the Goole Times.

Cllr Pat O'Neil said while she had sympathy for the local council worker who had refurbished the gun at the Goole depot, and who wanted to see

the gun displayed in Goole, she felt it would be best being displayed in Bridlington, where it had sat on the harbour side before falling into disrepair.

Cllr Mally Boatman said he had no strong feelings as to where else the gun might be placed, if local people wanted it on display in Goole, but the

roundabout was the wrong place for it.

Cllr Barbara Jeffreys said she felt Goole was not the most appropriate place for the gun, while Cllr Brent Huntington also felt the best place for the gun was Bridlington.

It's full steam ahead for Fundraising walk for Josh

STAFF and students at Withernsea High School are helping to raise money for former student Josh Barnfather who is currently aiming to raise £100,000 to fund life-extending cancer treatment. On Wednesday October 17, the school's Year 12 cohort will take part in a sponsored walk from Withernsea to Hull which will follow the route of the old railway line. The walk will start at the site of the seaside town's former station before finishing at Hull's Paragon Interchange an estimated seven hours later. Their aim is to cover as much of the original route as possible, with diversions around areas

which have been lost to redevelopment since the closure of the line. The walk will take place 54 years to the week that the final passenger service ran on October 19, 1964. It is hoped that a sizable amount of money can be raised through sponsorship of the walk, which will directly go towards helping Josh achieve his fundraising target. Around half a dozen staff will be accompanying the students on the walk. School Media Coordinator Tim Nuttall is one of them. Mr Nuttall said: "We are delighted to offer our full support and help

contribute towards the fundraising for Josh, alongside the many events and activities that have been organised in the local community and beyond. "Many of our staff remember Josh and his time at Withernsea High School with great affection and we extend our very best wishes to him and his family through a difficult time." The up-coming sponsored walk will form part of a timetable enrichment package that is delivered to students at the school's Sixth Form. Launched last year, 'Collapsed Afternoon Wednesday' (CAW) offers students a range of experiences beyond their classrooms to

help equip them with additional skills, experiences, knowledge and values. Jamie Hughes, Teacher of Dance and CAW facilitator, said: "Our Collapsed Afternoon Wednesday (CAW) sessions offer a bespoke enrichment curriculum for Year 12 students which is designed to enhance life skills and promote positive values through a variety of experiences. "These experiences include volunteering, building links with the community and fundraising. Our up-coming fundraising walk is one of the many activities our students will participate in throughout the year ahead

and we are delighted this activity will contribute towards Josh and his family achieving their fundraising target." In addition to the walk, donations from the school's annual Muffin Day, where students pay a small amount to attend in non-uniform on the final day before the Christmas holidays, will also be donated to the fund. Sponsorship forms are held by individual staff and students participating in the walk. However, if anyone would like to sponsor the team as a whole, they can do so through a collective sponsorship form which is available in the High School's main office.

Freedom of the Parish awarded to Patrington stalwart

A FORMER Patrington parish councillor has been recognised for his long service by receiving the coveted Freedom of the Parish. Make trespassing a crime says MP

EAST Yorkshire MP Sir Greg Knight is one of a number of MPs calling on the Government to make trespassing on private land a criminal offence. The call follows news that since 2010 the number of unauthorised traveller caravans on private property has increased, by 20 per cent in 2017, with more coming also increasing. Sir Greg said: "A new criminal power would provide a quick method of dealing with unauthorised encroachments on private land, in contrast to the current civil remedy, which is limited in scope and requires a cumbersome recourse to the courts. Unauthorised trespass is an increasing problem, and all too often is accompanied by noise, litter, anti-social behaviour and damage to property." He added: "This simple change would mean the police could take action swiftly and effectively rather than local communities having to wait for a long-winded civil process to take place."

Fairtrade Hornsea helps to save Traidcraft

FAIRTRADE Hornsea's committee have issued a plea to help to save Traidcraft.

Traidcraft is credited with kick-starting the Fairtrade movement in the UK and since its formation has had a hand in pioneering fairly traded products we now take for granted including chocolate, tea, coffee, sugar, cotton, and confectionery.

Traidcraft is a UK-based Fairtrade organisation established in 1979.

The organisation has two components: a public limited company called Traidcraft plc, which sells fairly traded products in the

United Kingdom; and a development charity called Traidcraft Exchange that works with poor producers in Africa and Asia.

In 1992 Traidcraft also co-founded The Fairtrade Foundation whose mark we are now used to seeing on all products which have Fairtrade accreditation.

Fairtrade sales are booming with a 7 per cent increase in products bearing the mark this year. Despite this and an annual turnover of £10 million Traidcraft now finds itself in difficulties due to a combination of factors.

not have any retail outlets and relies on 4,000 people who sell their goods in churches, at fairs and various functions, as well as their online shop. The number of these has halved over the years and their online sales have been disappointing this year.

The vote to leave the EU caused such a shock to the company that they are struggling to recover due to the fall in the value of sterling by 17 per cent compared to the dollar - literally overnight - which cost the company three quarters of a million pounds as all their purchases are made in

dollar.

Many other companies have failed to sail rough times so Fairtrade Hornsea are keen to point out the impact Traidcraft failing would have. Traidcraft is not a normal company rather it is a community of people working directly with producers in the developing world to give them the skills and expertise to develop their products for both the local and export markets. They work extensively with marginalised groups and provide training for diversification and sustainability. Over the years they have lifted thousands out of poverty

and transformed whole villages and districts. Their work of fighting poverty through trade is not yet finished and they still need help.

using an electric toothbrush!

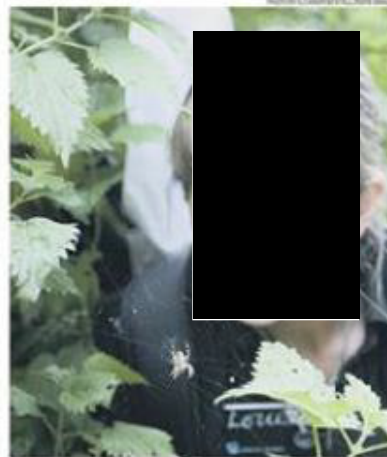

Back in saddle for top cycling events

It has been a whirlwind couple of weeks for the East Riding, with not just one but two major announcements relating to professional cycling.

First, we had a huge announcement in Innsbruck, Austria, confirming the race route and schedule for the Yorkshire 2019 UCI Road World Championships.

The nine-day celebration of cycling will take place between 21-29 September and commence in Beverley on the Saturday with a ground-breaking para-cycling event running alongside the Championships, which will act as a qualifier for the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games.

The showcase will feature every Paralympic road racing discipline and take place in front of one of the largest crowds ever assembled for

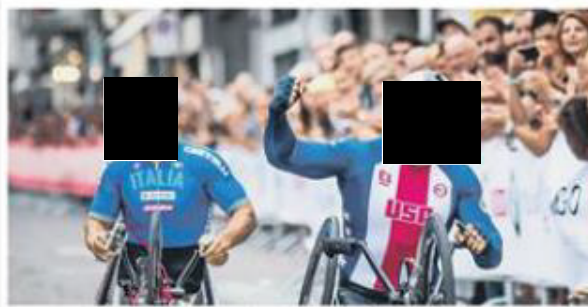

Theresa May yesterday appealed to MPs to back a Brexit deal "in the national interest" in a move seen as an attempt to persuade Labour rebels help her pass any withdrawal agreement. The Prime Minister urged MPs to do their "duty" to implement the result of the Brexit referendum as she struggled to maintain discipline within the Tory ranks. It came amid reports that 30 Labour MPs could rebel against Jeremy Corbyn's orders and back Mrs May's Brexit deal to cancel out 30 Tory Brexiteers who said to be prepared to vote it down, in order to avoid a chaotic withdrawal from the EU without an agreement.

The figure was described as wide of the mark by a senior Labour source while a Number 10 source said the PM was confident of getting the deal through on "Conservative votes". In comments made minutes before the Democratic Unionist Party, which props up the Government, threatened to vote down the Budget if its Brexit demands were not met.

It was Mrs May's first appearance in the Commons since last month's Salisbury assault, when EU leaders rubbish her Chequers blueprint for Brexit.

She has come under growing pressure from Brexit-backing Tories to drop the plan and instead seek a Canada-style free trade deal. But, at Prime Minister's Questions, veteran Hampshire Tory Kenneth Clarke urged her to ignore headline Brexiteers and bring forward a deal acceptable to 90pc of MPs on both sides of the Commons.

Meanwhile, European Commission chief executive Michel Barnier reiterated that Brussels could not accept the Chequers plan for a "common rulebook" with the EU on goods but not environmental or social standards.

"This type of single market system à la carte would be tantamount

to giving a huge competitive edge to UK companies with respect to companies operating within the single market," he said.

Mr Barnier also set out how the so-called "backstop" plan to maintain a soft Irish border would work, if a solution to keep goods moving cannot be found in a wider trade deal.

The issue has emerged as a key stumbling block in negotiations as Mrs May has said she cannot sign up to the EU plan as it would create a new de facto border in the Irish Sea.

But Mr Barnier continued efforts to "de-dramatise" the issue yesterday, saying customs and VAT checks would be carried out using existing procedures, to avoid the need for physical inspections at the border.

He said that under the EU backstop proposal, companies in the rest of the UK sending goods to Northern Ireland would fill out customs declarations online in advance.

"The only visible systematic checks between Northern Ireland and the rest of the UK would involve scanning the bar codes on lorries and containers, which could be done on ferries and at transit ports," he said. Similar arrangements already exist between mainland Spain and the Canary Islands.

But existing health and phytosanitary checks on "live animals and animal products, which must happen at the border because of food safety and animal health reasons", would "have to cover 100 per cent rather than 10 per cent of products."

Mr Barnier admitted this would be "a significant change in terms of scale."

"I understand why such procedures are politically sensitive but Brexit was not our choice. It is



Goodwill needed in case of 'no deal', says watchdog

FLIGHTS TO Europe could be grounded and key exports halted in the event of an "unfriendly" Brexit, the head of the Whistleblowing watchdog has warned.

Sir Amyas Morse, the head of the National Audit Office, said many existing arrangements with the EU would require "goodwill" on both sides if they were to continue if Britain leaves in March without a deal in place.

Giving evidence to the Commons Exiting the EU Committee, Sir Amyas rejected claims that it was "unfeasible" to suggest flights could be halted after March 29, saying a breakdown could happen by "mistake" as well as by the result of deliberate action.

He said yesterday that if the UK was to refuse to pay the £3.6bn "divorce" settlement in the event of a no-deal Brexit, it could lead to Brussels adopting a similarly tough line.

"It is not implausible. It is not impossible. It could happen by mistake rather than deliberately. It depends upon how friendly or unfriendly the accompanying music is as all this goes on," he said.

"If you say, 'Well, we're leaving in March and PS, we're going to take a very tough attitude, you can take us to court for whatever money you want from us and, well, and...' it is not impossible to think of scenarios where people might not be terribly helpfully disposed to us. The point about all of these arrangements is they do require mutual goodwill to put them in place."

'Slow hand' better for farming reform, says Gove

MICHAEL GOVE has insisted a "slow hand" is better than a "rough working" when it comes to introducing post-Brexit plans for agriculture.

The Environment Secretary was lobbied yesterday by Tory former Minister Nick Boles to start the "significant" reforms in March 2020, rather than waiting until the next decade, by ensuring the UK joins the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) and European Economic Area (EEA).

But leave-backing Mr Gove teased back that he could not

agree to such a proposition, and the Government's current plan gave the right balance between urgency and time for reform.

The UK is preparing to leave the EU common agriculture policy (CAP) and the system of subsidies, paid for the amount of land being farmed, will be phased out over a seven-year period between 2021 and 2027.

Farmers will instead be paid for "public goods" such as curbing flooding, protecting and boosting wildlife and improving access to the countryside after the UK

leaves the CAP with the Agricultural Bill enabling this change.

Speaking during the Bill's second reading, Mr Gove said the terms of reference for a review of funding across the UK will be published shortly. He said the Bill sets a "clear direction for the future of agriculture" and will give farmers time to make changes.

Interestingly, Mr Boles said "I am seduced by the vision of the future of British agriculture painted by the Secretary of State. But I am puzzled as to why it is he wants to take so long before he

cannot start on it. Why is it that we have to remain trapped in the limbo of the transition whereby we'll still be trapped in the Common Agricultural Policy when by joining EFTA and EEA on our way out of the EU, we could start on his magnificent reforms next March?"

Mr Gove replied: "I am delighted to have been able to seduce [Mr Boles]. What is striking in the seduction is rather than asking for a slow hand he wants a rough working - my view is that [Mr Boles] has made the best possible case

for the proposition that he has put forward but I must respectfully disagree with him."

"I think the transition period - both the one being discussed as we leave with the European Union and the transition period for our farmers - is the right balance between the urgency and also space for reform."

Mr Gove earlier told MPs he "did not recognise" a report which suggested officials have discussed plans for the mass slaughter of sheep - my view is that [Mr Boles] has made the best possible case
