1 Introduction

1.1 Project Background

- 1.1.1.1 Orsted Hornsea Project Four Limited (the 'Applicant') is proposing to develop Hornsea Project Four Wind Farm (hereafter 'Hornsea Four'). Hornsea Four will be located approximately 69 km offshore the East Riding of Yorkshire in the Southern North Sea and will be the fourth project to be developed in the former Hornsea Zone. Hornsea Four will include both offshore and onshore infrastructure including an offshore generating station (wind farm), export cables to landfall and on to an onshore substation (OnSS) with energy balancing infrastructure (EBI), and connection to the electricity transmission network.
- 1.1.1.2 Royal HaskoningDHV was commissioned to undertake a Historic Environment Desk Based Assessment (DBA) for Hornsea Four. This technical annex has been produced to characterise the baseline historic environment within and around the Hornsea Four Order Limits (i.e. the landfall, onshore export cable corridor (ECC), the OnSS, the EBI and 400 kV National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) connection area). This baseline data has been used to inform and support the Environmental Statement (ES) for Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.
- 1.1.1.3 This DBA has been undertaken to provide baseline data on the historic environment within a set of defined study areas around the onshore elements of Hornsea Four (Section 2.2). The historic environment comprises all designated and non-designated heritage assets, including built heritage, buried archaeological remains and historic earthworks.
- 1.1.1.4 The DBA presents the known heritage assets (historic environment resource) recorded in the Humber Historic Environment Record (HHER) in addition to potential heritage assets identified from initial historic map regression work and walkover surveys. Sites visited as part of the DBA production are presented in Appendix A and gazetteers of all designated and non-designated heritage assets are included in Appendix B and Appendix C.
- 1.1.1.5 An assessment of setting and associated contribution to heritage significance is provided, as well as a statement on the potential for encountering archaeological remains which are, at present, unknown. Following this, initial potential impacts associated with the construction, operation and decommissioning stages are presented, along with possible cumulative impacts. Assessment of impacts, associated effects and anticipated mitigation are included within the Historic Environment ES chapter (Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment). A detailed assessment of the potential impacts was undertaken for the PEIR (Orsted 2019), the results of which are presented in the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register). Those identified as significant in Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) terms are taken forward within the ES chapter; principally direct (physical) impacts to heritage assets.
- 1.1.1.6 This DBA directly supports **Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment** and is included as a primary technical annex.



- 1.1.1.1 Due to the amount of data collated for the Hornsea Four Historic Environment DBA, this technical report has been split into two parts:
 - Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part A (this document) outlines the methodology, survey results, conclusions and mitigation; and
 - Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B presents the data derived from the survey in a series of map books as figures (Appendix D).

1.2 Site Description

1.2.1.1 The Order Limits consist of a refined landfall location at Fraisthorpe Sands (south of Bridlington), an approximately 39 km long, 80 m wide onshore ECC easement with eight logistics compounds, orientated south-westwards and crossing the River Hull before curving southwards to the west of Beverley and terminating at the OnSS, 4 km south of Beverley and 10 km north-west of Hull (Figure 1). The onshore ECC route passes through 15 parishes within East Riding (Barmston, Ulrome, Beeford, Foston, Hutton Cranswick, Watton, Beswick, Lockington, Leconfield, Cherry Burton, Molescroft, Bishop Burton, Walkington, Rowley and Skidby). The vast majority of current land-use around Hornsea Four is arable farmland and the landscape contains numerous small villages, with larger urban centres located to the north (Bridlington) and east (Beverley).

1.3 Aims

- 1.3.1.1 The main aim of the DBA is to outline the baseline environment with respect to the onshore historic environment relevant to Hornsea Four. It includes archaeological assessment of available data, including desk-based research and a high-level review of historic mapping (Section 4.5), and a settings assessment (Section 6). Recommendations that arise from the results of this DBA are detailed in the ES chapter Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.
- 1.3.1.2 The specific objectives of this DBA are to:
 - outline the known and potential heritage assets, based on a review of existing information to provide an archaeological and historical baseline within a defined study area:
 - assess the significance of the known and potential heritage assets through a
 consideration of their archaeological, architectural, artistic and historic interest, and to
 provide a consideration of the contribution that setting has on their significance, where
 relevant; and
 - identify the potential impacts of Hornsea Four upon known heritage assets and their setting, and heritage assets which are, at present, unknown.
- 1.3.1.3 Further reference to, and assessment of, heritage significance and impact significance is detailed within Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment and the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register). This DBA focuses on establishing the historic environment baseline condition of the Hornsea Four Order Limits. This includes identifying



the heritage significance of the assets recorded in the baseline, the contribution setting makes to the significance of a heritage asset and identifying potential impacts (e.g. direct/indirect, temporary/permanent).

1.3.1.4 Separate technical reports have been produced detailing the geoarchaeological potential, assessment of aerial photography and Lidar data as well as the results of a Priority Archaeological Geophysical Survey for Hornsea Four. These reports form part of the baseline presented in the ES chapter (Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment) and are included as separate technical annexes (Annex 5.2: Aerial Photographic and Lidar Assessment Technical Report, Annex 5.3: Priority Archaeological Geophysical Survey and Annex 5.4: Geoarchaeological Desk Based Assessment).

2 Methodology

2.1 Introduction

- 2.1.1.1 The following methodology has been designed in a manner consistent with good practice professional guidance outlined by the CIfA's "Standards and guidance for historic environment desk-based assessment" (CIfA 2020).
- 2.1.1.2 The approach taken for this DBA and assessment work within the ES chapter was discussed and agreed with Historic England, Humber Archaeology Partnership (HAP) and the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's (ERYC) Conservation Officer during the Historic Environment Technical Panel Meetings, as described within the ES chapter Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.

2.2 The Study Area

2.2.1.1 Four historic environment study areas of varying size have been established around the Hornsea Four Order Limits, to ensure a full assessment of any potential impacts can be undertaken. These study areas were discussed and agreed with the stakeholders at the Historic Environment Technical Panel Meeting on the 2nd April 2019 (ON-HIS-2.7). The study areas are detailed below.

2.2.1.2 Onshore ECC (including landfall):

- A 500 m study area either side of the onshore ECC and 400 kV NGET connection area for non-designated heritage assets; and
- A 1 km study area either side of the onshore ECC and 400 kV NGET connection area for designated heritage assets.



2.2.1.3 OnSS:

- A 5 km study area from the OnSS permanent footprint boundary (and its associated permanent infrastructure) for designated heritage assets and non-designated built heritage assets; and
- A 1 km study area from the OnSS permanent footprint boundary (and its associated permanent infrastructure) is used for other non-designated heritage assets (i.e. buried archaeological remains and findspots).
- 2.2.1.4 The onshore ECC study area starts at the Mean Low Water Springs (MLWS) with the offshore ECC study area starting at Mean High Water Springs (MHWS), resulting in a slight overlap at the intertidal zone (Volume A2, Chapter 10: Marine Archaeology).
- 2.2.1.5 The OnSS study area includes the EBI as denoted on **Figure 1**. Note that all non-designated heritage assets have been included within the 5 km OnSS study area on **Figure 2** to ensure all non-designated built heritage can be considered.
- 2.2.1.6 These study areas allow for a proportionate assessment of any direct (physical) and indirect (non-physical) impacts upon designated and non-designated heritage assets, and identification of impacts which may be significant in EIA terms.
- 2.2.1.7 Due to the scale of the project, the baseline information is described and discussed by project area, i.e. onshore ECC (including the landfall and 400 kV NGET connection area) and OnSS (including the EBI), for ease of reference.

2.3 Heritage Asset Numbering

- 2.3.1.1 This DBA has used the preferential references as defined by the National Heritage List for England (NHLE) and the HHER for all heritage assets described throughout the report and presented on the figures (i.e. NHLE number, HER numbers; Figure 1, Figure 2 and Figure 3).
- 2.3.1.2 Following the baseline data collation, two walkover surveys and a setting assessment were undertaken for the heritage assets identified as being potentially affected by Hornsea Four. From this data set, a number of assets were identified as 'key' to the project due to the potential for impacts to occur to them.
- 2.3.1.3 These key heritage assets were assigned Hornsea Four-specific identification numbers (i.e. pre-fixed with 'HP4') and taken forward for assessment, with direct impacts presented in the ES chapter Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment. Indirect impacts are presented in the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register), with a summary of the indirect impacts presented in the Setting Assessment section of this DBA (Section 6). The key heritage assets are presented on Figure 3 and cross reference with the gazetteers in Appendix B and Appendix C.



2.3.1.4 Overview figures (Figure 1, Figure 2 and Figure 3) are included within the body of this DBA, where relevant, with a further 84 figures showing the detail of the heritage assets located within the study areas included in Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B.

2.4 Sources

- 2.4.1.1 Sources that contain relevant historic environment information have been consulted in the production of this DBA. This includes:
 - The NHLE, maintained by Historic England, for information and shapefiles (obtained via Hornsea Four) on designated heritage assets (Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings, Registered Parks and Gardens, Registered Battle
 - National Record for the Historic Environment (NRHE), maintained by Historic England, for information derived from the former National Buildings Record (NBR) and National Archaeological Record (NAR);
 - HHER search for information on non-designated heritage assets and historic landscape characterisation data (shapefile data obtained via Hornsea Four);
 - HHER paper records including previous archaeological investigation reports;
 - ERYC's Conservation Officer for information on Conservation Areas, Locally Listed Buildings and non-designated Buildings not recorded on the HHER;
 - The local Record Office (Beverley Treasure House) for historic mapping including pre-Ordnance Survey maps, published and unpublished documentary sources;
 - Urban characterisation reports, extensive urban surveys (EUS) and urban archaeological databases (UADs) held by Historic England and ERYC;
 - Geological mapping and borehole information held by the British Geological Survey;
 - Data from the Portable Antiquity Scheme (PAS) which records chance finds recovered and reported to them;
 - Data obtained through site visits and walkover surveys;
 - Data in respect of the zone of theoretical visibility (ZTV) as identified by the landscape and visual assessment, supported by wireframes and photomontages from relevant locations;
 - A search of the War Memorials Register held by the Imperial War Museum; and
 - Assessment of relevant archaeological grey literature reports held by the Archaeology Data Service (ADS) and the HHER.
- 2.4.1.2 These sources were collated into a dataset of designated and non-designated heritage assets within the study areas and are presented as part of the baseline conditions in Section 4. Following the collation of data, it was compiled into gazetteers Appendix B and Appendix C with the digital information plotted into a geographic information system (GIS) project along with mapping data, allowing for rigorous spatial analysis of the dataset.
- 2.4.1.3 Given the time since drafting of the PEIR, and to ensure the baseline data (i.e. HHER data) remains robust and valid to inform and support the EIA a new search request for the 1 km study areas was undertaken in July 2021. Ten additional records were identified which have been integrated with the previously obtained data and subsequently used to characterise the baseline conditions presented in Section 4. Whilst the HHER data has been updated, no



updated setting assessment or updated field surveys (e.g. priority archaeological geophysical survey) has been undertaken as the findings obtained to date are considered to remain valid and robust to inform the EIA. This conclusion (and approach) has been agreed with Historic England, ERYC and the Humber HER (ON-HIS-2.11).

2.4.1.4 An Aerial Photographic and Lidar Assessment, reporting on the Priority Archaeological Geophysical Surveys and a Geoarchaeological Desk-based Review form separate technical reports. The results of each also inform the baseline and impact assessment within the ES chapter Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.

2.5 Heritage Assessment Methodologies

2.5.1 Walkover Survey

- 2.5.1.1 Two walkover surveys were undertaken to inform this DBA and setting assessment, as well as to inform the suitability for other non-intrusive surveys to take place. The aims of the walkover surveys were to:
 - Assess the potential for upstanding/above ground archaeological remains within identified sites (i.e. earthworks);
 - Identify any currently unrecorded heritage assets;
 - Identify the potential for unknown heritage assets (e.g. archaeology) within the landfall, onshore ECC, OnSS and 400 kV NGET connection area;
 - Assess for the potential impact from other modern developments along the route which may reduce the significance/preservation of known heritage assets;
 - Assess the viability for targeted Priority Archaeological Geophysical Surveys; and
 - Undertake setting assessment work on identified key heritage assets.
- 2.5.1.2 These walkover surveys were undertaken between 28 30 November 2018 and 11 15 February 2019. The scope of the walkover surveys and areas to be visited were agreed with the heritage stakeholders at the Technical Panel meetings on 11 September 2018 (ON-HIS-1.2) and 16 January 2019 (ON-HIS-2.1), with initial results presented at the second Technical Panel meeting on 16 January 2019 and the third Technical Panel meeting on 2 April 2019.

2.5.2 Map Regression

- 2.5.2.1 Historic mapping, comprising tithe maps, enclosure maps and early Ordnance Survey maps, of selected areas within the study areas were to identify changes of boundaries and landuse. Field boundaries, parish boundaries, buildings, woodland and watercourses have been added and removed throughout history within the study area. Comparison of successive maps was undertaken to aid in the identification of these changes. The results of the map study are discussed in Section 4.5.
- 2.5.2.2 Due to the scale of the project, a broad approach for assessment of historic mapping has been undertaken for this DBA, using resources on the National Library of Scotland website (National Library of Scotland 2019), which holds numerous historic map resources for the



United Kingdom, and map resources available at Beverley Treasure House (which also holds the East Riding records).

2.5.3 Assessing Heritage Significance and Importance

- 2.5.3.1 The term significance, in relation to heritage policy, is identified in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) (Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government 2019, NPPF Annex 2: Glossary) as "The value of a heritage asset to this and future generations because of its heritage interest. That interest may be archaeological, architectural, artistic or historic. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting."
- 2.5.3.2 The importance of a heritage asset is the overall value assigned to it based on its heritage significance, reflecting its statutory designation or, in the case of non-designated assets, the professional judgement of the assessor. Historic England's industry standards and guidance (see Section 3.4, Table 1) also refers to an asset's 'level of significance', which in this usage has the same meaning as importance.
- 2.5.3.3 Designated heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings), non-designated heritage assets (e.g. HER monuments, locally listed buildings) and potential heritage assets (e.g. currently unknown archaeological remains) can all be identified as having a very high heritage significance, although designated heritage assets will be identified as high or very high significance more often than non-designated heritage assets. This is often due to the quality of a designated asset's survival and preservation, and/or a combination of its archaeological, architectural, artistic and historic interests.
- 2.5.3.4 Relevant to this definition of heritage significance, evidence for some heritage assets, particularly non-designated buried archaeological remains, is often an incomplete picture due to a lack of data on the remains (e.g. where they haven't been subject to any form of archaeological evaluation). Thus, the categories and definitions of heritage significance, as defined in the ES Chapter Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment, do not necessarily reflect a definitive level of importance for a non-designated asset. Where uncertainty occurs, a precautionary approach is to assign high importance; a good practice in impact assessments, which reduces the potential for impacts to be under-estimated. This is detailed via the assessment presented in Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.

2.5.4 Setting Assessment

- 2.5.4.1 A heritage asset's setting, and how it contributes to its significance, is a complex and far reaching subject. The NPPF identifies setting as that which encompasses an asset's surroundings in which it is experienced. The extent of setting is not fixed and can contribute both positively and negatively to the heritage significance of an asset.
- 2.5.4.2 Views allow for a concise method of articulating an asset's physical surroundings and how the setting is experienced or appreciated. Other considerations when identifying how setting contributes to an asset's significance include the asset's physical elements as well as



perceptual and associational attributes relating to its surroundings. Examples of these considerations include: the asset's relationship with other assets, its visual dominance, tranquillity, effect of noises, smells and other 'pollution' issues, degree of interpretation or promotion to the public, and celebrated artistic representations.

- 2.5.4.3 Identifying and articulating the setting of a heritage asset and how that setting contributes to its heritage significance follows the methodology as recommended by Historic England in Setting of Heritage Assets: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in planning Note 3 (Historic England 2017a).
- 2.5.4.4 This guidance document recommends a stage-based approach for assessing the implications of development proposals, as follows:
 - Step 1: identify those heritage assets whose settings might be affected;
 - Step 2: assess whether, how and to what degree setting makes a positive contribution to the value of those heritage assets;
 - Step 3: assess the effect of the proposed development on the significance of those assets due to changes to setting;
 - Step 4: maximise enhancement and minimise harm; and
 - Step 5: make and document decisions and monitor outcomes.
- 2.5.4.5 The first four steps of this process have been undertaken as part of this report with Steps 1 and 2 presented in Section 6.1 to Section 6.7, Step 3 presented in Section 6.8 and Step 4 in Section 6.9. This work builds upon the assessment undertaken previously and commented on by stakeholders through the Section 42 process.
- 2.5.4.6 For the purposes of the setting assessment, a 5 km study area around the OnSS was established (in line with the Landscape and Visual Assessment), and a 1 km study area from the onshore ECC. An appraisal of designated and non-designated heritage assets within these study areas was carried out using current and historic OS mapping, Google Maps, and information provided by the NHLE and HHER. A ZTV for the OnSS supported with wireframes and photomontages of relevant locations were produced as part of Hornsea Four's Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment, which have also been utilised for the setting assessment.
- 2.5.4.7 As part of the walkover surveys undertaken for baseline compilation and verification, identified designated and non-designated heritage assets were visited to inform the setting assessment. The heritage assets visited as part of the setting assessment were discussed and agreed with the heritage stakeholders at the Technical Panel meetings on 11 September 2018 (ON-HIS-1.2) and 16 January 2019 (ON-HIS-2.1).
- 2.5.4.8 The key areas of interest raised by the heritage stakeholders regarding impacts to heritage setting and associated heritage significance were those as a result of the OnSS and associated permanent infrastructure, with less concern around the onshore ECC as the construction phase is considered temporary and the cables will be buried below ground. The key question with the OnSS was how it will affect key views from and the visual relationship



between Beverley Minster and the Church of Saint Mary in Cottingham, as well as key views from non-designated historic farmsteads. This is discussed in further detail in Sections 6.7 and 6.8.

2.6 Assumptions and Limitations

- 2.6.1.1 Refinements to Hornsea Four made since the DBA was undertaken to support the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) submission have resulted in a number of small spatial changes to the pre-DCO boundary that form the Order Limits (See Volume A1, Chapter 3: Site Selection and Consideration of Alternatives for details of the refinements).
- 2.6.1.2 Following these refinements to the pre-DCO boundary, the study areas used within the DBA were revised to reflect the Order Limits. As a result, further heritage assets within the Onshore ECC 500 m study area have been identified as key heritage assets and brought forward for assessment at the ES stage.
- 2.6.1.3 The HHER is not a complete record, as it relies on non-designated assets being recorded and reported. The amount of archaeological work and surveys undertaken in an area and whether resulting findspots have been reported can limit the level of records within the HER. Similarly, unknown heritage assets are being found regularly, as part of new developments or new local research. As such, the HER is not a final record and does not preclude further assets being found in the future.
- 2.6.1.4 The assessment of an asset's setting must be seen as an assessment made in its current state. The setting can change considerably over time and the assessment undertaken for Hornsea Four is a 'snapshot' of it during the walkover surveys and associated site visits.

3 Legislation, Policy and Guidance

3.1 Legislation

3.1.1 Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act (1979) (as amended)

3.1.1.1 This act states that any archaeological site or historic building of national importance can be designated as a Scheduled Monument and registered with the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS). Any development that may physically affect the monument is subject to the granting of Scheduled Monument Consent. Historic England advises the government on individual cases for consent and offers advice on the management of Scheduled Monuments.

3.1.2 Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act (1990)

3.1.2.1 This act covers the registration of listed buildings (buildings that are seen to be of special architectural or historic interest) and the designation of Conservation Areas (areas of special architectural or historic interest, the character of which is desirable to preserve or enhance).



A building may be listed as grade I, II* or II and may not be demolished, altered or extended without Listed Building Consent being granted.

3.1.3 Historic Buildings and Ancient Monuments Act (1953)

- 3.1.3.1 This act makes provision for the compilation of a register of gardens and other land which is considered to be of special historic interest. The Act covers the designation of Registered Parks and Gardens and Registered Battlefields.
- 3.1.3.2 The Register of Parks and Gardens is held by Historic England which grades registered parks and gardens as Grade I, II* or II, along the same lines as listed buildings. The NPPF defines them as a designated heritage asset and as such their conservation is an objective of sustainable development and given great weight by planning authorities.

3.1.4 Hedgerow Regulations 1997, as amended by The Hedgerows (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2002

3.1.4.1 These regulations define which hedgerows within England are identified as important and protected against removal and various other works. Heritage-specific criteria for precluding removal of a hedgerow includes if the hedge forms a historic parish or township boundary; it incorporates an archaeological feature which is a Scheduled Monument; or is part of a field system forming part of a key landscape characteristic, such as a Registered Park and Garden.

3.2 National Policy

3.2.1 National Planning Policy Framework

- 3.2.1.1 The NPPF (Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government, updated 2019) forms the basis for the Government's planning policy direction. It gives protection to designated and non-designated heritage assets. Provision for the historic environment is detailed within Section 16: Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment, which directs Local Planners to set out a "positive strategy for the conservation and enjoyment of the historic environment, including heritage assets most at risk through neglect, decay or other threats" (para. 185) and "In doing so, they should recognise that heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource and should be conserved in a manner appropriate to their significance" (para. 184).
- 3.2.1.2 The NPPF also states that great weight should be given to the conservation of designated heritage assets (World Heritage Sites, Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings, Protected Wreck Sites, Registered Parks and Gardens, Registered Battlefields or Conservation Areas). If an asset is identified as being lost due to a development, it requires developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible (para. 199).



3.2.2 National Policy Statements for Energy

3.2.2.1 This policy (specifically EN-1: Overarching NPS for Energy and EN3: National Policy Statement for Renewable Energy infrastructure) sets out the Government's policy for delivery of nationally significant energy infrastructure. Section 5.8 of EN-1 sets out the Government's stance on protecting the historic environment and assessing the impact of any new energy infrastructure. It states that in considering the impact of a proposed development on any heritage assets, the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) should consider the nature and significance of the assets and the value they hold. Section 2.5.34 of EN-3 also states that when considering any impact on the historic environment, the PINS should take into account the positive role that large-scale renewable projects play in the mitigation of climate change and delivery of energy security.

3.3 Local Policy

3.3.1 The East Riding Local Plan

- 3.3.1.1 The local plan (ERYC 2016) details the direction that ERYC wish to take in their planning decisions, leading up to 2029. The policy was adopted in 2016 and is currently under review, following changes to national planning policy. Section 8, Policy ENV3 of the local plan describes how local planning decisions will consider the historic environment and protect, preserve and enhance it.
- 3.3.1.2 The plan makes note that the significance, views, setting, character, appearance and context of heritage assets, both designated and non-designated should be conserved. In particular, key features of the East Riding Landscape should be considered as part of the planning process. Examples include the nationally important archaeological sites of the Yorkshire Wolds, parts of Holderness where waterlogged archaeological deposits survive, Listed Buildings, Conservation Areas, historic parks and gardens and heritage assets associated with the East Yorkshire coast.

3.4 Guidance

3.4.1.1 Guidance is given by the Government on how the historic environment can be enhanced and conserved through the planning process and a number of guidance documents have been produced by Historic England and The Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA) regarding assessing the Historic Environment and implementing a best practice approach (detailed in Table 1). These have been referred to during the compilation of this DBA.

4 Historic Environment Baseline

4.1 Introduction

4.1.1.1 The following section details the currently known heritage assets within the study areas, which form the baseline data to assess the known and potential impacts as part of the assessment in Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment. The full data sets for designated and non-designated heritage assets are included as Appendix B and Appendix C.



4.2 Location, Geology and Topography

- 4.2.1.1 Hornsea Four is located within the East Riding of Yorkshire, traversing through a landscape of varying character and geology. The most distinct landscapes are those of the Yorkshire Wolds and Holderness. The Wolds encompass the land west of Hull, heading northwards and north-eastwards, culminating at the North Sea Coast between Bridlington and Scarborough. These low-lying chalk hills form a distinct landscape westward of the onshore ECC with gently rolling plateaus cut by deep valleys of glacial origin.
- 4.2.1.2 Holderness is east of the Wolds and characterised by rich arable farmland. This area is very flat and consisted of marshland until it was drained and reclaimed during the medieval period. Topographically, the area holds many similarities to the silt and peat fens of East Anglia and Lincolnshire.
- 4.2.1.3 The majority of Hornsea Four is located between these two distinct landscapes, skirting the eastern limits of the Wolds. Hornsea Four passes through a relatively flat landscape, situated at approximately 7 m above Ordnance Datum (aOD) at the coast, and staying relatively level until reaching the hinterlands of the Wolds, where the land gently rises up to approximately 24 m aOD near Cherry Burton, rising to 40 m aOD near Walkington, before gently falling and levelling off to approximately 12 m aOD at the OnSS near Creyke Beck.
- 4.2.1.4 Numerous watercourses pass through the landscape, the most significant being the River Hull and its tributaries, which the onshore ECC crosses near to Foston-on-the-Wolds.
- 4.2.1.5 Geologically, Hornsea Four is located on a White Chalk subgroup bedrock, with most of the area overlain by glacial till deposits. The onshore ECC passes through an area containing superficial deposits of alluvium near to Wansford, whilst the coast contains a complex mixture of alluvium and late glacial glaciofluvial deposits.
- 4.2.1.6 These superficial deposits contain, or are entirely composed of, sand and gravel which can provide good results from aerial survey, dependent on the time of year and ground conditions. Clay and silt, also present in many of these superficial deposits, is similarly capable of providing good results. However, the gravel-based deposits can result in 'noisy' geophysical survey data, and deep deposits of alluvium (i.e. depths beyond 1 m) are not always conducive to geophysical survey as smaller, discrete archaeological features can be masked from detection.1
- 4.2.1.7 The bedrock deposits are well drained and very well suited to the recording of crop and soil marks over buried features from the air, and the recording of archaeological anomalies from geophysical survey.
- 4.2.1.8 The soils are frequently mapped as semi-waterlogged, however the continued drainage within the Hull Valley from the medieval period onwards combined with the rich soils of glacial till and alluvium have proved favourable to the visibility of archaeological features as cropmarks and geophysical anomalies.



- 4.2.1.9 Less well drained soils located within the Hull Valley, (between Foston on the Wolds and Rotsea, and those to the west and south of Beverley) provide less suitable conditions for crop and soil marks. These less well drained soil types in combination with low-lying areas of alluvium, such as those within the Hull Valley, tend to be less conducive to geophysical survey as these overlying waterlogged deposits can mask smaller or less magnetically susceptible archaeological features from detection. However, the ability to detect geomorphological features, such as palaeochannels, in these ground conditions can indirectly inform the presence of archaeological activity.
- 4.2.1.10 Holderness and the Wolds have a complex geological and geomorphological history. The chalk bedrock which forms the sweeping ridge of the Yorkshire Wolds is overlain by up to 30 m of glacial till to the east, deposited within the Holderness region following the retreat of the Devensian glaciation approximately 13,000 years ago. Large meres that formed in natural undulations in the post-glacial landscape result in thick layers of alluvial deposits, often interleaved with layers of peat (Historic England 2005). During the late glacial/early post-glacial period, the region would have formed a ridge of higher ground to the flatlands of Doggerland, now under the North Sea, which reached Holderness by approximately 10,000 years ago. This rising sea level reduced the flow of the Humber and rivers leading into it, resulting in further alluvial deposits being lain within valleys between the low hills and ridges within the till landscape (Muir 1997).

4.3 Archaeological and historic overview

- 4.3.1.1 The area of East Riding has a rich historical and archaeological heritage, with nationally significant archaeological sites and monuments located across the landscape. An overview of the landscape's history is detailed in *The Yorkshire Countryside: A Landscape History* (Muir 1997), which is summarised below, as well as a summary of the findings from the *East Riding of Yorkshire, Chalk Lowland and the Hull Valley National Mapping Programme* (NMP) (Historic England 2012) and the Yorkshire and Lincolnshire Rapid Coastal Zone Assessment Surveys (Historic England 2010 & 2015c).
- 4.3.1.2 Early prehistoric activity is known within the region through pollen analysis, which indicates that forests were beginning to be cleared during the Mesolithic period. Following this, the Yorkshire Wolds and wider area became well settled during the Neolithic period, due to the wide range of natural resources. Evidence for this habitation is seen in the surviving Neolithic ceremonial/funerary monuments in the Wolds landscape, such as long barrows and henges. Evidence for seasonal occupation during the Mesolithic and Neolithic period within the wetlands of Holderness is also evident in environmental remains and flint scatters.
- 4.3.1.3 Settlement of the Wolds continued during the Bronze Age period. This is evidenced by over 140 Early Bronze Age round barrows known across the region, particularly on the higher ground overlooking river valleys. Groupings of barrows are notable within the valley of the River Hull and its tributaries. These funerary monuments indicate the landscape was well settled, although direct evidence for these settlements in the archaeological record is limited.



- 4.3.1.4 A distinctive material culture called the 'Arras Culture' prevailed throughout East Yorkshire during the Iron Age. A well-known element of this culture is burial within a square barrow, a subset of which contain high-status chariot burials. Square barrows survive as cropmarks on aerial photographs, usually in small groups, and as low earthworks, such as those at a cemetery containing about 120 square barrows just south of Scorborough, and the grouping of earthworks at Westwood Pasture, south-west of Beverley. Significant examples of square barrows, one including a chariot burial, were excavated in recent years prior to housing in the Yorkshire Wolds, near Pocklington (Caffell & Holst 2017).
- 4.3.1.5 Activity during the Romano-British period often relates to periods of enclosure and land division, seen in the form of cropmarks. Enclosures were the most common recorded feature-type during the NMP, often rectilinear in plan and isolated, although occasionally they were found in groups, aligned with trackways. Some of these identified enclosures survive as existing earthworks such as those at Westwood Pasture, which are scheduled (NHLE 1013994, 1013999, 1014001 & 1310087; Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). Trackways have been identified in archaeological excavations or from cropmarks which are thought to be Iron Age to Romano-British in origin (although could be earlier) and are often aligned to define access down into the Hull Valley. A single possible Roman villa has been identified in the cropmark records at Skidby (MHU 6598).
- 4.3.1.6 Whilst there is little evidence recorded on the HHER for the Anglo-Saxon period within the 500 m onshore ECC study area, the surrounding region of East Yorkshire itself contains several important Anglo-Saxon archaeological sites, evidencing potential for Anglo-Saxon remains to be present. One such example includes an extensive inhumation cemetery at Sewerby (approximately 14km north-east of landfall) (NHLE 1013625), with 59 graves being uncovered within the farmyard and grounds of Home Farm (Historic England 2021). Also, in East Yorkshire are the early Anglo-Saxon cemetery at Sancton and recently discovered early Germanic burials at Kilham (Historic England pers comm.).
- 4.3.1.7 The earliest phases of Beverley Minster, Beverley being known at the time as Inderawuda meaning 'in the wood of the men of Deira' (Baggs et al. 1989; Information-Britain 2021), were constructed during the Anglo-Saxon period. It was founded at the turn of the 8th century and re-founded after the reconquest from the Danes by King Athelstan in the 10th century. It is during the later centuries of the Anglo-Saxon period that many of East Yorkshire's settlements and their open-field systems were established, with evidence suggesting many of the fields maintained a large open layout to that used during the Roman period (Muir, 1997, pp. 107).
- 4.3.1.8 Medieval activity is better attested to within the region. A total of 29 moated or defended sites were recorded during the NMP, with six sites potentially indicative of monastic granges. Two sites are close to the study area, with one at Beeford and another near Lockington at Woodhouse Farm (Belagh Grange; MHU 7293, 350 m west of the onshore ECC). Sites of potential deer parks are located at Leconfield, Bentley, Skidby, Cottingham, Risby, Beverley and Woodmansey. Deer parks were ostentatious signals of power and wealth to the wider landscape and population, setting aside areas of managed woodland under seigniorial



- ownership for personal hunting use and coppicing of the woodland. They were identifiers of wealth and often developed nearby moated manor sites.
- 4.3.1.9 During the late medieval period, a worsening climate (the 'Little Ice Age') and poor rural economic stability, along with outbreaks of the Bubonic Plague reduced the quantity and quality of grain production, leading to land being lain to pasture and creating opportunity to encourage peasant migration to urban centres. Deserted settlements are relatively common within the region, found at Wilsthorpe, Auburn, Hartburn (Fraisthorpe), Winkton (Barmston), Gembling, Raventhorpe (Cherry Burton), Risby, Rotsea, Winthorpe (Etton) and Bentley. Rotsea is worthy of distinction (NHLE 1005212), consisting of 15 ha of preserved earthworks, with an associated nearby moated site. Beverley Minster and most parish churches within the region were built in the medieval period and retain most or much of their late medieval fabric.
- 4.3.1.10 Except for some ecclesiastical buildings, most built-heritage assets within the region, including most of the 450 built-heritage assets at Beverley, were constructed during the post-medieval and early modern periods. Formal gardens were laid out at Risby Hall during the late 17th century and were extended with pleasure grounds and ornamental lakes a century later (NHLE 1001419).
- 4.3.1.11 A large number of World War II pillboxes, anti-tank defences, searchlight batteries, observation posts and other military installations and structures are common along the Holderness coast. This includes the Royal Observer Corps underground monitoring post at Skipsea and the anti-aircraft gunsite at Butt Farm, near Beverley, both of which are Scheduled Monuments.

4.4 Historic Landscape Characterisation

- 4.4.1.1 The Historic Landscape Character (HLC) data held by the HHER has been obtained and included within Hornsea Four's GIS project database (Section 2.4.1.2). This data was produced as an aid in the interpretation of the current landscape's history and evolution and forms an aid to identifying areas of the landscape which may be sensitive to change.
- 4.4.1.2 The vast majority of Hornsea Four passes through land broadly identified as Settlement, Woodland or Fields and Enclosures. The woodland is mostly modern plantation, although a few small sections of ancient/semi natural or estate woodland are present. The current field pattern is a result of early and parliamentary planned enclosure. This is unsurprising given the rural agricultural landscape that Hornsea Four passes through. Other entries within the study area describe areas of historic earthworks, such as medieval villages (e.g. Ravensthorpe and Rotsea deserted medieval villages). Similarly, areas of landscaped parkland are also identified, such as those at Scorborough, Cherry Burton and Rotsea Manor.
- 4.4.1.3 Overall, the HLC data identifies a distinctly rural landscape, the history of which is mostly related to the period of Enclosure (piecemeal and parliamentary). There are links to the earlier history of the landscape, however, with surviving earthworks of medieval villages and medieval moated manors and hunting lodges. The route of Hornsea Four passes through



fields of distinctly modern agricultural character, with large fields that have developed since the period of Enclosure, most often amalgamated from smaller fields from the mid-20th century onwards.

4.5 Cartographic Evidence

- 4.5.1.1 The earliest maps consulted were surviving enclosure and tithe maps from late 18th to early 19th century. Survival of these maps is relatively rare and as such many areas along the onshore ECC are not covered. However, a concentrated study of the mapping available around the OnSS was possible. Following this, the earliest mapping assessed for the whole route was the Ordnance Survey (OS) first edition six-inch-to-the-mile maps, published in the mid-19th century, with later editions also reviewed, up to and including the most recent OS 1:10,000 digital mapping for Hornsea Four.
- 4.5.1.2 The landscape along the onshore ECC is relatively low-lying and characterised by extensive drainage ditch networks forming the boundaries to many fields. Often these boundaries are defined by dense hedgerows consisting of a mix of species, principally hawthorn, blackthorn, hazel and ash. The character of the landscape changes somewhat nearer to the OnSS, where the Wolds' hinterlands begin. This landscape is topographically more diverse than Holderness, although the development of the region is similar, with large fields bounded by deep ditches and dense hedgerows predominating.
- 4.5.1.3 The earliest mapping consulted (tithe and enclosure maps; **Table 2**) indicates that the landscape was blanketed in relatively small fields of agricultural use, all located within what are the larger field boundaries denoting the modern-day fields. Detail of road networks and urban centres are less apparent as the main purpose of these maps were to identify landowners.

4.5.1.4 Following this, the OS six-inch-to-the-mile map dated 1854-55 shows little change to the field pattern from the earlier mapping and has more detail of the road network, which is relatively unchanged in layout to that of today. Urban centres, such as Beverley, Bridlington, Cottingham and Hull are all much more nucleated on the OS first edition than what is seen today, due to the significant urban spread that has occurred across the local region in the past century. Many of the earthworks visible today, such as Skipsea Castle, Scorborough moated sites and barrows, and the Leconfield Castle moat are all detailed on the early OS



- maps and suggest that many of them were in better condition than today. This is generally expected considering modern agricultural practices.
- 4.5.1.5 The small fields seen on the 19th century mapping is the result of piecemeal and parliamentary enclosure during the 18th and 19th century. This period of enclosure resulted in vast swathes of common land being brought into private ownership, with ditches and hedgerows being used to denote ownership and stop common access rights for grazing. Prior to enclosure, the East Riding of Yorkshire was part of an area identified as 'planned countryside' of the English lowland (Rackham 2000); which was typically characterised by its wide, open fields with nucleated settlements dotted throughout the landscape; the result of Anglo-Saxon settlement and development.
- 4.5.1.6 The field layout remains broadly similar throughout the 20th century although some fields within the area, particularly within the Holderness region, are amalgamated during the mid-20th century. This is a common occurrence, due to the increased need for food following World War II and the ensuing government encouragement of farmers to maximise yields throughout the mid to latter half of the 20th century (Wetham 1970). This produced improvements to agricultural technology, allowing large fields to be easily farmed with less manpower, resulting in smaller fields being combined where practical. The results of which can be seen on OS maps from 1950 onwards.
- 4.5.1.7 Further cartographic assessment has been undertaken as part of the EIA, with assessment maps cross-referenced with results from the priority archaeological geophysical survey and aerial photographic and Lidar assessment reports (Annex 5.2: Aerial Photographic and Lidar Assessment Technical Report and Annex 5.3: Priority Archaeological Geophysical Survey).

4.6 Designated heritage assets

4.6.1.1 Designated heritage assets consist mainly of those that are afforded protection through current legislation. These assets are Scheduled Monuments (31 within the study areas), Listed Buildings (564), Registered Parks and Gardens (two), Registered Battlefields (none are recorded in the study areas), Conservation Areas (18) and ancient woodland (ten). These assets are afforded protection due to their national importance and significance in terms of their historical, archaeological, architectural or artistic interest. These assets are detailed further below, by designation-type. Following refinements to the Order Limits, one Scheduled Monument falls within the Order Limits (the Sanctuary Limit Stone at Bishop Burton (NHLE 1012589)); this has been taken forward for impact assessment presented within the ES Chapter (Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment). No other designated heritage assets are located within the Order Limits for Hornsea Four.

4.6.2 Scheduled Monuments

4.6.2.1 There is a total of 24 Scheduled Monuments within the OnSS 5 km study area and a further seven within the 1 km onshore ECC study area (shown and detailed in Figure 1, Table 3, Appendix B and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). Three other Scheduled Monuments have also been considered due to their visually prominent presence within the



low-lying, open landscape resulting in potential views towards the onshore ECC and landfall area during construction and the offshore infrastructure during construction and operation.



4.6.2.2 All these monuments have been scheduled due to their national importance and significance (incorporating archaeological and historic interest) and often form a major part of the



historic landscape or townscape character of the local area. A total of 12 NHLE entries relate to significant remains located on Westwood Pasture, directly south-west of Beverley. These NHLE entries describe the location of a Bronze Age oval barrow and three bowl barrows, nine Iron Age square barrows, and the extant earthwork remains of Romano-British enclosures. These features and remains survive well as distinct earthworks within the area due to the land being preserved as common land since the medieval period onwards, negating any impact to the earthworks from modern agricultural practices. This area of common land is located 4 km north-west of the OnSS and 250 m east of the onshore ECC at its nearest point.

- 4.6.2.3 Sixteen entries relate to the medieval history of the local area, including seven moated manor sites, one deserted village, two castles and two monastic sites. Moated sites and deserted medieval villages are relatively common monuments within the region and country. The moated sites often relate to the manorial seat for a local landowner during the period and were built to purvey a sense of power to the local population. Deserted villages often represent the abandonment of small nucleated settlements during the late medieval period, often attributed to the Black Death, but now desertion is often attributed to several economic and environmental conditions during the period (e.g. 'The Little Ice Age' resulting in poor crop growth, and population movements to larger urban centres).
- 4.6.2.4 A further three entries relate to sanctuary limit stones around the outskirts of Beverley. These stone markers were located on the edge of Beverley to denote an area where a person accused of a crime could consider themselves safe from their accusers and allowed time to try and clear their name. These monuments are rare and for three to survive around Beverley adds greatly to their historical interest and associated heritage significance. Following refinements to the Order Limits, the Sanctuary Limit Stone at Bishop Burton (NHLE 1012589) falls within the Order Limits and has been taken forward for impact assessment presented within the ES Chapter Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.
- 4.6.2.5 All of the monuments can be identified as being of **high** heritage significance, due to their archaeological and historical interest.





4.6.3 Listed Buildings

4.6.3.1 A total of 557 Listed Buildings are located within the study areas (Figure 1, Appendix B and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). The majority (530) are within the OnSS study area, principally due to the location and inclusion of the historic town of Beverley within this 5 km study area, which contains 447 of them. Within the onshore ECC study area, the remaining 27 Listed Buildings are located within the historic cores of smaller rural settlements, often in the form of parish churches. In total, there are 12 grade I listed and 46 grade II* listed buildings within the study areas (detailed in Table 4) and 498 are listed as grade II (not tabulated below). All listed building data is contained within gazetteers, shown in Appendix B.

4.6.3.2 The majority (38) of the grade I and II* Listed Buildings are located within Beverley Conservation Area, with some in Cottingham, Skidby, Foston and Walkington Conservation Areas. Arguably the most significant of these is the Minster Church of St John, located in the centre of Beverley (more commonly known as Beverley Minster). A monastic building has stood at this location since before the Norman conquest of 1066, whilst construction of the current Gothic-style minster building commenced in 1190, with construction of different sections undertaken through to the end of the 14th century. The church is dedicated to St John of Beverley and it was due to his reputation and 'fame' within the Church and country



- that resulted in Beverley Minster becoming a privileged sanctuary and centre of pilgrimage, turning the small settlement into a thriving town during the medieval period.
- 4.6.3.3 Many of the other listed buildings located within Beverley relate to residential and civic buildings dating to the post-medieval and early modern periods, with the styles and quality of architecture indicating the high status of the town during these periods.
- 4.6.3.4 The Listed Buildings are considered to be of **high** heritage significance to the local area and wider region, adding to the distinct quality and character of each Conservation Area, as well as the wider environment, particularly through shared intervisibility between buildings with vertical dominance (e.g. parish church spires).

4.6.4 Registered Parks and Gardens

- 4.6.4.1 There are two grade II Registered Parks and Gardens within the study areas. Risby Hall is located within both the OnSS and onshore ECC study areas (NHLE 1001419). It represents a park and garden associated with the Scheduled Monument surviving earthworks of the Hall (NHLE 1018600). Away from the house platform of the Hall (the Scheduled Monument), the earthworks of the 17th century formal garden are visible and to the east lies a more naturalistic garden with large lakes and a surviving folly, likely constructed in the late 18th century.
- 4.6.4.2 Thwaite Hall (NHLE 1000137) is located within the OnSS study area, 3 km south-east of the OnSS within Cottingham Conservation Area. The hall and grounds were built between 1803-7 for John Hentig, a wealthy merchant. Following its original construction, numerous other owners enlarged the property, with a significant redesign and a new, very large building constructed in the 1940s by Hull University. The buildings are not listed, with the gardens and pleasure ground forming the main features of historical and artistic interest, with a long narrow fishpond forming the main focal point of the grounds. This fishpond was constructed during the improvements to the grounds in the 19th century. Significant portions of the gardens around the house were redesigned during the 20th century, resulting in the loss of some of the more historically significant elements of the garden. Similarly, the land north of the fishpond was originally open paddocks, which were planted with woodland in 1965.
- 4.6.4.3 Both are considered to be of **high** heritage significance due to their archaeological and historical interest, along with the communal value they bring to the local area.

4.6.5 Conservation Areas

4.6.5.1 There is a total of 18 Conservation Areas within the study areas (Figure 1); five within the onshore ECC study area and the remainder within the OnSS study area. Of these, ten relate to distinct areas of Beverley. Nine of these (Areas 1 to 9, Table 5) have been assessed cumulatively as part of the setting assessment, whilst the tenth (Grosvenor Place) is considered separately due to its distance from the town's historic core.



4.6.5.2 All have Conservation Area Appraisals (CAA) available online, which detail the current character of the areas and potential risks to them (summarised in Table 5). All of these Conservation Areas were visited, and their setting and character assessed (Section 6). These areas have been designated as areas of important historical or architectural interest by ERYC and as such any development within them is carefully managed. Where development is permitted, it must enhance the character and setting of the Conservation Area, or at least be neutral (i.e. not detract in this regard).

4.6.5.3 These Conservation Areas are identified as being of **high** heritage significance to the region, adding to the historic character of the landscape. The exception is Beverley; where this group of conservation sub-areas is identified as being of **very high** significance to the region, with the character of the small town being one of the most distinct within the region and the Listed Buildings considered to be some of the most important examples of late medieval ecclesiastical architecture in the wider region.

4.6.6 Ancient Woodland

4.6.6.1 Ancient woodland (shown in Figure 1) is identified by Natural England as any woodland that is older than AD1600 (Forestry Commission & Natural England 2014). Ancient woodland has an inherent heritage interest, often contributing to the setting of other nearby heritage assets and having the potential to provide evidence of historic coppicing and other



woodland industries (e.g. charcoal or iron production). No such evidence is identified within the HER data, but this does not preclude the potential for it. Similarly, sections of ancient woodland can add greatly to an area's historic landscape character, and often enhance the setting of heritage assets. As such they form a useful addition to the baseline data.

- 4.6.6.2 In total, ten sections of woodland are registered as ancient within the study areas (detailed in Table 6). All these areas of woodland are located within the southern limits of the onshore ECC study area, west of Beverley and Hull. The largest section is named Burton Bushes and found in the north-western corner of Westwood Pasture, which also masks one of the scheduled Romano-British enclosures (NHLE 1014001). An area of Ancient Woodland is also located 340 m north of the OnSS and 15 m west of the OnSS access road. No sections of ancient woodland are found within the north-eastern two thirds of the onshore ECC study area, which again would be expected, as the area was marshland up until it was drained during the late medieval period.
- 4.6.6.3 The areas of ancient woodland are considered to be of at least **moderate** heritage significance in terms of their heritage interest, adding to the wider historic landscape character of the Wolds, although the areas are often so small they are difficult to distinguish within the landscape.

4.6.7 Registered Battlefields

4.6.7.1 There are no Registered Battlefields within the study areas, the nearest being 30 km to the west of the onshore ECC (Stamford Bridge).

4.7 Non-designated heritage data

- 4.7.1.1 This section is informed principally by data held in the HHER, obtained through a record search and a visit to the records office to assess documentary sources (visited on 7 March 2019).
- 4.7.1.2 The HHER data set records the location of many non-designated heritage assets (including archaeological sites and monuments) identified through previous fieldwork, the recovery of chance artefacts, review of aerial photography and any other research work undertaken and documented within the region. It informs the interpretation of the historic environment resource, as well as allowing for predictions to be made for the potential for as-yet unknown heritage assets (i.e. buried archaeological remains) to be found within a project's footprint.
- 4.7.1.3 All HHER data has been compiled into a gazetteer (Appendix C) and the sub-sections below identify the known remains most relevant to Hornsea Four with additional information provided where available from archaeological reports, HER event record data, data held on the ADS, results of the Yorkshire and Lincolnshire Rapid Coastal Zone Assessment Survey (Historic England 2010) and results from Historic England's National Mapping Programme (Historic England 2012).

4.7.1 Onshore ECC and Landfall Study Area

4.7.1.1 Within the 500 m onshore ECC study area, there is a total of 51 findspots and 190 monuments currently recorded within the HHER (shown in Figure 2 and detailed in Appendix C and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). As the onshore ECC transects through relatively remote countryside for much of its route, most monuments and findspots relate to archaeological remains of prehistoric to medieval date. Many are in the form of cropmarks which are indicative of the location of small farmstead enclosures or ceremonial monuments, such as Early Bronze Age round barrows or Iron Age square barrows.

Prehistoric

4.7.1.2 The earliest record within the onshore ECC study area relates to a Palaeolithic and Mesolithic flint working site excavated near Manor Farm in Brigham in the early 1960s where over 4,400 flints were recovered (MHU 3134).



- 4.7.1.3 Five records of Bronze Age round barrows and one cemetery are recorded in the HHER, four records are located south of Beswick of which one is recorded within the Order Limits (MHU 3147), the other two records are located to the north-east adjacent to Brigham Ings drain. This is a seemingly rare example of Bronze Age funerary practice in the area, on the very edge of the Wolds. Most of the known Bronze Age funerary activity has been recorded within the Wolds further to the west.
- 4.7.1.4 Of the 51 findspots, 31 relate to prehistoric struck flint tools. A total of five records of flint tool findspots are found within the landfall, associated within an area of complex cropmarks that are recorded as multi-period remains (MHU 326 and 21078). Interpretation of the cropmarks for this assessment, suggests a significant complex of Iron Age to Romano-British settlement(s), with evidence for potential square barrows, multiple enclosures, associated field systems and a trackway. An observation made during the walkover surveys (Section 5) identified potential archaeological remains in the cliff face suggesting the archaeology is being impacted by coastal erosion.
- 4.7.1.5 Another grouping of significant HHER entries within the onshore ECC study area are located north of Foston-on-the-Wolds. Three separate and distinct sub-rectangular enclosures have been recorded as cropmarks in fields north of the village (MHU 22121, 22148 and 22239), identified during the Hull Valley National Mapping Project (Historic England 2012). They are again most likely Iron Age to Romano-British enclosures associated with settlement, located 50 m to 200 m north of the onshore ECC. Another very similar enclosure is located directly adjacent to the onshore ECC near Beverley Road (MHU 22179).
- 4.7.1.6 Five cropmark locations are identified as potentially Iron Age square barrows within the study area (MHU 327, 332, 1519, 10044, 19425). Two groups are within a complex of cropmarks located to the north-west of the landfall (MHU 327 and 10044), one to the southwest of the landfall near Barmston (MHU 332), whilst the others are located approximately 30 m to the north-east of the Order Limits near Lockington (MHU 1519) and approximately 15 m to the north-west of the Order Limits near Beswick (MHU 19425).

Romano-British

4.7.1.7 Remains of definite Roman date are relatively rare within the onshore ECC study area, although it is thought that many of the Late Iron Age settlements recorded within the study areas would likely have continued into the Romano-British period. Roman pottery was recovered as a chance find at Lockington School (MHU 3490), whilst Romano-British features and finds were recovered during evaluation trenching at Lissett Airfield (MHU 21798). At Beverley, Westwood, several Romano-British glass bangles were discovered (MHU 15123, MHU 20133). The enclosures listed above as prehistoric may also potentially be Romano-British in date, whilst cropmarks south of Beswick, adjacent to Beverley Road are also considered potentially Roman in date (MHU 22336) and are located within 100 m to 200 m of the onshore ECC.

Anglo-Saxon

4.7.1.8 Anglo-Saxon remains within the onshore ECC study area are very rare; an assemblage of possible 6th to 7th century pottery was recovered in Brigham approximately 500 m from



the onshore ECC Order Limits (MHU 1129), whilst a silver Thor's hammer pendant was recovered near Leconfield (MHU 19684). The lack of recorded Anglo-Saxon remains is not unusual for the region. Anglo-Saxon remains can be notoriously hard to identify, due to a lack of dateable artefacts within features from this period, and since many of today's rural settlements were established during this period, archaeological remains of Anglo-Saxon date will have often been damaged or destroyed by later (medieval onwards) development.

4.7.1.9 A potential Anglo-Saxon burial ground has been identified through documentary references (MHU 3761), located within the footprint of the historic World War II airfield west of Lissett. No archaeological evidence for this cemetery has been identified, and watching briefs undertaken as part of an onshore wind farm development within the footprint of the historic airfield produced negative results.

<u>Medieval</u>

- 4.7.1.10 There is significant evidence of medieval settlement and farmstead activity throughout the onshore ECC study area with a number of villages having medieval origins, including Lissett (MHU 6669), Foston on the Wolds (MHU 9592) and Scorborough (MHU 3701).
- 4.7.1.11 Approximately 1 km west of Scorborough are a complex of archaeological remains which have been identified from cropmarks. These remains are identified as those of Winthorpe Manor house (MHU 3725). Excavation was undertaken within the area during the 1960s (see Section 4.7.5) which dated the remains from the 13th to 15th century. These remains are within 150 m of the onshore ECC.
- 4.7.1.12 Cropmarks associated with the shrunken village of Bentley (MHU 10058) and the site of the Manor House (MHU 9750) are recorded approximately 350 m to the east of the onshore ECC Order Limits.
- 4.7.1.13 East of Cherry Burton, the onshore ECC passes through the western-most field of Ravensthorpe deserted medieval village (MHU 3350). This monument consists of earthworks in the eastern fields, near to Rose Cottage Farm, whilst the western field is ploughed flat. It is probable that buried remains related to the deserted settlement are within the field. Approximately 700 m to the south-east are two medieval moated manors (MHU 3335 and 3700) which consist of extant moat earthworks partially masked by woodland.
- 4.7.1.14 Other cropmarks and earthworks of likely medieval date are located at Carr House Farm (MHU 3734) south-east of Beswick which may be associated with the Scheduled Barf Hill moated site (NHLE1007717) which is located further to the east outside of the onshore ECC study area. A further example of a medieval moated manor is recorded at Rotsea (MHU 4539), approximately 120 m south-east of the onshore ECC Order Limits.
- 4.7.1.15 Surviving ridge and furrow earthworks are located in a field to the south of Gembling House, north-east of Foston-on-the-Wolds, which the Onshore ECC passes through. These earthworks are not recorded on the HHER and are a good surviving example of medieval ridge and furrow which is visible from aerial photography.



Post-medieval to modern

- 4.7.1.16 A large number of the HHER records within the onshore ECC study area for these later periods relate to cartographic evidence for historic buildings or structures, such as farmsteads, windmills, watermills, public houses, blacksmiths and previous toll roads or turnpikes (detailed in Appendix C). These monuments have all been identified through historic map analysis and no longer exist above ground, however; there is the potential for remains associated with these monuments to survive below ground.
- 4.7.1.17 Along the coast, near landfall, there is a total of 27 monuments associated with World War II remains, mainly extant pillboxes, anti-tank cubes and gun emplacements. These World War II remains were visited as part of the walkover surveys (detailed in Section 5) in order to assess their survival, condition and significance, as well as to identify potential impacts from Hornsea Four. Some of the pillboxes were found very close to the cliff edge, and some will potentially erode onto the beach in the proceeding years.
- 4.7.1.18 Located approximately 500 m to the south of the onshore ECC Order Limits, is a record of a WWII crash site; the Spitfire BL246 crashed north of Barmston after colliding with a Beaufighter EL 394 on 22nd November 1942 (MHU 20480).

<u>Undated</u>

4.7.1.19 There are 35 monuments and one findspot of unknown date within the onshore ECC study area, most of which relate to cropmarks of enclosures and linear features.

4.7.2 OnSS Study Area

4.7.2.1 Within 1 km of the OnSS there are 29 monuments and eight findspots recorded in the HHER (Figure 2). Of most relevance to the OnSS is a group of extensive cropmarks (MHU 6599) and the site of two Bronze Age round barrows (MHU 1381).

Prehistoric

- 4.7.2.2 A number of the records relate to finds and features located within or directly adjacent to the OnSS which appear to be of prehistoric date. A Neolithic axehead (MHU 20109) was recovered from the stream bank, directly north of the OnSS. Prehistoric earthworks (MHU 7519 and 7521) are located in the fields north-west of the OnSS and a potential Neolithic henge (MHU 6625) is located north of the A1079, approximately 800 m from the OnSS.
- 4.7.2.3 Approximately 700 m east of the OnSS, is important evidence for a Bronze Age round barrow cemetery. One of these monuments is Scheduled (NHLE 1007731) and five HHER entries identify other potential barrows within the same field, visible as cropmarks (MHU 833, 6618, 14122, 14123 and 18737). The site of another two Bronze Age round barrows is recorded within the OnSS, towards the north-western end (MHU 1381).
- 4.7.2.4 There is an undated polygonal enclosure and associated trackways and other field system ditches (MHU 6599) located directly south of, and within, the OnSS. An undated pit (MHU 12381) is also located to the south-west of the OnSS, and approximately 20 m north of the onshore ECC Order Limits. These archaeological remains are visible as cropmarks on aerial



photographs and are far reaching, with the potential to extend further northwards across the OnSS, and eastwards towards the existing Creyke Beck National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) substation. These remains may date to the Iron Age and possibly associated with the Iron Age activity identified through archaeological investigation prior to the Creyke Beck NGET substation construction in 1997 (see Section 4.7.5). The aerial photographs also record evidence for medieval ridge and furrow which has the potential to mask earlier archaeological remains.

<u>Medieval</u>


4.7.2.5 A potential medieval deer park is recorded 600 m to the south of the OnSS (MHU 8801), identified from documentary sources. A medieval seal findspot (MHU 1379) has also been recovered directly south of the OnSS.

Post-medieval to modern

4.7.2.6 A small number of heritage assets located within the 1 km OnSS study area are of post-medieval date. Two relate to former houses, one of which was located immediately to the east of the OnSS (MHU 16583). The Hull to Scarborough railway (MHU 8811) which opened in 1846 is located approximately 700 m to the east of the OnSS. Located nearly 900 m to the south-east of the OnSS is Cottingham Pumping Station (MHU 14362). The remaining three heritage assets relate to extant houses; Platwoods Farm (MHU 7845) to the west, Pillwood Farm (MHU 14114) to the south-east and Northmoor House (MHU 15141) to the east. There are no heritage assets dated to the modern period within the OnSS 1 km study area.

Undated

4.7.2.7 Within the 1 km OnSS study area are five monuments and one findspot of unknown date, including an old pit marked on the 1855 OS map to the south of Burn Park Farm (MHU 12381). This map also marks the site of 'Cottingham Lawns' (MHU 12371) adjacent to the 400 kV NGET connection area Order Limits.





4.7.3 Locally Listed Buildings

- 4.7.3.1 There is no formal list detailing the locally listed buildings, however the HHER holds records for built heritage within the study areas. These records often relate to historic buildings within the cores of urban centres, such as Beverley and Cottingham. The records have been considered separately from other non-designated records due to the contribution these assets can have to the historic character and setting of their local area.
- 4.7.3.2 There are 15 locally listed buildings within the 1 km onshore ECC study area and a further 672 within 5 km of the OnSS, just over half (351) relate to buildings that are also formally listed (nationally designated) and are mostly located within Beverley or Cottingham (Appendix C). There are also a further 50 entries for lamp posts and 27 entries for boundary walls and associated gate piers located within Beverley. Generally, apart from the buildings that are also nationally designated, many of these buildings, structures and remains are considered to be of at least **moderate** heritage significance, adding to the general heritage interest and historic character of the areas, as well as the setting of associated heritage assets.
- 4.7.3.3 Consideration is also given to non-designated farmsteads currently extant. Some farm houses within the OnSS study area are designated (e.g. Old Hall and White Hall, see Section 4.6), but other non-designated farm buildings also have historic vernacular structures surviving, which contribute to the historic character of the local area. They consist of Victorian or later farmhouses within modern farmyards, often built over areas where potentially earlier vernacular buildings might have existed. There are ten farmsteads within the OnSS study area recorded within the HHER (Table 7). These are also considered of at least moderate heritage significance, adding to the historic character of the local area.

4.7.3.4 Currently no intervisibility towards the OnSS from the farms has been identified. This is the case for farms located adjacent to the historic cores of villages (e.g. Northland's Farm and Park Farm, Walkington) and for those that have views interrupted by modern infrastructure



(e.g. Butt Farm, which has limited views east towards the OnSS due to the intervening A164 and existing tree cover).

4.7.4 Other structures of historic interest

- 4.7.4.1 During the walkover surveys (see Section 5) and review of cartographic sources, a small number of historic buildings (and the locations of previous historic buildings no longer extant within the landscape), war memorials, road bridges and telephone boxes were identified. These heritage assets, which are not all currently recorded within the HHER, were assessed and are considered to be of no more than **low** to **moderate** heritage significance.
- 4.7.4.2 War memorials are a common asset in the study areas but are rarely designated. There are two listed memorials in the Northern Cemetery, Hull (east of Cottingham; NHLE 1293274 and 1297038), whilst other memorials are mentioned in the listing details for certain designated churches (e.g. Beverley Minster, NHLE 1084028, and Church of St Mary, NHLE 1162693). Despite the War Memorials Listing Project undertaken by Historic England, which was completed in September 2018, it appears no further memorials were listed within this region.
- 4.7.4.3 Many war memorials within the study areas are registered on the Imperial War Museums Register of Memorials, all of which can be considered of at least **moderate** heritage significance. The total number within the study areas is difficult to quantify as the register contains over 1,000 within the Humberside region (as per the search filter of the register), 200 of which are within Beverley District. Out of these, many refer to gravestones of service men and women and many other memorials are wall plaques often within churches. Approximately 60 relate to either crosses, statues or obelisks near or within the grounds of churches. For example, an obelisk memorial is located at Woodmansey, opposite St Peter's Church (MHU 5016) adjacent to Hull Road, which contributes to the setting of the church and its associated significance.
- 4.7.4.4 One road bridge (Wilfholme Bridge MHU 12871) is located within the 500 m onshore ECC study area and is considered to be of, at most, **moderate** heritage significance. No further bridges of historic interest were identified during the walkover surveys.
- 4.7.4.5 Intervisibility with Hornsea Four Order Limits (particularly the OnSS) is considered unlikely for these asset groups. For example, all the telephone boxes identified as having heritage significance during walkover surveys were within Beverley or villages such as Cottingham, Walkington or Wawne and located on streets where the built-up nature of their surroundings results in limited views outwards from the village or town locations.
- 4.7.4.6 Another important consideration are farmsteads which were identified on historic cartographic resources (mainly the OS 1st edition mapping), which are either no longer extant or now part of a modern farm (see Section 4.5). These farmsteads have some potential for archaeological remains associated with them to survive and contribute to the wider historic environment resource. As such they are considered of at least low heritage significance. These heritage assets are identified across the study areas, principally within



the OnSS study area, such as Bentley Park Farm (MHU 12978), Platwoods Farm (MHU 7845) and Black House Farm (MHU 12147).

4.7.5 Previous Archaeological Excavations and Surveys

- 4.7.5.1 Previous archaeological fieldwork, undertaken prior to or as a condition of development or as part of a research project is recorded within the HHER (Figure 2 and Appendix C and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), on the ADS, as well as in grey literature reports and publications produced to disseminate the findings of the projects. Previous archaeological work can take the form of historic buildings assessment/recording, site walkovers, geophysical survey, fieldwalking, metal detecting, watching briefs (i.e. archaeological monitoring of groundworks), trial trench evaluations, strip, map and record excavations and full excavations. Finds and archaeological remains found as part of these works will also be recorded within the HHER as a find spot or monument for example, adding to the narrative of the region's historic environment resource.
- 4.7.5.2 A total of 47 grey literature reports, held on the ADS, were reviewed for relevance whilst a further eight were reviewed in-person at the HHER. Out of these, the Creyke Beck NGET Substation Archaeological Reports (Northern Archaeological Associates 1997 & 1998) and the Ganstead to Asselby Gas Pipeline Post-Excavation Assessment (Network Archaeology 2011) were found to be of particular relevance.
- 4.7.5.3 Limited archaeological works have been undertaken within the onshore ECC study area, with 13 events recorded within the HHER. These take the form of watching briefs undertaken as part of smaller development works or installation of pipelines (seven records), two trial trench evaluations prior to development, and one desk-based assessment. The lack of archaeological works within the area is understandable considering the rural, agricultural landscape the onshore ECC passes through.
- 4.7.5.4 Many of the events that have taken place produced limited archaeological remains. Two flint flakes were found during a watching brief in Brigham (EHU1911), whilst the most notable event is the excavations undertaken of Winthorpe Manor (EHU2063), west of Scorborough, between 1959-63 which revealed 12th to 17th century occupation in the western half of the field, including remains of the 16th to 17th century manor house. Reports on the excavations were not completed and the site archive is poor precluding further interpretation.
- 4.7.5.5 Archaeological works within 5 km of the OnSS are more prevalent, with a total of 236 events recorded within the HHER, whilst only four are formally recorded within 1 km of the OnSS; event numbers were not obtained for the Creyke Beck NGET substation excavation (see Section 4.7.5.6). Again, most of these events took place within Beverley (152) and Cottingham (31). The remaining events took place in the smaller rural settlement centres such as Walkington, Little Weighton and Epplesworth. Most of these events are watching briefs undertaken as part of smaller developments.



- 4.7.5.6 The nearest larger-scale intrusive archaeological works to the OnSS were undertaken prior to the construction of Creyke Beck NGET Substation, approximately 250 m to the east of the OnSS permanent footprint (NAA 1997 & 1998). Several Iron Age features were found within the trial trenching. Geophysical survey was then undertaken in an attempt to trace where the features extended to. These features may well aid in dating the undated remains recorded on the HHER to the west, directly next to and potentially within the OnSS.
- 4.7.5.7 During the construction of the Ganstead to Asselby gas pipeline (Network Archaeology 2011), two excavations were undertaken approximately 300 m north-west of White Hall Farm, approximately 2 km north of the OnSS at Shepherd Lane (Pipeline Plots 53 & 55; TA 04131 37128). Further evidence for a Late Iron Age to Early Roman settlement was revealed with 17 roundhouses and other post-built structures superseded by a Roman field system.
- 4.7.5.8 A watching brief was undertaken approximately 1 km south of the OnSS, at the location of the demolished Norwood Lodge (EHU1016). No archaeological features were revealed, but ceramic building material from the demolished lodge was recovered and dated the construction of the building to the 18th century.

5 Walkover Survey

- 5.1.1.1 Two phases of walkover surveys were undertaken to inform the historic environment baseline. The walkover surveys consisted of a condition survey and/or a setting assessment site visit. The condition survey was undertaken at targeted locations to record the extent and level of survival of the earthworks and cropmarks recorded in the HHER and to establish whether the current land-use was suitable for a programme of priority archaeological geophysical survey. Setting assessment site visits were undertaken for heritage assets identified as potentially being indirectly (non-physically) impacted by Hornsea Four, such as Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas. A total of 73 locations were visited during the production of this DBA (Appendix A).
- 5.1.1.2 These walkover surveys also incorporated a rapid assessment of the historic landscape in order to identify any potential risks or impacts to the historic environment and establish key considerations early on.
- 5.1.1.3 The vast majority of the landscape that the onshore ECC passes through is arable farmland, principally winter wheat, consisting of large, open fields bounded by large ditches and/or hedgerows. Small sections of pasture are located within certain areas, particularly where earthworks survive, and pockets of woodland are located near to the onshore ECC, mostly within the hinterlands of the Wolds towards the southern limits. The OnSS is situated within a slightly more urbanised locality, with Beverley to the north and Hull and its suburbs to the south-east. The immediate vicinity of the OnSS is open arable farmland with some larger sections of woodland to the north.
- 5.1.1.4 At the landfall, a number of World War II defences were visited, all of which are recorded within the HHER. These remains consisted of extant pillboxes and anti-tank cubes (on the beach and cliffs edge) along with partial remains of other features which have collapsed



onto the beach through coastal erosion. Erosion of certain pillboxes on the cliff edge was identified as a significant risk during the site visit. Similarly, the remains of an Iron Age to Roman settlement (MHU 21078), visible as cropmarks in the fields directly adjacent to the beach at landfall were also identified as at risk of loss through coastal erosion, with potential buried archaeological remains identified within the cliff face during the site visit.

5.1.1.5 Within the OnSS study area, the fields forming the OnSS were visited. Slight depressions associated with buried archaeological remains identified as cropmarks on aerial photography were faintly visible within the fields forming the southern limit of the OnSS (associated with MHU 6599).

6 Setting Assessment

6.1 Introduction

- 6.1.1.1 Due to the scale of Hornsea Four, the study areas have been separated into regions distinguished by their urban or landscape character.
- 6.1.1.2 These areas, starting from landfall, are:
 - The Yorkshire Coast;
 - Holderness;
 - The Wolds' Hinterlands;
 - Beverley; and
 - The Hull Suburbs.
- 6.1.1.3 These distinct areas aid in separating out the important setting considerations from a historic landscape perspective, whilst allowing for an ease of navigation through the large quantity of heritage data forming the baseline. Particular attention is paid to intervisibility between heritage assets and the OnSS, with the aid of ZTV data and supported by wireframes and photomontages of relevant locations, to identify where heritage significance may be affected due to a change in visual links between heritage assets.
- 6.1.1.4 This setting assessment addresses steps 1 to 4 of the Historic England guidance (2017a) and builds upon the work undertaken previously and commented on by stakeholders as part of the Section 42 process. The results of steps 1 to 2 are presented in Sections 6.2 to 6.7, step 3 is presented in Section 6.8 and step 4 is presented in Section 6.9.



- 6.1.1.5 In summary, the main objectives of this setting assessment were to:
 - Establish which designated and pertinent non-designated heritage assets located within the study areas may have potential setting implications as a result of Hornsea Four:
 - Establish an understanding of the heritage assets and their setting, through documentary research and site visits, to identify potential changes to setting as a result of Hornsea Four;
 - Assess the effects of Hornsea Four (beneficial or harmful) on the significance of the heritage assets, or an ability to appreciate that significance through a change in setting; and
 - Identify ways to minimise the harm or provide enhancement to the setting of any affected heritage assets.
- 6.1.1.6 All the heritage assets visited for the setting assessment are included in Appendix A, whilst a summary of the contribution setting makes to each heritage asset's significance is detailed in Table 8. Many of these heritage assets were identified as not having visibility or intervisibility with Hornsea Four during the setting site visits, and as such are not included in the text below. Those heritage assets which were identified as having visibility or intervisibility with Hornsea Four, and therefore possibly subject to alterations to their setting (and associated heritage significance), are discussed in detail below (Sections 6.2 to 6.7). Identification of any potential setting issues to these key heritage assets based on the latest design and route refinements for Hornsea Four are included in Section 6.8. All photographs were taken with an iPhone 7 12MP camera (f/1.8 aperture 6-element lens).

6.2 The Yorkshire Coast

6.2.1 Introduction

6.2.1.1 This landscape consists of the gently undulating low-lying fields leading onto the coast, with panoramic views of the area and views out to sea. The landscape is dotted with numerous World War II defences, such as pillboxes and gun emplacements, all of which survive well.

6.2.2 World War II Coastal Defences

6.2.2.1 These remains (Figure 2 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B) when grouped together form an important group asset along the coast. Numerous anti-tank cubes (MHU21148), surviving pillboxes (MHU21081) and residual concrete remains are located along the beaches near Fraisthorpe. Currently the setting is one of rural coastline with wide views of the seascape and panoramic views of the coastline. The World War II coastal defences sit within this landscape very well, contributing to its historic character. Similarly, the setting adds to the significance of the asset group, particularly with the anti-tank cubes on the beach, with the wide, 'open' coastline indicative of why the defences were required. The pillboxes are of variable preservation; some are near-destroyed through coastal erosion, whilst others are situated on top of the low cliffs forming the lands edge and are clearly visible from the beach. Very little modern development has impacted upon the current



setting, with only groupings of wind turbines located nearby being visible, but these are not considered to affect their setting or associated heritage significance, situated within a broad panorama. Overall the setting of these assets is considered to make a **moderate** contribution to their significance.

6.2.3 Skipsea Castle and Halgarth Moated Site

- 6.2.3.1 These heritage assets (NHLE 1011212 and 1013705, Figure 1) are located approximately 5 km south of the landfall, and 3.5 km south-east of the onshore ECC. Skipsea Castle is the impressive earthwork remains of a motte and bailey castle located on the edge of the village, visible from some distance. The moated site is less visible, located behind housing within the village itself but is a well-preserved example of a medieval moated site.
- 6.2.3.2 The heritage assets are situated within a rural village setting in Holderness, with wider views of the modern agricultural landscape. Preservation of both is very good, allowing an appreciation of their function and history. Similarly, intervisibility between both aids in their appreciation. This results in a setting that contributes to their significance. Furthermore, the castle is historically very significant; as it was the seat for the Lord of Holderness, a lordship created by William the Conqueror and given to his trusted follower, Drogo de la Beauvriere, who fought alongside him at the Battle of Hastings. This castle is one of the earliest constructed in Yorkshire (c. 1086) and the surviving motte and bailey is very well preserved.
- 6.2.3.3 Intervisibility with the Church of All Saints, which is within panoramas from both assets, also forms part of the setting, introducing further historic interest and tying sites together through their links to the village (Plate 1).
- 6.2.3.4 There are no identifiable views towards the onshore ECC or landfall location from the castle or moat. Views are mostly blocked by hedgerows and modern residential buildings. From the top of the Skipsea Castle mound it is difficult to clearly identify the location of the onshore ECC and landfall area given the considerable distance, although there is still potential for the onshore ECC to be visible from the castle during construction.
- 6.2.3.5 Overall, the setting of these heritage assets makes a **major** contribution to their heritage significance.

6.2.4 Church of All Saints and Old Hall medieval complex, Barmston

6.2.4.1 The Church of All Saints (NHLE 1083851), Old Hall (NHLE 1204832) and adjacent earthwork remains of a deserted medieval village (NHLE 1007846) are situated within a quiet rural setting, within a wider modern agricultural landscape. The heritage assets are easily visible and appreciated as a group, with the earthworks forming the background to the church. They aid in understanding the significance of one another; the medieval remains are indicative of the church's origins, and the church supports the interpretation of the earthworks as a previous settlement, centred around the church. The area is tranquil, and a lack of traffic noise also contributes positively to their setting, and an appreciation of their significance. Modern agricultural buildings are located nearby, which detract slightly, but overall the setting makes at least a moderate contribution to the assets' heritage significance.

6.2.4.2 Views towards the onshore ECC are partial and often masked by hedgerows or tree cover.

6.3 Holderness

6.3.1 Introduction

6.3.1.1 This landscape encompasses the central section of the onshore ECC, from the village of Lissett to the beginning of the rise to the Wolds, located at Beswick. The landscape is again low-lying and relatively flat, with wide panoramic views occasionally interrupted by woodland.

6.3.2 Former RAF Lissett

6.3.2.1 This World War II airfield (MHU11147, Figure 2 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B) is located adjacent to the A165, west of Lissett village. Currently, the airfield is in a



distinctly modern agricultural setting with an onshore wind farm located on the western half of its footprint. The layout of the airfield is still visible with the concrete tracks still in use. The airfield has some historical significance, forming the residence of No. 158 Heavy Bomber squadron, who carried out bombing runs from March 1943 until the end of the war, completing 250 missions and losing 144 aircraft. There is also the possibility for an Anglo-Saxon cemetery to be present somewhere within the footprint of the airfield. The current setting makes a **moderate** contribution to the heritage significance of the airfield as a historical monument and a **low** contribution to the significance of any potential Anglo-Saxon cemetery.

- 6.3.2.2 With respect to the contribution that setting makes to the heritage significance of the World War II airfield, this is due to the current layout of the airfield being appreciable in form from the roadside along with a well-designed memorial to the aircrew who flew from the airfield, installed on the roadside (Plate 2).
- 6.3.2.3 Lissett village and its grade II listed Church of St James forms part of the airfield's setting, although intervisibility between them is limited, particularly as the church doesn't have a tower and is masked by tree cover surrounding its boundary.
- 6.3.2.4 Construction works along the onshore ECC will be visible from the airfield and roadside and will also bisect through the southern limits of the airfield, which could impact upon remains



of archaeological significance associated with the airfield and/or a potential Anglo-Saxon cemetery identified through documentary sources (see Section 4.7.1).

6.3.3 Foston-on-the-Wolds Conservation Area

- 6.3.3.1 Despite its name, this village is over 5 km from the nearest hills of the Yorkshire Wolds (Figure 1). The village has a quintessentially English rural village character, with vernacular architecture of 18th and 19th century predominating alongside modern housing. Kelk Beck flows through the centre of the village and forms a focal point for the village, and the winding country lane the village has built up around adds to the feeling of a village with a rich history. The village is set on an outcrop within Holderness, situated at approximately 8 m aOD. This extra height is noticeable within the local landscape, with impressive views across parts of Holderness obtainable within the village. This is particularly relevant for some of the properties which will have impressive rural views of Holderness from the first storey. The lack of modern development and the natural 'greenscape' of the village, including the river, associated foliage and clearly apparent wildlife (birds) within the village, along with the quiet village character and lack of traffic, all contribute to and represent material elements of the setting. This setting also contributes to the attractive historic character of the village and associated historic buildings. Overall, the setting of the village makes a major contribution to its heritage significance.
- 6.3.3.2 Within the locality of Foston-on-the-Wolds are three distinct enclosures, surviving as buried archaeological remains within arable farmland, north of Foston-on-the-Wolds and close to the onshore ECC (MHU 22121 & 22148). These assets are not visible above ground, only known due to aerial photographic assessment. These assets have a modern agricultural setting, situated within the large open arable fields that make up the wider setting of Foston-on-the-Wolds. As such, this setting, despite being modern, still makes a **minor** contribution to their heritage significance, providing a quiet/tranquil setting, although not aiding in the appreciation of the assets.
- 6.3.3.3 Views towards the onshore ECC are potentially obtained from within the village, although it appears that due to the distances involved any onshore ECC construction activity would appear on the edge of a very wide panorama only.

6.3.4 Rotsea Deserted Medieval Village

6.3.4.1 This Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1005212) is accessible down a narrow country lane and a long distance from any major village centre, located near to the River Hull and Frodingham Beck, with wide vistas of Holderness available from a very flat, open landscape. A lack of visible modern buildings or infrastructure is also noticeable, with only the occasional farmstead observed in the distance, resulting in a strong sense of remoteness and bleakness, particularly with the strong winds that occur within such a landscape. This all contributes positively to the setting of the monument. The condition of the earthworks also adds to an appreciation of setting (including associated heritage significance), with significant remains surviving (Plate 3), including some ditch earthworks that survive to such a depth that water is held within them. The layout of the deserted village is still discernible with hollow ways



and the location of the potential house platforms identified when on site. Overall, the setting of the monument makes a **major** contribution to its heritage significance.

6.3.4.2 Views towards the onshore ECC during construction would potentially be available but partially masked by low hedgerows and the location of a farmstead to the northwest.

6.3.5 Carr House cropmark complex

- 6.3.5.1 This complex of medieval earthworks and cropmarks is located 300 m south of the onshore ECC, and within the final area of Holderness before meeting the Wolds' hinterlands. They consist of two large fields split in half by a track leading to the farmhouse to the north with the westernmost field being ploughed and the eastern field comprising extant earthworks. These remains are non-designated (MHU 3734). The current setting is one dominated by the 19th century farmhouse to the north, whilst the wider landscape is distinctly 'Holderness' in character; flat with expansive views. The main contributor to its setting are the earthworks themselves, which survive well, and are impressive, albeit confusing in pattern, making it difficult to discern much of any settlement layout when on site. The remains have a landscape link with Barf Hill moated site, located 1.5 km to the east (outside of the onshore ECC study area), which enhances the setting and historic interest of the remains. The setting of these remains is considered to make a **moderate** contribution to the asset's heritage significance.
- 6.3.5.2 Views towards the onshore ECC are partially obstructed by the farmhouse and intervening hedgerows and partial tree line.



6.4 The Wolds' Hinterlands

6.4.1 Introduction

6.4.1.1 The Wolds' hinterlands represent a major change in landscape character when approached from Holderness, with the beginning of gently rolling hills suggestive of the start of the Wolds and representing a marked contrast to the flat open landscape of Holderness. Villages are more common within the region, and are often distinctive in their cohesive vernacular architecture, with the historical wealth of many villages apparent, as well as their associations with previous estate lands.

6.4.2 Beswick Conservation Area

6.4.2.1 This small village is located on the edge of the Wolds (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), overlooking Holderness, situated directly west of the A164 Beverley Road (which was constructed in the 1970s, bypassing the village). Its current setting is dominated by the grade II* listed Beswick Hall (NHLE 1103484) and its associated farm buildings, located on the western side of the road, which is an impressive example of a manorial hall of late 16th century date (Plate 4). The small church with a construction date of approximately AD1500 is located on the eastern side of the road along with the majority of residential housing, which are a mix of historic and modern construction. The local landscape adds a rural element to the setting, whilst the wide green verges and features such as two historic village water pumps aid in the appreciation of the village's historic interest. The noise from Beverley Road, a busy main road from Bridlington to Beverley, detracts from the historic character of the village but not significantly.

6.4.2.2 The current setting is considered to make a **moderate** contribution to the Conservation Area's heritage significance. Views towards the onshore ECC are potentially available from within Beswick due to the relatively open character of the village and wide panoramic views obtainable of Holderness.

6.4.3 Lockington Conservation Area

6.4.3.1 Lockington is located south-west of Beswick (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B) and located along a country road off the A164 Beverley Road. The area closest to the onshore ECC is the surviving parkland associated with the estate located at Lockington. This land contributes greatly to the rural character of the village. Similarly, a well-preserved farmstead is located on the very edge of the village, built in the c. 18th century. The busy main road through the village produces a lot of noise affecting the setting but this is offset (in part) by the well-maintained village and appropriate street furnishings. Furthermore, many of the agricultural buildings (such as the aforementioned farmhouse) have all their doors and windows painted a distinctive yellow colour to denote their association with the local estate. This adds to the cohesiveness of the village's architecture and enhances its setting. Overall setting makes a moderate contribution to the conservation area's heritage significance.



6.4.3.2 Views of the onshore ECC are obtainable from the south-eastern extent of the Conservation Area as it is located on slightly elevated land. The view, however, is interrupted by intervening hedgerows and tree cover.

6.4.4 Scorborough Village and Scheduled Monuments

- 6.4.4.1 Scorborough does not have a Conservation Area (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), however its character and the large scale of the Scheduled Monuments (NHLE 1015613 & 1015818) within the locality result in it being a significant and well-defined location that merits further consideration. It is located off the A164 and is a small village in a very rural setting with a distinct estate-village character. It is surrounded by fields lain to pasture, with numerous earthworks within the locality, including a cluster of round barrow earthworks, two moated manor sites and various ditch earthworks within the surviving parkland. The focus of the village is around the Church of St Leonard, a grade I listed building, whilst the rest of the village consists of well-maintained vernacular dwellings, along with a large farmhouse and farmyard offset from the village road.
- 6.4.4.2 The nature of the surviving earthworks themselves adds greatly to their heritage significance, and the village's setting, with the parkland adjacent to the church containing distinct earthworks of medieval origin (Plate 5), such as a large moated manor site and associated field systems. To the west, on the edge of the village and easily visible from the road, is a very well-preserved moated site, with associated ditch that still holds water. The cluster of round barrow earthworks are difficult to identify from the road and are not publicly accessible, but they can be partially seen and appreciated from the fields fronting the village road.

6.4.4.3 The village is very quiet and minimal on-road parking results in a village with a very strong and appreciable historic character, the setting of which makes a **major** contribution to the heritage significance of the village and the earthworks. Intervisibility with the area of the Hornsea Four onshore ECC was not readily apparent from within the village.

6.4.5 Leconfield Castle

- 6.4.5.1 This is another impressive moated site (NHLE 1007949; Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), with the extant ditch surviving to a depth of approximately 2 m. The monument is accessed down a footpath from Leconfield, within a relatively flat landscape which results in a predominantly rural, agricultural setting. Most of the nearby fields are small and lain to pasture which reduces any modern agricultural feel, with many of the fields likely set out during Enclosure. This setting makes at least a moderate contribution to the heritage significance of the monument.
- 6.4.5.2 The monument shares a landscape and most likely a history with the nearby Ravensthorpe deserted medieval village, located to the south-west. Intervisibility is not apparent between the assets and no views to the onshore ECC from the moated site were identified on site as its setting is quite enclosed due to the mature hawthorn hedgerows and tree cover forming the boundary to the moated site, precluding any significant views outwards.



6.4.6 Raventhorpe Deserted Medieval Village

- 6.4.6.1 This complex of cropmarks and earthworks are located east of Cherry Burton and are visible from the track accessing Rose Farm (Figure 2 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). The earthworks are visible from the farmyard, although no evidence of the cropmarks (recorded in the HHER MHU3350) is identifiable when on site. The current setting is one of modern agriculture, with the modern farm and large fields within the area adding to this impression. The small field containing the earthworks aids in the interpretation of the medieval village and enhances the appreciation of the asset, as without the earthworks there would be no above-ground evidence for the former village. The earthworks are quite well preserved with ditches, a trackway and potentially some house platforms still visible. Overall the current setting makes a moderate contribution to the heritage significance of the earthworks.
- 6.4.6.2 The onshore ECC passes the complex of cropmarks at their western-most limit. The associated construction works will be clearly visible from the earthworks and could impact any buried archaeological remains associated with the village, should they survive.

6.4.7 Moated Sites, Parkhouse Farm

6.4.7.1 These two moated sites are scheduled (NHLE 1007842 and 1008292) and interpreted as the location of hunting lodges for a medieval deer park (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). They are located on a trackway leading up to a modern farm. The current setting is distinctly modern and agricultural. Of the two, the western-most is the most visible in the landscape and is well preserved, with ditches over 2 m deep still present and water contained within the large ditch and associated fishpond (Plate 6). The eastern moated site is not visible, located within dense woodland. Currently, the modern farm and



its associated outbuildings, along with the lack of intervisibility between the two moated sites results in a setting that is a **minor** detractor from their heritage significance.

6.4.7.2 There are potentially views towards the onshore ECC from these designated heritage assets, although the views are at least partially masked by tree cover and hedgerows.

6.4.8 Cherry Burton Conservation Area

6.4.8.1 Cherry Burton (and its neighbour, Bishop Burton) has a distinct character and is considered to be a good example of a typical Yorkshire Wolds village (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B). The majority of the buildings with historic interest and character are located on the frontage of the east-west road through the town, often in terrace form and located in groups. There is a large area of estate parkland located at the eastern end of the village and the large manor house (Cherry Burton House; grade II listed – NHLE 1103437) dominates the approach to the village. The topography of the village results in the modern housing situated within estates off the main road not being visible from within the village's historic core, with the surviving historic buildings and structures predominating views and aiding greatly in the appreciation of the village's historical links. Overall, the dominance of historic buildings and their cohesive architecture along with the large section



- of surviving estate parkland all results in a setting that makes a **major** contribution to the conservation area's heritage significance.
- 6.4.8.2 Likely partial visibility to the onshore ECC (when under construction) was identified on site from within the parkland which forms the eastern half of the Conservation Area.

6.4.9 Bishop Burton Conservation Area & Deer Park Pale

6.4.9.1 This village has a similar development history to its neighbour – Cherry Burton (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), and the historic wealth of the village is clearly visible in the large quantity of high quality 17th to 18th century buildings. The village is centred around a large green and pond and has developed in a ribbon-band style typical of Wold villages. The architecture is cohesive, with many of the smaller cottages painted with whitewash (Plate 7). The small church is visible from much of the village, located on the side of the dry valley from which the village developed within. The main road running through the village is extremely busy resulting in a background noise perceptible from within the village, although once off the main road and within the smaller side streets the area is generally peaceful. Many of the roads also maintain their original medieval route and size resulting in narrow winding lanes still in use today.

- 6.4.9.2 Outside of the historic core of the village, to the north, is a large equestrian centre and college; precluded from any views from the village due to the topography and does not affect its historic qualities and interest.
- 6.4.9.3 The deer park pale is a Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1019864) and consists of an earthwork and buried remains associated with Bishop Burton Manor, held by the Archbishop of York until 1542. The remains are unusual compared to other deer park pales, with the ditches located on the outside of the boundary and having a gentle inner slope and steep outer. This suggests it may well have had a different function to other deer park pales, which were often very steep to deter poachers. This monument adds greatly to the overall setting and associated heritage significance of the village, and vice-versa, aiding in an appreciation of the medieval origins of the village.
- 6.4.9.4 Overall the setting of the village makes a **major** contribution to its heritage significance. No likely views towards the onshore ECC or OnSS were identified from within the village due to the topography (located in the bottom of a dry valley) precluding any longer-range views.

6.4.10 Walkington Conservation Area

- 6.4.10.1 This large village is located west of the onshore ECC (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B) and has a quaint English Village setting (Plate 8). located on the edge of the Yorkshire Wolds. This wider landscape is important to its setting as it forms the wider backdrop to the village. Within the village, the architecture isn't particularly cohesive with multiple styles and periods of property. The buildings are all of high quality however and enhance the setting. In particular, some of the historic properties, such as the cottages and The Old Rectory (NHLE 1103416) are distinct within the village and contribute to its historic qualities. Of note is the 17th to 18th century Old Rectory, which is quite dominant in the village, located on a raised section of ground. Most street furniture (i.e. lights and signs) complement the setting well, contributing to the character of the Conservation Area, although traffic calming within the village does detract from its character and the traffic itself introduces significant background noise within the village.
- 6.4.10.2 The current setting of the village makes a **major** contribution to its significance. No likely views towards the onshore ECC were noticeable on site due to the local topography and current intervening buildings blocking any views.

6.5 Beverley

6.5.1 Introduction

- 6.5.1.1 Beverley is situated upon the edge of the Yorkshire Wolds, dominating views from Holderness to the east. Major views of the landscape can be obtained from the higher escarpment west of Beverley, at Westwood Pasture, whilst views towards the town and its minster are far-reaching when located within Holderness to the south. Due to the size of Beverley, and sheer quantity and quality of significant heritage assets within the town and its vicinity, the key aspects of setting and associated heritage significance have been split within this section to aid in articulation and better understanding.
- 6.5.1.2 Overall, however, the town and nearby landscape has a setting that is distinctly historic in feel due in part to the dominating presence of Beverley Minster and St Mary's Church, whilst the town's layout, historic street names and cobbled streets around the Minster and views across the town from Westwood Pasture all contribute to and enhance the town's setting, which in turn contributes greatly to the town and its associated heritage assets' significance.

6.5.2 Beverley Minster

6.5.2.1 The most dominant heritage asset within the town is the Minster itself, NHLE 1084028 (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), which forms a major landmark and contributes greatly to the wider setting of the town and other associated heritage



assets. Beverley Minster is considered to have significant archaeological, historical and artistic interest, and is one of the best examples of surviving medieval ecclesiastical Gothic style architecture within the region and arguably holds as much historical significance as York Minster.

6.5.2.2 Beverley Minster (Plate 9) has historical associations with St John of Beverley, who founded a monastery in the 8th century nearby. His remains still lie in a vault under the nave, and historically there are numerous stories about his link to the crown of England; Alfred the Great's grandson, King Athelstan who apparently prayed for success at St John's tomb in 937. St John's banner was then carried into battle by the men of Yorkshire, and Athelstan was victorious against the Scottish Army. By 1266 it was customary for one man from the Minster to be sent with St John's banner when the King summoned an army. After the battle of Agincourt, King Henry V visited St John's shrine to give thanks and made him a patron saint of the Royal family. The cult of St John, like all other saints, was abolished by Henry VIII, who robbed and destroyed his tomb and shrine. His bones, rediscovered in 1664, were re-interred in their present tomb between the nave choir stalls.

- 6.5.2.3 Archaeological excavations during the 1970s revealed evidence for the antecedent church to the Minster located near to the current Minster's location during the 8th century, whilst the current building was constructed during the 12th century in the Gothic style following a fire that engulfed the original.
- 6.5.2.4 The Minster is a focal point of Beverley's historical interest and significance, with the town's oldest roads converging on it, and often still cobbled. This, along with the historic street names, intervisibility with St Mary's Church to the west, Halgarth moated site, directly



- adjacent to the Minster, and the large number of historic buildings along the nearby streets all contributes to a relatively intact historic setting, which is a **major** contributor to the Minster's heritage significance.
- 6.5.2.5 Views to the onshore ECC and OnSS are not obtained when within the locality of Beverley Minster, however views are afforded from the rooftop, which was accessed on 7 March 2019. These views are panoramic, and it was identified that the OnSS is likely to form a small part of the wide vista. The current Creyke Beck NGET Substation and associated pylons are difficult to see within the view and it is expected the OnSS would be similar in its impact on the current view (see Section 6.8).

6.5.3 Beverley Conservation Areas and associated designated assets

- 6.5.3.1 Beverley is formed of a total of ten Conservation Areas (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B) all with varying characters, qualities and interests. For the scope of this assessment, however, the historic core of the town is looked at, alongside other heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings and non-designated assets) which were identified whilst on site as being important in terms of their contribution to setting and associated heritage significance.
- 6.5.3.2 Arguably the most significant area of the town in terms of its contribution to the setting and enhancing the heritage significance of Beverley is the Minster Area. As previously described, Beverley Minster is a significant landmark in the region and town and contributes greatly to the setting of the area, whilst the cobbled streets around the Minster and historic buildings all result in a very distinct historic setting. The buildings fronting onto the roads are mostly Victorian townhouses that are well maintained with abundant historic character. Similarly, adjacent to the Minster is a large open field that contains the earthworks of the Scheduled Monument Hall Garth moated site (NHLE 1008122, Plate 9). These characteristics add greatly to the setting of the Conservation Area. Many of the nearby roads have historically important names (e.g. Eastgate, Minster Moorgate, Westgate, Friary Lane), which again contribute to the appreciation of the setting and significance of the town's history and associated heritage significance.
- 6.5.3.3 The remains of the Friary (NHLE 1003598, Plate 10) are located east of the Minster and consists of buried remains and one building converted to residential dwellings. This building is surrounded by apartments built in the 1990s which detract from the setting somewhat and results in a more tightly confined setting for the monument.

- 6.5.3.4 Other important areas that materially contribute to the historic feel and setting are located within the Guildhall and Markets Conservation Areas (Plate 11), both of which contain major historic buildings such as St Mary's Church (NHLE 1162693) and the old Guildhall (NHLE 1083960). As such the setting is again one that is distinctly historic with well-maintained and restored/converted historic buildings all enhancing the setting. Of particular importance is the marketplace itself, which maintains a distinct character despite now being a car park, due to the large amount of historically important buildings still extant and the fact the square is still cobbled. In particular, the buildings fronting onto the marketplace are good examples of a variety of historic architectural styles and retain impressive views towards St Mary's Church.
- 6.5.3.5 Overall, the Beverley Conservation Areas have a setting that forms a **major** contribution to their heritage significance as well as generally enhancing the appreciation of the town overall and its historic assets and associated interest. This is particularly true within the Minster area and within the town centre (Markets Conservation Area).

6.5.4 Beverley Sanctuary Limit Stones

6.5.4.1 The remains of three Sanctuary Limit Stones are located on the outskirts of Beverley; Bishop Burton Cross, Bentley Cross and Walkington Cross (NHLE 1012589, 1015290 & 1012591; Plate 12). These are the last remains of crosses which previously delimited the boundary where anyone accused of a crime during the medieval period could pass and be provided sanctuary within Beverley to try and clear their name. They are located on the edge of busy main roads, especially the Bentley Cross, which has also been moved from its original location. The Walkington cross is well preserved and maintained, with a plaque to explain the stone's significance and is fenced with some low (approximately 0.4 m high) wrought iron railings which adds to the general aesthetic value. The Bishop Burton Cross is located within a field, behind the boundary hedge along York Road near to the junction with the A1079. This cross is in good condition bounded by a wooden fence and its setting, set back from the road and within the agricultural field, adds to its aesthetic value, but the limited access (to the asset) reduces the ease with which it can be appreciated. The Bentley Cross on the other hand is on the edge of the very busy A164, with no access for pedestrians and bounded by a low wooden fence. The stone is covered with dirt from the heavy traffic and no recognition of the stone's historical significance is discernible or provided.

- 6.5.4.2 The setting of the Walkington Cross and Bishop Burton Cross make a **minor** contribution to their heritage significance, however, the current setting of the Bentley Cross is considered to detract from its heritage significance.
- 6.5.4.3 Views of the OnSS are not achievable from the three Sanctuary Limit Stones due to intervening vegetation and infrastructure. This is also the case in terms of views of the onshore ECC, with the exception of the Bishop Burton Cross which is located within the onshore ECC Order Limits and therefore construction activities are likely to affect its setting, albeit temporarily, as discussed further in Section 6.8.

6.5.5 Westwood Pasture

- 6.5.5.1 Arguably, Westwood Pasture is one of the most significant positive contributors to Beverley's setting, located on the western fringes of the town. This large area of historic common land (approximately 200 ha) adds greatly to the setting of the town, and its associated heritage significance. The common land contains a large number of Scheduled Monuments, all of which survive as earthworks, including Bronze Age round barrows (NHLE 1013992), Iron Age square barrows (NHLE 1013994), Romano-British enclosures (NHLE 1013999, Plate 13) and medieval hollow ways and other earthworks (Plate 14). Important historic views into Beverley are also available, with both Beverley Minster and St Mary's Church visible within the same panorama.
- 6.5.5.2 The setting of the heritage assets within the common land itself is one of a historic common with surviving and visible earthworks located across the area. These earthworks, the narrow lanes and the wide views including views towards Beverley Minster all positively contribute to their setting, and appreciation of their historic and archaeological (heritage) significance. The racecourse, located to the north and the golf course located across Westwood Pasture are only moderate detractors, although the golf course is well sited and utilises the topography of the common land well; the course has not affected the historic character of the common to a significant degree, whilst many of the holes have been designed to



- incorporate historic features within the common, for example one of the greens is located within one of the potential Romano-British enclosures (Plate 13).
- 6.5.5.3 Overall, the setting of Westwood Pasture makes a **major** contribution to the setting and associated heritage significance of the heritage assets located on it, as well as the wider setting of Beverley town itself and associated assets, such as Beverley Minster and St Mary's Church.

6.5.6 Old Hall and White Hall, Shepherd Lane

6.5.6.1 Both of these Listed Buildings (NHLE 1103420 & 1161458) and their associated vernacular farm buildings are within 2 km of the OnSS. Both are good examples of early modern vernacular farmhouses and associated structures (i.e. barns, gate piers etc.). Currently, White Hall Farm is perhaps better preserved. Old Hall Farm (Plate 15) is in a relatively run-down condition and some lesser maintained modern farm outbuildings near to the historic structures detract somewhat from their setting.

6.5.6.2 There is no intervisibility between the farmhouses, although both have good visual links to Beverley Minster, which historically dominated the landscape. This dominance is a lesser constant in the landscape today however, with the views now partially obscured by the A1079. Similarly, the Creyke Beck NGET Substation and other nearby pylons compete for visual dominance with Beverley Minster from the locations and surrounds of the farmhouses (Plate 16).

- 6.5.6.3 The current setting is one of modern agriculture in a wider Holderness landscape (Plate 16), with significant modern infrastructure also forming part of the setting. Some appreciation of the historic and vernacular architectural interest of the buildings is possible when within the area, with some detraction due to the modern developments (i.e. new roads, electricity pylons etc.). Overall the setting is considered to make a minor contribution to the assets' heritage significance.
- 6.5.6.4 Intervisibility with the OnSS is likely to be limited due to tree cover from Beverley Park and the new A1079 road. There is potential for upper portions of the OnSS to be visible in longdistance views from Old Hall Farm, however White Hall Farm is tightly contained within a more enclosed setting with limited views out from the farm due to a tall woodland belt around it.

6.6 The Hull Suburbs

6.6.1 Introduction

6.6.1.1 The following setting assessment site visits were undertaken within an area identified as the 'Hull Suburbs'. Much of the area falls within the Holderness landscape, however increased urbanisation and expansion of Hull over the preceding 100 years has resulted in many smaller settlements being subsumed into a more urbanised spread around the city, with many villages and historic buildings being amalgamated into the wider Hull suburbs. This has resulted in many areas of historic landscape or townscape losing some of its distinct historic character.



6.6.2 World War II Anti-Aircraft Gunsight at Butt Farm

6.6.2.1 This asset is located adjacent to a farm and the south-western third is currently in use as a caravan park. Access to the Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1019186) is down a footpath along the original track lain during World War II. Built of brick and clinker, there is a public information panel nearby to explain the history of the site. The buildings survive quite well, although much of the concrete is beginning to degrade and crack. Earthworks survive within the rest of the field which is lain to grass and contains livestock (Plate 17). Generally, the current setting is one that is distinctly agricultural and is negatively affected by the busy A1079 which introduces a lot of traffic noise. The track is slightly overgrown but contributes greatly to the setting and allows for better appreciation of the asset.

6.6.2.2 Overall, the setting of the asset makes at least a **minor** contribution to its heritage significance. No likely views towards the onshore ECC or OnSS locations were identified from the site.

6.6.3 Skidby Conservation Area and Windmill

- 6.6.3.1 Skidby windmill (NHLE 1103339) is located on the outskirts of the village, close to the busy A164. The windmill is a major landscape marker, visible from some distance down the A164, and forms a significant part of the overall setting of Skidby village. The windmill and its outbuildings are well preserved and well-used with a café and restaurant located within its converted barns. The approach to the mill is a pleasant one with ridge and furrow in nearby fields adding to the historic rural setting (Plate 18).
- 6.6.3.2 Skidby Conservation Area is centred around the chapel and farmstead located in the centre of the village. Bungalows and other modern developments (c. 1990s) have built up around the historic core, detracting from the setting. Similarly, the road through the village is busy and is detrimental to the Conservation Area's character.

6.6.3.3 Overall the setting makes a **minor** contribution to the heritage significance of the Conservation Area and the heritage assets within it. Views of the onshore ECC and OnSS from the top of the windmill are obtainable due to their topographic locations, although this view is interrupted by intervening vegetation and existing infrastructure.

6.6.4 Risby Hall and Gardens and Cellar Heads moated site

6.6.4.1 Risby Hall, which is designated as a Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1018600) and Registered Park and Garden (NHLE 1001419), is impressive with significant earthworks surviving which are likely associated with the hall and its gardens to the west. A public information board is located on the road which overlooks the hall's earthworks and provides an explanation enabling an appreciation of its history. The eastern half of the park contains three lakes currently used by a fishing club. The folly located within this area is also impressive (Plate 19) and allows for an understanding that the area still forms part of the wider parklands for Risby Hall.

- 6.6.4.2 No likely views towards the onshore ECC or OnSS location were identified on site due to current tree cover completely blocking any views out towards the eastern side of the park (Plate 19). The onshore ECC is proposed to be located c. 200 m east of this tree line.
- 6.6.4.3 Cellar Heads moated site is located north of Risby Hall and gardens, and is thought to be the antecedent to it, forming the original manorial estate. The moated site (Plate 20) is located adjacent to a public footpath and is away from busy roads, and along with the surrounding distinctive Wold landscape, provides a quiet rural setting for the remains of the moated site. Intervisibility between the moated site and Risby Hall earthworks is limited although some appreciation of the historic links between the two assets is perceivable.
- 6.6.4.4 Certain limited views towards the OnSS are likely to be obtainable due to the higher ground of the Wolds which Cellar Heads is located within (Plate 21).
- 6.6.4.5 Overall, the setting of these assets makes a **moderate** contribution to their heritage significance.

6.6.5 Round barrow cemetery north-east of Creyke Beck NGET Substation

6.6.5.1 These assets (NHLE 1007731, MHU 833, 6618, 14122 & 18737, Figure 1 and Figure 2) are located between 500 m and 800 m to the east of the 400 kV NGET connection area, east of the OnSS. No earthworks are visible, and the fields consist of ploughed arable farmland



intersected by the Hull to Scarborough train line. The majority of these barrows are recorded on the HHER and one is also a Scheduled Monument. The setting is one of modern agriculture with significant modern and industrial structures (i.e. Creyke Beck NGET Substation and pylons, the train line etc.) dominating the landscape. No above ground evidence for the barrows survive, having been ploughed away. Access to the fields containing the barrows passes Creyke Beck NGET Substation which strongly limits any visual appreciation of the assets and, as such, the setting is considered to make only a **minor** contribution at most to their heritage significance. Views towards the OnSS will be possible from the western half of the cemetery group, partially blocked by the Creyke Beck NGET substation, whilst the eastern monuments are masked due to a rail line.

6.6.6 Ancient Woodland north-west of the OnSS

6.6.6.1 This 10 ha section of ancient woodland (Birkhill Wood) is located 300 m to the north-west of the OnSS and approximately 15 m (at its closes point) west of the OnSS permanent access road (Plate 22). An additional, smaller (1 ha) section of ancient woodland is located south-west of the larger 10 ha area. The woodland's setting has been noticeably altered by modern agriculture, with the parcel of woodland located within a distinct square with straight boundaries and limited organic shape. The woodland does contribute to the overall historic character of the local area and provides an indication of the landscape's original setting by breaking up the wide, open, post-enclosure landscape. The modern infrastructure (i.e. pylons, main roads etc.) near to the woodland does detract somewhat, and overall the setting of the asset is identified as making a minor contribution to the woodland's heritage significance. Views towards the OnSS will be obtained from a position near the woodland although this will be broken up with other intervening areas of tree cover, however direct views of the permanent OnSS access road will be obtainable.

6.6.7 Haltemprice Augustinian Priory

- 6.6.7.1 This Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1019825, Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B) is located on the edge of the Hull Suburbs, down a farm track to Priory Farm. The farmhouse at Priory Farm is Grade II* listed (NHLE 1103364) and consists of a well-maintained farmhouse of c. 18th century origin. The priory is located within a large open arable field lain to wheat at the time of the site visit. No visible remains of the priory were observed, although potential cropmarks for the priory were noted. The field is in a quiet rural setting, although being in close proximity to the suburbs of Hull introduces some modern detractors.
- 6.6.7.2 Overall, the setting of the assets is considered a **minor** contributor to their heritage significance.

6.6.8 Platwoods Farm

- 6.6.8.1 Platwoods Farm (MHU 7845) is located just over 850 m to the west of the OnSS (Figure 2). The farm dates to the 18th century although many of its original buildings have been replaced by large modern barns which detract from its historic and current setting. The surrounding agricultural fields form part of the farm's setting as well as the wider modern developments (i.e. electricity pylons, roads, golf course etc.). Overall the setting is considered to make a **minor** contribution to the asset's heritage significance.
- 6.6.8.2 Views of the OnSS will be possible from the eastern boundary of the farm through gaps in the intervening tree lines and hedgerows, although views are unlikely to be obtained from the farmhouse itself due to the neighbouring barns.

6.6.9 Cottingham Conservation Area

- 6.6.9.1 Cottingham Conservation Area is large and encompasses a large portion of the modern village (Figure 1 and Annex 5.1: Historic Environment DBA Part B), which is now subsumed by urban development and forms a suburb to Hull, 3 km to the south. The historic core is centred on the Church of Saint Mary (NHLE 1103394) and a small number of listed buildings located near the centre of the village. Several other listed buildings are located across the Conservation Area, often adjacent to more modern buildings (e.g. Sarum House NHLE 1161551; Plate 23).
- 6.6.9.2 Baynard Castle, a Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1019823), is in the western limits of the village, and a large Registered Park and Garden, known as Thwaite Hall (NHLE 1000137), is located to the east. Both, along with the Lawns (see below), add some much-needed green space to the urbanised village. The high street has many modern shops with several poorly maintained, making it difficult to appreciate any historical or architectural significance within the village. A positive contributor to the character of the Conservation Area is obtained through the high proportion of pubs that are within the town as these are often



- located in non-listed, historically important buildings. Similarly, views of the church are often obtainable ensuring a link to the village's history is maintained from within the village core.
- 6.6.9.3 Overall, the setting of the conservation area has been impacted by modern development and is identified as making a **minor** contribution to its significance.
- 6.6.9.4 The Church of Saint Mary is Grade I listed (NHLE 1103394) and dates to the 14th century with 15th century additions. The immediate setting of the church incorporates its walled cemetery and a number of mature trees which partially obscure views of the church. Its historic connection with the rest of the village forms its wider setting. Overall the setting of the Church make a **moderate** contribution to its heritage significance.
- 6.6.9.5 The Lawns, a group of six Grade II* listed halls of residence for the University of Hull (NHLE 1103343, 1103344, 1103345, 1103346, 1232675 and 1276987; Plate 24), forms part of the setting of Cottingham. They are located around a large open space within a campus separated from Cottingham. It is a quiet location and isolated from Cottingham by natural screening provided by trees. The open green space also aids in breaking up the wider urban landscape of Cottingham. The primary significance is in the architectural and historical aspects of the buildings and the planned style of the campus. The halls of residence were built in the early 1960s by Scottish architects Gillespie, Kidd & Coia, a firm famous for their use of the modernist style in the design of universities and churches.
- 6.6.9.6 Overall the setting of this group of assets makes a **major** contribution to their significance.
- 6.6.9.7 No likely views of the Hornsea Four onshore infrastructure were identified within the setting of the Cottingham Conservation Area, however views of the OnSS from the church tower of St Mary are obtainable.

6.7 Visibility and Intervisibility of Heritage Assets

- 6.7.1.1 This is a significant element of the setting of certain heritage assets particularly those with a vertical dominance such as church towers. Similarly, the dominance of the OnSS and its potential to interfere with existing key views from heritage assets as well as the intervisibility between heritage assets has been considered. This process was undertaken with the aid of a ZTV produced by the Hornsea Four landscape consultants as part of the baseline collation and further assessed as part of the walkover survey site visits.
- 6.7.1.2 One of the most easily identifiable and visually dominant heritage assets is Beverley Minster particularly from within the OnSS study area. Intervisibility with Beverley Minster is relevant for Old Hall and White Hall farms (NHLE 1161458 & 1103420), the barrow cemetery near to the OnSS (NHLE 1007731, MHU 833, 6618 & 18737), Skidby Mill (NHLE 1103339), Cellar Heads moated site (NHLE 1015312) and the heritage assets on Westwood Pasture, such as the Roman Enclosure (NHLE 1013999), the 'Black Mill' (NHLE 1310087) and the grouping of round and square barrow earthworks (NHLE 1013994, 1013998 & 1013991).
- 6.7.1.3 Also, of importance is any intervisibility between the Church of Saint Mary, Cottingham and Beverley Minster, as the OnSS will be located within the intervening landscape. During the site visit it was identified that intervisibility between the two designated heritage assets from their towers was not discernible due to the distance and intervening electricity pylons. The views offered wide panoramas of quite built up areas, which do not contribute to the heritage significance of the assets. These views are considered to make a minor to moderate contribution to their setting and ability to appreciate their heritage significance.
- 6.7.1.4 The Creyke Beck NGET Substation has been identified as being within views from and of certain heritage assets and forms a significant part of the existing modern infrastructure within the area and current landscape. This existing substation will often partially screen the OnSS from views westwards, in particular the Round Barrow cemetery north-east of Creyke Beck NGET Substation (NHLE 1007731 and MHU833, 6618, 18737) (Plate 25).
- 6.7.1.5 Key views from heritage assets and the intervisibility between heritage assets often contributes to and can form a primary element of setting and associated heritage significance. Therefore the way in which the current landscape character, topography and modern infrastructure affects these key views and/or intervisibility is important. Assessment of the proposed Hornsea Four onshore ECC and OnSS indicates that it may have at least a minor effect upon some of these key views and/or shared views. This is discussed further in Section 6.8.

6.7.2 Visibility of Offshore Infrastructure

6.7.2.1 Consideration of the offshore infrastructure has also been undertaken to identify if any other heritage assets, not discussed above, should be included in the impact assessment. No further heritage assets within the study areas have been identified as having visibility of the offshore infrastructure which would affect their heritage significance. The main heritage assets considered for this were Skipsea Castle, Church of All Saints in Barmston, Bridlington Conservation Area and Burton Agnes Conservation Area. The Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register) details the results of previous assessment work and the conclusions reached for effects on setting.

6.8 Effect of Hornsea Four upon the Significance of Heritage Assets

6.8.1.1 The potential impacts to heritage significance caused by changes to their setting during construction and operation are discussed below for those heritage assets listed in Table 8.

6.8.2 Construction effects

- 6.8.2.1 Effects to the setting of heritage assets during construction would occur due to the introduction of machinery, construction traffic and general construction activities taking place within the landfall, onshore ECC, OnSS, including the EBI, and 400 kV NGET connection area, along with any associated temporary works areas. These activities and these locations could result in noise or visual changes which may affect the setting of heritage assets and could potentially temporarily impact their heritage significance.
- 6.8.2.2 The heritage assets identified as having a partial or direct view of the Order Limits during construction and/or located in the immediate vicinity where construction noise may become perceptible) with the potential for these to result in some alteration to their setting, and associated heritage significance, include:



- World War II Coastal Defences (MHU21052);
- Church of All Saints (NHLE 1083851) and Old Hall medieval complex (NHLE 1007846 and 1204832);
- Former RAF Lissett (MHU11147) and Church of St James (NHLE 1083826);
- Foston-on the-Wolds Conservation Area;
- Rotsea Deserted Medieval Village (NHLE 1005212);
- Carr House cropmark complex (MHU 3734);
- Beswick Conservation Area;
- Lockington Conservation Area;
- Raventhorpe Deserted Medieval Village (MHU3350);
- Parkhouse Farm moated sites (NHLE 1008292);
- Cherry Burton Conservation Area;
- Beverley Minster (NHLE 1084028);
- Beverley Sanctuary Limit Stone at Bishop Burton (NHLE 1012589);
- Westwood Pasture Scheduled Monuments (NHLE 1013994, 1013992, 1013998 and 1310087);
- Old Hall Farm (NHLE 1103420);
- Skidby Windmill (NHLE 1103339);
- Risby Hall Registered Park and Garden (NHLE 1001419);
- Cellar Heads moated site (NHLE 1015312);
- Round Barrow cemetery north-east of Creyke Beck NGET Substation (NHLE 1007731 and MHU833, 6618, 18737);
- Birkhill Ancient Woodland (NE 1115368);
- Platwoods Farm (MHU7845); and
- Church of Saint Mary, Cottingham (NHLE 1103394).
- 6.8.2.3 From those assets listed above only the World War II Coastal Defences, former RAF Lissett, Raventhorpe Deserted Medieval Village, Beverley Minster, Beverley Sanctuary Limit Stone at Bishop Burton, Birkhill Ancient Woodland, Platwoods Farm and the Church of Saint Mary have direct views of the Order Limits during construction. This is either as a result of being partly or wholly located within the Order Limits; represent tall buildings within the landscape; or have very little intervening obstructions screening the views.
- 6.8.2.4 Those heritage assets located within or partially within the Order Limits include the World War II Coastal Defences, former RAF Lissett, Raventhorpe Deserted Medieval Village and Beverley Sanctuary Limit Stone at Bishop Burton. Construction-related activities will temporarily alter their immediate settings as a result of visual and aural intrusions. In consideration of the position of these four heritage assets and the alterations to their immediate settings, this is considered to result in some short-term adverse impact upon their heritage significance, albeit temporary.
- 6.8.2.5 Beverley Minster is the dominant built heritage feature within the landscape with farreaching views. The assessment identified that the onshore ECC and OnSS is located at such a distance (2-4 km) in the landscape that visibility of the construction-related activities will be limited within the wide panoramic views achieved from the top of the Minster's West Towers. Views from, and the setting of, Beverley Minster is predominantly enhanced through



its intervisibility and historic relationship with St Mary's Church, Beverley and the historic townscape visible within the immediate environs of the Minster. Construction-related activities will not fall within these key views.

- 6.8.2.6 Similarly, the construction-related activities will only be visible from the tower of the Church of Saint Mary in Cottingham and although construction activities will take place within the asset's wider setting, there will be limited alteration or impact upon its heritage significance as a result
- 6.8.2.7 Those assets located in proximity to the Order Limits and which have relatively uninterrupted views of the construction-related activities are Birkhill Ancient Woodland and Platwoods Farm. The construction-related activities will be undertaken in what is considered to form part of these asset's wider setting only, and will have a limited effect on heritage significance or the ability to appreciate heritage significance. The visibility of the construction-related activities within the setting of these heritage assets will be short term and temporary in nature and is not considered to adversely impact their heritage significance.
- 6.8.2.8 The remaining assets were assessed as having only partial visibility of the Order Limits during construction due to intervening buildings, tree cover and hedgerows and other infrastructure. The Order Limits were also assessed as forming part of their wider settings and result in a limited short term, temporary change, which is not considered to impact their heritage significance.
- 6.8.2.9 The setting of a heritage asset can also be affected by changes due to the use of lighting during construction, changes in traffic movements and potential noise increases (Volume A3, Chapters 4, 7 and 8). Upon consideration of the results of these topics within their relevant ES chapters, it is considered that the increases in lighting, noise and traffic movements during construction will not result in material changes to the setting of heritage assets, and would not affect their significance or ability to appreciate significance.
- 6.8.2.10 The increases in traffic were found to be most substantial along the A164, west of Cottingham and Beverley, where a daily peak of 874 two-way HGV movements could occur during the construction period. This is due to the amount of deliveries required for construction of the OnSS in combination with the onshore ECC and landfall construction traffic. This main road does not travel through any Conservation Areas or near to any other designated heritage assets. Commitment Co150 (see Commitments Register: Volume A4, Annex 5.2) identifies that construction traffic for the OnSS will be routed around Cottingham, avoiding any potential temporary change in setting arising within the Conservation Area.
- 6.8.2.11 There is also a potential impact from the construction of an access road to the OnSS, which will result in the introduction of road traffic alongside Birkhill Ancient Woodland. Road traffic is currently not part of the woodland's setting (apart from some perceptible noise from the nearby A164). The construction-related traffic in this instance will be temporary in nature



- and will result in a minimal change to its landscape setting, which is not considered to materially affect its heritage significance.
- 6.8.2.12 In terms of potential lighting impacts, task lighting may be required for certain aspects of work. However, as construction will mostly occur during daylight hours (Co36), lighting is not expected to be a major requirement or cause any potential temporary change within the setting of heritage assets. Similarly, construction activity is located at such a distance that any temporary noise impacts associated with construction work is identified as not resulting in a significant impact on heritage assets.
- 6.8.2.13 Overall, the construction-related effects on setting (and associated heritage significance) are identified as short term and temporary with any change in setting reverting to its original setting following construction. As such, this is not considered a significant effect in EIA terms.
- 6.8.2.14 The heritage assets which will be affected through a visual alteration to their setting as a result of the permanent infrastructure are discussed in Section 6.8.3.

6.8.3 Operational effects

- 6.8.3.1 The presence of the OnSS permanent infrastructure within the landscape during the operation and maintenance phase could result in an indirect (non-physical) impact upon the significance of designated and non-designated heritage assets as a result of changes to the setting of heritage assets.
- 6.8.3.2 The majority of Hornsea Four consists of underground elements (landfall, the onshore ECC and the 400 kV NGET connection area from the OnSS) and as such will not indirectly impact heritage assets during operation and are not considered further in this section.
- 6.8.3.3 Consideration was also given to potential indirect (non-physical) impacts on designated assets from the offshore infrastructure such as potential indirect impacts to the setting and associated heritage significance of Skipsea Castle. However, the setting assessment has identified that no indirect (setting) impacts would occur due to the vast distance (approximately 65 km to the array and approximately 25 km to the offshore booster station) precluding visibility between the heritage assets near or on the coastline and the offshore infrastructure.
- 6.8.3.4 Indirect (non-physical) impacts could occur as a result of alterations to the setting of designated and non-designated heritage assets within the locality of the OnSS due to visual changes which may alter the setting and negatively affect the heritage significance of an asset or group of assets.
- 6.8.3.5 Following the heritage-specific site visits and setting assessment, some designated and nondesignated heritage assets thought to potentially be affected were found to have no visibility of / intervisibility with the Hornsea Four OnSS and were not considered further.



These heritage assets are principally located within Cottingham and the Hull Suburbs (see Section 6.6).

- 6.8.3.6 The heritage assets considered further as part of the setting assessment during operation include:
 - Westwood Pasture Scheduled Monuments (NHLE 1013994, 1013992, 1013998 and 1310087);
 - Beverley Conservation Area;
 - Beverley Minster (NHLE 1084028);
 - Cellar Heads moated site (NHLE 1015312);
 - Risby Hall Registered Park and Garden (NHLE 1001419 and 1018600), and Folly (NHLE 1161815);
 - Birkhill Ancient Woodland (NE 1115368);
 - Skidby Windmill (NHLE 1103339);
 - Round Barrow cemetery north-east of Creyke Beck NGET Substation (NHLE 1007731 and MHU833, 6618, 18737);
 - Old Hall Farm (NHLE 1103420);
 - Platwoods Farm (MHU7845); and
 - Church of Saint Mary, Cottingham (NHLE 1103394).
- 6.8.3.7 The potential indirect (non-physical) impacts occur mostly due to visibility from the heritage assets to the OnSS, however noise, lighting and changes to the historic landscape character were also considered as these factors could also alter a heritage asset's setting, and associated heritage significance. Visibility was found to be most important for heritage assets closest to the OnSS permanent structure; these included: Birkhill Ancient Woodland, Old Hall Farm, Platwoods Farm and the Round Barrow cemetery north-east of Creyke Beck NGET Substation. In addition to this, heritage assets with a strong vertical dominance in the landscape (e.g. Beverley Minster and the Church of Saint Mary, Cottingham) as well as assets topographically situated overlooking the OnSS (e.g. assets on Westwood Pasture, and Skidby Windmill) were identified as having a clear visual connection with other heritage assets and the surrounding landscape.
- 6.8.3.8 One of the most dominant features in views on the Holderness skyline is Beverley Minster. From the tower of Beverley Minster, the OnSS will fall within the asset's wider landscape setting with long-distance views of the OnSS obtainable from its tower (see Photomontage Figure 17 in Volume A3, Chapter 4: Landscape and Visual). Beverley Minster was designed to be seen from numerous locations and this will still be the case during operation of the OnSS. The OnSS will be located within a backdrop which has an existing industrial character, and the addition of the OnSS is not considered to significantly alter the existing view or wider landscape setting associated with Beverley Minster. It is therefore considered that the inclusion of the OnSS within the wider setting of Beverley Minster will not adversely affect the ability to appreciate the asset within the landscape or significantly affect its heritage significance.



- 6.8.3.9 Long distance views from the tower of the Church of Saint Mary in Cottingham will incorporate the OnSS (see Photomontage Figure 18 in Volume A3, Chapter 4: Landscape and Visual). The OnSS will form part of the asset's wider landscape setting and sit within an area which has been subject to existing change to a more industrial character from the once agrarian character. In consideration of the existing wider setting, the OnSS is not considered to greatly alter this setting or affect the ability to appreciate the asset to such an extent as to significantly impact its heritage significance.
- 6.8.3.10 The OnSS will be located within the landscape setting and historic visual connection between Beverley Minster, to the north, and the Church of Saint Mary in Cottingham, to the south. As discussed above the OnSS will fall within long-distance views from both towers albeit within an existing industrialised area. The Creyke Beck NGET substation is located within the direct line of sight between the two towers, and the OnSS will be located to the west, adjacent to the Creyke Beck NGET substation. It is considered that the historic connection between the two assets obtained through the visual link from the towers was semi-altered by the existing infrastructure and the presence of the OnSS will not further sever the historic connection to such a degree as to adversely impact heritage significance in this pre-existing semi-industrialised landscape.
- 6.8.3.11 The designated heritage assets located on Westwood Pasture form a cohesive group, all adding greatly to the historic interest of the common land, which can be considered an asset in its own right, and greatly contributing to the character of Beverley Conservation Area. Views towards the OnSS from Westwood Pasture are available due to its elevated position, and form part of the Holderness backdrop dominated by Beverley, particularly its Minster and Church, in the foreground. The OnSS will fall within the wider landscape setting to the south of Westwood Pasture and Beverley Conservation Area which includes existing modern infrastructure and as such is not considered to significantly alter its setting or ability to appreciate the assets to such an extent as to significantly impact their heritage significance.
- 6.8.3.12 Skidby Windmill is located in quite a prominent position overlooking much of the local landscape and representing a local landmark, particularly when within approximately 1 km of the asset, due to its position on raised ground to the east of Skidby. The windmill dominates the local landscape and is visible on the approach from nearby roads. Visibility with the OnSS was identified from the ZTV (Volume A3, Chapter 4: Landscape and Visual), however following a site visit and setting assessment, visibility towards the OnSS has been found to be very limited from within the setting of the windmill and is not considered to affect the setting and associated heritage significance of the asset.
- 6.8.3.13 A similar vista-like view is obtained from Cellar Heads moated site, which also forms part of a wider asset group with Risby Hall Park and Garden and Folly, located to the south. Visibility of the OnSS from Cellar Heads is obtained from within its peaceful rural setting. This view incorporates the OnSS on the distant horizon which is already dominated by the tall electricity pylons of Creyke Beck NGET substation. This change in view is not considered to affect the heritage significance of the moated site. Visibility of the OnSS from within the grounds of Risby Hall (now a fishing lake) is not obtained due to the screening of views eastwards by a thick pine wood belt around its perimeter. Views towards the OnSS are



obtained however from the eastern boundary of Risby Hall Park and Garden (see Photomontage Figure 14 in Volume A3, Chapter 4: Landscape and Visual) from which views towards Beverley Minster are also possible. The OnSS falls within long-distance views from Risby Hall and is partially obscured by intervening vegetation and changes in topography. The operation of the OnSS is not considered to greatly alter the wider setting of Risby Hall and it does not affect its intervisibility with Beverley Minster. Therefore, the OnSS is not considered to impact the heritage significance or ability to appreciate the significance of the asset

- 6.8.3.14 The introduction of the OnSS will alter views across the historic Holderness landscape particularly within the setting of those heritage assets located closest to the OnSS such as Birkhill Ancient Woodland located c.400 m to the north-west, Platwoods Farm located c.600 m to the west, the round barrow cemetery (including one Scheduled Monument) located c.840 m to the east, and Old Hall Farm located c.1.7 km to the north.
- 6.8.3.15 Birkhill Ancient Woodland will be located directly west of and partly adjacent to the permanent access road to the OnSS. Due to the asset's proximity, the access road and OnSS will fall within its setting and alter its historic relationship with the surrounding landscape character. Although it is acknowledged that the landscape character has changed overtime with the removal of the southern half of the woodland in the early 20th century, the enlarging of agricultural fields, and the expansion of modern infrastructure. The current landscape to the southeast of the Ancient Woodland has an existing industrial character. The OnSS will further contribute to this modern character, and therefore it is not considered to significantly alter the asset's current setting or significantly impact its heritage significance.
- 6.8.3.16 The OnSS will fall within the wider agricultural setting of Platwoods Farm and fall within views from the eastern edge of the modern barns with views from the farmhouse limited by the adjacent modern barns. Where views are achievable this is partly screened by existing vegetation and tree cover. The current wider setting incorporates the industrial character of the Creyke Beck NGET substation, therefore it is considered that the OnSS will not greatly alter the asset's current setting to the east although it is acknowledged that the OnSS will be closer to the heritage asset and appear more dominant. This change, however, to the asset's wider setting is not considered to materially alter its heritage significance.
- 6.8.3.17 The historic setting of the round barrow cemetery located to the east of the OnSS has significantly changed overtime with the construction of the Beverley railway line dividing the cemetery into two, the construction of the Creyke Beck NGET substation to the west and the A1079 road to the north. Views of the OnSS will be partially screened by Creyke Beck NGET substation and the Beverley railway line. It is considered that, although the OnSS will be an additional feature within this existing industrialised landscape, it will not significantly alter its wider setting or impact the historic relationship between the round barrows themselves, and therefore not significantly impact their heritage significance.
- 6.8.3.18 Long-distance views of the OnSS are obtained from Old Hall Farm due to the open Holderness landscape within which it is located. However, the OnSS will fall within the



asset's much wider landscape setting and is not considered to significantly alter its heritage significance or the ability to appreciate significance and its connection with neighbouring White Hall Farm.

- 6.8.3.19 Consideration of the lighting used at the OnSS has been given to identify if any permanent lighting will be used which could affect the setting of any heritage assets and their associated heritage significance. As the OnSS is an unmanned structure, the on-site lighting will only be required for security and will be designed to ensure as minimal a change possible in the local landscape. Full assessment of operational lighting is undertaken in Volume A3, Chapter 4 Landscape and Visual. It is considered that this lighting will not result in a change to the setting of an asset which could alter its heritage significance. Any maintenance works could require lighting; however, maintenance is expected to occur during normal working hours, reducing the potential for times when lighting may be required. Overall, the potential for lighting to impact the setting (and associated heritage significance) of a heritage asset during operation and maintenance is considered negligible.
- 6.8.3.20 Similarly, noise is not expected to alter the setting of the identified assets in such a way to affect their heritage significance. This is due to the operational noise levels of Hornsea Four being of such a level as to be non-significant in EIA terms (Volume A3, Chapter 8: Noise and Vibration).
- 6.8.3.21 Overall, assessment of the potential setting effects has identified that the OnSS would form a new permanent intrusive visual element within the wider setting of some heritage assets, however this change in setting would not adversely affect the ability to appreciate heritage significance or historic connections between the heritage assets and the existing historic landscape character, or adversely impact the significance of those heritage assets identified and described throughout the assessment undertaken above. It was concluded at PEIR that the operation of the OnSS would not significantly impact the heritage significance of heritage assets through alterations to their setting, as summarised in the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register). In further consideration of the design of the OnSS at the ES stage, no material changes to the conclusions of the impact assessment at PEIR have been identified.

6.9 Opportunities to minimise harm or provide enhancement

- 6.9.1.1 The outline Landscape Management Plan (Volume F2, Annex 8: Outline Landscape Management Plan) for Hornsea Four details recommendations and aspirations to ensure any impact upon the landscape character and views are reduced as far as possible.
- 6.9.1.2 Aspects of the design options for the OnSS permanent infrastructure seek to mitigate the visual elements of the infrastructure further which in turn are considered to further minimise the effect upon the setting of heritage assets (and associated heritage significance) than the low levels of impact magnitude already identified.
- 6.9.1.3 Aspirations for the final design of the OnSS include the use of colouring taken from the surrounding landscape, and carefully considered landscaping and planting would be used to



reduce any visual impact from the presence of the OnSS whilst not affecting the significance of nearby heritage assets. This in turn will reduce its visual intrusion within the wider panoramic views from other heritage assets, reducing further the impact to heritage significance associated with change in the setting of heritage assets (as presented in the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register).

6.9.1.4 The mitigation planting as detailed on the indicative landscape plan (see Figure 4.8 in Volume A3, Chapter 4: Landscape and Visual) will complement the existing tree lines and hedgerows and reintroduce planting to the western and eastern boundaries which was lost with the expansion of the agricultural fields. This is considered a potential enhancement and provides a potential (part) re-establishment of previous historic landscape character, prior to the onset of modern farming practices.

7 Summary of Heritage Significance

7.1 Summary

- 7.1.1.1 The Scheduled Monuments and many of the Listed Buildings within the study areas have been identified as **highly** important due to their significance in terms of archaeological potential, innate heritage interest and their significant contribution to the understanding of the region's past. The Conservation Areas are of at least **high** significance, apart from Beverley Conservation Areas which are considered **very high**. Often, the setting of these assets has been identified as materially contributing to their heritage significance (see Section 6).
- 7.1.1.2 The locally listed buildings within the study areas are considered to be of at least **moderate** heritage significance and contribute to the historic character of the settlements they are situated within, although perhaps not evidencing enough historical or architectural value and interest for them to be formally listed.
- 7.1.1.3 Known buried archaeological remains recorded in the HHER which lie within the study areas could range from **low** to **high** heritage significance, as in many cases there is not currently enough information to confidently establish their significance, due to for example a lack of evaluation. This has been addressed through further assessment work, including a Geoarchaeological Desk-based Assessment, Aerial Photographic and Lidar assessment and Priority Archaeological Geophysical Survey. This work has enabled a more thorough picture of the archaeological potential within the Order Limits to be established and assessed. These further assessments form part of the updated baseline information and inform the impact assessment within **Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment**.

7.2 Key Heritage Assets

7.2.1.1 Following the collation and establishment of all known heritage assets within the study areas and initial assessment of their significance (including the contribution to significance made by their setting), 61 heritage assets (both designated and non-designated) have been identified as being 'key' in relation to Hornsea Four (detailed in Table 9 and presented on Figures 64 to 84). These assets are those which have the potential to be affected, either



directly (physically) or indirectly (non-physically), by Hornsea Four and have been assigned Hornsea Four-specific ID numbers. Please note that some of these Hornsea Four-specific locations are groupings of HHER entries which identifies an area with multiple nearby records which might indicate a high archaeological potential (e.g. HP4-02 in Table 9).

- 7.2.1.2 The key heritage assets which have the potential to be directly (physically) impacted include one designated heritage asset (HP4-56) and a number of non-designated heritage assets mostly relating to buried archaeological remains. These heritage assets have been taken forward for impact assessment and are presented in Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.
- 7.2.1.3 The key designated and non-designated heritage assets identified as a result of potential changes to their setting which may in turn impact their heritage significance are discussed in Section 6 above. These assets have not been taken through to the ES stage of impact assessment as it was concluded at the PEIR stage that no likely significant effects would occur and this outcome has not changed following the finalisation of the design and further consideration undertaken in this area of heritage setting. This is summarised and presented within the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register).



8 Discussion

8.1 Summary of Potential

- 8.1.1.1 The baseline presented within this DBA suggests a rich historic landscape in which Hornsea Four will be located with numerous known heritage assets in the form of buried archaeological remains, historic earthworks and buildings. Some of these heritage assets are regionally or nationally significant, such as Skipsea Castle and Beverley Minster.
- 8.1.1.2 The known buried archaeological remains along the onshore ECC and within the OnSS study areas are indicative of a landscape which has seen occupation since the early prehistoric period onwards, particularly along the watercourses and valleys on the edge of the Yorkshire Wolds.

8.1.2 Archaeological Potential

- 8.1.2.1 The archaeological potential of the landfall, onshore ECC and OnSS is considered to be high, with known archaeological remains dating from the Mesolithic to modern periods. Many of the recorded archaeological remains within the onshore ECC study area represent the remains of small settlements and farmsteads from the Iron Age period onwards. There is also evidence of ritual activity dated to the early Bronze Age and Iron Age periods, in the form of round barrows and square barrows, respectively, often found near to watercourses within the study areas.
- 8.1.2.2 In consideration of the buried archaeological remains currently recorded (and collated as part of this DBA), the following list presents areas of Hornsea Four which are known to contain buried archaeological remains, or areas where current evidence suggests remains are likely to be present which could be of medium to high importance:

• Landfall:

 areas of Iron Age to Romano-British cropmarks identified from aerial photographic sources (HP4-2);

Onshore ECC:

- o located just south of cropmarks of Iron Age to Romano-British enclosures, to the north of Foston-on-the-Wolds (HP4-8);
- o a cropmark of a square enclosure, north of Rotsea Farm (HP4-11);
- o adjacent to cropmarks of an Iron Age to Romano-British rectilinear enclosure, between Scorborough and Beswick (HP4-22 and HP4-54);
- o located to the east of the site of Winthorpe Manor and House (HP4-24);
- o directly adjacent to earthworks and buried remains associated with Ravensthorpe Deserted Medieval Village (HP4-26);
- o adjacent to cropmarks of an Iron Age to Romano-British enclosure, to the east of Bishop Burton (HP4-31); and

OnSS:

o cropmarks identified from aerial photographic sources show evidence for a large settlement(s) of probable Iron Age to Romano-British date (HP4-49).



8.1.2.3 Further areas of archaeological potential may be evidenced as part of other archaeological surveys and investigations such as the aerial photographic and Lidar assessment and priority archaeological geophysical survey; these findings are used to inform the updated baseline section presented in the ES and discussed further within Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment.

8.1.3 Previous impacts to buried archaeological remains

- 8.1.3.1 The landscape in which Hornsea Four is located is one that has been under heavy modern agricultural use since post-World War II. As such, previous impacts upon potential archaeological remains will have been from agricultural activity. There is a high potential that modern ploughing will have impacted the archaeological horizon, eroding the upper fills of potential buried archaeological remains, whilst completely removing certain shallower features. Despite this agricultural impact, it is expected there will be no areas where this could have caused complete removal of all buried remains, with ploughing expected to have, at worst, significantly scarred the sub-surface deposits. This is particularly relevant for rural prehistoric and Romano-British settlements, where the ditches associated with settlements and their field systems can often be of significant depth and contain well-preserved artefacts and deposits near the base of the features.
- 8.1.3.2 Other impacts will have occurred within the area from modern developments, such as residential, industrial (e.g. the Creyke Beck NGET substation) or commercial developments and their associated infrastructure. Many of these developments will have been subject to archaeological investigation prior to construction and the findings will have been submitted to the HHER to inform any future development of the archaeological potential and form part of the baseline to this report (Section 4.7.5).

8.1.4 Previous impacts to historic earthworks and built heritage

- 8.1.4.1 The landscape in which Hornsea Four is proposed to be located results in many surviving earthworks often relating to either deserted medieval settlements. Built structures are often associated with the late medieval and post-medieval agricultural heritage of the area (e.g. historic farmsteads) and a large number of built remains associated with World War II (pillboxes etc.). The lack of development over the modern period within this rural landscape results in good survival of these remains. This is mainly notable within the northern two thirds of Hornsea Four, whilst south of Beverley and towards the Hull suburbs, the historic character has been lost somewhat due to the large amount of modern infrastructure built over the previous 100 years.
- 8.1.4.2 Previous impacts to historic earthworks and built heritage assets are predominantly associated with indirect (non-physical) impacts (i.e. changes to an asset's setting) due to various developments within the locality of the heritage asset. Broad examples include the introduction of residential developments, new road infrastructure or construction of new industrial developments. Introduction of such developments could result in changes to nearby heritage assets' settings, which could impact their significance.



8.2 Potential Project Impacts

- 8.2.1.1 Hornsea Four has the potential to impact upon the historic environment in a number of ways, either directly (physical) or indirectly (non-physical). Some of these impacts could be temporary, such as those during construction, or be more permanent, lasting for the lifespan of Hornsea Four. Direct (physical) impacts could occur where heritage assets are partially or completely damaged or removed by construction works, whilst indirect (non-physical) impacts would relate to any changes in setting that occur to heritage assets due to the introduction of Hornsea Four into the landscape, and particularly in respect to above ground structures, e.g. the OnSS.
- 8.2.1.2 Impacts that could occur during construction are:
 - Direct impact on buried archaeological remains;
 - Direct impact on above ground archaeological remains (e.g. earthworks, built structures);
 - Direct impact on potential geoarchaeological or palaeoenvironment remains; and
 - Temporary indirect impact on the setting of heritage assets (designated and nondesignated).
- 8.2.1.3 During the operation phase, there could be more permanent indirect (non-physical) impact on the setting of heritage assets, particularly those which fall within the OnSS study area.
- 8.2.1.4 During decommissioning of Hornsea Four, there could be a direct impact on buried archaeological remains and / or an indirect (non-physical) impact on the setting of heritage assets (designated and non-designated).
- 8.2.1.5 The following potential cumulative impacts have also been identified:
 - Cumulative impact on the setting of designated and non-designated heritage assets;
 - Cumulative impact from groundworks on above ground, or buried archaeological remains; and
 - Cumulative impact from groundworks on potential geoarchaeological / palaeoenvironmental remains, potentially indicative of former land surfaces.
- 8.2.1.6 Following earlier assessment of all baseline data produced as part of this DBA, including a setting assessment, and through consultation with stakeholders, indirect (non-physical) impacts are considered to not be significant in EIA terms and are not assessed further within the ES Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment. However direct (physical) impacts to designated and non-designated heritage assets could be significant and are therefore assessed within the ES Volume A3, Chapter 5: Historic Environment. Details of all potential impacts considered are presented in the Impacts Register (Volume A4, Annex 5.1: Impacts Register.
