Medworth Open Floor Hearings (OFH1 and OFH2) on 22 and 23 February 2023 Requests to participate at the Open Floor Hearings 1 and 2:

Councillor Lorna Dupre, Chair of the Environment and Green Investment Committee of the Council would like to participate in OFH2.

Suggested locations for Site Inspections

The Council has the following suggested locations for unaccompanied and accompanied site inspections, and has detailed the reason for nomination, the issues to be observed, and whether the location(s) can be observed and accessed through public land:

Suggestions for Unaccompanied site inspections (visible from public land)

Weasenham Lane, Wisbech

Reason: to view the route that construction traffic will take and the impact that the proposed development will have on the area.

Elm Hall roundabout

Reason: to show where two major routes, the A1101 and A47, intersect and the impact of the vehicle movements during construction, operation and decommissioning.

Freedom Bridge

Reason: to view the main route into Wisbech from the north, through which convoys of waste lorries will travel and the impact of the proposed development on this area.

- Redmoor Lane roundabout/Cromwell Road and into New Bridge Lane Reason: to view the main access/exit route to the proposed facility.
- New Bridge Lane

Reason: to view the route for the proposed railway and its proximity to the proposed EfW site.

The field next to Lineage

Reason: to view the area where it is proposed that 400-700 construction workers will park.

The Lineage building

Reason: to compare the height with the incinerator main building which will be twice as high, with the chimneys being four times as high so that the impact of the proposal on the surrounding area is appreciated.

- The River Nene from the junction of South Brink and New Bridge Lane Reason: to note that the incinerator site sits on the lower lying flood plain and the proximity to the river. To understand the need for the flood gates installed after the 1978 floods and consequently the potential impact of such flooding on the application site.
- The A47 between Guyhirn Roundabout and Redmoor Lane Roundabout.
 Reason: to understand the nature of this heavily used single carriageway which leads to the coast and the impact that the proposal would have on it. In addition, to note the current skyline on the approach to Wisbech and the potential visual impact of the facility from the approach roads to the town.
- Heron Road Open Space and surrounding community.
 Reason: to fully appreciate the impact that the proposed development would have and how it would appear on the skyline.
- Local communities to the south east of the Site: Begdale, Elm and Emneth;
 Begdale Redmoor Lane / Begdale Road; and,
 Elm Limes Avenue / All Saints Close / Halfpenny Lane. Emneth Low Road / Outwell Road.

Reason: to fully appreciate visibility of the proposed development on local communities and to appreciate extent of significant effects to landscape character.

 Local communities to the west of the Site: Church End, Wisbech St Mary and Leverington. Church End – Main Road (VP22 proposed development located set directly behind church at Wisbech St Mary); and

Wisbech St Mary – Bevis Lane.

Reason: to fully appreciate visibility of the proposed development on local communities and to appreciate extent of significant effects to landscape character.

 Cromwell Road commercial zone / Wisbech Retail Park, including Lidl, Costa Coffee, Farmfoods etc.

Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development across the immediately adjacent urban area.

- A47 eastbound (to Wisbech)
 Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development on the
 primary approach to Wisbech from the south.
- Welney Wildlife Trust Visitor Centre.
 Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development across the wider extent of the study area.
- Nene Washes NNR Car Park at Eldernell.
 Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development across the wider extent of the study area.

Settlements / Communities within the wider study area:

Friday Bridge, Emneth, Chequers Corner/Marshland St. James, The Smeeth/St.
John Fen End, Terrington St. John/Tilney St. Lawrence, Walpole Highway, Walton
Highway, West Walton, Walpole St Peter/Walpole St Andrew, Gorefield, Wisbech
St. Mary/Leverington Common, Guyhirn, Upwell/Outwell, Tydd St. Mary/St. Giles,
Parson Drove/Murrow, and March.

Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development across the wider extent of the study area.

Public Rights of Way (PRoW)

- 'The Still', south of Leverington / locations on the southern edge of Leverington. Reason: to fully appreciate visibility of the proposed development on local communities and PRoW.
- The Nene Way (a regionally promoted walking trail) south of Wisbech.
 Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development from local PRoW.
- PRoW west of Begdale: Crooked Bank/Narrow Drove/Broad Drove to the south of the Site.

Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development from local PRoW.

NCR 63 Begdale Road between Elm & Begdale.
 Reason: to fully appreciate the visibility of the proposed development from local PRoW.

Suggested locations for Accompanied site inspections

- Thomas Clarkson School sports pitches, the Helping Hands Disability Group, Cambrian Specialist Education School and Riverside Meadows SEMH Specialist Academy. Reason: to fully appreciate the impact that the proposed development would have on each of the facilities and how it would dominate the skyline.
- Residential properties No. 9 and 10 New Bridge Lane. Reason: to fully appreciate the proximity and arrangement of these two residential properties to the proposed development. Particularly No. 10 New Bridge Lane where there are concerns of the development breaching the RVAA threshold.
- Residential property No. 25 Cromwell Road.
 Reason: to fully appreciate the proximity and arrangement of these two residential properties to the proposed development.

Please be advised the County Council's Landscape and Visual Consultant (LVC) will be available to attend the Accompanied visits and highlight viewpoints and vantage points which will be impacted by the proposed development and explain the type and level of impact. The LVC also recommends that most, if not all, of the Viewpoint locations prepared by the Applicant and a more general review of the Wisbech Urban area.
