I'm not an expert and don't understand all the implications that this proposed facility will impose upon the town, but it is quite plain to see that it. Right. It is quite plain to see that it would change the infrastructure and the visual effects of Wisbech and the surrounding farmlands for years to come. This is such a beautiful example of a Georgian town with some exceptional buildings of historical value. The low lying land has fertile loam soil and the warm climate are ideal to grow cereal crops such as wheat, barley and oats and the root vegetables of potatoes, carrots and sugar beet, which gives this area of East Anglia the title of the breadbasket of the UK.

Also grown here are the brassicas, such as sprouts, cabbages and cauliflowers, and there are many fruit orchards and strawberries and raspberries grown. All these crops will be affected over future years by the fallout of toxins, etcetera, which will inevitably be emitted by the plumes from the two chimneys of the incinerator. No one is able to guarantee that clean air will be discharged from these chimneys. There will be no emissions monitoring and as household rubbish could contain all manner of plastics, furnishings, heavy metals, rubber and other materials, who knows what toxins and poisons will be put into the atmosphere.

The toxic fallout will eventually soak into the soil and be absorbed through the leaves of the trees. We cannot let this happen, especially as we are being told we have to be more self-sufficient in the future to keep food prices down. Another characteristic of the fence is the flat nature of the land, which enables one to see for miles around. However, the size and scale of the proposed facility will mean that it will stand out in comparison to other surrounding buildings and will be an eyesore in our backyard, which will be seen for miles around.

The applicant stated that the views from various few points in the outlying areas were insignificant. What an interesting word to use. Insignificant. The proposed facility is not suitable for this area and will change our landscape irreparably. In fact, it would become a blot on the landscape.

Where this facility is to be located is very close to housing estates, schools, supermarkets and retail shops.

And therefore residents will feel reluctant to use these facilities with all the concerns regarding safety, health and wellbeing and the dangers of children walking to and from school with all the extra HGVs

in the town. It has been declared today that the UK is at the bottom of the long list of countries signed up to climate change at Cop26, and the government has failed to act decisively in response to the energy crisis. So to allow this planning application to go ahead is not going to help us move up that list.

My concern about this proposal is that there are already a high number of energy infrastructures in the Wisbech area and that the addition of another is incompatible with the planning principle of necessary but unattractive developments being sited as equally as possible among those who benefit from them. This was raised as a relevant representation R250 and written representation rep 2045.

The applicant has commented on these and those comments have raised four points. The first point is regarding the planning principle of equitable distribution of necessary but unattractive sites among those benefiting from the development. The applicants comment on RR 250 was comment noted? Could the applicant clarify whether comment noted implies an acceptance of that principle? Or is it neutral that.

That is neither accepting or dismissing the principle. I'm selecting the site at Wisbech the applicant commented. One reason is it was allocated for waste treatment facilities in the previous Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Minerals and Waste Local plan. Mention of this plan highlights a relevant feature of the site, which is that Wisbech is a border town. It's situated in Cambridgeshire, but parts of the town are in Norfolk and other parts within four miles of Lincolnshire.

The justifications from the Minerals and Waste Plan covers those living in Cambridgeshire. Should the applicant not also provide a similar mandate for Norfolk and Lincolnshire?

Inspection of the National Infrastructure Planning Project list suggest one energy project within ten miles of the proposed development, which is the paper mill. King's Lynn attended the applicant's presentation in Walton Highway within a ten mile radius of that village hall. The following energy projects the electricity substation at Walpole Power Station at Sutton Bridge, the power station at King's Lynn, the palm paper mill.

What is the basis for the applicant, excluding them from their concentration of energy projects in the region? That is the four points.

Thank you. Local people first heard of this proposal. They were rightly horrified by its sheer size, scale and intended location. What on earth would possess anyone to think a small, historic Georgian market town on the upper edge of nowhere with long neglected roads, infrastructure surrounded by flat, highly food, productive fenland landscape would be a good location for something so heavily reliant on hundreds of HGVs converging at this one point each and every day for 40 plus years. Moreover, Wisbech is on a single carriage a47 pinch point for all Midlands access to Norfolk made even worse in the long summer months, with tourist flocking to the beaches along its vast coastline.

The applicant states business retains the overall group ethos of belonging to the communities it serves while benefiting from over 50 years experience gains by German German sister companies. The community doesn't want it. Neither the five authorities nor the local MP, a company which goes against their group ethos does not smack of integrity. But then little does this with this planning application, rather than it being a clear solution to a problem. The applicant, through manipulation, appears to have artificially created a problem for their profitable solution to bypass refuse at local refusal at local level.

The applicant appears to have made it as profitably large as the confines of the site would allow in order to qualify as an IP requiring a generating capacity of over 50MW. However, given the applicant's strong confidence of heat using customers, their intended expectation is exporting a

maximum of 47.9MW. Moreover, to be able to export over 50MW of energy, the facility would have to operate without heat export and totally reliant on burning feedstock within a very small calorific window over which they have no control.

It's difficult to have any level of confidence or trust in either the planning application or the applicant. Words are far too often vague, hollow, meaningless and non-committal actions will be considered where suitable, wherever practical are planning will look to, and the repeatedly contradicted themselves and each other throughout the issues. Specific hearings. The applicants.

Being able to robustly demonstrate how compliance with those key elements will be met, particularly accordance with the waste hierarchy and proximity principle. The proposed development is not in accordance with the Cambridge Development Plan, which states proposals for disposal must demonstrate that waste has been pre-treated and cannot practically be recycled without any means of on site sorting. The applicant cannot demonstrate. This facility is anything more than the mass burn incinerator. Using Defi's own composition figures, it could burn over 330,000 tonnes a year of readily recyclable waste and can only guarantee to burn waste that it can't cannot be recycled if local authorities or some other party presort all waste before it arrives at the facility for burning.

Given the applicant's clear intentions to take local authority waste through competitive price tendering, much of which could simply be removing feedstock from other waste energy from waste incinerators.

Then to look for other sources potentially even further afield. This neither moves waste up the hierarchy nor generates new energy. It merely replaces energy others were generating. These facilities place a huge burden on drinking water resources and at a time of increasing water scarcity, the applicant has selected a site in one of the driest areas in the country. Anglian Water may have rolled over to put profit before people, but can water really be regarded in Bountiful supply here? No. The uncertainty around future weather and the significant burden it will place on this increasingly precious resource is far too high risk in this area.

Given its enormous capacity, this planning application has not made robust arguments to demonstrate a proven need in this location or any robust evidence to support any benefits to the area. Moreover, the applicant confirmed quite clearly to the X-ray that no other locations were considered an admission which would also negatively impact the in other areas, such as its location in flood zone three and any cpos. The effects of visual intrusion have been played down in Cathedral's iconic part of the landscape known as the shape of the fence.

It majestically dominates the skyline, but at 66m high it would be dwarfed by the two 90 metre chimneys. Whilst any large scale building project is attractive to boost the economy in the short term, that benefit is not confined to this location and could potentially occur anywhere in the country. However, in this deprived location, the detrimental effects of such a large scale project would be significant and the negative impact would far outweigh any perceived benefits. The cumulative negative effects and non-compliance with national policies are significant enough to prevent this planning application benefiting from grant consent.

Sarah, a registered veterinary nurse with 25 years experience in veterinary practice, has asked me to speak on her behalf due to her work pressures and our poor road infrastructure. She is unable to get here for this afternoon's hearing and she dearly wanted to. So I'm quoting Sarah's words. Due to the nature of my profession, I regularly come into contact with wildlife and can easily identify trends in their presentation, often linked directly to environmental challenges in relation to the wildlife and the incinerator.

I have concerns regarding the impacts on our waterways and the protected and rare species that are currently living in it quite happily. Aquatic wildlife is particularly sensitive to pollution and environmental changes. Two species in particular are living very close to the site of the proposal. These are the spined loach copters Taenia This particular fish is only found in five river catchments in the east of England and these vitally include the River Nene.

It is protected under Annex two of the Habitats and Spaces Directive, which gives special full protection. They are at risk of localised extinction and are known to be particularly sensitive to pollution. The Environment Agency are regularly sampling for these fish across the fens to monitor agricultural practice and pollution. These fish have been documented living very close to the but to the proposed site of the incinerator.

The other species living very close by. Our water voles, waterfalls are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. Waterfalls are also listed as rare and most threatened species under section 41 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006. You must have regard for the conservation of Section 41 species as part of your planning decision.

These voles are numerous in very close proximity to the proposed site of the incinerator, with several pairs breeding pairs along half. Penny Lane.
