1 Executive Summary

- 1. Royal HaskoningDHV was commissioned by North Falls Offshore Wind Farm Ltd. to undertake a historic environment desk-based (baseline) assessment for the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone of the North Falls Offshore Wind Farm in September 2022, to inform early site of Environmental Impact activitv and to form part the Assessment baseline, informing the subsequent Preliminary Environmental Information Report and Environmental Statement submissions. This report forms a review of historic environment baseline data within the defined onshore archaeological desk-based assessment study areas.
- 2. Two study areas have been established and are defined as follows (Figure 1):
 - Non-designated heritage assets study area: defined as all land within the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone plus a 500m buffer; and
 - Designated heritage assets study area: defined as all land within the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone plus a 1km buffer along the route of the onshore cable corridors and a 5km buffer around the onshore substation zone.
- 3. This desk-based assessment provides an initial collation and characterisation of designated assets within the study areas in order to provide a constraints mapping exercise to feed into the design and site selection process and to form part of the Environmental Impact Assessment baseline, informing the subsequent, Preliminary Environmental Information Report and Environmental Statement submissions. As the project intends to avoid all designated heritage assets, no direct physical impacts are anticipated to occur. These assets will therefore predominantly form part of the settings assessment in the wider Preliminary Environmental Information Report and Environmental Statement, in which they will be considered in greater detail, so that any non-physical impacts associated with a change in setting resulting from the project's operation can be more fully understood.
- 4. This desk-based assessment also provides an initial collation and characterisation of non-designated assets and is supported by the results (Stage 2) an aerialimagery assessment undertaken by Air Photo Services Ltd to identify key areas of archaeological potential and outline recommendations for further assessment work.
- 5. This report broadly identifies the potential impacts on the historic environment resource based on the known project components, which was still undergoing some refinement at the time of writing. Further assessment of impacts on the historic environment will be considered in the wider Preliminary Environmental Information Report and Environmental Statement.
- 6. This desk-based assessment builds on the cable landfall search area desk-based assessment (reported separately), which was based on an area identified through early site selection for the offshore cable landfall at the coast. The present assessment extends inland from the cable landfall search area characterising the baseline for the proposed cable corridors and substation zone.







2 Introduction

2.1 Project and Report Background

- 7. The North Falls Offshore Wind Farm project (herein 'the project') is a proposed extension to the Greater Gabbard Offshore Wind Farm, which is located off the coast of Suffolk, England and was opened in 2013. The project is being developed by North Falls Offshore Wind Farm Ltd. (NFOW), a joint venture between SSE Renewables and RWE Renewables.
- 8. The project is proposed in response to The Crown Estate's extension leasing round, launched in 2017, with The Crown Estate recognising that extensions to operational wind farms are proven to be a successful way of efficiently developing more offshore generating capacity. NFOW was awarded an Agreement for Lease (AfL) from The Crown Estate in September 2020. NFOW have begun the process of baseline data collection to inform an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the project in support of a Development Consent Order (DCO) application proposed to be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in 2023.
- 9. The project will comprise an array of offshore wind turbines and offshore electrical platforms which will be connected to the shore by offshore export cables installed within an offshore cable corridor. The project also requires onshore infrastructure in order to connect the offshore wind farm to the National Grid, the footprint for which is collectively referred to as the 'onshore project area'. The onshore project area will comprise:
 - Landfall;
 - Buried electrical cables located within onshore cable corridors, from landfall (between Clacton-on-Sea and Frinton-on-Sea) to the onshore substation; and
 - Onshore substation.
- 10. The project received informal confirmation of the location of its grid connection point from National Grid on 8th December 2021. Prior to formal confirmation, ongoing detailed site selection of the landfall location, onshore cable corridor and onshore substation location have taken place to date at risk. Although the footprint of the onshore project area will continue to be refined down during the EIA process, it has to date been refined down beyond the project's initial 'onshore scoping area' to allow specific study areas to be drawn for designated and non-designated heritage assets. The current onshore project area comprises an area within the Tendring District of Essex (see Figure 1).
- 11. In September 2021, Royal HaskoningDHV produced a high-level historic environment desk-based (baseline) assessment (DBA) for an area referred to as the project's 'cable landfall search area' (an area in which landfall was being considered) (Document Reference: 004095496-01). The cable landfall search area DBA report formed an early high-level review of historic environment baseline data within the defined cable landfall search area study area to inform early site selection activity. Both the cable landfall DBA and the onshore cable



- corridors and onshore substation zone DBA will jointly form appendices to the subsequent Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) and Environmental Statement (ES) submissions. The PEIR and ES submissions will be undertaken on the onshore project area, as refined through the DBA and site selection processes.
- 12. This DBA focuses on the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone and presents the historic environment baseline data within the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone study area (the 'onshore archaeological DBA study area'). This will likely be expanded and/or refined as a result of the findings of this DBA and as the wider project progresses. The historic environment comprises all designated and non-designated heritage assets, including e.g., built heritage, buried archaeological remains and historic earthworks.
- 13. This DBA presents the known heritage assets (historic environment resource) recorded in the Essex Historic Environment Record (HER) and the National Heritage List for England (NHLE) for the onshore archaeological DBA study area. Gazetteers of all designated and non-designated heritage assets are included in Annex A and Annex B.
- 14. The DBA also includes an assessment of LiDAR data, National Mapping Programme (NMP), aerial images and historic mapping carried out by Air Photo Services (APS, July 2022) for the onshore archaeological DBA study area.
- 15. A characterisation of the baseline, as well as a statement on the potential for encountering archaeological remains which are, at present, unknown is included in this report. Further detailed assessment of impacts, associated effects and anticipated mitigation will be included within the Historic Environment PEIR chapter. This DBA, as well as the earlier DBA work covering the cable landfall search area, will support the scope of the PEIR Chapter and subsequent ES Chapter for the Onshore Historic Environment.

2.2 Site Description

16. The onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone comprise a relatively rural area of fieldscapes punctuated with smaller rural settlements. The extant modern fieldscape is a patchwork of earlier relict boundaries where modern agricultural techniques have shaped the present landscape. The onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone extend inland from Great Holland in a north-westerly direction towards Thorpe-le-Soken and Landermere, continuing on towards Horsley Cross where the onshore cable corridor crosses the A120 with the onshore substation zone located near to Little Bromley.

2.3 Aims and Objectives

- 17. The specific aims and objectives of this DBA are to:
 - Outline the known and potential heritage assets, based on a review of existing information to provide an archaeological and historical baseline within a defined study area;



- Assess the significance of the known and potential heritage assets through a consideration of their archaeological, architectural, artistic and historic interest, and to provide an initial consideration of the contribution that setting has on their significance, where relevant and at a high level only at this stage prior to further assessment work, which will be included in the PEIR;
- Inform the site selection process, identify any potential constraints and outline the broad potential for impacts upon heritage assets and their significance as part of a high-level assessment; and
- Scope areas of archaeological sensitivity and identify areas for further assessment where further qualification of the potential for buried archaeological remains would be required.

3 Methodology

3.1 Introduction

- 18. The following methodology has been designed in a manner consistent with good practice professional guidance outlined by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA) "Standards and guidance for historic environment desk-based assessment" (CIfA, 2020).
- 19. The approach taken for the ongoing wider assessment work within the PEIR chapter will be discussed and agreed with Historic England, Tendring District Council and Essex County Council Historic Environment Service (HES) (Place Services). At the time of writing, consultation with the Expert Topic Group has been ongoing. The results of consultation undertaken on the approach presented here will be set out within the PEIR.

3.2 Study Area

- 20. For the purposes of this DBA, two principal study areas have been established, defined as follows (Figure 1):
 - Non-designated heritage assets study area: a 500m buffer either side of the onshore cable corridors and from all sides of the onshore substation zone; and
 - Designated heritage assets study area: a 1km buffer either side of the onshore cable corridors merged with a 5km buffer from all sides of the onshore substation zone.

3.3 Sources

- 21. Sources that contain relevant historic environment information have been consulted in the production of this DBA. This includes:
 - Online 'Listing data' from the NHLE, maintained by Historic England, for information and shapefiles of designated heritage assets (Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings, Registered Parks and Gardens, Registered Battlefields and World Heritage Sites);



- National Record for the Historic Environment (NRHE), maintained by Historic England, for information derived from the former National Buildings Record (NBR) and National Archaeological Record (NAR);
- HER search for information on non-designated heritage assets and historic landscape characterisation data;
- HER event records for previous archaeological investigation reports;
- Data from the Portable Antiquity Scheme (PAS) accessed through information held by the HER, with supplementary information accessed via the online database, which records chance finds recovered and reported to them; and
- Tendring District Council website for information on Conservation Areas.
- The Essex Record Office for historic mapping including pre-Ordnance Survey maps, published and unpublished documentary sources (sourced by APS);
- Landmark data (sourced by APS);
- LiDAR data (sourced by APS);
- Geological mapping and borehole information held by the British Geological Survey;
- Assessment of relevant archaeological grey literature reports held by the Archaeology Data Service (ADS) and the HER;
- Tendring District Historic Environment Characterisation Report (Tendring District Council and Essex County Council 2008);
- Tendring Geodiversity Characterisation Report (Tendring District Council and Essex County Council 2009); and
- Essex Historic Grazing Marsh Project (Essex County Council 2014).
- 22. These sources were collated into a dataset of designated and non-designated heritage assets within the study areas (Figure 1) and are presented as part of the baseline conditions described in Section 5. Following the collation of data, it was compiled into gazetteers (Annex A and Annex B) with the digital information plotted into a geographic information system (GIS) dataset along with mapping data, allowing for rigorous spatial analysis of the dataset.
- 3.3.1 Cartographic sources
- 23. A historic map regression exercise has been undertaken by APS as part of their assessment, the results of which are included in this baseline DBA.
- 24. The historic map data hasbeen subject to a detailed examination as part of the ongoing development of the full PEIR assessment, ES chapter and DCO application to be submitted in due course.
- 3.3.2 Aerial photographic data



- 25. This baseline DBA includes the results of the aerial photographic data assessment, undertaken by APS (APS, July 2022) (see Section 5.8).
- 26. Aerial photographs can be very useful for identifying and / or assisting in the interpretation and identification of heritage assets and archaeological remains. The following sources were consulted in order to compile the aerial photographic data assessment:
 - HER:
 - Historic England Archive, Swindon;
 - Available online images sourced from Google Earth and Bing; and
 - NMP.
- 27. Further details regarding the methodology adopted for the aerial photographic data assessment will be provided in the full aerial photographic data assessment (APS, July 2022).

3.3.3 Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR)

- 28. This baseline DBA includes the results of the LiDAR data assessment, also undertaken by APS (APS, July 2022) (see Section 5.8).
- 29. LiDAR is a remote sensing technique and stands for 'Light Detection And Ranging'. The technique uses an active laser sensor, which sends and receives rapid pulses of laser light from an airborne aircraft (sometimes known as Airborne Laser Scanning or ALS). The pulses of laser light strike the surface of the earth and are reflected back to the aircraft. The time taken for a pulse of light to reach the ground and return is recorded by the sensor, which allows the three-dimensional (x, y, z) location of a point to be determined. As such, LiDAR data can produce horizontally and vertically accurate elevation measurements, thereby enabling archaeological sites which survive as upstanding earthworks (sometimes only very subtle in nature) to be mapped. LiDAR data can also provide a greater insight into the surroundings of already known archaeological remains and can be used in conjunction with other methods such as aerial photographic assessment.
- 30. The assessment of LiDAR data which informs this baseline DBA was based on freely available data from the Environment Agency, reviewed in conjunction with aerial photographic data. Further details regarding the methodology adopted for the LiDAR data assessment are provided in the full report (APS, July 2022) (Annex D).

3.4 Data Handling

31. Of the sources outlined in Section 3.3, those with spatial data were incorporated into a GIS dataset using ArcGIS 10.8.1 so that they could be spatially analysed. The data were subsequently compiled into two gazetteers, one for designated heritage assets (Annex A) and another for non-designated heritage assets (Annex B), which also covers where monuments and find spots have been recovered / identified during specifically planned previous archaeological events.



32. At this baseline DBA stage, it is known that there are some duplicated records between the two datasets, but these have been rationalised, so any designated heritage assets also listed in the HER dataset have been incorporated into the designated heritage asset gazetteer and are referred to using the NHLE ID number. For the purposes of this report, the gazetteers are compiled and illustrated in British National Grid.

3.5 Chronology

33. Archaeological, cultural and historic material is generally studied within a framework of 'periods' or 'ages' that reflect the activities and cultural changes taking place over time. Dates are referred to as BC (before Christ), BP (before present) or AD (Anno domini) within the text. BP dates are used for periods of time older than circa 10,000 years ago whereas BC and AD affectively refer to calendar years. Archaeological periods have been broadly defined by the following date ranges:

Palaeolithic: -1,000 000 to -10,000 BP

Mesolithic: -10,000 to -4,000 BC

Neolithic: -4,000 to -2,200 BC

Early Prehistoric -1,000 000 to -4,000 BC

• Bronze Age: -2,600 to -700 BC

Iron Age: -800 BC to 43 AD

Later Prehistoric -4,000 BC to 43 AD

Prehistoric -1,000 000 BC to 43 AD

Roman: 43 to 410 AD

Early Medieval (Saxon): 410 to 1066 AD

Medieval: 1066 to 1540 AD

Post Medieval: 1540 to 1901 AD

19th Century: 1800 to 1899 AD

Modern: 1900 AD to present day

3.6 Assessing Heritage Significance and Importance

- 34. The term significance, in relation to heritage policy, is identified in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) (Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government 2021 NPPF Annex 2: Glossary) as "The value of a heritage asset to this and future generations because of its heritage interest. That interest may be archaeological, architectural, artistic or historic. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting."
- 35. The importance of a heritage asset is the overall value assigned to it based on its heritage significance, e.g., reflecting its statutory designation or, in the case



- of non-designated assets, the professional judgement of the assessor. Historic England's industry standards and guidance (Historic England, 2015b and Historic England, 2017a) also refers to an asset's 'level of significance', which in this usage has the same meaning as importance.
- 36. Designated assets (e.g., Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings), non-designated heritage assets (e.g., HER monuments) and potential heritage assets (e.g., currently unknown archaeological remains) can all be identified as having a very high heritage significance, although designated heritage assets will be identified as high or very high significance more often than non-designated heritage assets. This is often due to the quality of a designated asset's survival and preservation, and/or a combination of its archaeological, architectural, artistic and historic interests.
- 37. Relevant to this definition of heritage significance, evidence for some heritage assets, particularly non-designated buried archaeological remains, is often an incomplete picture due to a lack of data on the remains (e.g., where they haven't been subject to any form of archaeological evaluation). Thus, the categories and definitions of heritage significance do not necessarily reflect a definitive level of importance for a non-designated asset. Where uncertainty occurs, a precautionary approach is to assign high importance; a good practice in impact assessments, which reduces the potential for impacts to be under-estimated.

3.7 Setting of heritage assets

- 38. A heritage asset's setting, and how it contributes to its significance, is a complex and far reaching subject. The NPPF identifies setting as that which encompasses an asset's surroundings in which it is experienced. The extent of setting is not fixed and can contribute both positively and negatively to the heritage significance of an asset.
- 39. Views allow for a concise method of articulating an asset's physical surroundings and how the setting is experienced or appreciated. Other considerations when identifying how setting contributes to an asset's significance include the asset's physical elements as well as perceptual and associational attributes relating to its surroundings. Examples of these considerations include: the asset's relationship with other assets, its visual dominance, tranquility, effect of noises, smells and other 'pollution' issues, degree of interpretation or promotion to the public, and celebrated artistic representations.
- 40. Identifying and articulating the setting of a heritage asset and how that setting contributes to its heritage significance follows the methodology as recommended by Historic England in the Setting of Heritage Assets: Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in planning Note 3 (Historic England, 2017a).
- 41. This guidance document recommends a stage-based approach for assessing the implications of development proposals, as follows:
 - Step 1: identify those heritage assets whose settings might be affected;



- Step 2: assess whether, how and to what degree setting makes a positive contribution to the value of those heritage assets;
- Step 3: assess the effect of the proposed development on the significance of those assets due to changes to setting;
- Step 4: maximise enhancement and minimise harm; and
- Step 5: make and document decisions and monitor outcomes.
- 42. The first step of this process has been undertaken as part of this report. Once there is further indication of the location of above ground infrastructure, further consideration of setting assessment can be progressed. In the meantime, the baseline data gathered within 5km of the onshore substation zone and 1km of the cable corridors has been used to feed into the site selection process and informed areas for avoidance of designated assets and early micrositing of infrastructure.
- 43. An initial appraisal of designated and non-designated heritage assets (Annex B and Annex C, Figure 3 and Figure 4) within these study areas was carried out using current and historic OS mapping, Google Maps, and information provided by the NHLE and HER.
- 44. No walkover survey has been undertaken at this stage as the present DBA aims mainly to identify and characterise the available data within the study areas and highlight any areas where further, more detailed assessment will be required. A walkover survey will be undertaken once the onshore project area has been better defined and will form either an Addendum to this report or a separate accompanying report.
- 45. An initial site visit was undertaken on 12th July by NFOW and Royal HaskoningDHV and attended by representatives from Essex County Council HES (Place Services), Historic England and Essex County Council's Principal Planning Officer to agree cultural heritage viewpoints of the refined onshore substation zone, including targeted assets within the ZTV to inform viewpoints for the setting assessment. Further details are given in Section 5.9.

3.8 Assumptions and Limitations

- 46. The HER is not a complete record, as it relies on non-designated assets being recorded and reported. The amount of archaeological work and surveys undertaken in an area and whether resulting findspots have been reported can limit the level of records within the HER. Similarly, unknown heritage assets are being found regularly, as part of new developments or new local research. As such, the HER is not a final record and does not preclude further assets being found in the future.
- 47. The report does not include a walkover survey as the exact location and layout of infrastructure has not yet been fully established. A walkover survey will be undertaken once the onshore project area has been better defined and will form either an Addendum to this report or a separate accompanying report.

4 Legislation, Policy and Guidance



4.1 Legislation

4.1.1 Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act (1979) (as amended)

48. This act states that any archaeological site or historic building of national importance can be designated as a Scheduled Monument and registered with the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS). Any development that may physically affect the monument is subject to the granting of Scheduled Monument Consent. Historic England advises the government on individual cases for consent and offers advice on the management of Scheduled Monuments.

4.1.2 Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act (1990)

49. This act covers the registration of listed buildings (buildings that are seen to be of special architectural or historic interest) and the designation of Conservation Areas (areas of special architectural or historic interest, the character of which is desirable to preserve or enhance). A building may be listed as grade I, II* or II and may not be demolished, altered or extended without Listed Building Consent being granted.

4.1.3 Historic England Register of Parks and Gardens

50. The Register of Parks and Gardens is held by Historic England, which grades registered parks and gardens as grade I, II* or II, along the same lines as listed buildings. Registered parks or gardens are not protected by a specific act or consenting regime but local authorities will give great weight to their conservation. The NPPF defines them as a designated heritage asset and as such their conservation is an objective of sustainable development.

4.1.4 Hedgerow Regulations 1997, as amended by The Hedgerows (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2002

51. These regulations define which hedgerows within England are identified as important and protected against removal and various other works. Heritage-specific criteria for precluding removal of a hedgerow includes if the hedge forms a historic parish or township boundary; it incorporates an archaeological feature which is a Scheduled Monument; or is part of a field system forming part of a key landscape characteristic, such as a Registered Park and Garden.

4.2 National Policy

4.2.1 National Planning Policy Framework

52. The NPPF (Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government, updated 2021) forms the basis for the Government's planning policy direction. It gives protection to designated and non-designated heritage assets. Provision for the historic environment is detailed within Section 16: Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment, which directs Local Planners to set out a "positive strategy for the conservation and enjoyment of the historic environment,



- including heritage assets most at risk through neglect, decay or other threats" (para. 190) and "In doing so, they should recognise that heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource and should be conserved in a manner appropriate to their significance" (para. 189).
- 53. The NPPF also states that great weight should be given to the conservation of designated heritage assets (World Heritage Sites, Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings, Protected Wreck Sites, Registered Parks and Gardens, Registered Battlefields or Conservation Areas). If an asset is identified as being lost due to a development, it requires developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible (para. 205).

4.2.2 National Policy Statements for Energy

- 54. These policies (specifically EN-1: Overarching NPS for Energy and EN3: National Policy Statement for Renewable Energy infrastructure) set out the Government's policy for delivery of nationally significant energy infrastructure. Section 5.8 of EN-1 sets out the Government's stance on protecting the historic environment and assessing the impact of any new energy infrastructure. It states that in considering the impact of a proposed development on any heritage assets, the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) should consider the nature and significance of the assets and the value they hold. Section 2.5.34 of EN-3 also states that when considering any impact on the historic environment, PINS should take into account the positive role that large-scale renewable projects play in the mitigation of climate change and delivery of energy security.
- 55. It is noted that the NPS for Energy (EN-1) and the NPS for Renewable Energy Infrastructure (EN-3) are in the process of being revised. A draft version of each NPS was published for consultation in September 2021 (Department for Business Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) (2021a) and BEIS (2021b) respectively). The relevant additional NPS requirements not presented within the current NPS include the requirement within section 5.9.14 of EN-1 which encourages the applicant, where opportunities exist, to prepare proposals which can make a positive contribution to the historic environment, and to consider how their scheme takes account of the significance of the heritage assets affected.

4.3 Local Policy

4.3.1 Tendring District Local Plan

- 56. Due to strategic cross-boundary policies and allocations, Tendring, Braintree and Colchester's Local Plan share an identical Section 1. Tendring specific policies and allocations can be found within Section 2 of the Local Plan.
- 57. Section 1 of the local plan (Tendring District Local Plan 2013-2033 and Beyond: North Essex Authorities, 2021) details the direction that the North Essex Authorities, including Tendring District Council wish to take their policies and allocations.



- 58. Section 2 of the Local Plan used for planning decisions was adopted on 25th January 2022 (Tendring District Local Plan 2013-2033 and Beyond, 2022).
- 59. Objective 7 Historic Environment states that: To conserve and enhance Tendring District's historic environment, including: heritage; respecting historic buildings and their settings; heritage assets; landscapes; links; and views. Policy SPL3 gives the requirements for Sustainable Design and states with particular relation to heritage that "the design and layout of the development maintains or enhances important existing site features of landscape, ecological, heritage or amenity value".

4.4 Standards and Guidance

60. Standards and guidance is given by the Government on how the historic environment can be enhanced and conserved through the planning process and a number of standard and guidance documents have been produced by Historic England and ClfA regarding assessing the Historic Environment and implementing a best practice approach. These have been referred to during the compilation of this DBA.

Historic Environment Baseline

5.1 Introduction

61. The following section details the currently known heritage assets within the study areas, which form the baseline data to identify and characterise the historic environment. The full data sets for designated and non-designated heritage assets are included as Annex A and Annex B, respectively.

Location, Topography and Geology

- 62. The onshore cable corridor continues inland on a roughly north-west alignment from Great Holland towards Little Bromley via Landermere, Tendring Green and Horsley Cross. The Tendring Brook is crossed to the north-east of Tendring and the Holland Brook to the north-west of Horsley Cross. The onshore substation zone is located to the west of Little Bromley.
- 63. The north-western extent of the study area, around Little Bromley, forms the highest parts of the study area ranging from 35m Ordnance Datum (OD) to 30m OD and gradually declines to 20m OD around Great Holland in the southeastern extent of the study area. The study area descends to 5m OD towards the Holland Brook which runs almost in parallel to the south-west of the study
- 64. The underlying bedrock geology across the study area is London Clay comprising fossilised plants and wood and nodules of calcium phosphate (cement stones) in layers, which contain fossil bones of mammals, birds, sharks and other animals, laid down on the floor of a sub-tropical sea approximately 50 million years BP.
- 65. After the Anglian glaciation (424,000 years BP), the River Thames was diverted to its modern channel which left a series of terraces (Kesgrave Sand and Gravels) exposed. These were then covered indiscriminately by the deposition of brickearth during the Devensian glacial stage (15-20,000 years BP). These superficial deposits of Brickearth are recorded within the north-western extent of the study area with pockets towards the south-east. Localised areas of Kesgrave Catchment Subgroup Sands and Gravels are recorded near Tendring, Thorpe-le-Soken and Great Holland. The valley slopes of the Holland Brook and Hamford Water are covered by Alluvium.
- 66. Essex County Council and Tendring District Council have undertaken a study of the geodiversity of the district, which culminated in a GIS data set and



accompanying report characterising geodiversity. It has been designed as a tool to support planning decisions and development control in the area. The project was developed primarily to serve as a tool for Tendring District to use in the creation of its Local Development Framework and to facilitate the development of positive approaches to the integration of geodiversity objectives into spatial planning for the District. The results of the Tendring Geodiversity Characterisation Report (Essex County Council and Tendring District Council 2009) form a critical resource for better understanding the geoarchaeological resource and its importance.

- 67. The report provides a detailed analysis of the previous courses of the River Thames and Medway and detailed discussion of underlying geology and overlying soils. An explanation of geologically derived cropmarks is also provided, stating that it is generally confined to generally flat areas of brickearth, and represents the results of Glacial melts.
- 68. The report identified Geodiversity Character Areas (GCA) and further breaks these down into Geodiversity Character Zones (GCZ), which provide an invaluable understanding of the underlying character of the geology within the study area. For the purposes of this DBA, a summary of the GCAs within the study area is provided below and presented in Figure 2. A more detailed review and consideration of the GCAs and GCZs located within the study area will be presented in the Geoarchaeological DBA (forthcoming) (see also Section 7.4).
- 69. There are two main GCAs which fall within the study area:
 - GCA 1 Tendring Plateau extends across the northern section of the study area with pockets recorded to the south. This is further subdivided into GCZs 1.2, 1.4, 1.5, 1.6, 1.7 and 1.8.
 - GCA 13 London Clay extends across much of the central and southern portions of the study area. This is further subdivided into GCZs 13.1 and 13.2.
- 70. The remaining areas within the study area consist of localised GCAs including GCA 4, 6, 7, 12, 16 and 18. A summary of each GCA is provided below.

5.2.1 GCA 1 Tendring Plateau

71. The plateau is flat or gently undulating and dissected by a number of stream valleys. The area is largely covered by brickearth deposits which cover gravels that were deposited by ancient courses of the River Thames and River Medway. The brickearth gives rise to rich and fertile soils which have been exploited for agriculture since the earliest prehistoric agrarian communities.

5.2.2 GCA 4 Alresford Valley System

72. The Alresford valley consists of a series of relatively steep-sided river valleys, flowing southwards into the Colne.

5.2.3 GCA 6 Ardleigh Gravels



73. The Ardleigh Gravels belong to the second highest of the four Kesgrave Formations on the Tendring Plateau. The band of sands and gravels located in the north of the District was deposited by the pre-diverted Thames c.550,000 years BP, when it flowed across the north of the district. The stratigraphic sequence is interbedded with significant interglacial deposits and a buried soil. Where the Ardleigh Gravels are overlain by brickearth they form part of GCA 1.

5.2.4 GCA 7 Wivenhoe Gravels and Cooks Green Gravels

74. The Wivenhoe and Cooks Green Gravels belong to the third highest of the four Kesgrave Formations on the Tendring Plateau. The band of gravels were deposited by an earlier course of the Thames as it flowed north-eastwards across Tendring around 500,000 years BP. These gravel deposits represent the Thames and Thames/Medway channels respectively.

5.2.5 GCA 12 Hamford Water

75. Hamford Water is a large and shallow embayment comprising tidal creeks, intertidal mudflats and sandflats, saltmarshes, islands, beaches and marsh grasslands. The area is underlain by London Clay which outcrops within the basin as small islands. The fine-grained sediments of the London Clay represent the accumulation of mud on a sub-tropical sea floor over 50 million years ago. The London Clay contains fossil bones of warm-loving marine mammals as well as birds, sharks and other animals and fossilised plants and wood representative of rainforest vegetation brought/washed in by rivers.

5.2.6 GCA 13 London Clay plateau and coastal slopes around Hamford Water and Brightlingsea

76. The area includes the gently undulating London clay plateau across the central region of the District from Wrabness in the north to Clacton in the south and the low coastal slopes around Hamford Water and Brightlingsea. It includes two geological SSSIs at Harwich and the Naze. The diversity of fossils and form of preservation in these areas is of great significance for research.

5.2.7 GCA 16 Holland Brook Valley

77. The area covers the steep sided valley slopes of the Holland Brook, the alluvial floodplain and Holland Haven marshes.

5.2.8 GCA 18 Exposures of Red Crag and sediments from the Cromerian Complex

78. At Beaumont, an area of the distinctive red shelly sand known as the Red Crag is exposed. The Red Crag is composed of sediments and shells deposited in the near-shore environments of the sea around 2.4 million years BP.

5.3 Designated Heritage Assets

79. There are 479 designated heritage assets within the study area for designated heritage assets (see Annex A and Annex C Figures 3a-3i), comprising



seven Scheduled Monuments (SMs), two Registered Parks and Gardens, 462 Listed Buildings and eight Conservation Areas. This section provides a short summary of these designated heritage assets. As the project intends to avoid all designated heritage assets, no direct physical impacts are anticipated to occur. These assets will therefore predominantly form part of the settings assessment in the wider PEIR and ES, in which they will be considered in greater detail, so that any non-physical impacts associated with a change in setting resulting from the project's operation can be more fully understood.

5.3.1 Scheduled Monuments

- 80. There is one Scheduled Monument located approximately 300m to the north-east of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone, at Hamford Water: the 19th century Beaumont Quay (NHLE List Entry 1020688). The remains of the 19th century quay are combined with those of a largely intact lime kiln together with the standing and buried remains of associated buildings and the wreck of a contemporary cargo vessel. The lime kiln is a rare example of an East Anglian form, surviving in very good condition, and is the only one of its type (mixed feed) to survive in this area. The quay itself, the remains of the sailing barge, the associated store where the traded goods would have been stowed away and the lime kiln representing associated industrial enterprise.
- 81. A further six Scheduled Monuments are located within the wider study area (Figures 3a-3i).
- 82. To the north of the onshore substation zone, approximately 1.6km at Lawford, is the Scheduled settlement site of a Neolithic enclosure (NLHE List Entry 1002157). The settlement site, also known as Tye Field, is a circular enclosure with opposed entrances showing as a cropmark. In appearance, it is similar to a henge, although excavation in the 1960s proved it to be a Neolithic domestic site.
- 83. Also, to the north (approximately c.2.6km), is the Scheduled Round Barrow west of Lawford Hall (NLHE Listed Entry 1002125). Round barrows are funerary monuments dating from the Late Neolithic period to the Late Bronze Age.
- 84. Further north, on the banks of the River Stour (approximately c.3.3km north of the onshore substation zone) are the Scheduled ring ditches south-west of Reed Island (NHLE List Entry 1002135).
- 85. To the west of the onshore substation zone (just over 1.5km) is the Scheduled cropmark site south of Ardleigh (NHLE List Entry 1002146), represented by cropmarks of possible Bronze Age or Iron Age cemeteries.
- 86. To the north-east of the onshore substation zone (approximately 4km), is the Scheduled 18th century Mistley Towers (NHLE List Entry 1002154). The two porticoed classical towers stood at each end of the now demolished parish Church of St Mary the Virgin. The towers are also Grade I Listed (NHLE List Entry 1240390, 1261061).
- 87. Further north-east (approximately 4.5km) at Mistley Heath, is the Scheduled Site of Old St Mary's Church (NHLE List Entry 1002142). The ruins of the



- medieval former parish church comprise flint and rubble and are overgrown by vegetation. The ruins are also Grade II Listed (NHLE List Entry 1240277).
- 88. All these monuments have been scheduled due to their national importance and significance (incorporating archaeological and historic interest) and can often form a primary part of the historic landscape or townscape character of the local area.
- 89. All of the monuments can be identified as being of high heritage importance, with significance being derived from their archaeological and historical interest.

5.3.2 Registered Parks and Gardens

- 90. There two Grade II Registered Parks and Gardens within the study area. The designation at Thorpe Hall (NHLE List Entry 1000521) is located just over 600m to the south-west of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone at Thorpe Hall and comprises an early 20th century shrub and water gardens developed by the owner, Lady Byng, from 1913 onwards.
- 91. Beth Chatto Gardens (NHLE List Entry 1468784) are a series of informal gardens, developed from 1960 onwards, with additions and alterations in the late 20th and early 21st century, by Beth Chatto. The gardens are located 4.1km to the south-west of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone.
- 92. These are considered as being of high heritage importance, with significance being derived from their archaeological and historical interest.

5.3.3 Listed Buildings

- 93. Of the 462 Listed Buildings, 15 are designated as Grade I, 30 are Grade II* and the remaining 417 are Grade II. Within 500m of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone there are three Grade II* Listed Buildings and 27 Grade II Listed Buildings. No Listed Buildings are located with the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone.
- 94. Two Grade II Listed Building are located immediately adjacent to the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone:
 - Barker's Farmhouse (NHLE List Entry 1322630), on Swan Road, Beaumontcum-Moze (almost mid-way along the onshore cable corridors). The 16th century farmhouse is a two-storey timber-framed and plastered building, with handmade red clay tiles, and has some 19th century alterations; and
 - Hempstall's Farmhouse (NHLE List Entry 1240504), off the A120 Colchester Road 450m south east of Horsley Cross. The a two-storey red brick farmhouse dates to at least the 17th century with various later alterations.
- 95. As stated above, three Grade II* Listed Buildings are located within 500m of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone:
 - The Church of St Mary (Grade II*, NHLE List Entry 1337175) is located near the onshore substation zone, to the south-west of Little Bromley. The parish church comprises an early 12th century nave, whilst the chancel was rebuilt in the 14th century, the lower stages of the west tower constructed in the



- early 15th century with the upper stage rebuilt in the 16th century. It is constructed of puddingstone rubble and is part plastered with stone dressings, with red brick to the upper stages of the west tower and has a red plain tiled roof on the chancel. A viewpoint from the Church as been agreed with Historic England and Essex County Council;
- The Church of All Saints (Grade II*, NHLE List Entry 1165610) is located near the landfall in Great Holland. The original parish church was rebuilt circa 1866 by Sir Arthur Blomfield withf lint and stone dressings. The red brick west tower dates to the 15th/16th century; and
- The Homestead (Grade II*, NHLE List Entry 1111531) is located in Frintonon-Sea Circa 1905-6. C.F.A and is a two storey L-plan rough rendered brick house with attics to gables. The house was designed by the architect and furniture designer Voysey for A.C. Turner. There are stone window surrounds and mullions.
- 96. Although the Listed buildings show a scattered distribution across the full extent of the study area, there are some areas in which a notable concentration of such heritage assets occur. Such concentrations are commonly observed in association with historical towns and settlements within the study area.
- 97. A number of these concentrations of Listed Buildings commonly reside in areas designated as Conservation Areas (see Section 5.3.4 below) within the study area, such as Thorpe-le-Soken, Manningtree and Mistley, Dedham, and Ardleigh, for example.
- 98. There are several Listed Buildings that are sited in a seemingly more sporadic way; these tend to be agricultural, religious or individual residential buildings in origin. Examples include Jenning's Farmhouse (Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1111459) (also an agreed viewpoint), Chequers Farmhouse (Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1111419), Parish Church of St Leonard (Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1112130), and Millington House (Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1147589).
- 99. Examples of other types of structures which are listed include public houses (e.g., The Sun Public House, Grade II*, NHLE List Entry 1273783), War Memorials (e.g., Grade II, NHLE 1391298), fountains (e.g., Swan Fountain, Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1074956), pumps (e.g., Pump adjacent to east return of number 12, Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1240303), kilns (e.g., Kiln at east end of Maltings adjacent to north street, Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1239944), and numerous garden walls and gates associated with Listed Buildings.
- 100. The Grade I and II* Listed Buildings are certainly considered to be of high heritage importance to the local area and wider region, adding to the distinct quality and character of historic non-designated settlements and Conservation Areas, as well as the wider environment, particularly through shared intervisibility between buildings with vertical dominance (e.g. parish church spires).

5.3.4 Conservation Areas



- 101. Great Holland Conservation Area is located within 500m of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone, with Thorpe-le-Soken, Tendring, Lawford and Manningtree and Mistley Conservation Areas located within 1km of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone. The remainder are located over 1km from the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone. East Berholht Conservation Area extends 40m into the northern edge of the 5km study area and therefore has not been included in this assessment as the vast majority of the Conservation Areas sits beyond 5km of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone.
- 102. Table 5-1 summarises the special character of each Conservation Area.

The area is complete by the designation of the attractive if degraded designed landscape associated with the long-vanished Mistley Hall.
Lawford	The special quality of Lawford Conservation Area lies in the importance of Lawford Hall and its designated landscape, to the intrinsic character of the church and of church hill, and the quality of the earlier sections of the main part of the village. The main developed part of the Area on Wignall street is in a relatively deep valley, secluded by the landform and mature trees. The Area is also notable for the wealth of views in and around the parkland, and over the Stour estuary.
Bradfield	The special character of Bradfield Conservation Area stems from the historic and architectural importance of the little group of buildings historically associated with the parish church of the dispersed settlement. Alongside the church, churchyard and former vicarage, the character of the Area derives mainly from its vernacular cottages fronting the mains roads, most particularly the individual cottages with prominent facades and gables on The Street.
Ardleigh	The special quality of Ardleigh Conservation Area comes from its setting of a small medieval village set at



	an important road junction, alongside retaining its fine church and sequences of attractive vernacular buildings. The well-treed approaches to the north and east are essential to the character of the village and are also included in the Area. The village expanded southwards in the 19 th century, resulting in further groups of distinctive buildings, which with their settings are also recognised.
Tendring	The special character of Tendring Conservation Area derives in its setting of a linear village straddling one of the main cross-country routes through the district. The Area consists of buildings predominating at its eastern end, and for a short section of The Street in the centre of the village, whilst frontage walls are also prominent in fronting both cottages and the extensive grounds of The Grange. Otherwise, the curving spine of the village is almost entirely framed by mature planting, either specimen trees or hedgerows, where they frame the attractive and informal group of older properties, including the Church. Properties built up to the Second World War tend to be more prominent in the street scene, those constructed afterwards are generally set back behind individual or grouped accesses.
Great Holland	The special character of Great Holland Conservation Area lies in the relationship between a formal, enclosed area in front of the Ship Inn and the sinuous lane leading to the Church, Hall and extensive views over the coast.
Thorpe-le-Soken	The special quality of Thorpe-Le-Soken Conservation Area derives ultimately from its importance in Medieval times, indicated by the wealth of historic buildings lining a sinuous main street. Neighbouring parts of the village that relate to the Medieval core in plan form and in the intrinsic interest of their buildings are also included in the Area because of their supporting role. The Area contains a wealth of mature trees which frame buildings and spaces and contribute to its character and appearance.

103. These Conservation Areas are identified as being of high heritage importance to the region, adding to the historic character of the landscape and townscapes.

5.3.5 Ancient Woodland

- 104. 30 sections of Ancient Woodland are identified by Natural England within the study area. Ancient Woodland is any woodland that is older than AD1600 (Forestry Commission & Natural England, 2022). Ancient woodland has an inherent heritage interest, often contributing to the setting of other nearby heritage assets and having the potential to provide evidence of historic coppicing and other woodland industries (e.g., charcoal or iron production). No such evidence is identified within the HER data within the study area.
- 105. Similarly, sections of ancient woodland can add greatly to an area's historic landscape character, and often enhancing the setting of heritage assets. As such they can form a useful addition to the baseline data.



106. The majority of ancient woodland is located over 2km from the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone and mainly to the south of the onshore substation zone. Ten areas of ancient woodland are located within 500m of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone, with the closest being Simons Wood (NF ID 1117171) which lies adjacent to the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone, located to the east of Tendring.

5.3.6 Registered Battlefields

107. There are no Registered Battlefields within the study area.

5.4 Non-designated heritage assets

- All HER data has been compiled into a gazetteer (see Annex B and Annex C 108. Figures 4a-4i) and the sub-sections below identify the known remains most relevant to the study area with additional information provided where available from archaeological reports, HER event record data, data held on the ADS and results from The Tendring District Historic Environment Characterisation Project (Tendring District Council and Essex County Council 2008) and the National Mapping Programme Essex: Management Report (Essex County Council and EH 2003).
- 109. Within the study area, there are a total of 277 HER records describing findspots (128), monuments (116), industry (1), maritime (1), landscape features (3), buildings (3) and Listed Buildings (25) (Annex B and Annex C Figures 4a-4hi). The Listed Buildings on the HER have been considered as part of the designated heritage assets to avoid duplication.

5.4.1 Palaeolithic

Tendring District is known to contain Palaeolithic deposits of international importance. Deposits of this level of importance are generally concentrated along the coast around Clacton and Jaywick, outside the study area. These Palaeolithic deposits from the wider Clacton area have produced a range of flint tools and the oldest wooden tool ever recovered from Britain. The deposits are of international importance and as such the name 'Clactonian Industry' is given to the evidence for production and typology of tools recovered from this region dating to 300,000 – 200,000 years BP. The Palaeolithic deposits also provide a rich source of information on the past environment, habitats, flora and fauna.



- Essex County Council and Historic England undertook a project to develop a methodology and create a predictive model of the Palaeolithic resource at a county-wide scale, which resulted in a detailed report: Managing the Essex Pleistocene (2015). It builds on previous work, including the Medway Valley Palaeolithic Project (2009), the Tendring Geodiversity Characterisation Project (2009) and earlier Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund (ALSF) funded projects carried out within Essex. As part of the Managing the Essex Pleistocene project, areas that can be characterised by their potential for the presence and survival of Palaeolithic archaeological remains and/or associated Pleistocene palaeoenvironmental remains were identified and named Palaeolithic Potential Areas (or PPAs). The study area is largely characterised by low potential areas, but one moderate potential PPA intersects the study area in two locations in the vicinity of Thorpe-le-Soken, namely Thorpe Cross and near the intersection of the railway lines to Frinton-on-Sea and Holland-on-Sea (east of Thorpe-le-Soken). The area is characterised as Cooks Greeen/Wivenhoe gravel (as per Tendring Geodiversity Project GCA 7) of Kesgrave (Colchester) formation with recorded Palaeolithic findspots within its extent and within close proximity to the mapped extent of this area.
- 112. Within the study area the Palaeolithic evidence can generally be characterised by flint tools (53850, 1917, 1919), some of which are broadly dated to the Paleolithic to Bronze Age.
- 113. Some of the HER records include sites where archaeological features and finds recovered have been dated between the Palaeolithic and later periods. A field north of Carringtons Farm (2457) containing cropmarks dating from at least the prehistoric period underwent trial trenching in 2011 (30 trenches). The cropmarks comprised a small sub-rectangular enclosure (possibly prehistoric). Three pits were excavated and produced prehistoric pottery and flints. One pot sherd was Late Iron Age in date and two other sherds were more tentatively assigned the same date. A further 21 features were identified and comprised field ditches (mostly undated) which share a southwest-northeast alignment in line with the present-day field boundaries, these were also undated but presumed to be post-medieval.
- 114. Other cropmark features within the wider area have been broadly dated to the prehistoric to Roman periods, though sometimes these are described as being masked in part by underlying geological conditions. Similarly, a series of cropmarks west of Horsleycross Street (3127) are masked in part by underlying geological conditions and have been broadly dated to the Palaeolithic to Post Medieval periods. Of these cropmarks, the sub-rectangular enclosure was presumed to be prehistoric in origin and the remainder of features included pits, trackways and field boundaries dating from the prehistoric to the Post Medieval periods.

5.4.2 Mesolithic

115. In the wider area, evidence from the Mesolithic period can largely be characterised by significant assemblages of microlith stone tools, particularly around the coast at Walton-on-the-Naze, which attest to the presence of transient groups relying on wild game and fishing for subsistence. Within the



- study area records of Mesolithic finds include one tranchet axe (1918), Adze (53618), and a flint tool (53625). In the wider area other tranchet axes, maceheads and a perforated stone objects have also been found.
- 116. The sea levels began to rise during this period due to glacial melt and by the Mesolithic period there was probably a tidal estuary (48658) within the cable landfall search area, which occupied the area of low, flat, marshy land in the vicinity of the current Holland Brook (former Holland River). The estuary was known as the Gunfleet estuary from the Medieval period onwards. The estuary extended broadly along the line of the Holland Brook and surrounding marshlands and narrowed as it stretched northwest inland. It probably extended well beyond the present location of Fan bridge on the road between Great Holland Common and Cook's Green (Little Clacton) and may have been tidal as far as Weeley and navigable to smaller boats up to Thorpe-le-Soken further north.

5.4.3 Neolithic

- 117. Neolithic activity is well attested across the wider Tendring District and is evidenced by cropmarks of a monumental causewayed enclosure at St Osyth and ring ditch at Brightlingsea, which together have yielded one of the largest collections of early Neolithic ceramics of the East of England. Evidence suggests that during this period the population begins to move to a more settled agricultural existence.
- 118. Within the study area Neolithic evidence comprises a findspot of an axe head characteristic of this period (7413). The Neolithic finds are concentrated to the south of Lawford and finds such as Neolithic axe heads are much more common in this wider area. Over 1km north of the study area near Lawford a scheduled Neolithic settlement site (NHLE List Entry 1002157) initially identified as a cropmark and has since been variously excavated. Earthworks and a domestic structure have been identified, along with finds such as; Neolithic pottery, flint tools, bone pins and animal bones.
- 119. A Neolithic beaker burial was also recorded and scheduled (NHLE List Entry 1002146) near Ardleigh, approximately 1km outside the study area. The burial was found in a rectangular pit, with no other grave goods. A series of later features were also identified and are also located outside the study area. The features include Late Iron Age or early Roman field ditches (17435); Saxon evidence (17436); and Post Medieval evidence (17437).

5.4.4 Bronze Age

120. Evidence for Bronze Age evidence in the wider Tendring area can be characterised by Beaker pottery, barrows and cremation cemeteries. A locally distinctive form of pottery and funerary tradition has been recovered from cremation cemeteries at Ardleigh, Brightlingsea, Lodge Farm and Little Bromley (all outside the study area), with cremations being placed between barrows in large straight sided elaborately decorated Bucket Urns (evident as ring ditches). Bronze Age burials have also been found eroding from modern cliff faces north



- of Walton, which would have still been a distance from the coastline during the Bronze Age.
- 121. A concentration of potential Bronze Age features has been identified around Carrington's Farm at the north of the study area. Two possible ring ditches both measuring 11m in diameter (17485 and 2640). The latter ring ditch (2640) is situated within a complex series of undated cropmarks (likely field boundaries, pit and trackway).
- 122. Two Middle Bronze Age hoards (51070 and 51086) and an axe (51077) have also been found within the study area. Evidence from the Late Bronze Age includes a vessel (51130).
- 123. There are various HER records broadly dated to the prehistoric period. They mainly comprise worked flints (2469) and arrowheads (3071). Various findspots of pottery (17745) and a red carnelian bead have also been recorded (2357) as prehistoric.
- 124. In the wider area there are various concentrations of cropmarks including curvilinear enclosures, trackways and field boundaries have also been broadly recorded as prehistoric in date. Several HER records in the wider area note that several enclosures show signs of irregular morphology and have been broadly dated to the prehistoric.

5.4.5 Iron Age

- 125. Evidence for Iron Age activity in the wider area is characterised by dispersed domestic and agricultural settlements, field systems, cremation burials and red hills (salt production). Evidence from sites such as St Osyth (over 5km to the west of the study area) suggest arable and pastoral farming were practiced, with the lower lying salt marshes being used for grazing. Wool production likely also formed part of the local economy, which was probably heavily influenced by the Trinovantes tribe, whose capital was located in the nearby nationally significant Iron Age settlement of Camulodunum (near modern Colchester over 16km to the north-west). A comprehensive account of Essex red hills is given in The Red Hills of Essex: Salt-making in antiquity published by Colchester Archaeological Group. One red hill is recorded within the study area at Beaumont Quay (3016) along with sherds of Iron age and Roman pottery found on the mound.
- 126. The majority of recorded Iron Age evidence within the study area are finds of coins (56322, 56331, 56374, 56375, 51854 and 51855), broaches (56322, 56375, 51858, 51861, 51862, 56330, 56332 and 56387) and other jewelry (56375 and 56325). There is a particular concentration to the south of Little Bentley, which is a common theme across the periods. This could be due to it being an area used for metal detecting, where finds have been properly recorded through the Portable Antiquities Scheme and subsequently the HER. However, there is a very notable concentration from the Iron Age through to the Post Medieval, suggesting this could be an area of particular sensitivity, consistent with multiperiod settlement and/or activity.

5.4.6 Roman



- 127. Evidence from the Romano-British period in the wider area suggests a dispersed settlement pattern during this period, with an associated agricultural landscape with localised industries. The Roman town at Colchester (7km west of the northern extent of the study area) would also have heavily influenced land use, settlement pattern and economy in the area. A number of villa sites have been identified at St Osyth, Little Oakley and Dovercourt (all located over 6km from the study area).
- 128. Various Roman roads are recorded within the study area, with a particular concentration at the northern extent of the study area, which is reflective of the influence of the Roman town at Colchester. Sections of the Roman road connecting Colchester to Manningtree cross this area (2573 and 2770) and have been identified partly by aerial photography and extant roads with probable Roman (or earlier) origins, such as Bromley Road. Two other Roman roads are recorded in this area north of Little Bromley (3147 and 3168/3128). There are two records of undated cropmarks (17110) within the vicinity of these roads, both of which also include possible sections of Roman road (2631).
- 129. Evidence of likely roadside settlement is recorded around Grange Road where roads 2573 and 3168 intersect. Record 17110 represents a very high concentration of cropmark features indicative of settlement including; a double-ditched rectangular enclosure with entrances, a curvilinear enclosure, the roads themselves and various linear features.
- 130. Record 17486 appears to be a continuation of field boundaries eastwards along road 3168, as well as a section of the road 3168 itself.
- 131. There are two other possible Roman roads recorded on the HER, though more are likely present within the study area. One is located south of Wolves Hall (3138) and the other (3073) is at the south of the study area between Tendring and Beaumont Quay.
- 132. The remaining Roman HER records within the study area are findspots. There are notable concentrations around Little Bromley (56327, 56333, 56339, 2316 and 2468), Beaumont-cum-Moze (56367, 56370, 56373 and 3077) and Beaumont Quay (7409 and 3071). The latter is probably associated with the supposed Roman road (3073). Two other finds are recorded at the southern extent of the study area and include a tile (3122) and coin (57299).

5.4.7 Early Medieval

133. Evidence from the Saxon period is generally sparse in the wider area, suggesting either continued occupation or reoccupation of previously abandoned villas and farmsteads, such as those at St Osyth. The name of which derives from the dedication of a minster church to Osyth, daughter of a Saxon King. Evidence for Middle Saxon domestic settlement and activity have been recovered from the Clacton area. Later Viking evidence is rare in Essex as a whole, but place name evidence at Kirkby-le-Soken and Thorpe-le-Soken near the south of the study area, are Danish in origin suggesting at least a general presence in the area.



- 134. The majority of early medieval HER records within the study area are findspots and include items such as horse tack (51331 and 51332), coins (51330 and 51163), pottery (7410, 7411 and 17746), a sword (51324) and a brooch (52899). The finds are fairly widely distributed across the study area with a loose concentration between Great Bromley and Little Bromley.
- 135. Features indicative of early medieval agricultural and industrial activity include various cropmarks of field boundaries and other features:
 - Record 3162 comprises cropmarks of linear features, including a short stretch of double-ditched trackway and an extraction pit. The adjacent Ancient Woodland is notably called Gravel Wood and to the north Post Medieval gravel extraction is also evident from historic mapping.
 - Record 47285 comprises cropmarks of former field boundaries marked on 1st edition OS mapping just north of Thorpe Cross.
 - Record 3089, just north of Tendring Heath, is a ditch with associated field boundaries.

5.4.8 Medieval

- 136. Settlement patterns and activities in the wider area remained dispersed during the Medieval period, with villages (centered around churches and greens), hamlets, hall complexes and farmsteads providing settlement foci in an otherwise rural and agricultural landscape. These dispersed settlements were linked across the intervening agricultural land and commons by an extensive network of lanes connecting into the wider road network and roads to larger central markets.
- 137. Moated sites are a common small-scale settlement type in Essex, but less so in Tendring. The nearest Medieval moated hall is recorded at Gutteridge Hall in Weeley, over 3km to the west of the study area. A possible moat was recorded within the study area amongst other undated cropmarks (17241) east of Hannan Hall. Medieval activity is well attested at St Osyth and Great Bentley, where the remains of a windmill were identified and represents another relatively characteristic structure of Medieval Essex. No medieval mills are recorded within the HER data within the study area, though two Post Medieval mills are recorded.
- 138. Various cropmarks of possible medieval field boundaries (48329, 46798, 46801 and 46799) are recorded across the study area and are generally concentrated around Thorpe-le-Soken and Great Holland (3627 and 2983). These possible field boundaries are indicative of the agricultural activity that would have centered on settlements such as these.
- 139. Central markets for agricultural trade during this period would have been at Colchester, St Osyth and Manningtree. Coastal trade would have also formed an important aspect of the local economy during the Medieval period. Harwich (over 11km to the north-east) represents the main hub, with smaller sites at St Osyth, Manningtree and Beaumont Quay. The study area is largely located inland, so there are minimal records relating to coastal trade, though the few sites recorded would have fed into the wider economy during this period. There



are two presumed landing places recorded along the line of the former Holland River (48659 and 48661). They likely represent lanes that linked the Gunfleet estuary to the farms and villages on the higher land, allowing crops and other local produce to be loaded easily onto boats and carried along the river for trade in the wider area and into London. Remote landing places could also be used to avoid customs control and the isolated marshes at Holland earned a reputation for smuggling which carried on until the 17th century after the estuary had been reclaimed. Likewise, some of the quays along Hamford Water earned a similar reputation.

- 140. Beaumont Quay (3097) would have also been a landing place during this period and would have served the nearby Beaumont Hall (NHLE List Entry 1322628, Grade II* Listed Building). Stories of smuggling don't seem to be attached to Beaumont Quay, probably because it was purpose built to export produce from agricultural activities on the Beaumont Hall estate. Goods would have been taken by boat from the quay and along Landermere Creek, out to Hamford Water then southwards along the coast to London. There is also a medieval saltern recorded at Beaumont Quay, which would have been a common sight along the marshy coastal fringes of Landermere Creek, representing the continued growth of salt making in this area since the Iron Age.
- 141. Of the 55 records relating to medieval evidence within the study area 39 of those relate to findspots of items such as coins, horse tack, personal adornment, ampullae (flasks) and tokens. There are notable concentrations between Great Bromley and Little Bromley and at Beaumont-cum-Moze.

5.4.9 Post Medieval

- 142. Coastal trade continued to grow in importance during the Post Medieval period. The port at Manningtree 2km north of the study area thrived throughout the period largely due to its role in the shipping and transport of the area's agricultural produce and its growing role in the malting industry. Previously, the brewing of ale and beer had been predominantly on a small, domestic scale. The post medieval and modern periods saw the gradual growth of the brewing industry on an industrial scale which generated a thriving malting industry in this part of the county. Brightlingsea continued in existence as a trading port and smaller wharves existed at Beaumont-cum-Moze (Beaumont Quay), St Osyth, Manningtree and elsewhere along the coast.
- 143. Despite being a small scale quay, the extant structures at Beaumont Quay (9121) are a rare and interesting example of a 19th century quay which is scheduled (NHLE List Entry 1020688), as both the quay and lime kiln are rare examples of an East Anglian form, that survive in very good condition. The kiln is the only mixed feed (fuel/coal is mixed and burned together with the limestone charge) example surviving in this area. It represents a rare survival of a complex of contemporary features which has been largely unaltered since it was abandoned in the early 20th century. The lime kiln as well as the store building survive relatively intact. Archaeological deposits sealed below ground in the quayside area, and in and around Beaumont Cut generally, contain structural, artefactual and environmental evidence relating to the operations of the quay and the contemporary appearance of its surroundings. The remains of a sailing



- barge have been preserved in the alluvial deposits. Beaumont Cut is a channel cut into the marshy estuary to make a reliable navigable route along the tidal Landermere Creek.
- 144. A similar arrangement can be seen at Landermere Wharf (also known as Landermere Quay) further east, approximately 400m outside the study area, just east of Beaumont Quay. The wharf here also included a limekiln, as well as a malthouse, pub and fishermen's cottages (Gull Cottages).
- 145. Two Post Medieval windmills are recorded within the study area representing characteristic features of the Essex landscape during this period, continuing on from the medieval period. Great Holland Hill mill (2853) is a former smock mill, the base of which is still extant. The remaining record marks the possible location of a mill which are no longer standing (3036).
- 146. Record 3142 related to a former Church. The HER record is sparse, but map regression shows the site was formerly a church and has now been converted internally into a house and re-named Green Acre.
- 147. As with the medieval period many of HER entries for the Post Medieval period are for findspots recorded under the Portable Antiquities Scheme and comprise items such as bodkins, buckles, buttons, coins, various items of personal adornment and pottery. Of the 56 Post Medieval HER records 27 are of finds.

5.4.10 Modern

- During the modern period malting continued to grow in importance in the wider area. Mistley, approximately 3km north of the study area, developed a thriving malting industry in the 19th century supplying malt to large scale brewing companies with much going to the London market. By the end of the century and aided by effective rail and sea transport, Mistley had become a major centre of the industry. Eight brick-built malthouses incorporating a number of technological innovations pioneered by Robert Free were erected which dominated the town. The surviving maltings at Mistley, along with associated features such as the railway station, dock facilities, office block, workers housing and school form a group of national importance and have been the subject of extensive study. Mistley is also designated as part of the Manningtree and Mistley Conservation Area. Another important and earlier malting (1874-1882) built by Robert Free can be found at Thorpe-le-Soken, at the southern reach of the study area and a smaller rural malting and survives as part of a farm complex at Little Bentley. Agriculture in the wider area during this period would have supported and supplied this industry, yet there are no specific HER records relating to maltings within the study area.
- 149. During the modern period the aggregates industry has grown exponentially in this area and has resulted in significant areas of mineral extraction across the Tendring peninsula since the Second World War (WWII). The nearest occurrences of extraction near the study area is at Ardleigh. Archaeological investigations prior to work beginning on these sites has revealed much about the influence and activities of humans on the Tendring landscape.



- 150. Coastal defences continued to be variously built and decommissioned within the study area during the modern period with the advents of the First and Second World Wars (WWI and WWII).
- 151. An advanced night landing ground (19342) is recorded to the south of Beaumont-cum-Moze. The 43 acre site served the 39 Squadron Royal Flying Corps who were operating anti-Zeppelin patrols from April 1916 as part of WWI air defences. By August 1916 the site had been returned to agricultural use. No buildings were erected on this site. In view of the short duration of this landing ground's use, it is very unlikely that any evidence of the airfield survives on or below ground. The site remains in agricultural use and the original field boundaries defining the landing ground survive. Generally, these sites were intentionally hidden during the night to avoid being bombed by German aircraft. They would only be lit and ready for British aircraft to land when sufficient signal had been reached between operatives on the ground and in the aircraft.
- 152. Further south in the study area at Great Holland another WWI structure is recorded. A WWI pillbox (47909) was marked on the 3rd and 4th edition OS maps but has since been destroyed.
- 153. A pair of cast iron signposts (40797 (outside the study area) and 40801) are recorded on the HER, they both sit along the B1035 road on the entry to Beaumont; one at the junction with Swan Lane and the other opposite Chapel Lane. They date to the 1920s or 1930s and were manufactured by Maldon Iron Works. They consist of a flat semicircular parish plate finial reading "Parish of Beaumont E.C.C", along with distances to the nearest towns etc.
- 154. During this period, following WWI the British Government escalated social support efforts, this is evident in the study area by records relating to scattered homes and social housing built by the Land Settlement Association.
- 155. Two records relate to scattered homes, The Firs (15399) and The Limes (15400) at Tendring Heath. They were part of the Tendring Union Workhouse during the early 20th century (15385) and were used to house groups of children from the workhouse. Scattered homes were used across the UK during this period as a way of integrating children into local schools rather than isolating them within the workhouse system. They were administered centrally by the workhouse unions. The Firs is now a private home, and The Limes is a nursing home.
- 156. Outside the study area during the interwar period the Land Settlement Association built houses and associated small holdings at 61-66 Tile Barn Lane (40584) and 69-90 Hungerdown Lane (40585) in Lawford, which reflects the continued effort of the national and local government to provide social support in this area.
- 157. With the advent of WWII, the British Government sought to strengthen home defences as part of wider efforts, pillboxes were built as small, fortified structures to be operated by the Home Guard. As such there is one WWII pillbox (21350) recorded at The Green, Great Holland. But has since been destroyed. There is no sign of a pillbox now but it probably stood on the southern tip of the triangle of The Green from where it would have been able to cover an approach along any of the three arms of the junction.



5.4.11 Undated

- 158. The HER records a series of undated cropmarks and findspots within the study area. They are evenly distributed along the onshore cable corridors, evidently in areas that have not been developed and tend to be mainly agricultural. The information presented below is a summary of information held by the HER and NMP.
- 159. In total, 85 assets of unknown date are recorded within the study area, with the majority being documented as cropmarks. Of the 85 records, 70 represent undated cropmarks which are interspersed throughout the onshore cable corridors, have corresponding NMP data, and generally consist of linear features, ditches, field boundaries, enclosures, and ring ditches. Examples include a large cropmark area to the south and west of Little Bromley Hall (2460) that lies directly along the northern end of the onshore cable corridors, near to the onshore substation zone. The cropmarks consist of mainly linear features being part of field systems or trackways, in addition to many ring ditches and several enclosures, and a henge. An application has been made to Schedule this henge due to it being of national importance.
- 160. Occupying the north-west of the onshore substation zone is another large area of cropmarks near Riddlesdale Farm (2444), comprising a complex of linear features, rectilinear enclosures and an oval enclosure, although some marks recorded may be geological.
- 161. Examples that intersect the onshore cable corridors include another large area of cropmarks (3143) near Thorpe-le-Soken, that are masked by geological features consisting of field boundaries, trackways and enclosures.
- 162. Two records on the HER are referred to as archaeological investigations (EEX 49176 and 14891) and are discussed in Section 5.5 below.
- 163. 14 records are related to findspots many of which were recorded under the Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS). Otherwise, undated findspots are concentrated in two areas: between Great Bromley and Little Bromley, and Beaumont-cum-Moze. As previously stated, this could be due to these areas being used for metal detecting (although no specific events are recorded on the HER), and the finds have been appropriately recorded through the PAS, and subsequently the HER. Whilst these assets are noted on the HER as 'a find of unknown date' when reviewing them on the PAS database online, almost half are Iron Age coin or coin hoard finds (e.g., 51851 and 51932), alongside an Iron Age brooch (51883). The others are noted as a Medieval coin (52978), several Post Medieval finds (e.g., coins 54775, pins 54767, thimbles 54699), and a Roman to Medieval copper alloy casting (56451).

5.5 Previous Archaeological Investigations

164. A number of archaeological investigations have taken place within the study area, some of which are already detailed above in the HER data; therefore, this section provides a brief summary of the nature and type of assessments/surveys undertaken which have informed the known



- archaeological record and therefore enhanced our understanding of the historic environment in this area.
- 165. A watching brief of foundation trenches for a new building to the east of Ash Cottage (located near the centre of the onshore substation zone alongside drain lines leading to it, was conducted in c.1990 by Brooks (EEX 52964), however no finds or archaeological features were found.
- 166. A programme of field observation prior to a tree planting scheme at Beaumont Hall (EEX 52357, 53003) in an area of known Roman pottery sherds revealed a scatter of pottery on the soil surface. The pottery consisted of three sherds of prehistoric pottery; Roman sandy grey ware, fine grey ware, grog-tempered ware and oxidised wares; Medieval and Post Medieval pottery.
- 167. Several field surveys have been undertaken at the remains of possible Medieval salt-workings at Beaumont Quay (HER 3097), one which provided a photograph to the HER in 1996 (EEX 52766). Another conducted by Leech in 1994 reviewed cuts in the quay to receive barges and found a square depression showing as differential vegetation growth, thought to be an area for docking barges (EEX 11151 and 14891). In addition, a field walking survey at Beaumont Quay (EEX 24062) conducted by Farrands in 1976 found late Roman to Post Medieval material, including tile and pottery finds (HER 7409, 7410, 7411 and 7412).
- 168. A field observation by Green (EEX 24067) conducted sometime in c. 1955, to the west of Bradfield Heath resulted in the discovery of a Neolithic Axe Head (HER 7413).
- 169. In the centre of the onshore substation zone, at Little Bromley, a collection of 27 fragments of burnt flint was found by F.P. Girling (EEX 8730 (and 2472 outside the study area).
- 170. Recorded as a HER asset, a desk-based assessment and aerial photography report (HER 49176) was carried out at Rose Hill Quarry, Thorpe-le-Soken (towards the southern end of the study area), which whilst the aerial photography identifies numerous linear and enclosure features, the assessment suggested there is little potential for archaeological remains.
- 171. In 2010, an archaeological evaluation was carried out at Carrington's Farm, Great Bromley by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT, 2011) ahead of mineral extraction on a 6.5ha field north of Carringtons Farm, which contained the cropmarks of a rectilinear field system and a small sub-rectangular enclosure. 50 trenches found 67 archaeological features. The majority of these (31) were of natural origin. Twenty-one features were field ditches (mostly undated) which share a southwest-northeast alignment with the present-day field boundaries and are probably part of the same field system (also undated but presumed to be Post Medieval). The small cropmark enclosure may be of prehistoric date. Together with three prehistoric pits, these demonstrated thinly spread prehistoric activity. There were also a few undated ditches on an east-west alignment.
- 172. Archaeological monitoring and excavation were carried out by Colchester Archaeological Trust during the EDF Energy Networks cable route at Little Clacton in 2009 (CAT, 2009). An 11 km-long cable was laid by the contractor



from Sackett's Grove Caravan Park (Clacton-on-Sea) to Cook's Green (Little Clacton). For most of this route, the cable was laid along existing roads or in existing ducts. Where the cable crossed open fields, i.e., for 1.7km of the route, the stripping of the easement was monitored by the Colchester Archaeological Trust. Where monitoring revealed archaeological features, these were excavated and recorded. Evidence for prehistoric occupation consisted of an Iron Age ditch, and a residual Iron Age loom weight fragment. There were no Romano-British finds. The most important archaeological feature was the site of a small, Medieval rectangular structure with a burnt patch which was either a hearth or the base of an oven. It is not clear whether the structure was domestic or agricultural in function, or whether it was permanently or only occasionally occupied. An adjacent, right-angled gully appeared to be part of a similar Medieval structure. Two ditches forming part of an adjacent cropmark site were excavated where they crossed the easement. One was undatable, but the other was probably of Post Medieval date and had been infilled within living memory.

5.6 Historic Landscape Characterisation

- 173. The Historic Landscape Character (HLC) data held by the HER has been obtained and included within the North Falls GIS project database, see Figure 5, which displays the broad HLC groups which the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone crosses, as described in the report: Essex Historic Landscape Characterisation Project (HLC) (Essex County Council and Historic England, 2011).
- 174. The report provides a summary/profile of Tendring District in both the overview report and Volume 3. It states that the core of the area comprises a plateau of London Clay, with bands of Kesgrave sands and gravels, marking the former line of the River Thames. The fieldscape is characterised by a mix of later enclosure and pre-18th century irregular fields, probably of medieval origin. The area also comprises long thin roadside greens and triangular greens at road junctions. Historically the settlement character is very dispersed and rural.
- 175. Within Tendring at the northern and eastern flank of Colchester were extensive heaths. These were enclosed in the early 19th century. Ardleigh Reservoir (approximately 3.2km west of the study area) now forms a major landscape feature within the area. To the south, in the Alresford area (over 5km to the south of the study area), the landscape is gently undulating. The zone is characterised by extensive areas of meadow pasture along the valleys of the three brooks which drain it and large areas of orchards. The fieldscape comprises a mix of pre-18th century irregular fields and later enclosure of common fields. There are extensive areas of mineral extraction to the south. The landscape is similar to the south-east, around St Osyth, although the fields are noticeably smaller. The valley of the Holland Brook forms a distinct landscape element, characterised by enclosed meadows along the brook and drained tidal marshes. Historically the settlement for the area is markedly dispersed.
- 176. The coastline is marked by both improved and unimproved coastal marsh. Hamford Water in particular represents a particularly complex landscape of reclaimed marsh, salt-marsh, inter-tidal muds, creeks and islands.



177. There is one Protected Lane within the study area, Church Lane, Little Bentley. The Protected Lanes were initially set out in Essex County Council Policy, but for Tendring District an assessment and update of the data was published in 2015. The lanes have been scored according to historic integrity, diversity, group association, archaeological association, archaeological potential, biodiversity and aesthetic value. The lane (tenlande11) scores relatively low on most criteria apart from integrity, which suggests limited or discrete erosion/damage to the historic fabric of the lane and/or significant hedgerow loss. The status of Protected Lanes is reflective of lanes with early origins. The greater part of the road network in the Essex countryside derives from at least as far back as the medieval period. Much of it undoubtedly existed in Saxon times and it is likely that many roads and lanes were formed long before that. These lanes are part of what was once an immense mileage of minor roads and track-ways connecting villages, hamlets and scattered farms and cottages (Essex County Council, 2015).

5.7 Tendring District Historic Environment Characterisation

- 178. This section forms a summary of the results of The Tendring District Historic Environment Characterisation Project (HEC) (Tendring District Council and Essex County Council 2008), the data from which was provided separately by Place Services (Essex County Council) on 31st January 2022. This data was produced as an aid in the interpretation of the current landscape history and evolution and forms an aid to identifying areas of the landscape which may be sensitive to change. It should be noted that due to the nature of the data, in some cases the character polygons extend beyond the parameters of the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone. As such, more localised character types summarised below may lie beyond the area assessed in this review. Where possible, this is noted in the following discussion.
- 179. Each character area (HECA) is subdivided by character zones (HECZ). The zones have been scored on a range of criteria for which separate scores are retained within the GIS metadata. The following system is based on scoring developed for the English Heritage Monuments Protection Programme (MPP); modified to consider broad zones rather than particular monuments. This method of scoring is intended as a simple means of engaging with issues of sensitivity, value and importance. It is not designed to be definitive and is likely to be subject to change as new information becomes available and understanding develops. Seven criteria have been used:
 - Diversity of historic environment assets
 - Survival
 - Documentation
 - Group Value Association
 - Potential
 - Sensitivity to change
 - Amenity Value



- 180. Each of the criteria have been scored for each of the zones with a rating of 1, 2, or 3 with 1 as the lowest and 3 as the highest. Given the size of the study area and the fact it only partially intersects most of the character zones, only an overarching summary has been reproduced here of the character areas, with any relevant reference being made to additional pertinent data within the zone summaries.
- 181. There are five main HECAs which fall within the study area (see Figure 6):
 - Great Oakley (HECA 3) extends across the centre of the study area, only the zone of Wix HECZ 3.2 intersects the study area.
 - South East Tendring Plateau and the Sokens (HECA 6) extends across the south of the study area, only The Sokens 6.3 and The Great Holland 6.4 zones intersect with the study area.
 - St Osyth and Great Bentley (HECA 11) extends into the north of the study area at the junction between the onshore cable corridor and the onshore substation location. Only the Area to the North of Little Bentley zone 11.1 intersects with the study area to the south of Little Bromley.
 - Ardleigh (HECA 12) extends into the north western reaches of the study area in the onshore substation location. Half of the Great Bromley zone 12.3 intersects the study area and only small margins at the boundaries of zones Ardleigh 12.2 and Foxash Estate 12.4 intersect with the western edge of the study area.
 - Little Bentley Area (HECA 13) extends into the study area between Little Bromley and Lawford at the north of the onshore substation location. Only the zone of Bradfield Heath 13.2 intersects the study area.
- 182. Hamford Water (HECA 4) only just intersects the boundary of the study area, therefore has not been included.

5.7.1 Great Oakley HECA3

183. The study area only intersects with zone 3.2 Wix of the wider Great Oakley character area, which extends from Beaumont Quay to Horsley Cross within the centre of the study area. As such the relevant information is summarised here for the Wix zone 3.2. The Wix zone comprises a gently undulating agricultural landscape. Drainage is into the Holland Brook to the south, Ramsey Creek to the east and a minor stream to the north. The fieldscape is largely ancient in origin, but significant areas have been affected by post-medieval enclosure and post war boundary loss. Field boundaries comprise low interstice hedgerows, with occasional mature hedgerow oaks, due to the decline of Elm during the late 20th century. There are surviving remnants of ancient woodland. particularly in the southern half of the zone. These include Stonehall, Gravel and Killgrove Woods. Settlement in the zone was historically polyfocal and dispersed, comprising settlement around linear and triangular greens like Goose Green, Bockings Green, Stones Green and Tendring Green, church/hall complexes such as Beaumont and isolated halls, farms and cottages. Many of the greens have been subsequently infilled by housing, or removed by road widening or enclosure.



- 184. Wix is the largest village in the zone and is located over 2km north of the study area, having developed from a crossing of two roads at 'Wick's Cross' close to the monastic settlement of Wix Abbey. A network of narrow lanes connects the historic settlements and tends to follow the higher ground and ridges. The modern A120 cuts across the zone on an embankment and passes through the study area at Horsley Cross.
- 185. The area is likely to contain deposits related to widespread prehistoric activity and occupation. There are a range of cropmarks across the zone.
- 186. Prehistoric ring ditches and ring ditch cemeteries are particularly characteristic of the wider zone and are most likely to represent the buried archaeological remains of individual Bronze Age round barrows and barrow cemeteries. Other cropmarks include prehistoric and later ditched enclosures, field boundaries, and double-ditched trackways, a number of medieval moated sites and a World War II anti-aircraft site adjacent to Hamford Water, illustrating the archaeological potential of the wider zone.

5.7.2 South East Tendring Plateau and the Sokens HECA 6

- 187. This character area is present within almost 1/3 of the study area at the southern extent. The study area intersects with a small proportion of the wider character area, along with the sub zones of Weeley area 6.2, The Sokens 6.3 and The Great Holland area 6.4.
- 188. This area comprises the gently undulating rural plateau in the south east of Tendring. The landscape is characterised by a dispersed historic settlement pattern, although several small villages and greens provide foci, a fieldscape of pre-19th century and later enclosure and a cluster of small ancient woodlands in the north of the area. The valley of the Holland Brook runs parallel to the south of the study area, which is located near the limits of the former tidal estuary. The valley comprises enclosed meadows and reclaimed tidal marshes and is a significant feature running through the middle of and draining the area which is likely to contain well preserved palaeoenvironmental deposits. The



- archaeological record is largely dominated by concentrations of multi-period cropmarks although WWII defensive structures are also present due to the proximity to the coast.
- 189. This area comprises the gently undulating agricultural plateau, drained by the shallow valley of the Holland Brook with tidal marshes at its mouth. The geology is London Clay overlain by patches of Brickearth and Kesgrave Sands and Gravels. The valley floor is covered by alluvium and is characterised by enclosed meadows alongside the brook, with drained linear reclamation of the tidal marshes and fields of ancient origin on the valley sides and in the southern portion of the area. To the north of the valley, the fieldscape comprises a mixture of fields of ancient origin and later enclosure which has suffered from moderate boundary loss. Settlement in the area was historically polyfocal and dispersed, comprising isolated manors and farms but with foci at Little Clacton, Great Holland, Kirby-le-Soken, Thorpe-le-Soken, Weeley and a number of linear and other greens.
- 190. In The Sokens zone 6.3 a number of groups of cropmarks have been identified. some of these represent medieval or post-medieval field boundaries, others are clearly indicative of surviving earlier archaeological features, including a possible settlement site. In Weeley zone 6.2 cropmarks largely correspond to the extent of the Kesgrave sands and gravels. A number of these represent medieval or post-medieval field boundaries, others are clearly indicative of surviving earlier archaeological features. Excavations within the area have revealed Bronze Age activity and near Weeley the Gutteridge Hall medieval moated site. The alluvium of the Holland and Weeley Brook valleys may contain palaeoenvironmental deposits. In The Great Holland zone 6.4 these cropmarks possibly represent later prehistoric or Roman activity, and ring-ditch cemeteries of possible Bronze Age date, the latter are particularly characteristic of the archaeology of the Tendring peninsula. Of the cropmarks within the study area most are recorded as undated within the HER data. There are notable concentrations of cropmarks north of Thorpe Park Lane and around the village of Great Holland. These are generally linear features such as field boundaries, enclosures and trackways, though ring ditches are recorded within the study area north of Thorpe Park Lane, in association with these undated linear features. Numerous stray finds, ranging in date from the Palaeolithic to the postmedieval period, are also recorded in zone 6.4.

5.7.3 St Osyth and Great Bentley HECA 11

The study area only intersects with zone 11.1 the Area to the North of Little 191. Bentley, which is characterised by a fieldscape of ancient origin comprising irregular enclosure, with some later enclosure of the former heathlands and greens. There has been moderate post-1950 boundary loss throughout the zone. The settlement was historically dispersed, comprising cottages and farms spread out along the greens and former heaths. Settlement foci comprises Hare Green (approximately 1.7km south of the study area), where the green has





- been infilled by housing, and Little Bentley which developed at the crossroads to the north of the historic church/hall complex located in zone 11.2.
- 192. A number of cropmark complexes attest to the archaeological potential of the zone. These include ring-ditches of probable Bronze Age date, settlement enclosures and trackways of later prehistoric or Roman date and probable medieval field boundaries. Medieval remains are likely to survive in relation to settlement clustered around greens and former heaths, and associated with the dispersed halls, farms and cottages. There is the cropmark of a possible postmill to the north of Little Bentley.

5.7.4 Ardleigh HECA 12

- 193. The study area intersects with Great Bromley 12.3. Only a small extent of the zone extends within the study area near the substation zone, as such, a relevant summary of the character area description is given.
- 194. This area comprises a high, flat area. The area is characterised by large areas of former heathland; these included Ardleigh Heath and Burnt Heath (outside the western edge of the study area) forming part of a rough semi-circle round the eastern flank of Colchester. These were enclosed by agreement in the early 19th century. Elsewhere the fieldscape is largely of ancient origin and irregular but there has been moderate loss of field boundaries since the 1950s. There were orchards in the north east of the area established in the early 20th century and an extensive area of glass houses / nurseries exists today.
- 195. Ardleigh Park (approximately 1km west of the study area) is medieval in origin. Historic settlement foci include the nucleated village of Ardleigh, but more typically heaths formed the focal points for settlements as at Ardleigh/Burnt Heath. There are also church hall complexes and a scatter of halls, farms and cottages. The Foxash estate was developed for horticultural purposes in the 20th century, originating as a Land Settlement Association smallholding



- scheme. Modern housing is largely restricted to ribbon development along the roads.
- 196. The archaeology of this wider area is dominated by cropmarks including the Scheduled cropmark complex south of Ardleigh (NHLE List Entry 1002146). This nationally important Bronze Age cemetery has also significant remains of Iron Age and Roman material known from excavations carried out between 1950 and 1980. The remains include an extensive complex of Iron Age and Roman trackways and ditched enclosures, an enclosed Middle Iron Age roundhouse, 'Belgic' burials, a ritual pit and various Roman features including pottery kilns. Other significant cropmark complexes are found at Great Bromley and further sites occur throughout the area. Both Ardleigh Reservoir and major mineral extraction works south of Ardleigh have resulted in extensive loss and truncation of the archaeological resource, but in most of the area survival has been shown to be good with high potential for deposits of both prehistoric and historic periods. The historic settlement pattern was generally dispersed and associated archaeological deposits are likely to be widespread.

5.7.5 Little Bentley Area HECA 13

- 197. The study area intersects with one zone Bradley Heath 13.2 within this character area. A small section of this large zone extends within the study area around the north of Little Bromley.
- 198. The wider area is charaterised by heathland which is likely medieval in origin. The heathland was largely enclosed by the mid-19th century as part of wider agriculture developments, the current fieldscape comprises a mixture of later enclosure by agreement and irregular fields of ancient origin. Post 1950s boundary loss has been moderate. The historic settlement in the zone was dispersed and polyfocal, with settlement around former heathland. The historic pattern survives well in the modern landscape.



199. There is a high density of cropmarks throughout the zone, suggesting the area has long been the subject of human occupation and activity. In addition to the more common cropmark typologies in Tendring, two parallel cropmarks representing roadside ditches clearly illustrate the line of a Roman road from Colchester to a purported Roman settlement at Mistley (as described in the HER data). This zone is largely under arable and clearly has significant below ground potential for multi-period archaeological deposits.

5.8 APS Assessment of Aerial Imagery

- 200. Below is a summary of the assessment undertaken by APS which identifies the extent of cropmark features identified from aerial imagery.
- 201. The object of this assessment is to provide information on the location and nature of buried and upstanding archaeological features which are visible on historic aerial photographs, modern aerial and satellite imagery and visualised ALS, which is also known as LiDAR, to assess the topographic and micro topographic features within the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone, alongside historic map regression analysis.
- 202. Aerial photographs and LiDAR survey data gathered between the 1940s and the present time show a former landscape of buried eroded funerary, settlement, access and agricultural features which are mainly visible on the lighter soils over gravel substrates.
- 203. Features dating to the prehistoric, Roman, Medieval, Post Medieval periods have been identified and mapped. Some of these features have been previously identified by the EHER and Essex NMP survey.
- 204. In some cases this assessment has augmented and added to these data from modern airborne and satellite imagery sources.
- 205. It is likely that the below-ground archaeological deposits which cause the marks in crops and grass in this area are more extensive, both horizontally and



- vertically, than shown via the aerial imagery. Absence of cropmark evidence does not necessarily indicate an absence of archaeological deposits in apparently blank areas.
- 206. The separation of dating into specific periods of prehistory and history can only be confirmed by ground-based or documentary analyses, but some dating evidence for sites within the Site has been proposed by the EHER and NMP and by observation of morphological characteristics of cropmarked sites.
- 207. From an aerial perspective, this landscape may be analysed in a 'living' manner as one which developed over time and contains many multi-period elements. These will be more deeply stratified and extensive below the ground than is apparent in the results of the survey. The remains visible as cropmarks are all likely to have been impacted by agricultural cultivation, to some degree, and retain minimal or no micro-topographic features visible on the ground surface.
- 208. The assessment leads into and has benefited from a concurrent study of historic maps, which detail the development of the landscape over the past two centuries.
- 209. The assessment has initially identified 35 areas of archaeological interest (APS Sites) within the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone which are detailed in Table 5-11 below and presented on Figures 7a-7i. The table also aligns the APS Sites with the Essex HER data where relevant.
- 210. A detailed analysis of these sites forms part of the Stage 2 assessment report provided in Annex D, and includes detailed historic map regression (APS, July 2022).

5.9 Setting Assessment Baseline

- 211. An initial heritage settings (baseline) characterisation has been undertaken with respect to identifying assets which could potentially be impacted by any proposed (predominantly above ground) infrastructure sited within the study area. The heritage settings (baseline) assessment has identified the designated heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Registered Parks and Gardens, Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) located within a 1km study area either side of the onshore cable corridor and a 5km study area on all sides around the onshore substation (Annex A).
- 212. Those assets with a setting that potentially contributes in a material way to their heritage significance include assets of a certain height or predominance within the landscape, such as churches.
- 213. Formal Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment (LVIA) processes, and associated tool kits, such as photomontages have not yet been produced. However, using Zones of Theoretical Visibility (ZTVs) key LVIA and Heritage viewpoints have been selected and agreed by relevant stakeholders. These viewpoints will take account of and specifically reflect the topography of the landscape within and through which the project infrastructure will be constructed and operated within this area.
- 214. An initial site visit was undertaken on 12th July by NFOW and Royal HaskoningDHV and attended by representatives from Essex County Council HES (Place Services), Historic England and Essex County Council's Principal Planning Officer (Cultural Heritage Site Visit Minutes, Document Reference 004452413-01). Essex County Council's HES (Place Services) Built Heritage Consultant was not able to attend due to illness. The aim of the site visit was to agree cultural heritage viewpoints of the refined onshore substation zone, including targeted assets within the ZTV to inform viewpoints for the setting assessment.
- 215. NFOW (with support from Royal HaskoningDHV Heritage Team) presented three Cultural Heritage viewpoints which have been positioned based on collaboration with NFOWs LVIA specialists LUC. During the site visit the three viewpoints were agreed and Historic England requested an additional viewpoint be added of a non-designated cropmark henge site (2460) to the southwest of The Church of St Mary, Little Bromley (Grade II*, NHLE List Entry 1337175). Historic England have made an application to Schedule the henge, which will be approved before submission of the North Falls DCO application. As such NFOW have agreed to include this viewpoint as the substation location may be visible from the henge, which is of national importance. Four cultural heritage viewpoints have been agreed for the setting assessment along with observations on potential visibility of the substation locations:
 - CH01 Jenning's Farmhouse (Grade II, NHLE List Entry 1111459): Historic England confirmed the viewpoint would be required, although acknowledged that there is existing screening forming the western boundary to the



- property. Due to access restrictions two viewpoints from publicly accessible point near the property along Ardleigh Road.
- CH02 Scheduled cropmark site south of Ardleigh (NHLE List Entry 1002146): confirmed viewpoint would be required although acknowledged that the substation would be within long-distance views from the asset with existing intervening vegetation.
- CH03 The Church of St Mary, Little Bromley (Grade II*, NHLE List Entry 1337175: confirmed viewpoint would be required although acknowledged that the substation would be within long-distance views from the asset with existing intervening vegetation and buildings.
- CH04 non-designated cropmark henge site (2460): new viewpoint agreed and the henge site will need to be assessed based on the fact that it is considered to be of schedulable quality. It was agreed that views of the substation are likely to be achievable from the assets, albeit at a distance and with some intervening vegetation.
- 216. Photography will be undertaken at the site during summer (July 2022) by NFOW LVIA specialists LUC and again in winter (date TBC) to provide an indication of vegetation and associated screening at the proposed substation locations.
- 217. Any potential impacts to heritage significance associated with a change in setting of identified heritage assets from both construction, but predominantly operational activities, will be further addressed in the PEIR and the detailed findings reported in the subsequent final ES.
- 218. As yet no walkover surveys/heritage specific site visits have been undertaken. The results of these surveys will form either an Addendum to this report or a separate accompanying report.
- 219. The key areas where setting impacts may occur are most likely to be limited to designated assets within 1-2km of proposed permanent infrastructure, namely the Scheduled cropmark sites south of Ardleigh and the Conservation Areas and Listed Buildings at Ardleigh, Lawford and Manningtree and Mistley. However, without definitive information on the exact nature and location of infrastructure at this stage it is not possible to reliably identify any areas where potential effects may occur.

6 Discussion

6.1 Summary of archaeological potential

- 220. The archaeological evidence in the onshore archaeological DBA study area reflects a human presence from the prehistoric to the present day.
- 221. Finds from the prehistoric period suggest that the study area provided an environment suitable for exploitation during the Palaeolithic and Mesolithic periods. The wider archaeological record suggests a prevalence of activities associated with subsistence, reflective of a nomadic existence of a huntergatherer lifestyle. Should further remains from this early period exist within the study area, they will most likely comprise artefactual lithic finds.



- 222. Whilst the archaeological record is limited to lithic finds for the Neolithic period within the study area, evidence in the immediate vicinity at Lawford comprises evidence for a more settled existence from this period onwards. Should further remains from this period exist within the study area, they would most likely comprise artefactual lithic finds, with a possibility of settlement evidence.
- 223. The archaeological record well attests to Bronze Age funerary activity in the wider area. Cropmark evidence of ring ditches and finds within the study area are particularly focused around the southwest and northeast of the Little Bromley area (onshore substation areas), suggesting elevated potential for previously unrecorded assets dating to the Bronze Age relating to funerary practice in particular. Otherwise there are finds at Beaumont-cum-Moze and Great Holland, which also indicate some potential for this period across the southern reaches of the study area (onshore cable corridor areas).
- 224. Evidence for Iron Age activity in the wider area is attested by dispersed domestic and agricultural settlements, field systems, cremation burials and red hills (salt production). The evidence within the study area comprises a high density of findspots to the south of Little Bromley where there is likely to be elevated potential. There are also smaller pockets of evidence nearer Lawford (onshore substation areas), Beaumont-cum-Moze, and Great Holland, which follows the trend from the Bronze Age. Evidence in the remainder of the study area is relatively limited, which does not preclude potential previously unrecorded assets dating to the Iron Age and may be more reflective of the lack of archaeological investigations.
- 225. There is substantial evidence for Romano-British activity in the study area around the north west of Little Bromley where a small settlement is likely present at the intersection of various Roman roads radiating from Colchester and out to coastal settlements/harbours. There is another notable concentration of evidence around Little Bromley and Beaumont-cum-Moze and to a lesser degree at Beaumont Quay. Romano-British activity is well attested across the wider Tendring Peninsula. Any previously unrecorded assets would likely be representative of the road network and land-use in association with settlement and subsistence.
- 226. Whilst the archaeological record is relatively sparse for the Early Medieval / Saxon period in the wider area, and similarly widely and sparely dispersed within the study area, but again, noting a slight concentration of evidence to the south of Little Bromley. The rational for the dispersed and sparse nature of evidence for this period is generally based on the assumption that settlements were reoccupied (following the Roman period) or continued to be occupied from earlier periods prior to Roman. Any previously unrecorded assets would likely be representative of land-use in association with settlement and subsistence.
- 227. Within the study area previously unrecorded assets from the Medieval period are likely to relate to settlement, subsistence and coastal trade networks. Assets relating to settlement evidence for the Medieval period would potentially be concentrated in the vicinity of existing settlements and farmstead, as such there are notable concentrations of evidence south of Little Bromley and around Beaumont-cum-Moze and Thorpe-le-Soken, with more widely dispersed finds and cropmark evidence characterising the wider area.



- 228. Within the study area previously unrecorded assets from the Post Medieval period are similarly likely to relate to settlement and subsistence and the formation of the landscape into its present state. Assets relating to settlement, commerce, agriculture and industry are likely to be present. Despite the significant growth and urbanisation of the surrounding villages and towns in this period, the study area has remained largely rural and agricultural in nature. There are notable concentrations of evidence around Little Bromley, Horsley Cross and Beaumont-cum-Moze.
- 229. Modern assets within the study area mainly relate to social housing and defensive measures during WWI and WWII. Previously unrecorded assets from the modern period would likely be similar in nature.
- 230. The study area has undergone an review and assessment as part of the aerial photographic and LiDAR data assessment undertaken by Air Photo Services Ltd. The full details of this assessment are included in Annex D of this report. The results provided suggest potential for further discovery of buried archaeological sites/features. The assessment confirmed and revealed a series of cropmark sites cross the study area. The detailed analysis (APS Stage 2 Assessment) of these features has been critical in further defining areas of elevated archaeological potential and sensitivity.

7 Recommendations for further assessment

7.1 Geophysical survey

- 231. An early campaign of geophysical survey is proposed to bring forward key sensitive areas in the wider geophysical survey programme. The early campaign will focus on critical locations first. Under this approach, we envisage identifying key areas of archaeological sensitivity and project infrastructure (i.e., horizontal direction drilling (HDD) areas, pinch points, construction compounds and onshore substation) which will be surveyed in advance of the wider onshore project area (i.e., cable corridors). Following on from this the aim is to achieve as much coverage as possible of the onshore project area but accepting that full coverage is unlikely to be achievable due to access, land use and other constraints.
- 232. Generally magnetometer survey would be the anticipated approach to survey, but through early consultation with the Expert Topic Group, Historic England raised that the methodology and approach to geophysical survey would need to take into account the suitability of magnetometer survey across the entire onshore project area. If the onshore project area crosses areas of deep alluvial deposits then other survey techniques should be considered to account for this.
- 233. The aim for all geophysical surveys is to identify, record and characterise any surviving sub-surface archaeological remains that would enhance current understanding of the archaeological resource within the onshore project area. The potential for buried remains to be present is considered to be high.
- 234. The programme of (pre-application) geophysical survey will be discussed and agreed in consultation with Tendring District Council, Essex County Council and



- Historic England, at an early stage. The aerial photographic and LiDAR assessment revealed high potential for buried archaeological features or assets in the onshore substation zone. Any such features would expect to be revealed upon the stripping of topsoil and subsoil unless they have been eroded by ploughing and intensive arable regimes.
- 235. A Written Scheme of Investigation for initial Priority/Phase 1 Geophysical Survey has been presented to the Expert Topic Group for approval in August 2022.
- 236. Further optioneering and site selection work will enable a more targeted definition of areas where geophysical survey will be carried out. At present the location of landfall, above ground infrastructure and cable routes (within the wider cable corridors) have not been clearly defined.
- 237. The results of priority geophysical survey may also help to better define any areas where avoidance of buried archaeology may be advisable.

7.2 Walkover survey

238. A walkover survey will be necessary to ground truth identified heritage assets and potential areas of archaeological sensitivity. A walkover survey will also be carried out as part of the settings assessment, which will be included in the PEIR and ES chapters. A walkover survey will be undertaken once the onshore project area has been further defined and will form either an Addendum to this report or a separate accompanying report.

7.3 Trial trenching

239. Areas of targeted trial trenching will be discussed and agreed in consultation with Essex County Council, Tendring District Council and Historic England once a programme of priority geophysical survey has been undertaken. The results of the priority geophysical survey will be used to identify targeted areas for further assessment by means of archaeological evaluation.

7.4 Geoarchaeological assessment

- 240. A Geoarchaeological DBA has been carried out by NFOW specialist geoarchaeological contractor Wessex Archaeology to gain a better understanding of areas where further assessment would be required (Wessex Archaeology 2022). There is known potential for paleoenvironmental evidence within the former extent of the Gunfleet estuary and its environs outside the southern region of the study area. The Tendring and Holland Brooks both variously cross the study area and have been highlighted as areas of moderate potential for palaeolithic finds and paleoenvironmental deposits within alluvial deposits in the brooks and their wider valleys.
- 241. It is anticipated that early ground/site investigation works will also be able to support this process and identify key areas of paleoenvironmental potential. Wessex Archaeology have recommended that if the cable route extends into the environs of the Gunfleet Estuary, where necessary and possible, geophysical survey would ideally include electromagnetic (EM) survey in the



former channel. Wessex Archaeology also have made recommendations for further potential baseline surveys (in the form of test pitting and boreholes) based on the Tendring District Council's Geodiversity Character Zones. Following the results of the Geoarchaeological DBA, further consultation and discussion with Essex County Council, Tendring District Council and Historic England will be undertaken to define the scope of further assessment and investigation.

8 Potential Project Impacts

- 242. A fuller impact assessment will be provided in the PEIR and subsequent ES Chapters, however initial assessment of potential impacts is presented below, to form a preliminary indication to inform and guide the impact assessment.
- 243. Any development of infrastructure within the onshore cable corridors and onshore substation zone has the potential to impact upon the historic environment in a number of ways, either directly (physical) or indirectly (non-physical). Some of these impacts could be temporary, such as those during construction, or be more permanent, lasting for the lifespan of the project. Direct (physical) impacts could occur where heritage assets are partially or completely damaged or removed by construction works, whilst indirect (non-physical) impacts would relate to any changes in setting that occur to heritage assets due to the introduction of infrastructure into the landscape, and particularly in respect to above ground structures, such as the onshore substation.

8.1 Potential impacts during construction

- 244. Construction activities which could affect the onshore archaeology and cultural heritage resource are: any intrusive groundworks, including directional drilling, piling (if required), and open cut trench excavation; construction of any temporary work areas or permanent above ground infrastructure; general construction activities such as plant movement or increased traffic movements due to construction.
- 245. The potential impacts during construction that will be assessed are:
 - Direct, physical impacts to designated heritage assets;
 - Direct, physical impacts to non-designated heritage assets;
 - Indirect, physical impacts to designated heritage assets;
 - Indirect, physical impacts to non-designated heritage assets;
 - Temporary change to the setting of designated heritage assets, which could affect their heritage significance (during construction); and
 - Temporary change to the setting of non-designated heritage assets, which could affect their heritage significance (during construction).



8.2 Potential impacts during operation

- 246. As the majority of the project infrastructure is buried sub-surface (i.e. infrastructure associated with the buried cable systems and installation of foundations), this element of the operational project will have limited potential to further impact the archaeology and cultural heritage resource.
- 247. Activity which could have an ongoing impact to the onshore archaeology and cultural heritage resource will be the presence of the onshore substation and the potential visibility of the offshore infrastructure from coastal heritage assets. Any permanent above ground infrastructure has the potential to result in a change to the setting of heritage assets, which could affect heritage significance.
- 248. The main potential impacts during operation are:
 - Permanent change to the setting of designated heritage assets, which could affect their heritage significance; and
 - Permanent change to the setting of non-designated heritage assets, which could affect their heritage significance.
- 249. There would also be potential for impacts to the setting of heritage assets from the presence of the installed infrastructure and ongoing maintenance activities.

Figure 1 DBA Study Areas






Figure 2 Tendring Geodiversity Characterisation













Figure 3 Location of Designated Heritage Assets within the Study Area
































Figure 4 Location of Non-Designated Heritage Assets within the Study Area

























Figure 5 Historic Landscape Characterisation






Figure 6 Tendring Historic Environment Characterisation
