Thank you. My name is David Cliff. I've been appointed by the Secretary of State as the lead member of this panel to examine the application. I'm now going to ask my colleague and fellow panel member to introduce himself.

I also want to introduce our Planning Inspectorate colleagues who are working with us on this examination, some of which you'll have spoken to already.

The local authorities will be submitting local impact reports at the relevant deadline as well, which will be confirmed next week in our procedural Rule eight letter as well as written representations. In that case, I can move on to Mallard Pass Action Group represented by Mrs. Holloway.

Good morning. I'm speaking today. I'll sit back a bit. I'm speaking today on behalf of my pass action group, in my capacity as chairperson, not as myself, which I'll be doing later tonight. The Action Group was formed in December 2021 after residents across all the local villages realise the sheer enormity and complexity surrounding this national infrastructure development.

They decided they needed to form some kind of group to represent their views and become better informed. For the record, the group is not against solar. We just believe it's better placed on rooftops and brownfield land. And there are other renewable technologies that are far more efficient with less impacts that would better deliver the energy need. We will be articulating our detailed arguments about all the key issues within our written representation due in four weeks time.

However, today we want to focus specifically on the subject of community. And the importance of it when considering the benefits of the scheme versus the harm and many impacts.

We feel that often the community impacts can be overlooked whilst the more technical arguments are being explored.

Scale of the solar farm at 852 hectares. Or put into layman's terms at 2105 acres is huge and unprecedented. There is no large scale ground mounted solar farm in the UK that has been installed to compare to this shot with Solar Park in Flintshire at 72MW compared to Mallard passes projected 350MW is a fraction of the output and size.

It's located next to a paper mill in an industrial setting and is supplying energy to that paper mill. My life pass is surrounded by eight villages and in close proximity to over 20 villages in the rural environment. All the energy supplied will go into the national grid with no direct or meaningful benefit for the local community.

So given the unprecedented scale of this development, it's understandable why there's so much community opposition to it. Despite residents being worn down bamboozled by the long and complex process, their feelings are stronger than ever. There have been three key touch points for the public over the course of the 18 months. But stage one consultation, there was hardly any time for residents to draw breath and realise what had hit them.

But the initial reaction generated 978 responses at stage two statutory consultation six months later. There were 1097 responses on the increase. Unfortunately for both these consultations, Malpass never calculated the percentage breakdowns of, for and against the development. From the email feedback they received, they just provided stats from the questionnaire that residents filled in.

So round one, another five months the public entered into the unknown domain of the CIP process and registered as interested parties. Despite having to learn the language of CIP and infrastructure planning, the level of feedback increased yet again to over 1206 registrations from the public and stakeholder groups excluding Consultees. Of course, we've been through every relevant representation and found that 95.7% are opposed to this development.

So I think it's fair to say the public opposition to this development is overwhelming. In the same way, a 2105 acre solar farm is also overwhelming the impacts of a more typical sub 50 megawatt scheme compared to this 350 megawatt scheme cannot be compared as directly proportional. The impacts on the community are that much greater where rural populations exist.

Malpass perceives the community to be the villages directly adjacent to the site, which we agree is a starting point. They have a population of approximately 4000, which loosely equates to 1600

households. Remembering that over 1200 people registered as interested parties think it's safe to assume that the level of response was not just consigned to adjacent villages, but stretched out across other rural areas that share the same issues and concerns and will also experience the many impacts.

Had the consultation been targeted at a wider rural envelope, there would have been an even higher level of opposition. It's forecast that up to two thirds of the 13,000 leaflet distribution went to the market town of Stamford. To individuals that don't necessarily share the same values, way of life and recreational habits and therefore are less likely to be affected. So bringing this back to the point about community.

It's not just a group of people from a similar location. It's a social group whose members have something in common and share similar values. So I want to explain a bit more about those values and the relevance to Mallard Pass. Just consider for a moment the choices people make when living in a city, a town or a rural environment. The values and interests can be very different, especially when it comes to a way of life.

We think there's an interesting parallel with the local issue to give context. So without getting into any politics, a local town has recently fought hard to save an important facility, the local swimming pool and sports centre. There is huge opposition, not just from the local community but also from others coming from outside the area. Using this important facility, whether for health, recreation or competition needs. No one can argue losing this facility would be detrimental to many people.

In the same way, it needs to be understood how carpeting the rural landscape with 530,000 solar panels will change the environment, the landscape, the everyday amenity and wellbeing of the local people living in and around it, and also those coming from the outside the area to enjoy and experience it.

The community's feedback is clear and unwavering. They not only care deeply about the countryside, the environment or way of life, but are deeply concerned about the many principal issues already identified by yourselves, the examiner, and to be assessed in detail by ourselves in our written representation. They're not confident that the extensive mitigation, by virtue of its meaning, addresses their real concerns and issues and don't believe a development of this scale and nature is appropriate in this greenfield environment and amongst rural communities.

A development of this nature risks destabilising what is a thriving cluster of interconnected communities, ultimately leading to the isolation and confinement of those left living in and around this industrial landscape. We hope and ask that along with the many issues that will be reviewed, the Examiner will carefully consider the level of public opposition clearly apparent from all the feedback over the last 18 months.

Thank you, Mrs. Holloway. That's very clear. And thank you for keeping within the time limit as well. That was very clear. I've got I've got no questions for you at this time. Obviously, we'll look forward to your written submission at deadline two, which will be very helpful to us, and I'm sure as well that you'll be joining or your representatives will be joining various issues, specific hearings as they arise today. Thank you for that submission.

Councils. Yeah. The parish councils have asked me to to read out a statement on their behalf. Okay.

So I'm parish clerk for Ryle and Bell, Messer and Calvi Parish Councils. Three villages directly affected by the Malad Pass solar electricity plant proposal. I speak on behalf of the parish councils as well as personally as a resident living within the proposed development area.

Firstly, I repeat the assertions previously made that the applicants have failed to comply with the nonstatutory and statutory public consultations. The consultation leaflets and publicity material in both cases was obscure. In particular, the plans in the consultation leaflets were very small and showed the solar plant and surrounding settlement in a very grey, pale grey. Making identification of the location and the extent of the development very difficult and impossible for anyone unexperienced in reading maps and determining to work out what was what what was being proposed in the statutory consultation leaflet maps.

The settlements of Ryle and Bell Muscle and Stamford were blanked out by illustrations. Consequently, we feel the public in the area is largely unaware where the development would be or its extent.

However, at no time did the developer provide illustrations of what the proposed development would look like, with not one single photo or illustration of a solar panel on view at the public consultation events. Given that the proposed panels would be 3.2m high, significantly taller than the vast majority of solar panel arrays installed in the UK to date, this is a very serious and misleading omission by the developers,

as the inspector would be able to see from the consultation. Pictorial false information was included. For example, large areas of land shown as green mitigated land would, which is either already land in high habitat value or in farmland where the use will not change. The the impression given was one of large areas of new green space with a diverse flora, whereas the reality is very different.

This lack of clarity in inaccuracies of much of the consultation material means that the consultation has been ineffective in informing the public to the extent scale, location and character of the proposed development to extent that they have been misleading. Consequently, the public and the Royal Burmeister and Colby Parish councils have largely been excluded from the application process to date. We understand that the process is legally bound structure, but many residents in our village feel are too overwhelmed by the confused pictures painted by the applicant's consultation and the National Infrastructure Project procedure to attempt to have their voices heard from parish council public meetings and communications.

We can say that the majority are against the project for many reasons and the number of the registered interested parties does not begin to reflect the true feeling in the area.

The inspector will be aware that we have only just had council elections and it is only this week that the parish councils are reforming. In view of the complexity and scale of the proposed development, it is essential that the parish councils and the public are given adequate time to prepare their representations. As I know it was discussed yesterday at the preliminary meeting about date dates being extended.

Other matters from a parish council and myself point of view. We've we've been speaking to our residents and

I'd just like to just quote some of the things that have been mentioned to us. I personally asked regarding cabling and and the huge impact this would have on verges and fields and roadsides at the consultations. I personally have two miles of privately owned water pipe that feeds rural heath, which am extremely concerned about. The sheer size and block nature of this site has a detrimental impact on the visual and visual landscape.

Much of this land is undulating countryside and surrounds an SSI site and protected verges. The rolling nature of various areas of this proposed proposal makes the panels even more prominent in the wider landscape.

Some of the some comments the parish council have encountered from residents have been with regard to the screening and the mitigation and I quote, They say that the screening will be planted, but it will be 30 years before these panels will be any way obscured and will be long dead. The rest of my life will be blighted by this and an amenity I've used all my life will be lost to me. County residents have no shop, pub or any facility.

The only amenity that residents have for their leisure, health and wellbeing is footpaths and lanes to walk in.

The collective impact in this area with the solar factory application along with other how large housing development proposals and gravel extraction applications on the horizon are having an enormous impact visually as well as loss of large swathes of prime agricultural land, resulting in significant food loss at a time when, as a country we are importing products that should be grown locally.

And another person was questioning the data which. A questionable data such as total productivity of this site and it will produce. He said. How, as an individual, could I possibly question the figures that are being branded without employing experts to question it? And so the feeling was overwhelming by many of our parishioners.

Thank you for that submission. Just one question for you and you refer early on about plans. Think during the consultation stage, which were not very clear. What could be clearer than obviously make that clear either directly to the applicant or in written representations? You noted it now appears in written representations to us because obviously we want to ensure that everybody understands the plans properly.

And again, you have ten minutes and we'll give you a sort of one minute reminder of your. If you're if you're at nine minutes and getting close.

It is now. Okay. Thank you. Speak obviously as chair of Rutland, but also on behalf of Lincolnshire, which does not have an active branch at the moment, but has membership and also for CPR nationally. My observations today draw upon the countryside. Charity's recent submission to the Government's Environmental Audit Committee, which considered evidence on the future contribution of solar energy to the UK's transition to net zero. Also the findings of a new 2023 Rutland Renewable Energy study published only two weeks ago, which researched the future energy requirements of the Rutland community with particular regard for the potential contribution of solar and onshore wind.

Rutland is of the view that well executed solar energy projects of appropriate scale and location utilizing the latest in panel design and construct have a significant role to play in the nation's future energy provision. Local community support for any project and the use of rooftops and brownfield sites rather than agricultural land will be key components of the rapid adoption of the technology. There appear to be no consistency in government policy on this matter. Local agriculture based communities are said to be destroyed by such projects as the solar farm, which will severely impact Lincolnshire and Rutland.

Regrettably, regrettably, current planning, policy and practice is endangering swathes of valuable agricultural land at a time when severe economic hardship and the war in Europe highlight the value of home grown food. CBRE believes that solar should be on roofs and brownfield sites. It is in government's hands to ensure this. The Ministry of Defence alone has many brownfield sites lying unused which would lend themselves to energy production. Why support the loss of farms and green space at such a critical time for the food supply chain? The position defies logic.

Will undoubtedly have political consequences for rural MPs. The Inspectorate's report is the opportunity, in our opinion, to set an example and recommend stopping the loss of productive land and highlight the need to relocate such large scale projects to a brownfield site. Such sites include a significant number of former bases airbases dotted around the region and the country.

Most of the current applications for large forms, including this one, appear to be driven by financial opportunity rather than being part of an integrated strategy of energy supply. Foreign investment seems to be a significant force in the market, with little evidence of long term commitment to the UK. The community benefit offered to supporting communities touted by some of these investors does not stand up to scrutiny and is frequently not transparent. There is therefore considerable public disquiet with such large scale applications as not being considered today.

With regard to the application. Today the inspector is invited to note the following facts Alternatives are available. The success of offshore wind to date, supported by the current growth rate in rooftop solar, means that the UK is projected to be self-sufficient and actually able to export energy by the year 2030. This alone challenges the need to cover farmland and greenfield sites with huge solar installations. Rutland currently has solar farm applications under consideration, which cover over 2% of its countryside.

This compares with the national position of 0.1%. This is clearly unjust and disproportionate from a Rutland perspective.

00:35:31:13 - 00:35:43:09

Planning policy in Rutland offers the opportunity to meet the companies and it needs almost entirely with a small number of turbines on the Rutland Plateau to the north of the county with minimal footprint on green space.

00:35:45:15 - 00:36:17:04

This study argues that many nuclear reactor such as that developed by Rolls-Royce, located on a disused military site, would be more than enough to meet the region's future energy requirements. Importantly, that to be considered by the Inspectorate, along with the May 2003 Rutland Landscape Character Analysis by David TILDESLEY Associates.
