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
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
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JBM Solar to present project of over 50 MW in County Durham

UK solar developer JBM Solar announced on Thursday that it is launching stakeholder engagement on a new 50-MW-plus solar-andstorage project located between Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees in County Durham, England.

The Byers Gill Solar project, as it is named, is expected to generate enough power to meet the electricity demand of more than 70,000 UK households. It is classified as a Nationally

Significant Infrastructure Project because of its size.

Later this month, the developer intends to hold early engagement with selected stakeholders, while a wider consultation with the public is planned for next spring.

"Engaging with selected stakeholders at this early stage is vital, and will allow us to use their local knowledge to help shape the project's design at an early stage and understand local issues that are important to local communities before we present our plans to the wider community next year," project manager Michael Baker stated.

The company anticipates filing an application for planning permission in the autumn of 2023. A final decision would then be expected in early 2025.

JBM Solar noted that during the 40-year lifespan of the project, the land will still be used for agricultural needs such as grazing.

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

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Following the launch of the Byers Gill Solar and Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) proposal in October 2022, JBM Solar has now undertaken a series of workshops with stakeholders from local organisations on its early proposals.

The Byers Gill Solar Farm and BESS proposal is located hetween Darlington and Stockton on Tees. The solar farm would provide clean energy to the equivalent of over 70,000 UK homes, helping to tackle the cost of energy and climate crises we face in the UK.

The proposals would connect into the existing National Grid substation at Norton, on the outskirts of Stockton on Tees, with underground cables running from the solar farm to the substation. The project will have a lifespan of 40 years, after which the land will be returned to its former state. During its operation, the land can still be used for agricultural activities such as grazing.

The workshops provided representatives with the opportunity to scrutinise the plans; provide local knowledge of the area; input into aspects of the design, such as improvements to Public Rights of Way; ideas to reduce potential visual and landscape impacts of the project, and potential routes for construction access. JBM Solar and stakeholders also explored how we can provide henefits to the local community and environment.

Wider consultation with the public, where more detailed information will be shown, is planned for Spring 2023.

Michael Baker, Project Manager for JBM said: "We would like to thank all stakeholders who took time to attend our workshops and provide us with feedback on the project at this early stage. 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



Subject: Invitation to collaborative design workshop for Byers Gill Solar

JBM Solar is developing proposals for a new solar farm north east of Darlington, known as Byers Gill Solar.

Byers Gill Solar would be located on land between Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees. The electricity generated from the project would then connect to the National Grid's Norton Substation, to the northwest of Stockton-on-Tees.

The Government's recent Energy Security Strategy calls for a target of up to 70 gigawatts (GW) of solar electricity generation by 2035. This is an ambitious national challenge, and meeting the Government's target for affordable, home-grown renewable electricity will require projects like Byers Gill Solar to be delivered around the country.

Plans for Byers Gill Solar are still at a formative stage. We have carried out surveys to inform the assessment and design of the scheme to date, which has also been defined by agreements with landowners.

We have carried out initial studies and assessments to identify areas of land that would potentially be suitable for a proposed solar energy farm and cable route corridor connecting to the National Grid's Norton substation.

Byers Gill Solar is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). This is because it would generate more than 50MW of renewable energy. We therefore need to submit a Development Consent Order (DCO) application to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS).

We will therefore be undertaking consultation that meets the standards of relevant legislation (the Planning Act 2008). We expect to hold our statutory consultation in spring 2023, which will be open to the wider public. This will take place before we submit our DCO application.

As part of our early engagement on the project, we are inviting representatives of groups with an interest in the area to attend one of a series of workshops in the local area during November.

We are doing this to can explain more about our proposals and understand key local issues and constraints. These workshops will help shape the project at this early stage and allow local elected representatives and community groups, as well as independent technical experts, to discuss in detail a number of key topics and aspects of our plans.

Plans for Byers Gill Solar are still at a formative stage. We have carried out surveys to inform the assessment and design of the scheme to date, which has also been defined by agreements with landowners.

We have carried out initial studies and assessments to identify areas of land that would potentially be suitable for a proposed solar energy farm and cable route corridor connecting to the National Grid's Norton substation.

Byers Gill Solar is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). This is because it would generate more than 50MW of renewable energy. We therefore need to submit a Development Consent Order (DCO) application to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS).

We will therefore be undertaking consultation that meets the standards of relevant legislation (the Planning Act 2008). We expect to hold our statutory consultation in spring 2023, which will be open to the wider public. This will take place before we submit our DCO application.

As part of our early engagement on the project, we are inviting representatives of groups with an interest in the area to attend one of a series of workshops in the local area during November.

The Proposed Development would comprise:

- up to 21km of 33kilovolt (kV) underground cabling between the Panel Areas and the on-site substation;
- approximately 10km of 132kV underground cable to connect the Proposed Development to the grid connection at the existing Norton substation (located to the north-west of Stocktonon-Tees);
- supporting infrastructure comprising BESS; transformers and inverters for managing the electricity produced; storage containers to hold this equipment; and security measures such as fencing, CCTV and lighting; and
- environmental mitigation and enhancement measures to avoid or reduce adverse impacts on the surrounding environment and nearby communities.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 PURPOSE OF THE DOCUMENT

- 1.1.1 JBM Solar Limited ("we" or "the Applicant") is preparing a Development Consent Order (DCO) application under the Planning Act 2008 ("the Act") for a new solar energy and storage scheme located on land across Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees ("the Application").
- 1.1.2 This document is a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) which sets out how we intend to consult people ahead of our application for development consent for Byers Gill Solar (hereinafter referred to as the "Proposed development").
- 1.1.3 The Proposed development is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) and requires consent from the Secretary of State (SoS) for Energy Security and Net Zero (ESNZ), via a DCO. Accordingly, this SoCC has been prepared pursuant to section 47 of the Act and Regulation 12 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.
- 1.1.4 In developing this SoCC, we consulted with and had regard to comments from the following s43(1) local planning authorities:
 - Darlington Borough Council;
 - Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council; and
 - Durham County Council.
- 1.1.5 Following publication of this document, it will be circulated to neighboring authorities.

2 NATIONALLY SIGNIFICANT INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

- 2.1.1 As the Proposed Development will have a generating capacity of more than 50MW, Byers Gill Solar will be classified as an NSIP. The consenting regime for NSIPs under the Act requires the Applicant to apply for a DCO.
- 2.1.2 The Applicant intends to submit an application for a DCO under Section 37 of the Act to the Planning Inspectorate, the executive agency responsible for dealing with NSIP applications.
- 2.1.3 If accepted, the Application would be examined by the Planning Inspectorate, who would make a recommendation on the application to the SoS. The SoS makes the final decision on a DCO application. This process is explained further in Section 10 of this SoCC.

- 2.1.4 Before submitting an application, the Act requires us to carry out consultation with people living in the vicinity of the land and prescribed stakeholders.
- 2.1.5 Early involvement of communities, local authorities and other stakeholders helps to ensure we identify valuable information about the potential effects of the Proposed Development and provides an opportunity for early feedback from stakeholders to help shape the plans.
- 2.1.6 Early involvement also ensures that potential mitigation measures can be considered and, where appropriate, built into our designs before an application for development consent is submitted.
- 2.1.7 The DCO process is shown in Figure 10.1 and explained in more detail on the Planning Inspectorate's website: <u>https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/application-process/the-process/.1</u>
- 2.1.8 The Planning Inspectorate has also published a range of advice notes, which intend to inform applicants, consultees, the public and others about a range of matters in relation to the Planning Act 2008 process. This includes advice note eight, which provides more detail on the NSIP planning process. 

4 THE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

4.1 THE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

- 4.1.1 The Proposed Development is located north-east of Darlington, north of A66 and west of Stockton-on-Tees. There will be an underground cable from the solar farm to the substation. The Proposed Development will connect into National Grid Norton substation in Stockton-on-Tees.
- 4.1.2 The Proposed Development is approximately 552 ha and is made up of six sites where the solar panel and battery storage energy systems are proposed. These sites will also include other associated infrastructure, and areas for mitigation and enhancement. All of these sites are within the administrative areas of Darlington Borough Council, Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council and Durham County Council. The sites are:

Site A : Brafferton – this site includes a large area of panels to the south east of the village of Brafferton and a smaller area of panels to the north of High House Lane. Site B: Hauxley Farm – located South of lodge lane and East of Salters lane. Site C: Byers Gill Wood – this site is connected to Site B at the north and includes land to the South of Byers Gill Brook on fields surrounding Square Wood.

Site D: Great Stainton – located East of Elstob Lane and to the south of the C37 toward Bishopton.

Site E: West of Bishopton – located southwest of Bishopton, to the West of Folly Bank. Site F: North of Bishopton – bordered by Mill Lane to the South and Bishopton Beck to the North.

- 4.1.3 Byers Gill Solar would make a meaningful contribution to the local, and national, climate commitments. It would generate up to 180MW of renewable energy and connect to the Norton substation, located approximately 3.5km east of Site F: North of Bishopton. It is anticipated that 12km of underground 132kV cabling would be required to connect the Proposed Development to the Norton substation. As it stands, there are two proposed cable route options for the 132kV cable. These cable route options are currently being surveyed and we are seeking your feedback on these options; the preferred cable route will be confirmed following the statutory consultation.
- 4.1.4 Maps of the 5 site areas are contained Appendix 1.

4.2 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

- 4.2.1 The Proposed Development is an 'environmental impact assessment (EIA) development' under the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.
- 4.2.2 The Application will therefore require an Environmental Impact Assessment ('EIA') to be carried out to ensure the likely significant effects of the Proposed Development are properly understood and that, where available, appropriate mitigation measures are identified to control or reduce environmental effects.
- 4.2.3 An EIA Scoping Opinion was issued by the Planning Inspectorate in December 2022. Together with the Applicant's Scoping Report, this identifies the environmental issues and topics that are relevant to the Proposed Development and will be assessed as part of the EIA. The Scoping Opinion is available to view on the Planning Inspectorate website at: EN010139-000021-EN010139 - Scoping Report.pdf (planninginspectorate.gov.uk)
- 4.2.4 A Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will be produced and consulted upon as part of the statutory consultation. This will provide initial information on the potential environmental effects of the Proposed Development and any proposed mitigation to help the local community understand the environmental effects and inform responses regarding the proposals.

- 4.2.5 We will be inviting feedback and comments on the information presented in the PEIR as part of the statutory consultation. Feedback received will be considered before the DCO application and EIA are finalised for submission.
- 4.2.6 All final environmental findings will be set out in an Environmental Statement (ES), which will be submitted alongside our Application.
- 4.2.7 The statutory consultation will be carried out in compliance with the statutory requirements set out in the Act, including consultation on the PEIR.

5 STATUTORY CONSULTATION (5TH MAY 2023 – 16TH JUNE 2023)

5.1 INTRODUCTION

- 5.1.1 The statutory consultation will run for six weeks, starting on 5th May 2023 and finishing on 16th June 2023. All responses to the consultation must be received by 11:59pm on the closing date.
- 5.1.2 Held in accordance with the Act, this consultation provides an opportunity for you to have your say about our proposals for Byers Gill Solar. More details on what we will be consulting on are listed below.

5.2 WHAT ARE WE CONSULTING ON?


- 5.2.1 The aim of our pre-application consultation is to ensure that the community, landowners and other persons with an interest in the land, stakeholders and technical consultees have the opportunity to understand and influence our proposals. JBM Solar will present our proposals including how they have been informed by our environmental assessments and engagement to date.
- 5.2.2 We will be seeking feedback on all aspects of our plans for Byers Gill Solar. These will be explained in the following materials:
 - Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) the PEIR sets out the preliminary findings from the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). It also includes photomontages of the proposed solar park from various locations around the site.
 - Consultation booklet the booklet provides a more detailed overview of the proposals, including a summary of each panel area.
- 5.2.3 The full PEIR will be made available electronically on our project website, and we will publicise, as part of our statutory notices, information on how to request hard copies of the full PEIR.

5.2.4 All statutory consultation documents will be available online, on the Project website, and available in hard copy at no extra charge (except the PEIR, a hard copy of which can be requested for a charge of £0.35 per page to cover printing and posting costs).

5.3 WHO ARE WE CONSULTING?

- 5.3.1 Our consultation process is open to anyone who may be interested in our proposals for Byers Gill Solar. We welcome all views and will take them into account before we submit our DCO application.
- 5.3.2 We have identified a primary consultation zone (PCZ) by initially extending a minimum distance of two kilometres from the boundary of the Red Line Boundary (Appendix 1)– within which the solar PV panels, energy storage system, on-site substation and supporting infrastructure would be located. The PCZ also extends one kilometre from the edge of the cable route corridor for the grid connection, up to the boundary of the existing Norton substation.
- 5.3.3 The PCZ has also been amended in certain areas to consider:
 - Zone of theoretical visibility for the Proposed Development, which assesses areas in vicinity of the Red Line Boundary (Appendix 1) which could experience a degree of visual impact
 - Existing physical boundaries, such as main roads
 - Capturing entire communities, rather than excluding small numbers of properties
 - Where we propose to undertake additional works to enable construction transport, equipment areas or road modifications
- 5.3.4 The zone has also been amended where proportionate and reasonable based on existing boundaries in order to avoid inappropriate 'severance' of communities. The PCZ is shown in Figure 5.1.

5.4 CONSULTATION WITH UNDER-REPRESENTED OR SELDOM HEARD GROUPS

- 5.4.1 Our consultation has been developed to be accessible to all groups in the community, including 'under-represented' or 'seldom heard' groups and individuals who may be less likely to participate in or respond to traditional consultation techniques.
- 5.4.2 These groups and individuals that may find it harder to get involved in consultation and/or need additional support to access materials include:
 - Geographically isolated communities
 - Young people
 - Older people
 - Disabled people and those with learning disabilities
- 5.4.3 The specific methods to be used to engagement with these seldom heard groups are outlined in Section 5.8.

5.5 HOW WE WILL CONSULT

5.5.1 During this statutory consultation, we will use a range a methods to ensure an inclusive, meaningful and open consultation. We will use a range of digital and non-digital methods of communication to ensure that our consultation can be accessed by all members of the community.

- 5.5.2 Our statutory consultation is planned to take place for six weeks between 5th May 2023 and 16th June 2023 (exceeding the statutory minimum period of 28 days as required by the Act).
- 5.5.3 A proposed schedule for all engagement methods, including activities and materials, is set out in Table 5.1 below.






1.1 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT SITE LAYOUT:






1.3 SITE B: HAUXLEY FARM




1.4 SITE C: BYERS GILL WOOD




1.5 SITE D: GREAT STAINTON




1.7 SITE F: NORTH OF BISHOPTON



1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 PURPOSE OF THE DOCUMENT

- 1.1.1 JBM Solar Limited ("we" or "the Applicant") is preparing a Development Consent Order (DCO) application under the Planning Act 2008 ("the Act") for a new solar energy and storage scheme located on land across Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees ("the Application").
- 1.1.2 This document is a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) which sets out how we intend to consult people ahead of our application for development consent for Byers Gill Solar (hereinafter referred to as the "Proposed development").
- 1.1.3 The Proposed development is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) and requires consent from the Secretary of State (SoS) for Energy Security and Net Zero (ESNZ), via a DCO. Accordingly, this SoCC has been prepared pursuant to section 47 of the Act and Regulation 12 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.
- 1.1.4 In developing this SoCC, we consulted with and had regard to comments from the following s43(1) local planning authorities:
 - Darlington Borough Council;
 - Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council; and
 - Durham County Council.
- 1.1.5 Following publication of this document, it will be circulated to neighboring authorities.

2 NATIONALLY SIGNIFICANT INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

- 2.1.1 As the Proposed Development will have a generating capacity of more than 50MW, Byers Gill Solar will be classified as an NSIP. The consenting regime for NSIPs under the Act requires the Applicant to apply for a DCO.
- 2.1.2 The Applicant intends to submit an application for a DCO under Section 37 of the Act to the Planning Inspectorate, the executive agency responsible for dealing with NSIP applications.
- 2.1.3 If accepted, the Application would be examined by the Planning Inspectorate, who would make a recommendation on the application to the SoS. The SoS makes the final decision on a DCO application. This process is explained further in Section 10 of this SoCC.

- 2.1.4 Before submitting an application, the Act requires us to carry out consultation with people living in the vicinity of the land and prescribed stakeholders.
- 2.1.5 Early involvement of communities, local authorities and other stakeholders helps to ensure we identify valuable information about the potential effects of the Proposed Development and provides an opportunity for early feedback from stakeholders to help shape the plans.
- 2.1.6 Early involvement also ensures that potential mitigation measures can be considered and, where appropriate, built into our designs before an application for development consent is submitted.
- 2.1.7 The DCO process is shown in Figure 10.1 and explained in more detail on the Planning Inspectorate's website: <u>https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/application-process/the-process/.1</u>
- 2.1.8 The Planning Inspectorate has also published a range of advice notes, which intend to inform applicants, consultees, the public and others about a range of matters in relation to the Planning Act 2008 process. EIA Scoping



4 THE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

4.1 THE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

- 4.1.1 The Proposed Development is located north-east of Darlington, north of A66 and west of Stockton-on-Tees. There will be an underground cable from the solar farm to the substation. The Proposed Development will connect into National Grid Norton substation in Stockton-on-Tees.
- 4.1.2 The Proposed Development is approximately 552 ha and is made up of six sites where the solar panel and battery storage energy systems are proposed. These sites will also include other associated infrastructure, and areas for mitigation and enhancement. All of these sites are within the administrative areas of Darlington Borough Council, Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council and Durham County Council. The sites are:

Site A : Brafferton – this site includes a large area of panels to the south east of the village of Brafferton and a smaller area of panels to the north of High House Lane.

Site B: Hauxley Farm – located South of lodge lane and East of Salters lane.

Site C: Byers Gill Wood – this site is connected to Site B at the north and includes land to the South of Byers Gill Brook on fields surrounding Square Wood.

Site D: Great Stainton – located East of Elstob Lane and to the south of the road toward Bishopton.

Site E: West of Bishopton – located southwest of Bishopton, to the West of Folly Bank. Site F: North of Bishopton – bordered by Mill Lane to the South and Bishopton Beck to the North.

- 4.1.3 Byers Gill Solar would make a meaningful contribution to the local, and national, climate commitments. It would generate up to 180MW of renewable energy and connect to the Norton substation, located approximately 3.5km east of Site F: North of Bishopton. . It is anticipated that 12km of underground 132kV cabling would be required to connect the Proposed Development to the Norton substation. As it stands, there are two proposed cable route options for the 132kV cable. These cable route options are currently being surveyed and we are seeking your feedback on these options; the preferred cable route will be confirmed following the statutory consultation.
- 4.1.4 Maps of the 5 site areas are contained **Appendix 1**.

4.2 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

4.2.1 The Proposed Development is an 'environmental impact assessment (EIA) development' under the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.

- 4.2.2 The Application will therefore require an Environmental Impact Assessment ('EIA') to be carried out to ensure the likely significant effects of the Proposed Development are properly understood and that, where available, appropriate mitigation measures are identified to control or reduce environmental effects.
- 4.2.3 An EIA Scoping Opinion was issued by the Planning Inspectorate in December 2022. Together with the Applicant's Scoping Report, this identifies the environmental issues and topics that are relevant to the Proposed Development and will be assessed as part of the EIA. The Scoping Opinion is available to view on the Planning Inspectorate website at: EN010139-000021-EN010139 - Scoping Report.pdf (planninginspectorate.gov.uk)
- 4.2.4 A Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) and Non-Technical Summary (NTS) will be produced and consulted upon as part of the statutory consultation. This will provide initial information on the potential environmental effects of the Proposed Development and any proposed mitigation to help the local community understand the environmental effects and inform responses regarding the proposals.
- 4.2.5 We will be inviting feedback and comments on the information presented in the PEIR as part of the statutory consultation. Feedback received will be considered before the DCO application and EIA are finalised for submission.
- 4.2.6 All final environmental findings will be set out in an Environmental Statement (ES), which will be submitted alongside our Application.
- 4.2.7 The statutory consultation will be carried out in compliance with the statutory requirements set out in the Act, including consultation on the PEIR.

5 STATUTORY CONSULTATION (5TH MAY 2023 – 16TH JUNE 2023)

5.1 INTRODUCTION

- 5.1.1 The statutory consultation will run for six weeks, starting on 5th May 2023 and finishing on 16th June 2023. All responses to the consultation must be received by 11:59pm on the closing date
- 5.1.2 Held in accordance with the Act, this consultation provides an opportunity for you to have your say about our proposals for Byers Gill Solar. More details on what we will be consulting on are listed below

5.2 WHAT ARE WE CONSULTING ON?

- 5.2.1 The aim of our pre-application consultation is to ensure that the community, landowners and other persons with an interest in the land, stakeholders and technical consultees have the opportunity to understand and influence our proposals. JBM Solar will present our proposals including how they have been informed by our environmental assessments and engagement to date.
- 5.2.2 We will be seeking feedback on all aspects of our plans for Byers Gill Solar. These will be explained in the following materials:
 - Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) the PEIR sets out the preliminary findings from the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). It also includes photomontages of the proposed solar park from various locations around the site.
 - Non-technical Summary of the PEIR a shorter summary version of the full PEIR.
 - Consultation booklet the booklet provides a more detailed overview of the proposals, including a summary of each element of the solar park, energy storage and underground connection to Norton substation.
- 5.2.3 The full PEIR, together with the NTS, will be made available electronically on our project website, and we will publicise, as part of our statutory notices, information on how to request hard copies of the full PEIR.
- 5.2.4 All statutory consultation documents will be available online, on the Project website, and available in hard copy at no extra charge (except the PEIR, a hard copy of which can be requested for a charge of £0.35 per page to cover printing and posting costs).

5.3 WHO ARE WE CONSULTING?

- 5.3.1 Our consultation process is open to anyone who may be interested in our proposals for Byers Gill Solar. We welcome all views and will take them into account before we submit our DCO application.
- 5.3.2 We have identified a primary consultation zone (PCZ) by initially extending a minimum distance of two kilometres from the boundary of the Red Line Boundary (please see figure appendix 1)– within which the solar PV panels, energy storage system, on-site substation and supporting infrastructure would be located. The PCZ also extends one kilometre from the edge of the cable route corridor for the grid connection, up to the boundary of the existing Norton substation.
- 5.3.3 The PCZ has also been extended in certain areas to consider:

- Zone of theoretical visibility for the Proposed Development, which assesses areas in vicinity of the Red Line Boundary (Appendix 1) which could experience a degree of visual impact
- Existing physical boundaries, such as main roads
- Capturing entire communities, rather than excluding small numbers of properties
- Where we propose to undertake additional works to enable construction transport, equipment areas or road modifications




Figure 5.1: Primary Consultation Zone for Byers Gill Solar

- 5.3.4 The zone has been extended further where proportionate and reasonable based on existing boundaries in order to avoid inappropriate 'severance' of communities. The PCZ is shown in Figure 5.1.

5.4 CONSULTATION WITH UNDER-REPRESENTED OR SELDOM HEARD GROUPS

- 5.4.1 Our consultation has been developed to be accessible to all groups in the community, including 'under-represented' or 'seldom heard' groups and individuals who may be less likely to participate in or respond to traditional consultation techniques.
- 5.4.2 These groups and individuals that may find it harder to get involved in consultation and/or need additional support to access materials include:

- Geographically isolated communities
- Young people
- Older people
- Disabled people and those with learning disabilities
- 5.4.3 The specific methods to be used to engagement with these seldom heard groups are outlined in Section 5.8.

5.5 HOW WE WILL CONSULT

- 5.5.1 During this statutory consultation, we will use a range a methods to ensure an inclusive, meaningful and open consultation. We will use a range of digital and non-digital methods of communication to ensure that our consultation can be accessed by all members of the community.
- 5.5.2 Our statutory consultation is planned to take place for six weeks between 5th May 2023 and 16th June 2023 (exceeding the statutory minimum period of 28 days as required by the Act).
- 5.5.3 A proposed schedule for all engagement methods, including activities and materials, is set out in Table 5.1 below.

- 5.7.2 All relevant local and parish councillors, elected members for county, district and borough, and MPs will be contacted at the launch of the consultation and will be kept informed about the Proposed Development. They will also be encouraged to share information about the consultation with members of their constituency / local community.










1.5 SITE D: GREAT STAINTON

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 PURPOSE OF THE DOCUMENT

- 1.1.1 JBM Solar Limited ("we" or "the Applicant") is preparing a Development Consent Order (DCO) application under the Planning Act 2008 ("the Act") for a new solar energy and storage scheme located on land across Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees ("the Application").
- 1.1.2 This document is a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) which sets out how we intend to consult people ahead of our application for development consent for Byers Gill Solar (hereinafter referred to as the "Proposed development").
- 1.1.3 The Proposed development is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) and requires consent from the Secretary of State (SoS) for Energy Security and Net Zero (ESNZ), via a DCO. Accordingly, this SoCC has been prepared pursuant to section 47 of the Act and Regulation 12 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.
- 1.1.4 In developing this SoCC, we consulted with and had regard to comments from the following s43(1) local planning authorities:
 - Darlington Borough Council;
 - Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council; and
 - Durham County Council.
- 1.1.5 Following publication of this document, it will be circulated to neighboring authorities.

2 NATIONALLY SIGNIFICANT INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

- 2.1.1 As the Proposed Development will have a generating capacity of more than 50MW, Byers Gill Solar will be classified as an NSIP. The consenting regime for NSIPs under the Act requires the Applicant to apply for a DCO.
- 2.1.2 The Applicant intends to submit an application for a DCO under Section 37 of the Act to the Planning Inspectorate, the executive agency responsible for dealing with NSIP applications.
- 2.1.3 If accepted, the Application would be examined by the Planning Inspectorate, who would make a recommendation on the application to the SoS. The SoS makes the final decision on a DCO application. This process is explained further in Section 10 of this SoCC.

- 2.1.4 Before submitting an application, the Act requires us to carry out consultation with people living in the vicinity of the land and prescribed stakeholders.
- 2.1.5 Early involvement of communities, local authorities and other stakeholders helps to ensure we identify valuable information about the potential effects of the Proposed Development and provides an opportunity for early feedback from stakeholders to help shape the plans.
- 2.1.6 Early involvement also ensures that potential mitigation measures can be considered and, where appropriate, built into our designs before an application for development consent is submitted.
- 2.1.7 The DCO process is shown in Figure 10.1 and explained in more detail on the Planning Inspectorate's website: <u>https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/application-process/the-process/.</u>¹
- 2.1.8 The Planning Inspectorate has also published a range of advice notes, which intend to inform applicants, consultees, the public and others about a range of matters in relation to the Planning Act 2008 process. This includes advice note eight, which provides more detail on the NSIP planning process. EIA Scoping



In October 2022, JBM Solar submitted the Scoping Report to the Secretary of State. The Scoping Report set out the Applicant's proposals in relation to the scope and level of detail of the information to be provided in the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). The SoS adopted the Scoping Opinion on 6 December 2022 to confirm the scope of the EIA

Collaborative Design

In November 2022, JBM Solar undertook a series of workshops with stakeholders from local organisations on its early proposals. The workshops provided representatives with the opportunity to scrutinise the plans, provide local knowledge of the area, and input into aspects of the design. JBM Solar and stakeholders also explored how we can provide benefits to the local community and environment.

Continued Engagement

JBM Solar is committed to continued engagement between consultation phases. As part of our ongoing engagement, we will be meeting with local authorities, statutory consultees and local organisations to inform our proposals and how we assess them

Statutory Consultation

Before submitting a DCO application, the Act requires us to carry out consultation with people living in the vicinity of the land, prescribed stakeholders, and persons who have or may have an interest in the land affected by the Proposed Development. The Planning Inspectorate has published guidance on the process for members of the public, which can be viewed online at:

DCO Application

We will submit the final DCO application after statutory consultation. This will include a Consultation Report, which the Planning Inspectorate will use to help inform their decision as to whether to accept the Proposed Development for examination.

DCO process

The Planning Inspectorate has up to 28 days to decide whether the application meets the required standards for examination and whether our consultation has been adequate



4 THE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

4.1 THE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

- 4.1.1 The Proposed Development is located north-east of Darlington, north of A66 and west of Stockton-on-Tees. There will be an underground cable from the solar farm to the substation. The Proposed Development will connect into National Grid Norton substation in Stockton-on-Tees.
- 4.1.2 The Proposed Development is approximately 552 ha and is made up of six sites where the solar panel and battery storage energy systems are proposed. These sites will also include other associated infrastructure, and areas for mitigation and enhancement. All of these sites are within the administrative areas of Darlington Borough Council, Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council and Durham County Council. The sites are:

Site A : Brafferton – this site includes a large area of panels to the south east of the village of Brafferton and a smaller area of panels to the north of High House Lane. Site B: Hauxley Farm – located South of lodge lane and East of Salters lane. Site C: Byers Gill Wood – this site is connected to Site B at the north and includes land to the South of Byers Gill Brook on fields surrounding Square Wood.

Site D: Great Stainton – located East of Elstob Lane and to the south of the C37 toward Bishopton.

Site E: West of Bishopton – located southwest of Bishopton, to the West of Folly Bank. Site F: North of Bishopton – bordered by Mill Lane to the South and Bishopton Beck to the North.

- 4.1.3 Byers Gill Solar would make a meaningful contribution to the local, and national, climate commitments. It would generate up to 180MW of renewable energy and connect to the Norton substation, located approximately 3.5km east of Site F: North of Bishopton. It is anticipated that 12km of underground 132kV cabling would be required to connect the Proposed Development to the Norton substation. As it stands, there are two proposed cable route options for the 132kV cable. These cable route options are currently being surveyed and we are seeking your feedback on these options; the preferred cable route will be confirmed following the statutory consultation.
- 4.1.4 Maps of the 5 site areas are contained **Appendix 1**.

4.2 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

- 4.2.1 The Proposed Development is an 'environmental impact assessment (EIA) development' under the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017.
- 4.2.2 The Application will therefore require an Environmental Impact Assessment ('EIA') to be carried out to ensure the likely significant effects of the Proposed Development are properly understood and that, where available, appropriate mitigation measures are identified to control or reduce environmental effects.
- 4.2.3 An EIA Scoping Opinion was issued by the Planning Inspectorate in December 2022. Together with the Applicant's Scoping Report, this identifies the environmental issues and topics that are relevant to the Proposed Development and will be assessed as part of the EIA. The Scoping Opinion is available to view on the Planning Inspectorate website at: EN010139-000021-EN010139 - Scoping Report.pdf (planninginspectorate.gov.uk)
- 4.2.4 A Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will be produced and consulted upon as part of the statutory consultation. This will provide initial information on the potential environmental effects of the Proposed Development and any proposed mitigation to help the local community understand the environmental effects and inform responses regarding the proposals.

- 4.2.5 We will be inviting feedback and comments on the information presented in the PEIR as part of the statutory consultation. Feedback received will be considered before the DCO application and EIA are finalised for submission.
- 4.2.6 All final environmental findings will be set out in an Environmental Statement (ES), which will be submitted alongside our Application.
- 4.2.7 The statutory consultation will be carried out in compliance with the statutory requirements set out in the Act, including consultation on the PEIR.

5 STATUTORY CONSULTATION (5TH MAY 2023 – 16TH JUNE 2023)

5.1 INTRODUCTION

- 5.1.1 The statutory consultation will run for six weeks, starting on 5th May 2023 and finishing on 16th June 2023. All responses to the consultation must be received by 11:59pm on the closing date.
- 5.1.2 Held in accordance with the Act, this consultation provides an opportunity for you to have your say about our proposals for Byers Gill Solar. More details on what we will be consulting on are listed below.

5.2 WHAT ARE WE CONSULTING ON?


- 5.2.1 The aim of our pre-application consultation is to ensure that the community, landowners and other persons with an interest in the land, stakeholders and technical consultees have the opportunity to understand and influence our proposals. JBM Solar will present our proposals including how they have been informed by our environmental assessments and engagement to date.
- 5.2.2 We will be seeking feedback on all aspects of our plans for Byers Gill Solar. These will be explained in the following materials:
 - Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) the PEIR sets out the preliminary findings from the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). It also includes photomontages of the proposed solar park from various locations around the site.
 - Consultation booklet the booklet provides a more detailed overview of the proposals, including a summary of each panel area.
- 5.2.3 The full PEIR will be made available electronically on our project website, and we will publicise, as part of our statutory notices, information on how to request hard copies of the full PEIR.

5.2.4 All statutory consultation documents will be available online, on the Project website, and available in hard copy at no extra charge (except the PEIR, a hard copy of which can be requested for a charge of £0.35 per page to cover printing and posting costs).

5.3 WHO ARE WE CONSULTING?

- 5.3.1 Our consultation process is open to anyone who may be interested in our proposals for Byers Gill Solar. We welcome all views and will take them into account before we submit our DCO application.
- 5.3.2 We have identified a primary consultation zone (PCZ) by initially extending a minimum distance of two kilometres from the boundary of the Red Line Boundary (Appendix 1)– within which the solar PV panels, energy storage system, on-site substation and supporting infrastructure would be located. The PCZ also extends one kilometre from the edge of the cable route corridor for the grid connection, up to the boundary of the existing Norton substation.
- 5.3.3 The PCZ has also been amended in certain areas to consider:
 - Zone of theoretical visibility for the Proposed Development, which assesses areas in vicinity of the Red Line Boundary (Appendix 1) which could experience a degree of visual impact
 - Existing physical boundaries, such as main roads
 - Capturing entire communities, rather than excluding small numbers of properties
 - Where we propose to undertake additional works to enable construction transport, equipment areas or road modifications
- 5.3.4 The zone has also been amended where proportionate and reasonable based on existing boundaries in order to avoid inappropriate 'severance' of communities. The PCZ is shown in Figure 5.1.

5.4 CONSULTATION WITH UNDER-REPRESENTED OR SELDOM HEARD GROUPS

- 5.4.1 Our consultation has been developed to be accessible to all groups in the community, including 'under-represented' or 'seldom heard' groups and individuals who may be less likely to participate in or respond to traditional consultation techniques.
- 5.4.2 These groups and individuals that may find it harder to get involved in consultation and/or need additional support to access materials include:
 - Geographically isolated communities
 - Young people
 - Older people
 - Disabled people and those with learning disabilities
- 5.4.3 The specific methods to be used to engagement with these seldom heard groups are outlined in Section 5.8.

5.5 HOW WE WILL CONSULT

5.5.1 During this statutory consultation, we will use a range a methods to ensure an inclusive, meaningful and open consultation. We will use a range of digital and non-digital methods of communication to ensure that our consultation can be accessed by all members of the community.

- 5.5.2 Our statutory consultation is planned to take place for six weeks between 5th May 2023 and 16th June 2023 (exceeding the statutory minimum period of 28 days as required by the Act).
- 5.5.3 A proposed schedule for all engagement methods, including activities and materials, is set out in Table 5.1 below.

- 5.7.2 All relevant local and parish councillors, elected members for county, district and borough, and MPs will be contacted as soon as practicable following the local elections and will be kept informed about the Proposed Development. They will also be encouraged to share information about the consultation with members of their constituency / local community.






1.1 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT SITE LAYOUT:








1.4 SITE C: BYERS GILL WOOD




1.5 SITE D: GREAT STAINTON

othing much to see here, so move along please. That has been the message from the White House to those who fear the collapse of three US banks in as many months spells serious trouble for the world's biggest economy

Joe Biden has a point, even though the line that the US financial system is fundamentally sound has become harder to maintain as it becomes clear that Silicon Valley Bank was not a one-off. The US economy has slowed down but continues to grow.

The spin is that none of what has happened thus far - least of all the collapse of a small number of regional US banks - should come as a surprise. What is surprising is how well the US economy is holding up. The US will emerge relatively unscathed as it invariably does. What is there to be worried about?

Plenty, as it happens. The US has just witnessed one of the biggest bubbles of the past 100 years. That has been followed by the most rapid increase in interest rates in four decades, which has taken official borrowing costs from near zero to more than 5% in little more than a year. If Biden is not worried about the implications of this for his re-election prospects in November 2024, then he should be. Things could turn nasty very quickly, for the economy and for the president personally

In the circumstances, it will be little short of miraculous if the Federal Reserve manages to finesse a soft landing for the economy. Wall Street is expecting interest rates to start coming down in July and to be

just over 4% by the end of 2023 but the markets are getting ahead of themselves. Jobs growth is slowing but that won't be enough on its own to persuade the Fed to start cutting rates. For that to happen, a lot more banks would need to start to go bust.

That's entirely possible. The orger rates stay high the tougher le. life gets for vulnerable banks. Those institutions in better financial shape will limit the flow of new credit to firms and individuals. Inflation will be squeezed out of the economy but at a heavy cost. The Fed will eventually cut interest rates aggressively but by then it will be too late to avoid a hard landing.

To a large extent, it will be a recession of the central bank's own making. At the tail end of 2021, asset prices were booming across the board in the US. Shares, residential property, bonds, cryptocurrencies: all were part of a buying mania. With some justification, it was labelled the "everything bubble".

For students of economic history, there were distinct similarities between the frenzy as the US economy emerged from the pandemic and previous bubbles: the buildup to the Wall Street crash of 1929, the Japanese equity and property boom of the late 1980s, the dotcom implosion of 2000 and

the global financial crisis of 2008. There was one key difference, however. The four previous bubbles had all come at the peak of business cycles, when the strength of the underlying economy provided some justification for the optimism in the financial markets. The everything bubble was not like that. Asset prices - lubricated by vast amounts of cheap money from the Fed - boomed but the real economy did not.

So, predictably enough, asset prices were the first to suffer when the Fed began to tighten policy

early last year. Phase one of the

unwinding of the bubble involved house, bond and share prices all suffering during 2022. Phase two, attention switched to banks caught out by the unexpectedly rapid rise in interest rates. Phase three, which has only just begun, is when the real ecor omy will really start to hurt. By the time unemployme starts rising, the recession will already be under way. Some

economists think it already has. Even if this is not the equivalent of 1929 or 2008 (and the signs so far are that isn't), Biden could still be in political trouble. Since 1945, only three sitting

US presidents who have sought re-election after serving a full firstterm have failed to win a second: Donald Trump in 2020, George HW Bush in 1992 and Jimmy Carter in 1980. All three faced an uphill battle cause of a struggling econor In Carter's case, there was a

double-dip recession after the Fed under the legendary inflation hawk Paul Volcker - raised interest rates, cut them before inflation was fully under control, then raised them again. The Fed will no doubt want to avoid a repeat performance, and since its chair, Jerome Powell, has admitted he knows of no way to bring inflation down painlessly, it is a question of how hard the recession will be and how soon it will be over.


