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Summary

Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by Arup on behalf of JBM Solar Projects (UK) Limited (now RWE) to prepare a Historic Environment Desk-Based Assessment of Great Stainton, Stockton-on-Tees centred on NGR 433767, 521996.

This study is a technical appendix to an Environmental Statement (ES) chapter in support of an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) for a proposed solar farm and associated infrastructure across an area of approximately 490 hectares (ha).

This assessment has established that there is an archaeological interest within the Order Limits. This interest relates to Iron Age to Romano-British occupation activity and medieval and post-medieval agricultural remains and the structural remains of Bishopton Castle.

However, due to a lack of previous archaeological investigation within the Order Limits, the potential for and significance of any such remains could not be accurately assessed on the basis of the available evidence.

The Order Limits has been subject to some disturbance in the modern period which will have impacted on any below ground remains leading to a loss, or total loss, of significance through the removal of their archaeological interest.

The conclusion, therefore, is that there is potential for as yet unknown archaeological remains to be present within the Order Limits which may date to the Bronze Age or earlier. The highest potential is for possible archaeological remains from the Iron Age, the Romano British period and the medieval period. Such remains could be up to high heritage significance, depending on a number of factors including their preservation. There is also a potential for remains from the post-medieval period and later which are likely to be agricultural in nature alongside those associated with a First World War airfield.

Any adverse impact to buried archaeological features as a result of the implementation of the development proposals would be permanent and irreversible in nature. This potential adverse effect could be reduced through the implementation of an appropriate scheme of archaeological mitigation, in accordance with national and local planning policy.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Project background

1.1.1 Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by Arup on behalf of JBM Solar Ltd (the Applicant), to prepare an Archaeological Desk-Based assessment of land near to Great Stainton, Stockton-on-Tees (hereafter 'Proposed Development', Fig. 1), centred on NGR 433767, 521996.

1.1.2 This study is a technical appendix to an Environmental Statement (ES) chapter in support of an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) for a proposed solar farm and associated infrastructure across an area of approximately 490 hectares (ha).

1.2 The Proposed Development

1.2.1 The Proposed Development consists of a solar farm capable of generating over 50MW Alternating Current (AC) of electricity with co-located Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS), located between Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees in north-east England. The Proposed Development is approximately 490ha and comprises six solar photovoltaic (PV) panel areas (Panel Areas A-F). The solar PV panels would be mounted on a metal frame in groups, fixed in position aligned in East-West rows with panels facing south. An on-site substation would be located within Panel Area C.

1.2.2 The Proposed Development includes up to 32.5km of 33kilovolt (kV) underground cabling between the Panel Areas and the on-site substation, as well as approximately 10km of 132kV underground cable to connect the Proposed Development to the grid connection at the existing Norton substation (located to the north-west of Stockton-on-Tees) with both on-road and off-road options. A range of supporting infrastructure is required for the Proposed Development, comprising BESS; transformers and inverters for managing the electricity produced; storage containers to hold this equipment; and security measures such as fencing, CCTV and lighting. The Proposed Development includes environmental mitigation and enhancement measures to avoid or reduce adverse impacts on the surrounding environment and nearby communities.

1.2.3 The majority of the Proposed Development's planning boundary (the 'Order Limits') is located within the administrative boundary of Darlington Borough Council, with a section of the cable route situated within the administrative boundary of Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council. A very small section of the Order Limits is within the administrative boundary of Durham County Council.

1.3 Scope of document

1.3.1 This assessment will, as far as is possible from existing information, consider the nature, extent and significance of the historic environment resource within the Order Limits and its environs, and provide an initial assessment of the potential impact of development on the heritage assets that embody that significance.



1.4 Aims

1.4.1 The specific aims of this assessment are to:

- outline the known and potential heritage assets within the Order Limits based on a review of existing information within a defined study area;
- assess the significance of known and potential heritage assets through weighted consideration of their valued components;
- make recommendations for strategies to mitigate potential adverse impacts arising from the Proposed Development.

2 PLANNING BACKGROUND

2.1 Introduction

2.1.1 There is national legislation and guidance relating to the protection of, and Proposed Development on or near, important archaeological Sites or historical buildings within planning regulations as defined under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. In addition, local authorities are responsible for the protection of the historic environment within the planning system.

2.1.2 The following section summarises the main components of the national and local planning and legislative framework governing the treatment of the historic environment within the planning process. Further detail is presented in Appendix 2.

2.2 Legislation

2.2.1 Statutory protection is provided to certain heritage assets under the following legislation:

- The Historic Buildings and Ancient Monuments Act 1953;
- Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979;
- Protection of Military Remains Act 1986;
- Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990; and
- Hedgerows Regulations 1997 (as Amended 2002).

2.3 National Policy

National Policy Statement for Energy

2.3.1 As the Proposed Development comprises the construction of energy infrastructure, the primary policy for determination in regards to the Historic Environment is the Overarching National Policy Statement for Energy (NPS EN-1): Section 5.9 (Historic Environment).

2.3.2 National Policy Statement for Renewable Energy Infrastructure (EN-3): Section 2.10 (Solar Photovoltaic Generation), with paragraphs 2.10.107 to 2.10.119 specifically considers cultural heritage for solar development.

2.3.3 Reference is made within these policies where clarification of terms or for guidance on their practical implementation to 'Annex 2 of PPS5, or any successor to it.' PPS5 was replaced by the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) in 2012 and therefore is critical to any assessment as it share much of the same language as Policy EN-1 and EN-3 when referring to the Historic Environment.



National Planning Policy Framework

- 2.3.4 The most up to date version NPPF was published in December 2023 and sets out the government's planning policies for England and how these are expected to be applied.
- 2.3.5 Section 16 of the NPPF, entitled Conserving and enhancing the historic environment, sets out the principal national guidance on the importance, management and safeguarding of heritage assets within the planning process.
- 2.3.6 The aim of NPPF Section 16 is to ensure that Local Planning Authorities, developers and owners of heritage assets adopt a consistent and holistic approach to their conservation and to reduce complexity in planning policy relating to proposals that affect them.
- 2.3.7 To summarise, government guidance provides a framework which:
- recognises that heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource;
 - requires applicants to provide proportionate information on the significance of heritage assets affected by the proposals and an impact assessment of the Proposed Development on that significance;
 - takes into account the desirability of sustaining and enhancing the significance of heritage assets and their setting;
 - places weight on the conservation of designated heritage assets, in line with their significance; and
 - requires developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible.

Local policy

- 2.3.8 Local authorities are responsible for the protection of the historic environment within the planning system, in this case the following policies are relevant to this assessment:
- Darlington Borough Local Plan 2016 – 2036 (adopted February 2022): Policy ENV1; and
 - Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council Local Plan (adopted January 2019): Policy HE1, Policy HE2 and Policy HE3.

3 METHODOLOGY

3.1 Introduction

- 3.1.1 The methodology employed during this assessment was based upon relevant professional guidance, including the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' Standard and guidance for historic environment desk-based assessment (CIfA 2014, revised 2020).

3.2 Study Area

- 3.2.1 A 2 km Study Area was established around the proposed Panel Areas and cable route. The recorded historic environment resource within the Study Area was considered in order to provide a context for the discussion and interpretation of the known and potential resource within the Order Limits.



3.3 Sources

3.3.1 Several publicly accessible sources of primary and synthesised information were consulted. These comprised:

- the National Heritage List for England (NHLE), which is the only official and up to date database of all nationally designated heritage assets;
- the Durham Historic Environment Record (DHER) and Tees Sites and Monuments Record (TSMR), comprising a database of recorded archaeological Sites, find spots, and archaeological events within the county;
- relevant national, regional and thematic Research Frameworks including the North East Regional Research Framework (NERRF 2022);
- national heritage datasets including the Archaeological Data Service (ADS), Heritage Gateway, OASIS, PastScape and the National Record of the Historic Environment (NRHE) Excavation Index;
- Surveyed maps and Ordnance Survey maps viewed online;
- Aerial photographs of the area viewed at the Historic England Headquarters in Swindon; and
- relevant primary and secondary sources held in Wessex Archaeology's own library. Both published and unpublished archaeological reports relating to excavations and observations in the vicinity of the Site were studied.

3.3.2 Sources consulted during the preparation of this assessment are listed in the references section of the report.

3.4 Site visit

3.4.1 The Order Limits was visited on the 21st to 22nd February and 18th to 19th May 2022. Weather conditions were mainly sunny and dry with some overcast spells. A fieldwork record comprising digital photography is held in the project archive.

3.4.2 The aim of the Site visit was to assess the general aspect, character, condition and setting of the Order Limits and to identify any prior impacts not evident from secondary sources. The Site visit also sought to ascertain if the Order Limits contained any previously unidentified features of archaeological, architectural or historic interest.

3.5 Significance

3.5.1 Significance (for heritage policy) is defined in NPPF Annex 2 as:

'The value of a heritage asset to this and future generations because of its heritage interest. The interest may be archaeological, architectural, artistic or historic. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting. For World Heritage Sites, the cultural value described within each Site's Statement of Outstanding Universal Value forms part of its significance.'

3.5.2 The interests defined by NPPF, and expanded upon within Statements of Heritage Significance: analysing significance in heritage assets (Historic England 2019), are:

- Archaeological Interest: there will be archaeological interest in a heritage asset if it holds, or potentially holds, evidence of past human activity worthy of expert investigation at some point;

- Architectural and Artistic Interest: these are interests in the design and general aesthetics of a place. They can arise from conscious design or fortuitously from the way the heritage asset has evolved. More specifically, architectural interest is an interest in the art or science of the design, construction, craftsmanship and decoration of buildings and structures of all types. Artistic interest is an interest in other human creative skill, like sculpture; and
- Historic Interest: An interest in past lives and events (including prehistoric). Heritage assets can illustrate or be associated with them. Heritage assets with historic interest not only provide a material record of our nation's history but can also provide meaning for communities derived from their collective experience of a place and can symbolise wider values such as faith and cultural identity.

3.5.3 This assessment was also informed by the advice published by Historic England in the document entitled *Managing Significance in Decision-Taking in the Historic Environment: historic environment good practice advice in planning note 2* (2015).

3.6 Assumptions and limitations

3.6.1 Data used to compile this report consists of secondary information derived from a variety of sources, only some of which have been directly examined for the purposes of this assessment. The assumption is made that this data, as well as that derived from other secondary sources, is reasonably accurate.

3.6.2 The records held by the DHER and TSMR are not a record of all surviving heritage assets, but a record of the discovery of a wide range of archaeological and historical components of the historic environment. The information held within it is not complete and does not preclude the subsequent discovery of further elements of the historic environment that are, at present, unknown.

4 BASELINE RESOURCE

4.1 The Order Limits

4.1.1 The Order Limits covers a large area of the rural landscape between Darlington and Stockton-on-Tees within the counties of Darlington and County Durham. The Order Limits covers approximately 490 hectares (ha) comprising large parcels of land (mainly contained within existing land parcels defined by field boundaries) for the proposed Panel Areas which are connected by linear sections for the proposed underground cable routes (Figure 1). Some sections of the proposed cable route run along existing roads.

4.1.2 In line with the aims set out in Paragraph 3.4.2, areas of interest were defined and targeted during the walkover survey due to the potential for visible archaeological remains, a high potential for as yet unknown archaeological remains and to determine existing ground conditions to assess likely survival of buried archaeological remains. A total of 17 areas were identified which are set out below and referred to, where necessary, in Section 4.4:

Area 1 – Coatham Lane, north of Coatham Mundeville

- 4.1.3 This area was identified as an area of interest due to the presence of the Scheduled Monument of Coatham Mundeville medieval village, fishponds and areas of ridge and Furrow (NHLE 1016109) which is located to the north and south of Coatham Lane, located just to the north of Coatham Mundeville village (Figure 2).
- 4.1.4 Due to crop and vegetation cover the earthwork remains were unable to be identified during the walkover survey (Plates 1, 2 and 3).

Area 2 – Aycliffe Lane, Brafferton

- 4.1.5 This area was targeted due to the potential underground cable route option running along Aycliffe Lane. Aycliffe Lane runs northwards to the west of Brafferton village (Figure 3). The road is undulating and slopes uphill towards the junction with High House Lane.
- 4.1.6 The road is bordered by hedgerows and fields, some of which contain evidence of medieval earthwork remains, particularly to the west of Aycliffe Lane.

Area 3 – Lime Lane, Brafferton

- 4.1.7 This area was targeted due to the potential underground cable route option running along Lime Lane (Figure 4). Lime Lane runs on a roughly east to west alignment to the north of Brafferton bordered by dense hedgerows (Plates 6 and 7).

Area 4 – High House Lane, Brafferton

- 4.1.8 This area was targeted due to the potential underground cable route option running along High House Lane and then onto a track towards the south (Figure 4). High House Lane is the main road providing access to Brafferton village with access to the track to the south between Manor Farmhouse and adjoining building, both of which are Grade II Listed (NHLE 1185903 and NHLE 1186094) (Plates 8, 9 and 10). The proposed route then follows the route of a rough farm track which zig-zags in an 'L' shape to the rear of Manor Farm (Plates 11 and 12) before linking up with Area 5.

Area 5 – Fields south of Brafferton

- 4.1.9 This area was targeted as these fields comprise the proposed location of a Panel Area A (Figure 4) with the DHER identifying areas of post-medieval linear earthworks in the northern most fields. However, due to crop cover during the walkover these earthworks were difficult to identify (Plate 13) although some areas of ridge and Furrow could be observed in the fields in the north-western part of Area 5 (Plate 14).
- 4.1.10 Area 5 is comprised of a number of rectangular parcels of land defined by a mixture of fencing and hedgerow boundaries (Plate 15). These fields are accessed via an earthen track to the rear of Manor Farm (Plate 16). The topography is undulating and uneven with higher areas affording clear views over the surrounding landscape (Plates 17 and 18). At the time of the walkover the fields were laid to grass (Plate 19).

Area 6 – East of Oat Hill Farm, Salters Lane

- 4.1.11 This area was targeted as these fields comprise the proposed location of a Panel Area B (Figure 5). The DHER has identified areas of post-medieval linear earthworks in the northern section of this area, although at the time of the walkover survey the field was under crop which masked any views of possible earthworks (Plate 20).
- 4.1.12 The fields in this area are mainly flat with boundaries defined by a combination of hedgerows (Plate 21) and fencing. The flat, open landscape affords views in all directions, particularly



to the southeast (Plate 22). The fields in this area are irregular in shape, defined by a stream to the south and Lodge Lane to the north.

Area 7 – East of Whinney Hill and Hauxley Farm

4.1.13 This area was targeted as these fields comprise the proposed location of a Panel Area B (Figure 5). The DHER has identified areas of post-medieval linear earthworks to the east of Hauxley Farm, however, these were not accessible during the walkover survey.

4.1.14 The fields in this area are mainly flat and open and at the time of the visit were under crop (Plates 23). Field boundaries comprised a combination of dense hedgerows and mature trees.

Area 8 – Land at Galloping Hill, Elstob Lane

4.1.15 This area was targeted as the fields surrounding Galloping Hill Plantation and Byers Gill Wood are the proposed location of a Panel Area C (Figure 5). The land identified for the location of a Panel Area here covers a large area to the west of Elstob Lane to the south of Great Stainton, although they exclude land at Byers Gill Wood and Square Wood.

4.1.16 The DHER has identified both medieval and post-medieval earthworks within these fields, some of which were identified on the walkover survey, although some were not visible due to crop cover.

4.1.17 This section of the Order Limits was accessed via a tarmacked track leading to Mount Pleasant Farm (Plate 24). The land in this part of the Site is gently undulating with a gradual incline leading up to Byers Gill Wood and Mount Pleasant Farm (Plate 25). The area to the north of Mount Pleasant Farm is gently undulating with large, open fields bounded by hedgerows and the large woodland of Byers Gill (Plates 26 and 27). At the time of the walkover survey the fields were under crop.

Area 9 – Field east of Great Stainton

4.1.18 This area was targeted as it contains the proposed location of Panel Area D (Figure 6). This land lies to the east of Great Stainton village and covers a large area of fields, bordered by the road to the north and Little Stainton Beck to the south. The DHER has identified both medieval and post-medieval ridge and Furrow earthworks in these fields, although crop cover at the time of the walkover made these difficult to visually identify. The postulated course of a Roman road is also believed to run to the east of Elstob Lane.

4.1.19 The land in this area is relatively flat in the northern section of the Order Limits (Plate 28), located on a ridge of high ground with clear views in all directions and notably to the south (Plates 29, 30 and 31). This landscape is open and mainly comprises arable fields which are generally bordered by hedgerows (Plates 32 and 33).

Area 10 – West Newbiggin

4.1.20 This area was targeted due to its proximity with a proposed Panel Area E to the south-west of Bishopton village (Figure 7).

4.1.21 The land in this area is flat and low lying and were laid to grass at the time of the walkover (Plates 34 and 35).

Area 11 – Little Stainton

4.1.22 Although this area does not contain any of the proposed Panel Areas or cable route options, it was investigated due to a concentration of medieval earthwork remains that have been



identified within Little Stainton village its proximity to the proposed cable route which runs to the north of the village (Plates 36 and 37) (Figure 7). The topography of this area is a gentle incline northwards from Folly Bank.

Area 12 – Fields south-west of Folly Bank, Bishopton

- 4.1.23 This area was targeted due to it containing the proposed location of a Panel Area E (Figure 8). The DHER has identified the site of a World War I airfield within the southern section. Due to crop cover and inaccessibility, it was not possible to determine if any evidence of the former airfield is extant.
- 4.1.24 This area is gently undulating, comprising two elongated fields (Plate 38). The land is low lying and at the time of the walkover survey was laid to crop (Plate 39). The fields are bordered by fences and to the east by Folly Bank Road.

Area 13 – South of the High Street, Bishopton

- 4.1.25 This area was targeted due to the location of the potential cable route option in close proximity to the scheduled monument of the upstanding remains of a motte and bailey castle which is located immediately south of the village of Bishopton (NHLE 1008668) (Figure 8). The cable route option runs to the east of the scheduled monument along the High Street and to the south of the scheduled area.
- 4.1.26 The earthwork remains of the motte and bailey are clearly visible when looking west from the High Street and when looking northwards from the public footpath that crosses the scheduled area (Plates 40 and 41). Due to the relatively flat and open landscape there are both clear views of the monument from the wider landscape and also views of the wider landscape from the monument itself (Plate 42).
- 4.1.27 The cable route option runs to the south of the scheduled monument, parallel to the field boundary which curves towards the north-west. This boundary is comprised of a ditch, fence and hedgerow (Plates 43 and 44). From this point south of the scheduled monument the cable route option also runs to the east along Redmarshall Road (Plates 45 and 46). The field immediately south of the scheduled area is laid to crop and is relatively flat (Plate 47).
- 4.1.28 The route of the cable route option also runs along the High Street through the village of Bishopton (Plates 48, 49 and 50). Where the cable route option extends to the west of the scheduled monument, a high ridge limits visibility of the scheduled monument from Folly Bank to the west (Plate 51).

Area 14 – South of Whitton Beck, Whitton Road

- 4.1.29 This area was targeted due to the proximity of proposed Panel Area F to the west and the presence of an area of medieval field systems and earthworks, as identified on the THER (Plates 52 and 53) (Figure 9). Some evidence of the field systems to the east of Whitton Road was observed when looking east from Whitton Road (Plate 54).

Area 15 – Redmarshall

- 4.1.30 This area was targeted as the potential cable route option passes through Redmarshall village, close to a number of designated heritage assets (Figure 10). Redmarshall village is located in the eastern part of the Order Limits between the villages of Carlton and Bishopton.
- 4.1.31 The potential cable route option runs along Redmarshall Road and Kirk Hill. Redmarshall Road is the main thoroughfare providing access to the village of Redmarshall (Plate 55). The designated heritage assets of Rectory Cottage (NHLE 1139858), The Old Rectory

(NHLE 1248170) and the Church of St Cuthbert (NHLE 1140001) front this road in the western part of the village and form a dominant part of the streetscape in this area (Plates 56 and 57). Kirk Hill runs eastwards out of the village and joins Redmarshall Road at the crossroads with Drovers Lane (Plate 58).

Area 16 – Letch Lane, Carlton

- 4.1.32 This area was targeted as the potential cable route option runs along Letch Lane to the southeast of Carlton (Plates 59 and 60) (Figure 10). The road is bordered by hedgerows and some isolated trees with open fields either side. A large solar farm is present in fields to the north of Letch Lane (Plate 61).

Area 17 – Area north-west of Bishopton off Mill Lane

- 4.1.33 This area was targeted as these fields are the location of a proposed Panel Area F (Figure 11). This area includes a large swathe of land north of Bishopton and south of Old Stillington but does not include the land surrounding Downland Farm.
- 4.1.34 This area covers the fields north of Bishopton village and Mill Lane and extends to the route of the Bishopton Beck in the north. The fields in this area are roughly rectangular with defined boundaries. To the west, the fields can be accessed off Beach House Bank and at the time of the walkover were under crop (Plate 62). The larger fields in the western area are gently undulating with a gradual slope to the east (Plates 63 and 64). The landscape in this area is open and on relatively high ground with clear views both towards Old Stillington in the north (Plate 65), Bishopton in the south (Plate 66), to the east (Plate 67) and west (Plate 68). The fields are bordered by dense hedgerow with some mature trees (Plate 69).
- 4.1.35 The proposed Panel Area F here also includes the fields to the southeast of Downland Farm, north of Mill Lane (Plates 70 and 71). This area is flat and open with views in all directions. The northeastern part of Area 17 covers the fields to the west of West House Farm with open views in all directions (Plates 72 and 73).

4.2 Designated heritage assets

Order Limits

- 4.2.1 One of the potential cable route options runs along the very southern tip of the Scheduled motte and bailey castle remains to the south of Bishopton (NHLE1008668) and along High Street and The Green, both of which lie within the Bishopton Conservation Area.

Study Area

- 4.2.2 Designated heritage assets within the Study Area comprise:

- Five Scheduled Monuments including the deserted village at Mordon (NHLE1002335), Ketton bridge (NHLE1002345), the shrunken medieval village at Sadberge (NHLE1011073) and Coatham Mundeville medieval village, fishpond and areas of ridge and Furrow (NHLE1016109),
- Two Grade I Listed Buildings, including the Church of St Cuthbert, Redmarshall (NHLE1140001) and the Church of St Andrew, Great Aycliffe (NHLE1322806),
- 74 Grade II Listed Buildings, mainly centred in the villages of Coatham Mundeville, Aycliffe, Ketton, Great Stainton, Sadberge, Bishopton, Stillington, Thorpe Thewles, Redmarshall and Carlton; and
- Sadberge, Bishopton and Coatham Mundeville and Aycliffe Conservation Areas.



4.2.3 There are no Registered Parks and Gardens or Registered Battlefields within the Study Area.

4.2.4 Designated heritage assets located within the Study Area are depicted in Figure 12-32.

4.3 Previous archaeological investigations

4.3.1 Numerous archaeological investigations have been recorded across the Order Limits and Study Area (Figure 54-74). Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail in Section 4.6.

4.3.2 Aside from the current scheme of geophysical survey being undertaken by Wessex Archaeology, there have been no previous archaeological investigations within the Order Limits.

4.3.3 A geophysical survey was undertaken by Northern Archaeological Associates in 2021 (E6979), immediately to the south of the Order Limits, in the fields either side of Lime Lane. This identified a number of anomalies interpreted as possibly relating to a system of enclosures.

4.3.4 There have been numerous archaeological investigations in the south-west of the Study Area, including geophysical surveys, archaeological excavation and evaluation and fieldwalking. One such investigation included the excavation of 17 trial trenches at Faverdale, 3 km to the southwest of the Order Limits by CFA Archaeology in 2013, targeted on anomalies interpreted as possible archaeological remains identified during an earlier geophysical survey. The results of the excavation uncovered evidence of gullies, pits and ditches thought to represent an enclosed Iron Age settlement (E49735).

4.3.5 An archaeological evaluation at Moor House Wind farm, Barmpton, approximately 500 m south of the Order Limits, by Solstice Heritage in 2016 revealed no evidence of any archaeological features, aside from some plough Furrows of possible post-medieval or modern date (E62659).

4.3.6 In the north-western corner of the Study Area at Newton Aycliffe, approximately 1 km northwest of the Order Limits, several archaeological investigations have been undertaken to the but have largely produced negative results, with the exception of the discovery of possible medieval features (E65772) and 19th century walls.

4.3.7 In the southern part of the Study Area, there have been numerous archaeological investigations around the village of Sadberge. These investigations identified possible Iron Age/Romano-British features located approximately 2.8 km south of the Order Limits (E72005), and possible evidence of the medieval (and earlier) court of Sadberge (E4749), located approximately 3km south of the Order Limits.

4.3.8 In the centre of the Study Area at Bishopton, all located immediately to the east and west of the Order Limits, investigations have only uncovered limited evidence of previous activity and/or settlement primarily comprising medieval pottery and features at Grange Farm (E5182, 8931, 61150).

4.3.9 Several large-scale landscape survey projects have been undertaken across the Study Area. The aggregate areas in County Durham Archaeological Assessment (ALSF) Project undertook a landscape-scale assessment of the archaeology associated with areas of past, present and future aggregate extraction in the county, undertaken between 2006-2007 covering the entire of the western and middle parts of the Order Limits (E34273). In the

north-western part of the Study Area, a large number of fields were fieldwalked as part of the Durham Archaeological Survey undertaken by The University of Durham between 1983-87 (E60345-97). Aside from a small part of the Order Limits between Panel Area A and Panel Area C, none of the fields that were investigated are within the Order Limits. The area surrounding Darlington and covered in the south-western area of the Study, was investigated as part of a historical and archaeological survey by Durham University between 1976-1978 and covered fields in the southern part of Panel Area C (E43664).

4.4 Archaeological and historical background

4.4.1 The likelihood of as yet unrecorded archaeological remains within the Order Limits is informed by the consideration of the known heritage assets within the Study Area, identified from the NHLE, HER, historic mapping, LiDAR and aerial photography, in conjunction with the geology and topography of the area. Relevant heritage assets identified from the HER and other sources are listed in Appendix 3 and illustrated in Figures 12-95.

Palaeolithic (970,000–9500 BC) and Mesolithic (8500-4000 BC)

4.4.2 Early prehistoric periods are associated with hunter-gatherer patterns of exploitation and shifting settlement leading to evidence from this period often being ephemeral and difficult to identify. This is reflected in general paucity of Palaeolithic and Mesolithic evidence from across the region, which is likely as a result of majority of north-eastern England being covered in a thick layer of uninhabitable snow and ice. However, this is compounded by a lack of consistent research into these periods undertaken (North East Research Framework, 2022).

4.4.3 Where remains have been uncovered, these are associated with gravel terraces in lowland areas, often recovered either from the surface of ploughed fields or from within the underlying drift during gravel extraction (North East Research Framework 2022). An isolated findspot of a hippopotamus bone is recorded to the south of Whitton (approximately 0.8 km to the east of Panel Area F) although further details as to its provenance are unknown (THER4866), while close to Preston-le-Skerne, the extent of a large glacial lake were identified located approximately 2.5 km northwest of Panel Area B during an augur survey undertaken in 2013 (DHER H58700).

4.4.4 Beyond environmental evidence, the characterisation of a sparsely occupied landscape is reflected throughout the Study Area with the DHER recording the location of only two isolated findspots yielding flint arrowheads and implements, including knives and scrapers, found at Newton Ketton, approximately 0.8 km to the east of Panel Area C (DHER H322 and H323).

Neolithic (4000–2400 BC) and Bronze Age (2400 – 700 BC)

4.4.5 A long process of transformation from the mobile populations of the earlier prehistoric periods to more settled living patterns began in around 4,000 BC and, probably punctuated by several 'false starts', continued throughout the Neolithic period and well into the Bronze Age (Stevens and Fuller 2012).

4.4.6 The flat, open nature of the Study Area bisected by a number of rivers and becks would have been rich in natural resources and would have likely been an attractive location not only for the mobile hunter gatherer populations exploiting the natural resources, but also for the more sedentary settlement which followed and developed in the Neolithic and Bronze Age, a theory that is supported by recent research within the region (North East Research Framework 2022).

- 4.4.7 During the Neolithic period, large swathes of forests began to be cleared, replaced with large areas of heathland as the local populace began to move towards a more domesticated lifestyle of pastoral and agricultural landscape and away from seasonal migration and hunter-gatherer activities. In the north-east of Britain, there is clear evidence of forest clearance in valley bottoms and lowland areas which continued into the Early Bronze Age which allowed the land to be used for cultivation, resulting in evidence for increased crop production (Moore 1998, Moore and Passmore 1999 and Young 2004b).
- 4.4.8 Recent research across County Durham suggests that evidence for occupation and activity remained sparse throughout the county into the Neolithic and Bronze Age. A single findspot relating to a flint scraper found 0.2 km north of the Order Limits at Letch Lane in 2005 (THER5427) is the only evidence recorded from the Neolithic period within the Study Area, although it is possible that some of the flint findspots, and features identified as 'prehistoric' in the DHER and TSMR may date from this period.
- 4.4.9 The resultant changes in settlement patterns and landscape use during these periods saw an increasing number of more permanent settlements, located on areas of cleared grassland. These changes in occupation and activity led to a change in funerary practices which had been focused on large communal tombs (long barrows) during the Neolithic period to the establishment of round monuments (round barrows) that focused on individuals (Ochota 2016).
- 4.4.10 The Cadeby Formation (formerly known as the Magnesian Limestone) covers large areas of the Study Area, and stretches south as far as Nottingham, has been extensively studied and has yielded significant archaeological remains. These include a large array of prehistoric funerary monuments, a number of which are located within wider landscape beyond the limits of the Study Area, including both long barrow and round barrow monuments, reflecting the transition from the use of communal to individual burial practices.
- 4.4.11 In addition to the evidence for funerary practices, a small collection of lithic implements dating to the Bronze Age has been found which includes a worked flint found (DHER H60396) while an arrowhead, discoidal knife and an axehead have also been recorded in the area east of Carlton (THER5426, 5431, 6193).

Iron Age (700 BC–AD 43) and Romano-British (AD 43–410)

- 4.4.12 In the north-east region, the Tees Valley has the greatest density of known and excavated Iron Age Sites, dominated by rectilinear enclosures (Haselgrove 2016). Analysis of LiDAR and elevation data has revealed that the majority of these features lie on relatively lower ground often close to river channels. This focus of settlement on areas identified during earlier periods highlights their continuing importance for populations even after more sedentary patterns of occupation were established, particularly in the case of seasonal migration where lowland areas are likely to have been favoured during the winter months (North East Research Framework 2022).
- 4.4.13 The Study Area contains at least eight of these rectilinear enclosures at Preston-le-Skerne (DHER H359, 360), approximately 2 km north of the Order Limits, Newton Ketton, approximately 500 m south of Panel Area A (DHER H685), Little Burdon and Barmpton (DHER H667 and 672), approximately 2.8 km south of Panel Area C, Little Stainton, approximately 1.4 km southeast of Panel Area C (DHER H675 and 687) and at Thorpe Thewles, immediately to the north of Order Limits at the Norton Substation (THER8884), all of which have been identified from cropmarks visible on aerial photographs.

- 4.4.14 While not definitively dated by either the DHER or the TSMR, a number of features identified from cropmarks are likely to trace their origins to the Iron Age period including a concentration of rectangular and curvilinear enclosures and linear features in the southern part of the Study Area surrounding Sadberge, 3.7 km south of Panel Area C (DHER H659, 660, 661, 662).
- 4.4.15 Analysis of aerial photographs have also identified a concentration of rectangular and polygonal enclosures to the west of Newton Beck, immediately south of Panel Area A (DHER H682, 683, 684), a circular cropmark enclosure with internal hut circle has been identified at Thorpe Thewles (THER534), and a large rectangular enclosure identified from aerial photographs in the area to the north-west of Thorpe Thewles, 2 km north of the Order Limits (THER828).
- 4.4.16 The Cadeby Formation (formerly the Magnesian Limestone) offers exceptional conditions for cropmark visibility and any lack of similar features beyond the limits of the limestone bedrock does not necessarily indicate such features are absent.
- 4.4.17 Intrusive archaeological investigations at Faverdale, approximately 3.7 km to the southwest of Panel Area A, confirmed the cropmarks visible here related to an Iron Age enclosure through dating evidence provided by pottery recovered from the enclosure ditches. Analysis of environmental evidence indicated that both domestic and industrial activity were being undertaken at this site during this period (H32418, Bell 2013). Archaeological investigations have also identified the location of a possible ring ditch through anomalies interpreted from geophysical survey data at the southern edge of Study Area, 2 km to the south of the Order Limits, to the north-west of Stockton-on-Tees (THER8934).
- 4.4.18 While untested by intrusive excavations, there is a high likelihood that similar enclosures identified from cropmarks within the Study Area would be of a similar nature and provenance which suggests a clear settlement presence in this landscape.
- 4.4.19 This conclusion is reinforced in instances where settlement areas are closely associated with additional evidence attributable to Iron Age activity like a 'Brigatian' type sword thought to have been found near to Brampton, approximately 2.4 km southwest of Panel Area C and now in the British Museum (DHER H310), and a late Iron Age or Romano-British coin found on Cat Gill Lane, 0.4 km north of the Order Limits (DHER H319).
- 4.4.20 Previously, our understanding of Romano-British occupation of the region has been largely derived from isolated Sites and chance finds. This has led to a slightly disjointed impression of the way in which the Romano-British populations interacted with one another and their environment.
- 4.4.21 Fortunately, as a result of an increase in development-led archaeological investigations and landscape-based studies, there is now a growing evidence base for the hitherto undefined social, military and economic interactions in the wider Roman period landscape, not to mention providing opportunities for research into the Iron Age to Romano-British transition within the area (Frodsham 2004).
- 4.4.22 Recent development in areas of the northeast have provided opportunities for research into the Iron Age to Romano-British transition within the area where primary rural settlements in the eastern lowlands did not radically change with the arrival of the Romans but do not appear to have been maintained after this point.

- 4.4.23 The archaeological record of the Romano-British period occupation of the region is now characterised by; evidence for a dispersed road network, rural settlement Sites, contemporary land division and associated cultivation systems. Regional analysis of aerial photography has revealed settlement Sites with associated paddocks surrounded by extensive pockets of cord rig field systems 1, a cultivation practice more commonly associated with the later prehistoric. This would indicate a continuity of culture and agricultural practice beyond the Roman invasion.
- 4.4.24 The basic road network within the region comprises major north-south aligned routes with occasional west-east forking routes which bisect the major routes heading north/south.
- 4.4.25 One of these possible main north-south aligned routes is Cade's Road (Margary 80a) within the Study Area. It was named after the Durham antiquary who first suggested its course in the late 18th century (DHER H3242, H3243, H3245, H3349). It is thought to share an alignment with Elstob Lane, located 0.3 km to the west of Panel Area D.
- 4.4.26 No physical trace of this road has been recorded due to a lack of intrusive archaeological investigation along its course. As a result, neither the definite trajectory of the road, nor the survival of any associated features (e.g. agger, flanking ditches) have been confirmed.
- 4.4.27 At Sadberge, approximately 3 km south of Panel Area C, the DHER also records the postulated route of Cade's Road (DHER H220). In this area, several archaeological investigations have been undertaken including a watching brief and an evaluation although neither of these produced any evidence of a Roman road (DHER E5871 and DHER E72008).
- 4.4.28 There is also evidence for Romano-British settlement within the Study Area. In the area to the south-east of Carlton, 0.7 km south of the Order Limits, the eastern section of the Study Area, two sub-rectangular enclosures with a potential droveway have been identified by a series of cropmarks east of California Farm (THER6230). The shape and morphology of the cropmarks were indicative of Romano-British settlement.
- 4.4.29 Geophysical survey of the area in 2007 corroborated the presence of these features below-ground. The survey expanded upon our understanding of the complexity of the Order Limits through the discovery of additional ditch features and pits (THER482). The shape and morphology of the cropmarks suggest a Romano-British origin and were also evident on a geophysical survey of the area in 2007 where ditch features and pits were identified (THER482). The THER also suggests that the character of this cropmark shared similarities to the site of a Roman villa at Ingleby Barwick, located approximately 9 km southeast of Redmarshall (Willis and Carne 2013). However, without further investigation of this cropmark this claim is difficult to substantiate.
- 4.4.30 The evidence for Romano-British settlement in this location has been further corroborated by the finds evidence. A number of pottery scatters have also been recovered in the surrounding area from just south of Kenilworth (THER 5424) and to the south of Hardwick (THER7736), approximately 1.4 km south of the Order Limits, both thought to date from the Romano-British period.

Saxon (AD 410–1066)

- 4.4.31 The availability and quantity of evidence for Saxon activity and settlement in the North-East is variable. The large settlement centres like Hartlepool, Newcastle, Durham and Darlington all have pre-conquest origins and are all associated with Saxon ecclesiastical Sites. This general principle is repeated across the region, including within the Study Area, where there

are several examples of Saxon date masonry within the fabric of later churches of Sadberge, Great Stainton and Aycliffe.

- 4.4.32 In Sadberge, a village located in the southern part of the Study Area, there is a record of a Saxon church which was located within the village and was extant until 1825 when it was demolished and the present church of St Andrew's was constructed in 1831 (NHLE1185943, DHER4611). Several carved figures and the two bells of this earlier building were incorporated into the fabric of the later building. Place name evidence also suggests that Sadberge (meaning a flat-topped hill in Old Norse) had origins prior to the Norman Conquest in AD 1066.
- 4.4.33 All Saints' Church at Great Stainton, a village located between Panel Areas B and D, contains fragments of several cross shaped sculptures which are thought to be Saxon in date (DHER756, 757, 758 and 329).
- 4.4.34 The village of Aycliffe is located in the very western part of the Study Area, 0.7 km northwest of the Order Limits. The church of St Andrew's comprises 10th century masonry which can be observed in the lower courses of the tower (DHER1489, NHLE1322806). In addition, a large number of stone sculptures (mainly comprising crosses) have also been identified within the church and churchyard (DHER695-699, 713-724).
- 4.4.35 Further evidence of Saxon activity, settlement or infrastructure is sparse across the region with some areas, such as those within the Milfield Basin in Northumberland, having significant important Sites but relatively little evidence found elsewhere, particularly in County Durham (North East Research Framework 2022).

Medieval (AD 1066–1500)

- 4.4.36 During the 9th and 10th centuries, village settlements began to be established over much of the midlands and the north of England in the form of regular, planned settlement centres, often focused on the fertile lowlands which provided an attractive location for settlement. Settlement was also focused on, or developed around, strongholds of nobles and religious Sites due to areas being given permission to hold fairs or markets, encouraged by local lords to make money from taxation.
- 4.4.37 The interplay between settlement development and land ownership is best evidenced from the Study Area in the form of the Scheduled Monument of Bishopton Castle (NHLE1008668). Both the motte and bailey survive well, enclosed by a substantial moat and two raised causeways.
- 4.4.38 The castle was built in the 12th century by Roger de Conyers as a result of a dispute with William Cumin and the need to fortify and lay claim to the settlement at Bishopton (Pettifer 2002). The siting of the castle in a strategic and dominant location to the south of Bishopton village was a deliberate choice as a clear demonstration of secular power within the landscape which can still be appreciated today.
- 4.4.39 The castle was investigated by the Round Mounds Project in 2015 as part of an investigation into mounds of possible prehistoric date which had then been re-used as Norman mottes. In this case, radiocarbon dating confirmed that the mound had been constructed during the Norman period (Leary et al 2018).
- 4.4.40 Analysis of documentary evidence, LIDAR data and aerial photography, often as part of the large-scale landscape surveys that have been undertaken within the region, have provided evidence for the scale and extent of Deserted Medieval Villages (DMV) by identifying the

linear forms of the crofts and tofts which are characteristic of deserted medieval villages (Historic England 2018).

- 4.4.41 In total, there are approximately 28 Deserted Medieval Villages (DMV) spread throughout the Study Area and immediately beyond, recorded at:
- Fulthorpe (THER1188), c. 2.6 km north of the Order Limits;
 - Old Stillington, 0.6 km north of Panel Area F (THER1478);
 - Mordon, c.1.7 km north of the Order Limits (DHERH7813, 39843);
 - West Middleton, c. 3 km south of Panel Area E (DHER H7819);
 - West and East Newbiggin, c. 2 km south of Panel Area E (H71006, 208),;
 - Grindon, c. 1.8 km north of Panel Area B (H325);
 - Newton Ketton, c. 0.2 km south of Panel Area A (H320);
 - Foxton c.2 km north of Panel Area F (H336);
 - Skerningham c. 1.7 km south of Panel Area A (H306);
 - Shotton c. 1.4 km northwest of Panel Area A (H353);
 - Little Burdon c.3.2 km south of the Order Limits (H311); and
 - Little Stainton c.0.8 km southwest of Panel Area E (H331).
- 4.4.42 Some have been designated as Scheduled Monuments, such as those at Coatham Mundeville, c.0.3 km west of Panel Area A (NHLE1016109), Sadberge, c. 3 km south of Panel Area C (NHLE1011073) and Preston-le-Skerne c.1.5 km north of the Order Limits (NHLE1002335). In terms of the form and layout of these DMV, the plans comprise a type well known from County Durham consisting of two parallel lines of houses which face onto a broad, rectangular village green with narrow crofts to the rear.
- 4.4.43 The desertion of these medieval villages occurred between the 13th and 15th centuries. This is thought to have been the result of the Black Death combined with the declining economic viability of medieval agricultural practices leading to significant changes in land use to allow grazing areas for livestock, emparkment and laterally the enclosure of the common land.
- 4.4.44 Within the Study Area, some DMVs are located in what are now isolated locations, such as those at Newton Ketton, West Middleton and Grindon representing a complete abandonment of the settlement and the move away from further settlement in these locations. However, there are also some examples of where subsequent settlement developed in close proximity to abandoned villages, such as at Coatham Mundeville, Sadberge and Little Stainton and it is possible that later development in these villages was as a result of the construction of village churches which remained as a focal point for further settlement.
- 4.4.45 On the outskirts of the medieval settlement centres, and in the rural areas surrounding them, analysis of aerial photography and LIDAR data has revealed a landscape which is dominated by ridge and Furrow earthworks and field systems, characteristic of medieval farming practices, particularly in areas close to DMVs.
- 4.4.46 The extensive evidence for medieval activity within the Study Area has been further corroborated by the artefactual record in the form of medieval pottery scatters which have

been recorded from throughout the area and further attest to the active and dynamic medieval landscape.

Post-medieval (AD 1500–1800)

- 4.4.47 Throughout the Study Area, the already established settlements at Aycliffe, Coatham Mundeville, Brafferton, Great Stainton and Sadberge continued to be a focus for post-medieval activity and were expanded and added to during the 17th and 19th centuries. This expansion was predominantly in the form of linear development along the main streets, such as along the High Street Bishopton and Elstob Lane, Great Stainton. Several halls and hall garths, with accompanying parks and gardens, were also constructed during the 18th century on the outskirts of these village centres, such as the one to the east of Coatham Mundeville, c. 1 km west of Panel Area A (NHLE1121232, 1299345, 1121233, 11861227), at Elstob, c. 1.5 km north of Panel Area D (NHLE 1310873) and at Ketton, c.0.4 km south of Panel Area A (NHLE1186113).
- 4.4.48 In some areas, such as at Great Stainton, former areas of medieval settlement were replaced with development during the 18th and 19th centuries, sometimes with the addition of either the replacement of an earlier church (such as the one at Sadberge), or the construction of a new church within the expanding village.
- 4.4.49 Similar cluster patterns of post-medieval development also occurred at Redmarshall, Carlton and Thorpe Thewles during the post-medieval period with the construction of a number of cottages, farmhouses and public houses within these villages constructed between the 17th and 19th centuries (THER 687, 699, 7495, 7496, 7610, 7611, 7741, 7742, 7743, 7839, 8787).
- 4.4.50 The expansion of these settlement centres was likely, in part, fuelled by both the continuing use of the surrounding landscape for agricultural purposes and the rise of industrial production which dominated the North East region. This was predominantly in the form of both coal and lead mining which formed the foundation for industrial growth in the region (Newman and Newman 2022).
- 4.4.51 The evidence of this industrialisation within the Study Area has been recorded to the south of Aycliffe, approximately 1 km to the northwest of the Order Limits, where a series of limestone quarries are visible as earthworks in both aerial photographs and LIDAR imagery (DHER H16551), and at Stillington, approximately 2 km north of Panel Area F where the Carlton Ironworks were recorded on 19th century mapping (THER4217).
- 4.4.52 Within the Study Area, this growth was further facilitated by the construction of railway lines and routeways in order to be able to transport quarried and milled supplies throughout the region. The Castle Eden Branch Railway (part of the North Eastern Railway) and the West Hartlepool Railway cross the eastern part of the Study Area (THER4216, 4369, 4093) and a further branch of the North Eastern Railway (the York to Berwick branch) was also constructed in the 19th century in the western part of the Study Area. At its very eastern extent, the Order Limits crosses the route of the Castle Eden Branch of the North East Railway (THER4216) and crosses immediately north of the former Carlton South Railway junction (THER4233). The railway line is no longer in use, however, the sidings and track are still clearly visible within the landscape and were investigated during the walkover survey (Area 16).
- 4.4.53 During the 18th and 19th centuries, the natural resource of the River Skerne was harnessed by the construction of a number of watermills the banks of the river at Aycliffe, Brafferton and Coatham Mundeville (DHER H59045, H59046, H59047, H59048 and H34790). A mill

was also recorded to the south-west of Whitton on the banks of Whitton Beck, located approximately 0.6 km west of the Order Limits (DHER H61619). In the eastern part of the Study Area, at approximately 2 km north of the Order Limits, several mills and mill races were also recorded on the banks of the Thorp Beck, near to Thorpe Thewles (THER 687, 4102). Many of these mills are recorded on 19th century Ordnance Survey mapping but some no longer survive (such as mills at Aycliffe and Brafferton) and some mill buildings have either been converted into modern dwellings, or the original buildings modified, such as at Coatham Mundeville.

- 4.4.54 Aside from the evidence for industrial activity, the Study Area is characterised by clear evidence for the continued use of the landscape for agricultural purposes throughout the post-medieval period. Large scale landscape assessments and the analysis of aerial photographs and LIDAR data have revealed that post-medieval ridge and Furrow and field systems dominate the Study Area and numerous earthwork remains have been recorded within the Order Limits itself. The location of a series of farm buildings has also been recorded within the Order Limits at Bishop Middleham, possibly constructed from the remains of 'the castle' (DHER H62330) (presumably Bishopton motte) but the DHER records no further description. This area was not able to be accessed during the walkover survey, but analysis of aerial photography suggests that these buildings are no longer extant although their form can be made out in cropmark detail. No buildings are recorded in this location on 19th century, or later mapping.
- 4.4.55 In addition, historical map regression has demonstrated that the fields containing the majority of the ridge and Furrow remains are characteristically rectilinear and square having been subject to Parliamentary enclosure in the late 18th and 19th centuries but also due to the earlier enclosure of formerly open fields. Many of these field boundaries have remained unchanged and can be readily identified in the landscape today.

Modern (AD 1900–present day)

- 4.4.56 Modern activity within the Study Area is dominated by both World War One and World War Two evidence, including war memorials within the villages of Aycliffe, Bishopton and Stillington and a concentration of pillboxes in the eastern part of the Study Area near to both Carlton and Thorpe Thewles.
- 4.4.57 A record of a First World War airfield is located in fields to the south of Bishopton and is located within Panel Area E (DHER H44096). This location was formerly home to Bishopton Landing Ground and opened as a World War One 3rd Class Night Landing Ground for use by 36(HD) Sqn in October 1916 (NELSAM 2012). The area covered 60 acres and was in use until the 13th August 1919. This airfield has been identified by the Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust and a memorial plaque is located within the village.
- 4.4.58 No. 36 Squadron was one of the first Royal Flying Corps (RFC) Home Defence Squadrons to be formed, firstly tasked with the defence of the east coast between Newcastle and Whitby during March 1916 (Clarke 2009). However, by May 1916 this area had been expanded to include the areas surrounding Stockon-on-Tees with four main sites at Jesmond, Newcastle, Seaton Carew, Ashington and Hylton. The Night Landing Ground at Bishopton was an accessory to these main airfields, located away from the coast as an attempt to avoid being targeted (B. Clarke, pers comm).
- 4.4.59 As a Night Landing Ground, the area in use to the west of Bishopton was likely sparse, comprising a basic level of timber huts or billets. Due to the small size and weight of the aircraft, the landing strip would not have been paved and would've comprised a grassy strip only (B. Clarke, pers comm). The earliest available aerial photographs of the area date from

1946 and were taken by the RAF. Analysis of these photographs show a small hut in the south-west corner of a field to the west of Folly Bank (AP RAF/CPE/UK/1835, Frame No. 3113). It is unclear if this building was related to the Bishopton Landing Ground and there is no clear evidence of any other infrastructure or landing strips from this time. The building was still extant on aerial photographs from 1948 (AP RAF/541/23, Frame No 4091).

- 4.4.60 By 1963, the buildings have been demolished (AP RAF/543/2252, Frame No. 334). Aerial photographs from the early 1970's and the 1990's show a series of linear cropmarks in the fields at the proposed location of Bishopton airfield. In a photo taken in 1973 only the southern part of the area is visible but shows two roughly east to west aligned parallel linear features with a circular feature in the middle (AP MAL/73027, Frame No 166). Aerial photographs from 1995 show a roughly north-west aligned linear feature running north from Folly Bank (AP OS/95646, Frame No 166). It is unclear if these features relate to earlier field boundaries or whether they are part of the original airfield.
- 4.4.61 There are also several records of aircraft crash sites at Great Stainton, located approximately 0.3 km west of Panel Area D, one occurring during the Second World War (DHER H38602) and the other during the Cold War (DHER H61167).
- 4.4.62 Further analysis of aerial photographs in the area surrounding Bishopton shows evidence for the location of a quarry pit immediately to the south of the field containing the motte and bailey earthworks. This can be observed in aerial photographs taken by the RAF in 1946 which show a large quarry pit in the fields between the brook which forms the southern boundary of the scheduled area and Stoney Flatt Farm (AP RAF/106G/UK/1700, Frame No 4093). Analysis of aerial photographs taken in 1958 (RAF/58/2558, Frame No 354) show that the quarry was no longer extant at this time although the cropmarks of quarry scarring are still visible. Importantly, the southern boundary of the field containing the motte and bailey earthworks does not appear to have been altered or eroded by the quarrying during the 1940's and has retained its boundary along the brook which runs east to west along this field boundary.
- 4.4.63 However, during the 1960's, an earlier field boundary (marked as a 'Foot Road' on the Bishopton Parish Tithe map) was re-established immediately to the east of the motte and bailey earthworks, creating a triangular wedge of land between the earthworks and the High Street. This can be clearly observed on aerial photographs taken in 1966 (AP MAL/66017, Frame No 20) but appears to have been removed by 1995 (AP OS/95647, Frame No 35).
- 4.4.64 Despite the modern development of Stockton-on-Tees and Darlington, the Study Area largely retains its agricultural character with small villages and hamlets, many of which still demonstrate their historical character.

Undated

- 4.4.65 A possible rectangular cropmark has been recorded within Panel Area D, identified by analysis of aerial photography (DHER H69180). This area was investigated during the walkover survey (Area 9) but crop cover prevented any visual identification of any earthworks in this location.
- 4.4.66 Due to the known concentration of rectangular Iron Age enclosures in this part of the Study Area, it is possible that this enclosure is of similar date. However, further work would be required to substantiate this.



5 ARCHAEOLOGICAL INTEREST AND SIGNIFICANCE

5.1 Potential impact

5.1.1 The proposed works have the potential to lead to harm to the significance of the following known archaeological remains which lie within the Order Limits:

- Possible remains of the purported route of the Roman road to Chester-Le-Street (DHER H3245);
- A series of post-medieval farm buildings, likely constructed from reused stone from the nearby castle (H62330);
- Remains associated with possible rectangular cropmark of unknown date (H69180);
- Areas of medieval field systems near to Redmarshall and Carlton (THER 6867);
- Large areas of post-medieval ridge and Furrow throughout the Order Limits,
- The Castle Eden Branch of the North East Railway near to Kenilworth (THER 4216),
- Bishopton Landing Ground, a World War One airfield (H44096), and
- A possible rectangular cropmark to the north east of Great Stainton,

5.1.2 The methods for construction of the Proposed Development will entail the following sources of ground disturbance and excavations:

- Panels - The mounting structure for the solar PV modules is a metal frame (usually anodised aluminium alloy) securely fixed to the ground and supported by galvanized steel poles which are typically driven into the ground to a depth of approximately 1m.
- Cables - At this stage, it is anticipated that on-site cabling would be installed using a cable plough, wherever possible. This is considered to be the most efficient and least impactful method of cable installation, causing minimal disruption to the ground, cutting, installing and back-filling in one operation.
- In instances where the cable plough cannot be used, alternative methods, such as horizontal directional drilling, would be considered and assessed within the ES.

5.1.3 The aforementioned works have the potential to result in the damage to or loss of any buried archaeological features which may be present within their footprint. Any adverse impact to buried archaeological features would be permanent and irreversible in nature.

5.1.4 This physical loss would result in harm to significance of such remains, without mitigation or offsetting. This potential adverse effect could be reduced through the implementation of an appropriate scheme of archaeological mitigation.

5.1.5 The most destructive elements of the development proposals in terms of below ground archaeology (should any such remains be present within the Order Limits) would likely to be associated with the Panel Areas, which while widespread across the landscape are localised to the dimensions of the cable route easement.

5.1.6 Topsoil removal and levelling works for the establishment of site compounds, facilities and car parks would also risk exposure and damage to any buried archaeological remains present within the affected areas.



- 5.1.7 These activities have the potential to lead to a physical impact on any buried archaeological remains which would lead to a loss, up to and including a total loss, of their archaeological interest and thus their significance.

5.2 Conditions for survival

- 5.2.1 Much of the Order Limits has not been previously developed, with the exception of where the proposed cable route runs along the route of existing roads. Much of the area of the proposed Panel Areas is undeveloped farmland and therefore any existing disturbance to buried archaeological remains that may be present would be largely restricted to truncation caused by ploughing.
- 5.2.2 Impacts which are likely to have compromised the preservation of any archaeological remains (if present) include: the construction of modern carriageways and roads, the installation of associated services and drainage, and the installation of the pylons for overhead lines. In addition, areas of historic quarrying and associated infrastructure would have potentially removed or disturbed archaeological remains from earlier periods.
- 5.2.3 Despite the possibility of modern cultivation and minor modern intrusions, the presence of some visible earthworks within the Study Area indicates that conditions for survival of buried remains within the Proposed Development area should be favourable.
- 5.2.4 The construction of various sections of the North East Railway (particularly the Castle Eden Branch and the York to Berwick branch) in the eastern part of the Study Area have caused one of the greatest impacts to the archaeological resource within the Study Area. These works will have involved significant ground excavation and the creation of vast spoil heaps, some of which may have been redeposited within the surrounding landscape.

5.3 Interest and significance

- 5.3.1 The archaeological interest of any buried archaeological remains within the Order Limits is derived from their evidential value through the information they may yield about past human activity.
- 5.3.2 Based upon a review of the available information, the proposed cable route and location the Panel Areas are situated in an area of archaeological interest. This is primarily derived from Iron Age to Romano-British activity and medieval and post-medieval activity.
- 5.3.3 The available information suggests that the Study Area has been occupied since at least the Bronze Age period with evidence of earlier activity sparse and restricted dispersed lithic scatters.
- 5.3.4 The most substantial evidence for early occupation dates from the Iron Age to Romano-British periods. A high number of rectangular enclosures have been identified from within the Study Area along with evidence of Romano-British activity, concentrated on areas of limestone associated with the Cadeby Formation (formerly known as the Magnesian Limestone). The free draining soils which overlay the limestone bedrock provide both favourable conditions for settlement and for identification of potential archaeological remains from aerial imagery. In addition, the postulated route of a Romano-British road (Cade's Road) is thought to run through the centre of the Study Area, on alignment with Elstob Lane.
- 5.3.5 Settlement in the Study Area increased during the medieval period with many of the current villages tracing their origins to this period which includes Bishopton which retains a motte



and bailey castle now protected as a Scheduled Monument. A number of parish churches in the Study Area also date to the medieval period while there is also evidence for agricultural activity in the form of large areas of ridge and Furrow.

- 5.3.6 The character of the Study Area remains relatively unchanged into the post-medieval period with the primary activities undertaken agricultural in nature. The most noticeable change was the establishment of regular fields through the enclosure process and the expansion of the settlement centres with many buildings in the historic cores tracing their origins to this period.
- 5.3.7 Further change in the 19th century and modern periods included increasing industry including the use of watermills and quarrying, evidence of which has been recorded within the Study Area. The North East Railway was also established around this time and several branches of this line are recorded within the Study Area.
- 5.3.8 There are also connections to some of the most significant events of the early 20th century as evidenced by the presence of war memorials in many of the settlements and a former First World War airfield located just outside Bishopton. The finding of any evidence for timber structures (in the form of post holes) and evidence of a landing strip would be of high heritage significance due to the information this evidence could provide about the form, layout and function of these type of airfields during the First World War.
- 5.3.9 It should also be noted that the proposed cable routes and the location of the proposed Panel Areas crosses several mature hedgerows and former parish boundaries, all of which may fulfil the criteria for being considered historically important as defined under the Hedgerows Regulations 1997 (as amended in 2002)).

6 CONCLUSIONS

6.1 General

- 6.1.1 This assessment has established that there is an archaeological interest within the Order Limits. This interest relates to a potential for earlier prehistoric remains associated with activity of mobile populations and the transition to sedentary settlement practices, Iron Age to Romano-British occupation activity and medieval and post-medieval agricultural remains and the structural remains of Bishopton Castle.
- 6.1.2 However, due to a lack of previous archaeological investigation within the Order Limits, the potential for and significance of any such remains could not be accurately assessed on the basis of the available evidence.
- 6.1.3 The Order Limits has been subject to some limited disturbance in the modern period which will have impacted on any below ground remains leading to a loss, or total loss, of significance through the removal of their archaeological interest.
- 6.1.4 The highest potential is for possible archaeological remains from the Iron Age, the Romano British period and the medieval period. Such remains could be up to high heritage significance, depending on a number of factors including their preservation. There is also a potential for remains from the post-medieval period and later which are likely to be agricultural in nature alongside those associated with a First World War airfield.
- 6.1.5 Any adverse impact to buried archaeological features as a result of the implementation of the Proposed Development would be permanent and irreversible in nature. This potential



adverse effect could be reduced through the implementation of an appropriate scheme of archaeological mitigation, in accordance with national and local planning policy.

Appendix 1: Terminology

Glossary

The terminology used in this assessment follows definitions contained within Annex 2 of NPPF:

Archaeological interest	There will be archaeological interest in a heritage asset if it holds, or potentially holds, evidence of past human activity worthy of expert investigation at some point.
Conservation (for heritage policy)	The process of maintaining and managing change to a heritage asset in a way that sustains and, where appropriate, enhances its significance.
Designated heritage asset	A World Heritage Site, Scheduled Monument, Listed Building, Protected Wreck Site, Registered Park and Garden, Registered Battlefield or Conservation Area designated under the relevant legislation.
Heritage asset	A building, monument, Site, place, area or landscape identified as having a degree of significance meriting consideration in planning decisions, because of its heritage interest. It includes designated heritage assets and assets identified by the local planning authority (including local listing).
Historic environment	All aspects of the environment resulting from the interaction between people and places through time, including all surviving physical remains of past human activity, whether visible, buried or submerged, and landscaped and planted or managed flora.
Historic environment record	Information services that seek to provide access to comprehensive and dynamic resources relating to the historic environment of a defined geographic area for public benefit and use.
Setting of a heritage asset	The surroundings in which a heritage asset is experienced. Its extent is not fixed and may change as the asset and its surroundings evolve. Elements of a setting may make a positive or negative contribution to the significance of an asset, may affect the ability to appreciate that significance or may be neutral.
Significance (for heritage policy)	The value of a heritage asset to this and future generations because of its heritage interest. The interest may be archaeological, architectural, artistic or historic. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting. For World Heritage Sites, the cultural value described within each Site's Statement of Outstanding Universal Value forms part of its significance.

The sum of the heritage interests that a heritage asset holds is referred to as its significance. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting.
5.9.4	Some heritage assets have a level of significance that justifies official designation. Categories of designated heritage assets are: <ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ World Heritage Sites▪ Scheduled Monuments▪ Protected Wreck Sites▪ Protected Military Remains▪ Listed Buildings▪ Registered Parks and Gardens▪ Registered Battlefields▪ Conservation Areas Registered Historic Landscapes (Wales only).
5.9.5	There are heritage assets that are not currently designated, but which have been demonstrated to be of equivalent significance to designated heritage assets of the highest significance. These are: <ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ those that the Secretary of State has recognised as being capable of being designated as a Scheduled Monument or Protected Wreck Site but has decided not to designate▪ those that the Secretary of State has recognised as being of equivalent significance to Scheduled Monuments or Protected Wreck Sites but are incapable of being designated by virtue of being outside the scope of the related legislation. Those that have yet to be formally assessed by the Secretary of State, but which have potential to demonstrate equivalent significance to Scheduled Monuments or Protected Wreck Sites.
5.9.6	Non-designated heritage assets of archaeological interest that are demonstrably of equivalent significance to Scheduled Monuments or Protected Wreck Sites should be considered subject to the policies for designated heritage assets. The absence of designation for such heritage assets does not indicate lower significance.

5.9.7	The Secretary of State should also consider the impacts on other non-designated heritage assets (as identified either through the development plan making process by plan-making bodies, including 'local listing', or through the application, examination and decision making process). This is on the basis of clear evidence that such heritage assets have a significance that merits consideration in that process, even though those assets are of lesser significance than designated heritage assets.
5.9.8	Impacts on heritage assets specific to types of infrastructure are included in the technology specific NPSs.
5.9.9	The applicant should undertake an assessment of any likely significant heritage impacts of the proposed development as part of the EIA and describe these along with how the mitigation hierarchy has been applied in the ES (see Section 4.3). This should include consideration of heritage assets above, at, and below the surface of the ground. Consideration will also need to be given to the possible impacts, including cumulative, on the wider historic environment. The assessment should include reference to any historic landscape or seascape character assessment and associated studies as a means of assessing impacts relevant to the proposed project.
5.9.10	As part of the ES the applicant should provide a description of the significance of the heritage assets affected by the proposed development, including any contribution made by their setting. The level of detail should be proportionate to the importance of the heritage assets and no more than is sufficient to understand the potential impact of the proposal on their significance. As a minimum, the applicant should have consulted the relevant Historic Environment Record (or, where the development is in English or Welsh waters, Historic England or Cadw) and assessed the heritage assets themselves using expertise where necessary according to the proposed development's impact.
5.9.11	Where a site on which development is proposed includes, or the available evidence suggests it has the potential to include, heritage assets with an archaeological interest, the applicant should carry out appropriate desk-based assessment and, where such desk-based research is insufficient to properly assess the interest, a field evaluation. Where proposed development will affect the setting of a heritage asset, accurate representative visualisations may be necessary to explain the impact.
5.9.12	The applicant should ensure that the extent of the impact of the proposed development on the significance of any heritage assets affected can be adequately understood from the application and supporting documents. Studies will be required on those heritage assets affected by noise, vibration, light and indirect impacts, the extent and detail of these studies will be proportionate to the significance of the heritage asset affected.
5.9.13	The applicant is encouraged, where opportunities exist, to prepare proposals which can make a positive contribution to the historic environment, and to consider how their scheme takes account of the significance of heritage assets affected. This can include, where possible: <ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ enhancing, through a range of measures such a sensitive design, the significance of heritage assets or setting affected▪ considering where required the development of archive capacity which could deliver significant public benefits considering how visual or noise impacts can affect heritage assets, and whether there may be opportunities to enhance access to, or interpretation, understanding and appreciation of, the heritage assets affected by the scheme
5.9.14	Careful consideration in preparing the scheme will be required on whether the impacts on the historic environment will be direct or indirect, temporary, or permanent.

5.9.15	Applicants should look for opportunities for new development within Conservation Areas and World Heritage Sites, and within the setting of heritage assets, to enhance or better reveal their significance. Proposals that preserve those elements of the setting that make a positive contribution to the asset (or which better reveal its significance) should be treated favourably.
5.9.16	A documentary record of our past is not as valuable as retaining the heritage asset, and therefore the ability to record evidence of the asset should not be a factor in deciding whether such loss should be permitted, and whether or not consent should be given.
5.9.17	Where the loss of the whole or part of a heritage asset's significance is justified, the Secretary of State will require the applicant to record and advance understanding of the significance of the heritage asset before it is lost (wholly or in part). 5.9.23	The Secretary of State must also comply with the requirements on listed buildings, conservation areas and scheduled monuments, set out in Regulation 3 of the Infrastructure Planning (Decisions) Regulations 2010.
5.9.24	In considering the impact of a proposed development on any heritage assets, the Secretary of State should consider the particular nature of the significance of the heritage assets and the value that they hold for this and future generations. This understanding should be used to avoid or minimise conflict between their conservation and any aspect of the proposal.

5.9.32	Where the proposed development will lead to less than substantial harm to the significance of the designated heritage asset, this harm should be weighed against the public benefits of the proposal, including, where appropriate securing its optimum viable use.
5.9.33	In weighing applications that directly or indirectly affect non-designated heritage assets, a balanced judgement will be required having regard to the scale of any harm or loss and the significance of the heritage asset.
5.9.34	Not all elements of a Conservation Area or World Heritage Site will necessarily contribute to its significance. 2.10.108	Above ground impacts may include the effects on the setting of Listed Buildings and other designated heritage assets as well as on Historic Landscape Character.
2.10.109	Below ground impacts, although generally limited, may include direct impacts on archaeological deposits through ground disturbance associated with trenching, cabling, foundations, fencing, temporary haul routes etc.
2.10.110	Equally solar PV developments may have a positive effect, for example archaeological assets may be protected by a solar PV farm as the site is removed from regular ploughing and shoes or low-level piling is stipulated.
2.10.111	Generic historic environment impacts are covered in Section 5.9 of EN-1.
2.10.112	Applicant assessments should be informed by information from Historic Environment Records (HERs) or the local authority.
2.10.113	Where a site on which development is proposed includes, or has the potential to, include heritage assets with archaeological interest, the applicant should submit an appropriate desk-based assessment and, where necessary, a field evaluation. These should be carried out,

	using expertise where necessary and in consultation with the local planning authority, and should identify archaeological study areas and propose appropriate schemes of investigation, and design measures, to ensure the protection of relevant heritage assets.
2.10.114	In some instances, field studies may include investigative work (and may include trial trenching beyond the boundary of the proposed site) to assess the impacts of any ground disturbance, such as proposed cabling, substation foundations or mounting supports for solar panels on archaeological assets.
2.10.115	The extent of investigative work should be proportionate to the sensitivity of, and extent of proposed ground disturbance in, the associated study area.
2.10.116	Applicants should take account of the results of historic environment assessments in their design proposal.
2.10.117	Applicants should consider what steps can be taken to ensure heritage assets are conserved in a manner appropriate to their significance, including the impact of proposals on views important to their setting.
