Dear Mr McDonald,

My company, Alco Estates Ltd, owns the land at Huttoft Bank where it is proposed that the land fall from the sea should be made. The last time I met the representatives of RWE must be over two years ago, and this development was put to me not as a discussion, but as a finished project, and if I did not like it they would be able to use compulsory purchase powers.

I put forward that as it is over 41 miles to Bicker over land and probably close on to a hundred farmers would be affected, non of whom have agreed to this development except one, surely there must be a better route, either down the Wash, where it is only 8 miles to Bicker, or from Skegness where the supply from the other turbines comes ashore. That was dismissed without a second thought. I was informed that the route South of Anderby could not be used as the Lincolnshire Wild Life objected to it, but I am sure that is not true. Mr J Mowbray of R H Mowbray Ltd, my tenant, has very ably covered the technical reasons why the Southern route is more favourable and I would certainly concur with his views and if we are forced to have this development I would not oppose the Southern route.

My family have owned this land since 1943 and the land North of Anderby has been flooded in 1949, 1951, 1953, 1978, and probably many other times since, where the land South of Anderby has only been flooded in 1953. The Roman bank, adjacent to the road, was put there as a second line of defence for sea flooding, and there is a natural gap in the bank on the Southern route.

As a Landlord farmer, whilst the compensation price per acre looks favourable, the actual amount of land that will be paid for is miniscule, but the disturbance will be out of all proportion to the compensation, and I could be in a position of having to replace the drainage system on all the land due to their excavation damage at my own cost and also be faced with tenancy problems.

Whilst I fully appreciate the need for "Renewables" I do not believe The RWE have given enough thought to this project and this disruption that it is going to cause, and I am sure there are more viable alternatives at less cost.
