I'm sending my screen shots again as no idea why they were missing from previous email.


The areas in pink of the maps, are where asbestos was dumped over a period of 25 years by Portsmouth dockyard.

I have composed some screen shots for you to compare with regards to the area of Eastney and Milton where the land fall and trenching of the proposed cable will disturb toxic waste and asbestos.

I am confident that you will agree, that the area designated for the cable, is indeed not suitable for this proposed project.

If you take into account how damaging and deadly asbestos is when disturbed. Parts of Eastney were a dumping ground for a number of decades by Portsmouth dockyard, South of Ferry Road being one of the renowned areas for toxic waste and contains a vast amount of asbestos.

There are many accounts of the area causing illness to children when a development took place in early 1990. 120 people were evacuated because of asbestos dust being disturbed.

The route chosen by Aquind, trails all the way through many other areas of concern that are renowned areas of historical landfill that also contain toxic waste and asbestos.
