To whom it may concern,

I am a resident of Portsmouth, Hampshire, and I am writing to record my objection to the AQUIND interconnector project that Aquind plan to construct between Eastney and Lovedean. If this project goes ahead, it is going to have a detrimental effect on Portsmouth's environmental, economic and residential life.

Most importantly, the route crosses areas that are known to be historically blighted with contaminants which will be disturbed by digging and tunnelling, with the potential to harm the health of residents for years to come. Are you prepared to risk this for the profits of a company, run by individuals with connections to the Kremlin, that has no trading record, and a history of connections to political donations? Where will they be when the costs come in for rectifying the mistakes and damages if this project goes ahead?
