National Grid to consult on plans to reinforce the electricity network in Yorkshire



28th October 2021 - Press release

- The new link and reinforcement of the network is needed to carry more clean energy as the UK strives to achieve its Net Zero target for 2050
- The clean energy will power homes and businesses in Yorkshire and beyond
- Public consultation events and online webinars to start on Thursday 28 October

National Grid is consulting on its detailed plans for the Yorkshire Green Energy Enablement (GREEN) Project. The public consultation will open on Thursday 28 October and will run for six weeks, until Thursday 9 December 2021.

With more energy coming from offshore wind, a new connection from Scotland, and an interconnector from Europe into the North East, the Yorkshire GREEN Project is needed to deliver this new clean energy to homes and businesses.

National Grid plans to create a new link and reinforce the existing electricity network. The proposals include new and upgraded overhead lines, two new substations in the north west of York, and another near the existing Monk Fryston substation, some

pylon and wire replacement, four cable sealing end compounds with short sections of underground cables and some new equipment at existing substations.

This is a statutory consultation. It will give local communities the opportunity to see how their comments from the previous round of consultation have been taken into account and to provide further comments on the plans before National Grid submits a planning application to the Planning Inspectorate in winter 2022/23.

The Yorkshire GREEN proposals span several local authority areas, including North Yorkshire District Council, Hambleton District Council, City of York Council, Leeds City Council, Harrogate Borough Council and Selby District Council.

Residents, businesses, and community groups across Yorkshire are being encouraged to provide feedback, which will help inform the final design of the Yorkshire GREEN Project proposals.

When complete, the Yorkshire GREEN Project will help support the Government's aim for every home in the country to be powered by offshore wind by the end of the decade by providing a new connection which responds to clean energy growth.

Sheena Froggatt, National Grid's Yorkshire GREEN Lead Project Manager, said:

"The Yorkshire GREEN Project will provide the capacity to manage growing energy demand and the massive increase in clean energy that is coming onto the transmission system, supporting national and local Net Zero targets and ambitious Government plans to provide 40GW of electricity from offshore wind by 2030.

"We've carefully considered all the earlier feedback we received on our plans and we are now seeking your views on our more detailed proposals.

"We're looking forward to meeting people at our public consultation events and have also organised online webinar events to give everyone the opportunity to speak to the project team. We're encouraging everyone to get involved in our consultation and visit the project website."

MPs urge city child sex abuse inquiry

NEWMARKET
 A group of MPs has called for an independent inquiry to determine the scale of child sexual exploitation in Bradford.

During a debate in Parliament, Robert Munn, MP for Kirkstall and Riley, said the issue is "being swept under the carpet" and "nothing has really changed" since his Labour predecessor Alan Gymer raised concerns about grooming gangs in Bradford over 30 years ago.

The Tory MP has been urging Bradford Council to order an inquiry similar to the one led by Professor Alexis Jay in Rotherham in 2016, which found an estimated 1,400 children were sexually exploited in the town over a six-year period.

"We know that young children remain at risk. It is about time that we tackled these horrific, vile and criminal activities once and for all," said Mr Munn.

He said a "small minority of largely Pakistani Muslim men" have been abusing children in Bradford "for too long".

"This is not about race or getting communities against each other, it is about looking at the facts so that we can address them and move forward," he added.

Conservative Philip Davies, MP for Shipley, and Labour's Alan Foster, MP for Bradford, backed calls for an inquiry and accused the council and West Yorkshire mayor Tracy Brabin of failing to take decisive action.

Home Office Minister Rachel Hanson-Smith said councils are responsible for addressing local in-

Council leader rejects call

THE LEADER of Bradford Council said it would not order a compulsory inquiry into child sexual abuse, despite mounting pressure from MPs.

Ken Smeaton, council leader, said: "If public services are stretched and we have to focus on what the Ministers highlighted as the absolute priority which is from the protection of children."

"For historic crimes, it doesn't matter when or who perpetrated the crime, they will be caught and they will be punished."

The Labour-sponsored council has commissioned 37 reports on child sexual exploitation in the Bradford district over the last six years.

The council states the response of some agencies is "not yet good enough" and "some children remain unprotected while some perpetrators remain undetected and unprosecuted".

Mr Munn said the "light and limited" review "reflects only the tip of the iceberg of what has been going on."

Councillors in walkout over 'death threats'

Authority accused over safeguarding

A LOCAL authority is facing calls to improve its safeguarding of elected members after announcing it is investigating complaints that councillors have faced death threats in a campaign of harassment.

Almost a third of Scarborough Borough Council elected members walked out of a full meeting of the authority earlier this week in protest over its safeguarding actions, saying urgent action was needed to protect them, particularly in the wake of the murder of MP Sir David Lammy.

Allan Conservative group councillor Bill Clark left the meeting at Scarborough Spa, before former council leader, Councillor Derek Bartman, issued a statement saying the walkout was to highlight they had "no confidence in the council's commitment to safeguarding its members".

He said: "Over the past five years several councillors, former councillors and council officers have been subject to a campaign of abuse, violent threats and harassment."

Police should be informed

FOLLOWING THE meeting, a Scarborough Borough Council spokesman said it took the wellbeing, health, safety and security of all our publicly elected councillors very seriously and offered support and assistance.

He said: "We report any evidence of criminal wrongdoing to the police and encourage elected members to do the same given the fact the police are the appropriate body to deal with criminal conduct."

He said there was no intelligence of an immediate threat. If councillors have any information, they should share that with the council's police.

The statement also alleged two elected members had faced "physical, credible threats to conduct", but the alleged female offender, who cannot be named for legal reasons, had faced no consequences.

Cllr Bartman, who is also a

North Yorkshire County Council cabinet member, said the abuse had threatened the lives of several elected members.

He requested how his colleagues had moved away from their homes due to safety fears and how the county authority had moved quickly to bolster support and security at his home.

However, Cllr Bartman said Scarborough authority, run by Labour Group since 2016, did not appear to be taking the concerns seriously and the walkout had been due to the Conservative group feeling like they had "lapsed their heads against a brick wall".

He said: "We have no confidence in Scarborough Borough Council in taking our concerns seriously or attempting to resolve the issue. We await a response from the council as to what they intend to do to help protect its members from harassment and abuse."

Before the walkout, Cllr Liz Collins said the administration task its duty of care and safeguarding seriously.

North Yorkshire Police said it would not confirm whether anyone was under investigation over the allegations.



Award recognises work of museum volunteers

Halloween arsonists set fire to bus stop

POLICE ARE looking into multiple cases of arson and anti-social behaviour close to a bus stop sited on Halloween.

Officers said a probe into the burning of the Cover Road bus stop in Hull was one of several investigations into incidents in and around Burnley Playing Fields.

The police said parts

had been stepped up in the area to try to catch the perpetrators and to reassure locals.

In one case a group of youths stole a white van before taking them to the bus stop and burning them on Sunday. Fire and rescue officers showed high winds whipping up flames and smoke which rose above surrounding trees.

The Burnley Police spokesman said anti-social behaviour like that seen on Sunday would not be tolerated. He said anyone with information should contact the force which is currently following up on several lines of enquiry.

He added: "We are investigating a number of incidents of arson and anti-social behaviour."

Providing psychological support to families

WHILE THERE may be many emotional challenges for families whose children are living with a life-limiting condition from the point of diagnosis and throughout their child's life, we aim to support through such challenging times, helping children, young people and their families to build on their unique strengths and resilience.

We often talk about the holistic model of our care at Martin House and the ways we try to sensitively support families make the most of the precious time they have with their children.

Our team delivers holistic nursing and medical care to children and young people and intrinsically linked into that is the psychological and emotional support that the team also give to individuals

and their families. Our psychological support isn't necessarily about having one-to-one sessions with someone in a formal sense, but it is built into every interaction that each member of our team has with families, throughout their time using our services.

Behind the scenes, our team is constantly developing how to have important conversations with our young people and their families and also practical ways of supporting them on their unique journeys.

Martin House is one of only few children's hospices with a dedicated clinical psychologist, helping us to provide psychologically-informed support and interventions to the children, young people and families for whom we care.

Psychologically-informed

care starts the moment a family has their first contact with Martin House, from the moment they arrive at the door.

Considering individuals' emotional health and psychological wellbeing comes into everything we do. It's a

very important part of care, and the whole team keep this in mind throughout, working compassionately to help people to feel safe, connecting with them and listening to what's important to them. We recognise that our families are meeting emotional challenges,

and that's why we look at what we can offer at all times, and be responsive to their needs.

The psychologist's role is to support the team in their emotional and psychological care of children, young people and families and to integrate this with the work of the care and medical team, chaplain, creative therapists and counsellors.

There might also be times when a more specific psychological intervention is required and that could be offered on an individual basis.

The family support team might also offer some time to individuals and families in processing what they are experiencing and in recognising their strengths and skills for coping with situations that come their way, perhaps exploring additional strategies or other support

that might be useful for them.

The family support team includes psychology, chaplaincy, wellbeing, art and music therapy and bereavement care, which all offer forms of emotional support to children, young people and their families, throughout the different stages of their journey.

Psychological and emotional support at Martin House is integral to all aspects of our care for children, young people and families. We work closely together as a multi-disciplinary team across the hospice, being different pieces of the puzzle, offering something slightly different from one another but working closely together to complete the picture of compassionate, holistic care with children, young people and families at the very centre.

Councillors in walkout over 'death threats'

Authority accused over safeguarding

A LOCAL authority is being told to improve its safeguarding of elected members after announcing it is investigating complaints that councillors have faced death threats in "a campaign of harassment".

About a third of Scarborough Borough Council's elected members walked out of a full meeting of the authority earlier this week, in protest over its safeguarding actions, saying urgent action was needed to protect them, particularly in the wake of the murder of MP David Amess.

All 12 Conservative group councillors and independent councillor Bill Chant left the meeting at Scarborough Spa, before Labour council leader Gwyn Iwan Hartman, released a statement saying the walkout was to highlight they had "no confidence in the council's commitment to safeguarding its members".

He said: "Over the past few years several Conservative council members and council officers have been subject to a campaign of abuse, violent threats and harassment."

Police should be informed

FOLLOWING THE meeting, a Scarborough Borough Council spokesman said that the wellbeing, health, safety and security of all our publicly elected councillors very seriously and offered support and assistance.

He said: "We report any evidence of violence or threats to the police and encourage elected members to do the same given the fact the police are the appropriate body to deal with criminal matters."

He said there was no intelligence of an immediate threat. It is unclear how evidence of threats, harassment or intimidation they would share that with the council or police.

The statement also alleged two elected members had faced "graphic, credible threats to murder", but the alleged threats of murder, who cannot be named for legal reasons, had faced repercussions.

Gwyn Hartman, who is also a

North Yorkshire County Council cabinet member, said the abuse had shattered the lives of several elected members.

He mentioned how his wife, Lyzette, had moved away from their home due to safety fears and how the county authority had caused difficulty to balance support and security of his home.

However, Gwyn Hartman said Scarborough authority, run by Labour Group since May, did not appear to be taking the necessary seriously and the walkout had been due to the Conservative group feeling like they had "banged their heads against a brick wall".

He said: "We have no confidence in Scarborough Borough Council in taking our concerns seriously or attempting to resolve the issues. We want a response from the council as to what they intend to do to help protect its members from harassment and abuse."

Before the walkout, Gwyn Iwan Hartman said the administration took its duty of care and safeguarding seriously.

On-the-run rapist caught, starting nine years in jail

A CONVICTED rapist on the run for more than six weeks is starting his jail sentence.

Jason Vincent Longhurst failed to attend his trial but it went ahead in his absence.

When he appeared before York Crown Court on a bench warrant, the Recorder of York, Judge Sean Morris, told him he had been convicted of rape and attempted strangulation of a teenager with intent to rape her.

He had also been given a nine-year prison sentence. Longhurst, 44, of Lindsey Avenue, York, showed no reaction to the news.

He pleaded guilty to failure to attend York Crown Court on September 6, the second time in three weeks he had failed to attend court.

His case was adjourned for the Crown Prosecution Service to decide if it wants to apply for a sexual harm prevention order which would curb his behaviour upon release.

A woman in the public gallery cried as he was taken down to start serving his nine-year sentence.

A judge will decide on November 9 how much extra he will serve for not attending his trial and whether he should be made subject to a sexual harm prevention order. Longhurst will be on the sex offenders register for life.

North Yorkshire Police said after the hearing he had been arrested in East Yorkshire and thanked

supporting the victim's account that she had been throttled and heard from witnesses who heard the victim scream during the rape and saw Longhurst flee the house where it happened.

Jailing Longhurst for nine years, Recorder Marjia Mostafa said the rape had had a "catastrophic effect" on the victim and praised her courage and the way she had given evidence. In a personal statement, the victim said: "I cannot put into words how much this has ruined my life."

While the trial was in progress, police began their search for Longhurst, the second time they had had to find him after he failed to attend court.

On August 18, Longhurst had been due to appear before York Magistrates Court charged with driving whilst disqualified and other driving offences.

When he didn't attend, a warrant was signed for his arrest. It was executed in Wales on September 1.

Cardiff magistrates bailed him on conditions, including a curfew at his address in Lindsey Avenue. But when police went there on the first day of his trial - and that night when he should have been at home observing the curfew - no-one answered the door.

In September, a York Crown Court jury heard how Longhurst,

had throttled a teenager in York until she blacked out and then raped her many years ago. He had been released from

Cap lifted to allow 8,500 at stadium

THOUSANDS more spectators will be able to cheer on York's sports clubs as capacity restrictions at the Community Stadium are lifted. The milestone follows assessments of matchday arrangements, with the new stadium at Monks Cross now able to operate at full capacity of 8,500. The decision is timely for York City, with a big crowd expected for the FA Cup first round proper clash with Buxton this Saturday. York's Safety at Sports Advisory Group granted York Stadium Management Company, which operates the stadium, the 'unrestricted' certificate on Tuesday.

Martin Jesper, general manager of the management company, said it had invested in measures to enable the increased capacity and ensure the infrastructure was in place to allow for 'continual improvements in match day operations, the functionality of the ticketing system and the quality of the pitch'. "Since the stadium opened in May 2021, and with the

operational maturity of the stadium continuing to evolve, we have addressed a variety of implementation issues that have been brought to our attention either directly by the clubs using the facilities or their supporters. "We have greatly valued that ongoing feedback as it has allowed us to improve the way we operate behind the scenes while also welcoming more than 28,000

spectators during the three months to September. The capacity has been limited to 4,000 since late August when the advisory group upgraded it from the previous cap of 2,000. Cllr Darryl Smalley, executive member for culture, leisure and communities, said: "This is another positive milestone for what is a stunning new facility for the community."

WDH boss's 8.7 per cent rise

A HOUSING association has declined to say exactly how much its chief executive takes home, after his overall pay package reportedly rose by nearly nine per cent.

Wakefield District Housing (WDH) chief Andy Wallhead saw his salary increase from £207,000 to £225,000 during the last financial year, trade publication Housing Today revealed last week.

The publication said the rise of 8.7 per cent was the third biggest of any housing association chief across the UK during that time.

Meanwhile WDH's staff were given a lump sum increase of £350 each last January, plus a £300 bonus and an extra 2.5 days 'discretionary' annual leave.

Unions had asked for more, but WDH wrote to staff saying it

couldn't offer anything beyond that.

Rents for social housing tenants have also risen this year, with a 1.5 per cent increase applied to a number of properties.

However, WDH said the reported £225,000 figure reflects "pay and other benefits" for Mr Wallhead, and that his actual salary had only increased by £350, to £207,350.

It also said Mr Wallhead "chooses not to accept the full salary for the role".

When asked exactly how much he does accept however, WDH said this was "personal information" and could not be revealed.

A spokesperson for the organisation said: "The level of remuneration offered to WDH's management team is independently scrutinised and benchmarked and approved by WDH's board."

Explaining the pay increase for staff, WDH said: "The decision to pay a lump sum in place of a percentage increase, was made in order to reduce the

widening gap between employees, with those earning the least seeing the biggest benefit."

In a January letter to staff, which has been seen by the Local Democracy Reporting Service (LDRS), Mr Wallhead said: "We do not feel it would be right for us to award ourselves a higher pay rise in a year when we have increased rents for tenants, who are likely to be the hardest hit by any economic challenges resulting from Covid-19."

"Our approach to this, and other financial matters, is to ensure that we are prudent so that our business remains strong and we are able to protect jobs and the core terms and conditions that we all enjoy."

WDH operates around 32,000 properties in the local area. In the mid 2000s it took over all of the existing social housing stock in the district, which had previously been run by Wakefield Council.

"To ensure we have a board that is able to provide good governance, we have increased the number of members, bringing the skills our organisation needs."

Travel centre closed by Arriva

ARRIVA HAS said it shut the travel centre at Wakefield Bus Station because it 'wasn't commercially viable'.

Local councillors have criticised the closure, which has forced passengers to go elsewhere if they need to renew passes or access information.

Arriva released a statement saying that the centre was closed as fewer customers were using it and buying digital tickets.

Coun Olivia Rowley, Labour member for Wakefield East said the decision had resulted in a "huge loss for local residents", at a meeting last week.

Passengers from Wakefield now have to go to travel centres in Pontefract, Castleford or Leeds, if they can't get the service they need online.

Wakefield Council has said it is looking into the possibil-

ity of accommodating a centre within its city centre Wakefield One building, where passengers would be able to renew passes, to compensate.

Coun Rowley said: "Any action that encourages people to use public transport and keeps them informed is to be welcomed.

"I hope something can be done as quickly as possible.

"People are very frustrated that they can't get the details they want."

Arriva has also said that printed timetables could soon be reintroduced, amid criticism from passengers who can't access them online.

The operator said physical copies of timetables were stopped during the pandemic due to ever-changing adjustments to services. The company said that the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) "intend to start printing timetables again".

"The centre wasn't commercially viable and as a result of the pandemic, we found that many customers had found alternative means of getting information and buying tickets.

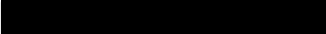

Macmillan was nothing short of amazing. We also wanted to make sure this financial help went to the local branch of the charity as we know there is a shortage of services in our local area."

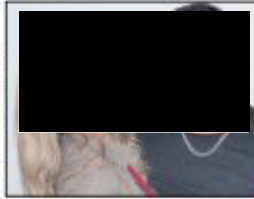
The couple have fully funded the skydive themselves so all the money raised from their challenge will go directly to the charity.

Man pleads guilty to assault charges

A Goole man has pleaded guilty to a string of offences including assaulting three police officers, as well as possessing two offensive weapons in a public place.

Cary Nicholls, of Church Close, appeared at Hull Magistrates' Court on October 18 charged with the six offences, which all took place between January and October this year.

The 46-year-old admitted to the assaulting of a woman by beating as well as assaulting a police officer by spitting on them, claiming to have Covid-19 and then attempting to bite them, in an incident on January 15. He also admitted to the assault by beating of two police officers and to possessing a 32cm silver chef's knife as well as a silver claw hammer in a public place, namely Jackson Street on October 15.

Mr Nicholls was remanded in custody and will appear at Hull Magistrates' Court again on November 8 for sentencing.

Gilberdyke man is guilty of assault

A man from Gilberdyke has been ordered to pay £250 compensation and banned from driving for 18 months after being found guilty of assault and dangerous driving.

David Jensen, of Manor Drive, appeared at Humber Magistrates' Court on October 18 charged with the two offences which both took place in Faxfleet on December 12, 2020. The 54-year-old was found guilty after standing trial and was handed a community order, ordered to pay compensation of £250 and hit with a driving ban.

Businessman found guilty of endangering the flight which killed footballer Emiliano Sala

East Yorkshire businessman David Henderson has been found guilty of endangering the flight which killed Cardiff City striker Emiliano Sala.

The 28-year-old footballer and pilot David Ibbotson, from Crowle, died on 21 January 2019 after their plane, which was travelling from Nantes to Cardiff, crashed into the English Channel.

Henderson was accused of failing to adhere to safety protocols while arranging the flight.

The 67-year-old denied acting in a reckless or negligent manner, but a jury found him guilty on Thursday, October 28, after a nine-day trial.

Henderson hired Ibbotson despite the pilot not having a commercial licence and not being allowed to fly at night. A court also heard Ibbotson, 59, was 'not competent' to fly in bad weather.

Henderson was also accused of

employing Ibbotson in the knowledge his licence to fly the N264DB plane had expired.

The single-engine Piper Malibu went down north of Guernsey in stormy conditions.

Sala's body was recovered by a private salvage operation one month after the crash. He was travelling to the United Kingdom after joining Cardiff in a £15million transfer.

The body of Ibbotson was never recovered.

After the tragic event, Henderson sent texts saying: "B***** disaster. There will be an enquiry."

Prosecutor Martin Goudie QC previously told the court Henderson - a former RAF officer - ran an "incompetent, undocumented, risk creating and dishonest" enterprise.

He added: "The longer they operated the more risks were taken and the worse it got. What he did was not an accident, what he

did here was deliberate and reckless."

The defence claimed the accused had fallen foul of a "paperwork issue" and insisted Ibbotson's ability as a pilot was not affected by his lack of a commercial licence.

"It is ultimately the pilot in command's responsibility," said Henderson as he addressed the court.

Henderson will be sentenced on November 12.

Judge Mr Justice Fuxton said: "All sentencing options are on the table. I make that clear. It will continue on the same terms but that is no indication towards sentence."

A post-mortem after the devastating crash showed the player had been exposed to high levels of carbon monoxide. The Air Accidents Investigation Branch suggested Ibbotson may also have been exposed, potentially leading to unconsciousness or drowsiness.

10 homes on Grove Drive, South Kirby.

A separate report to be considered by the cabinet also recommends Grove Drive for approval.

It's intended that this site will provide a number of specialist homes for people with pro-

found learning difficulties and autism plus other bungalows for people with mobility needs.

Coun Denise Jeffery, said: "We're taking a lead in delivering hundreds of new affordable homes because it's an issue that's critical to people's lives."

"Having a good home that is safe and warm gives stability and reduces the stress and pressure that people might be under."

"As such, there's major barriers to residents being able to afford a home, which can have a negative impact on our workforce and the wider economy. Providing new affordable housing will help those most in need of good quality housing while also supporting them to keep their jobs and spend locally."

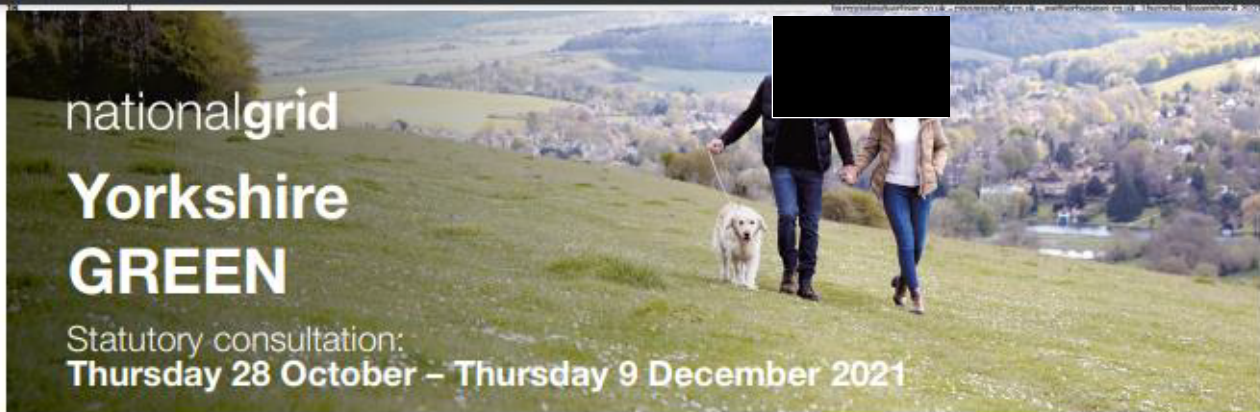

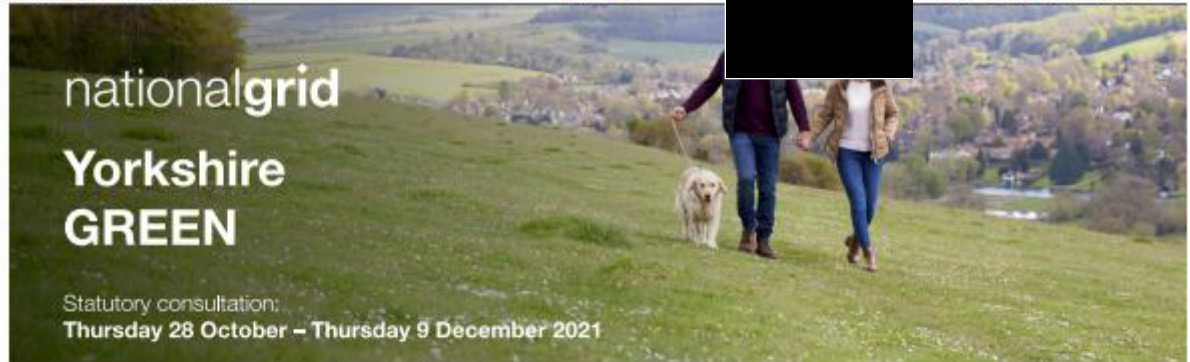

BBC is urged to give full refunds in TV mast saga

THE BBC has come under increased pressure to fully reimburse all those affected by the Bilsdale TV mast saga for their months of lost signal.

The corporation is sticking to its arrangements for partial refunds of the TV licence, in sharp contrast to mast operators Arqiva, which has already given 3,000 people £50 vouchers for streaming sticks.

The infrastructure company also revealed that TV services have improved for 6,000 more households across the region, with further smaller relay sites to be switched on and a new secondary 80-metre mast under construction at Bilsdale.

A BBC spokesperson said that its stance had not changed on the subject and an update would be provided in due course.

The spokesperson said: "We are continuing to assist customers where possible and the refund process is ongoing.

"If a household has been unable to receive TV coverage for over a month, and is also unable to view BBC programming through BBC iPlayer, and satellite and cable platforms, they will be able to claim a refund or be offered a free extension to their TV licence, depending

on their TV licensing payment plan. Those who have already contacted TV licensing and have not had services restored will automatically receive a partial refund or licence extension for the second month."

MPs have spoken of their "disappointment" over the BBC's decision to not issue full refunds to those affected.

Jacob Young, Conservative MP for Redcar, said: "It is very disappointing that BBC Licensing has, so far, still refused to offer refunds to many of the customers who were left without service due to the Bilsdale transmitter fire in August.

"I thank Arqiva for their work in trying to reinstate coverage with the temporary mast and for offering vouchers for alternative devices to support those living in 'not spots' where coverage remains poor.

"But the BBC needs to recognise its responsibilities to those who pay for its very existence through the licence fee. When people pay for a service that is not delivered, the provider should deal with that in the same way you would expect

from a private provider." Kevin Hollinrake, MP for Thirsk and Malton, confirmed that he had written to the BBC about the ongoing issue.

He said: "I fully understand the frustration of those of my constituents who are affected by this ongoing issue. I have

previously written to the BBC on this, and met with and written to Arqiva a number of times. The fact that many people have been without service since August and have been paying either a full or partial licence fee since then is not acceptable."

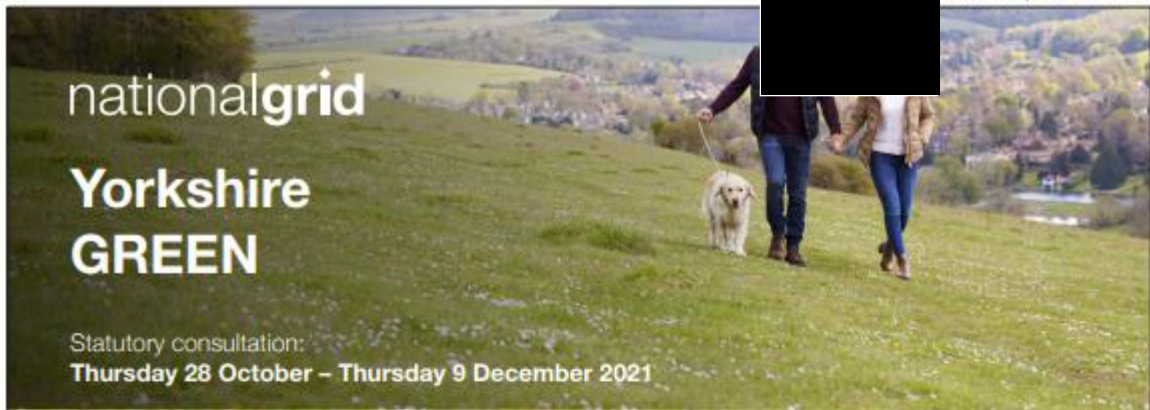

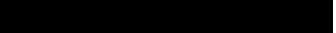

Trust Celebrates Passing Impressive Recycling Milestone

Outwood Grange Academies Trust & Trutex Have Helped Save Over 1 Million Plastic Bottles From Landfill.

A leading family of schools has passed the incredible milestone of saving over one million plastic bottles this year, thanks to its uniform being made from recycled bottles by its uniform supplier, Trutex.

The uniform at Outwood Grange Academies Trust's 24 secondary schools across the North of England (including Outwood Academy Easingwold and Outwood Primary Academy Airedale) consists of blazers and trousers that are manufactured by Trutex, made using fabric that has been manufactured from recycled drinks bottles.

The data is taken from sales on the Trutex Direct website for each academy and also each academy's Direct to School account.

Katy Bradford, Chief Operating Officer at the Outwood Family, said: "This is an incredible achievement and one we are very proud to have accomplished. We are passionate about the issue of sustainability and we work hard across the Outwood Family to spread awareness of it."

"We are delighted that our relationship with Trutex continues to help us promote sustainability and managing to save over one million plastic bottles from ending up in landfill having managed to save over 600,000 previous academic year is something we take great pride in."

Each Trutex blazer saves around 36 plastic bottles from ending up in a landfill site while a pair of boys' trousers saves 19 bottles. The numbers for Outwood have been calculated from the Outwood blazers and boy's trousers ordered from

Trutex. The Trust provides every child who joins the school with a free set of uniform, including their blazer.

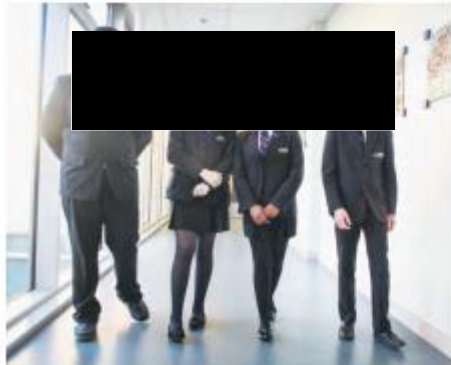
To make a yarn suitable for use in high quality Trutex blazers and boy's trousers, the plastic bottles are put together in a bale which is then broken down into flake. The flake then goes through a de-polymerization and re-polymerization process to make recycled chips which are melted and extruded to make yarn.

The yarn is then woven into the high quality fabric that is used to make the Outwood Family blazer.

Matthew Easter, CEO at Trutex, said: "We are proud to supply Outwood Grange Academies and were delighted to reach the significant milestone of saving over 1 million plastic bottles from landfill. Our own commitment in sustainability is aligned with the Trust having had carbon neutral status since 2012 and also launching our own uniform recycling project. We look forward to saving even more bottles next year and help provide parents with a Pre-loved uniform option."

The issue of sustainability is promoted heavily across the Outwood Family with many initiatives being led by students, including the Sustainable Outwood Schools programme. This was first created by Lily Ford, who recently took part in a roundtable discussion at the 2021 Climate Education Summit, hosted by the University of Reading.

The milestone news comes months after Outwood and Trutex launched a recycling campaign that saw a recycle bin housed at each of the Outwood academies, over 35 in total, that enabled students and their families to donate items of school uniform that they no longer wear or need. These items will then be collected by Trutex

to be repaired, if necessary, washed and made ready for purchase as pre-loved uniform items.

The figures behind the reason for the campaign are eye-catching as by extending the life of clothing by just nine months can reduce carbon and water usage by up to 10%, while helping reduce the staggering amount of garments that are sent to landfill every year, a figure that currently stands at over 350,000 tonnes of clothing every year.

Katy added: "Our vision is students first, and this goes beyond the classroom for us. Our students of today are the adults of tomorrow and it's our duty to support them in their efforts to ensure the world they inherit is a healthy one."

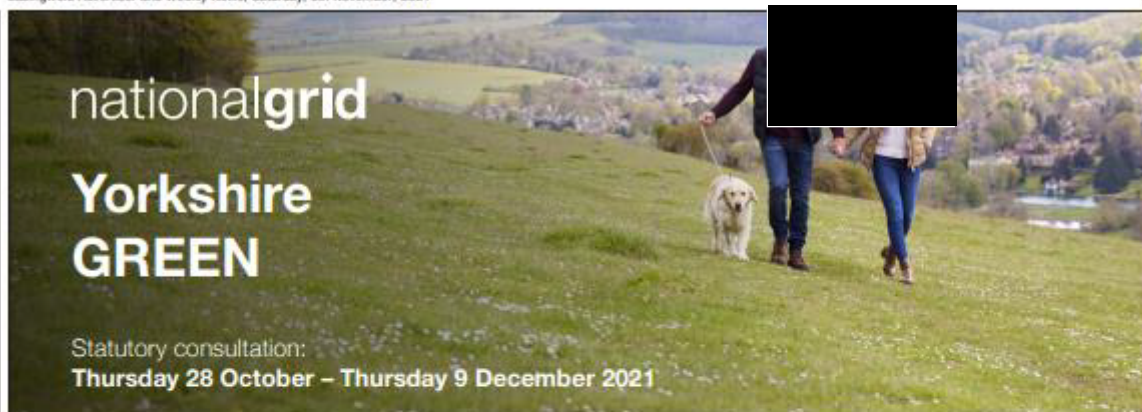

COUNTRYSIDE IGNORED IN CHANCELLOR'S BUDGET

Plans to help level up the countryside have been ignored in the Chancellor of the Exchequer's spending plans.

In the Budget announced by Rishi Sunak in the House of Commons, there is a lack of detail on how the government aims to help unleash the potential of the rural economy – a missed opportunity for the countryside.

If government brought its 'levelling up' agenda to the countryside and focused on reducing the productivity gap, up to £43bn could be added to the economy with the creation of hundreds of thousands of good jobs.

Victoria Vyvyan, Vice President of the Country Land & Business Association (CLA) which represents 28,000 rural businesses, farmers and land managers across England and Wales, said:

"Today's Budget shows government has no plan to create prosperity in rural areas. All too often, when government talks about the countryside they do so in the context of keeping it the same. But there is no ambition to show what the countryside could be – a vibrant part of the economy that creates jobs and encourages entrepreneurship, all the while building strong communities in which people can afford to live.

"The rural economy is 18% less productive than the national average, largely due to poor infrastructure, poor skills provision and an outdated planning regime. As a result, underemployment and deprivation take root. However, if government brought its 'levelling up' agenda to the countryside and focused on reducing the productivity gap, up to £43bn could be added to the economy with the creation of hundreds of thousands of good jobs. Today was a missed opportunity.

"The announcement to build more

homes on brownfield sites might make sense, but given less than 10% of available sites are in rural areas it will do nothing to ease the rural housing crisis. Nobody wants to concrete over the countryside, least of all us, but instead of treating rural communities as museums government should support small scale developments – adding small numbers of homes to a large number of villages, helping to provide good housing for local people whilst also boosting the local economy."

A plan to simplify alcohol duties, with taxes cut on English and Welsh sparkling wine and draught beer and cider, was also set out.

Business rates

The CLA welcomes the reform of business rates - something which we have campaigned for over many months as part of our Rural Powerhouse Campaign.

In its responses to several consultations on the business rates regime in the past 18 months, the CLA had repeatedly argued that rural businesses should not be penalised for installing small-scale renewable energy generation, given the urgency of the Net Zero agenda.

We are delighted that the Chancellor has announced a new green technology exemption and 100% relief for eligible heat networks. The CLA will work closely to scrutinise the eligibility definitions to ensure this covers rural-scale installations. The relief on property improvements could also be of benefit to diversifying rural businesses, although the scope is as yet unclear.

Hospitality and tourism businesses

The freeze of the multiplier and temporary 50% discount for retail, leisure and hospitality businesses,

which will help put these hard-hit sectors back on an even keel, is something the CLA supports. However, we urge the government to continue its reforms so that the proportionality of the whole business rate system across businesses is improved.

Annual Investment Allowance: £1 million allowance extended to 2023

The CLA welcomes this budget measure and had been campaigning for such split as part of its Rural Powerhouse initiative. By increasing the level of relief to £1 million, rural businesses would be incentivised to invest on enhancing their productivity, which is crucial in the post-Brexit and post-Covid era. This temporary increase will particularly benefit those who regularly invest more than £200,000 in qualifying plant and machinery.

CLA COMMENTS ON 25-YEAR ENVIRONMENT PLAN PROGRESS REPORT

Defra has published its latest progress report for the 25-Year Environment Plan. CLA President highlights that these problems can't be fixed overnight and will come at a cost.

The annual report, which began in 2018, outlines the progress that the government has made and sets out future opportunities.

Farmers and land managers are in a key position to contribute to the ambitions of the plan across nature, water, air and climate.

The plan galvanizes government action alongside the long-awaited Environment Act, with commitments such as the target for 30% protected

land by 2030.

Mark Bridgeman, President of the CLA, said:

"It's encouraging to see progress across the sector has been made. But the report is frank in its 'asks' that rural businesses need to go further in making environmental improvements and becoming greener."

"These problems cannot be fixed overnight and will come at a significant cost, which is why the CLA is lobbying government to support changes including Catchment Sensitive Farming, grant funding to fast-track adoption of better practices, and in the design of the new Environmental Land Management schemes."

CLA URGES BONFIRE NIGHT ORGANIZERS TO BAN SKY LANTERNS

The CLA (Country Land and Business Association) is once again urging local authorities, community groups and private individuals staging Bonfire Night displays not to release sky lanterns, ideally, banning them altogether.

The CLA also encourages farmers and land owners hosting bonfires to take extra care on their land, especially in the vicinity of farm buildings, hay barns and other highly combustible areas on their land.

The CLA has been campaigning for a total ban for a number of years, and will continue to do so for the sake of farming, wildlife, the environment and property owners everywhere.

On a local level, the CLA urges councils who have not yet introduced bans to give it some serious consideration, and balance the decision in favour of many people who have to deal with the unintended

consequences of releasing sky lanterns and balloons.

CLA Director North Lucinda Douglas said: "While Bonfire Night offers a chance for people to enjoy themselves at one of the many organized displays across the region, we would like them to do this without releasing sky lanterns. Releasing a naked flame with absolutely no control over where it will land is a serious threat to rural businesses, livestock, wildlife and the environment."

"An increasing number of local authorities are banning the release of lanterns from council-owned land, and we hope the Government will take note of a growing desire to see the use of these 'flying bonfires' banned outright."

"Prevention is better than cure, and safety should be a primary consideration for those hosting bonfires."

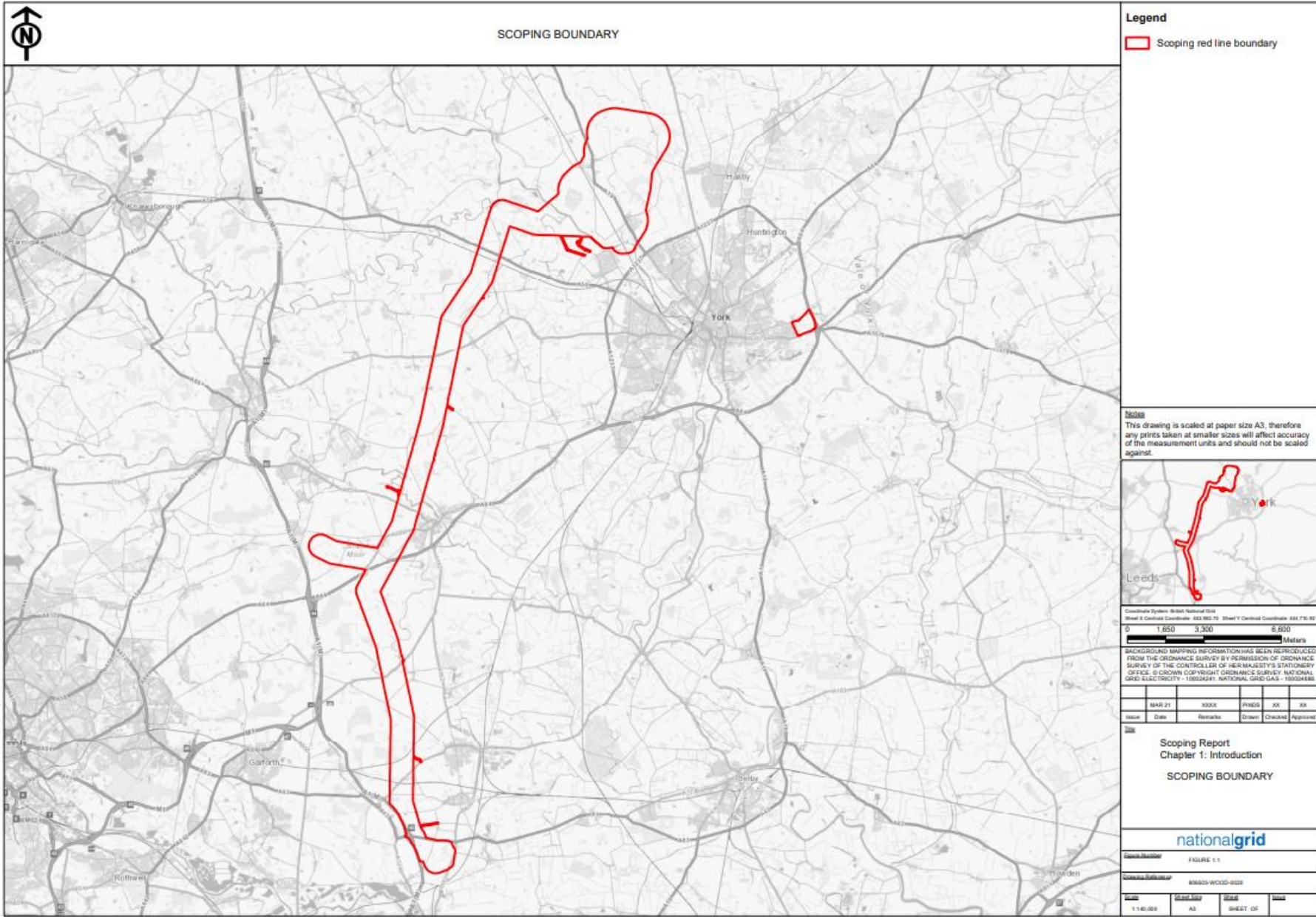

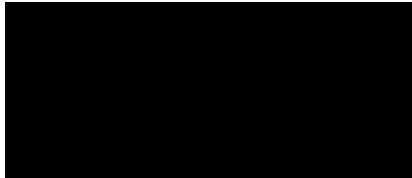

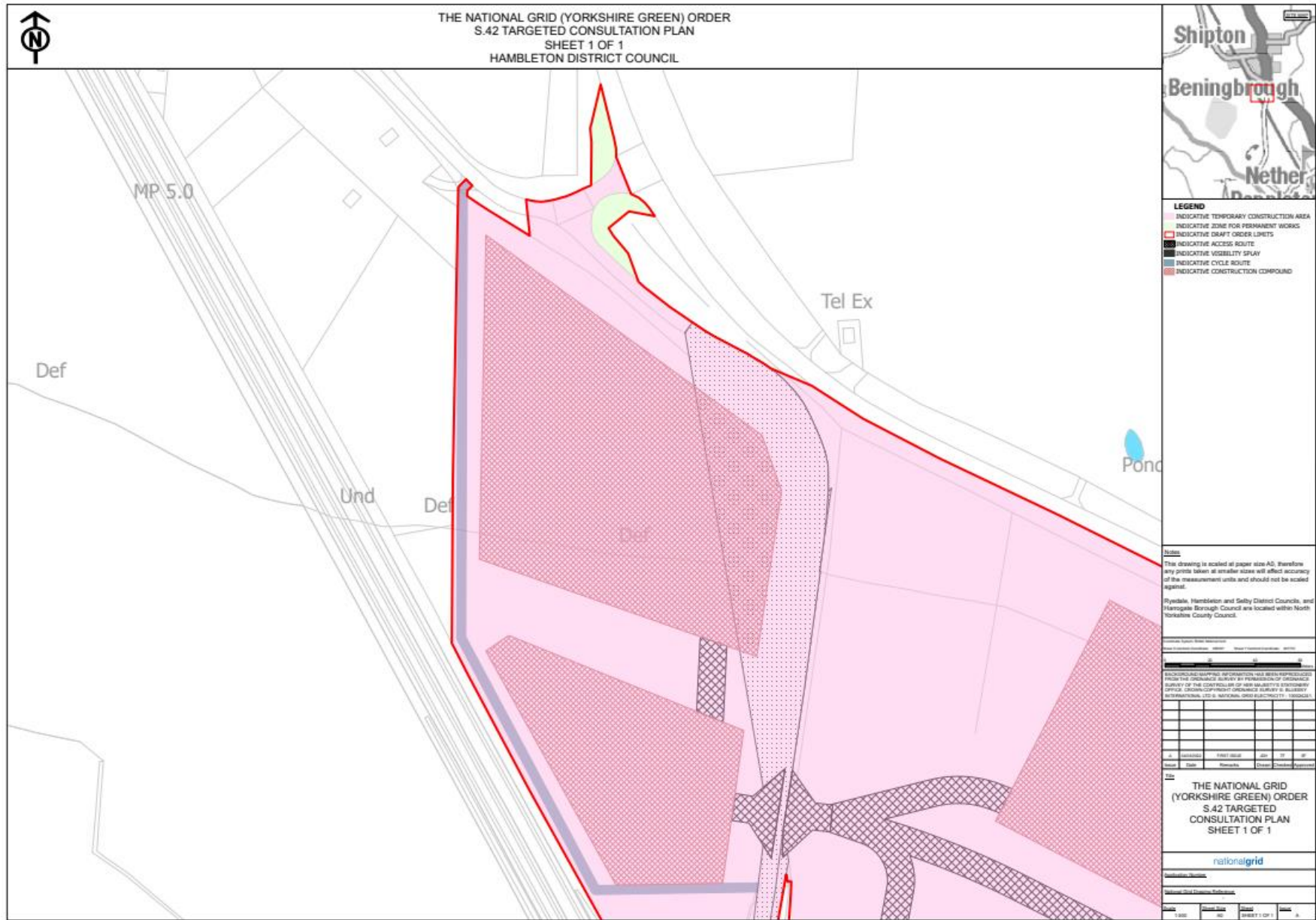

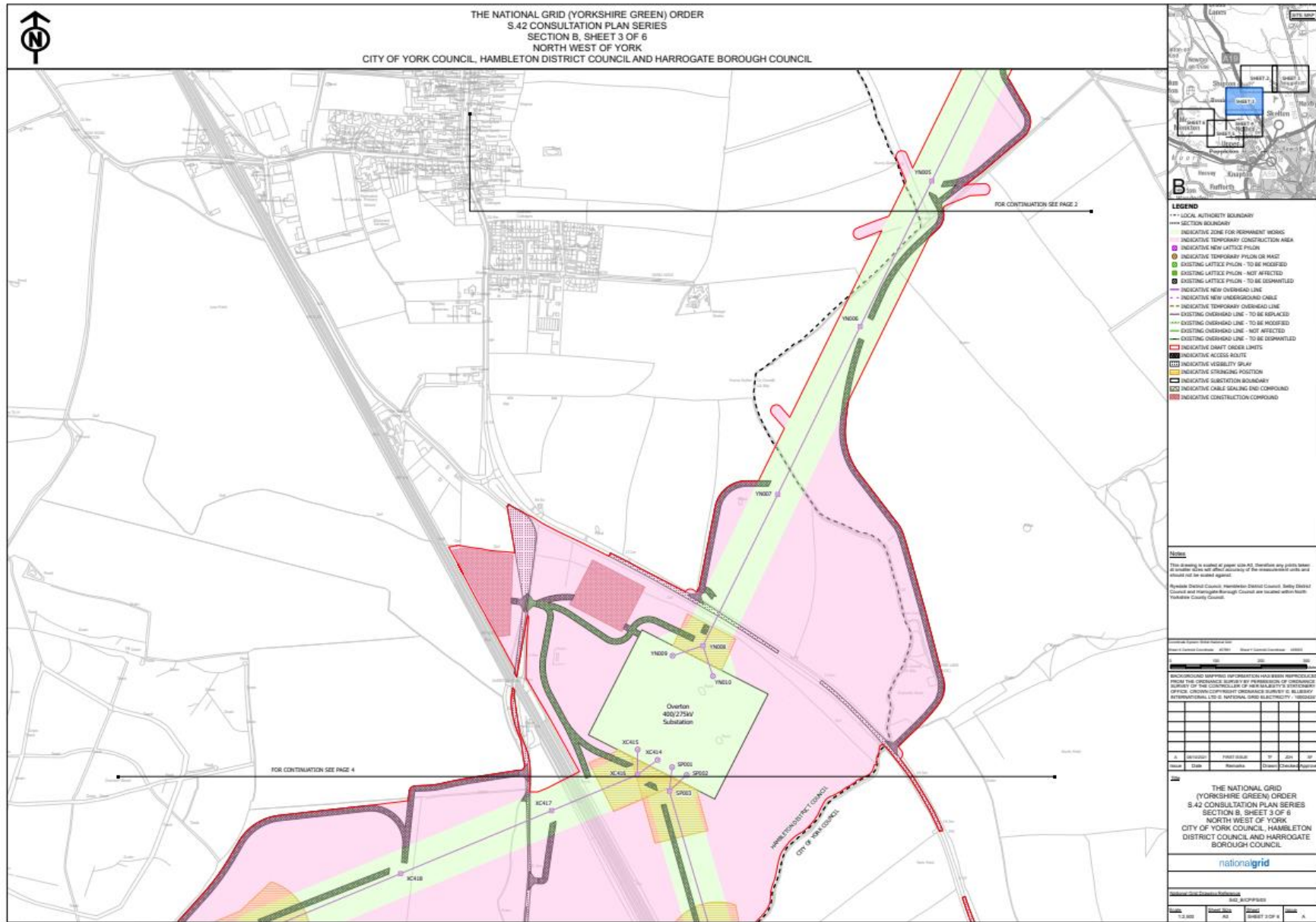

The new access to the southeast of pylon XC472 from the A659 would seek to utilise an existing bellmouth, be shorter in length and only require one watercourse crossing via a bridge. Construction vehicles would access pylon XC472 by turning off the A659 using the existing bellmouth and along the existing track. The proposed access route would then diverge off the existing track to the northwest between a row of trees and cross the watercourse south of the River Wharfe before heading across the field towards pylon XC472.

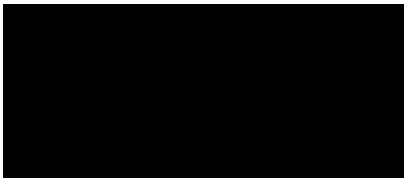

YORKSHIRE GREEN ENERGY ENABLEMENT (GREEN) PROJECT

TARGETED CONSULTATION: SECTION 42 OF THE PLANNING ACT 2008 (AS AMENDED)

We previously wrote to you to consult you on National Grid Electricity Transmission plc's ("NGET") proposed Yorkshire Green Energy Enablement (GREEN) Project (the "Project") and are now writing to you to consult you on some changes we propose to make as detailed later in this letter prior to submitting the Application for development consent.


NGET is proposing to upgrade and reinforce the electricity transmission system in Yorkshire. This reinforcement is needed to improve the transfer of clean energy across the country. It will support the Government's commitment to quadruple the UK's offshore wind capacity by 2030. It will also support growth in this source of green energy in Scotland and the north-east of England by providing the capability to efficiently manage substantially increased power flows in Great Britain and increased energy demand, which the Climate Change Committee ("CCC") predicts will double by 2050.

The Project will comprise approximately 7km of new overhead lines, a number of cable sealing end compounds, underground cables and two new substations (one near Overton and one near Monk Fryston), to link two existing overhead lines and to reinforce the system to increase the capacity of the network in the Yorkshire area. It will also include additional improvements and strengthening works to existing infrastructure, including existing overhead lines (conductors), fittings and pylons, utility diversions, connections and drainage works.

The Project is sited within Yorkshire, routed from the most northerly components of the Project located approximately 1.5km north-east of the village of Shipton-by-Beningbrough and approximately 10km north-west of York city centre, to the most southerly components at Monk Fryston Substation, located to the east of the A1 and immediately south of the A63. The Project would also be routed via the Tadcaster area, located approximately 3km south-west of Tadcaster and to the north-east of the A64/A659 junction, where new components of infrastructure would also be proposed.

The Project is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project ("NSIP") under the Act and requires an application for development consent via the Planning Inspectorate to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy. The development consent being sought will include a number of other provisions, including those which authorise the compulsory acquisition of land and rights over land, if necessary, to construct and maintain the Project.

Due to its nature and size, the Project is subject to the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the "EIA Regulations"). We are therefore carrying out an Environmental Impact Assessment ("EIA"). NGET launched a statutory consultation for the Project on Thursday 28 October 2021 which ended to the public at 23:59 on Thursday 9 December 2021. We consulted on the potential environmental effects of the Project during the statutory consultation in 2021. This information is detailed in the Preliminary Environmental Information Report ("PEIR"). An Environmental Statement will be produced subsequently in accordance with the EIA Regulations and will accompany the application for development consent.

Proposed changes to the Project

Since the 2021 statutory consultation, further work has been undertaken to progress the design of the Project which has also been developed in light of feedback received. As a result, we have made changes to the Project and so are consulting you on these as a consultee under either section 42(1)(a) or (b) of the Act, as we consider you may have an interest in the proposed changes to the Project.

At statutory consultation two options were identified to enable access to the existing pylon XC472, from the northwest off Croft Lane, Tadcaster near to Newton Kyme and the other from the A659 to the southwest of pylon XC472. The access from the northwest is very long and would require upgrades to existing bridges and culverts, as well as being in close proximity to Newton Kyme. The access to the southwest would be required to cross boggy/wet ground requiring significant groundworks and watercourse crossings (via bridges/culverts).

Following further design work, environmental assessment and site visits, an alternative access was identified to the south east of pylon XC472 that could utilise an existing large bellmouth on the A659. This option would remove the need for upgrades to, and additional crossings as required with the access routes shown at statutory consultation. It would also remove the access from the northwest which would reduce the adverse ecological, landscape and historic environment effects on listed buildings, scheduled monument, ridge and furrow at Newton Kyme and the traffic effects on the narrow lane into Newton Kyme village.

The new access to the southeast of pylon XC472 from the A659 would seek to utilise an existing bellmouth, be shorter in length and only require one watercourse crossing via a bridge. Construction vehicles would access pylon XC472 by turning off the A659 using the existing bellmouth and along the existing track. The proposed access route would then diverge off the existing track to the northwest between a row of trees and cross the watercourse south of the River Wharfe before heading across the field towards pylon XC472.

We enclose a plan showing the proposed changes to the Project explained above (Targeted Consultation Plan (Sheet 1 of 1)), which forms the basis of the targeted consultation in this location. We also enclose a copy of the relevant plan from our statutory consultation in 2021 (Section C, sheet 8) for ease of reference and so this can be compared to our proposed changes.

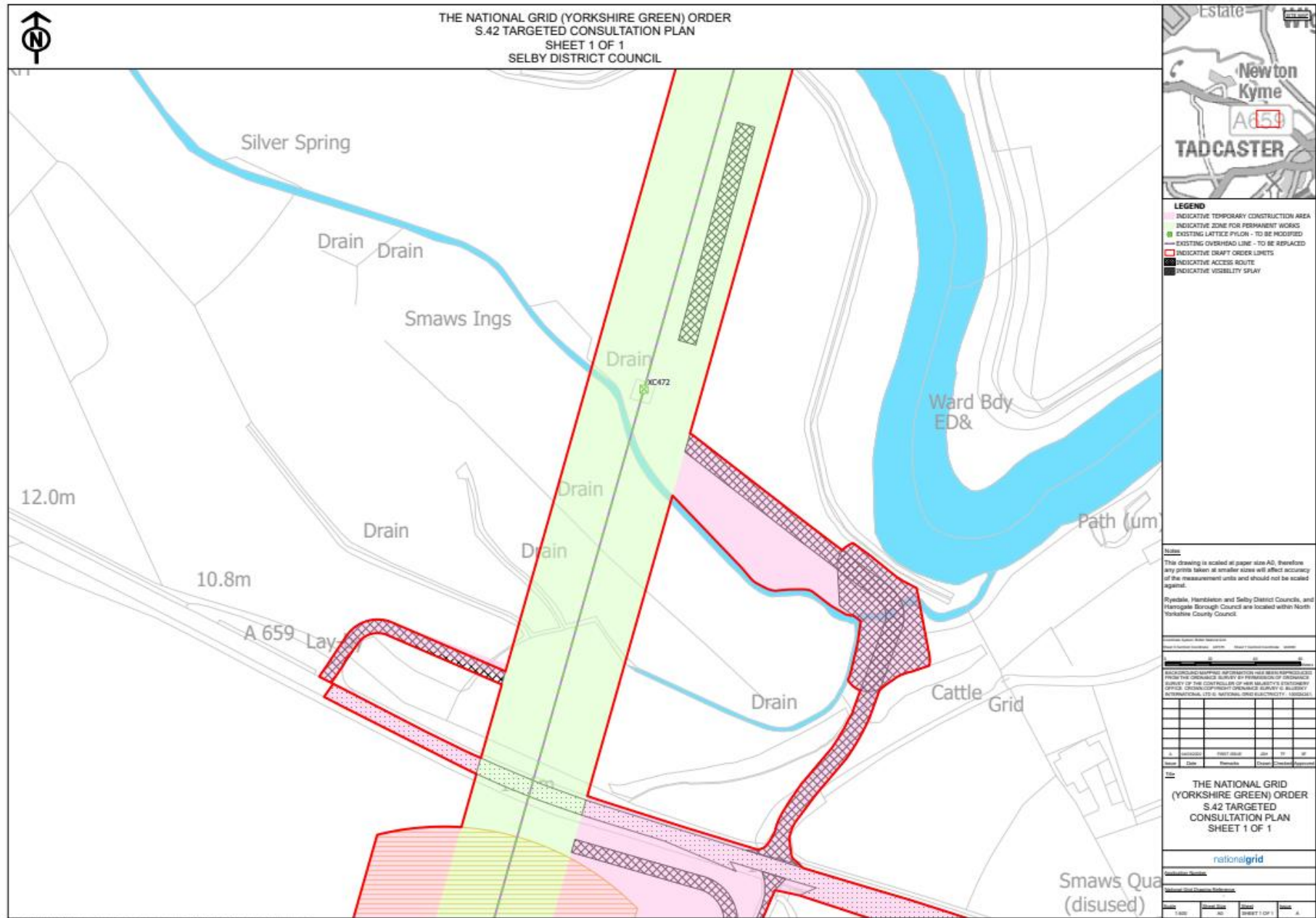

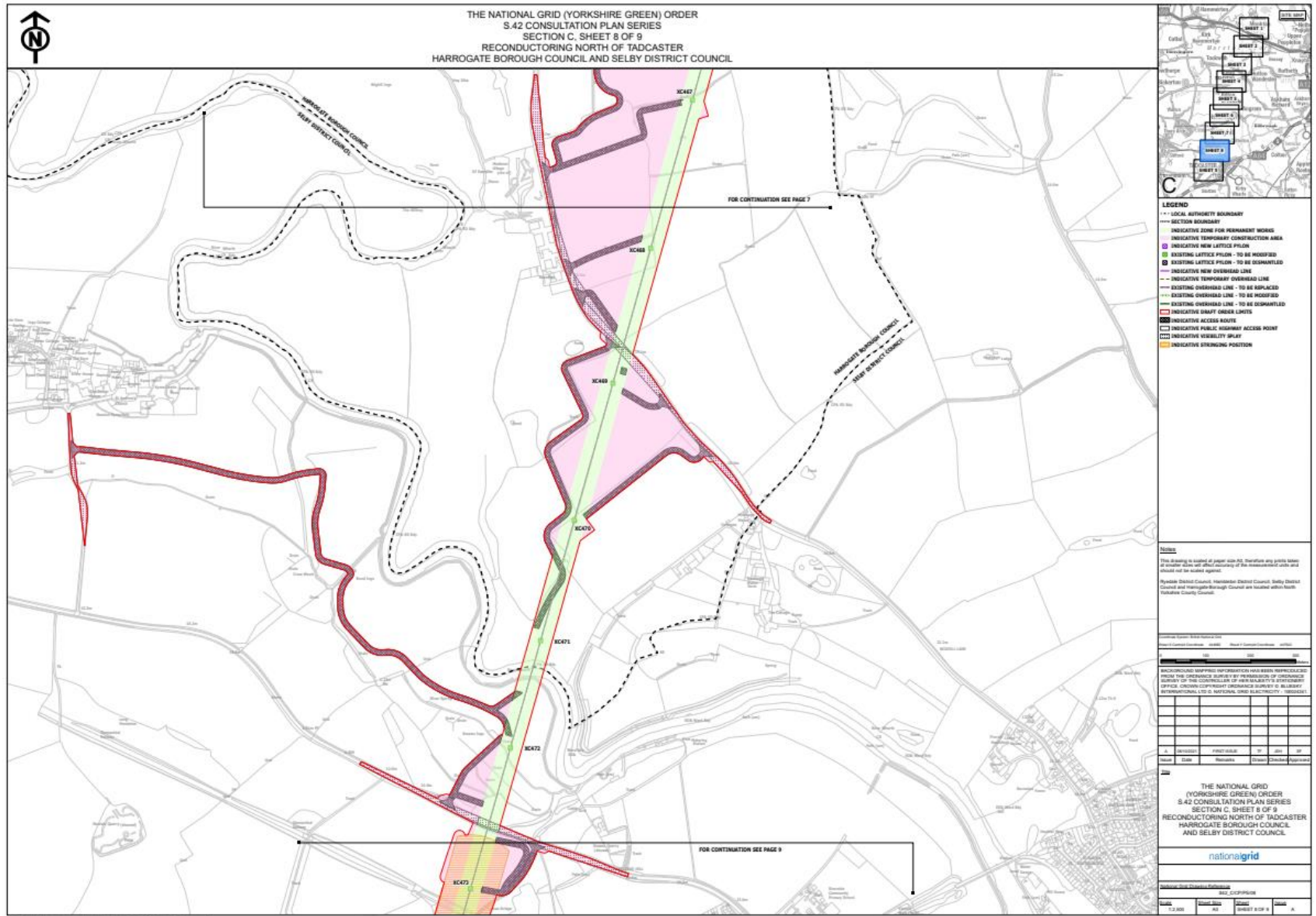

Proposed changes to the Project

Since the 2021 statutory consultation, further work has been undertaken to progress the design of the Project which has also been developed in light of feedback received. As a result, we have made changes to the Project which affect your interest in land and so are consulting you under section 42(1)(d) and section 44 of the Act.

Following extensive trees surveys for the Project, a 'veteran' tree has been identified along the existing access track that we proposed to utilise for construction as shown at statutory consultation. A 'veteran' tree is considered irreplaceable habitat in planning policy terms and their loss should be avoided to ensure no impact occurs to the veteran tree including the root protection zone.

Following identification of this veteran tree, the Project has taken steps to avoid impacting the tree by diverting the proposed access route to the west away from the veteran tree and its root protection zone. The new proposal for the access route means it now diverts off the existing track into the field, avoiding the tree and then routes back on to the existing track.

This area of land has been included within the draft Order Limits (red line boundary) and forms the basis of this targeted consultation. The plan shows both access route options included to allow for future design work by our contractors to determine if it could be possible to utilise the existing track without any impacts on the existing veteran tree including its root protection zone, if this is not possible the access route on the west within the field as shown on the plan would be utilised by the Project.

We enclose a plan showing the proposed changes to the Project explained above (Targeted Consultation Plan (Sheet 1 of 1)), which forms the basis of the targeted consultation in this location. We also enclose a copy of the relevant plan from our statutory consultation in 2021 (Section B, sheet 5) for ease of reference and so this can be compared to our proposed changes.

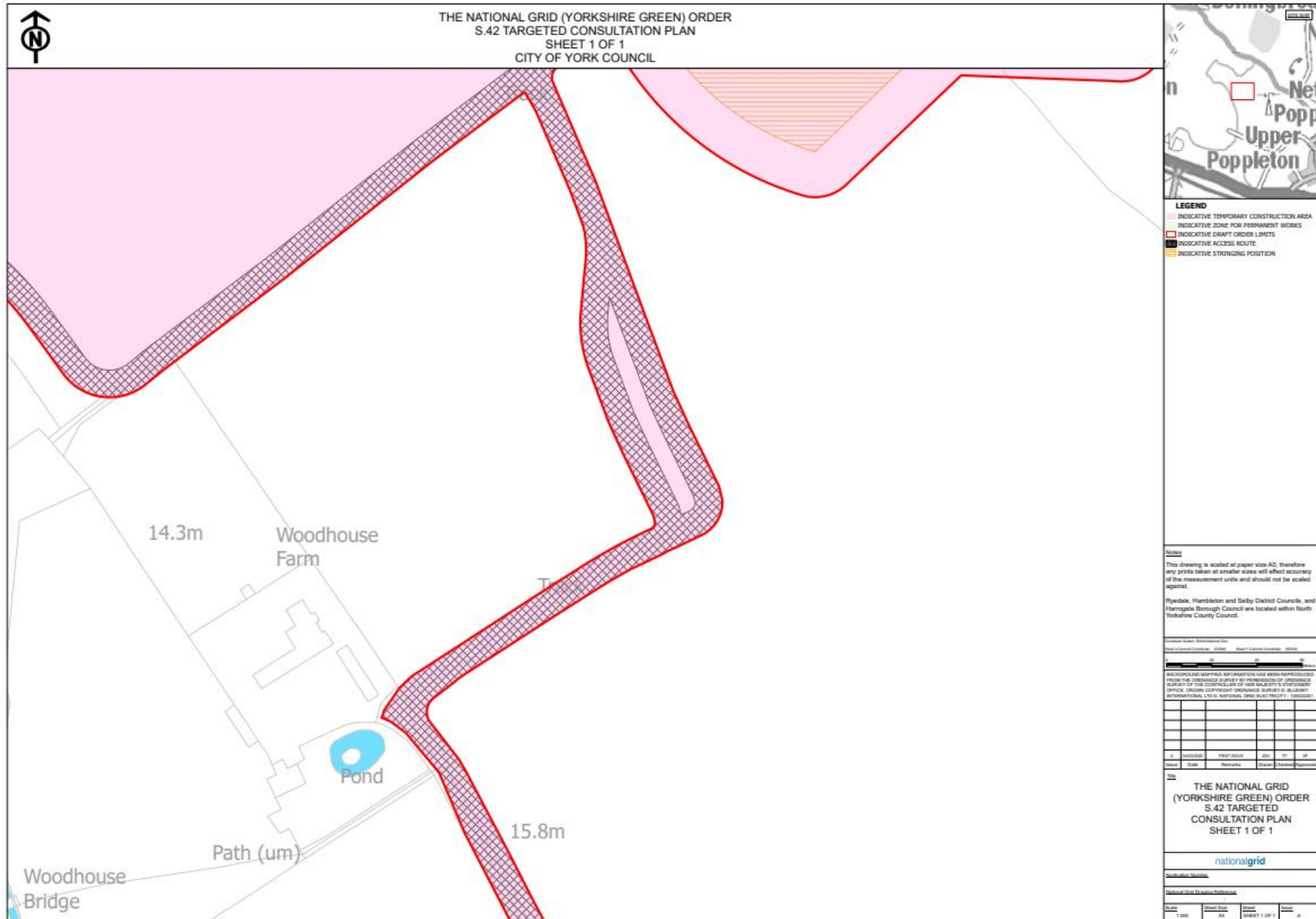

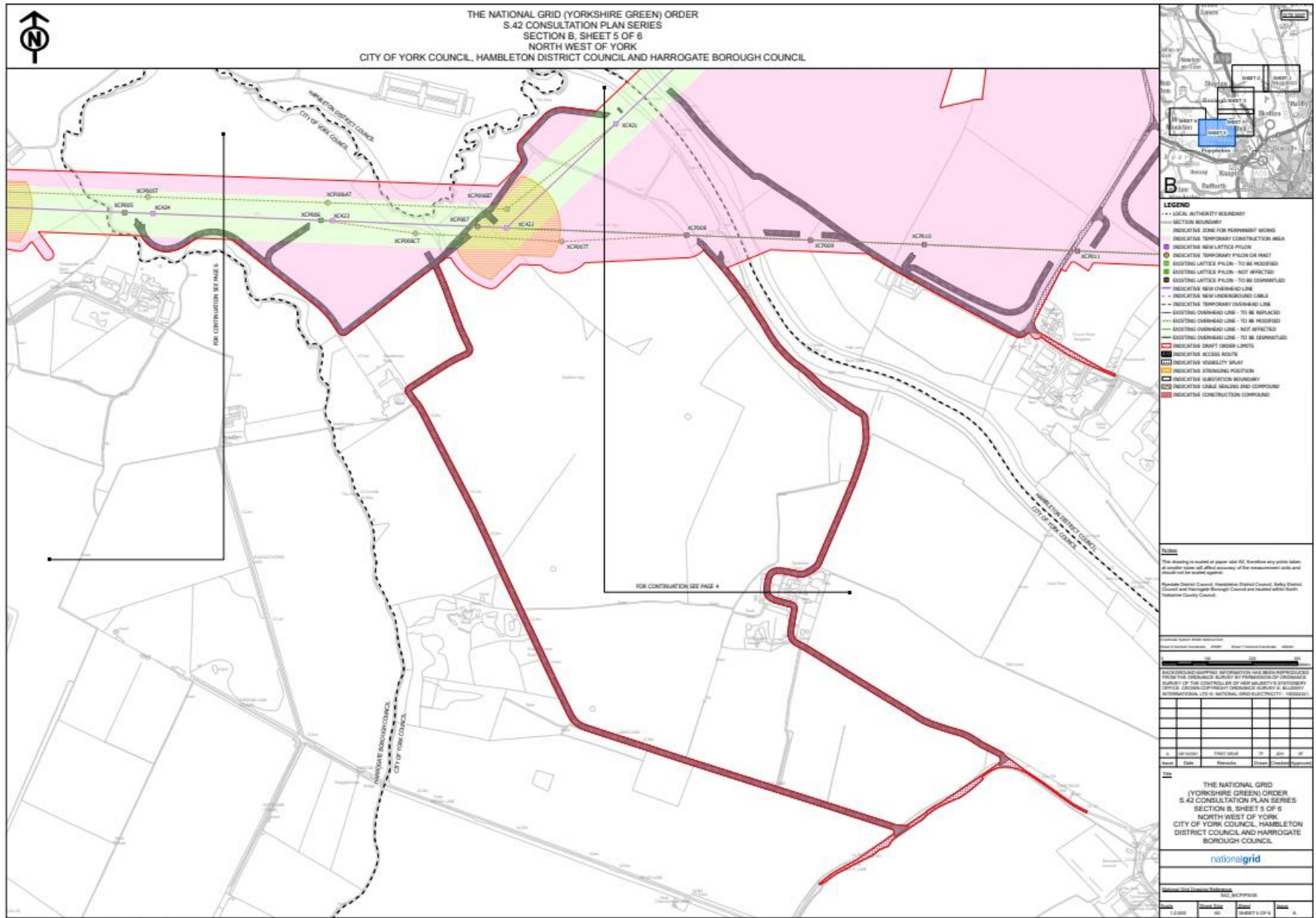

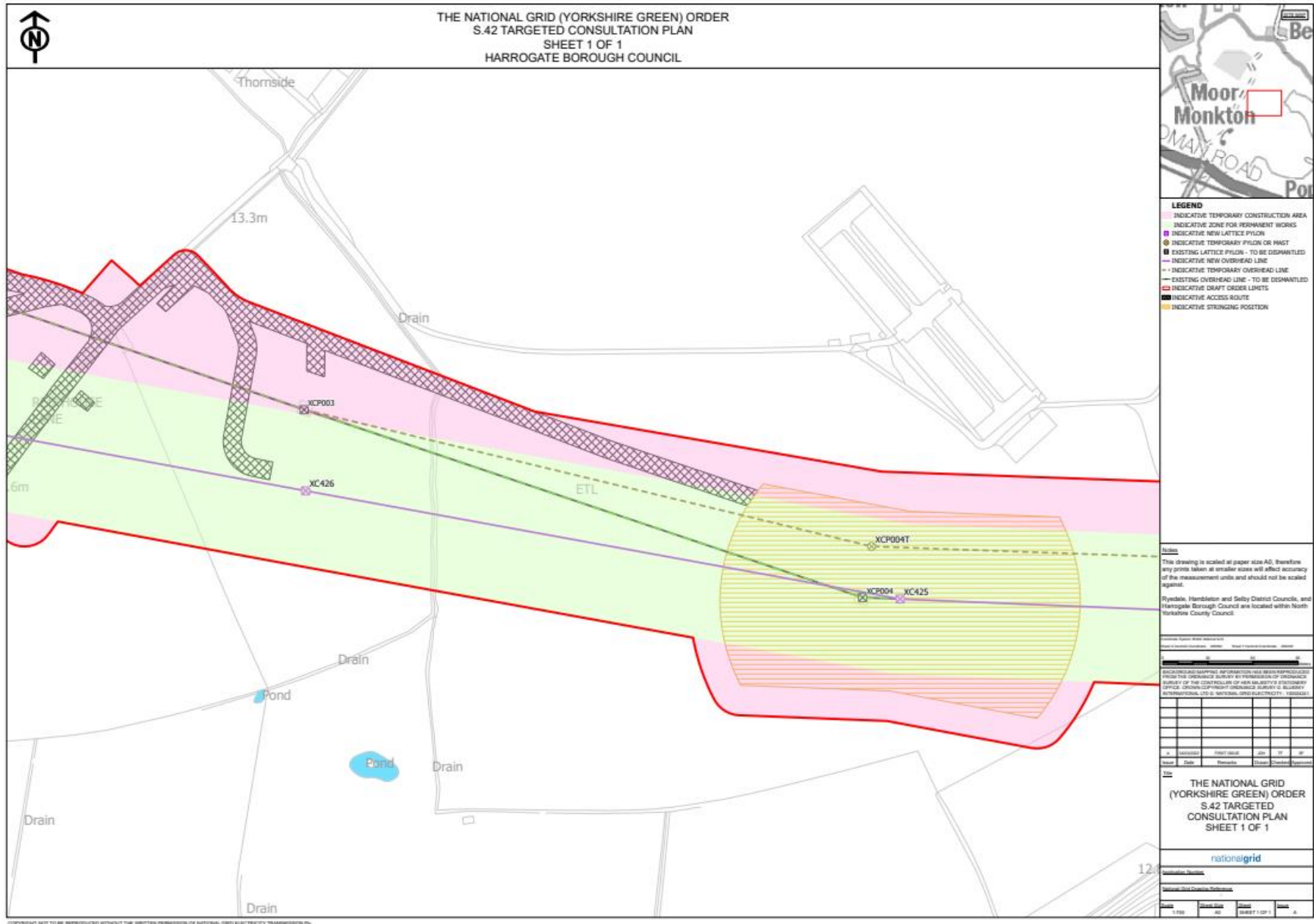

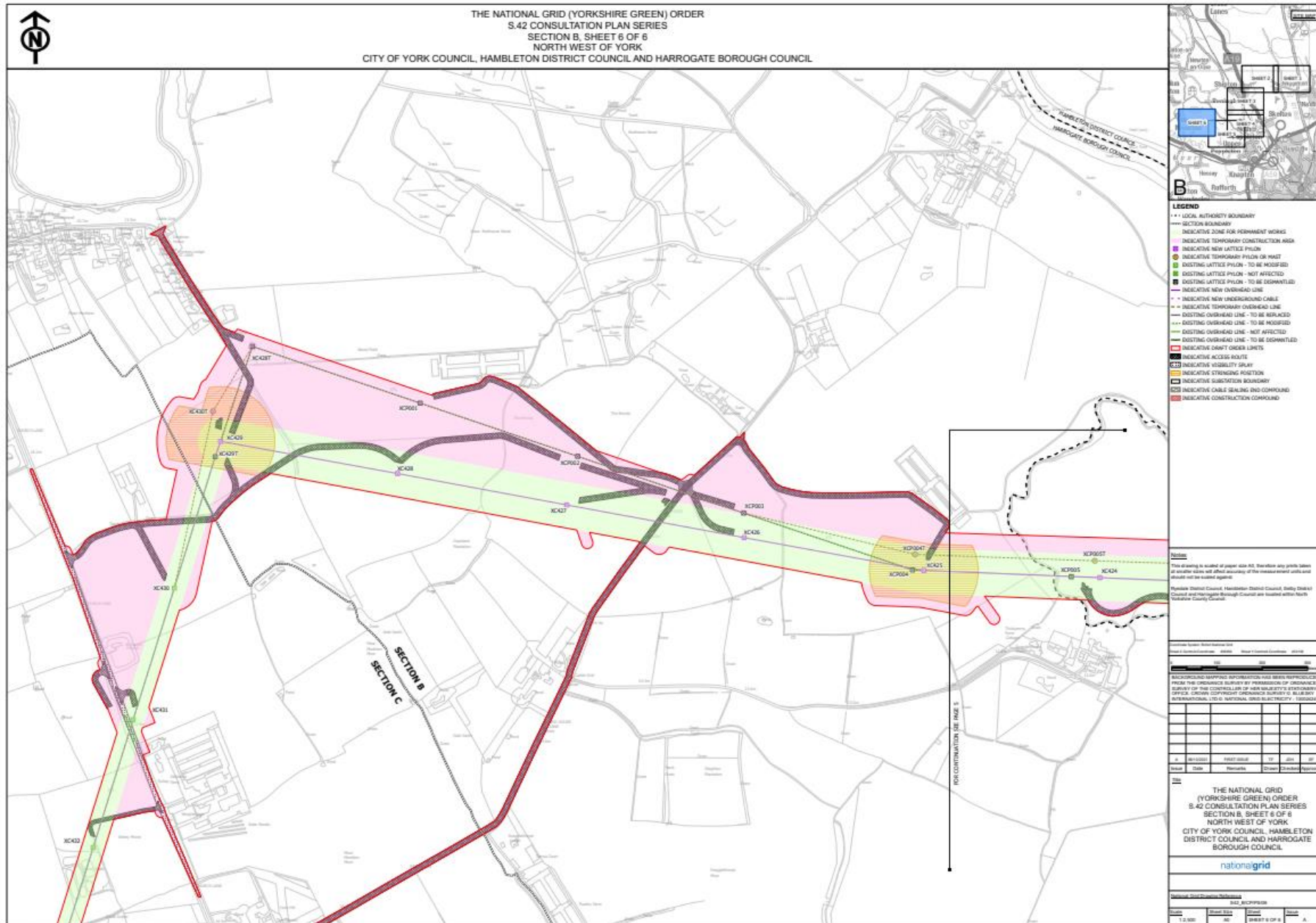

The proposed Cable Sealing End Compound (CSEC) located adjacent to pylon XC481 near Tadcaster, has been reorientated and positioned closer to, and encompassing the existing XC481 pylon within the CSEC compound fence line. This is due to a change in the CSEC, from a traditional gantry solution, to using anchor blocks due to space constraints on the land in proximity to the A64. Anchor block solutions are closer to the tower, with downleads from the pylon coming down onto concrete blocks rather than on to a gantry. Due to this, there is a requirement to put a fence line around the whole pylon to avoid any machinery breaching electrical clearance to the downleads.

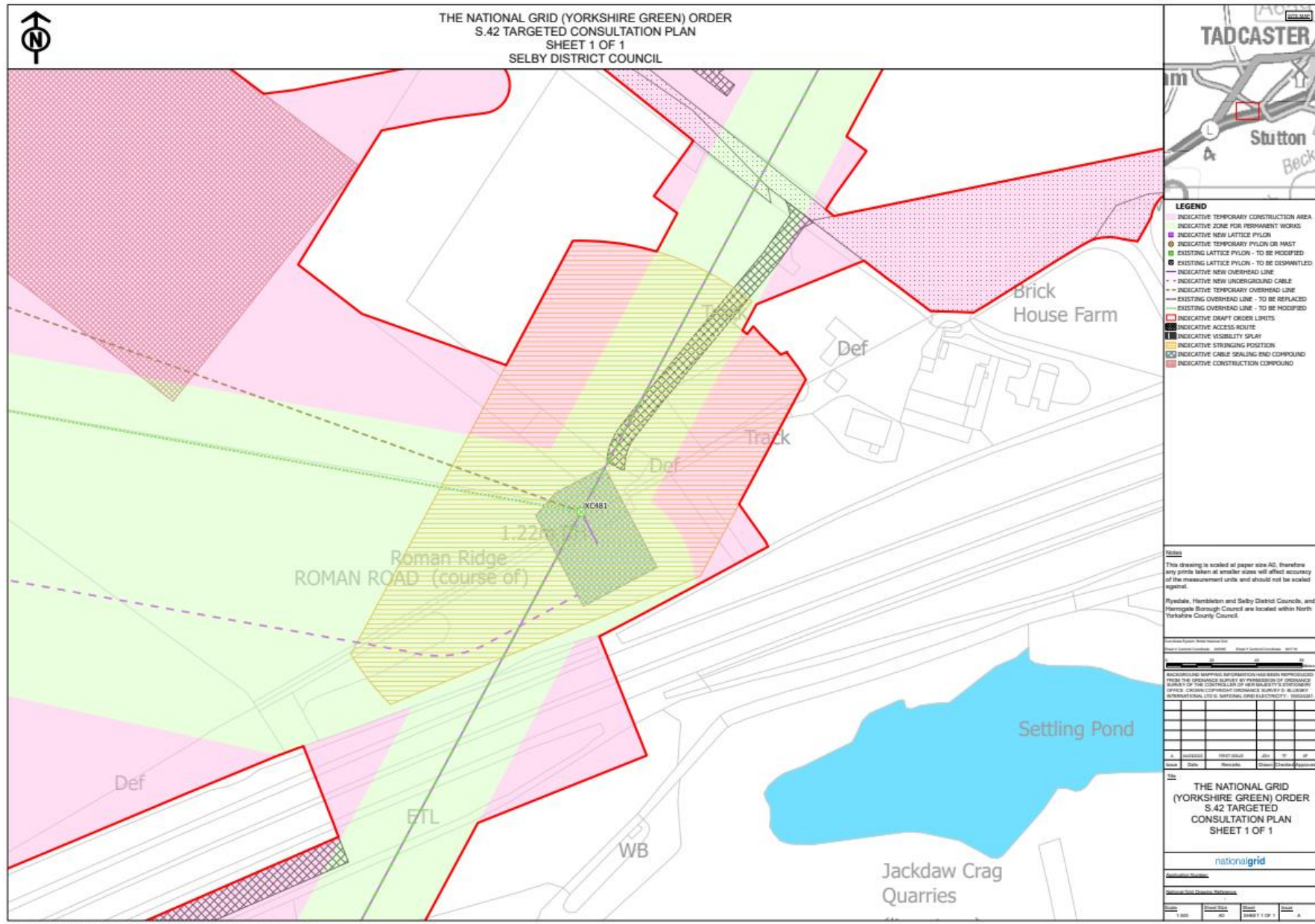

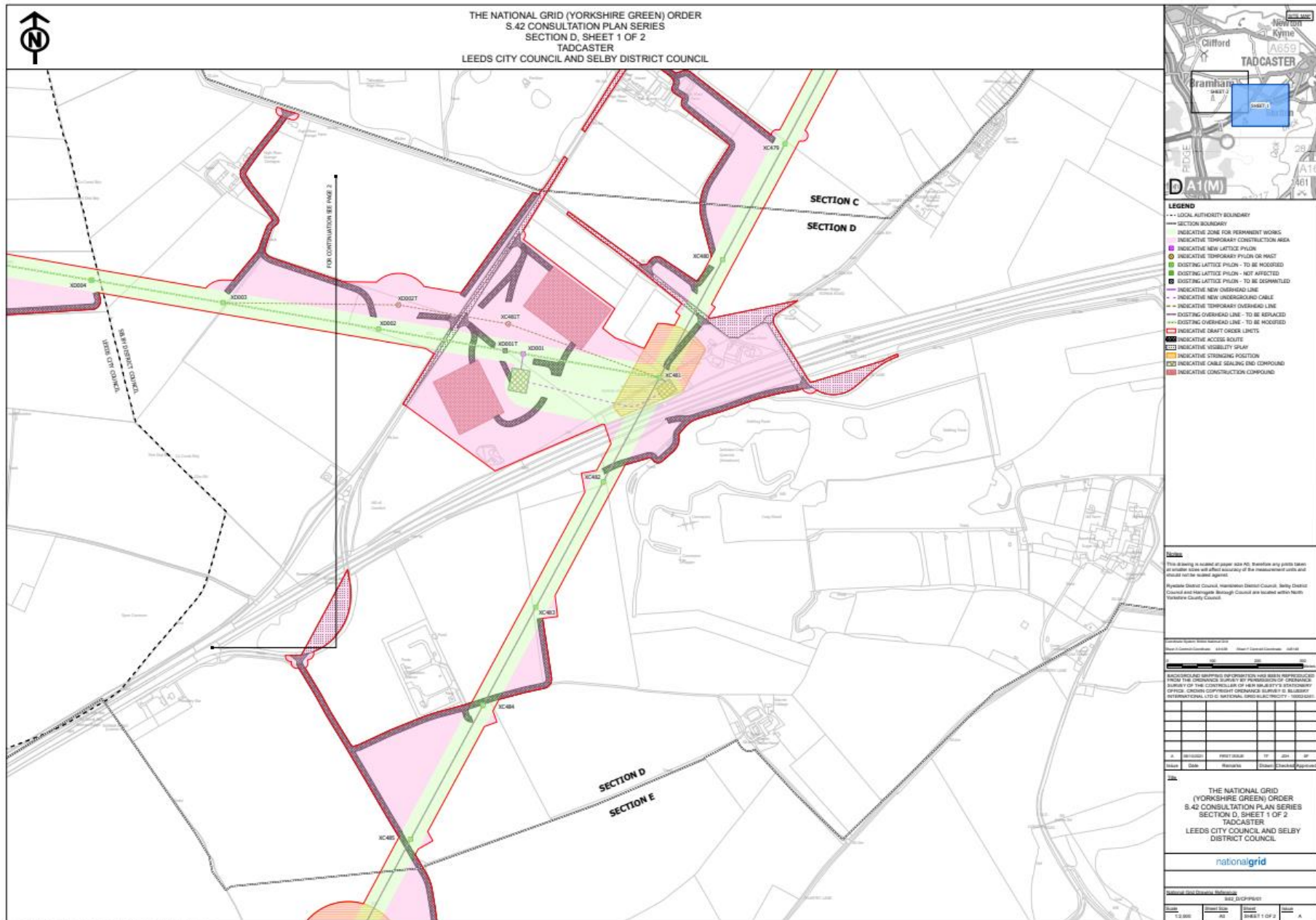

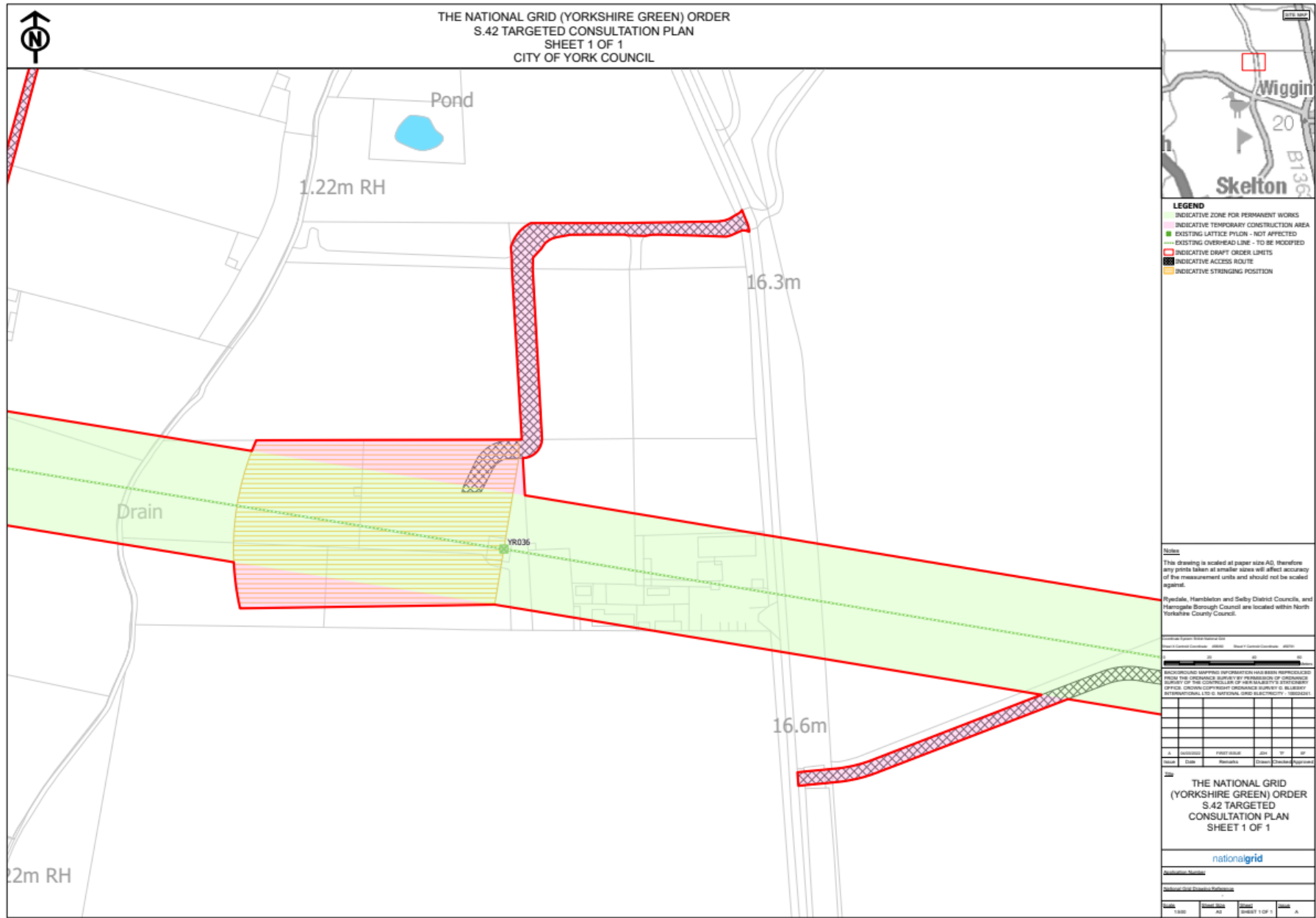

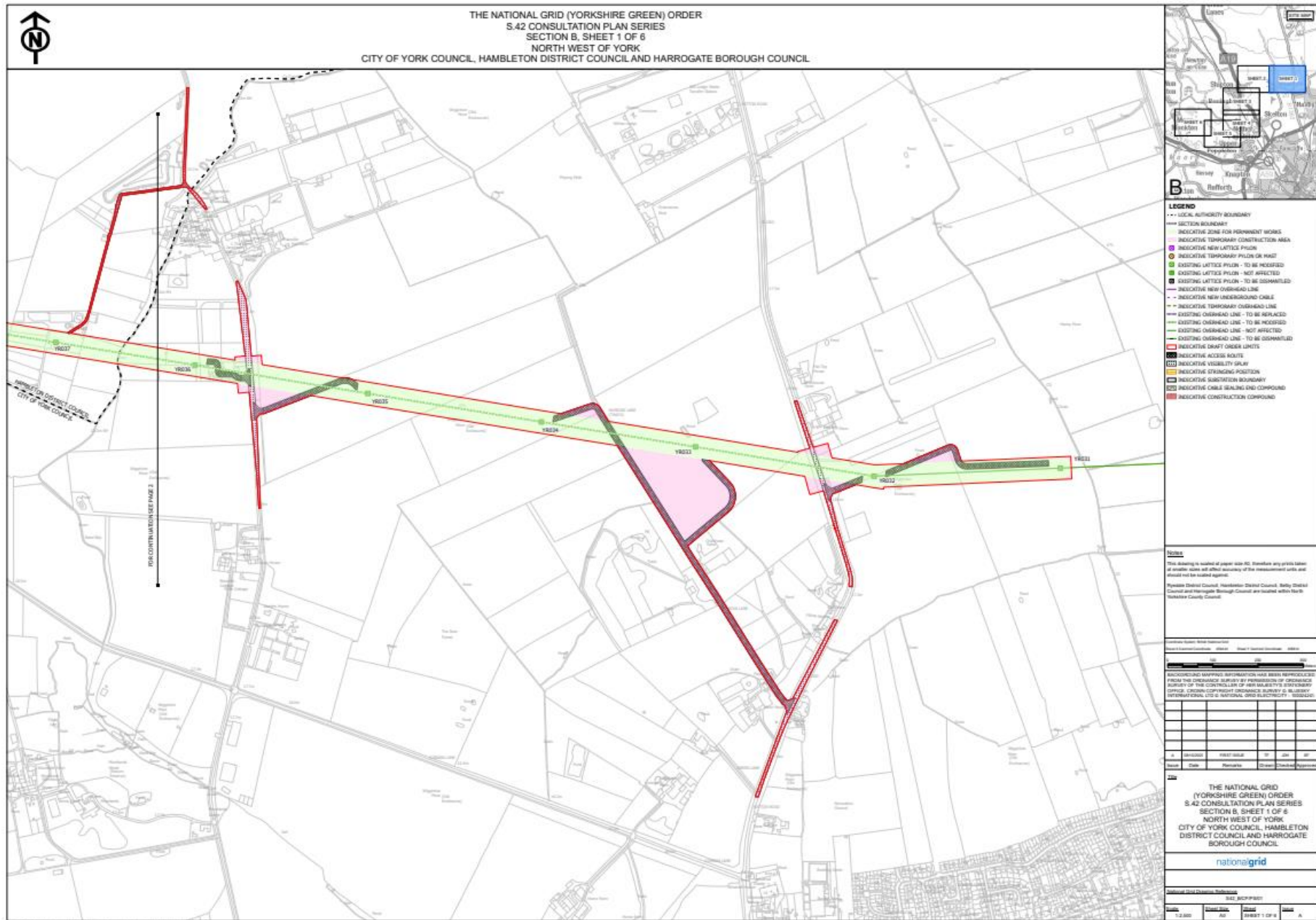

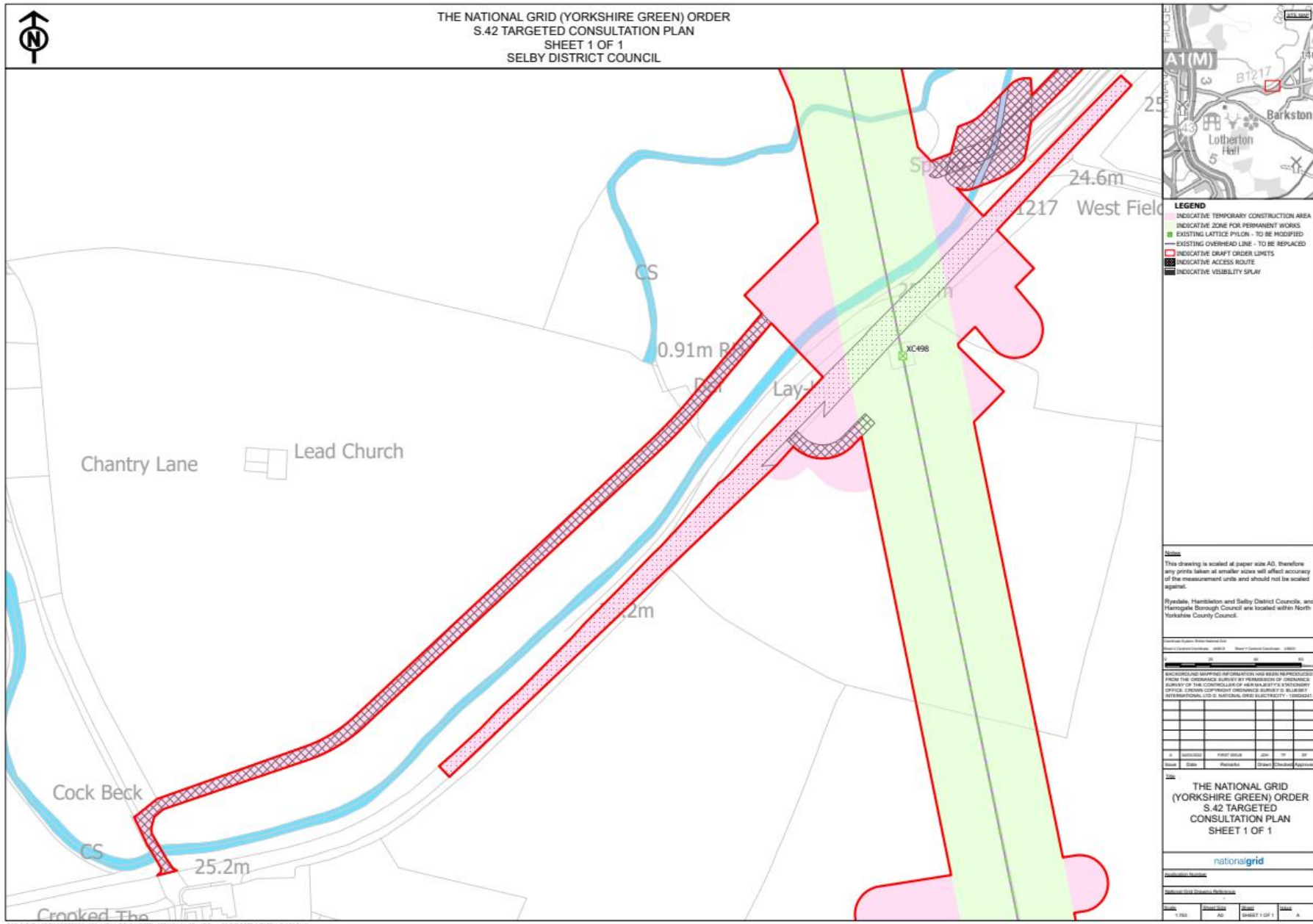

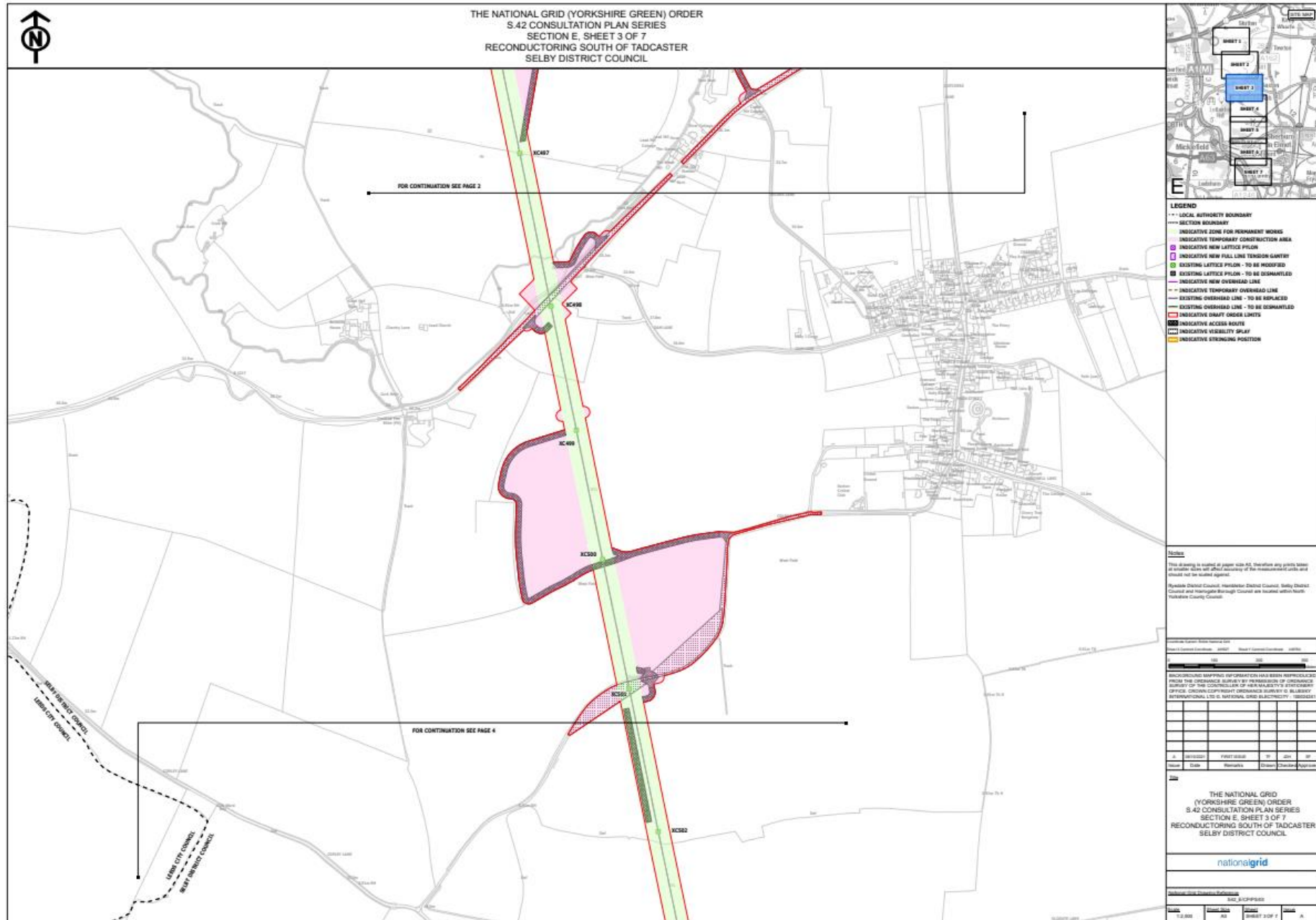

These changes relate to the proposed alignment of the 400kV overhead line between YN002 to YN008. Following extensive tree surveys for the Project, a number of 'veteran' trees have been identified along the proposed alignment of the 400kV overhead line as shown at statutory consultation, with veteran trees present east and south of pylon YN003, midway between pylons YN003 and YN004 and north of pylon YN006.

A 'veteran' tree is considered irreplaceable habitat in planning policy terms and their loss should be avoided to ensure no impact occurs to the veteran tree including the root protection zone. Due to the location of the veteran trees and the need to avoid them, an alternative alignment of the 400kV overhead line has been identified primarily to the east starting at pylon YN002, with pylon YN003 becoming a suspension pylon further south to the original location (rather than a tension pylon) and pylon YN004 becoming a tension pylon (rather than a suspension pylon) and located furthest east. 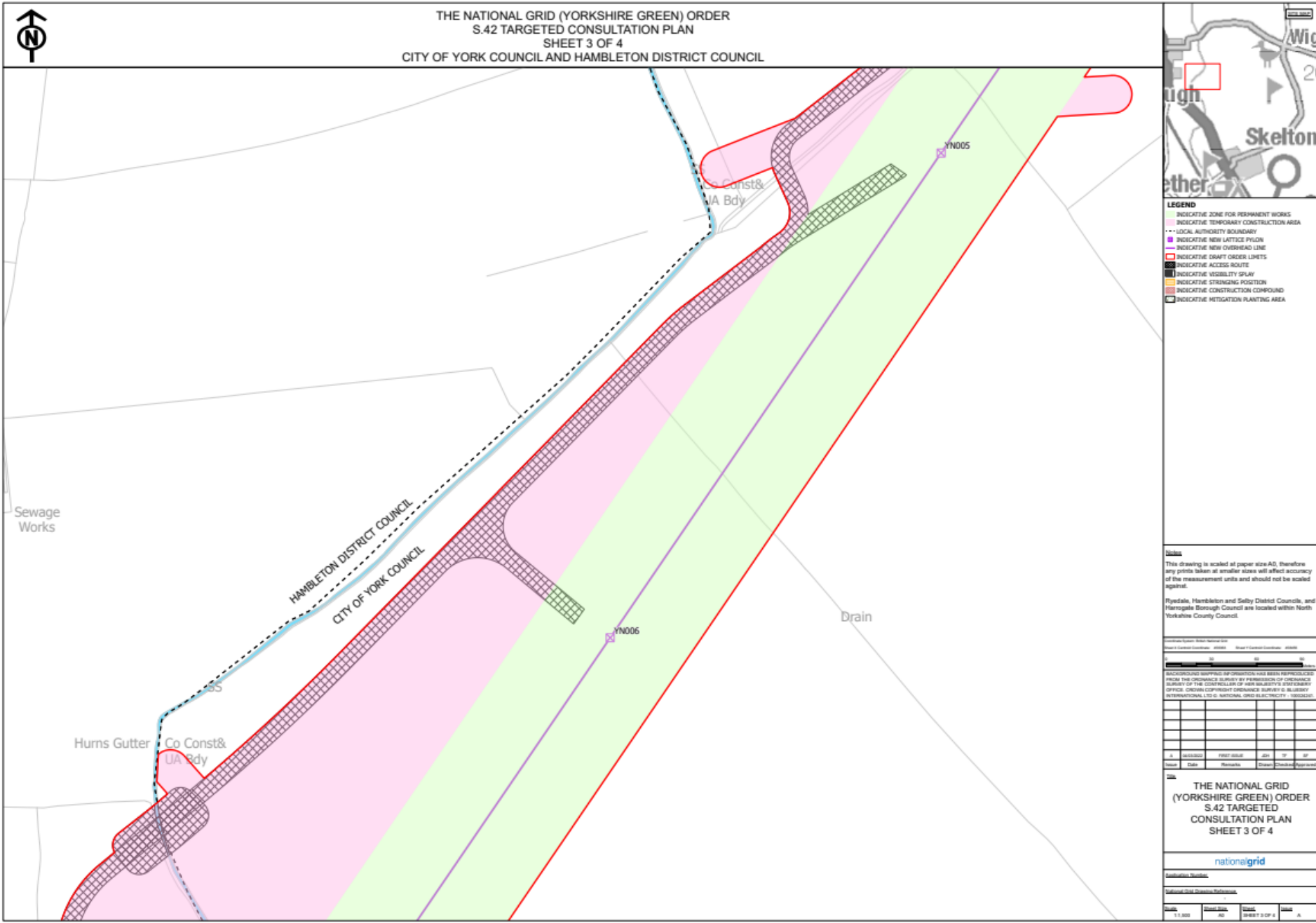

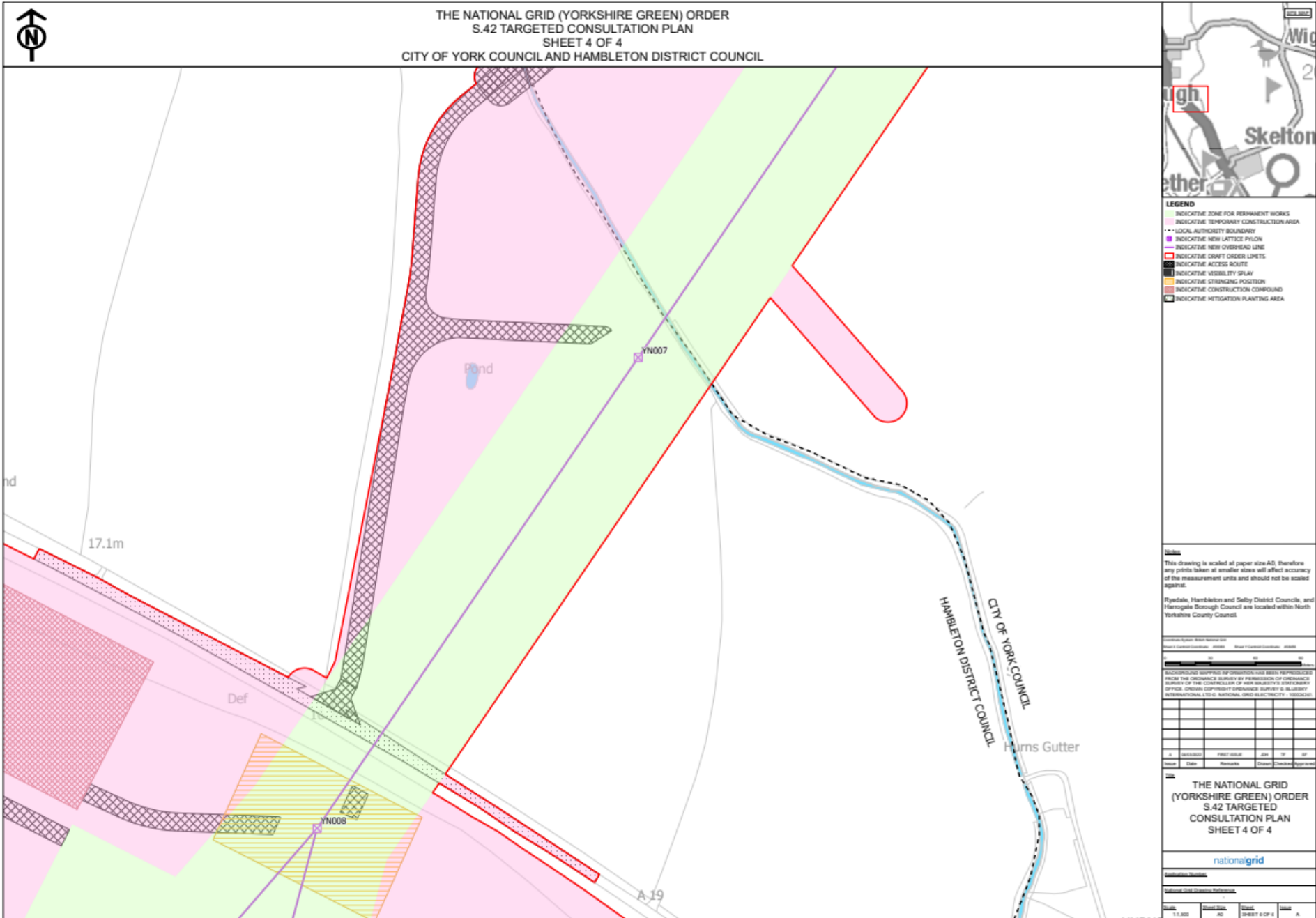

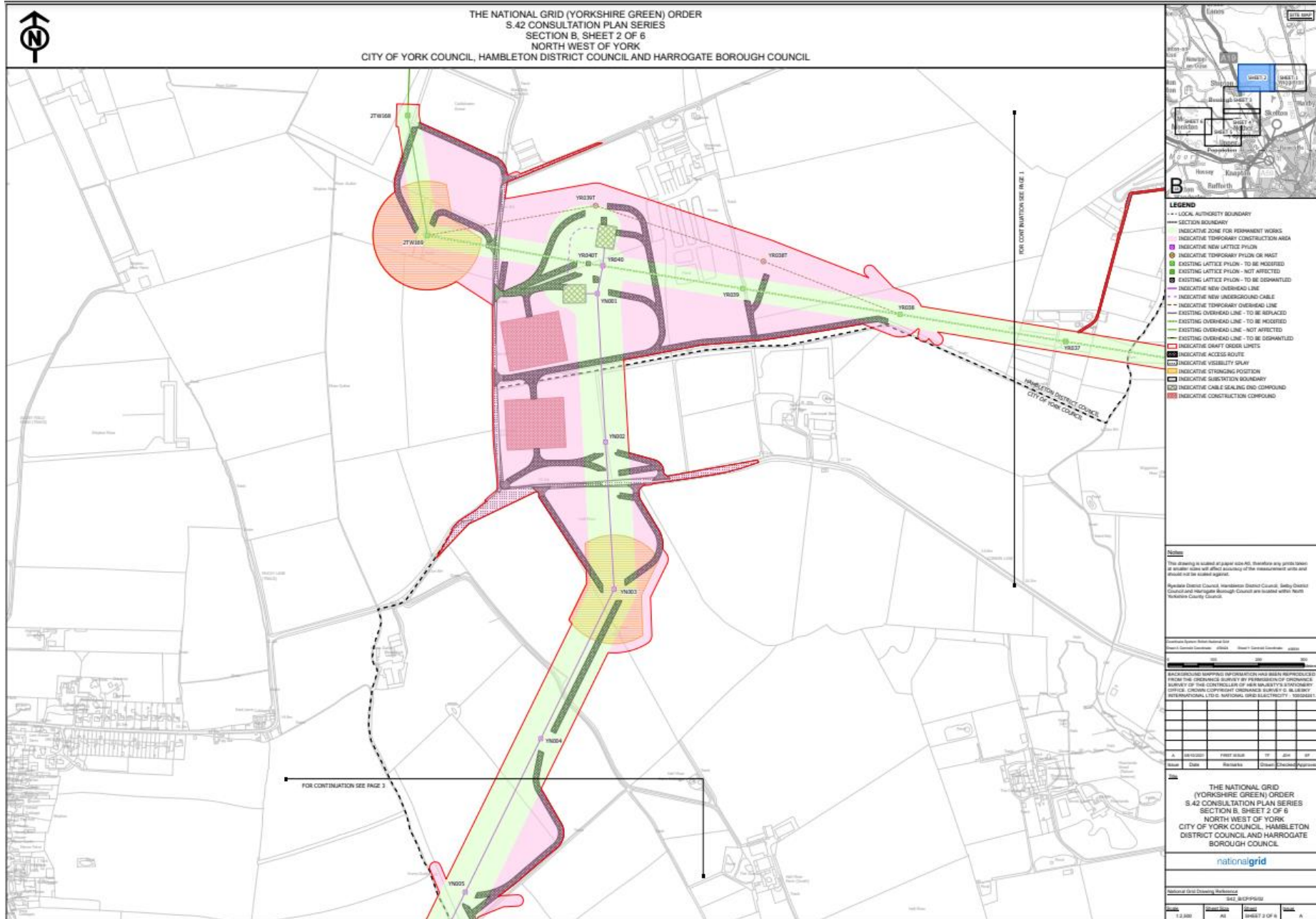

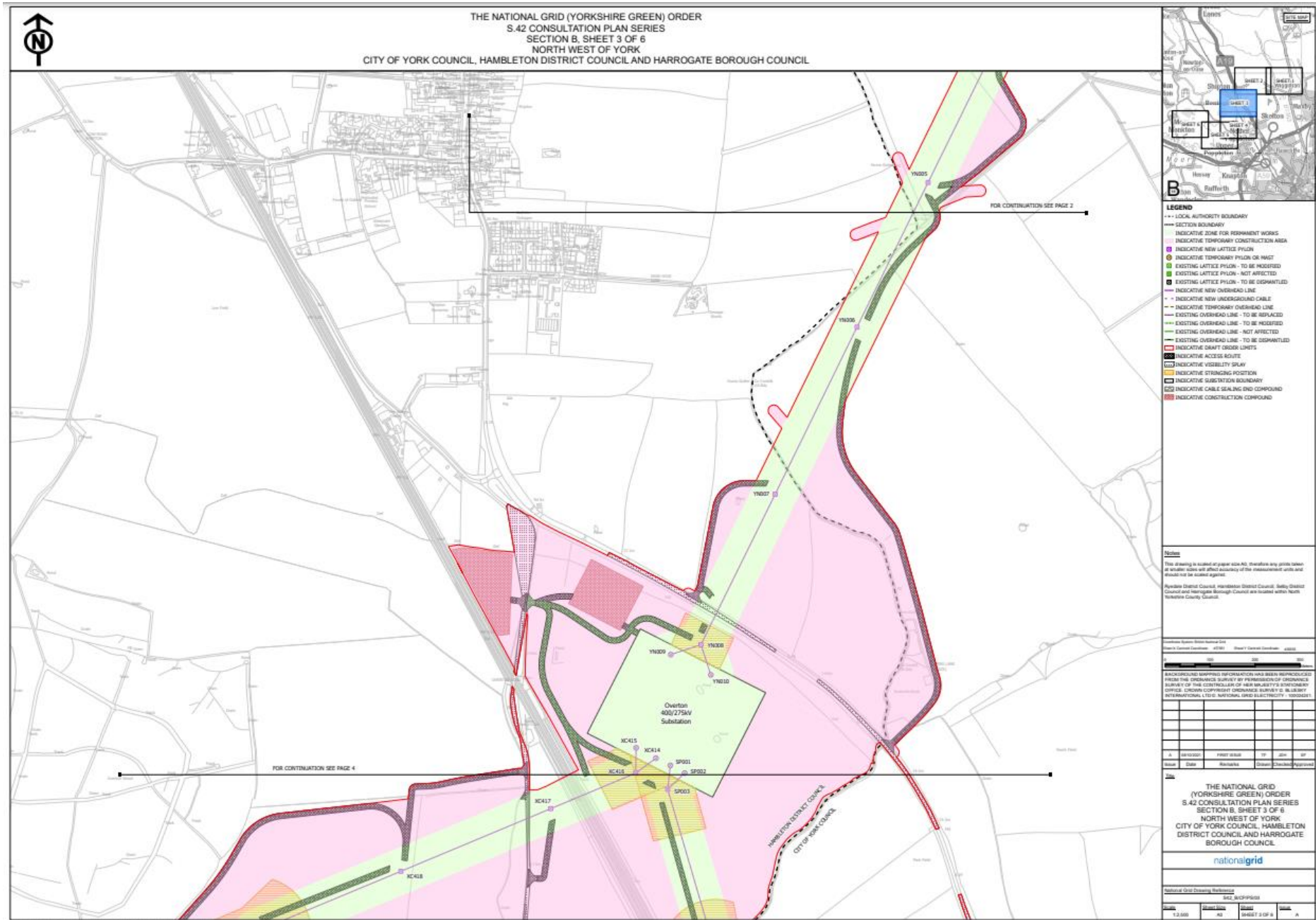

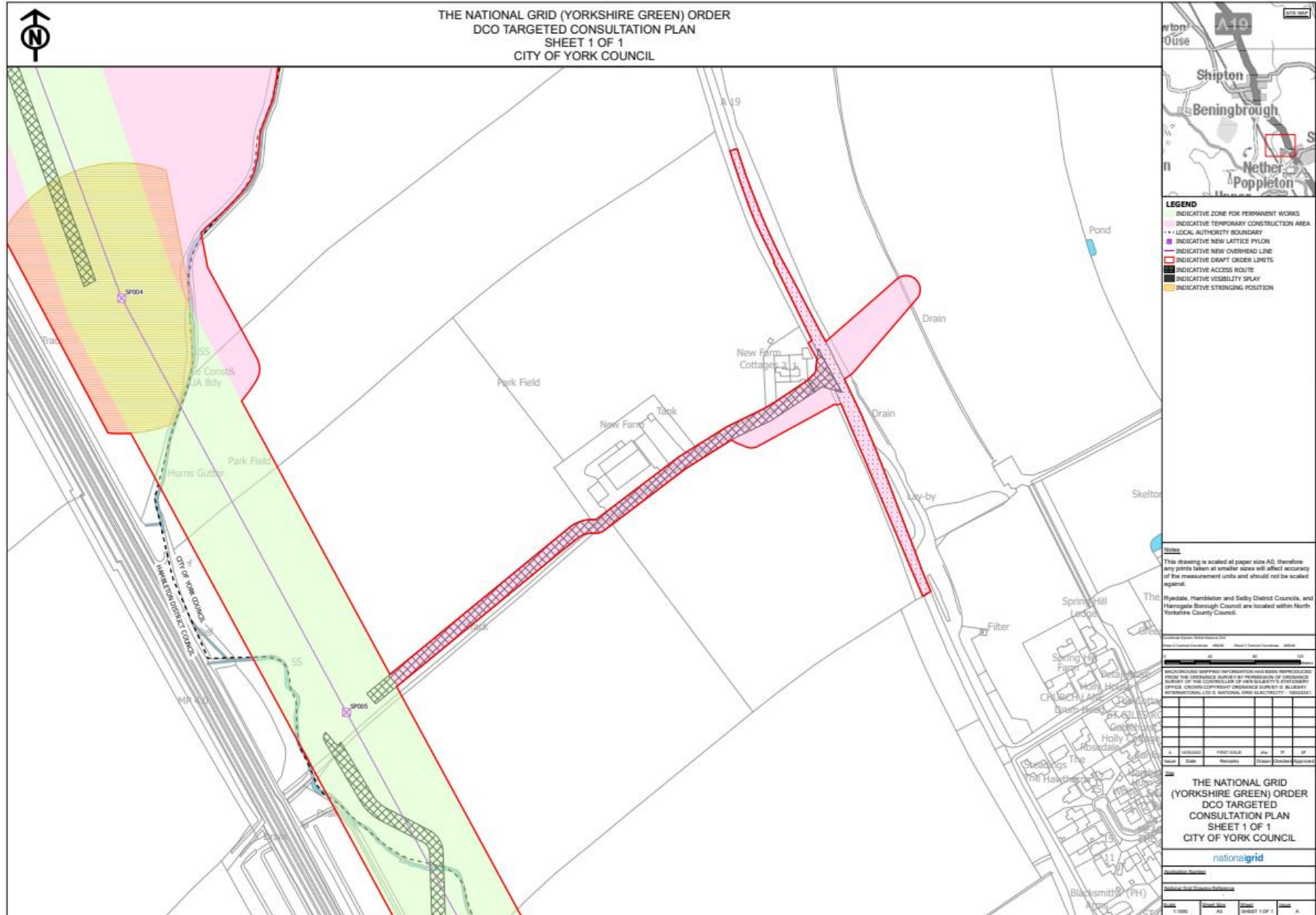

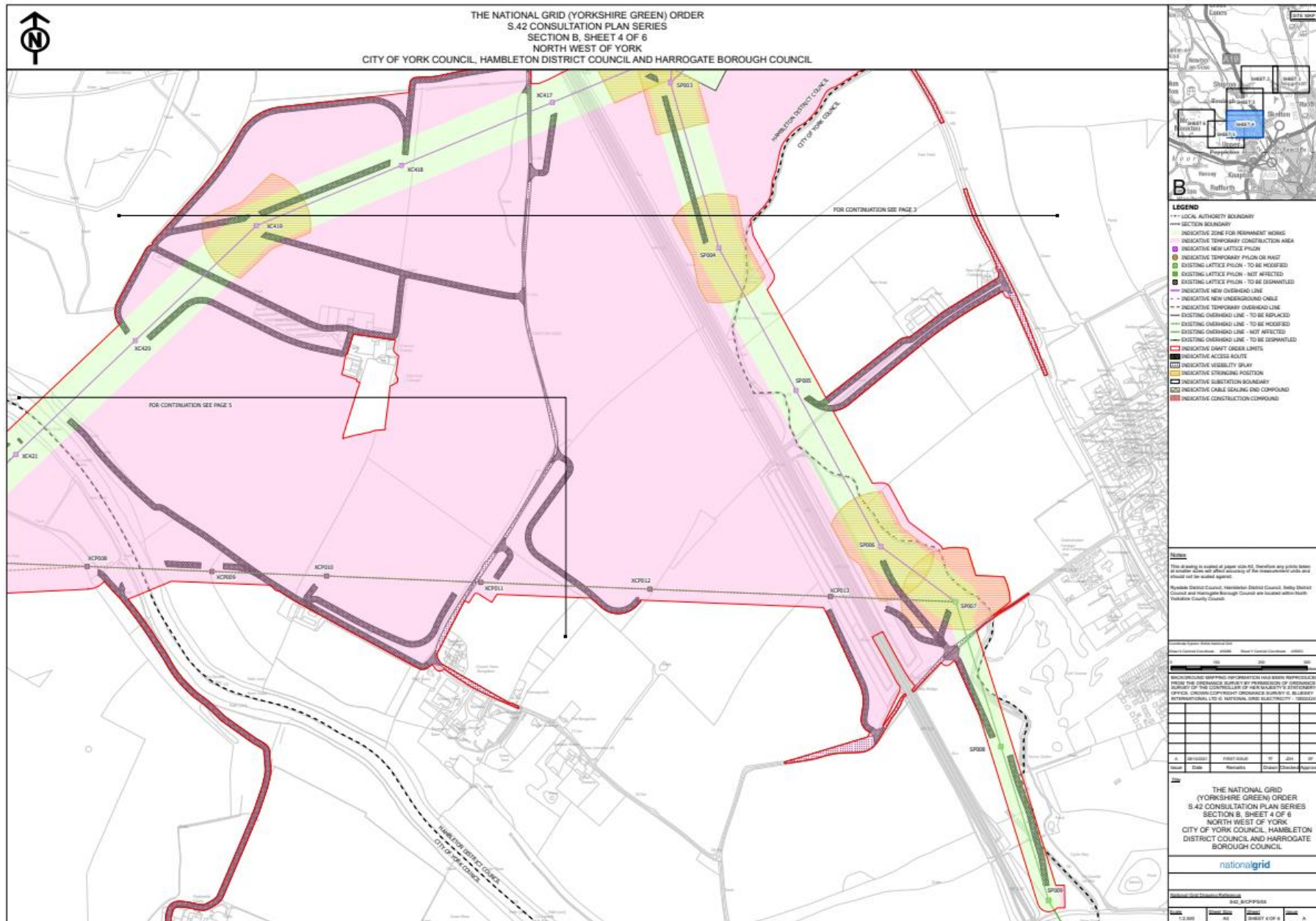

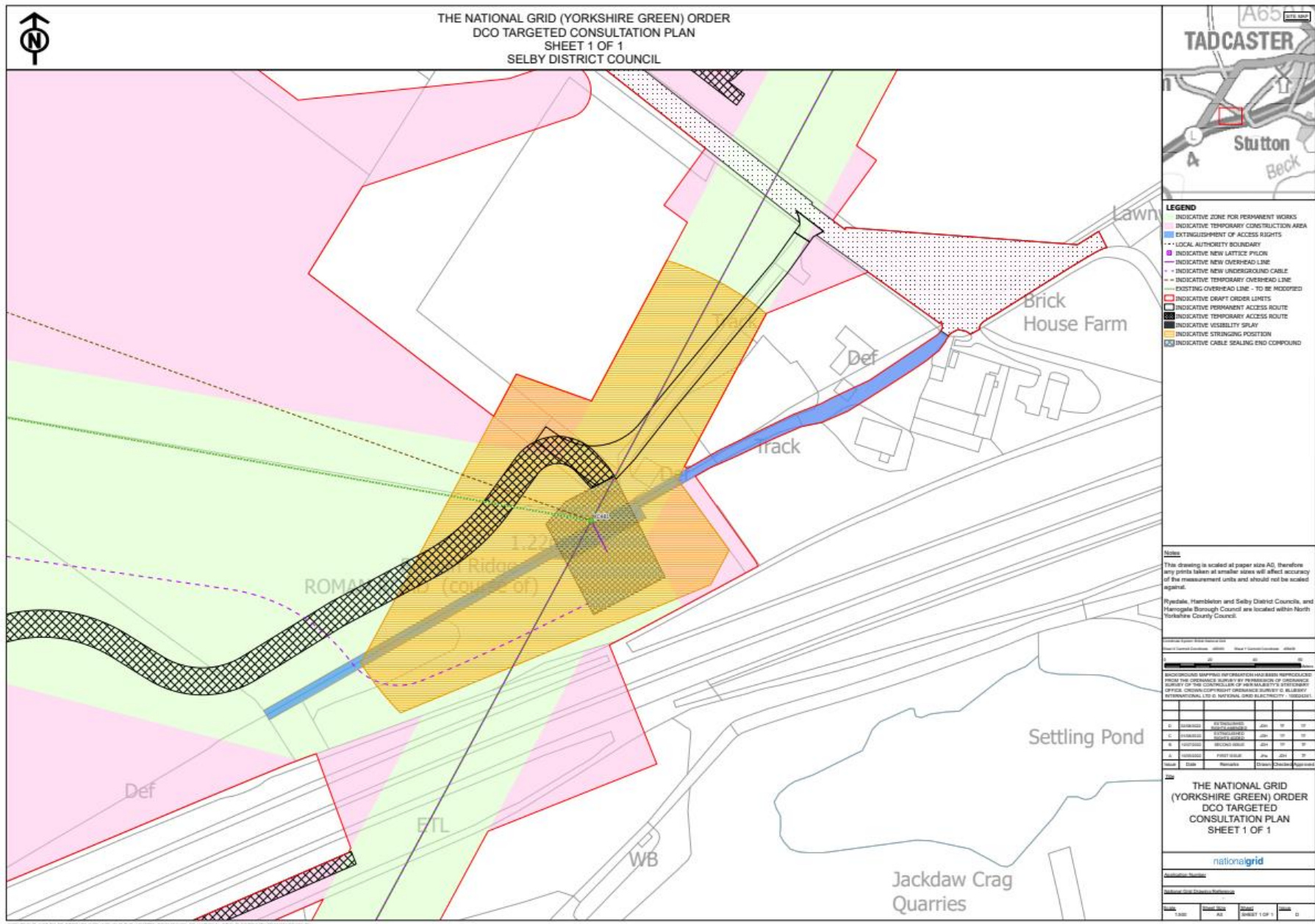

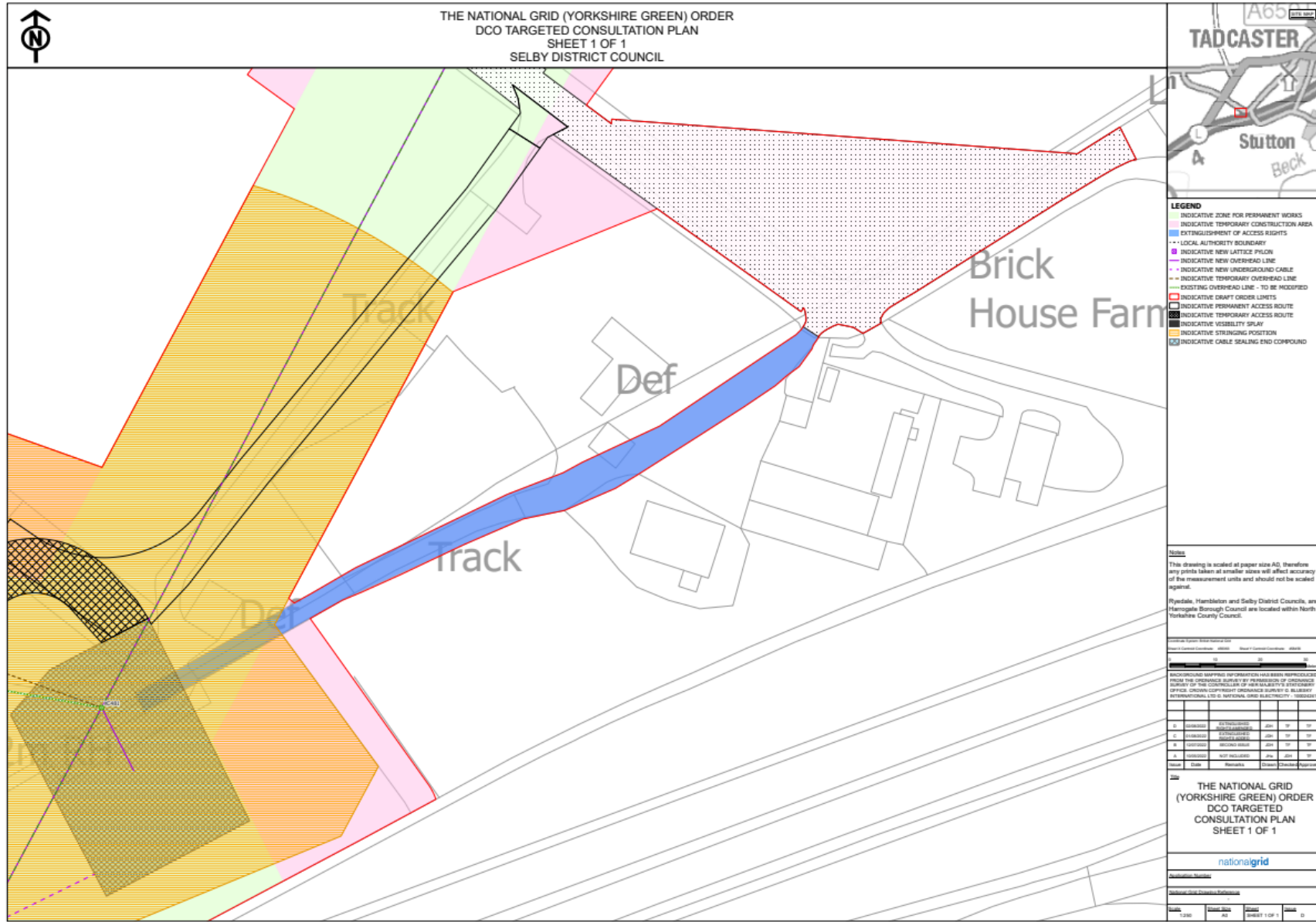

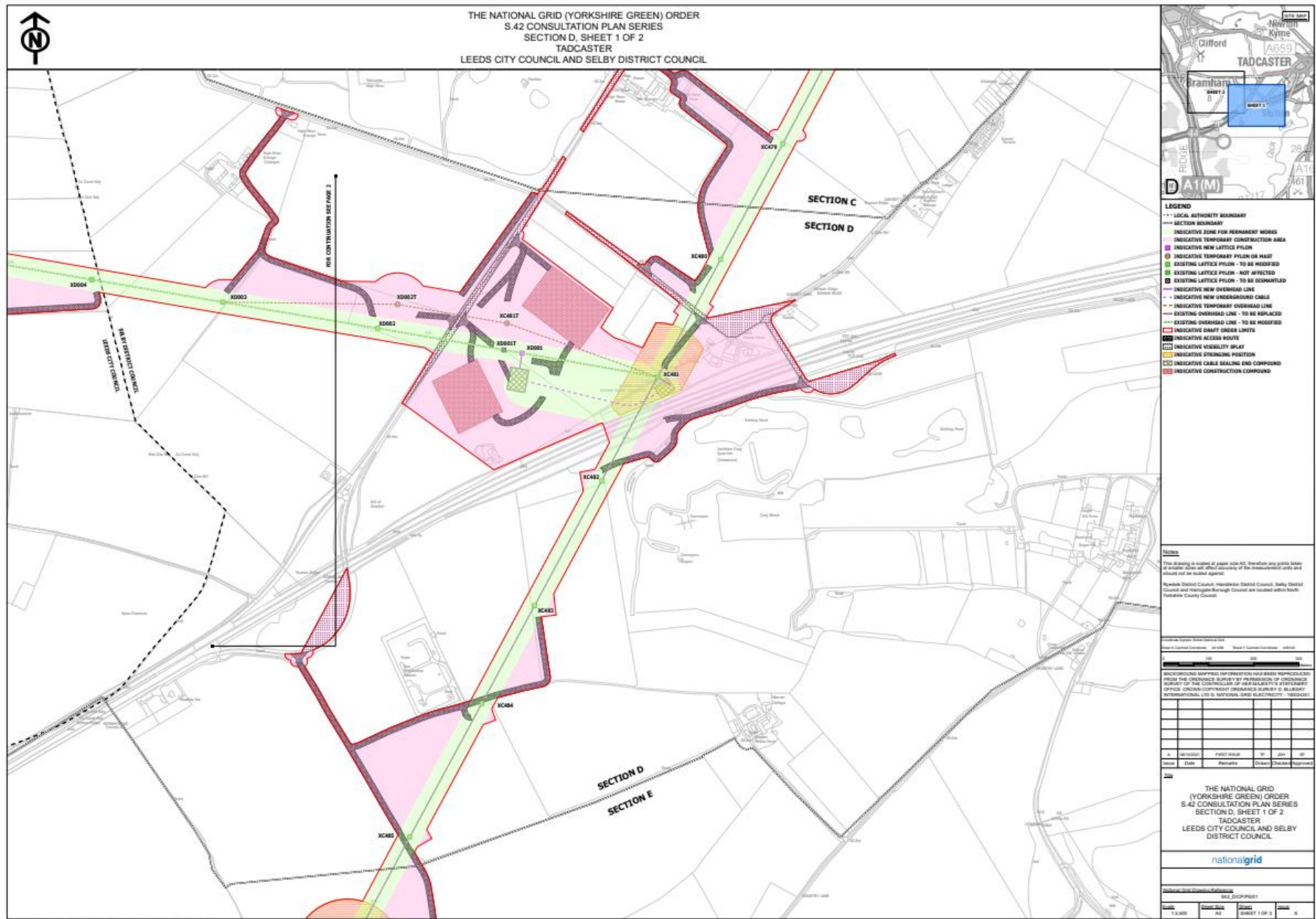
Plans showing Change 1 (CR307 (1 and 2) of the third targeted consultation period

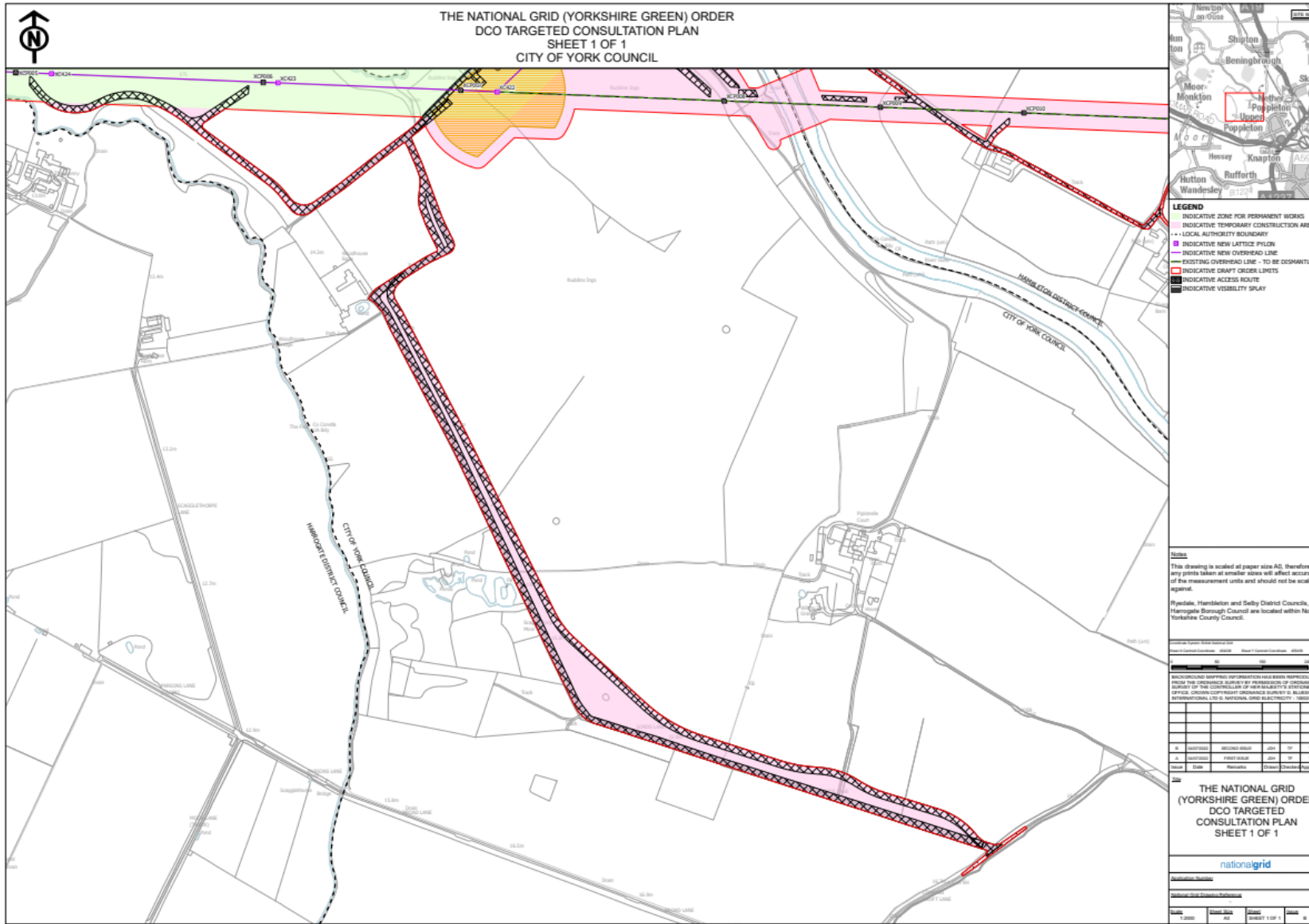

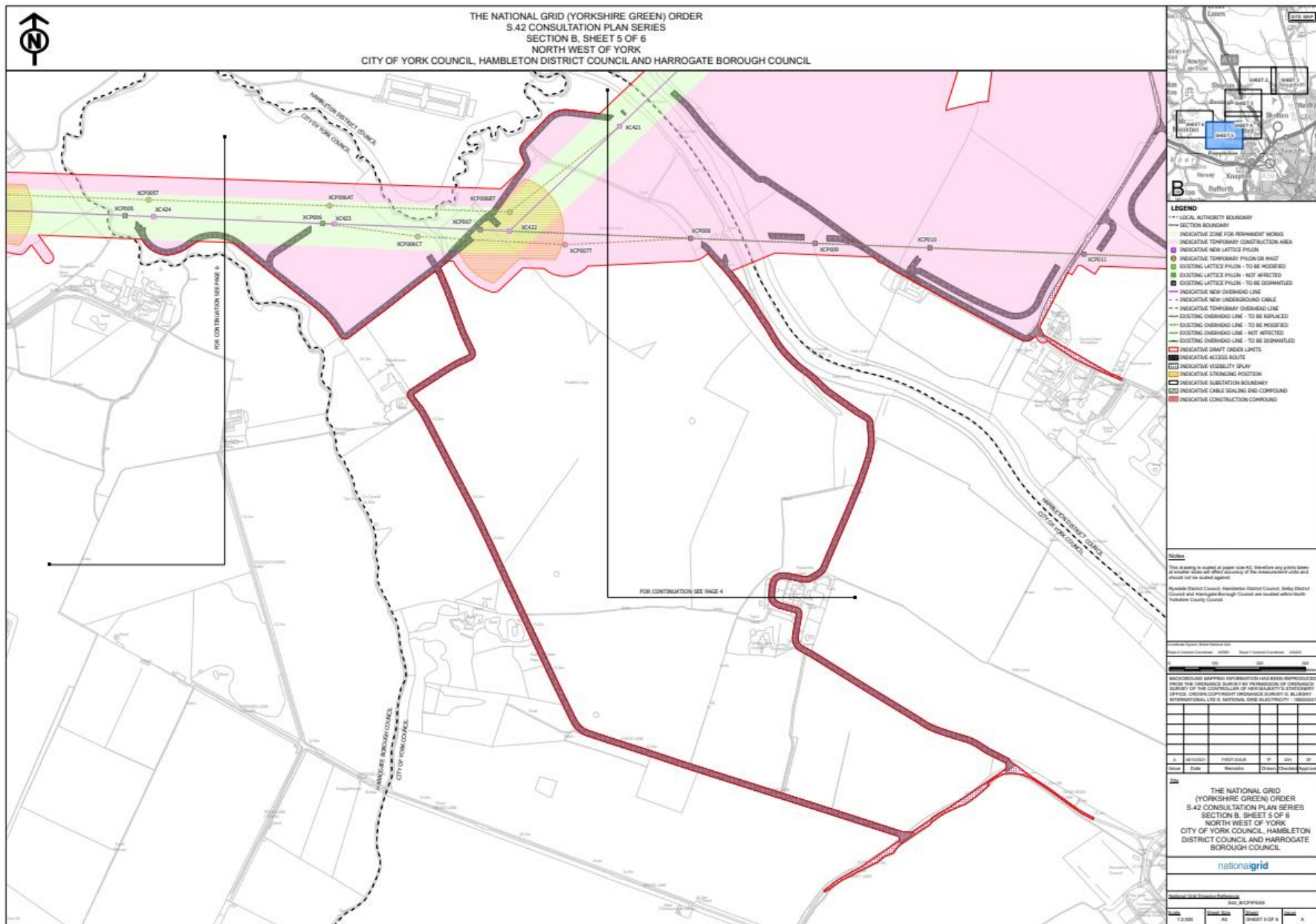

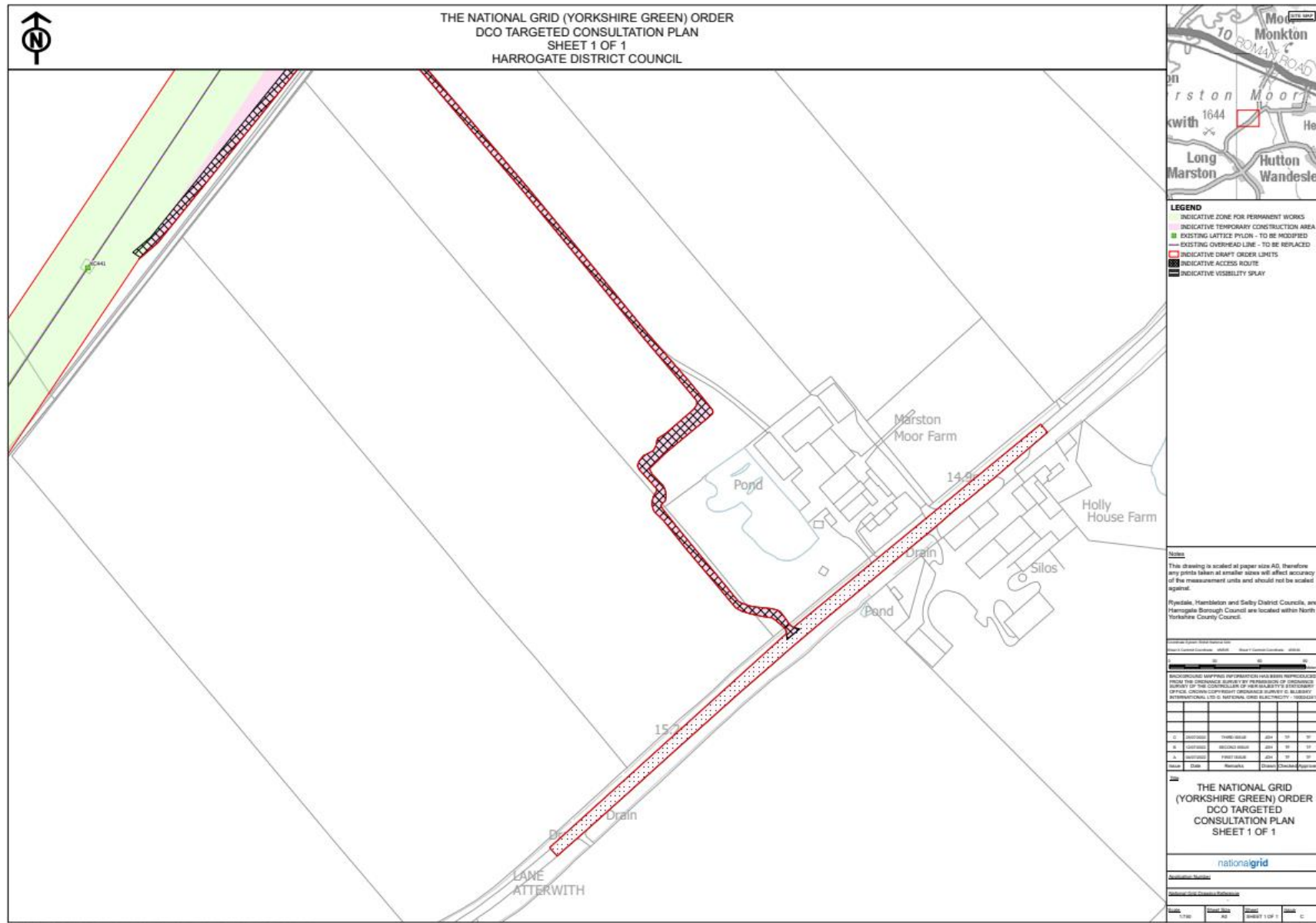

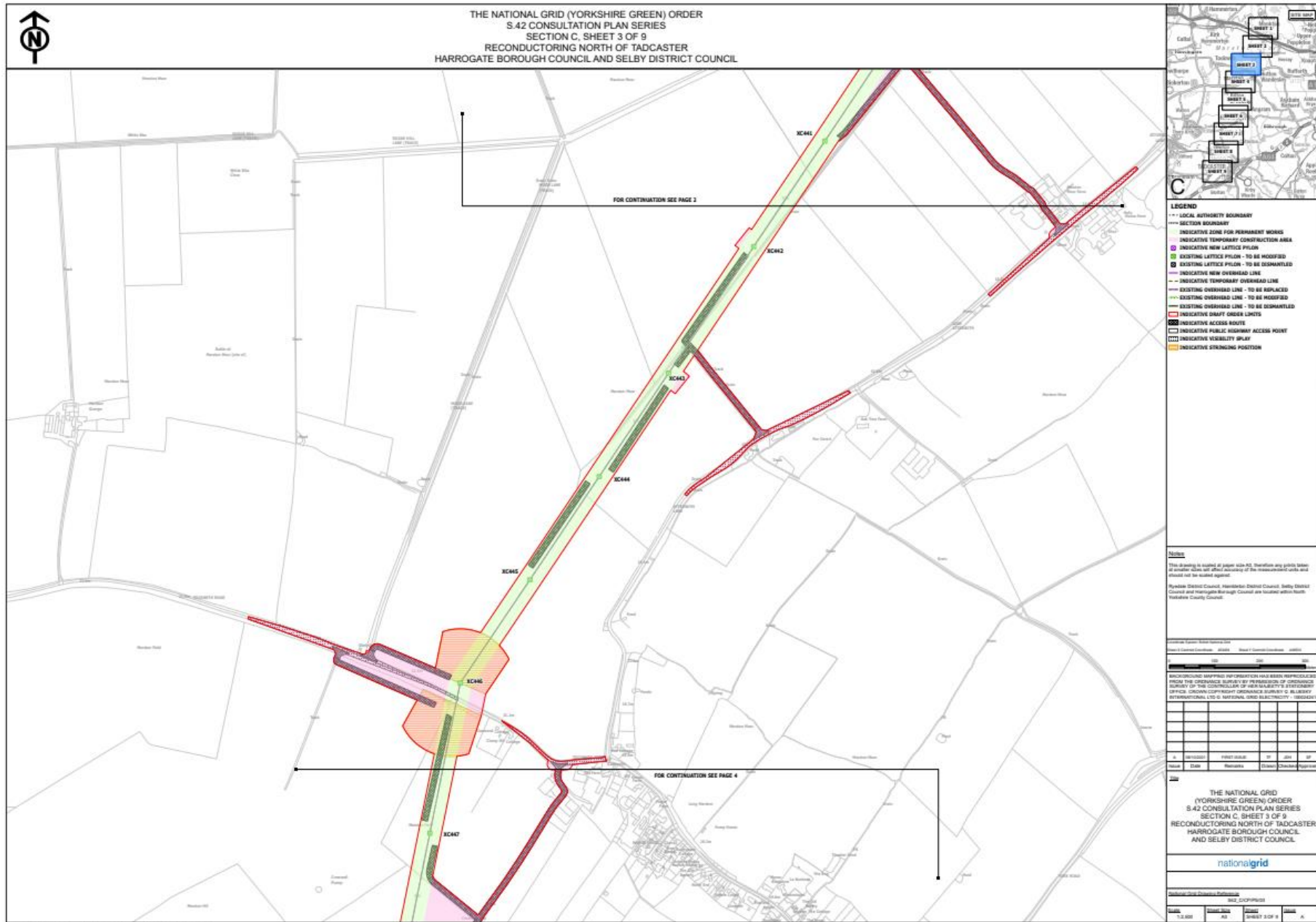

Plans showing Change 3 of the third targeted consultation period




The original statutory consultation plan showing location of Change 3 of the third targeted consultation period

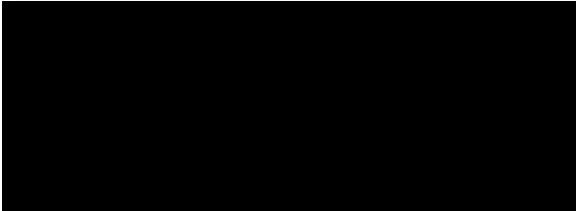

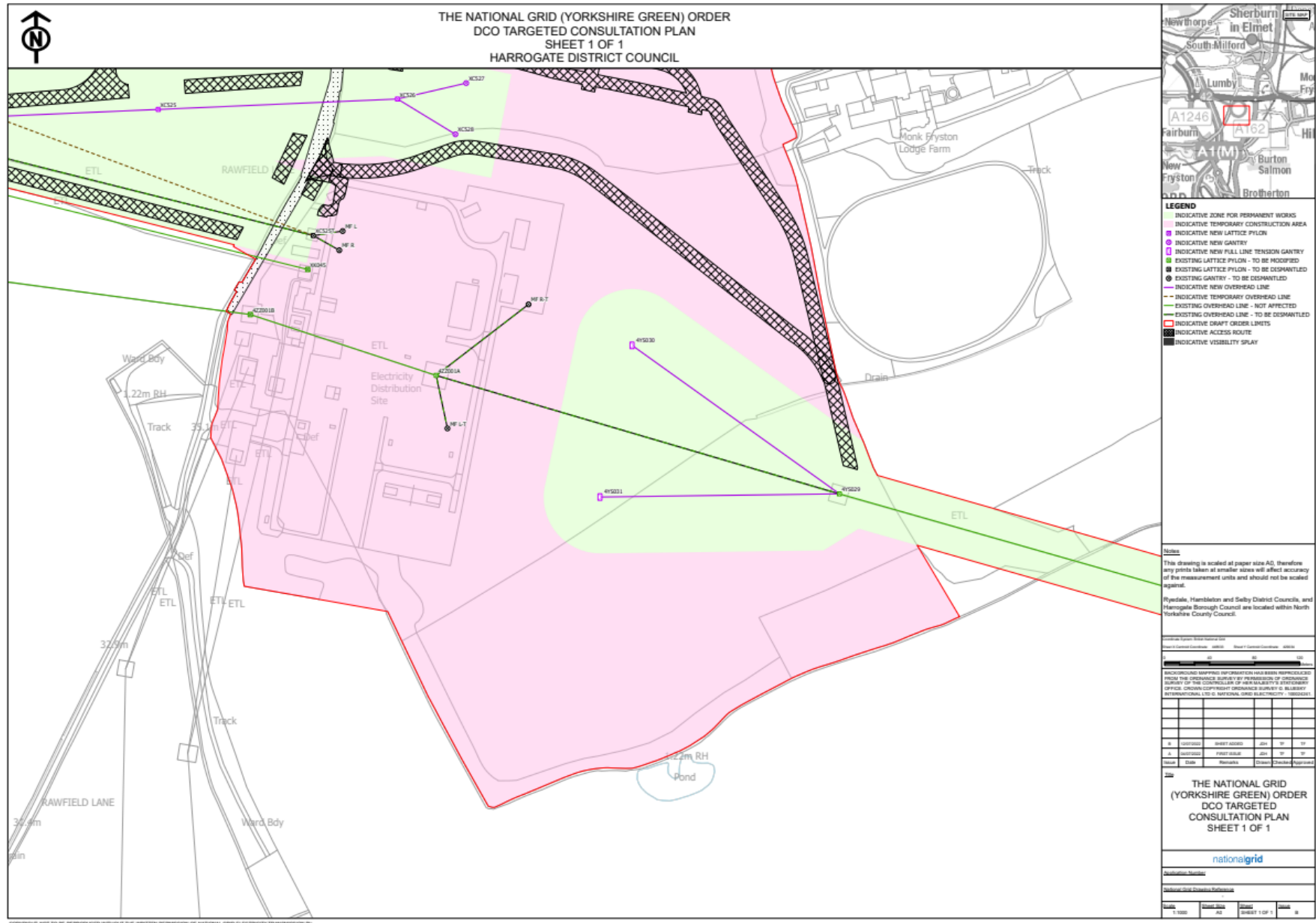

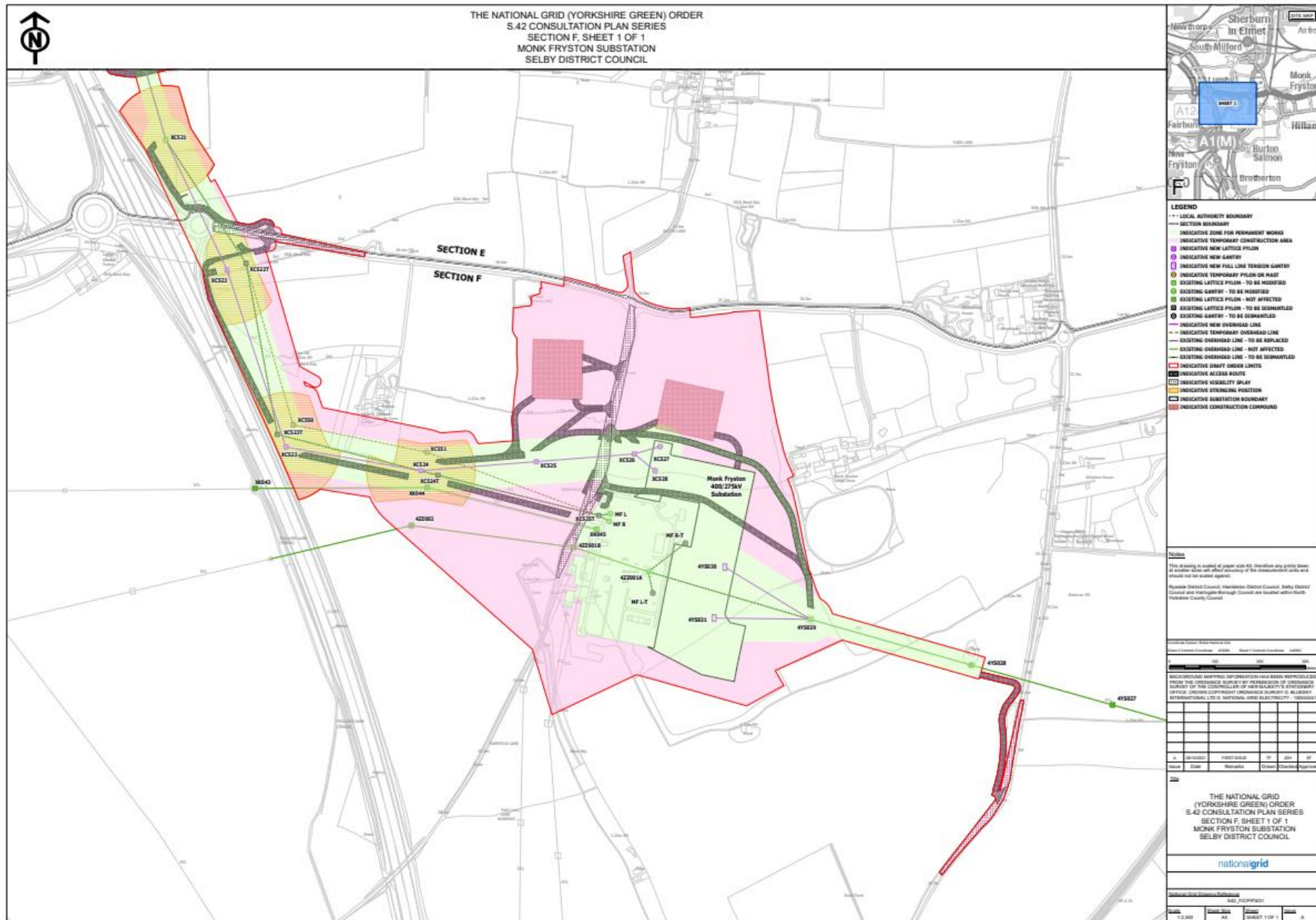

TARGETED CONSULTATION: SECTION 42 AND SECTION 44 OF THE PLANNING ACT 2008 (AS AMENDED) (“THE ACT”)

We previously wrote to you to consult you on National Grid Electricity Transmission plc's (“NGET”) proposed Yorkshire Green Energy Enablement (GREEN) Project (the “Project”) and are now writing to you to consult you on some changes we propose to make as detailed later in this letter prior to submitting the Application for development consent.

NGET is proposing to upgrade and reinforce the electricity transmission system in Yorkshire. This reinforcement is needed to improve the transfer of clean energy across the country. It will support the Government's commitment to quadruple the UK's offshore wind capacity by 2030. It will also support growth in this source of green energy in Scotland and the north-east of England by providing the capability to efficiently manage substantially increased power flows in Great Britain and increased energy demand, which the Climate Change Committee (“CCC”) predicts will double by 2050.

The Project will comprise approximately 7km of new overhead lines, a number of cable sealing end compounds, underground cables and two new substations (one near Overton and one near Monk Fryston), to link two existing overhead lines and to reinforce the system to increase the capacity of the network in the Yorkshire area. It will also include additional improvements and strengthening works to existing infrastructure, including existing overhead lines (conductors), fittings and pylons, utility diversions, connections and drainage works.

The Project is sited within Yorkshire, routed from the most northerly components of the Project located approximately 1.5km north-east of the village of Shipton-by-Beningbrough and approximately 10km north-west of York city centre, to the most southerly components at Monk Fryston Substation, located to the east of the A1 and immediately south of the A63. The Project would also be routed via the Tadcaster area, located approximately 3km south-west of Tadcaster and to the north-east of the A64/A659 junction, where new components of infrastructure would also be proposed.

The Project is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (“NSIP”) under the Act and requires an application for development consent via the Planning Inspectorate to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy. The development consent being sought will include a number of other provisions, including those which authorise the compulsory acquisition of land and rights over land, if necessary, to construct and maintain the Project. It is NGET's preference to seek to acquire all interests by agreement.

Due to its nature and size, the Project is subject to the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the “EIA Regulations”). We are therefore carrying out an Environmental Impact Assessment (“EIA”). NGET launched a statutory consultation for the Project on Thursday 28 October 2021 which ended to the public at 23:59 on Thursday 9 December 2021. We consulted on the potential environmental effects of the Project during the statutory consultation in 2021. This information was detailed in the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (“PEIR”). An Environmental Statement is being produced in accordance with the EIA Regulations and will accompany the application for development consent.

Proposed changes to the Project

Since the 2021 statutory consultation, further work has been undertaken to progress the design of the Project which has also been developed in light of feedback received. As a result, we have made changes to the Project which affect your interest in land and so are consulting you under section 42(1)(d) and section 44 of the Act.

Based on initial design work, it was proposed to follow the existing track to access pylon XC463 and XC464. However, following further survey work, it has been established that there are a number of veteran trees bordering this track, and their root protection areas underlie the track.

Given the level of protection afforded to veteran trees, we are obliged to ensure this Project does not result in damage to these trees, including their roots. As a result, the Order Limits have been amended slightly, allowing the potential for a new temporary access road to be constructed, and associated bellmouth, which would avoid the root protection area.

We enclose a plan showing the proposed changes to the Project explained above (Targeted Consultation Plan 57-210116-207-C, sheet 1 of 1), which forms the basis of the targeted consultation in this location. We also enclose a copy of the relevant plan from our statutory consultation in 2021 (S42_C/CP/PS/07, sheet 7 of 9) for ease of reference and so this can be compared to our proposed changes.

The closing date for you to provide feedback is **23:59 on Thursday 8 September 2022**.

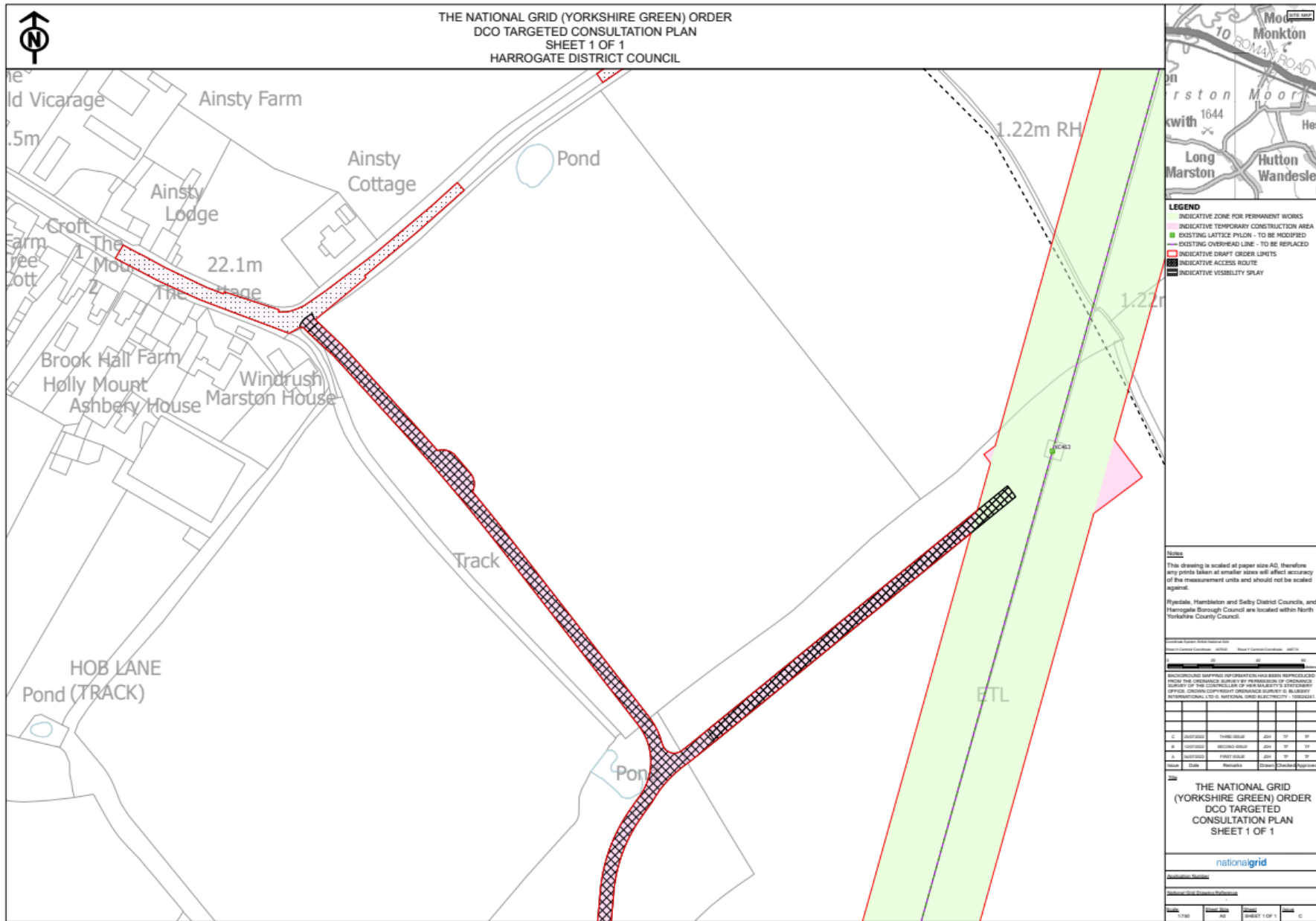

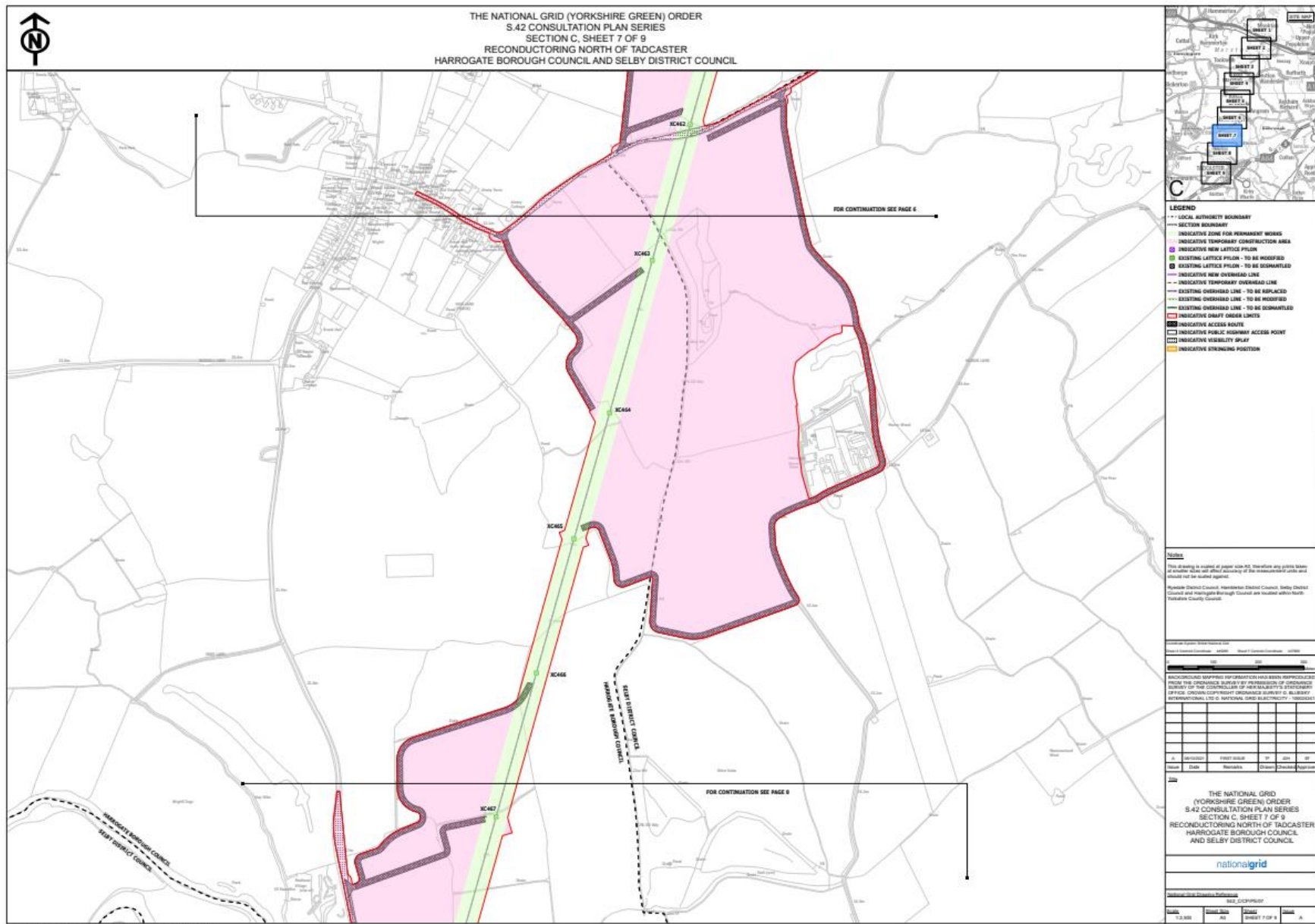

Introduction

The Yorkshire Green Energy Enablement Project (Yorkshire GREEN) will upgrade and reinforce the high-voltage power network. It will enable more low-carbon energy to be carried into homes and businesses in Yorkshire and further afield and will support the UK government’s targets to achieve net zero by 2050.



Why we need the Yorkshire GREEN Project

The Yorkshire GREEN Project will allow cleaner energy to flow into homes and businesses in Yorkshire and beyond. It will provide a new connection and reinforcement on the electricity transmission system, whilst supporting ambitious net zero targets set by the government.

We need to build approximately 7km of new overhead lines, along with new infrastructure, to help reinforce the system and increase network capacity in the area. We are developing our proposals carefully and local feedback is helping us to develop our detailed plans.

This newsletter provides an update following our recent statutory consultation, which was held between 28 October and 9 December 2021. We have provided a summary of the key themes raised in your feedback to the consultation. We have also provided details of next steps and your opportunities for involvement before we submit our Development Consent Order (DCO) application later this year.

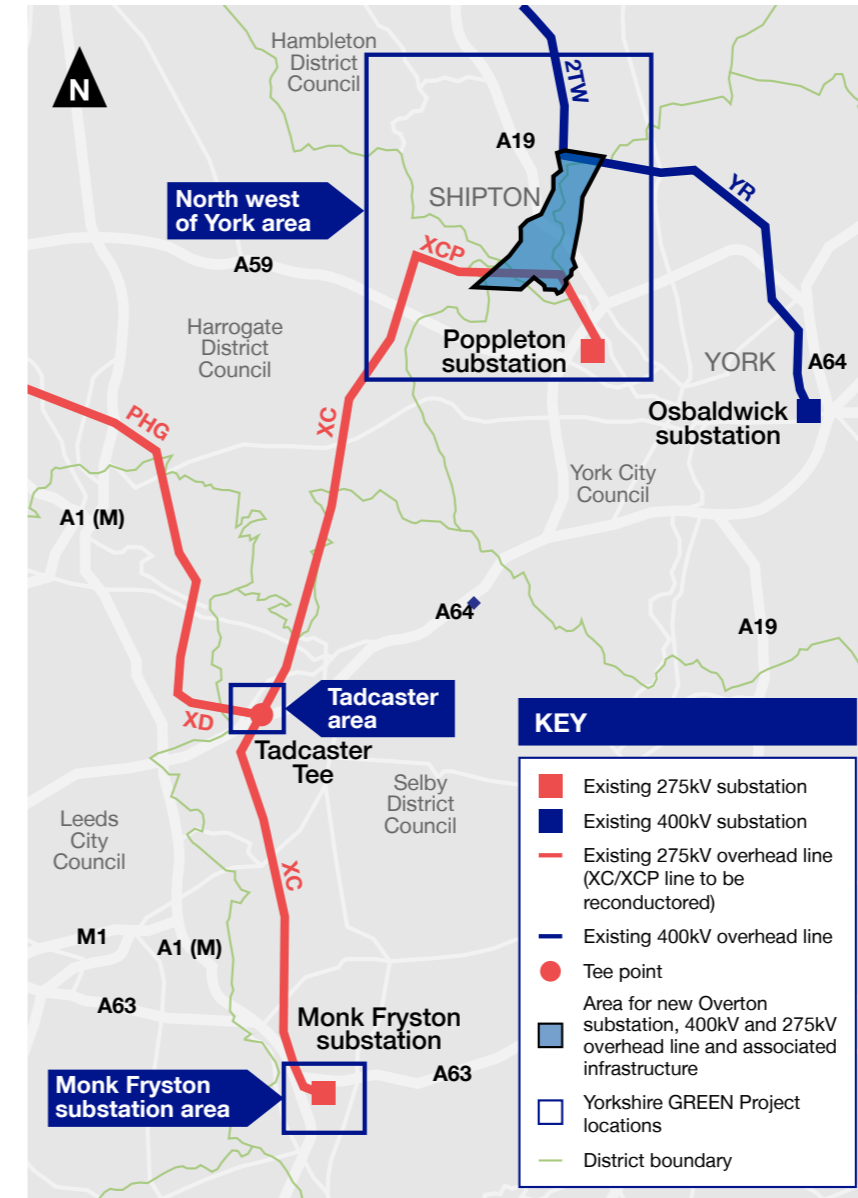

National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET), owns, builds and manages the electricity transmission system in England and Wales, connecting many different sources of energy safely.

Our proposals

Our plans for the Yorkshire GREEN Project include the construction of new infrastructure and works to existing infrastructure.

Proposed new infrastructure includes:

- a new 400kV overhead line connecting into the existing overhead line with two cable sealing end compounds and a short section of underground cable in the north-west of York
- two new 275kV overhead lines routed south out of a new substation at Overton, connecting into the existing 275kV overhead line
- two new cable sealing end compounds and short sections of underground cables located south-west of Tadcaster
- a new substation located adjacent to and connecting into the existing substation at Monk Fyston.

Works to existing infrastructure include:

- removal of short sections of 275kV overhead lines
- replacement of some pylons and realignment of the existing overhead line in two locations – to the south and south-east of Moor Monkton
- replacement of overhead line conductors and pylon fittings, as well as strengthening of steelwork and works to pylon foundations – to the north and south of Tadcaster.

Statutory consultation

We held our statutory consultation between Thursday 28 October and Thursday 9 December 2021 where we consulted on our proposals. We would like to thank everyone who provided feedback.

During our statutory consultation:



We sent our consultation leaflet to **16,900 stakeholders** within our updated consultation mailing zone, along with sending emails and letters to **152 statutory consultees**.



We advertised in **13 local and national newspapers**.



We had over **4,500 views** of our Project website, and our consultation documents were downloaded over **550 times**.



Our advertisements were viewed over **570,000 times** following our Facebook and Twitter advertising campaign.



We received **97 responses** to the statutory consultation from members of the local community and other stakeholder groups, via online and hard copy feedback forms and emails.



170 people attended our four face-to-face events and **19 people** attended our seven consultation webinars.

What we found

Our analysis to date revealed that:



81% of people support National Grid in developing new infrastructure that will help the UK to achieve net zero targets.



84% of people agree with the identified need for the Yorkshire GREEN Project.

Consultation themes

The table below presents a snapshot of feedback themes from our statutory consultation and what we're doing ahead of submitting our DCO application, planned for later this year. A detailed breakdown will be provided in a Consultation Report, which will be submitted as part of our application.

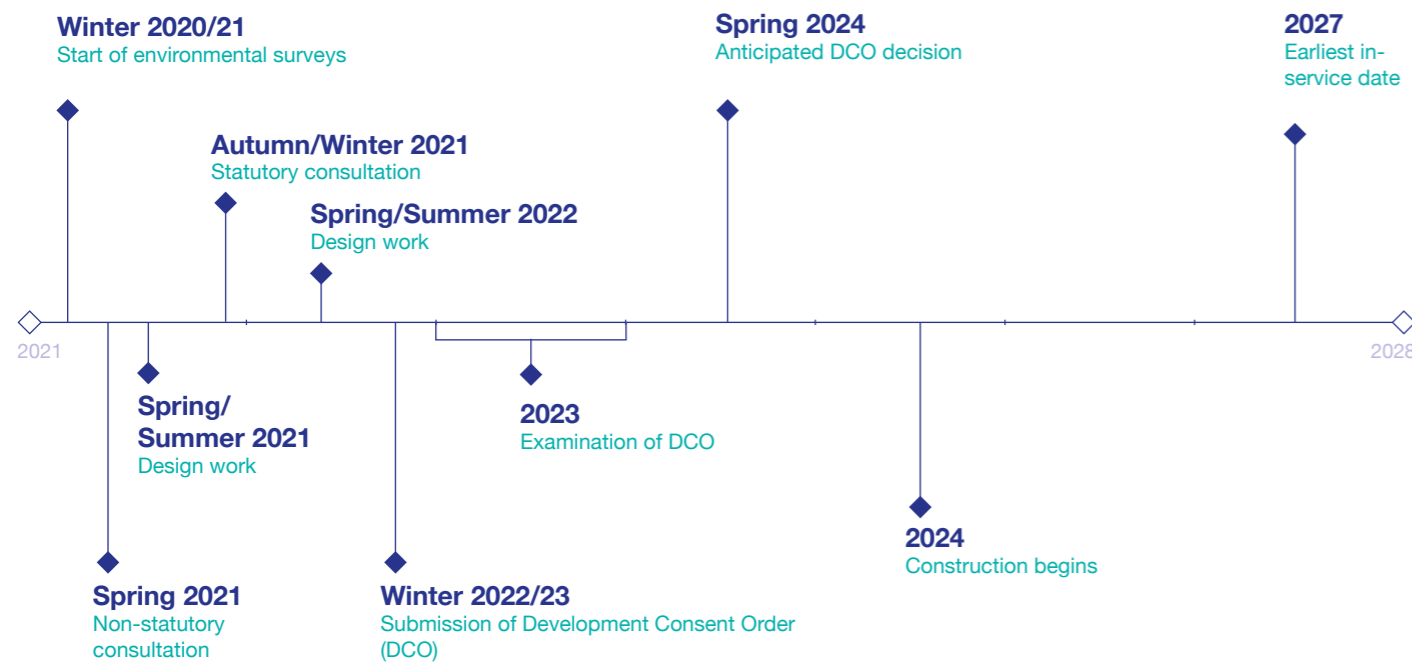
Topic area	Summary of feedback	What we're doing
Landscape and Visual 	Some respondents highlighted the potential visual impact of the Project due to new pylons and overhead lines. There was a preference from some respondents for putting cables underground.	We have carefully considered potential impacts of new overhead lines, pylons and other infrastructure, and any likely measures required to reduce these impacts. Our assessments are continuing and the results will be submitted as part of our final DCO application. As a company, National Grid is committed to developing an efficient, economic and coordinated network in a way that reduces impacts on local communities.
Public Rights of Way 	Some respondents highlighted the importance of ensuring minimal impacts on PRoW during construction.	The project will include planting and landscaping at the substation locations if required to mitigate the impacts of the scheme and to help screen the new infrastructure and soften potential visual impacts. Indicative zones for this mitigation planting were set out within the PEIR and are being developed in more detail to be included in the DCO application. We are aware of footpaths and rights of way in the local area that may be impacted and are currently working with the relevant Local Planning Authorities to agree how they can be managed during construction. These measures, along with a public rights of way management plan, will be included in our final DCO application.
Flood risk and drainage 	Some respondents were concerned about flood risk and drainage and highlighted the importance of careful management during construction.	We are currently carrying out a Flood Risk Assessment (FRA), which will identify if any measures are required to reduce the impact on flood risk and drainage. The FRA will be included in our final DCO application.
Cumulative impact 	Some respondents noted other developments in the area and the importance of closely monitoring these plans as the Yorkshire GREEN proposals evolve.	We are continuing to engage with Local Planning Authorities to ensure we have fully considered the impacts of other relevant planning applications and their combined impacts on the local area. Where appropriate, these will be considered within the DCO application as part of the 'cumulative impacts' section.
Health 	Some respondents were concerned about the impact of the Project on health, including the impacts of Electromagnetic fields (EMFs).	The safety of the public, local communities and our employees is central to everything that National Grid does. All our infrastructure for Yorkshire GREEN will be designed to comply with the relevant policies and Public Health England's recommended exposure guidelines for EMFs.

Next steps

Following the close of our statutory consultation, we have been taking into account all feedback received and continuing our surveys and assessments.

These surveys will build on the preliminary findings presented during our statutory consultation and will help to inform our design to be submitted as part of our DCO application.

We will continue to engage with landowners and statutory consultees until we submit our final application, expected in winter 2022/23. Our communication channels also remain open for you to get in touch and speak with a member of the project team.



Targeted localised consultation – March to April 2022

As a result of feedback received during our statutory consultation and ongoing design refinement, we are undertaking targeted consultation on minor amendments to the project and the red line boundary shown at statutory consultation.

In March and April 2022, we are seeking the views of stakeholders in these targeted areas, including landowners, statutory consultees and other community groups or members of the public as applicable. These stakeholders have been notified of this consultation directly and provided with updated plans and details of how to provide feedback.

Biodiversity Net Gain

As part of the Yorkshire GREEN project, National Grid seeks to deliver 10% Biodiversity Net Gain, which would mean that the natural environment would be left in a measurably better state than before the Project. We will work with Natural England, using a standardised approach, as we seek to achieve this aim.

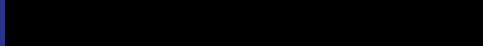
