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1 Copies of Newspaper Notices

1.1 Southampton to London Pipeline Project

1.1.1 The Southampton to London Pipeline Project will replace 90km (56 miles) of Esso's existing aviation fuel pipeline that runs from Borley Green in Hampshire to Esso's West London Terminal storage facility in Hounslow via Esso's Alton Pumping Station. The work is important as it will maintain fuel supplies to major airports in the South East. Pipelines are a safe, secure and low-impact method of transporting fuel.

1.2 Purpose of this Document

1.2.1 This document has been prepared to support Esso Petroleum Company, Limited's (Esso) application for development consent. It addresses question 8 b) on the application form. Paragraph 21 of the DCLG publication "Planning Act 2008: Application form guidance" indicates that "*Regulation 4 of the Applications Regulations requires an applicant to publish newspaper notices in order to publicise a proposed application. Copies of all the notices must be submitted within the application including the date and issue that the notices were published.*" We set out how we do this below. For completeness we have also included non-statutory notices in this document and notices that relate to S47 of Planning Act 2008 (the 2008 Act).

1.2.2 s47(1) of the 2008 Act requires Esso to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) which sets out how people living in the vicinity of the land will be consulted on the proposed application. Consultation must be carried out in accordance with the SoCC in compliance with s47(7).

1.2.3 Once the SoCC has been prepared, Esso has a duty under s47(6) to publish in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected. These notices were part of the combined advert which was published to comply with s47 and s48 in the method prescribed by Regulation 4(2) of the APFP Regulations 2009.

1.2.4 The document presents the newspaper notices published in accordance with s47 and s48 of the 2008 Act and Regulation 13 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the EIA Regs).

1.2.5 In fulfilling our statutory duty under s48 of the 2008 Act, Regulation 4(2) of the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009 (as amended) (APFP regulations 2009) requires that notices are published:

(a) for at least two successive weeks in one or more local newspapers circulating in the vicinity in which the proposed development would be situated;

(b) once in a national newspaper;

(c) once in the London Gazette and, if land in Scotland is affected, the Edinburgh Gazette; and



(d) where the proposed application relates to offshore development—

(i) once in Lloyd’s List; and

(ii) once in an appropriate fishing trade journal

1.2.6 As this application is not offshore development, and does not relate to land in Scotland, no notices were placed in Lloyd’s List, in a fishing trade journal or in the Edinburgh Gazette.

1.3 Non-Statutory Consultation (Corridors Options Consultation)

1.3.1 A period of non-statutory consultation was held in March and April 2018. Advertisements of the consultation and associated consultation events were published in the following publications on the dates indicated. The notices are reproduced in section 1.7. In order to assist in identifying the edition and date of each newspaper the front cover of each paper is also supplied.

1.4 First Statutory Consultation (Preferred Route Consultation)

The first statutory pre-application consultation was held in September and October 2018. To comply with the requirements of s47 and s48 of the 2008 Act, a combined statutory notice was published in the following publications on the dates indicated, in the method prescribed by Regulation 4(2) of the APFP Regulations 2009. The statutory notice also met the requirements of Regulation 13 of the EIA Regs. In addition, each newspaper also contained an advertisement in a more accessible format that continued the approach from the non-statutory consultation. The notices are reproduced in section 1.7.

1.5 Second Statutory Consultation (Design Refinements Consultation)

- 1.5.1 The project team addressed feedback received during the September/October statutory consultation and refined the route in some places. Additional targeted consultation took place in January and February 2019. This consultation included details of Esso's proposed temporary logistics hubs, which will support the installation of the pipeline.
- 1.5.2 This consultation was in relation to targeted and location specific changes to the route, and it was not appropriate to conduct further s48 publication intended to reach the wider public outside the vicinity of the project. Instead, the consultation was advertised in the following publications circulating in the vicinity of the, refinements that were deemed could have a wider community impact. This approach was aligned with the approach set out within the SoCC. The notices are reproduced in section 1.7.

1.6 Additional Information

- 1.6.1 The Southern Daily Echo erroneously published the Section 48 notice on 2 consecutive days (6 & 7 of September 2018) rather than over 2 consecutive weeks (7 & 14 September 2018). As a result, the notices were also then included in the editions published on 14 and 21 September 2018.
- 1.6.2 Richmond and Twickenham Times – It was intended that the Section 48 notice was to be included in the 7 and 14 September edition of the publication, however the notice was not included in the edition on 7 September 2018. As a result, the notice was included in the 14 and 21 September 2018 editions of the publication.
- 1.6.3 No-one was disadvantaged by the newspaper errors as the consultation did not close until 19 October 2018, which was more than 28 days after the date the last newspaper notice appeared.

Organisers urge visitors to buy tickets from official website – not auction sites

THE organisers of this year's Farnborough International Airshow are warning customers about the risks of buying tickets through ticket-selling platforms or auction websites.

It follows serious concerns that tickets and associated costs mean people are paying far more than if they buy directly through Farnborough International's website.

Farnborough International said in one incident, a site charged £186 for two tickets when the actual total cost should have been £85.50.

Gareth Rogers, the chief executive of Farnborough International, said: "Families booking to visit this July's airshow should expect a fantastic experience but it's important they get value for money. "We believe the price we sell tickets at is fair, especially as children are admitted free; however I am concerned that ticket-selling platforms are vastly inflating prices."

Farnborough International said limiting the sale of tickets through ticket-selling platforms or auction websites is a major challenge.

It added that to guarantee the right price and the best value, customers are advised to only buy through www.farnboroughairshow.com, or if buying elsewhere, to check that the price and associated costs are fair.

Running from July 16 to 22, this year's airshow looks set to be the most varied and exciting yet.

As well as the legendary flying displays, there will be an opportunity to get a close-up view of aircraft on the ground with static displays from across the decades.

Winchester Science Centre will be hosting a range of interactive exhibits, live shows and its mobile planetarium for a trip across the galaxy.

And there will also be a dedicated Space Zone, revealing even more about the Solar System.

There will be an opportunity to "fly" back to the past and see the vintage aircraft being showcased by Brooklands Museum or head to the Future and Innovation Zone, where visitors will discover the latest aviation innovations and technology.

SNOW GO FOR RUNNERS

Organisers call off Fleet Half Marathon after amber weather warning and are unsure of re-staging event this year

SUNDAY'S Fleet Half Marathon was cancelled after race organisers decided the event would not be safe to run due to the weather forecast.

Fleet and Cronkham Athletic Club decided to cancel the popular race on Sunday morning due to a number of factors, including an amber

weather warning from the Met Office.

In a statement, the club said it was "with deep regret" that it had made the "very difficult decision".

"This takes into consideration the Met Office amber weather warning forecast for set-up day, Saturday night and Sunday morning, and the risk of snow/ice build-up on the route and wind chill on race day of -8 degrees," it added.

"This decision has not been taken lightly and it is very disappointing for everyone involved.

"However, following specific advice from our Event Medical Provider, discussions with other bodies including Hart District Council's Safety Advisory Team and discussions within the organising team, the duty of care towards not only our runners but all of our volunteers and

organising team, who will be outside for long periods of time across the whole of the weekend, and the wider public is paramount.

"The event set-up takes many hours. Several aspects of the run, e.g. some water stations, medal hanging/goods bag distribution, are completed by some fantastic junior supporters and our duty of care towards under-11s is even

greater. In light of the current weather warnings, particularly around wind chill factor but also snow and ice, we believe this was the only decision we could make."

The club said it will be looking at all possible options, including if the event could be reinstated for a later date.

"But I am sure you appreciate staging this event takes a lot of work, all by volunteers, across

about nine months and it is many factors and organisations which allow it to happen," added race director Penny Abbott.

"At this point in time we do not know how easy it would be to re-stage in the short term, and indeed at what additional cost to us. Please hold on to your race number until a decision has been announced.

"We are of course very sorry for this decision -

we know all of our runners look forward to running at Fleet and have many reasons for doing it.

"For any of you who know us as organisers, you will know how passionate we are about the Fleet Half Marathon and it will come as no surprise to you that we are all truly sorry we have had no choice but to make this difficult decision."

Adultery on the rise

ESHER is the most adulterous town in Surrey and the tenth in the UK, according to figures released by affair website iHesocounters.com.

The number of site users in each town has been mapped onto the towns' adult populations to give a percentage score.

Esher has 475 users on the site looking to have an affair - 1.9 per cent of its adult population and the town has climbed 57 places in the country-wide ranking since last year.

The site's spokesman Christian Grant said: "The past decade has seen affairs skyrocket, and one of the main propo-

Footbridge to go

THE footbridge beside Kingston Station will be removed next month as part of the Kingston Co Cycle programme.

Major roadworks will be taking place on the weekend of April 14 and 15 while the bridge over Kingsgate Road is removed, and extensive traffic disruption is expected.

Diversion will start from 5pm on Saturday April 14, and are expected to remain in place until Sunday afternoon.

Kingston Station will be closed, as will rail lines to Wimbledon and Surbiton, and there will be rail replacement buses in place.

Buses 85, 111, 226, 261, 268, 411, 421, 461, X26 will be affected by the works.

Routes 111, 226, 265, 411, 461, 461, will terminate at Wood Street opposite Bentalls, while route 85 will be diverted via the B71 route so it will not stop at Clarence Street, Kingsgate Road and Richmond Road to Upper Ham Road.

Route 261 will stop in Wood Street at Bentalls and passengers must continue their jour-

ney from Crosswell Road bus station.

Route X26 will be diverted via Richmond Bridge.

The council has confirmed the town centre will "remain open for business" with clear signage to allow drivers to get around easily. All carparks will be open and accessible from both Kingston and Richmond.

Drivers from east to west along Wood Street will not be able to access the A307 Richmond Road via the part of Kingsgate Road under the footbridge and railway; they will instead be diverted along Horse Fair to a diversion route via Hampton Wick and Richmond.

Kingston Bridge will be open for buses, cyclists and motorists who want to park in the Bentalls and John Lewis car parks.

All other eastbound traffic from the western side of the bridge will be diverted at the Horse Fair roundabout in Hampton Wick as follows:

- Via Richmond - between Hampton Court Road and Richmond Road via Sandy Lane, Twickenham Road and Star and Gerler Hill.
- Via Kingston - between Hampton Court Road and Woodfield Way via Hampton Court Way, A5 Kingston bypass and Ewell Road.
- Vehicles over 15t will be diverted from Hampton Court Road and Woodfield Way via Summer Road and Portsmouth Road.
- Seven Kings Way: The one-

way system on Seven Kings Way in Kingston will be temporarily reversed to assist with traffic management. Drivers will still have access to Seven Kings Way via Richmond Road and Sury Basin, Kingsgate Road and Sopwith Way can be used to exit from Seven Kings Way.

Pedestrians and cyclists will no longer be able to use the bridge after April 3 until its replacement is ready for use in six months.

Alternative routes:

COUNCIL MAKES HOUSING COMPANY BID

ALDERSHOT and Farnborough could soon have a council-owned local housing company.

Rushmore Borough Council (RBC) plans to set up the new wholly-owned company in a bid to deliver more new homes and increase the quality of temporary accommodation.

A report to RBC's Policy and Project Advisory Board said the move would allow the council to hold existing properties, acquire and develop

rented homes, respond to housing needs in the borough and provide additional social and economic benefits, such as jobs and training opportunities during construction, stimulating growth and regeneration.

The report states: "There is widespread agreement that long term under-supply of housing has created unaffordable house prices and rents with a quarter of young adults still living with their parents, and long waiting lists for social housing."

"It is estimated that the country needs from 225,000 to 275,000 or

more homes per year to keep up with population growth and to start to tackle years of under-supply."

Last year the government identified three priority housing areas in under-supply - not enough local authorities planning for the homes they need; house building that is simply too slow; and a construction industry that is too reliant on a small number of big players.

"As a consequence of under-supply, the ratio of average house prices to average earnings has more than doubled since 1990," states the RBC re-

port. "For many people that means a safe, secure home of their own is unattainable."

The principle source of data on the local housing market is the Strategic Housing Market Assessment (SHMA), covering a defined housing market area (HMA) that includes the administrative areas of Rushmore, Hart and Surrey Heath.

The three councils jointly commissioned the SHMA to assess future housing need across the HMA.

The November 2016 SHMA identifies a housing need of 1,200 homes a

year across the HMA between 2014 and 2032. Of these, 436 homes a year are identified as being required within Rushmore, a total need of 7,850 dwellings to be provided in the borough by 2032.

The SHMA identifies that in Rushmore average house prices increased by 27% between 2010 and 2015. The household income needed to buy a property in the lowest quartile of house prices (£197,000) would be £41,600, while households need an income of £28,000 to afford one of the lowest priced (lower quartile) private rented properties.

The SHMA also revealed that one-fifth of private and social rented dwellings are overcrowded.

The RBC report states that the proportion of homes owned by private sector landlords in the borough increased from 6% of the total housing stock in 2001 to 18% in 2011, due to the increased number of buy-to-let landlords, but it warned that a private sector survey in 12 areas of the borough identified issues of disrepair, overcrowding and small, non-licensable houses in multiple occupancy.

Council Executive Barbara Hurst, RBC's cabinet member for planning and economy, said: "Our council plan sets out our ambitions to develop more, good quality private rented and affordable homes and establishing a housing company will help us to achieve this vision and participate directly in the provision of housing for our residents."

A further meeting of the policy and project advisory board will consider the financial and management case and proposed governance arrangements of the new housing company.

PUBLIC FOOTPATH NO. 351 (ASB)
TEMPORARY PROHIBITION OF TRAFFIC ORDER 2018
The Surrey County Council Public Footpath No. 351 (Asb) Temporary Prohibition of Traffic Order 2018 was made on the grounds of public safety due to construction work. The Order came into operation on 15 March 2018 and was due to expire on 15 September 2018. It has now been continued in force by the Secretary of State for Transport until 15 September 2019 or completion of the works, whichever is earlier. The Order as continued will have the effect of prohibiting all traffic on foot or by any other means from entering or proceeding along Footpath No. 351 (Asb) which extends from its junction with Footpath 349 (Asb) (Grid ref. 485000 749000) in a generally north easterly direction for approximately 222 metres.

The prohibition described above will only be operative while the County Council, or an authorised person acting on its behalf, displays signs prohibiting the said movements. Access to properties will not be affected by this temporary closure.

The alternative route from the south western end of the closure is to proceed in a south easterly direction along Footpath 349 to its junction with DCAT 518. Turn left onto DCAT 518 and proceed in an easterly and then north easterly direction to its junction with Footpath 350. Turn left onto Footpath 350 and proceed in a north westerly direction to the north easterly end of the closure. 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PLEA FOR TREATMENT

Terminally-ill father petitions to extend use of cancer drug

A TERMINALLY ill patient feels like he has been told to 'go home and die' after two years of access to medication.

Father-of-two Mick Cole faces an uphill struggle to extend cancer treatment he believes is keeping him alive.

The 52-year-old Aldershot man signed a waiver allowing him to be treated for two years with previously unlicensed medication.

But now the two years are over, Mr Cole wants to know why the NHS is not prepared to keep him on the immunotherapy drug. The NHS say there is no evidence to suggest further treatment would be of benefit to lung cancer sufferers, but he disagrees.

Mr Cole was diagnosed with testicular cancer in 2015. He had surgery and was given chemotherapy treatment at the Royal Surrey County Hospital in Guildford.

Further scans revealed that the cancer, which had spread to his lungs and liver, was terminal and in June 2016 he was placed on a two-year course of pembrolizum-

ab through an early access to medicine scheme (EAMS).

The drug, which is now licensed, is designed to encourage the body's immune system to fight off cancer cells.

Mr Cole believes the drug has had a life-extending impact on his condition and is fearful that without it, he could face death far sooner.

He said he had signed up to the two-year course because he did not believe his life expectancy would be more than a few months, adding, "so obviously you are going to sign anything".

He said: "After about six months it shrunk both tumours a little bit and after that it has just kept it stable for two years, which is keeping me here basically. It hasn't spread or grown at all in the last two years. I'm stage four terminal already and on chemotherapy, it was still growing so you can see that it has done something already."

"If I had melanoma, I can have the same treatment with the same drug for as long as I want but that doesn't apply to lung cancer. Most people don't die from melanoma so if you are looking at it from a horrible black and white cost perspec-

tive, you would be using it on a lot for people for that than you would for lung cancer patients."

An NHS spokesman has said the two cancers, lung cancer and melanoma, cannot be compared.

Three years ago Mr Cole's life was turned upside down when he was diagnosed with cancer.

He had plans to move house with wife Stacy and had been offered a new job. However, both prospects fell through after the former sales manager found he was ill.

Now, he says the most important thing is to get more time with his children, Jasmine, 12, and Josh, 16.

"It feels like I have just been told to go home and die," he said. "The doctors have offered me chemotherapy again, but I have already been sat down in a room and told it would never work for me. So I won't be having that again."

"I have now been told I will be sent for monthly scans, but to be honest, what is the point of that? If it starts growing again there is nothing to give me. There is no point in doing the rest of it really if they are not going to give it to me."

"It is like saying, 'well I know what you need but

you have already had it. We didn't think you'd get to two years anyway so think yourself lucky."

"The most important thing for me really is getting to have a bit more time with my kids."

"I think I am possibly the first person in the UK to get this far with it, so it is new for everyone."

"There are quite a few other people I have found online who are approaching the same situation but are not quite there yet."

A spokesman from the Royal Surrey County Hospital said: "The trust uses all available mechanisms to ensure that patients receive the most effective treatments, including the EAMS. The duration of course treatments is dictated by the evidence gathered during clinical trials."

"As yet, there is no clinical evidence to show that continuing treatment with pembrolizumab beyond two years would provide any further clinical benefit to the patient."

"Undeterred, Mr Cole wants to extend his treatment using pembrolizumab and has launched a petition asking for the treatment period for lung

cancer sufferers to go beyond 24 months.

As the News & Mail went to press, the petition had been signed by 5,400 people – just over halfway to the 10,000 responses it needs to warrant a government response.

A spokesman for National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) said: "When NICE

appraised pembrolizumab for treating PD-L1-positive non-small-cell lung cancer after chemotherapy, Merck Sharp & Dohme proposed including a rule stopping treatment after two years of uninterrupted treatment and no documented disease progression as this reflected their key clinical trial. Our independent

appraisal committee incorporated this rule into its recommendation. "We will consider whether there is new evidence available that suggests the guidance needs to be updated next year."

'BIKE HELMET SAVED MY LIFE'

"I WOULD be dead or seriously injured and in a vegetative state if it wasn't for my helmet."

These are the words of an Andover man after he was caught up in a collision while racing his bicycle and skidded for 50 metres, bleeding, across tarmac.

John Penfound, of St Swithin Way, is still recovering after the accident in a race at Thrupton circuit on August 14 when he was leant into by another rider and the pair became tangled.

"Most of us are just worried about damaging our bikes rather than ourselves, except for this one rider on my left side who leant on me and I thought 'what are you doing' and then his handlebars got caught up in mine."

John's bike collapsed and his helmeted head hit the tarmac.

"I went down and my head smacked the tarmac and I just began to slide – the paramedics reckon I must have slid about 50 metres on my head."

"I can just remember thinking 'please stop', I just seemed to be sliding for ages. It felt as if my face was on a cheese grater."

Diversion concerns

58-mile trek for lorries

ANDOVER is expected to see an influx of lorries as a 58-mile diversion is set to be put in place while multi-million-pound roadworks go ahead.

The M27 is to close over the weekend of September 28 as a scheme to replace Romsey Road bridge gets under way.

The diversion is currently listed to direct traffic to Andover, the A303, out to Salisbury and back round to Southampton.

Romsey Road bridge, which travels over the motorway, was built in the 1970s and links Southampton to Romsey through Nursling.

Highways England, route sponsor John Henderson said: "Our work to replace the Romsey Road bridge is a vital part of our work to ensure that the bridges on England's major roads remain operating safely and reliably for the millions of people who depend on them every day.

"This is the best, safest way to complete the work and minimise overall disruption.

"Completing these key phases of work at the weekend means that restrictions can be kept to a minimum at other, busier times and we have chosen diversions that are the most suitable for the type and volume of traffic that usually uses the M27."

But with the listed diversion route taking 58 miles to complete for heavy goods vehicles, councillors say it is likely that those with local knowledge will cut through smaller roads to avoid the lengthy alternative.

Test Valley Borough Council deputy leader Councillor Nick Adams-King said work from the authority's side was being done.

He said: "While the Highways Agency diversions are sending motorists via Salisbury and the A303, it's clear to me anyone with local knowledge, or using Sat Nav diverts, will use the alternative routes across southern Test Valley.

"Local routes are therefore likely to be extremely busy. We are therefore recommending Test Valley residents plan ahead if they are travelling, even locally, on those weekends.

"We're reinforcing this on social media throughout the run up to each of the weekends."

The scheme, which totals £19 million, will see the closure in place for two further weekends until the project is completed in October next year.

When Tony Noskes, owner of The Rockhouse, saw the CCTV footage of the incident, his response was: "What a doughnut."

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RECOGNITION FOR LIFESAVING DUO

TWO quick-thinking police officers who saved a man's life have been honoured for their heroic actions.

PC Katie McGloin and PC Ian Castle from Basingstoke response and patrol team were two of the officers honoured at an awards ceremony held at Hampshire Constabulary's training headquarters in Netley.

The pair were the first on the scene in January 2017 when a dog walker reported seeing a man leap from a tree and leave himself hanging.

PC McGloin quickly climbed 15ft up the tree to cut the man free while PC Castle managed to break the man's fall, safely lowering him to the ground.

The officers then started performing CPR on the man, taking it in turns until the ambulance arrived.

Without their quick thinking that day that man would not be alive today.

Both officers have been awarded the Royal Humane Society Certificate of Resuscitation.

An array of officers were

honoured at the ceremony for their actions including others who performed CPR on a newborn baby and some who lifted a bus to rescue a man trapped underneath.

Chief constable at Hampshire Constabulary, Olivia Pinkney, presented the awards at the event.

She said: "We work every day to protect the public but those officers and members of staff honoured here have gone above and beyond the call of duty.

"Our officers often find themselves first at a scene and if they didn't act quickly, doing everything they can to save lives despite not being the medical

experts, lives would be lost.

"I can honestly say that when I read these accounts I was overwhelmed with pride – from lifting buses, to plugging life-threatening wounds with their hands and keeping a clear head in a truly traumatic situation, there is no doubt these acts of bravery deserve recognition."

DRUG deals, anti-social behaviour, and criminal damage are just some of the issues residents near a park claim to be confronted by on a regular basis. South Ham residents have

criticised the authorities for neglecting Russell Howard Park, believing it has been made an unsafe environment and a "hive for criminal activity". People living in the area told *The Gazette* that the issues have dated back for years and claim neither Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council or Hampshire

Constabulary are doing anything about it. Marcus Simpson, who has lived in Howard View for 19 years, said he had been directly targeted by a group of young people "causing trouble" around the sports pavilion in the park. Mr Simpson said: "There is no deterrent put in place and

Have your say on plans to improve busy road

RESIDENTS are urged to have their say on plans to improve a busy Hampshire road.

As previously reported, Hampshire County Council is aiming to upgrade Hamble Lane between Windhover Roundabout and the Pound Road junction in a bid to ease traffic congestion.

"We're holding information events where people have the opportunity to see the proposals and discuss them in detail. We very much want to hear what local people think."

The authority said it is also reviewing opportunities to reduce traffic on Hamble Lane by looking at ways to improve people's travel choices across the Hamble peninsula. The scheme comes after Highways England has planned improvements at junction eight of the M27 and Windhover Roundabout.

The public consultations on Hamble Lane will take place at Hamble Memorial Hall on September 25 from 1.30pm to 7.30pm and Pilands Wood Centre in Chamberlayne Road on October 1 from 1.30pm to 7.30pm.

Get free flu vaccination

HEALTH bosses are urging people to book their free flu vaccine.

Hampshire County Council is asking people at increased risk from flu, or who care for someone vulnerable, to book their free flu vaccine as early as September.

Cllr Patricia Stallard, executive member for public health at Hampshire County Council, said: "Flu can be absolutely debilitating and lead to serious complications so it's vitally important for everyone who is eligible to get vaccinated to protect not only themselves but those around them."

A winter flu jab is considered essential protection for the over-65s, young children, pregnant women, carers, those with pre-existing long-term health conditions or a weakened immune system. The vaccination is available free of charge from GPs and pharmacies for these eligible groups.

Surrey's £100m black hole

Cash crisis threatens East St

SURREY County Council has been forced to confirm its continued backing for the 'Brightwells Yard' re-development in Farnham - as the scheme was resumed this week - after it was revealed the council is facing a near-£100 million budget shortfall by 2021.

It comes after an independent review of the county council's struggling finances criticised Surrey's finance team for being "too top-heavy", discovered there is no "plan B" and concluded that the slow pace of administration partnership Orbis - a partnership with East Sussex County Council and Brighton & Hove City Council - to provide core operational services such as finance, HR and procurement - has become a "hindrance to change".

The "deep-dive" review carried out by The Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy (CIPFA), to be presented at a cabinet meeting next week, also slammed the Finance department for being "too passive", lacking sufficient drive and initiative to tackle the escalating issues with budget problems.

Mr Holder said: "Rather than the government preparing for a no deal Brexit, has [Waverley's] chief executive Tom Horwood looked at possible demise of Surrey County Council and the fact that the county will be broken up into four unitary authorities if that is the case? Perhaps we should make preliminary plans for that eventually."

Mr Horwood did not respond to Mr Holder's query during the meeting.

Crowds flock to enjoy gin fest

GIN lovers were treated to a festival dedicated to their favourite tipple last weekend at the second Farnham Gin Festival.

Following the success of last year's one-day event, Farnham Town Council, in partnership with Red Mist Leisure, held this year's festival across two nights on September 14 and 15, at Farnham Mallings.

Councillor Jill Hargreaves, lead member for tourism and events, said: "Distillers, many of them small-scale or local producers, offered a selection of over 100 types of gin. As well as tastings, we had talks and masterclasses led by gin experts, making this a really interesting event as well as being great fun for everyone who came along. If gin is your favourite drink, the festival was the place to be."

Experts from Chase Distillery gave demonstrations on how to make gin cocktails and talked about the history of gin, how it is made and why its popularity has soared in recent years. Guest also received a complimentary Fever Tree tonic and a souvenir festival glass.

act now because "as things stand, the council will not have sufficient reserves to meet its expected budget gap", which the CIPFA adds has the potential to rise from £3m in 2018-19 to £86m by March 2020 and an eye-watering £94m by March 2021.

The county council has estimated it needs to make savings of around £250m by 2021 if it's to meet these budget gaps.

As well as shedding new light on the scale of Surrey's financial woes, the damning report has also cast a long shadow over Waverley Council and Crest Nicholson's long-delayed Brightwells development in Farnham, estimated to be worth around £50 million.

Surrey pledged to fund almost half the total £115m cost of the mixed-use de-

velopment but "putting up" on concerns in a letter to this week's Herald, printed in full on page 23, chairman of the Farnham Theatre Association Anne Cooper, campaigning against the demolition of the Redgrave Theatre as part of the Brightwells works - has questioned "whether Surrey's dense would place Crest Nicholson Sainsbury's Brightwells scheme in jeopardy."

Responding, both Surrey and Waverley councils provided single-sentence statements confirming their ongoing support of Brightwells - but declined to answer the Herald's question whether or not Surrey's promise of funding is now legally binding.

A Surrey County Council spokesman said: "We're continuing to back the Brightwells scheme and there's been no change to our involvement."

Plans for a new visitor centre, toilets, cafe, ramp facilities and alterations to the car park layout at Frensham Great Pond and Common have been submitted by Waverley Borough Council (WBC).

The existing building, which consists of a cafe, toilets and ramp facilities, will be demolished and replaced by two new buildings on the same site.

According to Waverley's design and access statement, the condition of the current building, built around 30 years ago, is said to be "irreparable considering its age", but is now in need of a general refurbishment.

The exhibition space is said to be "small and dark" and not suitable for larger groups such as schools. It also states that the "general public do not necessarily get the best use out of it".

The existing mains water pipe is also said to be "insufficient", resulting in the water supply drying up and the toilets and cafe "having to close" on a number of occasions. Drains from the toilets "regularly block" due to the clay pipes being out of alignment.

The planned buildings

will be larger than the current centre, however will include a "multipurpose room" used as an exhibition space, classroom or meeting room with the aim of educating the public about the common and the need to look after it. There will also be a new, open plan cafe facing the Great Pond, with both indoor and outdoor seating and a "serviced zone", with toilets for the general public.

Proposed plans include new offices for rangers, with improved surveillance of the site and "larger and more secure" workshop facilities". There would

be space for three ranger work stations, as well as a separate kitchen, toilet and shower area, and an outside yard area where vehicles, trailers and boats can be stored.

Next to the building will also be a new compound for the rangers, replacing the existing compounds around the site.

In pre-application advice, officers stated that although situated on a Green Belt location, the building would "support the outdoor sport and recreation activities taking place on Frensham Common". This "would not lead to urban sprawl within the area" and so "does not appear to conflict with the purposes of including the site in the Green Belt".

The project also proposes alterations to the layout of the car park, with the front row of parking being removed and restored to heathland.

The decision to remove the front row came after it was noted as "one of the most prominent features of the site from distant views" during the early design process, according to the design and access statement.

Delineation between the new buildings will allow the current number of spaces to remain the same, with the implementation of "Pay & Display" hoped to "improve traffic flows into the site and reduce existing congestion that backs up onto Bacon Lane".

It is also hoped that this will boost the council's revenue with the introduction of all-year-round parking charges. Currently, payments are collected manually by a member of staff on the gate.

Gardening guru to give Cobbett lecture

COBBETT the Countryman will be the theme of this year's William Cobbett Annual Memorial Lecture, to be given by journalist and author Anna Pavord at the Farnham Malls on Friday, October 5.

William Cobbett was not just famous for his political campaigning; he had a long and close relationship with the countryside and was particularly good at 'reading a landscape' and understanding its problems and possibilities. He would tell which crops would flourish and which would not by looking at the soil, the rivers, the birds, the wildlife and the woodlands.

He wrote extensively about what he saw in his Rural Rides, but he also wrote extensively in The Cottage Economy and The English Gardener about how to grow and make things. Both were best sellers.

The English Gardener is a self-help manual, concerned with things to eat, not with flowers and ornamental plants, whereas The Cottage Economy is designed to help the rural family, not the owners of large estates.

It explains, in Cobbett's own words: "The brewing of beer, the making of bread, the rearing of pigs and poultry, the keeping of a cow,

the curing of bacon; and in short, everything necessary to teach a small family how to make the most of a little bit of ground, and how to live well by good management."

In her illustrated lecture Anna Pavord will discuss and comment on some of the issues which concerned Cobbett the Countryman.

Anna has had a long and varied career - including writing for the Guardian for 20 years and contributing to Country Life. She worked in radio and TV for many years and was the writer and presenter of 'Flowering Passions' a 10 part series on Channel 4.

Anna is also currently the gardening correspondent of the Independent, a regular contributor to the RHS's The Garden, and is an associate editor of Gardens Illustrated magazine. Among her best known books are The Tollyp (1999), The Curious Gardener (2010) and Landskipping (2016) - which has a chapter on Cobbett. In Nov 2017 she was also a castaway on Desert Island Discs.

Out and about to see a hoppa bus in action

THE Mayor of Farnham, David Atfield, has been out and about in Farnham to see the hoppa community bus in action.

The mayor caught up with the bus at Farnham Hospital and learned more about how the service is benefiting residents. On any one day, hoppas will pick up passengers from their homes and take them to a prearranged destination.

This could be the town centre, Farnham Hospital, a supermarket or the library. Then, at an agreed time, the bus driver will pick up the passengers and return them home.

Farnham Town Council is a long-term supporter of hoppa in Farnham and since 2015, the council has provided an annual grant of £10,000. This money enables a second hoppa bus to service Farnham five days a week instead of only on a Thursday and Friday.

Mr Atfield said: "Hoppa provides a very good service to the people of Farnham.

"Having booked their ride, the bus will pick up passengers from their home and take them to wherever they want to go in Farnham.

"The service is enabling more people to keep their independence for longer and I am delighted that

Farnham Town Council is in a position to provide financial support."

Hoppa is an accessible way to travel for wheelchair users and people with pushchairs. The service is more affordable than other forms of public transport and after 9.30am, people with a bus pass can use the service for free.

Steve Forward, general manager at hoppa, said: "We are grateful

for the grant from Farnham Town Council which goes towards meeting demand for affordable community transport in Farnham.

"The Farnham service is so popular that we now run a third bus. This is funded by hoppa and currently operates on a Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

"Demand is such that we may need to run the service on a Mon-

day and Tuesday too. As well as the convenience of hoppa, being able to travel for free with a valid bus pass makes the service even more appealing."

The project then continues through Ashford in Surrey and terminates at the West London Terminal storage facility in Hounslow.

Under section 42 and section 47 of the 2008 Act, Esso has a duty to consult the local community and has produced a Statement of Community Consultation which sets out how Esso will undertake its community consultation. Additionally, Esso has a duty to publicise the proposed application under section 48 of the 2008 Act and in line with Regulation 4 of the 2009 Regulations. This notice therefore outlines the main details of the application and where a copy of the consultation documents can be viewed.

Proposed Works

The proposed DCO will, amongst other things, authorise:

- the construction of a new pipeline, approximately 30cm in internal diameter and approximately 90km in length, between Boreley Green in Hampshire and the West London Terminal storage facility in Hounslow;
- the construction of all above ground infrastructure, including piggings

- stations, valve pits, pipeline marking and cathodic protection cabinets;
- the creation of temporary compounds for construction works and storage purposes;
- the creation of a temporary construction area extending throughout the length of the pipeline route;
- the creation of permanent and temporary accesses from the public highway;
- the temporary stopping up or diversion of certain streets, public rights of way and public footpaths crossing the pipeline route; and
- other associated development and construction activities.

The proposed DCO will also seek to authorise the permanent acquisition of land and rights in land, and the temporary possession of land required for the construction and maintenance of the project.

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

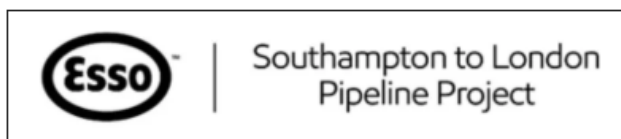

Sight loss study plea

RESEARCHERS are in the early stages of a pioneering study which aims to discover if albinism may protect against a leading cause of blindness.

Despite age-related macular degeneration (AMD) affecting a quarter of people over 65 and half over 85, clinicians have very rarely, if ever, seen a patient with both conditions.

Now, Jay Saini, a consultant ophthalmologist at University Hospital South-

ampton NHS Foundation Trust, and his team are looking to recruit anyone over 65 with albinism to find out more.

The condition is caused by faulty genes that a child inherits from their parents and affects the production of melanin, the pigment that colours skin, hair and eyes.

People with albinism can have pale skin which burns easily in the sun, white hair, poor vision, a sensitivity to light and involuntary eye movements.

AMD, which causes a gradual loss of central vision, is the biggest cause of sight loss in the UK.

"It has been an odd observation for many years that no-one can ever remember seeing a case of AMD in someone with albinism - therefore, something is going on," he said.

"So far, using various online resources and databases, we have amassed a grand total of seven people in the UK over 65 who report having albinism at all and none who have been given both diagnoses."

Mr Saini said: "We have recruited extensively from the records available and have this interesting phenomenon which we need to know more about."

The project commences at Boreley Green in Hampshire, before travelling northwest to Alton pumping station, the route of which passes to the northwest of Bishop's Waltham and to the southwest of Four Marks in Hampshire. The project then continues northwest, skirting south of Fleet, travelling through Farnborough, crossing into Surrey and skirting Frimley, before continuing through Chobham and crossing beneath the M3 and M25 motorways as well as the River Thames. 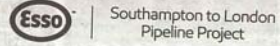

Triple boost for city centre

THREE new enterprises are set to bring a boost to Winchester city centre following the launch of a new gin workshop.

The Blend Academy, a gin school hosting 'create your own gin' sessions as well as classes, is set to open its doors on October 1 and marks the next step in the city centre's Silver Hill 5 revamp.

Run by local distillers Winchester Distillery, the new workshop is taking

over the upstairs floor of the former Post Office site in Middle Brook Street. The building has remained empty for a number of years.

Meanwhile, upmarket frozen food firm Cook has taken over the Jager shop on the corner of St George's Street and Upper Brook Street.

And as previously reported, Nutshell Arts is taking over the Antique Market, which has been vacant for more than a year.

Also part of the Silver Hill area, the moves represent the first steps in the project, officially known as the Central Winchester Regeneration project,

to revamp part of the city centre.

Council leader Cllr Caroline Horvill, who is also chairman of the committee leading the Central Winchester Regeneration, said: "It's super to see local businesses take up space in the city centre and be a part of a thriving business community."

"We are thrilled to have the Winchester Distillery take up residence on Middle Brook Street, where we've already welcomed a Pistes business."

"The premises have been empty and neglected for years so we've totally refurbished the space and with businesses like Winchester Distillery mov-

ing in, it's being brought back to life.

"This company has grown up locally and is a great example of innovation and growth in our district."

Winchester Distillery owner Paul Epsley added: "We've been running gin-making experiences from our distillery in Alverstock for a few years now and they've been really successful."

"This new space in central Winchester means more people can easily reach us and now we will have the space to host a range of fun, educational events."

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Ferry worker honoured for saving life

Wightlink officer jumped into freezing waters

A quick-thinking mariner who jumped into freezing waters to save a stranger's life has been given the top maritime honour for his bravery.

Stephen Chamberlain (pictured) is one of 10 people who are receiving the Merchant Navy Medal for Meritorious Service for going above and beyond in their service to the maritime industry.

The Wightlink deck officer risked his own life in February to help a man struggling in the cold water in Portsmouth Harbour at 11pm. The crew on the St. Clare ferry spotted the man in danger and Mr Chamberlain saw he was not able to reach the flotation device. The officer jumped in and kept the man, who was suffering from hypothermia, from drowning.

Maritime Minister Nasir Ghani said: "Our merchant navy is crucial to keeping the UK thriving – helping deliver goods, energy and food to our homes."

"These 10 people are a credit not just to the maritime industry but to the wider nation. They

have gone above and beyond their duty for the benefit of others."

This is the third year the Merchant Navy Medal for Meritorious Service will be awarded to those who have set an outstanding example to others.

Another winner is Captain Beinda Bennett, of Southampton – the first black female captain in the commercial cruise industry, whose maiden voyage was a cruise to the Caribbean aboard a 148-passenger Windstar ship.

Among the other winners this year are Captain Robin Lock, of Havant, Michael Mockety, of Lyndhurst, and Captain Ian Shields, of Portsmouth for their services to maritime charity.

The medals will be awarded by Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, at a ceremony in Trinity House on Wednesday 26th September.

Nominations have been put forward for those working in the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleets of the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands.



Diesel protest on VW forecourt

Members of Greenpeace Southampton have stuck hazard warnings on diesel cars in the forecourt of the Volkswagen dealership in Shirley High Street in the city.

The A3-size posters put up in August read "Warning: driving this car creates dangerous levels of pollution".

Greenpeace is calling on Volkswagen to stop producing diesel cars and go 100% electric.

Sten van der Plank, Greenpeace Southampton member, said: "Air pollution is an invisible killer, and diesel is the biggest culprit. Living in Southampton, one of the cities with the poorest air in the UK, we're all at risk of stroke, heart disease and asthma by breathing in the polluted air around us."

"Volkswagen are partially to blame for these illnesses. It knows its diesel cars cause pollution."



"If Volkswagen really do make cars that are for the people, it's time they lived up to their name and stop making cars that harm people's health. It's time for Volkswagen to ditch diesel."

Land's End to John O'Groats ride for Meningitis Research

A team of 14 people are gearing up for a cross country cycle from Land's End to John O'Groats and have raised £8k,000 for charities, Meningitis Research Foundation (MRF) and For Leola.

Three of the team's members have had family affected by meningitis.

Toby Paxton, 54, from East Boldre, Hampshire, who brought the team together for the challenge, explains, "Our ten year old son, Monty, contracted pneumococcal meningitis when he was six weeks old. For a while it was tough and go but against the odds, he survived. He did not escape unscathed though and, now nine years old, he is living with the consequences of this brutal and indiscriminate disease, not least in his current battle against a de-

batating and largely deteriorating condition. Biologically, he is a normal, funny, giving and loving son. And most important of all, he is a normal brother. Many other children their families are not so fortunate. I really wanted to get a team together to do something that would make a significant contribution to the ongoing battle to eliminate meningitis from our lives."

The team hope that their fundraising efforts as they ramp up training will help to fund the challenge which will be completed in 100 days over nine days and one every night. Over the course of the ride, they will climb nearly 9,000 feet, which is approximately the height of Everest.

'Maybe we went for too many runs on a pitch like that'

Essex (435) beat Hampshire (172& 211) by an innings and 52 runs at Chelmsford

Peter Siddle took five for 48 with some typically accurate bowling as Essex's claimed their fourth Spensavers County Championship of the season. Hampshire's defeat by an innings and 52 runs was confirmed with 14 and a half overs left on the fourth day.

It was Siddle's third five-wicket haul in six Championship appearances for Essex. He plays the last game of his stint against champions-elect Surrey, this week at Chelmsford, before returning to his day job back in Australia. He already has 34 red-ball wickets this season.

He was well supported by Simon Harmer, who alternated between his traditional haunt at the Hayes Close End and the River End, and finished with four wickets for 64. He has 43 wickets this summer to follow up his 72 last year.

Hampshire, losing for the fourth time this season, moved deeper into troubled waters in the lower reaches of Division One.

Tom Alsop and Sam Northeast kept Essex in the field longer than they would have liked in the early evening. Northeast steadied the ship during

the morning with Kyle Abbott, finally departing after 101 balls for 41. The left-handed Alsop was even more the immovable object personified, his innings spanning all three sessions while eking out 51 runs from 141 balls.

After losing the whole of the first day to damp spots where the wicketkeepers stand, Essex managed to pull off their victory inside three days. It was reminiscent of many of the wins in last season's title success, piling up runs in the first innings and bowling teams out twice. This was the first time this season they had managed to do so. They also took a maximum 24 points for the first time this year.

Needing to take eight wickets at the start of the fourth day, it looked as if Essex would wrap the game in double-quick time, especially when Siddle carried on from his devastating bowling of the previous evening. He had left Hampshire 17 for two overnight, and reduced them further to 24 for four in his second over of the morning.

With the second ball of the over he had Ian Holland playing on for a 25-ball run, and followed four balls later when Hampshire captain James Vince was undone by a beauty, an off-cutter that sent his off-stump flying.

Essex were held up for 14 overs while Kyle Abbott and Sam Northeast added 39 runs. It was a classic example of obduracy, though there was the odd outburst of aggression.

The fifth-wicket stand ended in discord when Abbott called Northeast for a sharp single to substitute fielder Paul Walter at cover. Except

Northeast didn't move. Abbott was halfway down the wicket and applying the brakes by the time substitute wicketkeeper Michael Pepper had gathered Walter's throw and removed the balls. The rock-like Abbott had gone for 22 from 70 balls.

Harmer kept changing ends to keep the pressure on the batsmen. He was on at the Hayes Close End to end Northeast's stay by his 101st ball soon after lunch. Harmer turned one away and caught the edge of the batsman's forward prod with Varnm Chopra holding on at slip.

Bowling from the River End, Rilee Rossouw executed a reverse-sweep, rather out of synch with the match position but Harmer hit back when the South African drove into Nick Browne's hands at short cover for 14 from 30 balls.

Siddle had his fifth wicket when Liam Dawson got an inside edge that Pepper took one-handed going low down to his left.

Alsop, who hit 99 against Nottinghamshire last week, reached his snail-pace fifty with his eighth boundary, a square-drive off Cook. It had taken 135 balls. Next ball he brought up the fifty partnership with Gareth Berg. His three-hour vigil ended six balls later when Harmer extracted some extra bounce and Pepper juggled with the ball before finally claiming the catch in front of the wicket.

Berg showed some late aggression when he put Harmer over long leg for six but Berg became Harmer's fourth wicket, lbw, after scoring 37 from 107 balls.

Hampshire batsman Tom Alsop said: "At the start of the day we knew it was a big day ahead. But it definitely wasn't out of our capabilities. We had a chat about the last day at Warwickshire and we needed to replicate that. Credit to them. Siddle is a world-class bowler and so's Harmer, and they've shown here why they are the defending champions.

"We're disappointed. To fall 50 runs short of making them but again, it makes us look back on the whole game, look at the bowling, maybe we went for too many runs on a pitch like that. And batting, maybe we didn't apply ourselves quite as much as we should have.

"On days like this you look for the perfect start. To lose them those wicket so early you're on the back-foot already and it's another punch to take. There were signs of rebuilding and there was some fight. It probably wasn't a great game to watch. You do try and do your best for your team in situations like that.

"I was just trying to be disciplined, knowing it wasn't going to be easy and almost making them get you out - that was the mindset: I wasn't going to give my wicket away, try and put a few shots away on a day when there would be risks. It's nice personally but obviously the team always comes first.

"Everyone is fully aware of the situation we're in. But the good thing is it's in our control. If we go to Worcester and put in a good performance, then things will start to look up."

Positive Living Event helps with mental health issues

On 10th September a mental health awareness event took place at Leigh Park Community Centre with over 150 people attending.

Local people were invited to the Positive Living Event to find out about what services are available for people with mental health issues in the Havant area.

Twenty agencies were represented, including Citizens Advice, Bereavement Centre, Mind, Parkway, Of the Record, Community First Youth and Training Teams, Chrysalis, Orion Centre, Talk, SDA's, Making Space, Samaritans, Recovery College, Hollybank, Richmond Fellowship and Bisceps Solicitors.

The Positive Living event took place on World Suicide Prevention Day, helping to raise awareness about mental health and what services are available. A person dies every 40 seconds by suicide and up to 25 times as many again make a suicide attempt. At the event there was an exercise bike with attendees taking it in turns to cycle as many kilometres as they could. The challenge was to cycle 100km which would be added towards the global number of kilometres people were cycling on the same day around the world at similar events.

One person at the event stated: "I wanted to attend the mental health day to find out about

what help I can get for my 23 year old son, who has depression. I have met many mental health providers and got some really useful information and now feel more confident about helping my son with his recovery. I also had a go on the exercise bike and cycled 5k!"

The event was organised by Community First's Positive Pathways Big Lottery Funded Project, an initiative that supports people in the Havant area to volunteer in the community.

Ina Allum, the Positive Pathways Coordinator said:

"We had a fantastic day with great support from local agencies, with the Deputy Mayor of Havant, Cllr Diana Patrick and Tim Houghton, Chief Executive of Community First, opening

the event. Cllr Patrick also had a go on the exercise bike, contributing to the 100k achieved by the attendees. I would like to thank all the agencies and local residents that came along to support this event and hope that if just one person got the information they need to help them on their mental health journey, then it was a great success".

Equine Thermography course helps identify health problems

The Hampshire-based thermal imaging company iRed has launched a new training course – in Equine Thermography.

It explains how the use of thermal imaging cameras and correct interpretation of data can identify medical issues with horses.

A US study has shown that thermography can identify areas of injury up to three weeks before a horse exhibits clinical symptoms.

When thermography was a new science, iRed set up a training centre for those in the building and electrical trades to explain how the technology could benefit them. The company has expanded dramatically and has a whole variety of packages and services – and a number of courses of which Equine Thermography is the latest.

It is attracting veterinarians, farriers, therapists and others involved in animal husbandry. Ray Faulkner, who founded iRed in Emsworth 2002, said: "The applications for this technology are never-ending."

"Equine thermography is a branch of the science that allows a non-invasive inspection to detect minute differences in a horse's thermal and neural condition."

"Because blood flows more heavily to areas that are injured it is possible to detect heat differences.

"This allows early identification of problem areas so vets can investigate further and make a more detailed diagnosis."

"Obviously early intervention can hasten recovery and ultimately save a great deal of time and money. Thermal imaging cameras can quickly identify nerve damage, bone injury, undiagnosed lameness, muscle damage, tendon stress and soft-tissue damage in horses."

"The techniques can work in theory for any warm-blooded animal. Our course includes training attendees about the cameras and how to set them up and operate them. And then we train how to prepare reports which require equine pattern recognition and knowledge of equine anatomy and physiology."

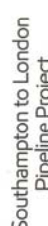

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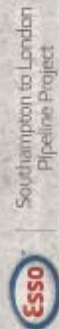

Volunteers catch out drivers

THOUSANDS OF SPEEDING MOTORISTS RECORDED BY COMMUNITY ROADWATCH

COMMUNITY volunteers aiming to improve road safety caught thousands of drivers speeding in west London residential areas in just six months.

Community Roadwatch, launched by Transport for London (TfL), police and London boroughs in August 2016, allows residents to work with the Police Safer Transport Team for their borough, using speed guns provided by TfL.

In Ealing, 2,036 speeding drivers were caught over just 63 sessions and 2,021 were caught in Hounslow over 71 sessions.

Warning letters are sent to drivers caught speeding to emphasise the dangers and information about hotspots is passed on to police to inform their future activity.

TfL director of compliance and policing Steve Burton said: "Community Roadwatch gives local resi-

dents the opportunity to work side by side with their local police teams to make a real impact in their community and we're delighted to see such positive results.

"We are working hard to create a road network which is free from deaths or serious injury. As well as funding Community Roadwatch, our Vision Zero approach to reducing road danger includes working with local boroughs to make safety improvements at junctions, implementing more 20mph speed limits and promoting better vehicle design.

"We're also cracking down on dangerous drivers who put themselves and other road users at risk, by enforcing offences such as speeding, using mobile phones or dangerous driving."

TfL provided two speed guns for every London borough, which are also used by police for enforcement activity.

In Hammersmith and Fulham, where volunteers caught 800 drivers, fewer than 2% went on to reoffend.

Hammersmith and Fulham volunteer John Ryan said: "I'm proud to be part of Community Roadwatch, working with 15 other volunteers in the area to raise awareness of the dangers of speeding and make a difference to our local community.

"I'm often shocked to see people driving over double the speed limit near schools and in residential areas and we often get people pulling over to thank us for our help, suggesting other times and locations when speed is a problem.

"By monitoring speed and sending warning letters, our Community Roadwatch work deters dangerous drivers and shows that we won't accept people using our local roads as rat runs."

Local residents can take part in Community Roadwatch or suggest a residential area for monitoring by contacting Community Roadwatch@met.police.uk and stating the borough they live in. The enquiry will be forwarded to the relevant MPS Safer Transport Team.

Stabbing suspect in court

ISLEWORTH WOMAN CHARGED WITH ATTEMPTED MURDER

A WOMAN from Isleworth has been charged with attempted murder after a man was allegedly stabbed in a Yorkshire town, nearly 200 miles away.

Aayan Ali, 28, has been charged with attempted murder, affray and possession of an offensive weapon in Barnsley town centre, South Yorkshire Police said.

She appeared before Barnsley Magistrates' Court on Monday

and was remanded in custody to appear at Sheffield Crown Court on October 8.

Police received multiple calls from around 8.20am on Saturday September 8, after one man suffered minor injuries following an alleged stabbing.

Chief Superintendent Scott Green, district commander for Barnsley, said: "There remains a lot of speculation and rumour on social media, much of which is inaccurate and is creating a lot of fear and distress locally."

"While it would be inappropriate to provide specific infor-

mation about ongoing legal proceedings, what I can clarify is that at this stage, there is absolutely no information whatsoever to suggest that this was a group attack.

"We've had officers scouring hours of CCTV, working in partnership with other agencies, to gather as much information as we can about the circumstances

surrounding yesterday's incident.

"We are satisfied that this was an isolated incident by a single person. We would therefore ask the public to stop reinforcing the rumour that there were multiple people involved."

"We can now also confirm definitively that this was not an act of terrorism."

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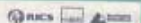

Town anti-social problems worst in over a decade

THIS SUMMER has been the worst in more than a decade for anti-social behaviour at some of Petersfield's open spaces. That's the belief of staff at Petersfield Town Council (PTC) who have removed drug paraphernalia from The Avenue and Love Lane recreation grounds on a "daily basis" throughout the summer months.

Damage has been regularly reported at the latter site while the sight of mopeds and motorcycles being driven illegally across the fields has become a common one over the same period.

"It's been probably the worst it's been in my time here, and The Avenue has really come into play," PTC senior groundsman Dugg Budd told the Grounds Committee last Thursday.

"They used to hang around the pavilion but where it's been so warm they've gone to shadier spots so we're finding rubbish and detritus every day."

Town clerk Neil Hitch said the cost of cleaning up and making repairs has exceeded £1,000 this summer, with Love Lane being one of the worst affected areas.

He said: "There's a constant, constant battle with the fencing alongside the football club and that was repaired four or five times in April alone."

"There's a lot of drugs, laughing gas bottles and there's syringes, it's been a constant battle this summer and I think it's been the worst in the 12 years I've been here."

The problem could ease over the coming months as temperatures fall while plans to install CCTV at Love Lane, The Avenue and Bell Hill are close to being finalised.

After numerous pictures of his travels around town centre were posted on Facebook, Tigs' owner Diane Botterill decided to set up a Tigs of Petersfield group, which now boasts more than 520 members.

She said: "The people Petersfield love and welcome him."

Stabbing shock

Police appeal after teenager knifed near Whitton station

THE stabbing of a 16-year-old boy near Whitton Station on Wednesday has prompted a shocked reaction from the community.

The incident took place on Britannia Lane in the evening, with police and ambulance services being called to the scene at 6.30pm to find a 16-year-old with stab injuries.

The victim was rushed to hospital as emergency services, including armed police, descended on an area typically seen as one of the safest in London.

Whitton ward councillor, Liz Jaeger, also deputy council leader and cabinet member for housing and community safety said: "Your local councillors were all very shocked to hear about a stabbing at Whitton Station in the Wednesday evening rush hour.

Such incidents are thankfully very uncommon in our part of London, which makes this all the more alarming, and we share the community's concern.

"We hear a man was taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries, and police enquiries are ongoing to find the suspect. It is too early to be able to say much more, but in my role as the council member for community safety I will be following developments

closely. Meanwhile, our thoughts are with the victim, and we hope he makes a speedy recovery."

The sole suspect reportedly ran into the station, fleeing on the railway tracks.

Officers, including the Met's Dog Unit, searched the area extensively but no one was found.

It is believed the incident took place around the corner from the station on Britannia Lane, near the junction with Constance Road.

Commuters watched events unfold, as train services were suspended between Hounslow and Twickenham until 8pm.

Beware the stags at rutting season

In the 13 years since I joined The Royal Parks as Richmond Park Manager, the job has been challenging, often surprising, but always a privilege, giving me the chance to care for, and enjoy, a truly incredible place. There have been many 'miraculous' incidents in the park over the years – some bizarre, some funny, and some concerning.

Many readers will have visited the park more times than they can remember. However, Richmond Park is large enough to fit all seven of the other Royal Parks inside its boundaries, and always has something new to discover. Through this column, I want to get you thinking a little more deeply about this vast wild space, right on your doorstep.

I can't begin writing a column about Richmond Park without touching on our most famous residents. The 630-strong deer herd can be traced back to the 2,000 animals which roamed freely on the site in 1637. Facing from the plague, Charles I set up home in Richmond, introduced the deer and took the less-than-popular decision to enclose the land, as his own personal hunting ground. You can just imagine how the locals felt about 8 miles of wall going up around this huge parcel of countryside, where they gathered food and firewood. Sections of that wall are still standing.

September marks the start of the rut (breeding season). The males – red deer males are known as 'stags' and fallow deer, as 'bucks' – are now sporting impressive, fully-grown antlers. Less attractive are the bloody remains of the velvet covering being shed from them, so no cause for alarm should you spot a male adorned with some grey hodgepodge. Look out for stags and bucks trampling their antlers about in vegetation

to build up their neck muscles. They are getting ready to pick and defend a territory. You may spot them fully contending sides of brackets, which have been cut back by our team and left to break down, before we collect them. These temporary 'survivors' offer a perfect spot to see which of competitors.

Rutting season brings another regular visitor to the park – the roaming photographer. These mysterious creatures tend to gather in large packs around competing deer, seriously risking their own safety. I have seen 15 people surrounding a single stag, filled with testosterone and ready to fight bitterly, this is not the time to be creeping up to these subjects, majestic as they may look, they do too. You may remember a high-profile incident a few years ago when Fenton the Labrador was caught on camera taking a herd of deer across the park into a busy road, while his little owner ran after him, shouting and warning of him to come back. The video became a YouTube sensation with millions of views, but it did communicate a serious message about the importance of keeping dogs under control at all times around wildlife incidents (like this endanger and traumatic deer but as the video shows, they also place other park users, such as motorists, in danger).

Like many of our wild residents, deer are best approached from a distance. If you want to see these majestic creatures behaving naturally during the rut, stay back, stay safe and always respect their space.

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Childcare crisis

One in five nurseries and early years providers closed in three years

ALMOST 100 childcare providers and nurseries have closed in Richmond Borough since March 2015, according to data published by Ofsted.

This is one of the biggest drops in providers seen by any local authority in England and has led to calls from The Pre-School Learning Alliance for 'urgent action' to address the funding crisis, which has left more than 40 per cent of providers in England contemplating closure next year.

The data shows that one in five childcare providers in Richmond have closed since 2015.

More than one in five nurseries and other early years childcare providers in Richmond have closed since 2015, according to data published by Ofsted.

All three and four-year-olds in England are entitled to 15 hours of free childcare per week during term time.

But since September 2017, parents can claim an additional 16 hours if both they and their partner earn less than £100,000 a year but more than the equivalent of 16 hours at the minimum wage.

The Pre-school Learning Alliance argues that the funding the Government provides for the scheme is not enough to cover the costs incurred



Funding issues have made the problem get worse

by providers. Almost three quarters of local authorities in England lost early years providers in the first seven months after the 16 hours scheme was introduced, while 98 per cent have seen a drop since 2015.

In Richmond, there were 16 fewer providers at the end of March 2018 than there were before the policy changed in September.

Neil Leitch, chief executive of the Pre-School Learning Alliance, said the new scheme had "further exacerbated" funding problems already experienced by providers under the 15 hours scheme.

He said: "There has never been any such thing as free childcare. It's subsidised childcare."

"Early Years funding is frozen until 2020, and while our costs go up, we're just told to make it work." Since 2015, the number of avail-

able places in England has not been reducing at the same rate as providers, and in the most recent 12 month period, they increased by 2,500, despite a loss of more than 1,700 providers.

A similar picture can be seen in Richmond, where there were 26 more places at the end of March compared to the previous year.

According to Mr Leitch, providers are being forced to take on more children to cope with the funding problems.

Nadhim Zahawi, Minister for Children and Families, said it was "normal in a private market" for providers to close and leave the Ofsted register.

He continued: "We want every child to have the best start in life, and it is great that more than 340,000

children have benefited from a 30 hours place in its first year."

The Government is also supporting new childcare providers by providing grants to reimburse them for some of the costs of setting up their businesses, he added.

Cllr Penny Frost, Richmond Council cabinet member for Children's Services and Schools said: "The childcare market has changed considerably both nationally and locally since 2015 with the introduction of the Early Years National Funding Formula in April 2017 increasing hourly grant funding for childcare providers from £102 to £170.

"Additional changes in how childcare is delivered means that although the number of individual providers may have changed the number of childcare places may not necessarily have been affected.

"This includes provision out of school provision in schools, with regulation for these places no longer measured through Ofsted directly. As a result, the full picture of childcare provision in the borough is not captured in this report.

"Richmond upon Thames continues to be in the top five boroughs for take up of fully funded childcare places for two-year-olds and hourly funding for three and four-year-olds has increased to £5.12 per hour since March 2015.

Taking steps to defeat the rising levels of crime

In recent weeks there have been a number of violent incidents in our borough.

Just a few days ago a man in his mid-30s was cut across his arm with a knife following an argument with another man waiting at a bus stop on Mortlake High Street.

There was a further stabbing recently of a 16-year boy near to Whitton train station.

And just a few weeks ago Carole Harrison was found dead inside her home on Mays Road in Teddington. Although a post-mortem examination could not establish a cause of death, she was found to "have injuries consistent with an assault", according to the police. The Met Police launched their 100th murder investigation this year after making this discovery.

Our thoughts are with everyone directly affected by these violent incidents.

I would also urge people who might have any information relating to any of these incidents to contact the police. For example in relation to the Whitton incident anyone with information is asked to call police on 101 quoting CAD388/08SEP or Tweet @MetCC. Information can also be reported to Crime-toppers anonymously on 0800 661 111 or online at crimetoppers-uk.org.

For many people in our borough these incidents are disturbing as we often take comfort from the idea that our area is largely spared from violent crime. When that comfort blanket is taken away it can be bitterly cold.

Yet these recent incidents are not complete aberrations.

For example, one disturbing trend has been that the London Borough of Richmond has experienced a higher level of 'moped enabled crime' (which often can be violent) than many other London boroughs. At the beginning of the year the Met's figures showed that Richmond's level of such crime was 10th out of 32 London boroughs.

Addressing all violent crimes and ensuring our borough and capital is a much safer place, is essential.

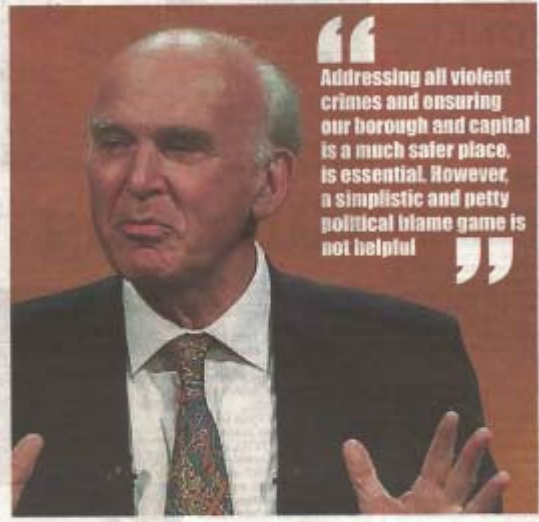
However a simplistic and petty political blame game is not helpful.

For example the buck-pass of Boris Johnson wants to pin all the blame on current levels of crime on Sadiq Khan, conveniently overlooking the fact that knife crime was already increasing in London when Boris Johnson was Mayor of London.

While tackling crime will always need a range of solutions one thing is for certain - a real crackdown is now urgently needed. Yet despite all their hard work and professionalism our police force is simply too stretched.

We need more visible policing and a police force that undertakes much more proactive work. One of the greatest deterrents against crime is the real risk of simply being caught.

We need a police force that can spend more time investigating a wide range of crimes - yet at present too many crime cases are closed prematurely.

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Tackling issues

Stadium has restrictions enforced following spate of complaints

TWICKENHAM Stadium has had restrictions placed on its licence following several complaints by residents.

The Rugby Football Union (RFU) had applied to include the removed east stand in the stadium's licence. However, following a four-hour hearing by the council and 66 official objections from residents, many new conditions were suggested.

Several people complained of drug-taking, public urination and littering. Many residents complained especially about the Eminem concert in July which they said led to more anti-social behaviour than other events, with many complaining about drugs and public urination, and one resident saying his pregnant wife was verbally abused.

Councillor Ben Khosa said he had complained about public urination many times, and felt the issue was not being addressed, blaming it on the amount of alcohol stadium-goers were drinking.

A representative for the RFU at the meeting said individuals were responsible for their own actions, but apologised for issues surrounding the Eminem concert. Councillor Helen Lee-Pearson,

chairwoman of the committee that granted the new licence, said: "The licensing sub-committee determined the RFU's licence should be granted subject to a number of conditions.

"In doing so, the committee took into account the substantial representations from the local community who expressed concerns about anti-social behaviour and nuisance arising from events.

"The committee welcome the applicants offering extra conditions on its licence in response to residents' concerns. We are satisfied that the granted licence strikes the right balance."

These extra conditions include: At least two of the three concerts each year must be held on a Saturday, street cleaning efforts are to be included as part of the "sanitation plan", hospitality areas in the new east stand on non-game days (e.g. weddings, functions etc) will stop serving drinks at 1am rather than 1am on Fridays and Saturdays, and once they go past 11pm on any night there will be no more than 1,500 people there.

The RFU has also said it will investigate whether stewards could issue on-the-spot fines for anti-social behaviour, and there will be more monitoring and training of staff selling alcohol.

An RFU spokeswoman said: "The local community is really important to us as it being a good neighbour. We look at all complaints individually take each one seriously and make sure that we address any concerns.

"We worked extremely constructively with the council on the licence conditions and will continue to collaborate with them on our activity."

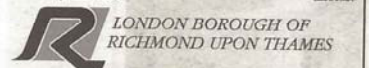

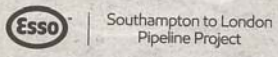

M3 MOTORWAY - JUNCTION 13 NEAR EASTLEIGH TEMPORARY TRAFFIC RESTRICTIONS

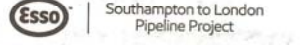

Hospital partnership could mean longer journeys for patients

THREE Surrey hospitals are in talks with St George's in London about forming a "partnership" for vascular services prompting fears that patients could end up having to travel to the capital for surgery.

It is feared the move would mean vascular surgery is no longer carried out at Ashford Hospital and St Peter's Hospital, which are run by Ashford and St Peter's Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, and Frimley Park Hospital, which is run by Frimley Health NHS Foundation Trust.

Patients can currently have their operations in one of these hospitals. However, a source connected to one of the hospitals said there are concerns the plan is to make St George's, in Tooting, the main site for vascular surgery, meaning long

journeys for patients.

The trust running Ashford and St Peter's, and St George's University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, declined to comment on whether this was a possibility, and the trust running Frimley Park did not respond before the paper went to press.

However all three confirmed that talks are ongoing.

Patients are often referred to specialist vascular units if they suffer from conditions affecting their veins, arteries and lymphatic circulation, limiting their mobility.

Some patients living in north west Surrey would have to drive for more than an hour to have an operation, if St George's was made the main site for surgery.

James Thomas, director of operations at Ashford and St Peter's Hospitals, said: "As part of our vascular transformation programme and after a formal selection process we

can confirm we are in discussions with both Frimley Health and St George's University Hospitals to work in partnership to provide vascular services together for the residents of north west Surrey.

"Discussions are in the early stages and no formal agreement to provide these services together has been made."

He added: "A recent directive requires all vascular units to arrange themselves into networks where vascular teams are centred around a specialist vascular hub. With our steering group for the vascular transformation programme we are aiming to achieve this and continue to provide patients with the best possible service."

A statement from Frimley Health said: "We can confirm that we are in discussions with both Ashford and St Peter's Hospital's NHS Foundation Trust and St George's University Hospitals to explore the possi-



bility of working in partnership to provide specialist vascular services for the benefit of our patients. No formal agreement has been made."

A spokesman for St George's added that it was "in discussion" with the Surrey hospitals over the running of vascular services.

Stabbing suspect in court

ISLEWORTH WOMAN CHARGED WITH ATTEMPTED MURDER

A WOMAN from Isleworth has been charged with attempted murder after a man was allegedly stabbed in a Yorkshire town, nearly 200 miles away.

Ayaan Ali, 28, has been charged with attempted murder, affray and possession of an offensive weapon in Barnsley town centre, South Yorkshire Police said.

She appeared before Barnsley Magistrates' Court on Monday

and was remanded in custody to appear at Sheffield Crown Court on October 8.

Police received multiple calls from around 8.20am on Saturday September 8, after one man suffered minor injuries following an alleged stabbing.

Chief Superintendent Scott Green, district commander for Barnsley, said: "There remains a lot of speculation and rumour on social media, much of which is inaccurate and is creating a lot of fear and distress locally.

"While it would be inappropriate to provide specific information about ongoing legal proceedings, what I can clarify is that at this stage, there is absolutely no information whatsoever to suggest that this was a group attack.

"We've had officers scouring hours of CCTV, working in partnership with other agencies, to gather as much information as we can about the circumstances surrounding yesterday's incident.

"We can now also confirm definitively that this was not an act of terrorism."

"We are satisfied that this was an isolated incident by a single person. We would therefore ask the public to stop reinforcing the rumour that there were multiple people involved.

Another consultation about aviation fuel pipeline project

Esso has launched a detailed statutory consultation on the preferred route for its underground Southampton to London aviation fuel pipeline and associated project proposals.

It intends to replace 90km of the existing 103km pipeline that runs from its Fawley refinery near Southampton, via Alton, to its West London Terminal storage facility in Hoozslow.

The pipeline will help maintain around 1,000 highly skilled engi-

neering jobs at Fawley and keep 100 oil tankers off the roads each day. Once installed, it will be buried underground.

Esso held a pre-statutory consultation in March and April on pipeline corridors, which were around 200m wide. An initial working route that followed the selected corridor was announced in June.

The latest consultation is an extra chance to comment on the project and learn more about the plans, including:

- The preferred route of

the underground replacement pipeline.

- The location of above-ground infrastructure, such as isolation valves and inspection stations.

- A preliminary view on potential environmental impacts, based on expert research to date.

- Preliminary project management and installation plans.

As part of this statutory consultation, Esso will host 11 public consultation events to enable communities to meet the project team and ask questions.

Local ones will be held in Alton Community Centre, Amery Street, Alton, on September 27 from 2-8pm; Bramdean and Hinton Ampner Village Hall, Wood Lane, Bramdean, on October 2 from 2-8pm; and Ropley Sports Pavilion in Vaccarage Lane, Ropley, on October 3 from 2-8pm.

Esso has also produced a series of detailed but easy to read consultation leaflets that provide an overview of the proposals.

These include maps and information about the pipeline route, and how people can take part in the consultation. These are available on the project website, www.slpproject.co.uk, and will be available at the events. Printed copies will also be placed at local information points.

Esso project executive Tim Sunderland said: "As a company that strives to be a 'good neighbour', we're really grateful to the more than 1,000 people who have commented on our plans to date.

"The feedback they have provided has helped us understand local perspectives, and community members have provided a wealth of information about their

local areas, which we have found very useful.

"We conducted an initial consultation in the spring, and over the summer we met again with potentially affected landowners, while continuing our technical work.

"The information we gathered helped us refine our plans. Now that we have a preferred route for the replacement underground pipeline, and other proposals for the project, we are once again seeking the views of local communities to help shape this important project."

As the replacement pipeline is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project, its planning process is being managed by the regional Planning Inspectorate rather than those local authorities through whose areas it would pass.

Stephen Marcos Jones, director-general of the UK Petroleum

Industry Association, said: "Projects like this will help secure the supply of aviation fuel to satisfy the UK's significant and growing demand for air travel for both business and pleasure alike."

The preferred pipeline route may be subject to change following the responses received during the current consultation.

Esso will then submit a formal application to the Planning Inspectorate for a Development Consent Order to install a replacement pipeline. Whether or not to grant it will be a decision for the Secretary of State of the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy.

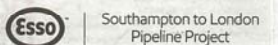

A GUILDFORD couple who took their four-year-old daughter to Stoke Park paddling pool on Sunday were shocked to discover glass in the water.

Cathryn and Garry Cook said they had just arrived for the afternoon with daughter Roxy when another parent told them she had found some glass.

Mrs Cook said: "Garry was walking round, telling other parents to be careful, because there were babies crawling round, and he found another piece."

"The small shards were submerged, which Mrs Cook said made them "almost impossible to see".

She posted a photograph of the glass on Facebook with a warning to other parents, one of whom commented that she had also found broken glass during a visit to the pool on Monday August 27.

Councillor David Wright, Guildford Borough Council's deputy lead councillor for urban parks and recreation, confirmed on Tuesday that "less than a handful" of broken glass had been found in the pool, which was immediately closed.

"The pool had been emptied and cleaned by noon on Tuesday, but it still needed to be refilled and the water chemically dosed and tested before it could reopen.

"Thank you to those who use the paddling pool for their patience while we rectify the issue as quickly as we can," Cllr Wright added earlier this week.

"Incidents such as this are rare and necessitate an immediate closure of the pool so we can drain it, clean it and ensure all of the glass is removed."

"We will complete this today and carry out the necessary water tests before we can reopen."

On Wednesday morning the council's website advised that the paddling pool had reopened.

The footage, posted on Facebook by Runnymede Police on Tuesday, shows a group of teenagers cycling in the direction of oncoming traffic at the Chertsey Meads.

One youth, who is riding on one wheel, then has to swerve suddenly to avoid a car.

Police say this is part of an emerging trend in which young people ride on one wheel amongst traffic as part of organised ride-outs.

According to police, the

trend originated from the #BikesUpKnivesDown movement, which started in 2014 as a major ride in London and has since received backing from the Metropolitan Police and the London Mayor's Office.

A spokesman for Surrey Police said: "Over the past year or so we have seen an emerging trend which originates from the #BikesUpKnivesDown movement whereby young people organise ride-outs in solidarity with their peers as an alternative to partaking in drugs and knife crime."

"Whilst very honourable in itself, the practice also includes riding on one wheel against and in amongst traffic which is obviously dangerous and creates confrontations on the busy roads."

More than one hundred complaints linked to the trend were reported in Addlestone and the council subsequently authorised a Public Space Protection Order for Addlestone Town with specific prohibitions in an effort to crack down on such acts.

These included public order and criminal damage offences.

Parents have subsequently been warned about the trend by police, who say the number of complaints has continued to increase over the summer.

A police spokesman said: "Parents and young people please take note and spare some thought. Several young people were placed on antisocial behaviour contracts and many parents spoken to."

"We're having to keep the message fresh however with a lot of complaints as expected during the summer break and continuing concerns about the attitude of some young people."

GOOD STUFF, KINGS!

Ofsted recognises huge improvements as school leaps from inadequate to good in recent inspection

A GUILDFORD school once ranked among the worst in the country has completed a remarkable turnaround and been rated "good" by Ofsted.

Kings College in Southway was placed in special measures after an inspection in December 2016 rated it "inadequate".

There was good news on Tuesday, however, when principal Alastair McKenzie announced its reclassification following an inspection in July, achieving his aim of moving Kings College straight from "inadequate" to "good".

"I have always believed in our students, in the skill and professionalism of the teachers and professionals at school, and in the passion and aspirations of our parents and the wider community," he said.

The inspection report in 2016 described Kings College as inadequate in several areas, including effectiveness of leadership and management, quality of teaching, personal development of pupils and student outcomes.

"It was quite a difficult thing to have as my first

headship," said Mr McKenzie, who started as principal at Kings College only eight weeks before the inspection, describing the period as "the darkest days of my life".

The Ofsted report, however, provided the principal with what he described as "a mandate for change".

"Sometimes a siege mentality helps," he said. "We were able to create this atmosphere of everyone pulling in the same direction."

After the 2016 inspection, an educational alliance was formed to give the school extra support.

The Guildford Education Partnership announced a collaboration between Kings College, Guildford Borough Council, the University of Surrey and the Royal Grammar School to improve the standard of education.

Kings College also formed partnerships with local groups such as the Guildford Shakespeare Company and G Live to give pupils opportunities outside of the school day.

"As soon as you start doing those sorts of things, people start seeing an investment in them, so that moved things forward," Mr McKenzie said.

But there were changes inside the classroom as well.

"We cracked down on behaviour," he explained. "Really cracked down on behaviour. If you walk around the school, you won't see any children in the corridors, you won't hear any shouting."

Mr McKenzie said that the staff, adding: "Teachers who could only control a class by shouting, we got rid of".

The school moved from five 60-minute lessons

per day to three 100-minute lessons, which gave students more time to focus on learning.

It also stopped constantly assessing pupils, a decision Mr McKenzie described as "really brave" but backed up by research and concerns about the impact of continual exams on pupils' mental health.

He said: "We do exams but we only do them twice a year, whereas some schools will do them every six weeks."

"We do a lot of low-

stakes quizzes but we don't record the marks. We just find out what the kids know."

"That's quite liberating for the teachers as well, because they can just focus on learning and not marking exams."

The report from Ofsted's inspection in July this year found: "Leaders' determined and focused actions have promoted rapid school improvement" and described teaching at the school as "consistently effective".

The report also noted

improved behaviour among pupils, saying: "Staff have transformed the atmosphere in the school through raising expectations of pupils' behaviour."

"Pupils appreciate the clear rules that are now in place and the consistency with which teachers apply them. As a result, pupils conduct themselves well as a matter of course."

The next step is to make Kings College an outstanding school but Mr McKenzie says he is now more concerned with

day-to-day life at the school than with Ofsted reclassifying it.

"To say we are recognised as good is so satisfying," he said, "but Ofsted is just an external validation."

"The only thing that really matters is what happens every day, going forward."

"What I want is for what happens in the school to be outstanding, and if someone comes in and says it's outstanding, that's great, but it's not the be all and end all."

Pioneering NHS dementia study gets £1m boost

A pioneering Surrey NHS study supporting people with dementia and their carers has received a £1 million boost.
Additional funding from NHS England and the Office for Life Sciences will pay for up to 200 people with dementia and their carers from across Surrey and North East Hampshire to take part in the second phase of the study.
The award-winning TIHM (Technology Integrated Health Management) for dementia study enables clinicians to remotely monitor the health of people with dementia living at home.
Led by Surrey and Borders Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, the study uses a network of

internet-enabled devices installed in the home in combination with artificial intelligence to alert clinicians when a participant with dementia needs support.
The aim is to identify problems early on so that people with dementia can receive prompt treatment and help.
Dr Helen Rostill, director of innovation and development at Surrey and Borders Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, said:

“We believe TIHM has the potential to transform care for people with dementia and also those with other long term conditions as well as reduce some of the pressures on the NHS.
“We are particularly proud of our pioneering

work in developing machine learning algorithms to alert clinicians to signs of agitation and urinary tract infections (UTI). UTIs are a top five cause of unplanned hospital admission among people in this group. We will further develop this work in phase two to improve early intervention and reduce people’s need for hospital admission.
Payam Barnaghi, professor of machine intelligence at the University of Surrey, said: “This is a significant project and we are extremely pleased to have received additional fund-

ing to extend our work.
“When we meet people with dementia and their carers who have been testing the TIHM technology in their homes, we can see the very real difference TIHM is making to their lives and that is very inspirational for us.”
The increased funding for TIHM follows a successful first phase involving more than 400 people with dementia and their carers.
Early findings show there was a significant reduction in neuropsychiatric symptoms associated with dementia, such as depression, agitation, anxiety

and irritability, in people with dementia testing the technology.
People with dementia taking part in TIHM phase two will have a network of small, internet-enabled devices, such as sensors and monitors installed in their home. They will also be provided with wearable devices.
To take part in TIHM, a person with dementia must have a carer who is also willing to get involved. For more information phone Surrey and Borders Partnership’s Research and Development Team on 01932 722247.

Campaigners release figures showing 725,000 people affected by 55 decibel sound from Heathrow

NOISE caused by aircraft affects more than 700,000 people who live near Heathrow Airport, seven times the amount of people under the second most populous flight path in the UK.

According to figures unearthed by campaign group Heathrow Association for the Control of Aircraft Noise (HACAN),

725,000 people reside in an area that is known as the 55Lden contour.

Second-placed Manchester has seven times fewer people affected by airport noise at 100,000.

By comparison, only 14,300 people live in the Luton area, while 12,500 people live in the area around Gatwick Airport.

The 55Lden contour is an area where the average noise level across the day, evening and night is at 55 decibels or above. It is the

standard drawn up by the EU that airport have to refer to when drawing up noise action plans on how they intend to reduce noise.

All figures come from each airport's own noise action plan. This autumn every UK airport will have to submit a new plan to the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA), and these will be passed onto the European Commission for approval.

John Stewart, chairman of HACAN, said the figures show the impact of noise on people living near Heathrow.

"These updated figures confirm just how many more people are impacted by noise from Heathrow than by any other airport in the country," he said. "It puts a huge onus on Heathrow to find ways to lessen the noise burden whether or not a third runway is built.

"We will be pressing

hard for a tough night flight regime, steeper angles as planes approach and depart the airport, and a period of respite from the noise for everybody overflown."

A spokesman for Heathrow said the airport will introduce new measures to curb the impact noise has on nearby residents.

The spokesman said: "Over the past 30 years and through our strict operating procedures and investment of our airlines

in newer, quieter technology, we have reduced the population significantly affected by aircraft noise by around 90%.

"Unique efforts to tackle aircraft noise like our Fly Quiet and Green table and trials on quieter approaches, have been recognised by Mr Stewart as the right direction to take."

They added: "With expansion, we have pledged to introduce new measures to reduce noise in-

cluding a 6.5 hour ban on scheduled night flights and offer a world-class noise insulation scheme.

"This is worth more than £700 million to those living closest to the airport and goes above and beyond existing UK policy requirements.

"We continue to work hard implementing innovative ways to reduce noise and remain committed in making the airport quieter for our closest communities"

The project then continues north-east, skirting south of Fleet, travelling through Farnborough, crossing into Surrey and skirting Frimley, before continuing through Chobham and crossing beneath the M3 and M25 motorways as well as the River Thames. The project then continues through Ashford in Surrey and terminates at the West London Terminal storage facility in Hounslow. Under section 42 and section 47 of the 2008 Act, Esso has a duty to consult the local community and has produced a Statement of Community Consultation which sets out how Esso will undertake its community consultation. Additionally, Esso has a duty to publish the proposed application under section 48 of the 2008 Act and in line with Regulation 4 of the 2009 Regulations. This notice therefore outlines the main details of the application and where a copy of the consultation documents can be viewed.

Proposed Works

- The proposed DCO will, amongst other things, authorise:
 - the construction of a new pipeline, approximately 300m in internal diameter and approximately 90km in length between Bourley Green in Hampshire and the West London Terminal storage facility in Hounslow;
 - the construction of all above ground infrastructure, including pipeline stations, valve pits, pipeline marking and cathodic protection cabinets;

- the creation of temporary compounds for construction works and storage purposes;
- the creation of a temporary construction area extending throughout the length of the pipeline route;
- the creation of permanent and temporary access from the public highway;
- the temporary stopping up or diversion of certain streets, public rights of way and public footpaths crossing the pipeline route;
- other associated development and construction activities.

The proposed DCO will also seek to authorise the permanent acquisition of land and rights in land, and the temporary possession of land required for the construction and maintenance of the project. The proposed project is an Environmental Impact Assessment development ("EIA development"), as defined by the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017. TRUCK drivers from across the country came together to raise awareness for a 16-year-old boy from Ashford who suffers from a rare form of cancer.

Alfie Ward has been battling the disease since the age of five and his friends and family aim to raise £400,000 to be spent on antibody therapy which is not offered to him on the NHS.

The latest event saw 120

volunteer drivers take part in a 75 minute-long convoy on Sunday.

The vehicles made their way around the M25, through Staines town centre and finished in Poyle, where a ticketed truck show took place.

Shelley Wells, 36, a family friend of Alfie's, said it is "heartwarming and quite remarkable to know his story is being heard up and down the country".

She said: "The event was bigger than we expected and the response we have had from it is totally out of this world.

She said they had a steady stream of visitors to the event throughout the day adding lots of people had left messages on social media saying they saw the convoy or heard the horns.

"We're very fortunate with the local community too, we have quite a number of people backing him," she said.

Alfie attended the event and Shelley said he very much enjoyed the day.

She continued: "I think from Alfie's point of view it's overwhelming because obviously he is a

teenager and sometimes when we throw events like this it suddenly hits him how many people support him.

"He is absolutely loving today and has got to ride round in lots of cars and trucks and speak to quite a few people.

"It's really exciting for Alfie's campaign to have lots of interest generated but it's also important to us that he enjoys it because he has missed out on things for most of his childhood and spent most of his time in hospital. We're trying to recoup lost

childhood memories if you like."

The event was the brainchild of Jess and Robert Holden, who heard about Alfie's campaign on social media and have previously thrown similar events in the north of England.

Shelley said: "Without them this would not have been possible and I want to say a massive thank you for their dedication and perseverance.

"They have been organising it for about six months and it leaves you a bit speechless how much time they have given

up for people who started out as complete strangers to them, we could not have asked for any more.

"I also want to say a huge thank you to all the truck drivers who came from all over the country and made this happen. You just never know what to say to people who have come out of the blue to help us. It touches Alfie's mum in particular to know people are thinking of her son.

"Fundraising isn't easy at the best of times but to get even halfway to our

goal would be amazing to us. We always encourage new people to come on board with new ideas."

Shelley set up a Change.org petition, which has received more than 300,000 signatures, to call on the NHS to pay for or subsidise the cost of antibody therapy for people like Alfie, who is not eligible for the treatment due to having relapsed previously.

Pioneering NHS dementia study gets £1m boost

A pioneering Surrey NHS study supporting people with dementia and their carers has received a £1 million boost.

Additional funding from NHS England and the Office for Life Sciences will pay for up to 200 people with dementia and their carers from across Surrey and North East Hampshire to take part in the second phase of the study.

The award-winning TIHM (Technology Integrated Health Management) for dementia study enables clinicians to remotely monitor the health of people with dementia living at home.

Led by Surrey and Borders Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, the study uses a network of

internet-enabled devices installed in the home in combination with artificial intelligence to alert clinicians when a participant with dementia needs support.

The aim is to identify problems early on so that people with dementia can receive prompt treatment and help.

Dr Helen Rostill, director of innovation and development at Surrey and Borders Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, said:

"We are delighted this important study has been awarded additional funding to help us build on the successes achieved during the first phase of TIHM. We believe TIHM has the potential to transform care for people with dementia and also those with other long term conditions as well as reduce some of the pressures on the NHS.

"We are particularly proud of our pioneering work in developing machine learning algorithms to alert clinicians to signs of agitation and urinary tract infections (UTI). UTIs are a top five cause of unplanned hospital admission among people in this group. We will further develop this work in phase two to improve early intervention and reduce people's need for hospital admission.

Payam Barnaghi, professor of machine intelligence at the University of Surrey, said: "This is a significant project and we are extremely pleased to have received additional funding to extend our work.

"When we meet people with dementia and their carers who have been testing the TIHM technology in their homes, we can see the very real difference TIHM is making to their lives and that is very inspirational for us."

The increased funding for TIHM follows a successful first phase involving more than 400 people with dementia and their carers. Early findings show there was a significant statistical reduction in neuropsychiatric symptoms associated with dementia, such as depression, agitation, anxiety

and irritability, in people with dementia testing the technology.

People with dementia taking part in TIHM phase two will have a network of small internet-enabled devices, such as sensors and monitors installed in their home. They will also be provided with wearable devices.

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Top honour for life-saver David

A GATWICK Airport worker from Woking who saved a passenger from the brink of death has been awarded a top national life-saving honour.

David Coombor, 53, received a Royal Humane Society Resuscitation Certificate after he saved a man whose heart stopped beating.

David, who lives in Ripley, spotted the 56-year-old man in the international departure lounge looking clearly unwell. "He was sweaty, had clammy skin and had chest pains. He was also struggling to breathe."

David found a faint pulse on the man who then quickly lost consciousness.

"He collapsed right in front of me. I immediately put him in the recovery position. I tried to take his pulse, but it was undetectable, and his lips had turned blue, indicating a lack of oxygen."

David turned the man on his back and gave him cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

A colleague arrived with a defibrillator and David helped to attach pads to the unconscious man's chest.

But before the machine could be switched on, the passenger began breathing on his own and started to regain consciousness.

David said there was a nurse in the lounge waiting for a flight and she said that if he hadn't intervened, the ill man would probably have died.

"I feel quite proud and humble that I am the first recipient in the terminal operations team of the certificate from the Royal Humane Society. I credit much of

that to the excellent first aid training we have had. I was able to put the theory into practice in a fast-paced, critical incident where breathing had stopped."

David said that his colleagues, including Laura Selby and Dawn Baker, also played their part in helping the critically ill man. "I work with very special people."

He said he has not heard from the passenger since the incident earlier this year but "last saw him sitting up on a stretcher, alive and well and preparing for his second life".

David added: "I had a big dose of satisfaction. Being in the right place at the right time made a difference."

Before his current role as an information passenger assistant in the terminal operations team, David worked in security at the airport for about five years.

He is married to Sarah, who works for Sainsbury's in Horsley, and they have four children: Joshua, 28, Sophie, 26, Zoe, 24 and Harry 22.

They and his four grandchildren keep him busy. "There's always someone doing something somewhere," he said.

David and Sophie are training for the London Marathon next year.

"We hope to get picked out in the sweepstakes in October. I did it in 1995 and thought it was time to do it again. Sophie is hoping to do it with her old dad," he said.

A Woking FC season ticket holder, he is very pleased with the 'Cards' great start to the current campaign.

"I am hopeful of a swift return to the National League," he said.

WOKING does some things so very well – the Food and Drink Festival being one such event. Yet again this was a great success with crowds pouring into the town centre to enjoy all that was on offer.

On the first day, Friday, I passed a VIP enclosure where people were sipping cool, pale, sparkling drinks which, given the warm weather, I fancied, but I was not a VIP. I vowed that the next day I would turn up in my *News & Mail* skin, which I did. The VIP enclosure was so nice and no one offered me a free glass of bubbly although I did get offered plenty of sample glasses of various types of drink.

There was, for instance, Crambs Brewing (www.crambsbrewing.co.uk) from Reigate which makes beer using left-over artisan bread from Chalk Hills Bakery in Reigate thus doing their bit for the growing problem of food waste. As every beer was a different style of loaf the result is unique beers. My favourite was the Rye Ruby “dark, mysterious and warming”.

There was wine from the cluster of vineyards of the Surrey Hills including Greyfriars, Chisworth Manor, Albany Organic, High Clendon and Deedes Wine Estate. How sensible to get together to show their wares and supply a useful map of the sites and the cycle route between them, although I would suggest that any vine-crawl would not make for good cycling afterwards. There was also The Lava with its award-winning teas (www.thelavacollection.com). The Woking-based team supplies bespoke blends available in leaf or in biodegradable tea bags. I tried the Rhubarb Patch but the many other flavours range from Green and Pleasant to English Breakfast.

No all-night Big Macs

This plan for a 24-hour McDonald's drive-thru in Woking has been curbed by borough councillors.

The burger chain's application to build a new restaurant and takeaway on land off Goldsworth Road has been approved, but with no all-night opening.

The restaurant, on an unused area next to the Morrisons superstore, will be restricted to 9am to 11pm Monday to Saturday and 9am to 10pm on Sundays.

Woking's planning committee decided around-the-clock opening, seven days a week, would cause too much disturbance to the nearby residential areas.

The drive-thru will be the third McDonald's in Woking. The town already has a 24-hour branch in Chertsey Road and there is a branch in the Francis shopping centre food court.

The council received 13 objections to the plan and three letters of support.

Ben Whitaker, who lives in nearby Kingsway, spoke at the committee meeting on Tuesday last week. He said a 24-hour drive-thru would create noise, litter and traffic problems in a quiet residential area at all hours.

He pointed out that permission had been refused for a 24-hour KFC restaurant on the site of the defunct Goldsworth Arms pub in Goldsworth Road.

Cllr Graham Claywick suggested that the new McDonald's should be allowed 24-hour opening for a trial period of six or 12 months.

Cllr Melanie Woodhead said she could not understand the need for around-the-clock opening for a food that was not a healthy option.

She proposed the restricted hours, supported by Cllr Louise Moxley, which the committee put as a condition on the planning permission.

The News & Mail asked McDonald's Restaurants Ltd for a comment but it had not replied at the time of going to press.

Steam fair knife terror

A TEENAGE gang terrorised young visitors to the Carters Steam Fair at Wheatshaf Common last Saturday, robbing them of phones and wallets at knifepoint.

Details of the incidents are unclear but Surrey Police said that an unknown number of boys, aged around 14 to 15, one of whom had a knife, went around the common robbing mostly young people. The number of robberies is unclear as victims are still coming forward.

One resident posted on Facebook: "I took Maudie and Emil to the police station who took statements and they're

writing everything they recall for police visits later. Very shaken but thankfully unharmed.

"Apparently there were five incidents at the fair according to friend who has gone to fetch her son."

During the evening, parents and friends went on to social media to warn visitors of the danger.

Horsell resident Michael Cannon posted: "A warning to those with kids at Carters Steam Fair on the Wheatshaf common this evening.

"A gang of approx 15 mugged my son and his friends while waiting to watch the fireworks earlier this evening.

"All are OK but knives were used to

take all cash from wallets. Police informed."

A police spokesman said a large number of officers arrived very quickly at the common because of the volume of calls about the incidents. Two males were arrested, one for being in possession of an offensive weapon and possibly linked to the robberies.

The other arrest, of a 17-year-old boy from West Molesey, was for suspicion of robbery and possession of a large kitchen knife and a face covering. He was released on conditional bail.

It is not known if he was connected to the other incidents.

The police spokesman said that some

of the victims were in groups and added "we have carried out a number of enquiries and our investigation remains ongoing".

Mark Pengelly, a committee member of the Woking Association of Neighbourhood Watches, said: "It's distressing that what should have been a fun, festive, fun-filled event was marred in such a horrendous way."

Vintage ads make fascinating reading

A COPY of the St Peter's Church parish magazine from the 1930s provides a fascinating glimpse of shops that were once in Old Woking and Kingfield.

A number of tradespeople took out advertisements in the magazine.

Most of them were still in business after the Second World War.

Eileen Eileen, who came across the magazine, has added some memories of them, and other local traders, from when she was a child.

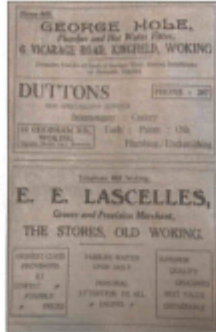
Family butcher James R Fox's advertisement stated he farmed poultry, pig and cattle at Grayland's Farm at Wood Street in Worplesdon. Eileen recalled that his shop, at 128 High Street, Old Woking, had a lovely tiled frontage.

F and J Seaman was a family butcher from Westfield. Its advertisement offered "a trial order solicited". How differently offers and deals were once written.

Shoe and boot repairer EW Nottridge boasted in his advert that "only the best English leather used" and "quality pays". Eileen recalls that he had a tiny shop on the green at Kingfield, but not everyone could afford to have their shoes mended by him.

Some people did their own shoe mending, especially when stick-on soles became available. She said her family referred to Mr Nottridge and his shop when more well-off people took their shoes to him as "going down there to the snobs".

Florists BF Hastie's advert offered "wedding bouquets at lowest prices" and "best quality fruit and vegetables".

Eileen said that she remembers well the shop in Kingfield Road. She added: "They did flowers for funerals as well, but we couldn't afford to go there. If we needed flowers, we picked them from off the common."

"I remember that where Seinsbury's Local is now in Kingfield Road (Ashcombe Parade) was Burdon and Bates' Kingsfield Motor Garage. It was where we took the accumulator batteries from our wireless to be charged up."

There was once a number of small dairies in Woking, one being A Hobbs and Sons of the Kingfield Dairy Farm. With its telephone number being Woking 870, it advertised "pure new

milk delivered daily" and "nursery milk, cream, fish butter and new laid eggs supplied". Eileen recalled that the dairy delivered throughout the Westfield estate. She said that Mr Hobbs made his deliveries in a horse-drawn cart. Unfortunately, one day his horse bolted and he was killed in the accident.

The appropriately named Mr Bunn delivered goods for baker E Cliff and Son of Old Woking. His advertisement in the parish magazine described it as a "hygienic machine bakery", adding: "Have you tried our celebrated 'radio' self-raising flour? Made on the premises from the finest ingredients."

Eileen said: "Some years ago, the old building that was Cliff's bakery was pulled down for redevelopment. It was a shame as they didn't realise until too late that there were some historic baker's ovens in there. We also had a local hosiery shop. It was very small and full of buttons, knitting wool and socks. It was run by two sisters."

The magazine also published adverts for shops in Woking town centre, including hosiery, clothing and fabric business PM Edwards Ltd; corn, seed, fuels and animal feed firm Glosters Ltd; ironmongers Duttons; grocer and provision merchant EE Lascelles; and plumber and hot water fitter George Hole.

Free community event recalls the Great War

David Rose is one of the organisers and it takes place on the green within Cudwells Keep, off Stoughton Road. This was once Stoughton Barracks home of the Queen's Regiment, which men from Woking served during the First World War.

The event will feature military at-home front history displays (including one by Woking's Kevin Smith), children's activities, Surrey Police Band refreshments and a service of remembrance. It starts at 11.30am, with a procession led by a marching band, and continues throughout the afternoon.

TALK OF HIGH THINGS

PEOPLE ask me how I find things to write for my column. Mainly it is by listening to what people are talking about.

There has been plenty of talk about High Towers in Woking but I am beginning to hear a slightly different tone.

No. We don't want Tower Blocks. No, they are too high. No, we don't want building on the Green Belt.

Yes, we do realise we need, and have to provide, many more homes. So do we build upwards or outwards? To that question the general, begrudging, reply is "upwards".

Shall we have a tower in each village? No, it would make more sense to have them in Woking itself. But towers are so ugly. Not necessarily so: and if we must have towers can we not have competitions for architects? If Woking must become a mass of high buildings, surely they can be interesting ones, surely they can be sited so the tallest is at the centre and the others graduated, "cascading" down from it?

There are some interesting buildings in Goldsworth Road - they are not towers but there are some interesting shapes.

But modern buildings often get a light finish which shows those awful rust and dirt marks. Why don't the architects find inspiration from Woking's heritage in brick making and clad the buildings in brick?

My grandmother's opinion of almost every new, and therefore hideous, building, in particular the

Royal Festival Hall, was: "It'll look all right once the ivy has grown up it."

Well, now there are these green walls which do, in fact, have greenery growing up them.

The concept of living green walls goes back to the 1930s, and many readers will have seen examples on buildings in London and elsewhere.

We know there will be a restaurant at the top of one of the towers, so perhaps roof gardens?

With the green walls as well, Woking could become a focal point for good, interesting architecture and good, interesting gardening.

If we must give in to the idea of towers, let us make sure they are good to look at as well as live in, and that they do not look like giant cornflake packets.

HERITAGE DAYS

THE card you may have picked up from the libraries and The Lightbox lists 14 places of interest within the borough which will be open during the Heritage Open Days.

It states: "Sites will be open on a variety of days between 6 and 9 September and 13 and 16 September."

That is the problem for it makes nonsense of the Heritage Open Days Trail shown on the card which maps a convenient route to take in all the participating sites.

Places in the same area are not open at the same times or even on the same days. Next year, please may we sort that out?

A reader visited the fascinating St Mary's

Church in Byfleet on 8 September. He intended to also visit West Hall Manor House in neighbouring West Byfleet.

Alas, that is not open until Saturday 15 September from 10.30am to 4pm. I have never managed to see it, so perhaps I shall visit this time.

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May vows revenge on Russia

Theresa May is preparing a cyberwar against Russia's spy network after accusing two of its agents of carrying out the Salisbury nerve agent attack.

Serving notice of new covert operations against the Russian intelligence service, the prime minister said that it was a threat to "all our allies and to all our citizens" and promised to do "whatever is necessary to keep our people safe".

In a Commons statement yesterday Mrs May named two members of Kozmin military intelligence as key suspects in the poisoning of the former Russian spy Sergei Skripal, 67, and his daughter, Yulia, 34, with a nerve agent on March 4. The prime minister drew gasps from MPs when she revealed that Britain's security and intelligence services had established that the men, who used the names Alexander Petrov and Ruslan Boshrov, were GRU (foreign intelligence) agents.

Pointing the finger at President Putin, she made clear that the attack was "not

The quiet spy who became caught in a global intrigue

Before March of this year, few outside the inner ring of the espionage world had heard of Sergei Skripal: a Russian former spy living in obscurity in Salisbury, giving the occasional private lecture on intelligence, drinking in the local pubs — a leftover, half-forgotten relic from the latter Cold War.

And then someone tried to kill him, causing a diplomatic firestorm and setting off one of the most extensive criminal investigations of modern times.

Mr Skripal — or Agent Furtivith to give him his MI6 codename — turned out to be a more significant figure than anyone expected, including Mr Skripal himself.

The murder of the former Russian intelligence officer Alexander Litvinenko seemed to offer an obvious precedent for what had happened in Salisbury. But the Litvinenko case was different: he had been an open critic of the Putin regime, investigating and exposing corruption; Mr Skripal had kept his head down and was, moreover, in Britain as a result of a spy swap.

His poisoning, and that of his daughter Yulia at the same time, seemed to undermine the very arithmetic of the spy swap.

Sergei Viktorovich Skripal was a child of the Cold War, born in Kiev on June 23, 1951 when Ukraine was still part of the Soviet Union. Physically strong and patriotic, he chose a military career; long after becoming an intelligence officer he retained the bearing of a soldier.

In 1972 he graduated from the military engineering school at Kaliningrad, the Russian territory between Poland and Lithuania, and then studied at the Kuibyshev Military Engineering Academy in Moscow, from which he was selected to join the elite Russian paratrooper division, the largest airborne force in the world. He completed several tours of duty in Afghanistan. While

a rogue operation" and was "almost certainly" approved at a senior level of the Russian state. Mrs May said the "full range of tools from across our national security apparatus" would be used against the GRU. The prime minister spoke to President Trump and will update the UN security council today.

Cyberwar will almost certainly play a part. Whitehall sources told *The Times*. Such operations will aim to disrupt the GRU by scrambling communications and obstructing its access to finance. They are likely to target groups that support the intelligence service, particularly those that link it to criminality or Kremlin figures.

The evidence that Russia carried out a chemical weapons attack on British soil has increased the actions the UK could take in self-defence, a senior government figure said. She added that it would be futile to seek to extradite the men but said Britain would ensure that they faced arrest if they left Russia.

Earlier police had laid out evidence against the pair, revealing that they had been captured on CCTV in Salisbury shortly before the attack and in the aftermath, when they were seen smiling.

Neil Basu, the head of counterterrorism, said that the men conducted reconnaissance in Salisbury on March 3, the day before the poisoning. They are thought to have entered Britain on passports issued by the Russian government, he said.

Police discovered in May that the suspects had stayed for two nights in a hotel in east London but did not warn guests who had stayed there in the eight weeks before, even though the room was contaminated with novichok. Scotland Yard said it did not want to alert the suspects to their discovery. A team secretly entered the hotel in Bow Road on May 4 and carried out tests that determined the room was safe.

Charges have not been authorised in relation to the accidental poisoning of Dawn Sturgess and Charlie Rowley in Amesbury, Wiltshire, in June.

Ben Wallace, the security minister, said the trademark of the Russian spies had been wolfish. The pair had arrived on direct flights from Moscow, carried out reconnaissance in daylight and had left together on a flight home, he said. "This was more Johnny English than James Bond."

Moscow accused Britain of manipulation. "The names, as well as the photos, published in the media mean nothing to us," Maria Zakharova, a foreign ministry spokeswoman, said.

Town tip no longer earmarked for closure

PEOPLE power has helped save Farnham's community recycling centre, say councillors, with Surrey County Council's cabinet expected to sign off plans to retain the town's under-used tip next week.
The Herald launched a drive to Dump the Dump campaign in November, backing the widespread calls of residents and councillors to save Farnham's tip after it was earmarked to close as part of Surrey's latest cost-cutting measures.
And papers published ahead of next Tuesday's Surrey cabinet meeting have revealed that, while four recycling centres across Surrey are still deemed to close, the Bostite Mill recycling centre in Farnham is no longer one of them.
Residents were asked for their feedback on proposed cuts to council services but the council's proposed 'service charges' proved

stead & Village's Sure Start centre, while funding for five bus routes for disabled people, libraries and SEND services also faces an uncertain future.
But a public outcry has apparently speeded Farnham's recycling centre, coming on the back of a hard-fought campaign by Farnham's three county councillors Wyatt Ramsdale (Conservative), Andy MacLeod and Stephen Spence (both Farnham Residents), in December they persuaded Surrey to hold a drop-in consultation event at Farnham Library, attended by an "overwhelming" number of residents, councillors and other representatives.

Community grants to be protected

CONCERN was voiced at Waverley's watchdog meeting and scrutiny committee that the borough council was "not doing anything" about its projected £2.8 million shortfall by 2025 in its 2019-20 budget.

Committee members on Tuesday were given the first opportunity to comment on Waverley's proposed budget, before it goes to the executive committee and then to full council for final approval on Tuesday, February 5.

The proposals currently include protecting voluntary sector funding, investing in provision and play grounds and a decrease of 2.59 per cent in Waverley's portion of council tax.

The increase in council tax – the maximum allowed by central government – is equivalent to a £3.20 increase over the year for an average Band D property.

The C&S chairman, Farnham Resi-



dent councillor David Beaman, commented Waverley for a budget that did not affect community grants and the committee agreed to "re-examine" the proposals to executive.

But members expressed concern about agreeing the cuts and charges without supporting information on why the charging decisions were based on, and called for a review to be conducted so they had full information.

Hulmebury Tory councillor David Rowland said: "It's really rather inappropriate to form a decision when we have no idea of the volume."

"I see the fee for the extermination of squirrels was around £113 but is now reduced to zero."

"To establish whether that's okay, we need to know if there were no call-outs or 5,000."

Members also queried if money from the New Hazles Broom should be used to boost Waverley's property investment fund rather than to cover a budget shortfall.

Waverley's strategic director Gwene Clark said because there was "no certainty" about income from the New Hazles Broom, and receipts had halved over the past few years, the council had agreed it was better not to rely on it to balance the budget, but use it to generate income.

Farnham Residents councillor Jerry Hyman said: "I know we've got a £3.5m shortfall and we are doing lots about it next year."

"Have we done enough this year?"

Farnham Town Council is set to agree a 2.59 per cent increase in its precept for 2019/20 during tonight's full council meeting, amounting the cost for a Band D household will rise to £64.40 a year.

Surrey County Council will also be proposing a 2.59 per cent increase to its precept, a rise of 81p a week for an average Band D property.

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Trial date set for ram raid suspects

FIVE MEN accused of masterminding 11 ram raids across the area are to stand trial at Leveson Crown Court in East Sussex this June, it has been confirmed.

Jimmy Shea, 24, of Nursery Road, Alton; Les Keet, 28, of Cobblers Close, Normandy, Wickham; Paul 45, of Walnut Tree Close, Guildford; Melvyn Bech, 47, of Kingston Road, Leatherhead; and Jason Mobery, 40, of Macdonald Road, Farnham are to take the stand on Monday, June 3.

The trial is expected to last four weeks, and will be preceded by an application to join the cases together at Leveson Crown Court on March 13.

All five men appeared via video link at Guildford Crown Court last Friday, but entered no pleas.

They have been remanded in custody until the trial at High Down prison.

It relates to a spree of ATM thefts across Surrey, Hampshire and Sussex between May and December last year, including

raids at Tesco Express in Ridgway Road, Farnham on July 5, Halifax bank in West Street, Farnham on August 17, Smeeth service station near Bordon on September 21, and HSBC bank in High Street, Alton on November 17 – as well as offences in Badgewick, Nutbourne and Billingshurst in Sussex, Dunsford and Kingsworthy in Hampshire, and East Horsley in Surrey.

Police arrested six people in a series of co-ordinated early-morning raids early on Thursday, December 20, involving a total of 70 officers from across Surrey, Sussex and Hampshire.

Three of the men, Mr Shea, Mr Keet and Mr Mobery, were subsequently charged with conspiracy to commit burglary (non-dwelling) and conspiracy to steal motor vehicles, while Mr Keet was also charged with conspiracy to commit robbery.

Mr Mobery, Mr Summerfield and Mr Bech were charged with conspiracy to commit burglary (dwelling) and robbery.

A31, Ropley Dean

A31/A32 Junction, Northfield Lane, Alton

The logistics hub would be located to the north of the pipeline route at Northfield Lane by the A31/A32 roundabout. This location has good access to the road network and is near to the pipeline route. This location is separated from residential properties by a railway line to the north west and the A31 to the south east. Chawton PACEWAY Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC) and Chawton Park Wood SINC lie to the far side of the railway line. Temporary views of the site may be possible from the South Downs National Park to the east of the A31.

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Design Refinements

Cove Road

Feedback from the preferred route consultation led us to consider how to reduce the impact on narrow residential roads and footpaths and Cove Brook Park (Southwood Meadows). Crossing the railway is very challenging, as it is important not to affect the area underneath the railway tracks during installation. We have identified an alternative to address this challenge and the concerns raised in consultation feedback.

Further technical work in this area identified the best place to cross the railway was from the end of Nash Close. We then considered how best to reach the end of Nash Close from Southwood Meadows. The most appropriate route would involve following the previous alignment of the E2a sub-option as far as Cove Road and heading west along Cove Road before turning right into Nash Close. As a result of these refinements, we are now proposing an open-cut trench method for installation through Cove Brook Park and along Cove Road and Nash Close. From the end of Nash Close we would then use a trenchless technique to cross the railway line. Nash Close is a wider residential road, when compared to Highfield Path, and the trenchless crossing location would have less impact on nearby homes and residents when compared to sub-option E2b. The narrow width of the footpaths at the end of Highfield Path and their frequent pedestrian use was a key concern in consultation feedback. Further, this route is less technically challenging and so would take less time to install, when compared to E2b. However, it would impact local road users and residents in Nash Close and Cove Road.

On the northern side of the railway line, we are proposing to have a compound off West Heath Road. As we would need to use trenchless techniques in this area, a compound would avoid the need to temporarily block off traffic for materials storage and win movements, preventing further impact on traffic. The other nearby compound, which was previously located within open land to the south of Cove Brook, has been relocated further south within the Southwood Golf Course to reduce the working area near to Cove Brook and in response to consultation feedback.

Balmoral Drive

Following further engineering and environmental work, we have identified additional underground services within the grass verge that we were planning to install alongside Balmoral Drive, and the previous alignment would have passed too close to residential properties as it came off Balmoral Drive into a residential area. We are now proposing a refinement to the route so that it continues along Balmoral Drive and re-joins the previously consulted upon route at St Catherine's Road to continue north. Due to limited space within the verge and further information from environmental surveys, the installation would need to take place within the road to avoid these engineering and environmental constraints. This change is likely to impact road users and residents along Balmoral Drive. We would work with local authorities in the area to carefully plan traffic management during installation to reduce disruption and maintain pedestrian access to homes during installation.

Beacon Hill Road

We have refined sub-option D3a to reduce impacts on development plans. The refinement would move the order limits of the pipeline route and installation area west to exclude Beacon Hill Road and the verge along the road. We believe there are no new or different environmental impacts due to this refinement. However, communities lying near to the order limits may face short-term disruption during installation.

Blackwater River Valley

Following further engineering and survey work, we are considering an open-cut trench technique through Finsley Hatches due to uncertain ground conditions. We would need to have access to this area for these works and have now included additional access points along paths, which were not previously part of our proposals. While a trenchless crossing remains our first choice in this area, due to the unpredictable ground conditions, we require the flexibility to use open-cut trench techniques. Therefore, we would seek to keep an open-cut trench technique as an option and further assess potential impacts. The additional access routes would be off the main road or via footpaths within The Hatches.

Logistics Hubs

Now that we have a clearer idea of where the pipeline route might go, we are also now sharing the details of our proposed temporary logistics hubs, which will support the installation of the pipeline.

Logistics hubs are areas used to store materials and equipment, and to provide staff facilities at a number of key locations. We anticipate that installation of the replacement pipeline will take two years to complete, so we will require these logistics hubs throughout that time. We will also need time to prepare the land before installation and reinstatement afterwards to its former state, where practical.

Hartland Park Village, Farnborough

We are considering a logistics hub in your area. The logistics hub would be located on part of the Hartland Park industrial estate between Fleet and Farnborough. It would be used for pipe and equipment storage. It is a large area of land close to the pipeline installation site, so would reduce disruption on the roads used for transporting pipe and equipment.

MoD land: Deepcut Bridge Road, Frimley Green

We are considering a logistics hub in your area. The logistics hub would be close to the pipeline route with access off Deepcut Bridge Road on land owned by the Ministry of Defence (MoD). It is not allocated for development and would provide a large area close to the pipeline to reduce the need to transport pipe over long distances and disrupt local roads.

M3 Junction 3: New Road, Windlesham

We are considering a logistics hub in your area. The logistics hub would be close to the M3 near Junction 3, along New Road in Windlesham. This area was previously used for works on the M3 smart motorway. It is a good hub location due to its accessibility from the M3 and the fact that it is a large site.

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Design Refinements

Chertsey Meads

For the River Thames crossing, we are amending the order limits in response to consultation feedback from the local council around floral biodiversity within Chertsey Meads. We have also carried out further technical work to identify the area needed to install the pipeline and cross the river. We have refined the order limits to install the pipeline alongside the access road for the car park at Chertsey Meads and recognise that this may have different impacts for the local community than our previous proposals.

Philip Southcote School

To provide a larger area for safely installing the replacement pipeline within Abbey Rangers FC, we are considering extending the order limits and limits of deviation into the corner of the adjacent playing field at Philip Southcote School. This may change the use of the land temporarily, so we are consulting the wider community on this suggested amendment.

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Heathrow expansion should be scrapped

Plans for a third runway at Heathrow should be scrapped and airspace in London improved drastically, a new report recommends.

The report produced by the Greater London Assembly Environment Committee, says that its "most urgent" recommendation is to oppose the expansion of Heathrow because of the impact of the increased numbers of flights would have on Londoners.

The report cites guidelines by the

World Health Organisation who that frequent exposure to noise above 45 decibels is associated with adverse health effects. Yet the threshold set in the Government's guidelines is 54 decibels.

As well as opposing a third runway, the Committee also propose a series of drastic improvements to the airspace in London, which, with Heathrow expansion, means up to 2.2 million people right across London will be impacted by

the plans in addition to up to 747,300 people impacted by noise from London City Airport.

Flight paths should also be less concentrated and more evenly dispersed so specific communities are not impacted overwhelmingly more than others close by, with more weight given to communities in south and east London who are impacted from overflying from both Heathrow and London City Airports. Altitude of planes should also be in-

creased, to bring less noise emissions to those on the ground, in densely populated boroughs of London such as Lambeth, Southwark and Lewisham.

The report also calls for the threshold for compensation levels for aircraft noise from Heathrow planes to be raised in line with those from London City Airport, as well as extending night flight bans at Heathrow to eight hours in order to bring in line with World Health

Organisation recommended hours for sleep.

Rob Barnstone, Coordinator of the No 3rd Runway Coalition, the leading campaign organisation opposing plans for more noise and other emissions from Heathrow Airport, said:

"We welcome the most urgent recommendation of this report being to cancel the third runway.

"London is set to be severely impacted by plans to expand Heathrow, in an already out-

dated airspace which leaves so many vast swathes of Londoners' lives, in some cases many, many miles from Heathrow, blighted by noise from planes.

"The sensible recommendations in this report should be implemented by the aviation authorities at the very earliest opportunity."

Jackie Clark, Chair of Stop Heathrow Expansion, which represents communities closest to Heathrow Airport, said:

"A third runway

means a new flight path, subjecting yet more people to the effects of aircraft noise exposure as well as more dirty air.

"The health and wellbeing of people that are impacted most by Heathrow both now and in the future is paramount.

"If the Government and Heathrow were serious about the exposure to these impacts it subjects us to, then they would extend the night time flight ban to the recommended eight hours. Will they consider that?"
