Good Morning,

I can confirm on behalf of the East Riding of Yorkshire Council that we would not wish to recommend any additional information should be required within an Environmental Impact Assessment, considering the other statutory consultees that would be involved in this process. We would like to note the particular importance of the Humber Estuary (SPA, SSSI and RAMSAR) in relation to this scheme however we trust that this would be duly covered by Natural England.

The other impacts on our authority from this prospective development would be outside the remits of an Environmental Impact Assessment and would be covered either through the pre-application advice process or as a consultee following the Secretary of State receiving a formal Planning Application for the project.

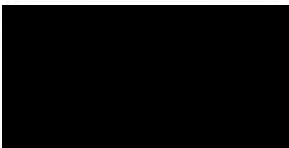

I refer to your letter of 5 March 2013.

The Council has no comment to make other than that the Environmental Impact Assessment considers mitigating measures that will be used to reduce noise and air pollution during the construction phase and when the improved road is open. Opportunities for tree planting or the use of a green wall on the completed scheme should be tested.

Any impact on the Council's highway network caused through any requirement to divert traffic during the construction phase should also be taken into account.
