Dear Sirs,

A14 Improvement Scheme - CTC withdrawal from Statement of Common Ground between Highways England and CTC-Cambridge

You will be aware that Highways England have been asked to agree a Statement of Common Ground for the A14 Improvement Scheme with the Cyclists' Touring Club (and with other cycling organisations).

After reviewing a draft statement prepared by Highways England I have decided that we do not wish to proceed with this document. I think that the first draft of the document is unbalanced and does not adequately reflect the important points of disagreement. I do not have the time to rewrite it.

On behalf of CTC, I therefore want to make it clear that we do NOT agree with this document. I assume that it represents the view of Highways England but it does NOT represent the view of CTC.

Instead, please refer to my earlier detailed letter dated 9th June that was submitted by email to the planning inspectorate. This letter contains full details of my main points of disagreement.
