Introduction

Highways England is a government run company. We are responsible for the operation, maintenance and improvements to England's motorways and major A roads. This includes delivery of the government's Road Investment Strategy (RIS) commitments, published in 2014 by the Department for Transport.

The RIS outlines how the government plans to invest in the Strategic Road Network (motorways and major A roads) in England over the next 5 years. The RIS made a commitment to make improvements to both the A19/A184 Testos junction and the A19 Downhill Lane junction. A preferred route announcement was made in June 2014 for the Testos junction, and statutory consultation has been undertaken on this scheme. An update on the Testos scheme is provided in Section 2 of this brochure.

This consultation brochure is in relation to proposed improvements to the A19 Downhill Lane junction. The improvements are required to increase capacity at the junction, facilitate access to the planned International Advanced Manufacturing Park (IAMP) whilst improving safety and minimising environmental impacts. This brochure explains the proposals that we are considering and how you can have your say.


Need for improvement

Section 2

The A19 is a major route running from Doncaster to the north of Newcastle. It is the main route linking Tyne and Wear with Teesside to the south, and to the north of England via the A1.

The Downhill Lane junction is located just over 5km south of the Tyne Tunnel and approximately 1.1km south of the Testos junction. It forms the junction between the A19 and the A1290, which is one of the main access routes for the Nissan car plant, and Washington Road, which runs into north Sunderland.

South Tyneside and Sunderland Councils are planning the development of the International Advanced Manufacturing Park (IAMP) within land to the west of the A19 and north of the Nissan plant. It is planned that access to the IAMP will also be from the Downhill Lane junction.



Why are we improving Downhill Lane junction?

Future developments on the land to the north of the Nissan plant are likely to significantly increase the amount of traffic using Downhill Lane junction. The current capacity of the junction would not be sufficient for the anticipated additional traffic and would therefore affect the A19 and local roads.

We need to make sure that the junction is able to cope with increased vehicle numbers. The proposed improvements at Downhill Lane junction would increase its capacity, reduce journey times and improve road user safety. The improvements will support new growth in the area by allowing better access to the proposed IAMP and the Nissan plant from the A19, as well as complementing the proposed improvements at Testos.

Regional and local benefits

The scheme is being designed with the following key objectives in mind:

Supporting economic growth

This will be achieved by improving the attractiveness of the area for the IAMP and other prospective developers and businesses by improving road access. The scheme will help connect key employment sites, schools, colleges and residential areas, thereby delivering major benefits.

■ A safe and serviceable network

The scheme aims to reduce accidents, provide safer crossings for non-motorists and improve journey time reliability, leading to a reduction in driver stress.

■ A more free-flowing network

The traffic model used to develop the scheme predicts that road users travelling through the junction will benefit significantly from reduced journey times as a result of the proposal.

Improved environment

The environmental effects resulting from the scheme have been considered during the options identification stage. Measures to mitigate potential effects on the local environment and opportunities to provide enhancements will be further developed as the design progresses.

■ An accessible and integrated network

The proposed scheme will provide improved connectivity with the local road network. We are investigating ways to maintain existing facilities for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders and to provide enhancements where possible. We will continue to work with the local access forum and user groups to develop our proposals.

What have we done to date?

We made the decision in 2015 to develop the Testos and Downhill Lane junction improvements together to minimise disruption to road users and provide cost efficiencies. This meant that we needed to identify options for improving Downhill Lane junction and review the preferred route option for Testos junction to understand what effect the changes at Downhill Lane junction might present.

The first part of this process involved identifying possible options for improvements at Downhill Lane junction. We considered all options and 6 were taken through a more detailed environmental assessment and technical appraisal. The results are reported in our Environmental Assessment Report (EAR) and Technical Appraisal Report (TAR). It is worth noting that environmental impacts are assessed based on national guidance and copies of the full TAR and EAR can be found on our website: www.highways.gov.uk/a19-testos-downhill-lane. In assessing the benefits and effects of improvement options, we have looked at a variety of topics including: environmental features, traffic forecasts, traffic movements, how it could

be constructed, value for money, cost and budget, required land take and the effect on communities. We have also considered the effect on the Testos scheme, including whether the Downhill Lane junction proposals would require major changes



to the Testos design, resulting in additional work, cost and delays to delivering the improvements.

Our appraisal identified that one of the 6 options, now referred to as Option A, should be progressed further and presented as our preferred option for public consultation. This consultation is taking place at an early stage in the overall project, and information is still being gathered as we undertake more surveys and assessments. This information and the feedback received from the consultation will be used during the design development.

We will continue to engage with South Tyneside and Sunderland Councils, Nissan and the IAMP development team to ensure a joined up approach.

Testos junction update

We are planning to deliver the Testos and Downhill Lane junction improvements together to minimise disruption to road users. To achieve our delivery plan commitments, this approach requires two phased applications for development consent. We will issue more information on Testos junction in early 2017 ahead of an application for development consent later that year.

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


The proposed option

Section

Option A is preferred over the other shortlisted options because:

- It is the most cost effective option, providing similar or greater benefits to other options, but at a lower cost
- It provides the best fit with the Testos preferred route design so it would have no impact on the programme to deliver the improvements at Testos junction
- It requires the least land take of all the options, minimising the impact on the proposed development site and the surrounding environment
- It is one of the simplest options to construct as it would not require work within the River Don corridor or work to divert the Northern Powergrid overhead power lines



Features

The table below illustrates the key impacts for the proposed option:

Fe	eature	Option A
Ai	ir quality	Air quality assessments determined that there would be no significant impacts with any option.

Noise and vibration	Significant noise disruption could occur at some locations for short periods during construction. We will minimise the effects through good construction practice.
Noise and vibration	Once opened we anticipate a small number of properties may experience a very small level of increased noise. Further work will be carried out to assess this impact.
Landscape and visual impact	Effects on the landscape would be most significant in the construction period and would reduce as planted trees and shrubs mature.
Drainage and the water environment	The River Don would see an increase in the amount of water running off the A19. However, the overall effect would be a net improvement to both flood risk and water quality, as the scheme would include balancing ponds to slow down the flow of water into the river and treat the water before release.
Geology and soils	The disturbance of contaminated ground, particularly around the historic railway line and along the existing A19 will be managed to prevent environmental incidents. No other significant impacts or risks have been identified.
Materials	We aim to minimise the volume of waste materials going to landfill and the use of raw materials such as quarried aggregates/stone through good design, good construction practice, recycling of materials where possible and effective management of waste. Further assessment of materials and waste is planned.
Cultural heritage	No significant effects on archaeological remains or historic landscape have been identified at this stage. Further investigation is planned.
Nature conservation	There would be no impact on European or nationally designated sites. Local wildlife sites, habitats and some wildlife species may be adversely impacted. Further assessment will be carried out and mitigation measures developed where needed.
Land take	Option A uses parts of the existing junction layout and features, minimising land requirements. Further opportunities to use the existing junction layout and reduce land take will be investigated during the later stages of design development.
Construction	Option A is considered to be one of the least complicated to build. For example, it does not require work within the River Don corridor. Further work will be carried out in the next stage of design to look at how traffic can be kept flowing as freely as possible during the construction work.
Cost	We plan to construct both Testos and Downhill Lane junctions together; the cost estimates for all the options include the improvements to Testos junction. Option A is the second cheapest, with only Option F being cheaper, but delivering significantly less benefit.
Value for money	When delivered with the Testos improvement, the scheme delivers high value for money.
Average peak time journey change	Option A is forecast to provide a significant reduction in average vehicle delay at Downhill Lane junction at peak times.
Compatibility with the Testos scheme	These proposals provide a direct fit to the preferred route announced for the improvements at Testos junction.

The environmental assessments will continue to be refined as more information becomes available and the design progresses. After the formal announcement of a preferred option, we will carry out a statutory Environmental Impact Assessment, leading to publication of an Environmental Statement (ES). The ES would provide a detailed description of the baseline environment and how it would be changed by the construction and operation of the scheme. It would describe any design changes we have made to avoid or reduce impacts, set out any other proposed environmental mitigation and enhancement works, and outline the environmental management plans that would be put in place to prevent accidental pollution or other environmental damage during construction or operation.

Discounted options

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Section

The following plans show the shortlisted options that we considered. These have been discounted for the reasons described with each option.

All options apart from Option **F** are more expensive than our preferred option.






Reasons for rejecting Option B

- Strengthening works would be required to the River Don culvert which would increase costs
- Safety concerns over traffic interaction on the northbound link road
- Significant additional land would be required east of Make-Me-Rich Farm
- Northern Powergrid overhead lines supplying the Nissan plant would need diversion works
- Maintenance access issues for the National Grid pylon
- Not directly compatible with the preferred route announced for the Testos scheme


Reasons for rejecting Option C

- Strengthening and extension of the River Don culvert would be required, which would increase costs and impact on the natural habitat of the local wildlife site
- Significant additional land would be required east of Make-Me-Rich Farm
- Maintenance access issues for the National Grid pylon
- Northern Powergrid overhead lines supplying the Nissan plant would need diversion works
- Not directly compatible with the preferred route announced for the Testos scheme

Reasons for rejecting Option D

- Strengthening and extension of the River Don culvert would be required, which would increase costs and impact on the natural habitat of the local wildlife site
- Poor ground conditions for construction of the new bridge to the north of the existing junction
- Significant additional land would be required east of Make-Me-Rich Farm
- Northern Powergrid overhead lines supplying the Nissan plant would need diversion works
- Maintenance access issues for the National Grid pylon
- Not directly compatible with the preferred route announced for the Testos scheme

Reasons for rejecting Option E

- Requires considerably more land take than all other options
- Requires a significant area of land which is earmarked for development
- Not directly compatible with the preferred route announced for the Testos scheme

Reasons for rejecting Option F

- Does not meet proposed scheme objectives for improving Downhill Lane junction
- Requires a significant area of land which is earmarked for development
- Not directly compatible with the preferred route announced for the Testos scheme

Next steps



Once the consultation closes on 6 January 2017, all responses will be analysed and compiled into a consultation report which summarises the feedback. The consultation report will be available via the Highways England website. We will then refine the design to:

- Ensure the scheme design incorporates all relevant comments where practicable
- Make sure the potential impact on the community and environment have been fully considered
- Complete our environmental assessment work, making sure it takes into account issues that you have told us about


We will then announce the preferred route option for the improvement to Downhill Lane junction in spring/summer 2017.

The planning process

Further consultation will take place on the preferred route before submitting a Development Consent Order (DCO) to the Planning Inspectorate. This is the planning application for the Downhill Lane scheme, which is required under the Planning Act 2008.

There are set opportunities for you to be involved in a DCO scheme:

- You can comment now, when we are selecting the option to take forward (this consultation)
- Formal pre-application consultation required by the Planning Act 2008 will be undertaken throughout 2017. We will inform statutory stakeholders, landowners, local communities and anybody else who tells us they wish to be informed about future consultation stages.

I am writing to update you on Highways England's proposed A19 Downhill Lane Junction Improvement project, which seeks to relieve congestion and improve safety at the A19/A1290 Downhill Lane Junction.

We are developing this project under the Planning Act 2008 (the Act). This legislation requires us to make an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to construct the project. We intend to make our DCO application in spring 2018. In accordance with Section 42 of the Act, Highways England, as the applicant, must consult you about this proposed application.

This statutory consultation is an opportunity for you to tell us your thoughts on the proposed scheme and about any changes that have occurred locally in the last year which may impact on our proposed design.

I also enclose a copy of our notice publicising our proposed application, which we have published in accordance with section 48 of the Planning Act 2008. We are required to send this to all statutory bodies for the purposes of the EIA Regulations. If you are not such a body, the notice has been included for reference.

The consultation starts on Monday 11 September 2017 and will end on Sunday 22 October 2017. The consultation brochure details how you can comment on the proposals. Downhill Lane junction improvement scheme

Every road user wants less congested roads to enable swift, safe, comfortable and informed travel. On behalf of the government, Highways England is responsible for delivering the largest investment in a generation throughout England's motorways and major A roads.

Downhill Lane junction is a vital link between the A19 and the A1290. It's located about 5km south of the Tyne Tunnel and 1.1km south of the Testos junction. The junction is one of the main access

routes for the Nissan car plant and Washington Road, which runs east into north Sunderland.

We need to make sure that the junction will be able to cope with increasing amounts of traffic. It's predicted that in the future many more vehicles will need to use the junction due to developments that are planned in the area. Currently the junction would not be able to cope with these additional vehicles – that's why we're planning a major improvement scheme.

In this brochure we explain our proposed improvements for the A19 Downhill Lane junction and what's new since the last consultation. We also give details of how you can give us your feedback during our public consultation.

We are proposing to submit an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to authorise the Downhill Lane junction Improvement scheme, with a target submission date of spring 2018.

Before we submit our application, we are consulting further on the proposals. This is a statutory consultation in accordance with the requirements of the Planning Act 2008. It provides an update to the 2016 non-statutory consultation and a further opportunity to hear any views people may have on the proposed scheme.

This is your opportunity to tell us your thoughts on the proposed scheme, including any changes that have occurred locally in the last year which may impact on our proposed design. We are keen to understand and take account of the views of all our customers, stakeholders and local communities.

We are holding two public consultation events in September 2017 (please see below for details of the events) that we would like you to attend and discuss our proposals in more detail with our project team so we can hear your views.



Preferred route

Our preferred route for the Downhill Lane junction Improvement involves a new bridge which would be constructed south of the existing bridge that will be retained or replaced. Together with the existing bridge this would form a more traditional roundabout junction layout above the A19. The existing north-bound and south-bound A19 slip roads would be realigned to tie in with the new

elevated roundabout arrangement. To the north of the junction, these would serve as link roads between Downhill Lane junction and the proposed new Testos junction roundabout. The slip roads south of the junction would also be realigned but would continue to provide direct access to and from the A19.




What's changed since the last consultation?

A non-statutory consultation exercise was held at the end of 2016 on a proposed option for the Downhill Lane junction Improvement. The consultation found an overall support for the proposed option with more than 60% of respondents stating they support it. The feedback has been considered in the development of the design and a preferred route announcement was made in June 2017.

Since we last consulted with the public we have worked hard on the scheme design. We are considering two options for Non-Motorised Users (NMUs), Option 1 and Option 2A/B for a new layout which aims to improve pedestrian, cyclist and equestrian access. Please note Option 2 has a variant in that Downhill Lane could be signalised (Option 2A) or have an underpass (Option 2B).


Non motorised users



Option '

This option provides NMU routes through Downhill Lane junction via a combination of at-grade crossings; located at signalised points around the roundabout, and an independent NMU bridge over the A19; located within the junction roundabout. Where possible the NMU route will be taken away from the carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic.




Option 2A/2B

This option provides NMU routes around Downhill Lane junction via a separate NMU bridge over the A19 and Washington Road; located to the south of the junction, and either an at-grade signalised crossing of, or underpass beneath, Downhill Lane. Where possible the NMU route will be taken away from the carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic. Estimates of journey times take into consideration both an at-grade signalised crossing of Downhill Lane (Option 2A) and an underpass variant (Option 2B).



Testos junction update

The Testos junction improvement project continues to be delivered with Downhill Lane junction, by one team. Following a review that took place in October 2016, it was concluded that the best approach for the projects would be separate DCO applications commitments made for each junction improvement.

Whilst our approach to deliver both schemes differs slightly, we are still planning to deliver the Testos and

Downhill Lane junction improvements together to minimise disruption to road users.

A statutory consultation for Testos junction was conducted between January and March 2017. Of the responses that were received, 90% were in support of the scheme. The Testos junction Improvement DCO application was submitted in July 2017 and is currently undergoing examination by the Planning Inspectorate.

Construction Management

As part of our DCO application we will produce an outline Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP). This will outline the control measures we will adopt to minimise the impact of the works on the local environment and communities during construction. The development teams have been collaborating to ensure as far as practial that the schemes can be delivered efficiently, minimising the impact on the public and key stakeholders.

We aim to minimise disruption to road users and will put in place measures to control nuisances such as noise and dust. The work will be phased with the aim of keeping two lanes of traffic flowing in both directions on the A19 at peak times. Temporary traffic management will be installed to separate traffic and other users (e.g. pedestrians and cyclists) from the construction activities and provide safe working areas for our workers.

Construction traffic and machinery will use designated access routes to keep it separate from road users as much as possible and access to businesses will be maintained.

Some lane closures and full road closures will be required, however full closures will be communicated in advance, and signed diversion routes will be put in place. We will employ a Community Relations Manager who will keep you informed of our activities.

Environmental considerations

The scheme is being designed to minimise the effect on the environment. We will be completing a full statutory Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the project, which is currently in progress. A detailed Environmental Statement (ES) will be submitted as part of the DCO application.

The aims of the EIA are to work out the effects the proposed scheme would have on the environment and to influence the design in such a way as to

reduce negative environmental effects. It will also identify mitigation measures for any effects that remain. We have also prepared a document called a Preliminary Environmental Information report. This provides information on the likely environmental effects and potential mitigation measures envisaged for the proposed scheme, so that you can respond to this consultation in a well-informed way. The EIA covers a wide range of environmental themes:



Air quality

We will consider the health related issues of local and regional air quality and the global issue of climate change. We will also consider emissions that may arise from the project both during construction and once it is open to traffic.



Noise and vibration

Traffic flow data and information on construction methodology will be used to assess the noise and vibration impacts of the project during construction and once open to traffic.



Cultural heritage

We will consider archaeological sites, historic buildings and landscapes. We will consider and manage direct impacts as well as how the project affects the settings and landscapes of potentially important local assets.



Landscape and visual amenity

We will look at the effects on the local landscape and on the quality of views.



Ecology and nature conservation

We will consider the effects on ecologically important sites, protected species and other sensitive species including bats, water voles and otters.



Road drainage and the water environment

We will assess the effects on surface water, groundwater and flood risk during construction and operation.



Geology and soils

We will consider the disturbance of groundwater, the impact on soil quality and the disturbance of any contaminated land.



Waste and material

We will identify opportunities where possible to reduce, reuse or recycle waste.



People and communities


We will consider safety, journey time, congestion and accessibility for everyone along the route, including vehicle travellers, pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders. We will consider the effects of the scheme on land or other assets owned or used by the community. We are also looking at the effects on privately owned assets such as farmland. This topic will also cover socio-economic aspects such as the effect of the scheme on local employment during construction and operation.

Next Steps

The planning process

This Downhill Lane junction Improvement scheme is classed as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under the Planning Act 2008. As such, we are required to make an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) in order to obtain permission to construct the scheme. The application will be made to the Planning Inspectorate who will examine the application

and make a recommendation to the Secretary of State for Transport, who will make the decision on whether or not the project should go ahead. We currently intend to submit our DCO application to the SoS for Transport in spring 2018. The process for a DCO application is set out in the diagram below, including where there is an opportunity for you to become involved in the process.



Once the consultation has closed on 22 October 2017, comments received will be reviewed and taken into consideration, where appropriate. The comments received will inform, if necessary and where possible, further refinements to the Downhill Lane junction scheme and our approach to environmental mitigation. All responses will be analysed and compiled into a consultation report which will set out the consultation carried out.

a summary of responses received and how those responses have influenced our proposals. The consultation report will form part of our application for a DCO and will also be available following submission of the application.

Subject to our DCO application being approved, we estimate that construction work will start by 2019/2020.



Introduction

Highways England is publishing this Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in connection with the proposed improvements to the A19/A1290 Downhill Junction in Sunderland. The purpose of this document is to set out how we will consult the local community about our proposals. The document also provides background to the project and how the application to build it will progress.

The Application

Highways England is developing this scheme under the Planning Act 2008 and is publishing this statement under Section 47 of that Act. We have consulted South Tyneside Council and Sunderland City Council, the local authorities responsible for the areas where the project will be built, about our plans to consult the local community.

The Planning Act 2008 requires Highways England to make an application to the Secretary of State through the Planning Inspectorate for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to build the scheme. The Secretary of State's role is to consider whether authorisation should be given for major infrastructure projects like this scheme. Highways England anticipates that a DCO application for the scheme will be published in spring 2018. The Planning Inspectorate will examine the DCO application and the Secretary of State will decide on whether the scheme should go ahead.

Government policy relating to the development of the national road network is set out in the National Networks National Policy Statement (NNNPS). This provides the framework for DCO applications to be considered against.

When Highways England submits its DCO application, the Secretary of State must consider whether our consultation has been adequate. This pre-application consultation will be important in relation to the examination process that follows after an application is accepted by the Planning Inspectorate. Therefore, the best time to provide feedback on this scheme is now by taking part in this consultation.

The Project

The improvements to the Downhill Lane junction, which is approximately 1km in length, include construction of a new bridge south of the existing bridge. Together with the existing bridge this will form a more traditional roundabout junction layout above the A19. The existing north-bound and south-bound A19 slip roads will be realigned to tie in with the new elevated roundabout arrangement. To the north of the junction, these will serve as link roads between Downhill Lane Junction and the proposed new Testos junction roundabout. The slip roads south of the junction will also be realigned but will continue to provide direct access to and from the A19. On the west side of the junction the A1290 will be re-aligned and to the east, the layout of Downhill Lane and Washington Road will also be amended to suit the new junction. Temporary access roads, temporary highway works, temporary construction compounds and work sites will be required during construction of the scheme.

Routes for walkers, cyclists and horse riders will be designed to provide overall improvements in safety and connectivity where possible.

In line with Highways England's Strategic Outcomes, the aims of the Project are to:

- To improve journey times on this route of strategic national importance.
- Improve network resilience and journey time reliability.
- Improve safety
- Facilitate future economic growth.
- Improve provision for walkers, cyclists and other non-motorised users.
- Maintain access for local traffic whilst improving the conditions for strategic traffic

The Project supports these aims by improving traffic flows and reducing queues. This will improve the environment for the local community and transport users will benefit from improved journey times, road quality and safety. This will support the overall competitiveness and productivity of the local, regional and national economy through time savings and improved reliability for business users.

The Project forms part of a wider strategy to upgrade the A19 through the east of Tyneside which includes the A19 Coast Road Improvement and A19 Testos junction Improvement. These improvements, along with the A19 Downhill Lane Junction Improvement, will support development of the International Advanced Manufacturing Park (IAMP) to the north of the Nissan plant, regeneration at the Port of Tyne, Newcastle Airport and further development at Cobalt Business Park, and complement other recent improvements to the local network such as the second Tyne crossing.

Consulting the community

In accordance with section 47 of the Planning Act 2008, Highways England is consulting people living in the vicinity of the proposed scheme.

Highways England has already undertaken a consultation exercise between November 2016 and January 2017. Consultees were asked for their views on a proposed single option for improvements to the junction. More details including the outcome of this consultation are included in the public consultation report available to download from www.highways.gov.uk/a19-testos-downhill-lane; on request from the project team or will be available to view for the duration of the consultation period at the display locations detailed in this SoCC.

We want to make sure that the local community, residents, local interest groups, businesses, visitors and road users have the opportunity to fully understand the scheme and comment on our proposals. To do this we are therefore holding a six week public consultation on the proposals, starting on **Monday 11th September 2017** and ending on **Sunday 22nd October 2017** during which we will provide consultation information on various issues including:

- Junction layout and access arrangements;
- Proposed improved facilities for walkers, cyclists and horse riders; and
- Outlining the extent of land required for the scheme

We have carried out an Environmental Impact Assessment for the scheme. The scheme is Environmental Impact Assessment development and therefore we are publishing Preliminary Environmental Information (PEI) as part of the consultation material. This gives information about the potential environmental effects of the scheme and the measures proposed to reduce those effects such as

- Noise and vibration during construction;
- Air quality during construction;
- Flood risk and drainage design;
- Impacts of sourcing and storage and use of imported materials; and
- Cumulative construction and operation impacts associated with IAMP and the proposed Testos Junction Improvement scheme





I use this junction almost daily as a cycle commuter, and occasionally as a driver. I also regularly lead group cycle rides as a Sustrans ride leader which use this junction too, so I am very familiar with this junction

There are some design issues with the current layout, which I hope will not be carried over or repeated in the new junction, especially if option 1 is adopted. These make using the cycleway vary inconvenient and unattractive for a lot of people meaning they use the road.

The recent consultation leaflet doesn't go into detail for either options about the number of separate stages for the crossings. If travelling N-S from the bridleway to the A1290, there are seven. There are 5 alone to get from downhill lane onto the bridge.


If travelling from the bridleway to Washington road heading to Sunderland there are still 4, so most people just skip across the road.

The current islands between the crossings are very small and some can only hold one or two cyclists. This is an issue with groups, but also commuting.

Option 2 has some merit, but I have concerns that the necessary height of the NMU bridge and the distance needed to clear the junction will make it undesirable for many. I can normally clear the existing junction in 2 minutes including wait times

- Can crossings be a single stage at each of the main crossing points, so cyclists and other NMUs can get across in one movement? This could be button controlled so only operates on demand (the crossing at Nissan way/Cherry Blossom way is an example that this can be done however the wait time can be poor there)
- Can low-level cycle specific lights be included so that the signals can be viewed on approach by cyclists? (An NE example is John Dobson st in Newcastle). The current pedestrian/cyclist signals are at 90' to the cycleway and hard to read on approach
- Is it not possible to combine the bridge from option 1 & and use underpasses (option 2) with ramps inside the roundabout instead of a longer detour? If the NMU path could be designed into the new southern bridge or the existing north bridge then this could be a sensible option, and potentially my preferred option.
- Ideally any underpasses need to be wide, and well lit and bright to appear welcoming, rather than the narrow dingy tunnels a lot of existing ones are. A camber and side drains would be needed to reduce risk of surface water which could be hazardous in cold conditions. An excellent example of how underpasses can be excellent is the Network Rail underpasses at Bolina Road, Bermondsey
- How wide will the cycleways be? I presume a minimum of 3m. How high will any underpasses be? What gradient will any ramps be.
- Can we ensure that we have no "cyclists dismount" signs as with the current design
- Can we ensure that NMU traffic safely flows in all directions, as the current junction only accommodates for flow N-S from bridleway to Nissan.

•	What will the surfacing of the NMU paths be? I presume sealed tarmac? As the end of the current
	bridleway looks like it will be realigned how far up will it be resurfaced?

A19 DOWNHILL LANE STATUTORY CONSULTATION: NMU PROPOSALS

Thank you for your valuable time in sharing with us your views and concerns on the A19 Downhill Lane Junction Improvement Scheme. We have liaised with our design team colleagues in order to provide a suitable response to your comments. Please find below the response to your comments.

Options 1 and 2A feature at-grade signalised crossings which in some locations will require traffic islands. These will be designed to current design standards but will also take cognisance of available road space, highway geometry, best practice and road safety.

Both Options 1 and 2 of our preliminary design have been formed following consultation with NMU (Non-Motorised User) focus groups, specifically the Local Access Forum, which included representatives from Sunderland and South Tyneside councils. As a result, these options reflect an initial proposed solution to the issues and concerns presented by the different NMU groups, including Nissan, Sustrans and Cycling UK, represented by the Local Access Forum. Furthermore, these proposed designs have to account for the predicted traffic volumes and ensure signal times primarily allow the junction to perform in terms of traffic flows. It is likely that due to the predicted traffic figures and demands, the junction will be fully signalised, therefore NMU crossing opportunities will be restricted to when adjacent traffic is held at a red light.

Opportunities for incorporating low-level accessible signal lights for NMUs will be considered at the detailed design stage.

For either option, the proposed NMU overbridges above the A19 are required to be in accordance with the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges (DMRB), which has specific requirements for the clearance of headroom and cross-sections. With reference to Option 1 specifically, due to constraints on the available space within the roundabout resulting from earthworks and other infrastructure, it will not be feasible to achieve the





vertical difference in height between the level of the underpass and the level of the footbridge whilst satisfying design standards and compliance with legislation.

Any underpasses will be designed in accordance with current design standards, best practice and the requirements of the local authority. Similarly, cycleway widths and access ramp gradients will be designed in accordance with current design standards and be compliant with current legislation.

The existing cyclists dismount signs have been provided due to the limitations of existing infrastructure, specifically, the width of existing footway / cycleway on the Downhill Lane overbridge. Accordingly, our proposed designs will resolve this issue by providing separate bridges for NMUs which as a result will provide improved multi-directional flow for all NMUs. A review of the necessary signage for the benefit of all road users and NMUs will be undertaken during detailed design.

Once again, the surfacing type of the NMU paths is to be considered during the detailed design stage but the surface specification will be based on the needs of all users, including any equestrian users. The existing bridleway will be re-aligned and improved as part of both the Testos and Downhill Lane Junction improvements. Redundant sections will be stopped up as required; any improvements to the existing bridleway will be to the scheme extents.

The current proposal has connections to the existing shared NMU facilities and bridleway at the north east of the scheme – these facilities are being improved as part of the adjacent Testos scheme. The bridleway does have a direct connection to the cycling facilities to the A184 and B1298.

This also allows for Free Flow of traffic onto the NB link road to Testo's and the off-slip NB from A19.


This also gives good connectivity to both existing cycle routes to Nissan & North Hlyton as well as desired route for horse riders.

Looking on google earth shows there is adequate un-used land to allow for an underpass.


This would also allow for a future link into the proposed Northern section of the IAMP area.

A19 DOWNHILL LANE STATUTORY CONSULTATION: RESPONSE TO NMU PROVISIONS

We have instructed our design team to take a detailed look into the provisions which you have provided us. We have factored their views and calculations into our response.

As your proposal suggests, using an NMU footbridge over the A19 North of the existing bridge, would present an at-grade crossing in a location unsuitable for signalisation. An alternative, as you propose, is to go underneath the existing bridge in the initial option you presented, or alternatively, an underpass underneath the northbound link road to Testos as presented in your second option. Our design team have assessed these proposals and deemed them unsuitable due to the following issues:

- The initial option presents an NMU route descending a spiral ramp before passing under the existing Downhill Lane overbridge. Locating an NMU facility in this location, presents operational safety concerns and a possible unacceptable risk of NMU user / vehicular interface. In particular, we are keen to keep equestrians and high speed vehicles separate, where possible.
- The option without the spiral ramp would be unachievable within the site constraints, due
 to the fact that typically a gradient of 5% is considered the most appropriate for a shared
 NMU facility.

Although an underpass was being considered in the Statutory Consultation, they have received a negative reception at the Local Access Forum, which included representatives from Sunderland and South Tyneside councils. The underpass option was included in the consultation in order for Highways England to receive feedback from the general public regarding their preference for the presented NMU options, including their opinions on the underpass option.



APPENDIX H: DRAWINGS OF NMU OPTIONS CONSULTED ON

This option provides NMU routes through Downhill Lane Junction via a combination of at-grade crossings; located at signalised points around the roundabout, and an independent NMU bridge over the A19; located within the junction roundabout. Where possible the NMU route will be taken away from the carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic.

- + Independent NMU bridge facility segregates NMU and motorised users
- + Shortest journey lengths in terms of distance
- + Route is visually more direct to NMU users; closer to the 'desire line'
- + No underpass required

- Routes will require waiting time at-grade crossings located at the traffic lights on the proposed roundabout
- Greater number of signalised corssings compared with Options 2A / 2B
- Not fully segregated from traffic
- Longer journey time when compared to Options 2A / 2B due to greater number of signalised crossings

This option provides NMU routes around Downhill Lane Junction via a separate NMU bridge over the A19 and Washington road; located to the south of the junction, and either an at-grade signalised crossing of, or underpass beneath, Downhill Lane. Where possible the NMU route will be taken away from the carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic. Estimates of journey times take into consideration both an at-grade signalised crossing of Downhill Lane (Option 2A) and an underpass variant (Option 2B)

- + Potential for routes A to B and C to B to be fully segregated from traffic
- + Offers possible opportunity for adaptation to integrate with the future IAMP proposals
- + Where an underpass is used, journey time is quicker

Cons

- Longest journey length in terms of distance
- Route is visually less direct to NMU users; deviating from the 'desire line'
- Height required to span Washington Road and the A19 results in a tall bridge with probable significant visual impacts May require an underpass










Preferred route


Our preferred route for the Downhill Lane junction Improvement will involve creating a more traditional roundabout junction layout above the A19. We will achieve this by:

- Constructing a new bridge south of the existing bridge. The existing bridge will either be kept, or it'll be replaced. Together these bridges will create a new elevated roundabout arrangement.
- Realigning the existing north-bound and south-bound A19 slip roads to tie in with the new elevated roundabout arrangement. To the north of the junction these will serve as link roads between Downhill Lane junction and the proposed new Testos junction roundabout.
- Realigning the slip roads south of the junction. These slip roads will continue to provide direct access to and from the A19.





Proposed land usage plan – (indicative and subject to change)







What's changed since the last consultation?

The last public consultation was held between November 2016 and January 2017 and we gathered a huge amount of feedback on the proposed route. In June 2017 we announced our preferred route and we have been working hard since then on the detailed scheme design.

This has included looking at options for Non-Motorised Users (NMUs) - walkers, cyclists and horse-riders. We are now presenting two options which aim to improve access for NMUs and we want to know what you think of them.









Access for pedestrians and cyclists

We have proposed two options which aim to improve access for Non-Motorised Users (NMUs) – walkers, cyclists and horse-riders – Option 1 and Option 2A/2B. The tables below give details of how each of the options impact journey times for pedestrians and cyclists.









Construction Management


As part of our DCO application we will produce an outline Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP). This will outline the control measures we will adopt to minimise the impact of the works on the local environment and communities during construction. The development teams have been collaborating to ensure as far as practial that the schemes can be delivered efficiently, minimising the impact on the public and key stakeholders.

We aim to minimise disruption to road users and will put in place measures to control nuisances such as noise and dust. The work will be phased with the aim of keeping two lanes of traffic flowing in both directions on the A19 at peak times. Temporary traffic management will be installed to separate traffic and other users (e.g. pedestrians and cyclists) from the construction activities and provide safe working areas for our workers.

Construction traffic and machinery will use designated access routes to keep it separate from road users as much as possible and access to businesses will be maintained.

Some lane closures and full road closures will be required, however full closures will be communicated in advance, and signed diversion routes will be put in place. We will employ a Community Relations Manager who will keep you informed of our activities.







Environmental considerations

The scheme is being designed to minimise the effect on the environment. We will be completing a full statutory Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the project, which is currently in progress. A detailed Environmental Statement (ES) will be submitted as part of the DCO application.

The aims of the EIA are to work out the effects the proposed scheme would have on the environment and to influence the design in such a way as to reduce negative environmental effects. It will also identify mitigation measures for any effects

that remain. We have also prepared a document called a Preliminary Environmental Information report. This provides information on the likely environmental effects and potential mitigation measures envisaged for the proposed scheme, so that you can respond to this consultation in a well-informed way. The EIA covers a wide range of environmental themes:



Air quality

We will consider the health related issues of local and regional air quality and the global issue of climate change. We will also consider emissions that may arise from the project both during construction and once it is open to traffic.



Noise and vibration

Traffic flow data and information on construction methodology will be used to assess the noise and vibration impacts of the project during construction and once open to traffic.



Cultural heritage

We will consider archaeological sites, historic buildings and landscapes. We will consider and manage direct impacts as well as how the project affects the settings and landscapes of potentially important local assets.



Landscape and visual amenity

We will look at the effects on the local landscape and on the quality of views



Ecology and nature conservation




Testos junction update


The Testos junction improvement project continues to be delivered with Downhill Lane junction, by one team. Following a review that took place in October 2016, it was concluded that the best approach for the projects would be separate DCO applications commitments made for each junction improvement.

Whilst our approach to deliver both schemes differs slightly, we are still planning to deliver the Testos and

Downhill Lane junction improvements together to minimise disruption to road users.

A statutory consultation for Testos junction was conducted between January and March 2017. Of the responses that were received, 90% were in support of the scheme. The Testos junction Improvement DCO application was submitted in July 2017 and is currently undergoing examination by the Planning Inspectorate.







Next Steps

The planning process

This Downhill Lane junction Improvement scheme is classed as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under the Planning Act 2008. As such, we are required to make an application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) in order to obtain permission to construct the scheme. The application will be made to the Planning Inspectorate who will examine the application





In regard to your recent application pertaining to proposed junction improvements at the A19 / Downhill junction.

Obviously there is no legislation in place that requires cyclist and pedestrians to use the alternative off carriageway facilities

As such I can envisage that the proposed non-motorised facility will not be use, as the proposed off carriageway route is quite significantly off the existing desire line.

Commuters already using or wanting to use a non-motorised form of transport will have to divert their journey from the shorter distance which the on-carriageway facilities already provide, resulting in add times to their journeys. This will potentially discourage its use by experienced cyclists and highway users.

Notwithstanding the above, creating routes with a greater distance is not in keeping with the government current guidance for encouraging a mode shift to alternative forms of transport.

Introducing these proposals will result in cyclists and pedestrians continuing to use the on carriageway facilities. The provided plans do not show any specific detail of proposed lane designation and junction facilities.

As such, I can only assume that the proposed on-carriageway proposals will also include facilities for both pedestrian and cycles (advanced stop lines and footways with raised parapets).

Thank you for your response to our most recent consultation in relation to the non-motorised user (NMU) proposals for the Downhill Lane Junction Scheme ("the Scheme").

The current proposed NMU route and design incorporates the views and concerns we have received from the responses to the statutory consultation held between 11 September and 22 October 2017, and those of key stakeholders such as South Tyneside Council, Sunderland City Council, the Local Access Forum (LAF), representatives from Nissan UK, IAMP LLP and local landowners directly affected by the proposed NMU route and associated works.

With regards to the issue concerning the potential for cyclists to continue using the junction, an extensive consultation and liaison with the LAF, which included representatives from SusTrans, Cycling UK and the British Horse Society, has been undertaken in order to develop an NMU solution that best balances the requirements of equestrians, cyclists and pedestrians. Two options were presented at statutory consultation in 2017;

- Option 1 This option provided NMU routes through Downhill Lane junction via a combination of at-grade crossing; located at signalised points around the roundabout, and an independent NMU bridge over the A19 located within the junction roundabout. Where possible the proposal was for the NMU route to be taken away from the carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic.
- Option 2A/2B This option provided NMU routes around Downhill Lane junction via a separate NMU bridge over the A19 and Washington Road located to the south of the junction, and either an at-grade signalised crossing (2A) of, or underpass beneath (2B), Downhill Lane. Where possible the proposal was for the NMU route to be taken away from carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic.

Following this consultation and taking into account the views of the key stakeholders listed above, Option 2A was selected as the preferred option. When compared to Option 1 which routes NMUs through the junction at numerous at-grade crossings and, as you correctly identify, adheres more closely to the desire lines, the consensus in terms of feedback from these stakeholders and key user groups was a preference for a wholly segregated NMU route which is what is now being proposed.

Added to this, the anticipated average delay / wait times at each signalised crossing, and the proposed NMU route to the south represents a safer and only marginally longer journey time than the route through the junction. Furthermore, we would like to stress that both of the proposed at-grade crossings on the A1290 and Downhill Lane (East) will be Pegasus type crossings with appropriate signage and signalling installed.

We believe that our proposal best satisfies and balances the requirements of all interested parties and provides a considerably safer solution to both the current situation and the alternative options (Options 1 and 2B) originally consulted on due to the significant segregation of the route.

We agree that there is no legislation enforcing pedestrians and cyclists to use the new off carriageway facilities. However, Department for Transport and Sustrans guidelines state that, physical segregation between motor vehicles and NMU traffic should be provided when traffic flow is expected to exceed 700 vehicles per hour and when the speed limit is 40 mph or greater, which is the case on Downhill Lane junction. The proposed segregated route should significantly improve safety for NMUs in the area. The majority of collisions at the junction are indicated to involve a pedal cyclist. The proposed segregation is therefore, an approach to mitigate this.

The proposed design of the new circulatory carriageway forms a complex spiral; involving a series of lane gains and lane drops around the circulatory so that drivers enter in the lane appropriate to their desired exit and follow the lane around to be led off at that exit. This spiralling configuration was developed to address the congestion problems at the junction, but unfortunately this configuration does not allow for the provision of cycle lanes on the nearside of the circulatory because the outside lane is led off the roundabout at certain exits which would conflict with any cycle lanes. Therefore, on carriageway cycling facilities, including cycle lanes and advanced stop lines could not be provided within the current scheme design.

We trust that this explains Highways England's position and reasoning in relation to the NMU proposals, and we thank you for responding to our most recent consultation.

A19 Downhill NMU bridge

The previous NMU proposal was not very satisfactory and unlikely to be well used by cyclists commuting to / from Nissan or the future IAMP due to its contrived, convoluted route away from the desire line across this interchange. Most will continue to use the highway to cross over the A19.

The addition of a zig zag ramp will make use of this route even more cycle un-friendly especially if the route width is too narrow to allow cyclists, pedestrians and equestrians to pass each other safely with adequate space between them and will lead to conflicts.

In wet or cold icy conditions a series of 180 deg, zig zag turns will become treacherous.

High parapets will also be required to prevent equestrians from being spooked by the noise & motion of fast moving traffic passing below.

This proposed bridge will be quite lengthy crossing both the A1290 & A19 roads and will have a <u>high visual impact</u> and be a <u>"blot on the landscape."</u>

It will be a become costly "white elephant" which will be made redundant once the new bridge further to the south is built as a direct entry to IAMP from the A1290 Washington Road, which will have provision for a traffic free cycle route.

The new HE proposal does not link into the existing traffic free cycle route along the west side of the A1290 Washington Road towards Sunderland & North Hylton nor allow does it allow easy access from the south to it.

If lighting along this proposed NMU route is not included then that would be an even greater deterrent for cyclists to use it especially in winter or at night.

Alternative solution:

A bridge over the A19 road **ONLY** with access to it from the west side of the A1290 from the existing traffic free cycle route. There is ample room to construct simple straight ramps in the dead ground between A1290 and A19 roads, south of the tree belt at the district boundary, this would also avoid the use of a zig zag ramp.

As there is an approx 4m difference in height between the A1290 & A19 roads the ramps up to the proposed bridge over A19 will be shorter and less steep. It would also be less visually intrusive.

A safe crossing point over the A1290 to access this bridge from Downhill Lane would be required with a wide central refuge at a point with clear lines of sight.

Proposed at grade crossing over A1290 to Follingsby Lane

This is situated on a straight fast section of A1290 with has high volumes of HGV's, car transporters, buses and cars (especially at Nissan shift changes) which are often exceeding the National Speed limit.

To expect equestrians to cross at this point is courting disaster unless a light controlled crossing is provided.

This will all change here once IAMP 1 now being constructed is completed with the existing Follingsby Lane being closed between A1290 and Hyton Bridge.

Downhill Lane Crossing.

The positioning of this at grade will not prevent cyclists from taking short cuts up the side of the embankment on Downhill Lane or from using using A19 slip or new link road instead so as to avoid the sharp turn at Downhill Lane to join cycle route.

Many will opt for using the highway instead of the proposed cycle route & bridge south of the Downhill interchange and are likely to continue to do so after new interchange has been constructed.

As was originally proposed the bridleway should ramp up to reach Downhill Lane with the new crossing closer to the junction or better still use provide an underpass.

Equestrian solution

As there is already provision for two **Pegasus Crossings** as part of the Testos A19 scheme consider this is the best and safest place for equestrians to cross the A19.

There are two options possible to reach bridleways to the west of the A19. A verge or field path alongside A184 to West Pasture Lane and/or another alongside the west side of the proposed northbound link road between Downhill & Testos interchanges. which would link directly into the proposed River Don recreation zone within the IAMP area.

<u>A urgent radical review</u> is required with all interested parties / stakeholders to address **ALL** needs for NMU's at both A19 schemes to result in an **effective** NMU scheme that will actually be used by the majority of users.

With regards to the issue concerning the potential for cyclists to continue using the junction, an extensive consultation and liaison with the LAF, which included representatives from SusTrans, Cycling UK and the British Horse Society, has been undertaken in order to develop an NMU solution that best balances the requirements of equestrians, cyclists and pedestrians. Two options were presented at statutory consultation in 2017;

- Option 1 This option provided NMU routes through Downhill Lane junction via a combination of at-grade crossing; located at signalised points around the roundabout, and an independent NMU bridge over the A19 located within the junction roundabout. Where possible the proposal was for the NMU route to be taken away from the carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic.
- Option 2A/2B This option provided NMU routes around Downhill Lane junction via a separate NMU bridge over the A19 and Washington Road located to the south of the junction, and either an at-grade signalised crossing (2A) of, or underpass beneath (2B), Downhill Lane. Where possible the proposal was for the NMU route to be taken away from carriageway to provide separation of NMU and motorised traffic.

Following this consultation and taking into account the views of the key stakeholders listed above, Option 2A was selected as the preferred option. When compared to Option 1 which routes NMUs through the junction at numerous at-grade crossings and, as you correctly identify, adheres more closely to the desire lines, the consensus in terms of feedback from these stakeholders and key user groups was a

preference for a wholly segregated NMU route which is what is now being proposed. Added to this, the anticipated average delay / wait times at each signalised crossing, and the proposed NMU route to the south, represents a safer and only marginally longer journey time than the route through the junction. Furthermore, we would like to stress that both of the proposed at-grade crossings on the A1290 and Downhill Lane (East) will be Pegasus type crossings with appropriate signage and signalling installed.

We believe that our proposal best satisfies and balances the requirements of all interested parties and provides a considerably safer solution to both the current situation and the alternative options (Options 1 and 2B) originally consulted on due to the significant segregation of the route.

In addition, Department for Transport and SusTrans guidelines state that, physical segregation between motor vehicles and NMU traffic should be provided when traffic flow is expected to exceed 700 vehicles per hour and when the speed limit is 40 mph or greater, which is the case on Downhill Lane junction. The proposed segregated route should significantly improve safety for NMUs in the area. The majority of collisions at the junction are indicated to involve a pedal cyclist. The proposed segregation is therefore, an approach to mitigate this.

Following the completion of nearby developments, such as the International Advanced Manufacturing Park (IAMP), the peak traffic periods will occur when the Nissan and IAMP shift changes occur. It is at these times that we also anticipate the largest volume of cyclist commuters requiring to navigate the junction which would significantly increase the risk of collisions between cyclists and vehicles, especially if no segregated route was provided. Between 1st October 2011 to 30th September 2016, five out of seven collisions that occurred between Downhill Lane (east of the junction) and the A1290, involved a pedal cyclist. The proposed provision of an independent NMU bridge in combination with a shared use footway and NMU crossing points will aid cyclists, walkers and equestrians when navigating the junction, negating the need for them to use the roundabout.

There are no proposals to move the proposed new NMU bridge closer to the junction due to site constraints. The proposed structure needs a headroom clearance of 5.7 metres above any road it bridges. Washington Road, which the bridge crosses, is circa 3.0 metres higher than the A19 trunk road and associated merge / diverge slip roads. This vertical offset between Washington Road and the A19 only increases the closer to Downhill Lane junction. Therefore, the NMU bridge in its proposed location is considered the most practical when balancing visual impact of the new structure, design standards and travel distance for NMUs.

With regards to the NMU ramps, both linear and switchback ramps were explored. Ramps in linear formation here would require three ramps with landings which increases the potential for high speed interaction between cyclist and NMU users. A straight ramp would have significant impact on the landscape, particularly from the east. A straight ramp would require around 100m length to get to sufficient height, around 6m, resulting in significant visual impact. It is for these reasons, that a switchback ramp was proposed on the eastern side of Washington Road. The below image provides an impression of how the ramp would be screened by the trees to the east of Washington Road.



It is worth explaining that on the west of the A19, we have proposed a straight ramp as the level difference between the bridge deck and the proposed embankment is less, therefore we need only two straight ramps and one landing to reach required level. Furthermore, the west of the A19 is the proposed location for an industrial development, therefore, the potential visual impact was deemed to be lower.

Regarding your concern about the route being too narrow for passing pedestrian, equestrian and cycling traffic, and the fact that the ramp has a switchback shape, these concerns were also identified at the preliminary design stage and therefore, we have widened the route to 3.5 metres whilst on structure, i.e. on the bridge and ramps leading to the bridge. Furthermore, the SusTrans guidelines require horizontal radius on cycle paths to be a minimum of 1.65 metres for a conventional bicycle, therefore, to improve cyclist comfort on the switchback ramp we have proposed a radius of 4 metres, so this is beyond the basic requirements outlined by SusTrans and will also allow equestrian users greater space to manoeuvre.

Current proposals are for the structure to be illuminated in full but at a low level above the A19 to reduce glare for motorists. However, an assessment is to be undertaken in detailed design to establish what lighting is required for above the A19 and the remainder of the NMU route given that the junction as a whole is illuminated and the route is quite adjacent to the junction, Washington Road and the A1290. This issue will be resolved as the scheme progresses through detailed design.

In accordance with the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges – TD19/06, and in line with the requirements of the British Horse Society, we are currently proposing a 1.8m high solid infill parapet to be provided for the footbridge.

Regarding your concern of the proposed route not linking into the existing traffic free cycle route along the west side of the Washington Road, our proposal includes an extension of the NMU route down the east side of the Washington Road. This will link to an informal crossing to join the west side of Washington Road with proposed NMU route. The location of the crossing has been carefully considered to ensure appropriate visibility along Washington Road to the north and south.

We trust that this explains Highways England's position and reasoning in relation to the NMU proposals, and we thank you for responding to our most recent consultation.

Thank you for your latest response to our consultation. With regards to your proposed alternative route set out in your subsequent correspondence to us dated 6th August 2018, we agree that your proposal does follow more closely the desire line for non-motorised users (NMUs). It should be noted that the alternative option you present follows similar rationale to Option 1 presented at the September 2017 public consultation, which we will refer to throughout this response. Taking into consideration your proposal from a highway design perspective we have some concerns regarding the route which means that this option would not be appropriate.

The route you have proposed indicates three additional at-grade crossings. These crossing raise concerns:

- a signalised crossing on the southbound on-slip exit from the circulatory carriageway would result in operational safety implications, compromising the safety of both NMU and vehicular traffic. The siting of a crossing in this location, on a section of road subject to the national speed limit, is not permissible by highway design standards (Design Manual for Roads & Bridges TA91/05). It would be an unusual occurrence on the strategic road network and would be unexpected by the majority of drivers. This could result in rear end shunting accidents caused by unexpected stopped vehicles, or drivers simply not being able to react and stop in time for a red signal.
- the Washington Road and Downhill Lane crossings you propose are also located close to the exits of the circulatory carriageway. Although these roads would have a lower speed limit, NMU crossings located on the exits of a roundabout are not recommended for a number of reasons; appropriate forward visibility is not always available to drivers resulting in late and sudden braking, and the scenario can result in queuing traffic on the circulatory. It is noted that in urban areas the location of crossings close to roundabout exits are not uncommon, this would not be the case in a rural location.

The locations of the at-grade crossings on both Options 1 and 2A presented at the consultations were carefully considered to ensure safe operation:

- Option 1: the at-grade crossings were located at the control points on the circulatory carriageway where the signals are typically expected by drivers, where appropriate forward visibility ensures safety and where the signals would not compromise the desired flow of vehicular traffic on the junction.
- Option 2A: the at-grade crossings of Downhill Lane were located 100m east of the junction, allowing an appropriate distance after leaving the junction to observe the approaching situation and stop.

As your proposal requires 4 signalised crossings, we can assume that the travel time of the route would be similar to that of the Option 1 of the September 2017 public consultation, which for a cyclist had a 6 min journey time, very similar to the travel time expected for Option 2B.

Options to accommodate NMU routes on the junction overbridges were explored during the option development phase, including options to widen the southern bridge and undertake remedial work to the existing bridge to allow sufficient width for NMU routes. However, the costs associated with the complexity of both these works were, on balance, similar to those for providing a separate, segregated bridge, located within the centre of the circulatory.

In conclusion, similarities can be drawn between your proposed option and that of option 1 presented at the September 2017 public consultation. Option 1 presented a safe option, following close to the desire line of NMU movements and was compliant with current highway design standards. However, following feedback from the consultation, local access forum and further discussions with the local highway authorities, this option was not taken forward as the preferred option.

I hope we have managed to answer your queries in regards to the chosen NMU route.



APPENDIX Q3: BRIDLEWAY B46 ROUTE COMPARISON PLAN



A19 DOWNHILL LANE JUNCTION IMPROVEMENT

Thank you for your response to our most recent consultation in relation to the NMU proposals for the Downhill Lane Junction Scheme ("the Scheme").

The crossings presented in the NMU connectivity plan as part of this consultation are Toucan & Pegasus crossings, designed in accordance with the Design Manual for Roads & Bridges standards, and in line with Horse Society guidance. The orange areas shown include the crossing and associated holding areas adjacent to the carriageway; including a horse corral featuring post and rail fencing. The full specification of the crossing facilities will be developed during the detailed design stage; however, it is anticipated that equestrian users will be able to operate the crossing whilst mounted or dismounted, which as you state will require high and normal level push buttons.

Following the Autumn 2017 consultation on the NMU options for the scheme, the design team explored opportunities to incorporate a connection between the northern end Town End Farm estate, the proposed NMU overbridge and Washington Road. Albeit, concerns were raised by a number of local residents, the Local Authorities and the Local Access Forum during the Autumn 2017 consultation regarding antisocial behaviour. However, a satisfactory NMU alignment that runs either to the east or south of the NMU bridge ramps that both mitigates the risk of antisocial behaviour beneath the proposed NMU ramps and provides a suitable NMU connection within the proposed permanent land take, that is justifiable for the scheme, has not been possible.

As you are aware, there is an existing informal route between Town End Farm estate and Washington Road. For the construction of the Scheme and specifically the NMU bridge, a temporary safe exclusion zone is required south of the proposed location of the NMU ramps, east of Washington Road. This working area clashes with the route of the existing informal path between Town End Farm estate and Washington Road. To mitigate this, a portion of the temporary land south of the safe exclusion zone will be adapted to ensure that an informal route is maintained by clearing the scrub material from the vegetated area to the east of Washington Road. It is intended that following construction, this informal route will be left as is, potentially allowing for regular use by pedestrians in perpetuity.

A19 DOWNHILL LANE JUNCTION IMPROVEMENT

Thank you for your response to our most recent consultation in relation to the NMU proposals for the Downhill Lane Junction Scheme ("the Scheme"). We understand and appreciate your concerns regarding operational management during the construction of the Scheme. We at Highways England are promoting both the Downhill Lane scheme and the Testo's junction improvement and have been consulting with all stakeholders to ensure as far as practicable that the schemes can be delivered efficiently, minimising the impact on the public and key stakeholders such as NEAS. We are aware of a number of proposed developments in the area. In constructing any scheme, we will consult as necessary on traffic management and seek to ensure that in so far as possible any proposals are dovetailed with other proposals in the area to give a seamless transition for road users.

Highways England's target is to maximise lane availability so that it does not fall below 97% in any one rolling year. Highways England is continuing to work to provide a more free-flowing network where delays are less likely. In particular, addressing customer concerns about the impact of roadworks and taking further action to improve the response to incidents and congestion. The Scheme must be constructed in accordance with a Traffic Management Plan (TMP) which will be submitted to and approved in writing by the Secretary of State, following consultation with the relevant planning authority. It is anticipated that this Requirement will be secured in the draft DCO.

We will continue to liaise with the local authorities and key stakeholders such as NEAS to ensure we understand any particular issues and where possible put measures in place to mitigate impacts on travel due to the roadworks. These discussions will inform the development of the TMP. Where full carriageway closures are required, suitable temporary diversion routes would be provided in consultation with the local highway authority. Full closures will only be implemented during off-peak times, unless otherwise agreed with myself, the Highways England Senior Project Manager (and key stakeholders where appropriate).

We have added NEAS to our list of named consultees to be consulted on usage of the network and will communicate in advance with NEAS on the few occasions where full closures are envisaged to be required.

A monthly Traffic Management Forum has been convened for the Testo's scheme, starting in January 2019 with all key stakeholders invited to discuss the development of traffic management proposals, to create a common understanding of traffic management measures and phasing, to report scheme progress and to monitor any specific objectives related to traffic





management. It is anticipated that the Downhill Lane scheme proposals will be presented at this forum as the TMP develops.

Advising of highway improvement works at the A19/A1290 Downhill Lane Junction and of Highways England's proposed development consent order (DCO) application in January 2019. I also note that dialogue and budget costs are being prepared to nearby works in relation to these proposals which are directly linked to this scheme these being ENQ5402442 (Hv diversions) and ENQ5405481 (Nissan No1 & No2 Pilot's).

Aside from the above noted Northern Powergrid Hv and protection/control assets it is of particular note that Northern Powergrid have EHV assets within the footprint of the proposed Downhill Lane junction improvement scheme namely Nissan No1 & No2 66kV Overhead Tower Line. All of the aforementioned assets will be secured via legal easements, wayleaves and we will have well-established rights of access into each of these areas. As such we are particularly keen to not only understand the impact this scheme may have on our operational assets and our existing legal rights but also on any existing access routes/accesses we have if the bridleway is in part to be stopped up, as this does give us access to a section of the Nissan No1 & No2 66kV Overhead Tower Line.

As such as a business we need to be fully satisfied that all of our existing assets, rights of access and legal easement/wayleave agreements are not unduly affected by these proposals. We are however confident through our continued close liaison and co-ordination within the Testo's diversions scheme that agreements between Highways England and Northern Powergrid will be reached so that any applicable necessary diversionary works can be completed by Northern Powergrid in advance of any works Highways England propose to undertake on the Downhill Lane junction improvement scheme.

This will assist to ensure that Northern Powergrid is operating its network, maintaining the quality and continuity of supply to its customers and its obligations as a Distribution Network Operator.
