To Whom it may concern,

I am a onetime Director with The John L:ewsi Partnership and part of my role was ensuring shops and stores had adequate vehicular access.

A key problem at Stonehenge is slow traffic due to two things.

One the road is not wide enough.

Two some people slow down to look at the Stonehenge.

All that is needed is widening of the road to optimise traffic flow. .

Additionally a turn off from the east for those visiting that leads to a bridge over the main road into Stonehenge, as was done at The Hogarth Roundabout in London.

Then planting of trees and arboreal shrubs on the bank between the henge and the road so drivers cannot see the henge from the road.All done with species that would have been around in Neolithic times.I once used to run half of Kew Gardens, Arboretum South.

The only big costs would be a bridge and widening of roads east to west.
