Dear Sirs/ Madam, I would like you to consider the following points in relation to access to Stonehenge. Firstly, Stonehenge is a sacred spiritual site, not a tourist attraction, so respect must be given to the difference. Access for all is of the utmost importance. Presently the access road is appropriate, it may generate long queues but above ground the scenery is lovely and a visit to the site is in many respects a pilgrimage and therefore, occasionally having to wait to get there is an opportunity for spiritual reflection. The idea of a tunnel, any tunnel is utterly unthinkable and frankly horrifying. For many people, a tunnel will act as a barrier to access, which I view as a potential form of discrimination. The whole point of Stonehenge is it being a natural church. There is nothing natural about having to enter a long dark tunnel in order to get to the site and such an action would definitely prevent me and likely many others from accessing the site. It may well be convenient for others, but a decision must take into account everyone's viewpoint. At a push, and only if deemed absolutely necessary then a small relief road, above ground would be acceptable, perhaps even a tram to ferry people to the site or a sky cable car. Finally, the land around Stonehenge is a positive energy portal and any disturbance to the surrounding grounds and area, tunnelling through, could have negative energetic consequences.
