Further to your invitation to comment on the response of National Highways to the abovementioned report, I would be grateful if the following points could be taken into consideration:

- the UNESCO report advised that the western limit of the tunnel should be extended to the World Heritage Site boundary;
- National Highways has simply reiterated many of the arguments it has raised previously to justify a scheme which is clearly unacceptable to:
