M25 Junction 10/A3 Wisley Interchange Improvement Plan – Issue Specific Hearing 2 and comments on WRs.

Further to previous correspondence, I write to provide the Guide Association Trust Corporation and Girlguiding Greater London West ("GGLW") written submission of oral case at Issue Specific Hearing 2 and some additional comments on the Written Representations of other parties.

Written Submission of oral case

Alternative route for safeguarding reasons

- The alternative route we propose changes after the gas station and pylon at the north-east end of the site. At this point instead of entering our land, the Private Means Access to our neighbours would turn right down the current access track for the gas station and Park Farm to the A3. It will then need to curve left alongside the widened A3. This will then be a straight access road, parallel to the A3, down to the current entrance for Court Close Farm. (see appendix 1 adapted Access map)
- 2. Our alternative route keeps our camp site whole rather than severing approx. 20% which includes our warden's bungalow, garage, tool shed and the ancient woodland area. (see appendix 2 labelled freeholder map).
- 3. Girlguiding has a Safeguarding policy (see appendix 3). There are 4 levels of safe space training that volunteers are required to undertake according to their volunteer role. Level 1 is completed by everyone including parent helpers; levels 1 & 2 by all adult leaders and young leaders (aged 14-18); levels 1, 2 & 3 by those leading residential trips or are the main leader for a unit; in addition level 4 is completed by all area commissioners. All volunteers undergo an Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check which is renewed every 5 years. In addition, all activities must prepare a risk assessment undertaken by the leaders.

- 4. The HE proposed new road is adjacent to the main camping field which has 8 camping areas (Sites 1 to 8) where girls can camp in independent groups. (see appendix 4 pictorial map attached) This field is very popular as it is the flat part of the site. The pictorial map shows the use of the various parts of the site.
- 5. The HE proposed route would result in the loss of our car parking area which would increase the risk to children and young people as they are dropped off and collected from the site.
- 6. The number of vehicles using the track to access the site during 2019 was just under 10,000, the majority of which were private cars. There were some minibuses/ transit vans used and for large events there were several coaches. In 2019 there were 12 coaches for one specific event, which were admitted to a pre-planned schedule.
- 7. Further research has revealed that no other Girlguiding campsite in the UK is in this position of having a public access through it.

Loss of ancient woodland

8. The current HE proposal identifies a loss of ancient woodland as well as other woodland and vegetation. Girlguiding values the environment; supporting and encouraging our members to protect our planet for their future.

At Heyswood we have always encouraged our young people to freely experience and enjoy this area of woodland. Albeit, we are all volunteers, we have been working to look after the woodland and ensure the young people who use the site do so as well.

We are currently working on:

- (1) Removing invasive species like Himalayan Balsam, having significantly reduced the spread of this over the last two years.
- (2) Removing and managing the false acacia trees that are at risk of falling in the middle section of woodland on the site which we had to temporarily fence off
- (3) Replacing non-native trees with native trees and increasing the number of trees on the site

Comments on the applicant's response to REP1-026

9. We note that Surrey County Council advised at the hearing that a Private Means Access (PMA) needs to be only 3m rather than 4.8m wide. This means that the GLW alternative route would require less impact on the ancient woodland and less land take than previously calculated.

10. We disagree with Highways England's view that the warden's bungalow would not need to be relocated if the proposed current route is used. The role of a resident warden is important to our members; It is not just access that would be restricted but also the general surveillance across the site. As indicated on the site visit, the fencing in front of the bungalow is specifically low to enable the warden to 'keep an eye' on activities unobtrusively.




- 11. We note that Agnes Engelen our neighbour at Court Close Farm has concerns similar to ours feeling that access to her property is severely compromised:
 - (1) Although security gates/barriers are indicated, the actual operation of these to make them effective is unknown as there would be a large number of various visitors who would often only need access for a single visit or delivery
 - (2) Safeguarding concerns for the numerous people who require access to Court Close Farm as listed in REP1-056-2
 - (3) Road safety concerns with vehicles having 24-hour access through Heyswood Campsite.

Safeguarding policy

Statement of purpose

Safeguarding is at the heart of everything we do in Girlguiding, and it's the responsibility of all of us.

As a Girlguiding volunteer you share this responsibility to protect and promote the safety and wellbeing of girls, young women and adults as you help them reach their full potential through great guiding experiences.

So it's really important that you're clear about your safeguarding responsibility, and about Girlguiding's commitment to safeguarding.

Our safeguarding policy will make that clear for you. It's for everyone involved with Girlguiding - whether you're a volunteer, staff or member - and it shows you our safeguarding principles and how we seek to protect children, young people and adults who are involved with the organisation.

You must read and always follow the safeguarding policy, and the safeguarding procedures that go with it. This isn't part of the contract of employment for staff or the code of conduct for volunteers, but it is a condition of your employment or voluntary service.

Girlguiding's commitment to safeguarding

It's our policy to safeguard all adults and children while they take part in Girlguiding activities. This is regardless of their age, disability (physical or mental), gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity status, race, religion or belief or sexual orientation. We recognise that some people are vulnerable because of the impact of previous experiences, their level of dependency, their communication needs, or other issues.

Everyone has a right to live free from abuse, exploitation, harm and fear and to be safe and well. We recognise and respond to all types of abuse and harm including physical, emotional, sexual and domestic abuse, neglect, online abuse, child sexual exploitation, female genital mutilation, bullying, harassment and cyberbullying, radicalisation, trafficking, grooming and harmful sexual behaviour. We work in partnership with children, young people, parents, carers and external agencies to promote the safeguarding and welfare of our young members and our adult members and volunteers.

Our safeguarding policy, procedures and guidance are designed to create a safe space for great guiding, protecting the safety and wellbeing of all our girls, young women and adults, regardless of role. They are also designed to enable everyone associated with Girlguiding to share allegations, concerns or disclosures - whether related to Girlguiding activities or not.

How do we effectively safeguard adults and children?

- We value, listen to and respect them.
- We have a safeguarding structure in place. (Please see: https://www.girlguiding.org.uk/making-guiding-happen/policies/girlguiding-policies/safety-and-safeguarding-policy/safeguarding-structure/).
- We have child protection and safeguarding procedures which reflect best practice.
- We share concerns and information with other agencies when there are significant concerns about an adult's suitability to work with children, or where we believe that someone is at risk of abuse or harm.
- We process information lawfully and securely, in line with the Data Protection Act 2018.
- We share information about child protection and safeguarding best practice with members, staff and volunteers. We do this via 'A Safe Space' pocket guides, e-learning and face-to-face training.
- We recruit volunteers safely, in line with the recruitment and vetting policy.
- We use our procedures to manage allegations against staff and volunteers.
- We make sure volunteers follow the code of conduct.
- We use complaints and whistleblowing policies and procedures.
- We always have health and safety measures in place in line with the law and regulatory guidance to provide a safe physical environment.

What does Girlguiding expect of you as volunteers, staff or adult members?

- To follow the good safeguarding behaviours on our website: (https://www.girlguiding.org.uk/making-guiding-happen/policies/girlguiding-policies/safety-and-safeguarding-policy/good-safeguarding-behaviours/).
- To report all concerns, allegations and disclosures to your commissioner, the national Safeguarding team or, if you are based with British Guiding Overseas, the BGO Chief Commissioner
- To work with your commissioner or the national Safeguarding team to act when there's a report of an allegation, concern or disclosure.
- To be vigilant so that you are alert when something is wrong.
- To act as soon as there's a problem. Report it within 24 hours, or sooner if it is an emergency or there's an immediate risk of harm.
- To be inclusive when thinking about safeguarding issues.
- To be accountable don't assume that someone else has responded to a concern.
- To support the development of safeguarding knowledge.
- To help on behalf of others, and support them to develop their voice.
- To take safeguarding training relevant to your role, in line with our A Safe Space programme.

What do I do if I have a concern?

As a volunteer or member of staff you must understand the procedures for recognising, responding to and referring any concerns, allegations or disclosures of harm or abuse. You can find information about this in our safeguarding procedures.

If you have a concern about someone in Girlguiding you should follow our process for reporting. You can find information about this in our A Safe Space pocket guide, and in our safeguarding procedure document.


