## Listed Buildings Identification and Extent

How the listing system identifies and grades buildings of historical and architectural interest, as well as providing clarification on extent.

If a <u>building</u> is considered by the <u>Secretary of State (for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport)</u> to be of <u>special architectural or historic interest</u> it will be included in a list of such buildings.

The designation regime is set out in the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 (1). The list is maintained by <u>Historic England</u> and is available online through the <u>National Heritage List for England</u> (2). Applications for new entries and to remove or amend an existing entry are made to Historic England. It will investigate the merits of the application and make a recommendation to the Secretary of State (for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport) who will make the decision.

There are around 400,000 <u>listed building</u> entries in England. Listed buildings are classified into three grades:

<u>Grade I buildings</u> are of exceptional interest. Just 2.5% of listed buildings are Grade I.

<u>Grade II\* buildings</u> are particularly important buildings of more than special interest. 5.8% of listed buildings are Grade II\*.

<u>Grade II buildings</u> are of special interest warranting every effort to preserve them. Over 90% of all listed buildings are in this grade (3).
