Thank you for your subsequent draft bat mitigation licence application in association with the above NSIP site, received in this office on the 23rd June 2021. As stated in our published guidance, once Natural England is content that the draft licence application is of the required standard, we will issue a 'letter of no impediment'. This is designed to provide the Planning Inspectorate and the Secretary of State with confidence that the competent licensing authority sees no impediment to issuing a licence in future, based on information assessed to date in respect of these proposals.

Assessment

Following our assessment of the resubmitted draft application documents, I can now confirm that, on the basis of the information and proposals provided, Natural England sees no impediment to a licence being issued, should the DCO be granted.

However, please note the following issues have been identified within the current draft of the method statement that will need to be addressed before the licence application is formally submitted. Our wildlife adviser, Dagmar Lewis, discussed this matter with Chloe Delgery via email correspondence and conference call on the 4th August 2021 where it was confirmed that the necessary amendments would be made. Please do ensure that the Method Statement is revised to include these changes prior to formal submission. For clarity these include:

Before any licence applications are submitted, further surveys need to be carried out to cover the current or immediately prior active period at the time the licence is applied for, and to cover any surveys that could not be carried out due to access not being granted or otherwise not possible. The surveys should include an element of thermal imaging to provide a robust base line of where bats are crossing the road and at what height etc.

The DCO area and its surrounds is important for many species of bats which forage, roost, breed and hibernate in the area. The foraging and commuting assemblage of the four Annex II

bat species (greater horseshoe, lesser horsehoe, Barbastelle and Bechsteins) in this area is considered to be of national importance. The foraging and commuting assemblage of the other bat species identified (common and soprano pipistrelle, Nathusius' pipistrelle, noctule, serotine, Leisler's, *Myotis* species and brown long-eared) is considered to be of county importance.

The scheme would result in the loss of two roosts in buildings and four roosts in trees. Suitable alternative roosting habitat will need to be provided, close to existing foraging and commuting roosts. Natural England welcomes the proposed mitigation for the losses of roosts and measures to minimise disturbance, as summarised in the ES Chaper 8 paragraphs 8.10.114 onwards and further detailed in in Annex D LEMP of ES Appendix 2.1 EMP (document reference 6.4), as well as the Bat House Design Principle recently submitted.

Embedded mitigation includes a bat underpass at Crickley Hill and three green overbridges (the Gloucestershire Way crossing and Stockwell and Cowley overbridges). The scheme replaces priority habitats with a greater amount than lost and has been amended to provide improved habitat connectivity.

Next Steps

Should the DCO be granted then the mitigation licence application must be formally submitted to Natural England. At this stage any modifications to the timings of the proposed works, e.g. due to ecological requirements of the species concerned, must be made and agreed with Natural England before a licence is granted. Please note that there will be no charge for the formal licence application determination, should the DCO be granted, for the granting of any licence.

If other minor changes to the application are subsequently necessary, e.g. amendments to the work schedule/s then these should be outlined in a covering letter and must be reflected in the formal submission of the licence application. These changes must be agreed by Natural England before a licence can be granted. If changes are made to proposals or timings which do not enable us to reach a 'satisfied' decision, we will issue correspondence outlining why the proposals are not acceptable and what further information is required. These issues will need to be addressed before any licence can be granted.

This is designed to provide the Planning Inspectorate and the Secretary of State with confidence that the competent licensing authority sees no impediment to issuing a licence in future, based on information assessed to date in respect of these proposals.

Assessment

Following our assessment of the resubmitted draft application documents, I can now confirm that, on the basis of the information and proposals provided, Natural England sees no impediment to a licence being issued, should the DCO be granted.

However, please note the following issues have been identified within the current draft of the method statement that will need to be addressed before the licence application is formally submitted. Our wildlife adviser, Dagmar Lewis, discussed this matter with Charlotte Phillips via e-mail correspondence and conference call on the 4th August 2021 where it was confirmed that the necessary amendments would be made. Please do ensure that the Method Statement is revised to include these changes prior to formal submission. For clarity these include:

Further surveys to be carried out to cover the current or immediately prior survey period to the application date. This is to update any changes in the survey data so far and to capture any new setts established or abandoned. Please note that licences will only be issued 1st July to 30 November and need a lead in time of at least 30 working days.

Some monitoring of the green bridges and culverts should be built into the maintenance programme to see how successful they are and how the various species make use of them. This can be done through camera traps, remote surveying and other low impact monitoring.

Next Steps

Should the DCO be granted then the mitigation licence application must be formally submitted to Natural England. At this stage any modifications to the timings of the proposed works, e.g. due to ecological requirements of the species concerned, must be made and agreed with Natural England before a licence is granted. Please note that there will be no charge for the formal licence application determination, should the DCO be granted, or the granting of any licence.

If other minor changes to the application are subsequently necessary, e.g. amendments to the work schedule/s then these should be outlined in a covering letter and must be reflected in the formal submission of the licence application. As stated in our published guidance, once Natural England is content that the draft licence application is of the required standard, we will issue a 'letter of no impediment'. This is designed to provide the Planning Inspectorate and the Secretary of State with confidence that the competent licensing authority sees no impediment to issuing a licence in future, based on information assessed to date in respect of these proposals.

Assessment

Following our assessment of the resubmitted draft application documents, I can now confirm that, on the basis of the information and mitigation plan proposals provided, Natural England sees no impediment to a licence being issued, should the DCO be granted. Roman snail remains a widespread species of Least Concern in the UK and your mitigation plan and translocation proposals are in line with that deployed elsewhere. This will ensure that the favourable conservation status of the species is maintained, and no population detriment will be encountered.

Next Steps

Should the DCO be granted then the mitigation licence application must be formally submitted to Natural England. At this stage any modifications to the timings of the proposed works, e.g. due to ecological requirements of the species concerned, must be made and agreed with Natural England before a licence is granted.
