I will reiterate that we will not be hearing comments on the merits of the application this morning, as those will be dealt with during the examination itself, which does not formally begin until after the close of this preliminary meeting.

We have read the letters that we've received from procedural deadline a and all the written submissions that have been received prior to that.

And also the requests we heard orally at this meeting. And subsequent subsequent hearings that we've already announced, will come to those participants who have expressed desire to speak shortly,

I would stress that the written submissions received carry equal weight to any oral submissions.

So in our initial examination proposals, we set out in our rule six letter dated the seventh of May, inviting you to this meeting. Our aim is to keep this meeting as efficient and focused as possible. And in that respect, we anticipate that you have read that rule six letter and the various annexes attached to it prior to this meeting.

And that includes the national infrastructure planning, privacy notice, and our advice note on examinations, which include virtual elements.

Firstly, in respect to the section 51 advice that we gave after the acceptance, and they are set out in the examination library, at references as dashes 0012 as dash zero 55. And then subsequent documents, which was as zero 56, two as zero 59, which were in response to our rule nine letter of the 30th of April.

We've also obviously decided to undertake the two issues Pacific hearings later in this week, as blended events. And they will be held here and also on teams tomorrow and Thursday.
