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## **1. Anglian Water Response to the Environment Agency Written Statement**

1.1. Anglian Water works closely with the Environment Agency to ensure there is sufficient wastewater capacity to serve proposed growth within environmental limits. We note the Environment Agency's proposed wording of requirement 11 (EA Written Statement paragraph 4.31) and agree with the proposed amendments.

## **2. Anglian Water response to E.ONs Written Statement**

2.1. Anglian Water notes E.ONs concerns regarding the proposed relocation of our Sludge and Brine Main from Elsham Water Treatment Works and will work with interested parties to understand their concerns.

2.2. During design, Anglian Water will notify E.ON should the proposed Sludge and Brine Main diversions fall within the easement for E.ONs assets.

2.3. The Environment Agency, as the relevant authority for Environmental Permits, will advertise and consult relevant parties prior to determining an application to discharge.

2.4. Anglian Water considers the DCO needs to enable a decision to be made promptly and the provision proposed by E.ON (E.ONs Written Statement Appendix 11) could delay the project.

2.5. Anglian Water considers the proposed draft provision in E.ONs Written Statement (Appendix 11) inappropriate and unnecessary as it duplicates other processes (as stated in paragraphs 2.2 and 2.3). Anglian Water considers the existing provisions, outlined above, to be sufficient to address the risks.
