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
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Chapter 1: Executive Summary

Consultation Report

- 1.1.1 This Consultation Report ("Report") has been submitted to the Secretary of State for Transport via the Planning Inspectorate ("PINS") in support of the application for a Development Consent Order ("DCO") for the proposed Immingham Green Energy Terminal ("IGET") also referred to for the purposes of this Report as the "Project".
- 1.1.2 The purpose of this Report is to provide a comprehensive description of the consultation and engagement process that has been carried out by Associated British Ports ("ABP") prior to the submission of the IGET application for a DCO ("the Application"). The Report has been prepared in compliance with section 37(7)(c) of the Planning Act 2008 (as amended) ("2008 Act") and relevant guidance. It demonstrates how ABP has complied with the pre-application consultation requirements set down in sections 42, 47, 48 and 49 of the 2008 Act.
- 1.1.3 In accordance with the Planning Inspectorate's Advice Note Fourteen: Compiling the Consultation Report ("Advice Note 14"), the Report provides the information required detailing:
 - a. Who was consulted and how the consultation was undertaken;
 - b. How and when the Project was publicised; and
 - c. How relevant responses to consultation were taken into account.
- 1.1.4 The Report also provides information regarding the non-statutory engagement, which has been taking place on an ongoing basis beyond the formal requirements of the 2008 Act to provide a full understanding of the totality of the consultation activity which has taken place.

The Applicant

- 1.1.5 The Application is being promoted by ABP, the owner and operator of the Port of Immingham (the "Port").
- 1.1.6 The Applicant for the Application is ABP (also referred to in this Report as the "Applicant") but is working closely with Air Products (BR) Limited ("Air Products"), in relation to the proposed hydrogen production facility, which also forms part of the Project. Air Products would be the first customer to use the new terminal ("the Terminal") for the import of green ammonia to be converted to green hydrogen.
- 1.1.7 Further information on both ABP and Air Products is provided in Chapter 2 of this Report.

The Proposed Development

1.1.8 ABP has submitted an Application to the Secretary of State for Transport under the provisions of section 37 of the 2008 Act for development consent which if approved will, through the statutory vehicle of a DCO, authorise the alteration of an existing harbour facility for the construction of a new liquid bulk terminal and associated





hydrogen production facility on the eastern side of the Port and includes both marine and landside development. It would be known as IGET.

- 1.1.9 **NSIP** The construction of the Terminal constitutes a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project ("NSIP") (as an alteration to an existing harbour facility) under sections 14(1)(j), 24(2) and 24(3)(c) of the 2008 Act given the quantity of material which the harbour facilities will be capable of handling after the alteration to the facilities will have increased by more than the relevant threshold of 5 million tonnes throughput per annum prescribed by the 2008 Act.
- 1.1.10 **Marine development** On the marine side, the Project would comprise a new approach trestle and jetty infrastructure running to the east and broadly parallel to the existing jetty for the Immingham Oil Terminal. The Terminal is designed to service the import of liquid bulk goods, principally green ammonia at first, with the ability to import and export other liquid bulk products including CO₂ in the future.
- 1.1.11 Landside development a jetty access ramp would connect the Terminal to the jetty access road (which will run from the Terminal to Laporte Road). Within that corridor, pipe-racks and pipelines will be installed to convey the imported green ammonia to the hydrogen production facility. The green ammonia will be stored and processed landside at two sites off Queens Road and Kings Road (referred to in this Report as the "East Site" and the "West Site") in storage tanks, hydrogen production units and liquefiers and conveyed via a pipeline to be installed connecting the East and West Site to create green hydrogen for onward transport to other parts of the UK.
- 1.1.12 The project for which development consent is sought is defined by Schedule 1: Authorised Project of the draft DCO [TR030008/APP/2.1] and the location of each Work No. within the Site is shown on Figure 2.3 [TR030008/APP/6.3] and on the Works Plans [TR030008/APP/4.2]). The Project is described further in Chapter 2 of this Report and in detail in Chapter 2: The Project of the Environmental Statement ("ES") [TR030008/APP/6.2], which forms part of the Application.

Consultation

- 1.1.13 The approach to consultation is set out further in subsequent chapters (2: Introduction and 3: Consultation Process), which provide the detail of all consultation activities undertaken to comply with the requirements of the 2008 Act, relevant legislation and policies, guidance and advice published by Government and PINS in relation to both ongoing (non-statutory) engagement and Statutory Consultation.
- 1.1.14 The Applicant has undertaken a comprehensive programme of engagement and consultation in support of the Application that included an initial launch introducing the Project to key stakeholders ("Project Launch"), two rounds of Statutory Consultation and a programme of ongoing engagement with key consultees and interested parties as demonstrated in Figure 1.1.

- 1.1.15 Responses have been received from consultees, stakeholders and interested parties throughout the Project Launch, both Statutory Consultations and the programme of ongoing engagement.
- 1.1.16 All responses have been taken into account in the design of the Project, with design changes and additional mitigations proposed where appropriate in response to the feedback received.
- 1.1.17 All responses and any subsequent design changes or additional mitigations are outlined in detail in Appendix P.1 and P.2 for the first Statutory Consultation and Appendix Q.1 and Q.2 for the second Statutory Consultation.





Chapter 2: Introduction

Overview

- 2.1.1. This Report provides a comprehensive description of all consultation and engagement activity undertaken in relation to the Application for the Project.
- 2.1.2. This Report has been prepared by ABP for submission with and to support its Application to PINS for determination by the Secretary of State for Transport (the "Secretary of State") under the provisions of section 37(3)(c) of the 2008 Act for the construction, operation and maintenance of the Project.
- 2.1.3. Section 37(3)(c) requires that 'an application for an order granting development consent must be accompanied by a Consultation Report.' This Report ensures compliance with s37(3)(c).

The Applicant – Associated British Ports

- 2.1.4. The Project is being promoted by ABP, the owner and operator of the Port. The Port is currently the UK's largest port by tonnage, handling some 46 million tonnes of cargo every year. Together with the other ports within the Humber Estuary which include ABP's ports of Grimsby, Hull and Goole, as well as the Killingholme Terminal operated by CLdN Ports¹, the Humber Estuary is the UK's busiest commercial shipping and trading estuary, connecting businesses across the UK, Europe and worldwide.
- 2.1.5. ABP is the Applicant for this DCO but is working closely with Air Products, who would be the first customer to use the Terminal once it is built. Air Products is the world's largest hydrogen supplier, and develops, builds and operates some of the world's largest industrial gas projects, employing over 20,000 staff in more than 50 countries worldwide, with over 750 production facilities.
- 2.1.6. ABP was established in 1981 following the privatisation of the British Transport Docks Board. It is the largest ports group in the UK, owning and operating 21 ports and other transport related businesses across England, Wales and Scotland.
- 2.1.7. Alongside the Port, ABP owns and operates three other ports on the Humber, namely the ports of Hull, Grimsby and Goole, which together constitute the largest ports complex in the UK. The Port is the largest and busiest of ABP's four Humber ports.




Figure 2.1: Location Plan of the Port of Immingham

- 2.1.8. ABP's statutory undertaking at Immingham, the 'statutory port estate', as shown in **Figure 2.1**, covers some 480 hectares (ha). The majority of the port estate falls within the administrative boundary of North East Lincolnshire Council ("NELC"), although the western part of the Port falls within the administrative boundary of North Lincolnshire Council.

- 2.1.9. As well as the internal dock, the Port has twenty 'in-river' berths from which it imports and exports cargo. The Port has a very diverse trade base and handles a wide variety of cargoes including liquid bulks, liquid and solid fuels, ores, breakbulk cargo, animal feed and grain and unitised cargoes in the form of containers ("lo-lo") and trailers ("ro-ro") from the internal dock and the existing in-river jetties. Since the 1960s the Port's marine capability has increasingly been serviced from jetties located in the river, thereby eliminating the need for vessels to pass through the lock gates into the Port's internal dock.
- 2.1.10. The Port comprises a number of discrete operational areas. These include the internal dock, the Eastern and Western Jetties, the Immingham Oil Terminal, the Immingham Gas Terminal, Immingham Outer Harbour and the Humber International Terminal.
- 2.1.11. The infrastructure at the Port is the product of incremental expansion. This has enabled ABP, as the port operator, to increase the quantity of cargo imported/exported and to expand the range and type of cargoes accommodated. The volumes processed through the Port have risen from 26 million tonnes to 50 million tonnes during the period 1981 2020.

Air Products (BR) Limited

- 2.1.12. Air Products is a world-leading industrial gases company in operation for nearly 80 years, and more than 60 years in the UK and Ireland with over 1000 employees and significant operating facilities including 35 production facilities across the UK and Ireland, in addition to a number of hydrogen refuelling stations and hydrogen, nitrogen and oxygen plants.
- 2.1.13. Focused on serving energy, environment and emerging markets, the company provides essential industrial gases, related equipment and applications expertise





- to customers in dozens of industries, including refining, chemical, metals, electronics, manufacturing, and food and beverage.
- 2.1.14. The company develops, engineers, builds, owns and operates some of the world's largest industrial gas and carbon-capture projects, supplying world-scale clean hydrogen for global transportation and industrial markets, as well as the broader energy transition.
- 2.1.15. Air Products plans to invest in the new green hydrogen production facility at Immingham, which forms part of the Application, supported by a downstream distribution network. The plan is to import green ammonia to convert into green hydrogen to fuel heavy duty transport, such as heavy goods vehicles ("HGVs") and buses. This is one of the most challenging and polluting sectors to decarbonise and a priority for meeting net zero in the UK.
- 2.1.16. Air Products and ABP have entered into an agreement in respect of the use of the IGET for the import of ammonia and construction of associated landside development at the Port and the grant of interests in land to Air Products to facilitate the delivery of ammonia and its storage and processing to produce green hydrogen.

The Project Site




Figure 2.2: Site Location Plan

2.1.17. The project site ("the Site") is located in North East Lincolnshire on the south bank of the Humber Estuary to the east of the Port. **Figure 2.2** illustrates the Project's location, which is approximately centred on National Grid Reference ("NGR") E520783 N415271.





- 2.1.18. The landside works fall within NELC's administrative boundary, as illustrated on **Figure 2.2**. The marine-side works, that extend seaward and fall beyond the local authority's boundary, would take place in the bed of the Humber Estuary, which is owned by the Crown Estate and over which the Applicant has the benefit of a long lease. The Project in its entirety covers an area of approximately 121ha.
- 2.1.19. The Site is situated to the east of the Port and largely outside of the operational area of the Port. The area surrounding the Port is industrial in nature, being dominated by chemical manufacturing, oil processing and power generation facilities. Residential and commercial properties are present to the south of the Port on Queens Road and lie within, and adjacent to, the proposed Site Boundary. Beyond the industrial facilities, the wider area is largely agricultural. The nearest residential area is the town of Immingham approximately 460m from the western edge of the West Site.

The Project

- 2.1.20. The Project comprises the alteration of an existing harbour facility for the construction of a new liquid bulk terminal and associated hydrogen production facility on the eastern side of the Port and includes both marine and landside development.
- 2.1.21. The Project would comprise a new approach trestle and jetty infrastructure running to the east and broadly parallel to the existing jetty for the Immingham Oil Terminal. The Terminal is designed to service the import of liquid bulk goods, principally green ammonia at first, with the ability to import and export other liquid bulk products, including CO₂ in the future. A corridor between the new jetty and Laporte Road would support a private road (the 'jetty access road'), pipe-racks and pipelines to enable the ammonia import to the East Site. The green ammonia will be stored and processed landside at two sites off Queens Road and Kings Road (the East Site and the West Site) in storage tanks, hydrogen production units and liquefiers and conveyed via a pipeline to be installed connecting the East Site and West Site to create green hydrogen for onward transport to other parts of the UK.
- 2.1.22. The construction of the Terminal constitutes a NSIP (as an alteration to an existing harbour facility) under sections 14(1)(j), 24(2) and 24(3)(c) of the 2008 Act given the quantity of material which the harbour facilities will be capable of handling after the alteration to the facilities will have increased by more than the relevant threshold of 5 million tonnes throughput per annum prescribed by the 2008 Act.
- 2.1.23. A comprehensive description of the Project is set out in Chapter 2: The Project of the ES, [TR030008/APP/6.2] which forms part of the Application.
- 2.1.24. The Project description set out in Chapter 2 of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2], and the summary set out below, cover the proposals as set out in the section 42 notice issued to stakeholders ahead of the second Statutory Consultation (see Appendix K.1). The proposals set out in the section 42 notice (see Appendix H.1) issued ahead of the first Statutory Consultation are no longer consistent with the final proposals due to changes made to the Project designs during the pre-application period. These changes are detailed in this Report at 4.1.174.
- 2.1.25. The works which comprise the Project are defined in **Schedule 1: Authorised Project** of the **draft DCO [TR030008/APP/2.1]** which provides the full description





of all elements of each Works No. The locations of Work No. 1 through to Work No. 10 within the Site are shown on the **Works Plans [TR030008/APP/4.2]**. The following is a summary of the main elements of each of Work Nos 1-10 as set out in the section 42 notice issued ahead of the second Statutory Consultation:

- A. The NSIP, Work No. 1, comprising:
 - i. On the marine side, a Terminal for liquid bulks: comprising:
 - a. a jetty (defined by **Work No. 1a**) including a loading platform, associated dolphins, fenders and walkways, topside infrastructure but not limited to control rooms, marine loading arms, pipe-racks, pipelines and other infrastructure;
 - b. a single berth, with a berthing pocket with a depth of up to 14.5m below chart datum; and
 - ii. related landside infrastructure including, but not limited to, a jetty access ramp, a flood defence access ramp and works to raise the seawall locally under the jetty access ramp;
- B. Associated Development on the landside, comprising:
 - i. corridor between the new jetty and Laporte Road which would support a private road (the 'jetty access road'), pipe-racks, pipelines to enable the ammonia import to the East Site, as well as security gates, a security building, a power distribution building and associated utilities (Work No. 2);
 - ii. 'East Site Ammonia Storage' (**Work No. 3**) on which an ammonia storage tank and related plant including an ammonia tank flare stack would be constructed (Work No. 3a) as well as additional buildings (including welfare building, power distribution building and a process instrumentation building), pipe-racks, pipelines, pipes, cable-racks, utilities and other infrastructure;
 - iii. Construction of a culvert (**Work No. 4**) under Laporte Road for pipelines, pipes and cables and other conducting media linking the two parts of the East Site:
 - iv. 'East Site Hydrogen Production Facility' (**Work No. 5**) on which up to three hydrogen production units and associated plant including flue gas stacks and flare stacks would be constructed (Work No. 5a) together with additional buildings (including process control building, power distribution buildings, process instrumentation buildings, analyser shelters), pipe-racks, pipelines, pipes, utilities and other infrastructure;
 - v. Underground pipelines, pipes, cables and other conducting media (**Work No. 6**), between the East and West Sites, for the transfer of ammonia, hydrogen, nitrogen and utilities, with cathodic protection against saline corrosion;
 - vi. 'West Site' (**Work No. 7**) involving the construction of up to three hydrogen production units with associated flue gas stacks and flare stacks and up to four liquefier units (**Work No. 7a** and **Work No. 7b**





combined); hydrogen storage tanks, hydrogen trailer filling stations, a hydrogen vent stack and associated process equipment (**Work No. 7c**); and hydrogen vehicle and trailer filling stations, hydrogen compressors and associated process equipment (**Work No. 7d**). Also additional buildings (including but not limited to control room and workshop building, security and visitor building, contractor building, warehouse, driver administration building, safe haven building, electrical substation and metering station, power distribution buildings, process instrumentation buildings, analyser buildings and additional temporary buildings during construction), process and utility plant including cooling towers and pumps, fire water tank, instrument air equipment, pipe-racks, pipelines, pipes, cable-racks, utilities and other infrastructure;

- vii. Formation of temporary construction and laydown areas on Queens Road (Work No. 8) and off Laporte Road (Work No. 9); and
- viii. Temporary removal of street furniture and modification of overhead cables on Kings Road (**Work No. 10**) associated with the transport of large construction components from the Port to the Site.
- 2.1.26. In addition to Work No. 1 to 10 which are each spatially defined within the **Works Plans [TR030008/APP/4.2], Schedule 1: Authorised Project** of the **draft DCO [TR030008/APP/2.1]** provides for 'Further associated development' and 'Ancillary Works' across the full extent of the Site.
- 2.1.27. In broad terms, 'Further associated development' would be the undertaking, as required, of works such as site clearance, creation of additional construction compounds, utility works, landscaping works and street works on a site wide basis (in connection with Work Nos. 1 to 10).
- 2.1.28. 'Ancillary works' constitute works that would not necessarily constitute development, such as vegetation removal, the installation of fencing and the demobilisation of construction works.
- 2.1.29. The relevant National Policy Statement ("NPS") to the determination of the Application and the one which has "effect" for the purposes of s104 of the 2008 Act is the National Policy Statement for Ports ("NPSfP"). Where an NPS has effect in the determination of an application, section 104(3) of the 2008 Act requires that the Secretary of State must decide an application for an NSIP in accordance with the relevant NPS except in a limited number of circumstances specified in the 2008 Act. Section 104(2) provides that the Secretary of State must have regard to a relevant NPS, the appropriate Marine policy documents, and the local impact report, any matters prescribed in relation to the development and any other matters which the Secretary of State thinks are both important and relevant to the decision.
- 2.1.30. Further detail on the compliance of the Project with the NPSfP is provided in the Planning Statement (including its appendices) [TR030008/APP/7.1], which forms part of the Application.

2.1.31. The structure of the following sections of this Report, is outlined **Table 1** below.

Compliance with Regulatory Requirements

- 2.1.32. This Report has been prepared in accordance with:
 - Section 37(3)(c) of the 2008 Act which requires all DCO applications to be accompanied by a Consultation Report providing details of what has been done to ensure compliance with sections 42, 47, and 48 of the 2008 Act, the relevant responses received to consultation and the account taken of those;
 - The Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009 ("APFP Regulations"); and
 - The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ("EIA Regulations").
- 2.1.33. Both rounds of formal Statutory Consultation for the Project were undertaken in accordance with the procedures agreed with the responsible local authorities and endorsed in the SoCC, together with the requirements set down in the 2008 Act, the APFP Regulations and the EIA Regulations.
- 2.1.34. In undertaking the consultation process and preparing this Report, ABP has had regard to the following guidance, in accordance with section 50 of the 2008 Act:
 - DCLG (2015) Planning Act 2008: Guidance on the pre-application process ("the DCLG (2015) Guidance");
 - The DCLG (2015) Guidance explains at paragraph 24 that the Government 'recognises that major infrastructure projects and the communities and environment in which they are located will vary considerably' and, therefore, that a 'one-size-fits-all' approach to consultation is not appropriate. The aim of the applicant should be to ensure that the consultation undertaken 'is appropriate to the scale and nature of the Project and where its impacts will be experienced'. Paragraph 25 states that: 'Consultation should be thorough, effective and proportionate'.
 - DLUHC and MHCLG (2020): Guidance on procedural requirements for major infrastructure projects ("the 2020 Guidance");
 - Advice Note 14; and
 - PINS Advice Note Three: EIA Notification and Consultation ("Advice Note 3").
- 2.1.35. A compliance checklist has been included at Annex 1, which details compliance with the requirements of the 2008 Act, the EIA Regulations and the APFP Regulations and demonstrates how ABP has followed relevant advice and guidance published by the PINS and UK Government in undertaking consultation. Evidence of compliance with the statutory consultation requirements in the 2008 Act is included in the appendices to this Report and includes examples of correspondence issued, notices placed and supporting collateral and materials used throughout both the first and second Statutory Consultations.
- 2.1.36. This Report forms part of the Application. It demonstrates that ABP, as the Applicant, has undertaken the consultation on the Project in accordance with the 2008 Act, the EIA Regulations and the APFP Regulations.
- 2.1.37. This Report explains how ABP has carried out its pre-Application consultation in relation to the Project, how it has complied with the relevant statutory requirements





and guidance, and how it has considered, and taken into account, the relevant responses and comments received in developing the Project. It also explains the non-statutory engagement that has taken place outside the strict requirements of the 2008 Act (in accordance with Advice Note 14) in order to give the Secretary of State a complete understanding of all the consultation activity relevant to the Project.

- 2.1.38. Specifically, this Report and its appendices explains and demonstrates how ABP has complied with the pre-application consultation requirements which are prescribed in the 2008 Act as follows:
 - Section 42: duty to consult with prescribed consultees;
 - Section 46: duty to notify Secretary of State of the proposed application;
 - Section 47: duty to consult with the local community;
 - Section 48: duty to publicise the proposed application;
 - Section 49: duty to take into account responses to consultation and publicity;
 - Section 50: duty to have regard to any statutory guidance issued by the Secretary of State; and
 - Section 37: requirement to prepare a Consultation Report and take account of any relevant responses.

2.1.39. Accordingly, this Report provides:

- i. An overview, together with the specific details, of the consultation activities undertaken to comply with the requirements of the 2008 Act, relevant legislation and policies, guidance and advice published by Government and PINS in relation to:
 - a. engagement prior to the Statutory Consultation (See Chapter 6, Ongoing Engagement, and Chapter 7, Consultation under EIA Regulations);
 - the original Statutory Consultation undertaken between 9 January and 20 February 2023 - referred to as the "first Statutory Consultation" in this Report (See Chapter 4, First Statutory Consultation);
 - c. the additional Statutory Consultation undertaken between 24 May 2023 and 20 July 2023 - referred to as the "second Statutory Consultation" in this Report (see Chapter 5, Second Statutory Consultation: and
 - d. detailing ongoing engagement undertaken throughout the preapplication period up to submission of the Application (See Chapter 6, Ongoing Engagement);
- ii. A summary of the responses to the Scoping Opinion Request consultation (See Chapter 7, Consultation under EIA Regulations);





- iii. A summary of the feedback received to the Statutory Consultations (i.e., the first Statutory Consultation and the second Statutory Consultation) and an explanation of how it has been taken into account;
- iv. Details as to how the development and evolution of the Project has been influenced by the consultation responses, including how relevant responses to the consultation have been addressed whilst also detailing the changes that have been made to the Project in response to the feedback received; and
- v. Details of the additional non-statutory engagement which has taken place outside the requirements of the 2008 Act so as to provide an understanding of all the relevant consultation and engagement activity which has taken place for the Project.

Overview of consultation activities undertaken

- 2.1.40. ABP has undertaken a comprehensive pre-Application consultation and engagement programme spanning from July/August 2022 to the date of submission.
- 2.1.41. In accordance with section 47 of the 2008 Act, ABP prepared a SoCC ahead of launching the first Statutory Consultation. Details on the consultation process and publication of the SoCC can be found in Chapter 3 and a copy of the SoCC prepared ahead of the first Statutory Consultation (the "first SoCC") is attached at A.4.
- 2.1.42. The proposed consultation for the Project set out in the first SoCC envisaged a single round of Statutory Consultation ahead of submitting the Application. However following feedback from the first Statutory Consultation, and progression of work on the design of the proposals, it was determined that a second Statutory Consultation would be necessary to update stakeholders on changes to the Project in advance of submission of the Application. As a result, a second SoCC was prepared and consulted on (the "second SoCC"). The second SoCC applied to the second and any potential subsequent Statutory Consultation that ABP chose to carry out ahead of submission, as outlined in Chapter 3. A copy of the second SoCC is attached at B.4.
- 2.1.43. As part of both the process of Statutory Consultations and ongoing engagement, ABP (and Air Products where appropriate) engaged in discussions on the Project prior to the submission of the Application to the Secretary of State with the following consultees in accordance with the 2008 Act:
 - Prescribed bodies in accordance with section 42(1)(a);
 - The Marine Management Organisation ("MMO") in accordance with section 42(1)(aa);
 - Relevant local authorities in accordance with section 42(1)(b) and as set out in Section 43;
 - Persons with an interest in the land in accordance with section 42(1)(d) and as set out in Section 44;





- The local community and organisations in the "vicinity" of the Project who may be affected both directly and indirectly by it in accordance with Section 47; and
- Wider communities and organisations (local, regional and national) in order to seek their comments on the development proposals for the Project in accordance with Sections 47 and 48.
- 2.1.44. The timeline at **Table 2** shows a summary of all consultation and engagement activity from Project Launch to submission of the Application.
- 2.1.45. At the Project Launch phase, the following materials were created and distributed, and activities carried out:
 - Letters to residents and businesses on and around the proposed Site Boundary (Appendix M.1)
 - Information leaflet providing a high-level overview of the upcoming Project (Appendix M.2)
 - Project website hosting high-level overview of the Project and contact information including email address, phone number, and contact form (Appendix M.3)
 - Meetings and conversations with local residents and businesses most likely to be impacted by the Project (Tables 28-30)
- 2.1.46. In addition, a range of informal engagement activities outside of the Statutory Consultation requirements were undertaken in the local community throughout the pre-Application period. These included:
 - Early engagement with local stakeholders during the Project Launch period from 30 August 2022 8 January 2023, including:
 - Local Planning Authority (i.e., NELC)
 - Local Parish and Town Councils
 - Local Ward Councillors representing residents across the Site
 - Residents within or near to the proposed Site Boundary at the time of Project Launch
 - Businesses within or near to the proposed Site Boundary at the time of Project Launch
 - Businesses impacted by Site investigation works beginning during the Project Launch period.
 - Ongoing engagement with stakeholders throughout the period from Project Launch to the submission of the Application, including with political, residential, business stakeholders, alongside prescribed and non-prescribed consultees as listed in Chapter 6 of this Report.
- 2.1.47. At the first Statutory Consultation, in accordance with the first SoCC the following materials were created and distributed:
 - Information brochures providing an overview of the consultation materials (Appendix H.5)





- Posting of notices and advertisements in newspapers and journals, as well as in the local community (Appendix C.1 & C.2)
- Display materials for use at public exhibitions, outlining the proposals for the public (Appendix H.6)
- A fly-through video showing an artist's impression of the proposals
- A Project website, hosting all relevant information throughout the Statutory Consultation periods (Appendix H.10)
- A virtual consultation room accessed via a link on the Project website, providing an online version of the in-person consultation experience (Appendix H.11)
- Feedback forms, available both online and physically at in-person event (Appendix H.7)
- In-person drop-in sessions open to the local community and advertised to around 5,000 homes in the vicinity of the Project, held at the Immingham Civic Centre near the Site
- The deposit of the Preliminary Environmental Information Report ("PEIR") (Appendix G.1), the PEIR Non-Technical Summary (Appendix G.2) and the first SoCC (Appendix A.4) in public locations for members of the community to access outside of drop-in sessions
- Press releases to the media
- Offer of webinars and an open phone line for telephone surgeries
- Discussions with statutory consultees to follow up on key gueries or concerns.
- 2.1.48. At the second Statutory Consultation, in accordance with the second SoCC, the following materials were created and distributed:
 - Information brochures providing an overview of the consultation materials highlighting the changes to the Project since the first Statutory Consultation (Appendix K.5)
 - Posting of notices and advertisements in newspapers and journals, as well as in the local community (Appendix D.2 & D.4)
 - Display materials for use at public exhibitions, outlining the proposed changes to the Project for the public (Appendix K.6)
 - A project website, hosting all relevant information throughout the Statutory Consultation periods (Appendix K.10)
 - Feedback forms, available both online and physically at in-person events (Appendix H.7)
 - In-person drop-in sessions open to the local community and advertised to around 5,000 homes in the area, held at the Immingham Civic Centre near the Site
 - The deposit of the PEIR Addendum Report ("PAR") (Appendix J.1) and the second SoCC (Appendix B.4) in public locations for members of the community to access outside of drop-in sessions





- Press releases to the media
- Offer of webinars and an open phone line for telephone surgeries
- Discussions with statutory consultees to follow up on key queries or concerns.

Taking feedback into account

- 2.1.49. As required by Section 49 of the 2008 Act, ABP considered and took into account all comments and feedback received in response to both rounds of Statutory Consultation. It also considered and took into account all comments and feedback received during ongoing engagement. Chapters 4, 5 and 6 of this Report discuss how those responses have been analysed, how ABP has responded and how they have been taken into account in the final design of the Project.
- 2.1.50. Please see the Response Tables in full at Appendix P and Q.

Consultation timeline

2.1.51. In accordance with the Advice Note 14, a timeline summarising both statutory consultation and ongoing engagement on this Project (in chronological order) is provided below at **Table 2**.





Figure 2.3: Consultation Timeline







2.1.52. It should be noted that the final dates for the second Statutory Consultation shown in the table above differ from those set out in the second SoCC at the time of consultation with the Local Planning Authority and neighbouring bodies. This is because dates included in the second SoCC were indicative, and the consultation period was extended after an administrative error required additional section 48 notices to be published in compliance with statutory timescales in Regulation 4 of the APFP Regulations. More information on this can be found in Chapters 3 and 5.





Chapter 3: Consultation Process

- 3.1.1. This chapter outlines ABP's approach to the Project consultation process, covering legislative context, relevant guidance, and compliance. The Report explains how the first and second Statutory Consultations have been carried out in compliance with the 2008 Act, and all ongoing engagement carried out supplementary to the requirements of the 2008 Act, Regulations 3 (prescribed consultees) and 4 (publicising a proposed application) of the APFP Regulations, as well as the EIA Regulations.
- 3.1.2. This chapter provides an overview of ABP's approach to the consultation on the Project and summarises the activities undertaken in the following order:
 - a) overview of statutory requirements for engagement and consultation on the Project;
 - b) summary of consultation and engagement undertaken, structured as follows:
 - Project Launch;
 - First Statutory Consultation;
 - Second Statutory Consultation;
 - Ongoing (non-statutory) engagement

General Overview of the Engagement and Consultation in accordance with the 2008 Act

- 3.1.3. The 2008 Act includes the following sections which are relevant to consultation in respect of the Project and must be complied with:
 - Section 42: 'Duty to Consult' which requires consultation with certain persons specified in the 2008 Act (s43 and s44) and prescribed in the APFP Regulations;
 - Section 46: 'Duty to notify Secretary of State of Proposed Application' providing the same information as required to be provided under section 42;
 - Section 47: 'Duty to consult Local Community' which requires applicants to prepare a SoCC which sets out how the applicant intends to consult the local community on the proposals in consultation with relevant local authorities. ABP undertook consultation with NELC as the responsible Local Planning Authority for the Project, as well as seeking comments from the neighbouring authorities, for SoCCs that supported the first and second Statutory Consultations separately. Under the 2008 Act, the applicant must publish the final SoCC and undertake its Statutory Consultation in accordance with it;
 - Section 48: 'Duty to Publicise' which requires that details of the Statutory Consultation are publicised via a series of notices in the local and national press; and
 - Section 49: 'Duty to take account of responses to consultation and publicity' which requires the applicant to have regard to any relevant responses received
 to the Statutory Consultation and publicity;





- Section 50: 'Duty to have regard to any statutory guidance issued by the Secretary of State';
- Relevant Guidance to the Regulatory Requirements is set out in Chapter 2 from 2.1.30.
- 3.1.4. The pre-application consultation for this Project was undertaken as follows:
 - Scoping Opinion Request Consultation this consultation was undertaken by PINS on behalf of the Secretary of State in accordance with regulation 10(6) of the EIA Regulations following the receipt of a Scoping Opinion request submitted by ABP on 30 August 2022. The consultation required PINS to consult with the 'Consultation Bodies' as prescribed by the APFP Regulations prior to adopting a Scoping Opinion. This stage is not discussed further in this chapter but is detailed in Chapter 7 of this Report.
 - Project Launch engagement activities, which took place outside of the first Statutory Consultation period from 30 August 2022 until the first Statutory Consultation began on 9 January 2023. Pre-Statutory Consultation activities and stakeholder engagement aimed to better inform the Statutory Consultation phase and consultation on the first SoCC.
 - First Statutory Consultation which was undertaken from 9 January to 23:59 on 20 February 2023 (total period of 42 days).
 - Second Statutory Consultation which was undertaken from 24 May 2023 to 23:59 on 20 July 2023 (total period of 57 days), and;
 - Ongoing engagement non-statutory engagement which took place with regulators and key stakeholders such as third parties with residential or commercial interests and was ongoing throughout the pre-Application process - from the Project Launch on 30 August 2022 through to submission of the Application.

Approach to consultation: general overview of engagement and consultation strategy

- 3.1.5. ABP has fully recognised the importance of effective engagement and consultation in developing the Project, as well as the need for discussions to continue throughout the Project's evolution. This approach has enabled those directly affected by the Project, or with an interest in the proposals, to identify and discuss matters with ABP throughout the development of the Project which ABP took into consideration.
- 3.1.6. In designing the consultation process and preparing this Report, ABP had regard to the DCLG (2015) Guidance and the 2020 Guidance in accordance with section 50 of the 2008 Act.
- 3.1.7. The strategy adopted ensured that local stakeholders were engaged with early and often, throughout the consultation process and ensured that all views have been listened to and taken into account before submitting the Application.

General approach to engagement and consultation

3.1.8. As outlined previously at **Figure 1.1**, the approach to engagement and consultation can be broken down into four key elements:





- 1. Project Launch 30 August 2022 8 January 2023
- 2. First Statutory Consultation 9 January 20 February 2023
- 3. Second Statutory Consultation 24 May 20 July 2023
- 4. Ongoing Engagement August 2022 Submission of Application
- 3.1.9. The approach and activities carried out in each of these phases are summarised below.

1: Project Launch: 30 August 2022 to 8 January 2023

- 3.1.10. ABP undertook early engagement with certain key stakeholders and published early information about the Project in the public domain so as to proactively engage those most impacted by the proposals prior to the first Statutory Consultation commencing.
- 3.1.11. This period coincided with PINS' consultation on the Scoping Opinion for the Environmental Impact Assessment ("EIA"). The Applicant shared the Scoping Opinion with PINS on 30 August 2022.
- 3.1.12. See Chapter 6 for full details of the Project Launch consultation conducted as part of Ongoing Engagement.

Approach to the SoCC

- 3.1.13. During the Project Launch, ABP drafted and consulted on the first SoCC for the Project. This process was repeated for the second Statutory Consultation, as outlined in **Table 3**.
- 3.1.14. A second SoCC for the second Statutory Consultation was prepared because the first SoCC only provided for a single round of Statutory Consultation on the Project. When it became apparent that a second round of Statutory Consultation was required, it was identified that it was necessary to update the SoCC to provide for the second Statutory Consultation and any subsequent rounds of statutory consultation on the Project.
- 3.1.15. Section 47 of the 2008 Act requires an applicant to consult the relevant local authorities (being each local authority that is within section 43(1) of the 2008 Act) about the scope of local community consultation activities to be undertaken, in the form of a draft SoCC, and to have regard to any comments made by the relevant local authority.
- 3.1.16. In addition to this, ABP engaged with local authorities prior to drafting the SoCC, to determine the scope of local community consultation activities that would be undertaken by ABP under section 47 of the 2008 Act. Correspondence with local authorities is summarised in Appendix A.3 for first Statutory Consultation and B3 for the second Statutory Consultation.
- 3.1.17. As a result of taking on board feedback, and evolution in the Project designs, ABP decided to go out for further consultation after the first Statutory Consultation. To enable this, the SoCC was updated and a second SoCC was consulted upon and published in accordance with section 47 of the 2008 Act, covering the second and any subsequent Statutory Consultations.





3.1.18. The process for consulting on the first SoCC is outlined further in Chapter 4 and the second SoCC consultation is outlined in Chapter 5.

2: First Statutory Consultation: 9 January 2023 to 20 February 2023

- 3.1.19. The Applicant undertook the first round of Statutory Consultation from 9 January 2023 to 20 February 2023 in accordance with the first SoCC.
- 3.1.20. This consultation focussed on the information provided in the PEIR (Appendix G.1) and included a range of consultation methods allowing consultees, stakeholders and interested parties to provide their feedback on the proposals.
- 3.1.21. Further information on the first Statutory Consultation is provided in Chapter 4.

3: Second Statutory Consultation: 24 May 2023 to 20 July 2023

- 3.1.22. Following analysis of the responses to the first Statutory Consultation and an evolution of the Project design, the Applicant undertook a second round of Statutory Consultation from 24 May 2023 to 20 July 2023 in accordance with the updated second SoCC.
- 3.1.23. This consultation focussed on the information provided in the PAR and included a range of consultation methods allowing consultees, stakeholders and interested parties to provide their feedback on the proposals.
- 3.1.24. Further information on the second Statutory Consultation is provided in Chapter 5.

Ongoing engagement: 30 August 2022 – Submission of DCO

- 3.1.25. In addition to the two rounds of Statutory Consultation, the Applicant has continued to engage with consultees, stakeholders and interested parties throughout the presubmission period, including both during and outside of the defined Statutory Consultation periods.
- 3.1.26. Further information on Ongoing Engagement is provided in Chapter 6.

Other Consultation

Hazardous Substances Consent

- 3.1.27. Alongside the Application for the DCO, Air Products as the first customer to use the proposed new Terminal, has submitted an entirely separate application for a Hazardous Substances Consent to NELC in connection with the hydrogen production facility.
- 3.1.28. Further information on this activity is included at 6.6.1.15

Immingham Eastern Roll-on Roll-off Terminal (IERRT)

3.1.29. In January 2022, ABP carried out Statutory Consultation in relation to the Immingham Eastern Ro-Ro Terminal ("IERRT"). On 28 October 2022, the IERRT project embarked upon supplementary Statutory Consultation to address feedback on the IERRT application. This consultation closed on 27 November 2022.





- 3.1.30. Whilst this consultation was led by ABP, the IERRT is a separate project unrelated to the IGET project and the IGET team has and will continue to make this clear in all materials and correspondence with stakeholders and the public.
- 3.1.31. The IERRT application has now been accepted for examination by the PINS and is currently in the examination period.

Section 47: local community consultees - for first and second Statutory Consultation

- 3.1.32. Section 47 of the 2008 Act sets out an applicant's duty to consult the local community about a proposed application. Section 47 specifically requires the preparation of 'a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, those people living in the vicinity of the land' ABP complied with this obligation by preparing, agreeing and publishing the first SoCC for the first Statutory Consultation and then the second SoCC in respect of the second Statutory Consultation.
- 3.1.33. In developing the SoCC, regard must be had to the EIA Regulations. Regulation 12 of the EIA Regulations stipulates that the SoCC must set out whether the proposal is EIA development and, if so, how the applicant intends to publicise and consult on Preliminary Environmental Information. The first and second SoCC contained information confirming that the Project was an EIA development, and provided details about how the Preliminary Environmental Information for the Project would be made accessible in the PEIR (Appendix G.1).
- 3.1.34. Chapter 3 above provides details of the production of the first and second SoCC for the Project and the identification of the consultation zone which was used for the section 47 consultation, which was agreed with the relevant local authority, NELC.
- 3.1.35. A plan showing the consultation zone for the Project was included in the first and second SoCC (as 'Figure 3: Map showing mail-out area' on page 8 of the first SoCC) an extract of which is provided in Chapter 4 at Figure 4.2. (A copy of the first SoCC is provided at Appendix A4).





Chapter 4: First Statutory Consultation

- 4.1.1. This chapter outlines all activities undertaken for the first Statutory Consultation, which took place from Monday 9 January to Monday 20 February 2023.
- 4.1.2. The principal purpose of the first Statutory Consultation was to seek the views of statutory consultees, the local community and other interested groups and individuals on the Project proposals which had been developed in accordance with the statutory requirements of sections 42 (duty to consult), 46 (duty to notify Secretary of State of proposed application), 47 (duty to consult local community) and 48 (duty to publicise) of the 2008 Act, Regulations 3 (prescribed consultees) and 4 (publicising a proposed application) of the APFP Regulations, as well as the EIA Regulations. The consultation also sought feedback on the PEIR (Appendix G.1), which had been compiled for the Project.

Consultation on the first SoCC

4.1.3. As outlined in Chapter 3, *Approach to SoCC*, ABP drafted and consulted on the first SoCC for the Project. The process for drafting and consulting on the first SoCC is summarised in **Table 3** below, followed in this chapter by further detail explaining how the process for consultation and conclusion of the first SoCC was carried out in accordance with section 47 of the 2008 Act. Copies of both the first and the second SoCC (Appendix A4 and B4) and notices (Appendix C.2, D.2 & D.4) are appended to this Report. The first SoCC should be referred to for detail of how the first Statutory Consultation undertaken.

4.1.4. Non-statutory engagement with local authorities as outlined in Table 2 in Chapter 2 was undertaken to determine the scope of local community consultation activities that would be undertaken by ABP under section 47 of the 2008 Act.





- 4.1.5. As noted in Chapter 3, section 47 of the 2008 Act requires an applicant to consult the relevant local authorities (being each local authority that is within section 43(1) of the 2008 Act which in this case is NELC) about the scope of local community consultation activities to be undertaken, in the form of a draft SoCC, and to have regard to any comments made by the relevant local authority.
- 4.1.6. In accordance with this requirement, the draft SoCC was prepared and formally issued on behalf of ABP to NELC on Monday 5 September 2022, with a request for any comments to be provided within 28 days from Tuesday 6 September 2022, ending at 11:59pm on Monday 3 October 2022, in order to inform the proposed approach to be taken for Statutory Consultation with the local community under section 47 of the 2008 Act, which related to the first Statutory Consultation. It should be noted that in compliance with section 47(3) of the 2008 Act, the Council was, therefore, given a period of 28 days beginning with the day after the day on which they received the consultation documents to provide comments on the draft SoCC. A copy of this first SoCC can be found in Appendix A.4.
- 4.1.7. For completeness, for the preparation of both SoCCs, ABP also wrote to the following neighbouring local authorities in the vicinity of the Project on the same day that each SoCC was shared, providing a copy of the draft SoCC and requesting they consider ABP's consultation proposals and provide comments if they so wished within the same consultation period:
 - North Lincolnshire Council;
 - Lincolnshire County Council;
 - West Lindsey District Council;
 - East Lindsey District Council;
 - East Riding of Yorkshire Council; and
 - (Kingston Upon) Hull City Council.
- 4.1.8. Copies of the letters sending each draft SoCC are provided at Appendix A.1.
- 4.1.9. On Monday 26 September 2022 for the first SoCC, emails were sent to the local authorities to provide a general reminder that the deadline for comments on the draft first SoCC was approaching at 11:59pm on Monday 3 October. An example of the reminder email is provided at Appendix A.3.
- 4.1.10. Following the SoCC consultation, the only substantive feedback received on the draft SoCC was from NELC, the relevant local authority under section 43(1) of the 2008 Act. In accordance with section 47(5) of the 2008 Act, the Applicant had regard to the feedback that was provided, adopting all of the recommendations made and using it to finalise the SoCC for the purposes of section 47 of the 2008 Act. ABP clarified with NELC the extent of the consultation area for the mail drop, which it had requested be enlarged by providing a scale plan identifying the extra consultation area requested by the authority (see email correspondence provided at Appendix A.3). That plan was subsequently incorporated within the final copy of the SoCC.
- 4.1.11. Feedback from local authorities is summarised in **Table 4** below.

Publication of the first SoCC

- 4.1.12. Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act provides that, once the SoCC has been finalised, the applicant must make it available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land and must publish a notice ("section 47 notice") in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land which states where and when the SoCC can be inspected.
- 4.1.13. Section 48(1) of the 2008 Act also requires that a notice publicising the Project ("section 48 notice") be published in accordance with Regulation 4(2) and with reference to Regulation 4(3) of the APFP Regulations.
- 4.1.14. To publicise the first SoCC, the section 47 notice was drafted and combined with the section 48 notice publicising the proposed Application and the first Statutory Consultation. This combined notice was published in the local press circulating in the vicinity of the Project site on Monday 9 January 2023, in the Grimsby Telegraph. A copy of the notice, as published, in the Grimsby Telegraph is provided at Appendix C.2.
- 4.1.15. As the section 47 and section 48 notices were combined, the section 47 notice publicising the SoCC was also published in the following publications during the first Statutory Consultation:
 - a) First Statutory Consultation
 - Fishing News, page 25 on Thursday 12 January 2023
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 37 on Monday 9 January 2023
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 39 on Wednesday 15 February 2023
 - Lincolnite, online on Monday 9 January 2023
 - Lloyd's List, page 8 on Monday 9 January 2023
 - London Gazette, page 302 on Monday 9 January 2023
 - The Times, legal notices on Monday 9 January 2023
- 4.1.16. The above notices can be viewed in Appendix C.2.
- 4.1.17. The section 47 notice, as published, provided that the first SoCC would be available to view and download free of charge from the dedicated consultation page of the Project website, as follows: 'The PEIR, the SoCC and other related consultation documents including plans and maps will be available to view and download online from 9 January 2023 to 20 February 2023 at: www.imminghamget.co.uk/documents/
 - This statement was included in both section 47 notices, with the dates amended to reflect each respective Statutory Consultation period.
- 4.1.18. Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act requires that at the pre-application stage the SoCC must be made available for inspection by the public and be published in such manner as may be prescribed. The 2020 Guidance provides that: 'This requirement can be met by making documents available for inspection online. Applicants should take reasonable steps to ensure that anyone wishing to view





- the documentation can find these documents on their website. Hard copies should be made available by the applicant on request.'
- 4.1.19. In accordance with this guidance, the first SoCC was published by ABP on the dedicated Project website on Monday 9 January 2023, from which it could be viewed and downloaded for free.
- 4.1.20. As with all of the consultation materials, ABP offered to provide printed copies of the SoCC upon request free of change. This was specifically stated in the SoCC (Appendix A.4) in Table 3.1: Consultation Activities, which provided that: "If there is a request for a private copy of the above documents, the Project team can fulfil this. However, please note there will be a fee of up to £300 to cover the costs of printing, depending on the documents requested." This statement was provided in both the first and the second SoCC.
- 4.1.21. In addition, the SoCC also provided that USB flash drives containing the consultation documents would be made available upon request, free of charge, for those who do not have access to the internet but who have a computer. This also applied to copies of the SoCC. This statement was included in both the first and the second SoCC.
- 4.1.22. Additionally, the first and second SoCCs also provided that physical copies of the document would be available for public inspection at two locations in the Project area. Hard copies of the first SoCC were printed and displayed at the locations below during the following dates:
 - a. Monday 9 January to Tuesday 23 May
 - Immingham Civic Centre, Pelham Rd, Immingham DN40 1QF
 - NELC Offices: Municipal Offices, Town Hall Sq., Grimsby DN31 1HU.
- 4.1.23. The first SoCC remained on display beyond the first Statutory Consultation period to allow those who were newly identified Land Interest consultees the opportunity to view a physical copy of the SoCC before sharing any comments. This meant that there was a period from 24 May 2023, when both the first and second SoCCs were both available to be viewed in hard copy at the above locations. More information on the second SoCC is provided from 5.1.4.
- 4.1.24. Section 47(7) of the 2008 Act provides that the applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in their SoCC. ABP undertook the first Statutory Consultation in compliance with the principles set out in the agreed first SoCC.
- 4.1.25. A SoCC compliance summary is provided at Appendix B.5, which demonstrates how ABP complied with the consultation proposals set out in the first and second SoCC. The first and second SoCC are to be read together and together form the SoCC covering all the Statutory Consultation which has been undertaken on the Project.

Identifying consultees

4.1.26. When undertaking both the first and second Statutory Consultations, ABP consulted the following groups and individuals in accordance with the requirements of the 2008 Act. This included the publicity requirements under section 48, regulation 13 of the EIA Regulations and regulations 3 and 4 of the





APFP Regulations to publish a notice of the proposed Application. The following parties were consulted:

Section 42 – Consultees:

- a. section 42(1)(a) Prescribed consultees including statutory undertakers, those listed in Schedule 1 of the APFP Regulations, relevant local authorities;
- b. section 42(1)(aa) the MMO as the Project would affect waters in England;
- c. section 42(1)(b) Local authorities the relevant local authorities that were within section 43 of the 2008 Act; and
- d. section 42(1)(d) Land interests the Applicant must consult each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in Section 44 ("Land Interest Consultees"). This includes persons within one or more categories in section 44 of the 2008 Act persons identified where the applicant, after making diligent inquiry, knows that the person is an owner, lessee, tenant (whatever the tenancy period) or occupier of the land within the order limits ("Category 1" (section 44(1)), or is interested in the land or has power to sell and convey the land or to release the land within the order limits ("Category 2" (section 44(2)), or parties whom ABP thinks would or might, if the Order sought by the applicant were made and fully implemented, be entitled to make a relevant claim for compensation under section 10 of the Compulsory Purchase Act 1965 and/or Part 1 of the Land Compensation Act 1973 and/or section 152(3) of the 2008 Act ("Category 3") (section 44(4)).

Section 47 – Consultees:

a. Local community consultees, including the people living in the vicinity of the Project, local businesses, and community representatives, in accordance with the SoCC; (See Figure 4.2 for consultation zone) and;

Section 48 - Publicity

a. ABP published a notice of the proposed Application and publicised the Project in accordance with section 48 of the PA 2008, regulation 13 of the EIA Regulations and regulations 3 and 4 of the APFP Regulations.

S42(1)(a)-(b) Prescribed Consultees – for first Statutory Consultation

4.1.27. The prescribed consultees under section 42(1)(a) were identified using Schedule 1 of the APFP Regulations, as well as incorporating the consultation bodies who were consulted by PINS on the EIA Scoping Report for the Project which were identified in accordance with Regulation 11 of the EIA Regulations and were required to be consulted under Regulation 13. In addition, ABP also included all of the relevant statutory undertakers identified in the Scoping Opinion adopted by PINS on behalf of the Secretary of State, as listed in the Regulation 11(1)(a) list (the "Regulation 11 List"). A copy of the original Regulation 11 List is provided at Appendix E.1.





MMO

4.1.28. The MMO was identified as a consultee for the purposes of the Project under section 42(1)(aa) as the Project would affect waters in England. A copy of the notice served under section 42 is provided at Appendix H.1.

Local authorities

- 4.1.29. Section 42(1)(b) of the 2008 Act requires the applicant to consult each local authority that is within section 43. The relevant local authorities under section 42(1)(b) were identified by application of section 43 of the 2008 Act for the purposes of the Project.
- 4.1.30. The Project site lies within the administrative area of NELC, making this a "B" authority (as defined in and for the purposes of section 43 of the 2008 Act). As NELC is a unitary authority there is no upper-tier county council (i.e., a "C" authority as defined in and for the purposes of section 43 of the 2008 Act).




Figure 4.1: Map of relevant local authorities

- 4.1.31. The following local authorities, as outlined in **Figure 4.1** below, share a boundary with NELC and were, therefore, identified as "A" authorities as defined in and for the purposes of section 43 of the 2008 Act:
 - North Lincolnshire Council
 - West Lindsey District Authority

S42(1)(d) consultees (land interests) - for the first Statutory Consultation

- 4.1.36. Additional statutory undertakers with the potential to hold an interest in land within the Project site were also identified as section 42(1)(d) land interests.
- 4.1.37. Section 42(1)(d) of the 2008 Act states that the applicant must consult each person who is within one or more of Category 1, Category 2 or Category 3 as set out in Section 44 (see paragraph 4.1.26 (d)).
- 4.1.38. Accordingly, ABP carried out diligent inquiry to identify any persons falling within these categories affected by the Project and included them in the Statutory Consultation. The persons so identified are listed in the Book of Reference [TR030008/APP/3.1]. In accordance with section 42 of the 2008 Act, persons with an interest in the land within the Order limits (i.e., the proposed Site Boundary) under section 44 of the 2008 Act, were identified through diligent inquiry, undertaken on behalf of ABP, and involved identifying any Category 1, 2 or 3 persons as described at 4.1.26 (d).
- 4.1.39. The approach taken to identifying any Category 1, 2 and 3 interests (i.e., the diligent inquiry process undertaken) is included in more detail in section 7 of the Statement of Reasons but included the following methods outlined below:
- 4.1.40. Title information: Land Registry data was used to create land ownership parcels and obtain title information. All land within the identified limits was parcelled and each parcel was given a unique reference number. The Land Registry titles were interrogated, and all information recorded against the relevant parcels. Land Registry data was also refreshed at regular intervals to identify new interests. Where new interests were found, land interest questionnaires were issued, and the process outlined below was followed to verify their details. This was also supplemented by desktop referencing and the use of publicly available information. Details for registered companies were checked through the use of company registers such as Companies House.
- 4.1.41. Land Interest Questionnaires: Title information was verified using 'land interest questionnaires.' These were issued to all land interests within the Order limits and asked landowners to confirm the information taken from the Land Registry and to obtain any additional information from those not identified through the Land Registry. Where land interest questionnaires were not returned, direct contact was sought with the owner or occupier of the property, this included phone calls and emails.
- 4.1.42. **Environmental Impact Assessment information**: As part of the preparation of the PEIR, ABP's environmental specialists were assisting in identifying receptors potentially impacted by the Project with a view to whether there are any 'Category 3' persons who might have a 'relevant claim' as defined by section





- 44(6) of the 2008 Act relating to matters such as noise and vibration. These findings were then reviewed as further assessments and information became available as the Project progressed.
- 4.1.43. **Utilities searches**: Utility searches Linesearch and Digdat were carried out to confirm any utility interests within the Order limits. Those companies flagged as potentially holding an interest in the Order limits were then contacted by both email and phone to confirm.
- 4.1.44. The combination of the above land referencing activities undertaken for the diligent inquiry process identified a list of section 44 persons to be consulted under section 42(1)(d) for the first Statutory Consultation. It was later reviewed and amended as appropriate for the purposes of the second Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.45. Utility providers and other similar bodies having or possibly having a right to keep equipment on, in or over the land within the Order limits, were also identified. Such parties that were believed to have a possible interest in the Order limits were included in the list of persons to be consulted under section 42(1)(d) for the Statutory Consultation. The interest held by each utility provider and other similar bodies whose services may be affected by the Project are also identified in the Book of Reference [TR030008/APP/3.1].
- 4.1.46. At the first Statutory Consultation, 108 land interest consultees were identified. After a change to the proposed Site Boundary, a further 31 land interest consultees were identified and consulted on at the second Statutory Consultation. A full list of prescribed consultees identified in accordance with section 42(1)(d) (land interests) for the first and second Statutory Consultations is provided in the Book of Reference [TR030008/APP/3.1].

Section 47: local community consultees

- 4.1.47. Section 47 of the 2008 Act sets out an applicant's duty to consult the local community about a proposed application. Section 47 specifically requires the preparation of 'a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, those people living in the vicinity of the land' ABP complied with this obligation by preparing, agreeing and publishing the first SoCC for the first Statutory Consultation and then the second SoCC in respect of the second Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.48. In developing the SoCC, regard must be had to the EIA Regulations. Regulation 12 of those EIA Regulations stipulates that the SoCC must set out whether the proposal is EIA development and, if so, how the applicant intends to publicise and consult on Preliminary Environmental Information. The first and second SoCC contained information confirming that the Project was an EIA development, and provided details about how the Preliminary Environmental Information for the Project would be made accessible in the PEIR.
- 4.1.49. Chapter 3 above provides details of the production of the first and second SoCC for the Project and the identification of the consultation zone which was used for the section 47 consultation, which was agreed with the relevant local authority, NELC.





4.1.50. A plan showing the consultation zone for the Project was included in the first and second SoCC (as 'Figure 3: Map showing mail-out area' on page 8 of the first SoCC) – an extract of which is provided below at **Figure 4.2**. A copy of the first SoCC is provided at Appendix A.4.

- 4.1.51. The consultation zone identified was the basis for the distribution of consultation materials during both the first and second Statutory Consultation in accordance with the requirements of the Advice Note 14.
- 4.1.52. For the first Statutory Consultation, a mail out was undertaken to all residences and businesses within the consultation zone, providing information about the consultation and consultation activities.
- 4.1.53. In addition to notifying those 'people living in the vicinity of the land', ABP also sought feedback on the proposals from all business/operators located within the Port and from local businesses located within the consultation zone.
- 4.1.54. In order to identify the addresses to be used for the mail out to the consultation zone for the Project, the following was undertaken:
 - ABP updated the targeted list from the Project Launch phase to match early changes to the proposed Site Boundary.
 - ABP compiled a list of addresses for all known businesses/operators (tenants, licences and occupiers) within the statutory Port estate.
 - For land outside the statutory Port estate, ABP used software to produce the list of addresses and a search of the Index Map held by the Land Registry was





undertaken, and relevant title documents (Official Copy Registers) were obtained and reviewed in order to identify all relevant titles and addresses. In addition, where relevant, manual searches of the Land Registry's Free Map Search tool were undertaken to check information and to ensure all addresses within the consultation zone were captured.

- 4.1.55. Parish Councils and Immingham Town Council were consulted in addition to residents and businesses within the consultation zone (**Figure 4.2**).
- 4.1.56. ABP also sought feedback on the proposals from members of the general public within the consultation radius through both the notices published in the local media and via a mail out, both providing information on the Project and detailing how members of the public could get further information and provide their feedback. Further information is provided at 4.1.92.
- 4.1.57. No hard-to-reach groups to which the Project might be of relevance were identified in consultation with the local authorities when consulting with them on the draft SoCC for the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.58. The Applicant was also guided by the local authorities on which, if any, vulnerable groups in the area should be included in the consultation. The Applicant asked in the SoCC for any groups that may have protected characteristics (for example, religion, ethnicity, or disability) be identified, and would adapt engagement activities to ensure they are inclusive for the specific characteristics of the group(s). No specific groups were identified in consultation on the SoCC.
- 4.1.59. There were a number of instances where correspondence issued within the mail out area was returned by Royal Mail. The objective on receipt of the undelivered correspondence was to ascertain the correct address or reissue them to the occupier of the address where it would be physically possible for them to receive the correspondence.
- 4.1.60. The Applicant re-issued correspondence, where it was able to ascertain alternative addresses or named occupiers. A number of the re-issued correspondence was returned to the Applicant by Royal Mail. These were all logged, and no further action was taken.

Who was consulted

- 4.1.61. A full list of the prescribed consultees is provided in Table 5, indicating how the consultation bodies were identified (i.e., under the Regulation 11 List, by virtue of section 42(1)(a) of the 2008 Act and Regulation 3 and Schedule 1 of the APFP Regulations or as an addition made to the list by ABP for completeness.) It should be noted that this list of the prescribed consultees has been used by ABP in undertaking both the first and second Statutory Consultations.
- 4.1.62. In addition to the prescribed consultees outlined above, 108 land interest consultees were identified and consulted on at the first Statutory Consultation. A full list of prescribed consultees identified in accordance with section 42(1)(d) (land interests) is provided in the Book of Reference [TR030008/APP/3.1].

There was some overlap with prescribed consultees and land interest consultees. The following prescribed consultees also fell into the land interest consultee category:

- 4.1.63. The Statutory Consultation was designed to fulfil the requirements for consultation on a DCO application under Sections 42 and 47 of the 2008 Act. In doing so, it:
 - Involved local authorities, communities and statutory consultees early in the Application process to bring about benefits for all parties;
 - Raised awareness and built understanding of the proposals among people living in the vicinity, or those potentially impacted by wider effects;
 - Allowed people potentially affected by the proposals to provide feedback as the Projects developed, so that their views could influence the decision-making process and the final Application;
 - Communicated with those being consulted to help them understand what could be influenced and why;
 - Communicated proportionately to the scale of the proposal;
 - Clearly communicated to those affected by the proposal as to how their comments have shaped the proposal;
 - Built lasting, positive relationships with key local stakeholders to allow open discussions around the proposals.
- 4.1.64. It was important to the Applicant that the consultation undertaken for the Project met the above objectives. As such, the Applicant was guided by five key principles, namely:
 - Openness and transparency making information available to stakeholders and the local community openly and with transparency.
 - Providing opportunities to get involved co-ordinating inclusive and accessible engagement and consultation events and providing feedback mechanisms to ensure that stakeholders and the public can be fully involved if they so wish.





- Sharing information and understanding providing up to date information about the Project as it develops via a range of channels, helping the public and stakeholders to better understand what is being proposed.
- **Listening and responding** being open to suggestions about how the Project could be improved and appropriate mitigation whilst also providing timely feedback to stakeholders and the public.
- **Respect** ensuring that everyone is treated with respect throughout the process.

Consultation dates

4.1.65. For the first Statutory Consultation, a period of over 28 days was provided to all section 42 consultees, commencing on Monday 9 January 2023 and ending at 23:59pm on 20 February 2023. The consultation period ran for a total of 42 days.

Providing feedback and deadline for comments

- 4.1.66. Respondents were asked to provide all feedback and comments by 23:59 on Monday 20 February 2023. However, ABP continued to accept responses from consultees and members of the wider community beyond the first Statutory Consultation end date.
- 4.1.67. Unless specified below, all consultation responses were required to be made in writing by:
 - Visiting a drop-in session and filling out a feedback questionnaire on the day;
 - Downloading and completing the online feedback questionnaire;
 - Emailing a copy of the questionnaire to the Applicant at enquiries@imminghamget.co.uk;
 - Downloading the feedback questionnaire and posting it to the Applicant at IGET, PO Box 76780, LONDON, WC1A 9SJ; or
 - Requesting a hard copy of the feedback questionnaire or picking one up at a drop-in session with a pre-paid stamped addressed envelope and returning the completed copy to the Applicant via post.
 - Alternatively, respondents could:
 - i. Email the Applicant at enquiries@imminghamget.co.uk
 - Write to the Applicant at the following address PO Box 76780, LONDON, WC1A 9SJ (Quoting Reference: Immingham Green Energy Terminal – a pre-paid stamped addressed envelope was provided on request free of charge)
- 4.1.68. The range of methods for people to submit feedback listed above allowed for an inclusive and far-reaching consultation, accessible to those who wanted to submit feedback either in-person or virtually.
- 4.1.69. Consultees could contact the Project team about requesting hard copies of the consultation documents, booking free of charge telephone surgery appointments, and for general enquiries via email or freephone throughout the first Statutory Consultation period.





4.1.70. Comments via social media were not counted as formal responses to the consultation process and not taken into account.

Sending letters and emails publicising the consultation

4.1.71. Letters and emails were drafted to accompany a brochure and feedback form for the first Statutory Consultation. These were tailored to each stakeholder group and are outlined below.

Sending letters and emails to prescribed consultees

- 4.1.72. Under regulation 13 of the EIA Regulations, the applicant is required to send a copy of the section 48 notice to the consultation bodies and any person notified to the applicant in accordance with regulation 11(1)(b). The consultation bodies are defined in the EIA Regulations to include consultees prescribed under sections 42(1)(a) and 43 of the 2008 Act. The letters to section 42(1)(a) (prescribed consultees) and section 42(1)(b) (relevant local authorities) consultees therefore explained that they were prescribed consultees under the 2008 Act and also the EIA Regulations and enclosed the section 48 notice as well as the other section 42 consultation material. An example of the letter sent to the section 42(1)(a)-(b) consultees, enclosing the section 48 notice, is provided at Appendix H.1.
- 4.1.73. The letters provided an overview of the Project, explained that it was an EIA development and how consultees could respond to the Statutory Consultation. The letters also explained that the PEIR, its non-technical summary and the SoCC could all be accessed online to view and download free of charge on ABP's dedicated Project consultation website, from the start of the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.74. The letters also provided details of the consultation events that were to take place, the deposit locations where documents could be viewed online, information on how to request a USB free of charge containing the documents or paper copies of the materials (subject to a responsible copying charge for certain documents, up to a maximum cost of £300).
- 4.1.75. The letters confirmed that the Statutory Consultation would take place between 9 January and 23:59 pm on 20 February 2023, and invited consultees to provide comments in writing on the Project proposals and/or submit feedback before the close of consultation at 23:59pm on 20 February 2023. Where possible comments received after that date have nevertheless been taken into account despite being received after the deadline.
- 4.1.76. ABP sent hard copies of letters to all prescribed consultees, MMO and local authorities via courier on Monday 9 January 2023. A courier service was used as strike action from Royal Mail throughout late December, combined with possible delays from the Christmas period, led ABP to take the decision to courier letters to prescribed consultees to ensure they were received on time for the start of the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.77. Where possible, ABP also sent copies of the letters and associated documents via email. Emails were sent from Monday 9 January to Wednesday 11 January 2023, and also provided links to the consultation website.





- 4.1.78. Included with all letters to the section 42 prescribed consultees, MMO and local authorities whether sent in hard copy by post, or electronically by email were copies of the consultation materials comprising the following enclosures:
 - a. Letter introducing the Project, as described above (Appendix H.1);
 - b. Combined section 47 and 48 notice; (Appendix C.1);
 - c. Brochure, as described below; (Appendix H.5); and
 - d. Feedback form, as described below. (Appendix H.7)
- 4.1.79. An example of the section 42 notice letter sent by email to the parties falling under section 42(1)(a) (prescribed consultees), 42(1)(aa) (MMO) and 42(1)(b) (relevant local authorities) are provided at Appendix H.1.

Sending letters to land interest consultees

- 4.1.80. The Section 42 Land Interest Consultees listed in the Book of Reference were notified of the first Statutory Consultation by letter, which was couriered to the consultees identified above to avoid complications from a Royal Mail strike taking place in early January 2023.
- 4.1.81. The letter provided an overview of the Project, explained that it was an EIA development and how consultees could respond to the consultation. The letters also explained that the PEIR, its non-technical summary and the SoCC could all be accessed online to view and download free of charge on ABP's dedicated Project consultation website, from the start of the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.82. The letters explained that ABP had identified the recipient as a Land Interest consultee under section 42 (1)(d) of the 2008 Act, and accordingly they were being consulted with on the Project.
- 4.1.83. The letters also provided details of the consultation events that were to take place, the deposit locations where documents could be viewed in person and online, information on how to request a USB free of charge containing the documents or paper copies of the materials (subject to a responsible copying charge for certain documents, up to a maximum cost of £300).
- 4.1.84. The letters confirmed that the first Statutory Consultation would take place between 9 January and 23:59 pm on 20 February 2023, and invited consultees to provide comments or feedback in writing on the Project proposals and/or submit feedback before the close of the first Statutory at 23:59pm on 20 February 2023, after which comments may not be considered.
- 4.1.85. On Monday 9 January 2023, each prescribed consultee received the following materials in their parcel:
 - a. Letter introducing the Project, consultation, and describing status at prescribed consultee in the consultation process
 - b. Physical copy of feedback form
 - c. Copy of combined section 47 and section 48 notice
 - d. Copy of consultation brochure, describing the Project and how consultees can comment on the proposals
 - e. Copy of map indicating proposed Site Boundary of the Project





- f. Copy of map(s) indicating the stakeholder's land interest(s) in the area
- 4.1.86. A copy of the section 42 notice letter sent by post to the section 42(1)(d) (land interests) is provided at Appendix H.1.

Unregistered Land Consultees

- 4.1.87. In addition, on 9 January 2023, ABP put on display unregistered land posters within the locality of the Project site, in relation to unregistered land in respect of which it had, at the time, not yet been able to ascertain the ownership.
- 4.1.88. A copy of the unregistered land poster and evidence of the unregistered land posters on display is provided at Appendix H.4.

Section 46: Duty to notify Secretary of State

- 4.1.89. Aligned with formal statutory consultation under section 42 is the requirement to notify the Secretary of State under section 46 of the 2008 Act. Section 46(2) of the 2008 Act requires this to be undertaken on or before the commencement of the statutory consultation under section 42 and the applicant must provide the same information as is proposed to be used for the section 42 consultation.
- 4.1.90. On Friday 6 January 2023, ABP's consultants AECOM wrote to PINS (in their role on behalf of the Secretary of State) to provide formal notification of the commencement of the Statutory Consultation for the Project, which was to commence the following working day, on Monday 9 January 2023. In accordance with section 46(1) of the 2008 Act, enclosed with this letter were copies of the information that was provided to consultees identified under section 42 of the 2008 Act. A copy of the letter sending it (sent by email on Friday 6 January 2023) is provided at Appendix I.1.
- 4.1.91. The acknowledgement letter received from PINS (on behalf of the Secretary of State) in response, dated Monday 9 January 2023, is included in Appendix I.2.

Sending letters, brochure, and feedback forms to the local community

- 4.1.92. In order to notify the local community of the Statutory Consultation, ABP sent brochures to approximately 5,000 homes within the consultation radius see Figure 4.2. The contents of the brochure are described in more detail below. These brochures were sent via Royal Mail First Class and were delivered on Monday 9 January 2023 in line with the start of the first Statutory Consultation period.
- 4.1.93. The following week on Monday 16 January 2023, ABP sent a reminder letter to encourage people to come to the Statutory Consultation events in the coming weeks and enclosed a physical copy of the feedback form. These letters and feedback forms were sent via Royal Mail First Class.
- 4.1.94. A copy of the brochure (H.5), letter (H.1), and feedback form (H.7) can be found in Appendix H.

Publication of section 48 notices

4.1.95. A section 48 notice publicising the Project was published in the prescribed manner, namely in accordance with Regulation 4(2) and with reference to Regulation 4(3) of the APFP Regulations.





- 4.1.96. The requirement for publication of the section 48 notice for this Project was for it to appear for at least two successive weeks in one or more local newspapers circulating in the vicinity of the Project site, and once in each of the following (i) a national newspaper, (ii) the London Gazette, (iii) Lloyd's List and (iv) an appropriate fishing trade journal.
- 4.1.97. As the section 48 notice was combined with the section 47 notice, it was therefore published in the same newspapers, on the same dates in the following publications:
 - Fishing News, page 25 on Thursday 12 January 2023
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 37 on Monday 9 January 2023
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 39 on Wednesday 15 February 2023
 - Lincolnite, online on Monday 9 January 2023
 - Lloyd's List, page 8 on Monday 9 January 2023
 - London Gazette, page 302 on Monday 9 January 2023
 - The Times, legal notices on Monday 9 January 2023
- 4.1.98. In accordance with Regulation 13 of the EIA Regulations a copy of the combined section 47 and 48 notice was also sent to the consultation bodies. Further information is provided in Chapter 7 which discusses consultation under the EIA Regulations.

Collateral

4.1.99. ABP created a number of materials to share information about the Project, as described below.

Brochure

- 4.1.100. A short project brochure was shared with those who received the letters and was also published on the dedicated Project website. It introduced both ABP and Air Products, explained the key aims of the proposals, and shared information on high-level next steps for the Project.
- 4.1.101. The brochure included:
 - A map of the indicative Site Boundary for the Project
 - An introduction to the Project
 - An overview of the proposals
 - Information on:
 - EIA
 - PEIR
 - Project Launch phase of engagement
 - Statutory Consultation
 - How to have your say
 - Next steps





- 4.1.102. The brochure clearly outlined the dates and times for the consultation events, how consultees could share feedback, and how they could contact the Project team throughout the Statutory Consultation period. It also clearly stated the deadline for feedback on the Project, and provided information on where physical copies of documents could be accessed, as well as offering a webinar should consultees wish to request one.
- 4.1.103. A copy of the brochure is provided at Appendix H.5.

Physical copies of project documents

- 4.1.104. The following physical documents were on display at NELC offices and Immingham Civic Centre from Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm throughout the first Statutory Consultation period:
 - A copy of the PEIR
 - Non-technical summary of the PEIR
 - A copy of the first SoCC
- 4.1.105. If there was a request for a private copy of the above documents, the Project team could fulfil this for a fee of up to £300 to cover the cost of printing, depending on the documents requested.

Exhibition Boards

- 4.1.106. Exhibition boards were displayed at consultation events, and PDF copies of the exhibition boards were made available to view online. Printed copies could be posted on request; however, no requests were received for this service.
- 4.1.107. There were seven boards in total, which described the Project and key information about it in an accessible manner. The boards covered topics as follows:
 - Welcome
 - About us
 - Working in Immingham
 - The Planning Process
 - Our proposals
 - Cleaner, greener fuel in the UK
 - Our community
 - The environment
 - Next steps
- 4.1.108. A copy of the boards is provided at Appendix H.6.

Website

- 4.1.109. The website created at Project Launch was updated for the first Statutory Consultation. The website URL (imminghamget.co.uk) was advertised in the brochure and all letters.
- 4.1.110. The website provided all the Statutory Consultation materials online, including:





- Brochure
- Feedback form
- PEIR
- PEIR non-technical summary
- SoCC
- Exhibition boards
- Project plans
- A fly-through video showing an artist's impression of the Project
- Images showing an artist's impression of the Project
- 4.1.111. Approximately 500 visitors visited the website during the first Statutory Consultation period.

Virtual Consultation Room

- 4.1.112. To present the consultation events in a virtual format, ABP commissioned a Virtual Consultation Room. This was an online version of the in-person consultation events, where people could view all the same information available at the drop-in sessions online, and interact with the boards, PEIR, SoCC and other materials in a virtual setting.
- 4.1.113. The Virtual Consultation Room was linked from the website rather than being publicised using its own URL to avoid confusion about which was the main Project website.
- 4.1.114. Approximately 200 visitors came to the Virtual Consultation Room during the first Statutory Consultation period.

Feedback form

- 4.1.115. A feedback form was created for people to provide their comments on the Project. The feedback form was shared in the following ways:
 - In hard copy, enclosed with letters as outlined above
 - In hard copy at consultation events
 - In hard copy, posted to consultees upon request
 - Online directly on the Project website
 - Online to be downloaded from the Project website
- 4.1.116. A copy of the feedback form in full can be found in Appendix H.7. Question 1 asked about demographic data, and questions 2-8, which asked respondents for their thoughts on the Project, are listed out below:
 - Are you satisfied with the information provided? (Y/N)
 - Do you support the proposals for the Project? (Y/N)
 - Do you think the Project would make a positive contribution to the local economy? (Y/N)





- Do you think the development of projects which enable the UK to move towards green energy, are a priority? (Y/N)
- Do you feel you or people you know would benefit from the employment and training opportunities the Project would create? (Y/N)
- Do you have any comments or questions on the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR)?
- Do you have any questions or additional comments for us to consider?
- 4.1.117. In total 39 feedback forms were received from the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.118. The demographics of the 39 people who filled out feedback forms are broken down as follows:
 - 23 local residents or property owners living within approximately 10km of the Project
 - 7 town, parish, or county council members
 - 7 local business owners or employee operating within approximately 10km of the Project
 - 2 other / wider UK residents
- 4.1.119. Comments from the feedback forms were codified to help the Project team understand the breadth of topics covered in the responses before drafting a formal response. Analysis of the feedback is covered in more detail from 4.1.152.

Email address

- 4.1.120. A dedicated email address was set up for the Project: enquiries@imminghamget.co.uk
- 4.1.121. Throughout the first Statutory Consultation, it was advertised to consultees in the brochure, feedback form, website, letters, and notices. The email address was the key form of contact for consultees to get in touch with the Project team.
- 4.1.122. Throughout the first Statutory Consultation, a total of 68 emails were received through the Project inbox, from groups broken down as follows:
 - 54 responses from prescribed consultees
 - 3 responses from non-prescribed consultees
 - 11 responses from local residents and groups.
- 4.1.123. All responses were collated from throughout the first Statutory Consultation period, and feedback was recorded for the technical team to respond to as outlined in at Appendix P.1 & P.2.

Freephone

- 4.1.124. A freephone line was opened at Project Launch and continued to be available throughout the first Statutory Consultation. The phone line was staffed from 9am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, from Project Launch.
- 4.1.125. Over the first Statutory Consultation period, three people called the Project team to discuss the Project. One was a resident who wanted more information about





the Project, one was a local worker, and one was a party interested in contracting for the Project in the future.

4.1.126. A full record of notes from these phone calls can be found in Appendix H.9.

Consultation events

- 4.1.127. For the first Statutory Consultation, face to face consultation drop-in sessions were held at the following venues, dates and times:
 - Burton Hall, Immingham Civic Centre, Pelham Road, Immingham DN40 1QF
 - Wednesday 18 January 2023, 08:00-12:00
 - Thursday 19 January 2023, 15:30-19:30
 - Wednesday 1 February 2023, 08:00-12:00
 - Thursday 2 February 2023, 15:30-19:30
 - Old Library Building, Immingham Civic Centre, Pelham Road, Immingham DN40 1QF
 - Friday 17 February 2023, 12:00-16:00
 - Saturday 18th February 2023, 10:00-14:00
- 4.1.128. Across the six sessions, ABP hosted 91 attendees from the local community.
 - 39 attendees signed in across 17-18 January, and an additional one who did not sign in
 - 24 attendees signed in across 1-2 February, and an additional three who did not sign in
 - 21 attendees signed in across 17-18 February, and an additional three who did not sign in
- 4.1.129. Those who attended had a broad range of interests in the Project. They included local residents, business owners and employees, Land Interest Consultees, and Ward Councillors.
- 4.1.130. Each event was staffed with a team which represented all relevant disciplines across the Project. This included team members from:
 - ABP: staff were present to speak to the role of the Project in the Port and discuss its impact in the area
 - Air Products: staff were present to talk to the technical side of the proposed hydrogen production facility and address questions about process and safety
 - Gateley Hamer: staff were present to speak with any land interest consultees who attended the sessions, taking details of land owners on Queens Road who could be subject to acquisition negotiations
 - AECOM: staff were present to speak to any questions around the PEIR.
 - Field Consulting: staff were present to coordinate each event, encourage attendees to share feedback, and make a record of each session.





Webinar

- 4.1.131. ABP offered the option of an online webinar in the section 48 notice and was mentioned in the Project brochure.
- 4.1.132. There was no interest from consultees in attending a webinar and as a result no webinar was held.

PO Box Address

- 4.1.133. A dedicated PO Box address was set up for the Project, allowing consultees to post physical copies of feedback forms to the Project team throughout the first Statutory Consultation. Self-addressed, pre-paid envelopes were provided at the in-person drop-in sessions and could be requested via phone or email.
- 4.1.134. One letter, and ten feedback forms were received through the PO Box address throughout the first Statutory Consultation.

One-to-one meetings with prescribed consultees

- 4.1.135. Some prescribed consultees liaised directly with the Project team to discuss issues that directly impacted them through a range of correspondence methods. These included emails, letters, and meetings. A record of when each stakeholder engaged with the Project team and how is provided in Table 32 in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement. This includes all meetings held by the Applicant from Project Launch to the submission of the Application, alongside a summary of the key themes of those meetings.
- 4.1.136. Each stakeholder group outlined in the Table 32 received correspondence notifying them of each Statutory Consultation

One-to-one meetings with land interest consultees

- 4.1.137. In addition, Land Interest Consultees where there was potential for the Project to require compulsory acquisition of their interest should permission be granted received additional targeted consultation through Land Agent Gately Hamer. This was to ensure that all who may be impacted were aware of the proposals from the outset, and those who wished to enter into negotiations with the Project team prior to the Application being submitted could do so.
- 4.1.138. Many Land Interest Consultees liaised directly with the Project team to discuss issues that directly impacted them through a range of correspondence methods. These included emails, letters, and meetings and is included in the Schedule of Negotiations.
- 4.1.139. A record of when each stakeholder engaged with the Project team and how is provided and more detailed information regarding the subjects of each meeting can be found in The Schedule of Negotiations at Appendix A of The Statement of Reasons [TR030008/APP/3.2].
- 4.1.140. A record of key engagement with Land Interest Consultees is included in **Table 32** in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement of this Report.
- 4.1.141. Each Land Interest Consultee outlined in the Table 32 also received correspondence notifying them of each Statutory Consultation, which has not been included in Table 32.





4.1.142. Further information on the engagement, meetings and outcomes of this engagement is included in the Schedule of Negotiations.

Considering feedback on the first Statutory Consultation

4.1.143. This section sets out how ABP has complied with its duty under section 49 of the 2008 Act to have regard to consultation responses received.

Section 49 Requirements

- 4.1.144. Section 49(2) of the 2008 Act requires applicants to have regard to any 'relevant responses' received to Statutory Consultation and associated publicity that has been undertaken under sections 42, 47 and 48 of the 2008 Act when deciding whether the actual Application is to be made in the same terms as that which was proposed during the Statutory Consultation periods. "Relevant responses" are those received by the applicant under sections 42, 47 or 48 of the 2008 Act within the deadline specified.
- 4.1.145. ABP has had regard to and taken fully into account all relevant consultation responses to both the first and second Statutory Consultations. Where possible comments received after the stated deadlines have nevertheless been taken into account despite being received after the deadline.
- 4.1.146. The DCLG (2015) Guidance on the pre-application process at paragraph 80 sets out the requirements for a Consultation Report, which includes the following:
 - 'set out a summary of relevant responses to consultation (but not a complete list of responses);
 - provide a description of how the Application was informed and influenced by those responses, outlining any changes made as a result and showing how significant relevant responses will be addressed;
 - provide an explanation as to why responses advising on major changes to a project were not followed, including advice from statutory consultees on impacts;'
- 4.1.147. Applicants should, therefore, be able to demonstrate that they have acted reasonably in fulfilling the requirements of section 49 of the of 2008 Act.
- 4.1.148. In this case, ABP has considered all of the consultation responses from section 42(1)(a), (aa), (b) and (d), section 47 and section 48 consultees, received in response to both rounds of statutory consultation and publicity, and throughout the programme of ongoing engagement, until such a point in the design process where the Project needed to be finalised for submission.
- 4.1.149. The following sections of this chapter sets out a summary of the comments received for the first Statutory Consultation and how ABP has had regard to those comments in preparing the Application. Chapter 5 provides the same analysis for the second Statutory Consultation, while the Applicant's approach to Ongoing Engagement is summarised in Chapter 6.

Response to first Statutory Consultation

4.1.150. Throughout the first Statutory Consultation period from 9 January 2023 to 20 February 2023, ABP engaged with a broad range of stakeholders both in-person





and virtually across the community. Methods of consultation are outlined in this Report in Chapter 3.

- 4.1.151. In summary, the Project team received the following responses to the first Statutory Consultation:
 - 61 responses from prescribed consultees, via email
 - 11 responses from local groups and residents, via email
 - 39 responses via feedback forms, received via the website, in physical copies at events, and via post.

Analysing feedback: feedback forms from the first Statutory Consultation

- 4.1.152. At the end of the first Statutory Consultation, all responses from feedback forms were codified in order to allow ABP to provide technical responses to queries.
- 4.1.153. As a first step, each feedback form was anonymised with all identifying information removed and comments were listed under each corresponding question. A copy of the feedback form in full can be found in Appendix H.7. Question 1 asked about demographic data, and questions 2-8, which asked respondents for their thoughts on the Project, are listed at 4.1.116.
- 4.1.154. Underneath each 'yes or no' questions, the feedback form also provided freeform sections where consultees could elaborate on their answers to each of the questions above.
- 4.1.155. **Table 6** below shows an overview of the responses to yes/no questions gathered through feedback forms.

- 4.1.156. As seen above, the majority of people who filled in feedback forms at the first Statutory Consultation were supportive of the Project, and generally felt positively about the benefits it would bring and the information provided.

- 4.1.159. While many comments on the proposals were positive, there were several queries about the local impact particularly around how the Project may impact the local environment, and what impact it may have on people living in the area.
- 4.1.160. Overall, there was a generally positive tone to the comments from feedback forms, with many supportive of the proposals, particularly of the new jobs it would bring to the area if the proposals are successful.
- 4.1.161. Our analysis showed that 32 people were generally supportive of the proposals through their comments in the feedback forms. Full copies of all 39 responses are provided at Appendix H.8.

Analysing feedback: email comments from the first Statutory Consultation

4.1.162. At the end of the first Statutory Consultation, all responses from email comments were codified into key themes in order to allow ABP to provide technical responses to each individual query raised in each email.





- 4.1.163. The majority of responses received via email (61 responses) were from prescribed consultees who provided detailed feedback on the Project, as well as the PEIR. The Project's technical team were key in analysing and responding to this feedback.
- 4.1.164. There were also 11 responses received via email from groups and individuals in the local community. These were combined with the above to provide an overall picture of the key themes raised by all respondents via email below.

- 4.1.166. Many comments received via email had positive things to say about the Project overall, as well as queries about the potential environmental, marine, and socioeconomic impact of the Project.
- 4.1.167. There were several groups who required follow up engagement as a result of queries raised in their responses. Further engagement with groups following their responses during the first Statutory Consultation is captured in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement.

Process for responding to comments

- 4.1.168. In order to provide comprehensive responses to all comments received, the Project team took the following steps:
 - 1) **Coding comments:** all feedback was broken down into individual comments, which were then assigned a key theme. The themes that arose from this process are captured in Tables 9 and 10 above.
 - 2) Assigning responses: once each individual comment had been coded, a member of the team on the Project was assigned responsibility for leading the draft response. Lead team members were assigned based on their area of expertise, ensuring that subject matter experts led on responding to the most relevant queries.





- 3) **Drafting responses:** lead team members drafted responses in conjunction with their team of subject matter experts. These were captured in draft Technical Response Tables, the final version of which can be found in Appendix P.1 & P.2.
- 4) Reviewing responses: once each lead team member had completed their assigned comments, responses were reviewed by Project managers and the legal team.
- 5) **Aligning responses**: comments from the review were taken on board to ensure all responses across consultees were consistent and aligned with the ES, ensuring consultees could easily find out more information about the response to their query when published in the Application.
- 6) Responding to consultees: where a consultee raised a query that required further discussion or clarification, further engagement was undertaken before finalising the response in the Technical Response Tables (Appendix P.1 & P.2). Further engagement undertaken in response to comments from the first Statutory Consultation is referenced in the individual responses where this is applicable in the Technical Response Table.
- 7) **Publishing responses**: all responses have now been published as part of this Application. These can be viewed in the Technical Response Tables in Appendix P.1 & P.2.

Consultation Responses and responding to key themes from first Statutory Consultation

- 4.1.169. The following summary tables divide themes between technical (those addressed in relevant ES chapters [TR030008/APP/6.2]) and non-technical responses.
- 4.1.170. **Table 12** below outlines a summary of the responses received during the first Statutory Consultation by theme.
- 4.1.171. The Technical and Non-Technical Response Tables at Appendix P.1 and P.2 also provide comprehensive information on how feedback was taken into account. The tables demonstrate how ABP, as the Applicant, has taken all relevant consultation responses fully into account, records the regard that has been had to each relevant consultation response and documents whether the comment has resulted in a change to the Project.

- 4.1.172. After steps 1 to 4 at 4.1.168 were carried out it, a number of minor amendments were made to the Project both in response to the consultation feedback received and as part of the design evolution of the Project.
- 4.1.173. Following the conclusion of the first Statutory Consultation eight key changes were made to the proposals. These changes were driven by both ongoing design development and the responses received through the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.174. The changes are described briefly below and were subsequently consulted on as part of the second Statutory Consultation.
 - Changes driven by design development
 - Amendments to the proposed Site Boundary including removal of the area of land south of Queens Road as design development meant it was no longer required for the proposed pipeline corridor linking the West and East sites.
 - **Marine design changes** including jetty alignment and length; berth arrangement and associated requirements. Further design work was





undertaken to refine the design of the jetty and a single berth design was confirmed as being able to accommodate the full range of vessels expected.

- Changes to the West Site illustrative layout, elevation and drainage including changes to the location of Hydrogen Production and Hydrogen Liquefier Units, and the control building alongside the addition of hydrogen compressors and temporary maintenance contractor offices and temporary vehicle maintenance areas. The finished ground level of the Site will also be raised to improve drainage for the Site.
- **Construction vehicle numbers increasing** to deliver additional fill materials for the West Site as a result of the change in elevation.
- Permanent adjustment to speed limits on Laporte Road to 30mph to ensure the safety of road users throughout both construction and operation of the Site.
- Temporary removal of Kings Road street furniture and overhead line works in four areas of Kings Road to facilitate delivery of oversized loads associated with modular methods of construction.
- Changes driven by consultation responses
 - Changes to the routing of the pipe-rack and Jetty Access Road in the Long Strip woodland to minimise the impact on the Long Strip woodland as far as possible and retain the most important tree within the Tree Protection Order.
 - Confirmation that a Public Rights of Way diversion (Public Bridleway 36) would be provided temporarily around the main construction area during the construction period. Also proposed to put appropriate fencing and signing around the construction area to ensure public safety. This includes two areas which currently have some low level recreational use but are not formal Public Rights of Way at the Sea Wall between Immingham Oil Terminal and where Bridleway 36 meets the Sea Wall and the southern part of the Long Strip woodland.
- 4.1.175. More detail on these changes is included in the respective chapters of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2].
- 4.1.176. The second Statutory Consultation where the Applicant consulted on these changes was a key part of our response to the comments received at the first Statutory Consultation.
- 4.1.177. To supplement this, Table 14 below provides an overview of the key themes from the Technical Response Tables (Appendix P.1 & P.2) for the first Statutory Consultation and how these key themes were addressed in the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2].



4.1.178. Section 47(7) requires that the applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in their SoCC. This Chapter, the following Chapters and the SoCC compliance summary (provided at Appendix B.5) demonstrate how the commitments outlined in the SoCC have been complied with, in accordance with section 47(7) – both in respect of the first and second Statutory Consultations. The SoCC compliance summary identifies each of the commitments made in the SoCC and provides details about how these have been met by ABP in the delivery of the Statutory Consultations.





Chapter 5: Second Statutory Consultation

- 5.1.1. This chapter outlines all activities undertaken and responses received during the second Statutory Consultation, which took place from **Wednesday 24 May to Thursday 20 July 2023.**
- 5.1.2. The principal purpose of the second Statutory Consultation was to seek the views of statutory consultees, the local community and other interested groups and individuals on a series of minor amendments proposed to the Project as a response to both changing design and the feedback from the first Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.3. There were the eight key changes to the proposals consulted on as part of the second Statutory Consultation. These changes are summarised below, with further detail provided at 4.1.174.
 - Amendments to the proposed Site Boundary
 - Marine design changes including jetty alignment and length; berth arrangement and associated requirements
 - Routing of the pipe-rack and Jetty Access Road in the Long Strip woodland
 - West Site illustrative layout, elevation and drainage
 - Construction vehicle numbers increasing to deliver additional fill materials for the West Site
 - Permanent adjustment to speed limits on Laporte Road
 - Public Rights of Way diversion (Public Bridleway 36) and removal of informal access in two areas
 - Temporary removal of Kings Road street furniture and overhead line works.

Second Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC)

Approach to the second SoCC

- 5.1.4. As a result of the feedback from the first Statutory Consultation period, as well as the evolution of design throughout the period following the first Statutory Consultation, ABP made changes to the Project design and a decision was made that further statutory consultation would be undertaken to obtain stakeholders and the local community's views on these changes.
- 5.1.5. In order to consult on these changes, the SoCC which was consulted on during September and October 2022 needed to be updated to include provision for subsequent periods of Statutory Consultation, which was not included in the original SoCC.
- 5.1.6. The first SoCC was updated to include provision for a second Statutory Consultation and any subsequent rounds of statutory consultations (as appropriate). A copy of the second SoCC is available at Appendix B.4.
- 5.1.7. The Applicant replicated the same approach to consultation on the second SoCC as for the first, set out at 3.1.13, including consultation with the same local authorities.





Consultation on the second SoCC

- 5.1.8. The second SoCC was then shared with NELC and the other local authorities included in Table 15 below on Monday 3 April 2023 with a request for any comments to be provided within 32 days from Tuesday 4 April 2023, ending at 11:59pm on Friday 5 May 2023, in order to inform the proposed approach to be taken for the second Statutory Consultation with the local community under section 47 of the 2008 Act. It should be noted that in compliance with section 47(3) of the 2008 Act, the Council was, therefore, given a period of more than 28 days beginning with the day after the day on which they received the consultation documents to provide comments on the draft second SoCC for the second Statutory Consultation. Additional time beyond the statutory 28-day period was given in order to account for bank holidays during the consultation period.
- 5.1.9. On Friday 28 April 2023, emails were again sent to the local authorities who were yet to respond on the second SoCC to provide a general reminder that the deadline for comments on the draft second SoCC was approaching on Friday 5 May 2023. An example of the reminder email is provided at Appendix B.3.
- 5.1.10. Feedback from local authorities is summarised in **Table 15** below.

Publication of the second SoCC

- 5.1.11. The Applicant replicated the approach to publication of the first SoCC as outlined from 4.1.12.
- 5.1.12. To publicise the second SoCC, the section 47 notice was again drafted and combined with the section 48 notice publicising the Application and the second Statutory Consultation. This combined notice was published in the same outlets as the first SoCC as outlined at 4.1.15 and included local press circulating in the vicinity of the Project site on 24 May, in the Grimsby Telegraph and The Lincolnite. Further detail on these notices is provided from 5.1.49. A copy of the notice, as published, in the Grimsby Telegraph is provided at Appendix D.2.
- 5.1.13. As the section 47 and section 48 notices were combined, the section 47 notice publicising the SoCC was also published in the publications and on the dates outlined in 5.1.50.
- 5.1.14. The second SoCC was also available on the Project website to view and download free of charge from 24 May 2023 and physical copies of the second SoCC were available to view at the locations below from 24 May 2023:





- Immingham Civic Centre, Pelham Rd, Immingham DN40 1QF
- NELC Offices: Municipal Offices, Town Hall Sq, Grimsby DN31 1HU
- 5.1.15. The SoCC remained on display beyond the second Statutory Consultation period to allow those who were interested the opportunity to view a physical copy of the SoCC.

Identifying Consultees

- 5.1.16. The Applicant undertook the same approach to identifying consultees as outlined in Chapter 4, using the same list of consultees identified for the first Statutory Consultation at **Table 5** and the land interest consultees referenced at 4.1.46 for the second Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.17. The Applicant did however identify a number of additional contacts and additional land interest consultees following the first Statutory Consultation who were included and consulted as part of the second Statutory Consultation. At the first Statutory Consultation, 108 land interest consultees were identified as referred to at 4.1.46 and 4.1.62 of this Report. Ahead of the second Statutory Consultation 104 land interest consultees were identified. An additional 31 land interest consultees (in addition to the 104) were identified and consulted as part of the second Statutory Consultation. This included the additional prescribed consultees outlined in **Table 16** below.
- 5.1.18. A full list of consultees identified in accordance with section 42(1)(d) (land interests) for both the first and second Statutory Consultations is provided in the Book of Reference [TR030008/APP/3.1].
- 5.1.19. The Applicant also removed a number of contacts following confirmation that they no longer held an interest in the property as a result of the first Statutory Consultation.

Consultation dates

- 5.1.20. For the second Statutory Consultation, a consultation period of over 28 days was provided to all section 42 consultees, commencing on Wednesday 24 May 2023 and ending at 23:59pm on Thursday 20 July 2023. The consultation period ran for a total of 57 days.
- 5.1.21. An original consultation end date of Friday 30 June for the second Statutory Consultation had initially been publicised, however following the publication of





additional notices to satisfy section 48(1) of the 2008 Act the consultation was extended. This is explained further at 5.1.51.

Providing feedback and deadline for comments

- 5.1.22. Respondents were initially asked to provide all feedback and comments by 23:59 on Friday 30 June 2023. However, as outlined above and explained further from 5.1.51 this deadline was extended to 23:59 on Thursday 20 July 2023.
- 5.1.23. As in the first Statutory Consultation ABP continued to accept responses from consultees beyond the second Statutory Consultation end date, which are included in the relevant response tables (Appendix Q.1 & Q.2).
- 5.1.24. The methods to provide feedback replicated those from the first Statutory Consultation as set out in Chapter 4 at 4.1.67.
- 5.1.25. As in the first Statutory Consultation responses were required to be in writing and comments via social media were not to be counted as formal responses to the consultation process and not taken into account.

Sending letters and emails publicising the consultation

5.1.26. The same approach from the first Statutory Consultation was undertaken in the second Statutory Consultation with letters and emails drafted to accompany a brochure and feedback form for the second Statutory Consultation. These were again tailored to each stakeholder group as outlined in Chapter 4 from 4.1.71.

Sending letters and emails to prescribed consultees

- 5.1.27. The letters to section 42(1)(a) (prescribed consultees) and section 42(1)(b) (relevant local authorities) consultees enclosed the section 48 notice as well as the other section 42 consultation material. An example of the letter sent to the section 42(1)(a)-(b) consultees, enclosing the section 48 notice, is provided at Appendix K.1.
- 5.1.28. The letters provided an overview of the amendments to the Project and explained how consultees could respond to the consultation. The letters also explained that the PAR, updated SoCC and previous materials from the first Statutory Consultation could all be accessed online to view and download free of charge on ABP's dedicated Project consultation website, throughout the second Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.29. The letters also provided details of the consultation events that were to take place, the deposit locations where documents could be viewed in person and online, information on how to request a USB free of charge containing the documents or paper copies of the materials (subject to a responsible copying charge for certain documents, up to a maximum cost of £300).
- 5.1.30. The letters confirmed that the second Statutory Consultation would take place between 24 May and 23:59 pm on 30 June 2023, and invited consultees to provide comments in writing on the Project proposals and/or submit feedback before the close of consultation at 23:59pm on 30 June 2023, after which comments may not be considered. As per 5.1.51 this date was later extended to 20 July 2023.





- 5.1.31. ABP sent hard copies of letters to all prescribed consultees via Royal Mail on Wednesday 24 May.
- 5.1.32. Where possible, ABP also sent copies of the letters and associated documents via email. Emails were sent from Wednesday 24 May to Friday 26 May 2023, and also provided links to the consultation website.
- 5.1.33. Included with all letters to the section 42 prescribed consultees whether sent in hard copy by post, or electronically by email were copies of the consultation materials comprising the following enclosures:
 - a. Letter introducing the changes to the Project; (Appendix K.1)
 - b. Combined section 47 and 48 notice; (Appendix D.1 & D.3)
 - c. Brochure, as described below; (Appendix K.5)
 - d. Feedback form, as described below. (Appendix K.7)
- 5.1.34. An example of the section 42 notice letter sent by email to the section 42(1)(a) (prescribed consultees), 42(1)(aa) (MMO) and 42(1)(b) (relevant local authorities) are provided at Appendix K.1.
- 5.1.35. There were a number of instances where correspondence issued within the mail out area were returned by Royal Mail. The objective on receipt of the undelivered correspondence was to ascertain the correct address or reissue them to the occupier of the address where it would be physically possible for them to receive the correspondence.
- 5.1.36. The Applicant re-issued correspondence, where it was able to ascertain alternative addresses or named occupiers. A number of the re-issued correspondence were returned to the Applicant by Royal Mail. These were all logged and no further action was taken.

Sending letters to land interest consultees

- 5.1.37. The Section 42 Land Interest consultees listed in the Book of Reference [TR030008/APP/3.1] were notified of the second Statutory Consultation by letter, which was couriered to the consultees. This included all Land Interest consultees identified as part of the first Statutory Consultation and any others identified thereafter.
- 5.1.38. The letters provided an overview of the amendments to the Project and explained how consultees could respond to the consultation. The letters also explained that the PAR, updated SoCC and previous materials from the first Statutory Consultation could all be accessed online to view and download free of charge on ABP's dedicated Project consultation website, throughout (and after) the second Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.39. The letters explained that ABP had identified the recipient as a Land Interest consultee under section 42(1)(d) of the 2008 Act, and accordingly they were being consulted with on the Project.
- 5.1.40. The letters also provided details as outlined at 4.1.73 and 4.1.74.
- 5.1.41. On Wednesday 24 May 2023, each land interest consultee received the following materials in their parcel:





- a. Letter introducing changes to the Project, the second Statutory Consultation, and describing status at a land interest consultee in the consultation process
- b. Physical copy of feedback form
- c. Copy of combined section 47 and section 48 notice
- d. Copy of consultation brochure, describing the changes to the Project and how consultees could comment on the proposals
- e. Copy of map indicating proposed Site Boundary of the Project
- f. Copy of map(s) indicating the stakeholder's land interest(s) in the area
- 5.1.42. A copy of the section 42 notice letter sent by post to the section 42(1)(d) (land interests) is provided at Appendix K.1.

Unregistered Land Consultees

- 5.1.43. On 24 May, ABP put on display unregistered land posters within the locality of the Project Site, in relation to unregistered land in respect of which it had, at the time, not yet been able to ascertain the ownership.
- 5.1.44. A copy of the unregistered land poster and evidence of the unregistered land posters on display is provided at Appendix K.4.

Section 46: Duty to notify Secretary of State

- 5.1.45. As outlined for the first Statutory Consultation, on Monday 3rd April 2023, ABP's consultants AECOM wrote to the PINS (in their role on behalf of the Secretary of State) to provide formal notification of the commencement of the second Statutory Consultation for the Project which was to commence on Wednesday 24 May 2023. A copy of this letter is provided at Appendix L.1.
- 5.1.46. The acknowledgement letter received from the PINS (on behalf of the Secretary of State) in response, is included in Appendix L.2.

Sending letters, brochure, and feedback forms to the local community

- 5.1.47. ABP replicated the approach from the first Statutory Consultation as set out at 4.1.92, delivering letters, brochures and feedback forms to 5,000 homes within the consultation radius via Royal Mail see consultation zone at **Figure 4.2**.
- 5.1.48. A copy of the brochure, letter, and feedback form can be found in Appendix K.

Publication of section 48 notices

- 5.1.49. As set out from 4.1.97, ABP again publicised the second Statutory Consultation in accordance with the section 48(1) of the 2008 Act, with a combined section 47 and 48 notice.
- 5.1.50. Notices were initially published in the following newspapers:
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 41 on Wednesday 24 May 2023
 - Lloyd's List, page 12 on Wednesday 24 May 2023
 - London Gazette, page 10,393-10,394 on Wednesday 24 May 2023

- 5.1.51. A second Grimsby Telegraph notice was due to be published on Wednesday 31 May 2023. However, due to an administrative error this notice was not published. In order to fulfil the requirements of the 2008 Act for notices 'to appear for at least two successive weeks in one or more local newspapers circulating in the vicinity of the Project site' the Applicant undertook to republish all notices and extended the consultation period accordingly.
- 5.1.52. A second round of notices were therefore published in the following newspapers:
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 41 on Wednesday 14 June 2023
 - Grimsby Telegraph, page 41 on Wednesday 21 June 2023
 - The Lincolnite, online on Wednesday 14 June 2023

- 5.1.53. With the final notice appearing in Fishing News on Thursday 22 June 2023, the second Statutory Consultation was extended by 28 days from this date, as required by the 2008 Act, concluding on Friday 20 July 2023.
- 5.1.54. In accordance with Regulation 13 of the EIA Regulations a copy of the combined section 47 and 48 notice was also sent to the consultation bodies. Further information is provided in Chapter 7, which discusses consultation under the EIA Regulations.

Collateral

5.1.55. ABP replicated its approach to collateral from the first Statutory Consultation as outlined from 4.1.99 with updated versions of the below collateral produced for the Second Statutory Consultation.

- 5.1.58. Other information was included as outlined at 4.1.102.
- 5.1.59. A copy of the brochure is provided at Appendix K.5.

Physical copies of project documents

- 5.1.60. In addition to the hard copy documents outlined at 4.1.104 the following additional documents were on display at NELC Offices and the Immingham Civic Centre from Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm throughout the second Statutory Consultation period:
 - A copy of the PAR
 - A copy of the second SoCC
- 5.1.61. If there was a request for a private copy of the above documents, the Project team could fulfil this for a fee of up to £300 to cover the cost of printing, depending on the documents requested.

Exhibition Boards

- 5.1.62. Exhibition boards were displayed at consultation events, and PDF copies of the exhibition boards were made available to view online. Printed copies could be posted on request; however, no requests were received for this service.
- 5.1.63. There were five boards in total, which described the changes to the Project and next steps in an accessible manner. The boards covered topics as follows:
 - Welcome
 - About us
 - Changes to the proposals
 - Further changes to the proposals
 - Next steps
- 5.1.64. A copy of the boards is provided at Appendix K.6.





Website

- 5.1.65. The website (www.imminghamget.co.uk) used for both Project Launch and the first Statutory Consultation was updated for the second Statutory Consultation and its address was included in the brochure and all letters.
- 5.1.66. As previously, it provided all relevant documents and information shared at in person consultation events. This included:
 - Brochure
 - Feedback form
 - PAR
 - PAR non-technical summary
 - Second SoCC
 - Exhibition boards
 - Project plans
 - Section 47 and 48 notice
- 5.1.67. All documentation from the first Statutory Consultation remained on the website and still remains.
- 5.1.68. 545 visitors came to the website during the second Statutory Consultation period, generating 1,464 individual page views.

Virtual Consultation Room

5.1.69. The Virtual Consultation Room used in the first Statutory Consultation remained accessible and included all the information from the first Statutory Consultation.

Feedback form

- 5.1.70. A feedback form was created for people to provide their comments on the changes to the Project. The feedback form was shared in the same ways as during the first Statutory Consultation as noted at 4.1.91.
- 5.1.71. A copy of the feedback form in full can be found in Appendix K.7. Question 1 asked about demographic data, and questions 2-6, which asked respondents for their thoughts on the Project, are listed out below:
 - Are you satisfied with the information provided? (Y/N)
 - Do you support the overall IGET proposals in principle? (Y/N)
 - Do you support the changes to the proposals? (Y/N)
 - Do you have any comments on the changes we have made to the proposals?
 - Do you have any questions or additional comments for us to consider?
- 5.1.72. In total 12 feedback forms were received during the second Statutory Consultation, six via post, five via email and one during the public exhibitions.
- 5.1.73. The demographics of the 12 people who filled out feedback forms are broken down as follows:





- 7 residents or property owners living or owning a property within approximately
 10km of the Project
- 1 resident
- 1 local business owner or employee operating within approximately 10km of the Project
- 3 other
- 5.1.74. Comments from the feedback forms were codified to help the Project team understand the breadth of topics covered in the responses before drafting a formal response. Analysis of the feedback is covered in more detail later in this chapter.

Email address

- 5.1.75. The email address remained open throughout the second Statutory Consultation and was included in all key collateral.
- 5.1.76. Throughout the second Statutory Consultation, a total of 56 emails were received through the Project inbox, from groups broken down as follows:
 - 39 responses from prescribed consultees
 - 12 responses from land interest consultees
 - 5 responses from local residents and groups.
- 5.1.77. All emails were collated from throughout the second Statutory Consultation period, and feedback was recorded for the technical team to respond to where such comments related to matters addressed in the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2].

Freephone

- 5.1.78. The freephone line remained open throughout the second Statutory Consultation and was included in all key collateral.
- 5.1.79. Over the second Statutory Consultation period, four people called the Project team to discuss the consultation. This included requests for consultation documents on a USB to be posted, questions about the extent of the proposed Site Boundary and following up on previous discussions had during in person meetings with Gately Hamer.
- 5.1.80. A full record of notes from these phone calls can be found in Appendix K.9.

PO Box Address

- 5.1.81. The PO Box address remained open throughout the Second Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.82. Six feedback forms were received through the PO Box address throughout the second Statutory Consultation period.

Consultation events

5.1.83. For the second Statutory Consultation, given the scale of the changes and comprehensive nature of the first Statutory Consultation, it was agreed that two face to face consultation drop-in sessions would be held rather than the six





events held during the first Statutory Consultation. Events were held at the following venues, dates and times:

- Burton Hall, Immingham Civic Centre, Pelham Road, Immingham DN40 1QF
 - Thursday 22 June 2023, 14:00 18:00
 - Saturday 24 June 2023, 10:00 14:00
- 5.1.84. Across both sessions, ABP hosted 19 attendees from the local community.
 - 14 attendees signed in and attended on 22 June.
 - 5 attendees signed in and attended on 24 June.
- 5.1.85. Those who attended had a broad range of interests in the Project. They included local residents, business owners and employees and land interest consultees.
- 5.1.86. Each event was staffed as it was in the first Statutory Consultation as noted at 4.1.130.

Webinar

- 5.1.87. ABP offered the option of an online webinar in the section 48 notice and was mentioned in the Project brochure.
- 5.1.88. There was not sufficient demand from consultees in attending a webinar (only a single enquiry) and as a result no webinar was held.

One-to-one meetings with prescribed consultees

- 5.1.89. As in the first Statutory Consultation, some prescribed consultees liaised directly with the Project team to discuss issues that directly impacted them through a range of correspondence methods. These included emails, letters, and meetings. A record of when each stakeholder engaged with the Project team and how is provided in Table 32 in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement of this Report.
- 5.1.90. As in the first Statutory Consultation, each stakeholder group outlined in Table 32 received correspondence notifying them of each Statutory Consultation, which has not been included in Table 32.

One-to-one meetings with land interest consultees

- 5.1.91. As in the first Statutory Consultation a number of Land Interest consultees continued to liaise directly with the Project team to discuss issues that directly impacted them through a range of correspondence methods. These included emails, letters, and meetings.
- 5.1.92. A record of key engagement with land interest consultees is included in **Table 32** in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement of this Report.
- 5.1.93. Each Land Interest consultee outlined in **Table 32** also received correspondence notifying them of each Statutory Consultation, which has not been included in **Table 32**.
- 5.1.94. Further information on this engagement including meetings and outcomes is included in the Schedule of Negotiations at Appendix A of The Statement of Reasons [TR030008/APP/3.2].





One to one meetings with other stakeholders and interested parties

5.1.95. The Applicant also continued to engage with other stakeholders and interested parties. Details of such meetings and engagement are also included in Table 32 in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement.

Considering feedback from second Statutory Consultation

- 5.1.96. This section sets out how ABP has complied with its duty under section 49 of the 2008 Act to have regard to consultation responses received.
- 5.1.97. All relevant legislation and guidance is referenced in Chapter 4 at 4.1.2 and was followed in the same manner for the second Statutory Consultation as it was in the first Statutory Consultation.

Response to second Statutory Consultation

- 5.1.98. Throughout the second Statutory Consultation period from 24 May 2023 to 20 July 2023, ABP engaged with a broad range of stakeholders both in-person and virtually across the community.
- 5.1.99. As noted at 5.1.21, the original second Statutory Consultation period was due to run from 24 May to 30 June 2023. The end date of the consultation was subsequently extended to 20 July 2023, with stakeholders notified of the extended deadline to respond to the second Statutory Consultation via the section 47 and section 48 notices, and via a notification on the website and at drop-in sessions.
- 5.1.100. In summary, the Project team received the following responses to the second Statutory Consultation:
 - 35 responses from prescribed consultees, via email
 - 17 responses from non-prescribed consultees, via email
 - 5 responses from local groups and residents, via email
 - 12 responses via feedback forms, received via the website, in physical copies at events, and via post.

Analysing feedback: feedback forms from the second Statutory Consultation

- 5.1.101. At the end of the second Statutory Consultation, all responses from feedback forms were codified in order to allow ABP to provide technical responses to queries.
- 5.1.102. As a first step, each feedback form was anonymised with all identifying information removed and comments were listed under each corresponding question. A copy of the feedback form in full can be found in Appendix K.7.
- 5.1.103. The demographics of the 12 people are included at 5.1.73.
- 5.1.104. **Table 17** below shows an overview of the responses to yes/no questions gathered through feedback forms.

- 5.1.108. Overall, there was a generally positive tone to the comments from feedback forms, with supportive comments for green energy and the approach to consultation around the second Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.109. Our analysis showed that 9 people or 75%, were supportive of the changes to the proposals through their comments in the feedback forms. Full copies of all 12 responses are provided at Appendix K.8.

Analysing feedback: email comments from the second Statutory Consultation

- 5.1.110. At the end of the second Statutory Consultation, all responses from email comments were codified into key themes in order to allow ABP to provide technical responses and non-technical where comments did not relate to issues covered in the ES, to each individual query raised in each email.
- 5.1.111. The majority of the responses received via email were from prescribed consultees who provided detailed feedback on the Project, as well as the PAR. The Project's technical team were key in analysing and responding to this feedback.
- 5.1.112. There were also 5 responses received via email from groups and individuals in the local community. These were combined with the above to provide an overall picture of the key themes raised by all respondents via email below.

- 5.1.114. Of the emails received, there were a number of emails noted as 'acknowledgments' of the letter about the second Statutory Consultation and noted an intent to respond at a later date without doing so in that particular response. Others provided responses or noted that they had no comments or no change to their previous consultation response. There were also responses that fell into 'other' categories for example requesting copies of documentation or seeking support for local sports teams.
- 5.1.115. There were a number of groups who required follow up engagement as a result of queries raised in their responses. Further engagement with groups following their responses during the second Statutory Consultation is captured in Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement.

Process for responding to comments

- 5.1.116. The same approach to responding to comments was adopted as in the first Statutory Consultation, set out at 4.1.172.
- 5.1.117. Table 22 below outlines a summary of the responses received during the second Statutory Consultation by theme.
- 5.1.118. The Response Tables at Appendix Q.1 and Q.2 also provide comprehensive information on how feedback was taken into account. The tables demonstrate how ABP, as the Applicant, has taken all relevant consultation responses fully into account, records the regard that has been had to each relevant consultation response and documents whether the comment has resulted in a change to the Project.




Responding to key themes from the second Statutory Consultation

- 5.1.119. Replicating the processes outlined at 4.1.152 and 4.1.162 allowed the Applicant to identify the key themes that emerged from the second Statutory Consultation.
- 5.1.120. The Technical Response Tables at Appendix Q.1 and Q.2 provide comprehensive information on how feedback received was taken into account and how the Applicant responded within the Project.
- 5.1.121. While no material changes have been made to the Application in response to the second Statutory Consultation, the tables demonstrate how the Applicant has taken all relevant consultation responses fully into account and records the regard that has been had to each relevant consultation response.
- 5.1.122. To supplement this, **Table 25** below provides an overview of the key themes from the Technical Response Tables for the second Statutory Consultation and how these key themes were addressed in the ES.

Section 18.7 of Chapter 18: Water Use, Water Quality, Coastal Protection, Flood Risk & Drainage of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2] and the FRA (Appendix 18.A [TR030008/APP/6.4] outline the flood risk mitigation measures for the Project including flood resilience and resistance measures, site operation and shut down, flood emergency response plans and elevation of critical plant equipment.

Compliance with the SoCC

5.1.123. As outlined at 4.1.178 the SoCC compliance summary (provided at Appendix B.5) demonstrates how the commitments outlined in the SoCC have been complied with, in satisfaction of section 47(7) – both in respect of the first and second Statutory Consultations.





Chapter 6: Ongoing Engagement

- 6.1.1. The chapter describes the activities undertaken outside of the first and second Statutory Consultations. Outside of these consultation activities, ABP continued its engagement to enable stakeholders to continue working with the Project team to understand issues and work through those that arose from the aforementioned consultation stages. For the purposes of this Report, this is referred to as 'Ongoing Engagement'.
- 6.1.2. In addition to compliance with the section 49 duty as noted at 4.1.144, relevant responses received during the programme of ongoing engagement were also taken into account and where appropriate have been considered as part of the responses provided to both the first and second Statutory Consultations at Appendix P.1, P.2, Q.1 and Q.2.
- 6.1.3. Ongoing Engagement with some key stakeholders has resulted in a continuing dialogue in order to address issues raised on the Project. For other stakeholders, the Ongoing Engagement has not resulted in any mitigation or design changes to the Application being required.
- 6.1.4. The Ongoing Engagement up to the point of submission of the Application is included in **Table 32** below.

Consultation dates

- 6.1.5. Ongoing Engagement encompassed a range of activities, including meetings, emails, letters, and face-to-face engagement from July 2022 in the weeks leading up to Project Launch on 30 August to the submission of the Application in September 2023.
- 6.1.6. This non-statutory Ongoing Engagement was undertaken and conducted alongside the formal Statutory Consultation process in the spirit of effective consultation and to inform the evolution of the Project as it progressed. A high-level overview of Ongoing Engagement activities between and after Statutory Consultation periods is provided in **Table 26** below.

Hazardous Substances Consent Application consultation

- 6.1.15. As noted in Chapter 3, prior to submitting an application for a Hazardous Substances Consent to NELC, Air Products conducted a period of consultation between 6 December 2022 and 1 January 2023.
- 6.1.16. Prior to submission, Air Products published a public notice in the Grimsby Telegraph and erected hard copy notices on the proposed site giving notice of the opportunity to make representations between 6 December 2022 and 1 January 2023. See Appendix M.4 for copies of the published notices.
- 6.1.17. The application was validated on 6 April 2023, and prior to NELC making a decision whether to grant consent, further consultation in accordance with the Planning (Hazardous Substances) Regulations 2015 was carried out by NELC.
- 6.1.18. The application is currently pending consideration by NELC.

Considering feedback from Ongoing Engagement

- 6.1.26. Responses received through Ongoing Engagement were considered alongside those received throughout the first and second Statutory Consultations and have helped to shape the final Project proposals.
- 6.1.27. Responses received during the initial Project Launch phase were largely preliminary and introductory in nature.
- 6.1.28. In the periods after the Statutory Consultations this engagement was largely an extension of ongoing conversations that had taken place and continued throughout the Statutory Consultation periods.
- 6.1.29. 1The key themes, topics of discussion and where appropriate the current status of discussions are included in **Table 32** above and have supplemented ongoing dialogue held with key stakeholders throughout the first and second Statutory Consultations.
- 6.1.30. The Response Tables at Appendix P.1, P.2 and Q.1 and Q.2 provide comprehensive information on how feedback was taken into account and, where relevant, how the Applicant responded in developing the Project. The tables demonstrate how ABP, as the Applicant, has taken all relevant consultation responses and any feedback received during ongoing engagement fully into account, records the regard that has been had to each relevant consultation response and documents whether the comment has resulted in a change to the Project.

Compliance with the SoCC

6.1.31. Section 47(7) requires that the Applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in their SoCC. The SoCC compliance summary provided at Appendix B.5 demonstrates how the commitments outlined in the SoCC have been complied with, in satisfaction of section 47(7). The SoCC compliance summary identifies each of the commitments made in the SoCC and provides details about how these have been met by ABP in the delivery of the consultation.





Chapter 7: Consultation under EIA Regulations

Overview

- 7.1.1. This chapter provides an overview of how the Project was identified as requiring an EIA and how consultation has been conducted in line with the EIA Regulations.
- 7.1.2. Chapter 1 Introduction of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2] sets out that the Project is subject to mandatory EIA as set out within paragraph 8(2) of Schedule 1 of the EIA Regulations, as it comprises 'Trading ports, piers for loading and unloading connected to land and outside ports (excluding ferry piers) which can take vessels of over 1,350 tonnes'. As such, the Application for the Project is supported by an EIA. Chapter 1 Introduction of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2] also sets out the steps taken to comply with the EIA Regulations. Chapter 5 EIA Approach of the ES [TR030008/ APP/6.2] reports on the Transboundary screening undertaken by PINS for the Project.
- 7.1.3. The Project was subject to an EIA Scoping Opinion, included at Appendix 1B of the ES Appendices [TR030008/APP/6.4], as detailed below.

Notification under Regulations 8 and 10 of the EIA Regulations

7.1.4. In accordance with Regulations 8 and 10 of the EIA Regulations, advanced notice was provided on behalf of ABP to PINS on behalf of the Secretary of State of its intention to ask the Secretary of State for a scoping opinion pursuant to Regulation 10 (1) of the EIA Regulations in relation to the Project. Advanced notice was provided at a meeting held on 12 July 2022 between the Applicant and PINS where scoping matters were discussed. In its Scoping Opinion at Appendix 1B of the ES Appendices [TR030008/APP/6.4], PINS confirmed that "the Applicant notified the Secretary of State (SoS) under Regulation 8(1)(b) of those regulations that they propose to provide an ES in respect of the Proposed Development and by virtue of Regulation 6(2)(a), the Proposed Development is 'EIA development'."

Scoping Opinion

- 7.1.5. In accordance with Regulation 10 of the EIA Regulations, an EIA Scoping Report, provided at Appendix 1.A of the ES Appendices [TR030008/APP/6.4] was submitted to the Secretary of State on behalf of the Applicant on 30 August 2022 with a request for an EIA Scoping Opinion, in order to determine the required scope of the EIA. The submission confirmed that ABP, as the Applicant, intended to submit an Application for a DCO in relation to the Project.
- 7.1.6. PINS, on behalf of the Secretary of State, accepted receipt of the scoping request on 30 August 2022 via email.
- 7.1.7. The Secretary of State adopted the Scoping Opinion on 10 October 2022, having consulted with the relevant consultation bodies in accordance with Regulation 10(6) of the EIA Regulations. The full list of consultation bodies notified by the PINS under Regulation 11(1)(a) of the EIA Regulations is provided at Appendix 1 of the Scoping Opinion, set out in Appendix 1B of the ES Appendices [TR030008/APP/6.4].





- 7.1.8. As set out within the Scoping Opinion, the Secretary of State confirmed that 'The Applicant provided the necessary information to inform a request under EIA Regulation 10(3) in the form of a Scoping Report' and so it can be concluded that the Scoping Report had encompassed all relevant aspects identified in the EIA Regulations. The Scoping Opinion included the Secretary of State's comments on the Project, EIA approach and topic areas, as well as a list of all organisations consulted.
- 7.1.9. In response to the issues raised by the Statutory Consultees in the Scoping Opinion, further targeted engagement was undertaken with the relevant bodies, as necessary, for example to provide further clarity on technical methodologies such as agreement of viewpoints for photomontages. The technical consultation undertaken is reported in the ES consultation tables on a topic by topic basis in each ES chapter as relevant.
- 7.1.10. The Scoping Opinion provided the foundation for undertaking the individual technical assessments that form the basis of the EIA for the Project.

The PEIR

- 7.1.11. A PEIR (Appendix G.1) was produced for the first Statutory Consultation which took place between 9 January 2023 and 20 February 2023 and formed a substantive element of the consultation materials which were shared during that period. The PEIR was available at each of the in person events, through the Virtual Consultation Room and directly through the Project website.
- 7.1.12. The role of the PEIR is to provide the information reasonably required to enable the "consultation bodies" as defined in Regulation 3 of the EIA Regulations 2017, to develop an informed view of the likely significant environmental effects of the proposed development for the purposes of providing feedback on the proposals.
- 7.1.13. That is reflected in the definition of Preliminary Environmental Information, which is defined in Regulation 12(2) as information referred to in Regulation 14(2) which:
- '(a) has been compiled by the applicant; and
- (b) is reasonably required for the consultation bodies to develop an informed view of the likely significant environment effects of the proposed development (and of any associated development).'
- 7.1.14. The PEIR was formed of four volumes, mirroring the structure of the final ES:

Volume I – Non-Technical Summary which summarised the PEIR in non-technical language.

Volume II – Main Report

Volume III - Figures

Volume IV - Appendices

Second Statutory Consultation: PAR

7.1.15. A PAR (Appendix J.1) was shared during the second Statutory Consultation. The PAR explained and presented the design refinements and changes that had been made to the Project since the PEIR was consulted upon in early 2023 for the first Statutory Consultation, in order to give all interested parties, the local community, regulators and stakeholders the opportunity to express their views about both the





proposals, and the refinements made to the Project. The PAR contained a description of the changes made to the Project, the rationale and justification for making them, the implications for environmental effects of the Project (constituting additional Preliminary Environmental Information) as well as providing plans showing the proposals.

7.1.16. The original PEIR and the non-technical summary of the PEIR were also made available at the second Statutory Consultation between 24 May 2023 and 20 July 2023. This was primarily to ensure that any newly affected parties, for example any whose property interests were affected by the changes to the proposed order limits, had an opportunity to review all of the Preliminary Environmental Information for the Project and not simply the information relating to the changes.

Environmental Statement

- 7.1.17. The ES for the Application is formed of four volumes:
- Volume I Non-Technical Summary which summarised the ES in non-technical language [TR030008/APP/6.1].
- Volume II Main Report [TR030008/APP/6.2].
- Volume III Figures [TR030008/APP/6.3].
- Volume IV Appendices [TR030008/APP/6.4].
- 7.1.18. The ES has been prepared in accordance with Regulation 14(2) of the EIA Regulations, which specifies what environmental information must be included in an ES.
- 7.1.19. Regulation 14(3)(b) requires that an ES must include information 'reasonably required for reaching a reasoned conclusion on the significant effects of the proposed development on the environment, taking into account current knowledge and methods of assessment'. Chapter 5 EIA Approach of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2] explains the approach taken to the EIA for the Project and sets out how the EIA Regulations have been complied with.

EIA Requirements during Statutory Consultation

7.1.20. In developing and delivering both rounds of Statutory Consultation there was full compliance with the relevant requirements in the EIA Regulations. The section below outlines how these were satisfied.

Consultation under the EIA Regulations

- 7.1.21. As described in Chapter 2 of this Report, both the first and second rounds of Statutory Consultation were undertaken consistently with the following EIA Regulations:
 - a. Regulation 12(1) of the EIA Regulations requires that the SoCC must make reference to the Project being an EIA development, and state how the applicant intends to publicise and consult on the Preliminary Environmental Information. The SoCC published by ABP confirmed that the Project is EIA development. The SoCC also explained how the Applicant intended to publicise and consult on the PEIR (the published SoCC is provided at Appendix A.4). A second SoCC (Appendix B.4) was prepared for the second





Statutory Consultation, which replicated the scope and methods of the first Statutory Consultation for the second and any subsequent Statutory Consultations.

- b. Regulation 13 of the EIA Regulations requires that, at the same time as publishing notice of the proposed application under section 48(1) of the Act, the Applicant must send a copy of the section 48 notice to the consultation bodies and any person notified to the Applicant in accordance with regulation 11(1)(b). The consultation bodies are defined in the EIA Regulations to include consultees prescribed under sections 42(1)(a) and 43 of the 2008 Act. In compliance with Regulation 13, a section 48 notice was sent to all the consultation bodies and persons notified to ABP under the Regulation 11 List, in accordance with regulation 11(1)(b).
- 7.1.22. The Applicant sent letters to the section 42(1)(a)-(b) consultees explaining that they were prescribed consultees under the 2008 Act and also the EIA Regulations and enclosed the section 48 notice as well as the other section 42 consultation material. This was undertaken for both rounds of Statutory Consultation. An example of the section 42 notice letters sent, including the section 48 notice are provided at Appendix H.1 and K.1.
- 7.1.23. The section 42 notice letters sent to the consultation bodies provided an overview of the Project, explained that it was an EIA development and how consultees could respond to the Statutory Consultation. The letters also explained that the PEIR, the non-technical summary to the PEIR and the SoCC (as well as the PAR in the letters sent for the second Statutory Consultation) could all be accessed online to view and download free of charge on ABP's dedicated Project consultation website, from the start of Statutory Consultation. They further provided details of the Statutory Consultation events that were to take place, the deposit locations where documents could be viewed online, information of how to request a USB free of charge containing the documents or paper copies of the materials (subject to a responsible copying charge for certain documents, up to a maximum cost of £300).
- 7.1.24. The section 42 notice letters also confirmed the dates when the Statutory Consultation would take place and invited consultees to provide comments in writing on the Project proposals before the close of consultation, after which comments may not be considered.
- 7.1.25. Volume 2 of the ES **[TR030008/APP/6.2]** contains each of the technical ES chapters, and these each provide detail of the consultation and engagement undertaken with the relevant statutory consultees in relation to the respective environmental topics for the Project.
- 7.1.26. The chapters also include a record of technical consultations which were held with stakeholders where these discussions related to technical scope, methodologies and the development of mitigation. For example, agreement of Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment view points, engagement with Environmental Health at NELC regarding the siting of noise monitoring equipment and potential construction working hours (see Chapters 13: Landscape & Visual Impact and 7: Noise & Vibration of the ES [TR030008/APP/6.2]. Consultation with key stakeholders began in August 2022 and has been ongoing to date. Engagement





with key stakeholders commenced at an early stage of the process, including discussing points raised in the Scoping Opinion, included at Appendix 1B of the ES Appendices [TR030008/APP/6.4], to try to reach agreement on these matters and further comments received since initial discussions.

Transboundary Consultation

- 7.1.27. Transboundary screening was undertaken by PINS on behalf of the Secretary of State for the purposes of Regulation 32 of the EIA Regulations on 2 March 2023, following the Applicant's request for a Scoping Opinion. A copy of the Transboundary screening is provided at Appendix O.1.
- 7.1.28. PINS was of the view that the Project was likely to have a significant effect on the environment in two European Economic Area ("EEA") States; Denmark and Iceland. In reaching this view it has applied the precautionary approach (as explained in its Advice Note Twelve: Transboundary Impacts) and taken into account the information that has been supplied by the Applicant with its request for a Scoping Opinion in August 2022.
- 7.1.29. PINS notified the states of Denmark and Iceland in respect of potential impacts on bird populations of conservation importance on 2 March 2023, and published a notice (signed by PINS for and on behalf of the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities) in the London Gazette on 10 March 2023. The notice reported that:
 - "In accordance with Regulation 32 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (EIA Regulations) the Secretary of State has provided information to the above mentioned EEA States about the Proposed Development and its likely significant effects, and these States have been asked to indicate by 17 April 2023 whether or not they wish to participate in the procedure for examining and determining the application under the Planning Act 2008 (PA 2008) and Regulation 32 of the EIA Regulations."
- 7.1.30. A response was received on behalf of Denmark on 17 April 2023, confirming the state would like to participate in the procedure going forward. A copy of the notice is available at Appendix O.2 and the response from Denmark is provided at Appendix O.3.





8. Conclusions

- 8.1.1. This Report sets out the consultation activities which have been undertaken and the publicity provided in accordance with sections 42, 47, 48 and 49 of the 2008 Act. ABP developed the approach to the Statutory Consultation and publicity in line with the requirements of the 2008 Act (and the APFP Regulations and EIA Regulations), as well as DCLG (2015) Guidance and Advice Note 14 as set out in this Report.
- 8.1.2. Two rounds of pre-Application Statutory Consultation and publicity were undertaken by ABP under sections 42, 47 and 48 of the 2008 Act the first Statutory Consultation from 9 January 2023 to 20 February 2023, and a second Statutory Consultation from 24 May 2023 to 20 July 2023. Both rounds of Statutory Consultation and publicity provided a period for feedback responses in excess of the statutory minimum of 28 days.
- 8.1.3. Responses to both rounds of Statutory Consultation and publicity have been carefully considered and fully taken into account and regard has been had to those responses in finalising ABP's Application for a DCO as is required under section 49 of the 2008 Act.
- 8.1.4. In response to feedback received to the first Statutory Consultation some minor changes/refinements were made to the Project in respect of which ABP consulted by undertaking a second round of Statutory Consultation.
- 8.1.5. This Report provides details as to how each requirement from the applicable legislation, regulations, as well as the guidance and advice notes, were met by the consultation and publicity undertaken by ABP. Compliance with the 2008 Act can be summarised as follows:
 - a. ABP undertook consultation under section 47 of the 2008 Act including consultation on both the first and second SoCC with local authorities, publication of the combined S47 and S48 notices, making both SoCCs available for inspection and undertaking consultation in accordance with the first published SoCC for the first Statutory Consultation and in accordance with the second SoCC for the second Statutory Consultation;
 - ABP undertook consultation under section 42 of the 2008 Act, as identified. This includes consultation with all relevant consultees under section 42(1)(a), section 42(1)(a), section 42(1)(b) and section 42(1)(d) (section 42(1)(c) Greater London Authority was not relevant to the Project);
 - ABP notified the Secretary of State of the proposed Application and that it
 would be accompanied by an ES under section 46 of the 2008 Act and in line
 with the EIA Regulations;
 - d. ABP publicised the Statutory Consultations in accordance with section 48 of the 2008 Act. This included the publication of a joint section 47 and section 48 notice in local and national newspapers, the London Gazette, Lloyd's List and Fishing News. This was replicated for both the first and second rounds of Statutory Consultation. This also included notification to consultation bodies in line with the EIA Regulations;





- e. ABP has had regard to all relevant consultation responses received, as per section 49 of the 2008 Act. Further detail of the issues raised and ABP's responses are included in this Report and the appendices to it; and
- f. ABP has had regard to statutory guidance issued by the Secretary of State, as per section 50 of the 2008 Act.
- 8.1.6. In addition to demonstrating compliance with the relevant statutory requirements, this Report also explains how ABP has also undertaken a process of Ongoing Engagement, which has also informed the development of the Project and the assessment of its effects.
- 8.1.7. This Report and collection and handling of data is compliant with the General Data Protection Regulation ('GDPR') which came into force from the 25th May 2018.


